


Valley's All-Star Grid Combines Poised for 11th Meeting of Series Tonight

Weather Crisp for Grid Classic

Stars Meet Tonight

Unusually crisp August weather, in prospect again tonight, provides a familiar fall background for the year's first football attraction, the all-star battle at Wheeling Stadium between the Ohio and West Virginia seniors of last season.

The occasion is the 11th of the Ohio Valley's all-star spectacles and it will be kicked off at 8:30 o'clock before a throng of over 10,000 of the football hungry fans.

The contest, which offers a twin climax with the crowning of the 1952 Queen of Queens at half-time, brings the Eastern Ohio huskies, coached by Pitt's Red Dawson, into town from their West Liberty State training camp high in hopes of extending their three-year rule into the fourth season.

West Virginia's stars, forced to give away weight tonight, placed their hopes in a clever set of backs who will deploy behind a line that is just short of the astounding of their Buckeye rivals.

Red Drew, coach of the West Virginians, and the grid strategist who directs the Crimson Tide of Alabama is committed to assisting with a backfield of West Jerry Comer, Dick Lash and Jerry Comer, with Jerry Comer, with Jerry Comer, with Jerry Comer.

won the first back in 1947 with a West Virginia team that scored twice 13-0, but lost the second a year later by 207 to the Ohioans.

To counter Ohio's Steubenville tackle huskies, the Conkel brothers, who are listed as starters, West Virginia will send two of its stalwarts, Bob Gardner of Wheeling and Cecil Huss of Linsly into the opposing line. They outweigh their tackle rivals on the Buckeye side as a whole as being at 200 pounds on the average to West Virginia's 197.

Ohio's backfield can put its punting unit to rest on its own terms, but the line is not as strong as the West Virginia training camp.

while Quentin Smith will hike the average at the other half.

Drew, in moulding his West Virginia cast, aided by his veteran aide, Lou Bostick, is able to come up with another clever set of ball carriers in Ross Sissini, Ted Pavlic and Al Riccadonna with Ken Jones at the switch.

Tonight's contest finds Ohio setting the winning pace for the series with six decisions to West Virginia's four. When Princeton's Charley Caldwell directed the Mountaineers to their 6-0 triumph in 1949, with Billy Reynolds as his ace back, West Virginia led for the last time.

The Buckeyes struck back for a 14-0 triumph in 1950, grabbed a 13-6 nod the next fall and last season, when Caldwell returned as coach, the Princeton mentor sent his Ohio eleven to a 20-15 verdict over the Jim Tatum-coached West Virginians.

Programme ceremonies, including the arrival of the queen candidate, near 8 o'clock, will bring the high school yards of Bellaire, Weirton, St. Clairsville and Wellsburg into the picture.

The rival senior schedules for the night game will announce their own equipment, will debut the West Virginia training camp.
