Ohio-W. Va. Stars Clash Saturday

Football plunges back into the Ohio-Valley sports picture this Saturday evening when the 12th Annual Ohio-West Virginia All-Star game unfolds on the Wheeling Stadium gridiron. Kickoff time is 8:30 o'clock.

Both the Buckeyes and Mountaineers appear exceptionally strong for the 1954 renewal of the pigskin classic which finds West Virginia striving to square the series at six victories apiece.

The West Virginians snapped a string of three straight Ohio victories, 7-0, in last year's game.

At the West Liberty State College training camp, the coaching staffs yesterday indicated that they were "very well pleased" with the progress of their respective clubs. The clashing squads take a one-day "break" in their 10-day training period today before heading into the last week of drills tomorrow.

Follansbee high's Doug Stone and Union's Charley Helinski will co-direct West Virginia which is expected to operate from both the "T" and short punt formations. Ohio, coached by Tiltonville's Jimmy Vince

and assisted by Nick Vrotsos, will counter with a straight "T" attack.

Rich Canestraro of Union's 1953 West Virginia runners-up will probably open at quarterback for West Virginia with Eddie Groux (Warwood) and Eddie Garbark, star of Central Catholic's OVAC "AA" champions, at halfback. The Mountaineers' tailback spot is well fortified. Either Ralph Anastasio (Follansbee) or Kenny Mikes of Sistersville high's 1953 West Virginia "B" champions will open at fullback.

Field general for Ohio's "T" attack will be Tony Casshie of

Dillonvale while the remainder of the Buckeye backfield probably will find Willie Stincin (Steubenville) and Cal Smith (Yorkville) at halfbacks with Don Sutherin, the Toronto standout, at fullback.

Groux has been elected by his mates as West Virginia's captain while Sutherin was accorded the same honor by the Ohioans.

West Virginia won the first two games in the series, 13-7 in 1940 and 7-0 in 1941, before Ohio swept two decisions, 20-7 in 1942 and 26-7 in 1946 when the rivalry was resumed after

the war. West Virginia won, 13-0, in 1947 but Ohio scored by 20-7 in 1948. Once again, West Virginia seized an edge in victories when it won the 1949 battle by 6-0 but the Ohioans came back to sweep three in a row, 14-0, 13-6 and 26-13, prior to last year's 7-0 Mountaineer triumph. So Ohio has six wins to five for West Virginia.

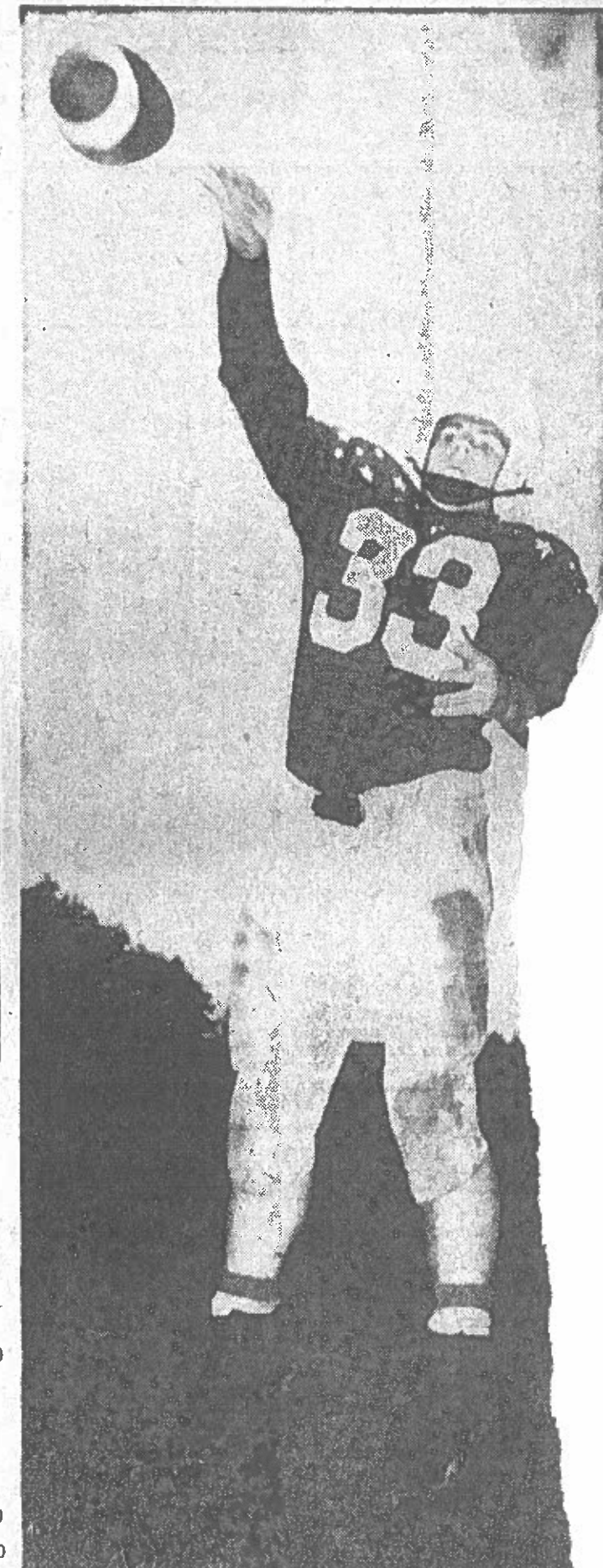

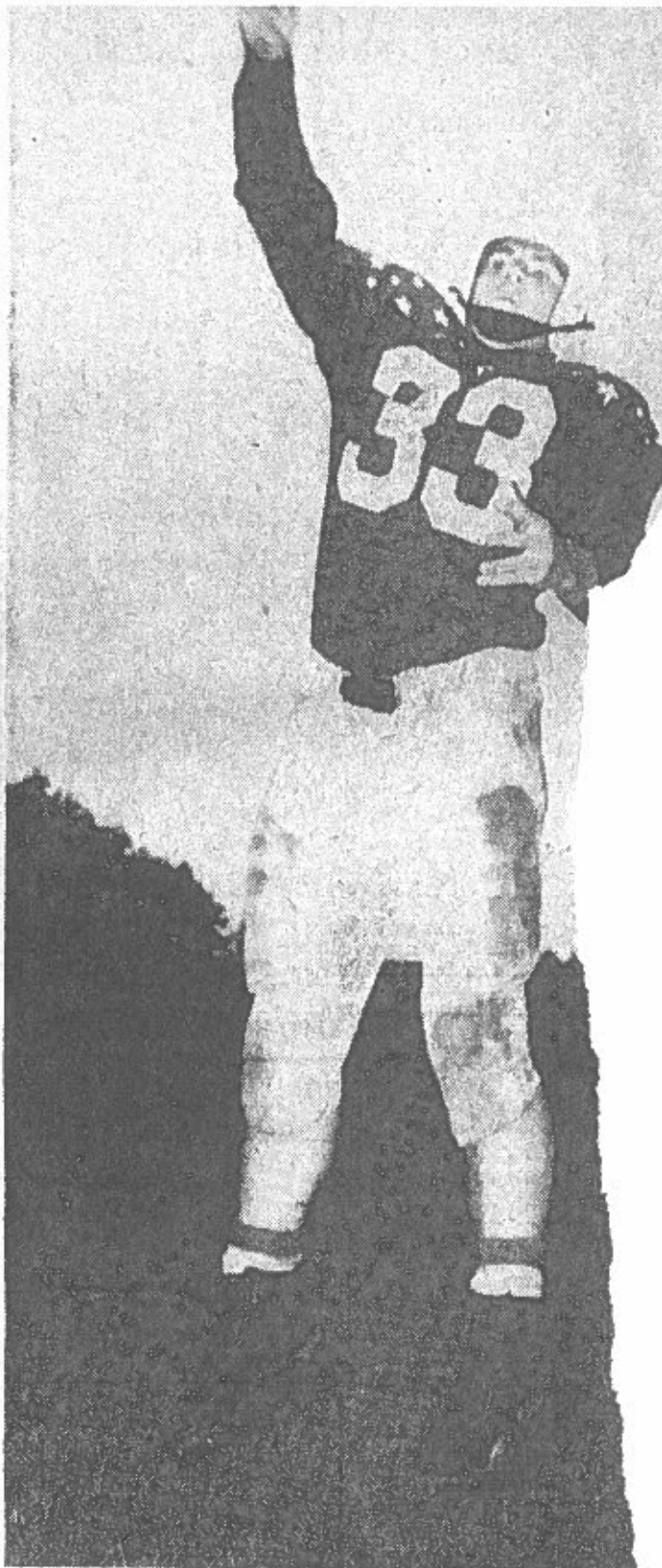

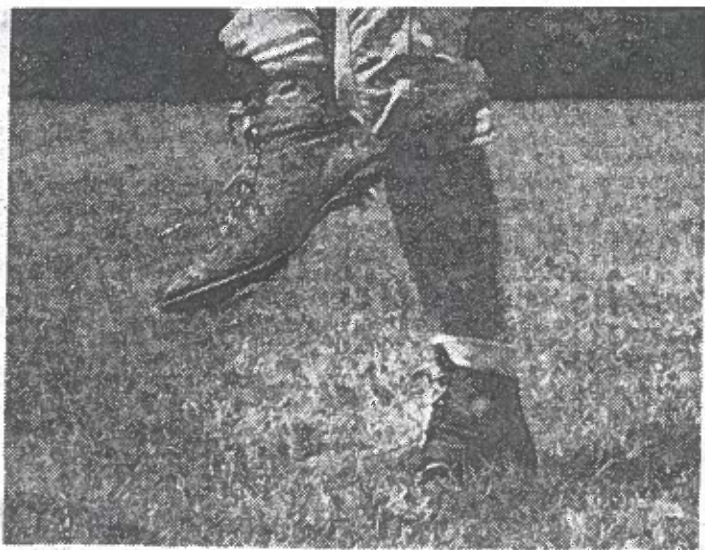

Almost Five Tons of Footballers!

OV Stars Report

Close to five tons of football talent will be deposited in West Liberty on Tuesday evening, the important ingredients for the 12th of the Ohio Valley's all-star football games.

The Eastern Ohio and West Virginia squads, scaling in at over 9,900 pounds in the aggregate, are to assemble at the Wheeling High building for a 5 o'clock departure to the Hilltopper campus where the senior stalwarts of a year ago will be quartered until the afternoon of this year's game, August 14.

Tuesday's early arrivals at West Liberty will eat their first meal at 5:30 o'clock and after a session with their respective coaches will turn in for the first of twice daily drills on Wednesday morning.

Doug Stone of Follansbee and Charley Helinski, who gave Union High its second straight OVAC Class A grid championship last fall, will collaborate in preparing their West Virginia athletes for the Wheeling Stadium date.

The Ohioans this year are to be directed by Jimmy Vince, Tiltonsville coach and his aide, Nick Vrotsos, who has resigned the Dillonvale post to become Dover High Basketball tutor. Both squads, numbering 25 players, will be quartered in the men's dormitory at West Liberty.

Athletic Director Joe A. Bartell, of the Hilltop college, will direct the all-star camp.

There will be no marked disparity in weights of the rival squads. West Virginia has an aggregate of 4,523 pounds to Ohio's 4,462, leaving the over-all average just two pounds apart.

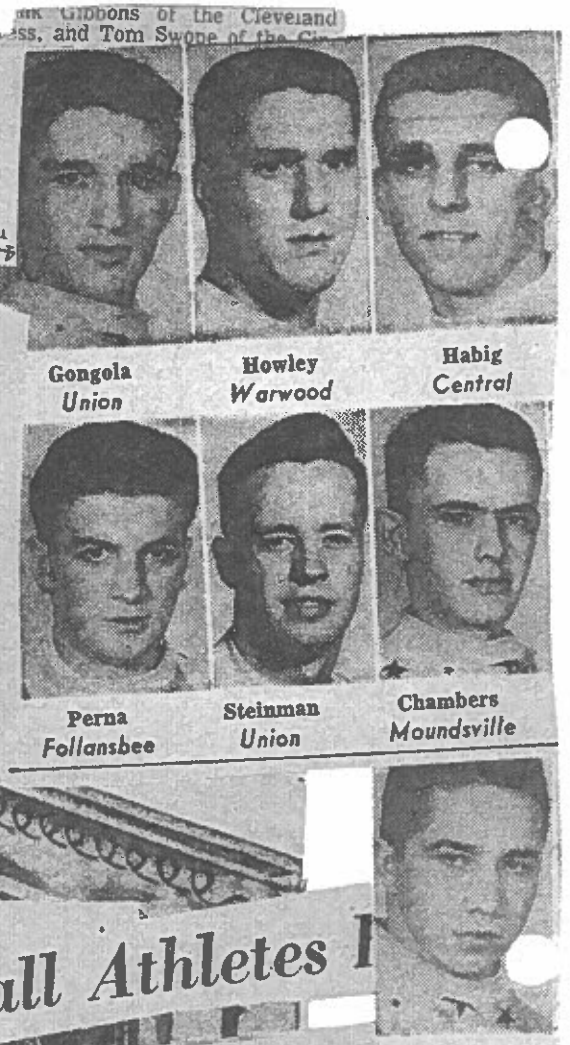

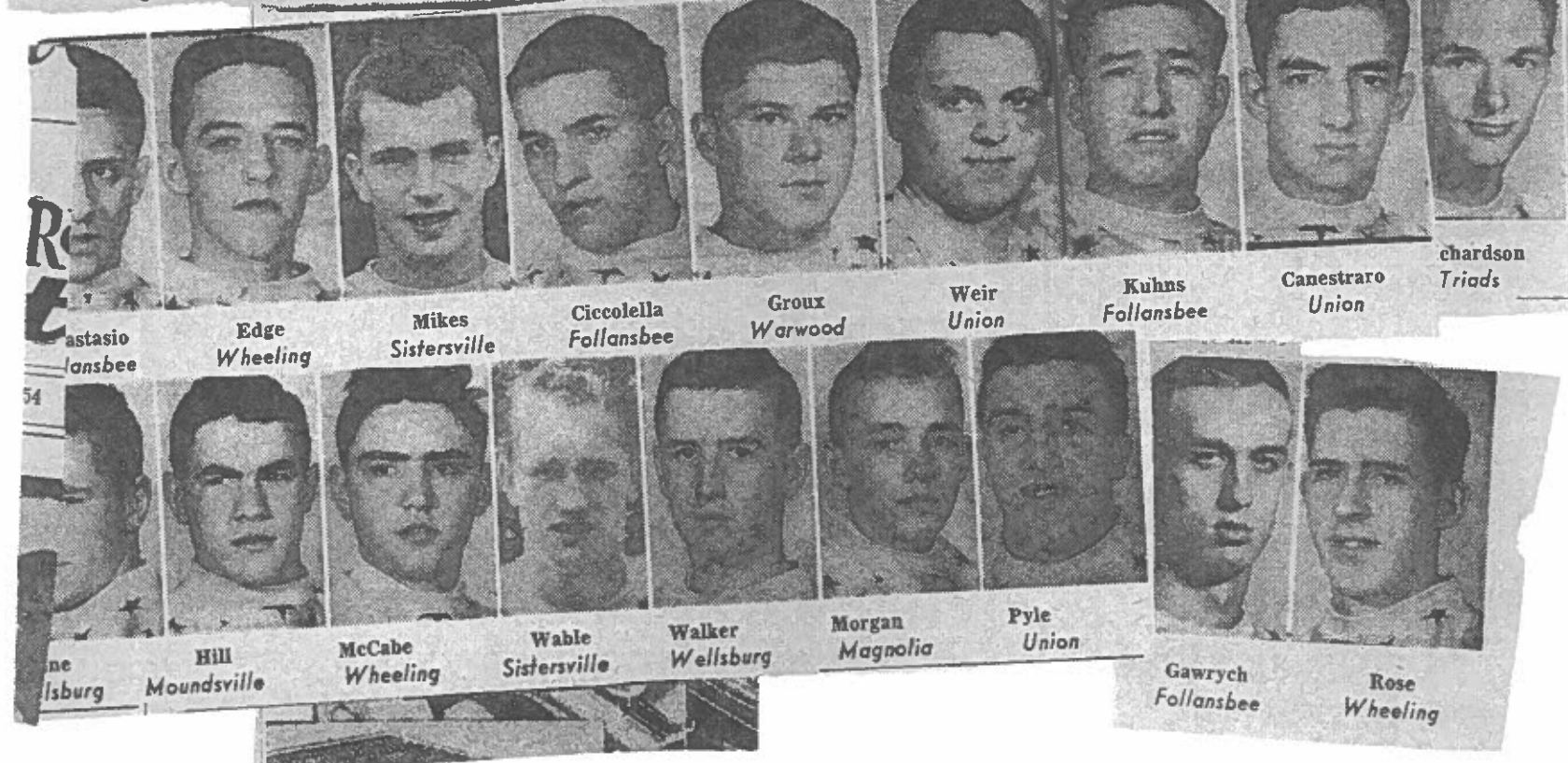
