# Automatic Safety

## Lands 2-0 Margin

The inevitable dog joined the marching bands at the start of the game and it turned out the pooch gained more ground than anyone.

But the Ohio All-Stars beat the West Virginia entry 2-0 on an automatic safety and it was fitting enough since it was apparent from the beginning that no one was going to win this going frontwards.

The moment of truth came with about three and a half minutes left in the game. Ohio had moved to a first down on the West Virginia 11. They took four whacks at it but as had happened all night, the Mountaineers stood strong where it counted most and the Ohioans lost the ball on downs on the three yard line.

With knee-burting Deeney Deegan operating at quarter-back, the West Virginians managed to get as far out as the seven yard line. Weirton half-back Tim Connell then went back to punt and Lyn Dodd, the good Wellsburg center who had played a standout game

thus far, snapped the ball over Connell's head and out of the end zone.

Two points, Ohio. And that was the name of the game.

It might rank as a moral victory for the West Virginia crew. They came into this seven-point underdogs in betting circles and more than that man to man.

There were perhaps 4,000 people watching it. They saw a winner, Ohio. There was no loser, nor can there ever be in a game such as this.

When you look for a star in this one you must only gaze as far as Jay Duffy. This little (150 lbs.) halfback from Wheeling Central was a monster on defense.

As time was fleeting in the first half and the Ohioans were knocking on the door, it was Duffy who leaped and slugged away a pass labeled touchdown.

And more times than a few when a runner managed to turn a corner, it was Duffy, all Tiger, who made the tackle.

He wasn't alone.

It has to be some kind of tribute to Big George Demko that the smaller West Virginia defenders constantly stopped Ohio drives. Charley DiBias, also from Wheeling Central had a hand in more than a moderate share of tackles. Jim Garbark, injured late in the first half, was a bull on defense.

Johnny Sobata, from Bishop Donahue was there a major portion of the time.

Terry as a pass receiver of no small accomplishment. He gather strikes from Shadyside's Ed Roman most of the night.

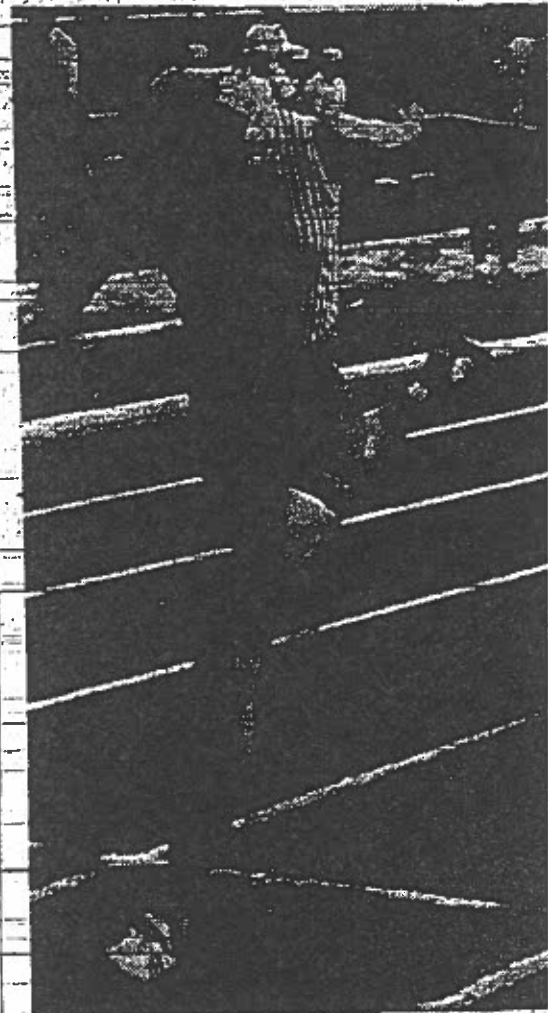
Doug DuBois of Union Local was the guy they called on for the vital three or four yards and often enough he got it.

# Orioles Nip Yanks In 10th

NEW YORK (AP) — Rookie outfielder Sam Bowers' 10th-inning home run powered the Baltimore Orioles to a 6-5 triumph and their second straight victory over the New York Yankees before the American League's largest crowd of the season Saturday.

A crowd of 52,798, largely attracted by the annual Old Timers Day ceremonies, saw Bowers break a 5-5 tie with a two-out, line drive into the lower left field stands on a 1-1 pitch by relief pitcher Hal Renitt.

The victory widened the Orioles lead to two games over the Yankees, who fell into third place one-half game behind the Chicago-White Sox, who defeated Boston 9-2.

Baltimore and New York conclude their four-game series with a doubleheader Sunday.

The homer, No. 18 of the season for Bowers, was his third hit of the game. Previously he doubled and singled, scoring in the fifth on a sacrifice fly by Dick Brown, and again in the seventh on a home run by Earl Robinson.

## Buckeyes Out To Land 12th Win in Series

West Virginians Rated Underdogs By Seven Points

A wild offensive battle may be in the offing tonight as the 21st edition of the Ohio-West Virginia football game unfolds at the Island Stadium with the Buckeyes favored to pick up their 12th victory in the twice-interrupted series.

Kickoff for the clash is scheduled at 8 o'clock with the half-time show to be spiced by the naming of the 1964 Ohio Valley Queen of Queens. The forecast for clear weather should stimulate ticket sales at the box office, which opens at 6:30. Tickets are \$2 each. Colorful pre-game activities will get underway with the Mingo and Wellsburg high school bands entertaining the early arrivals at 7 o'clock.

At 7:15 the two bands will lead the Queen of Queens procession onto the field. The 27 queen candidates, riding in convertibles and accompanied by cheerleaders and majorettes from their respective high schools, will be led to the south end of the field.

Here they will be seated on a specially-constructed platform.

Players from both squads will come out on the field at 7:30 for a 20-minute warmup session. Introduction of players will be made at 7:50 and the night of football will get underway after the playing of the National Anthem.

Ohio has a very fine passer in its lineup by the name of Ed Roman, former Shadyside quarterback—Roman not only is a highly-rated passer, but he is also a strong runner and could move to a halfback post if injuries beset the Ohio squad.

On Sunday in the AFL it's the Houston Oilers at Boston Patriots and the Kansas City Chiefs at Oakland Raiders.

The regular season opens Sept. 12 in both leagues.

rest of Ohio's starting backfield will be made up of Steubenville's Rick Terry and Union-Local's Doug Dubois at the halfbacks and line-crashing Frank Savarese of Yorkville at fullback. Terry, a speedster, is also rated as an outstanding pass receiving threat.

West Virginia's backfield will also include tricky co-captain Jay Duffy of Central and Moundsville's Harvey Foster at the halfbacks and Central's Jerry Cappiccie at fullback.

Cappiccie, a strong runner, was the bread-and-butter man on the Central offense last year that was headed by Duffy and all-state quarterback Chuck Lovinski. Whenever the Knights needed short yardage, Cappiccie was the man to get it for them.

Brookover, West Virginia's other co-captain, was an outstanding pass receiver at Magnolia and also proved to be an exceptional blocker. No midget by any means, Brookover is 6-3 and 185 pounds of "dynamite" according to his high school coach, Bob Sullivan.

# Strager Has QB Problem As All-Stars Open Drills

"Let's bird dog it," the man said.

And across the field the big guy was yelling "Drive, drive, dig. You don't take anyone out on your knees."

This was at Cadiz and George Strager, the boss man and his assistant, Big George Demko were inspiring sweat in the kids who will play for West Virginia in the Ohio - West Virginia All Star Game.

It was a motley group and Strager, as good a football coach as you will stumble across in this valley, was trying to do in days what it took him a season to do when he first arrived to coach Central Catholic.

He had a gutsy little kid named Vince DiBias from Warwood under center and the little quarterback was running a bootleg off which he'd throw to a swinging halfback.

"Keep running," George hollered. "Don't stop, don't get set, throw the pass on the run."

And they'd come back and "bird dog it."

When you bird dog it for Strager you are walking off slowly, step by step the play he's devised. And if Strager can install his system well enough in a scant few days he'll beat Ohio and Dangerous Dan McGrew and if he can't he won't, and that's a fact, sports fan.

At Cadiz the kids were working hard. Demko took his linemen under a low slung trampoline or some such and made them bust heads. "It makes them keep their noses on the ground where they belong," George said, and he hollered "Yo!"

And a couple of kids blasted

into each other in a two man war.

"C'mon, c'mon," Demko yelled. "Drive, get off your knees. Drive."

And a kid came up with a bloody nose and said, "Alright, let's try again." And they tried again and the kid got off his knees and took his man out.

This one will be a conflict for Strager. It will be his last appearance as a West Virginia coach and he's running in bad luck. His own boy, Denny Deegan who he expected to play at quarterback probably will not make it. He injured an old basketball infirmity and he stands with his knee bandaged watching the others work out with a look of sadness in his eye.

"I'll play," he says.

The doctors doubt it. Strager hopes so.

If it is not Deegan then it will be DiBias and DiBias is very small for a quarterback. "We'll probably have to stay on the ground a lot," Strager said. "I can't put DiBias back in the pocket, he's going to have to swing, throw on the run."

One of the buys he'll throw on the run to is Dave Byrd a rugged halfback from Weirton who was supposed to go into the service in a week but who got a short-term deferrment so he can play.

And there is little Gary Fos-

ter, a Moundsville halfback whom Strager claims has "more guts than anyone here." Guts he must have because he looks less like a halfback than anything. He claims he weighs 145 but the suspicion is he includes the shoulder pads and maybe his shoes in that figure.

Another tough little one is Bill Jeneskee, the mighty might from Follansbee who Demko will use as an offensive guard and defensive end. The sight of a five foot two defense end is a little startling but Jeneskee makes up in desire what he lacks in muscle.

All - Stars or not, the kids were impressive. Nobody gets dressed in a dozen pounds of equipment and runs up and down in the hot sun unless he really came to play.

Even Deegan, standing there on his wounded knee. The coach only hopes, the doctor is not optimistic. You see him put a little extra pressure on the knee and lip - reading you can see him mutter, "I'll play."

And under that trampoline, Jim Hall of Union High bangs into Terry Yeager of Paden City, and Demko yells, "No! No! drive harder, keep off your knees." And then he says, "Okay, next two men," and Hall looks at him. "Let me try one more time, coach."

The raw-boned Thompson, who is 5 ft. 11 and weighs 155, started out as a center in football his freshman year, was moved to halfback as a sophomore and wound up quarterbacking the Mounties as a senior.

He tossed several TD passes as a halfback his junior year and had five scoring aerials as a senior. Jim tallied six touchdowns last fall when Mt. Pleasant won six of 10 games, losing a pair by two points and another by a TD.

Thompson was co-captain of the Mountie gridgers and captain of the basketball squad his senior year. He tallied close to 900 points in basketball and ranked fourth among Class A players in East Ohio last winter with an average of 22 points per game.

Jim made the Eastern Ohio Athletic League all-star team and the "A" team of the OVAC in both football and basketball his senior year. He was All-Eastern Ohio in basketball and particular honorable mention All-Eastern Ohio in football. Thompson plans to enroll at West Liberty State College.

## Frick Will Leave Post Next Year

BOSTON (UPI) — Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick has informed the 20 major league teams he will leave his post when his present term expires next year, it was announced here Wednesday night.

Presidents Warren Giles of the National League and Joe Cronin of the American League announced Frick's position in a joint statement. They said Frick had informed major league owners he would not seek reelection to another term as Commissioner when his term expires Sept 21, 1965.

Frick, who will be 70 later this year, had repeatedly expressed his intention to retire when the term ends, but the letter to club owners served as official notification.

Cronin and Giles said they had requested Frick to convene a meeting of the major league executive council Monday in Chicago to make preliminary recommendations to a joint meeting of the two leagues the following day.

The recommendations would involve procedure to be followed in the selection of Frick's successor.

Cronin, a former major league player and manager, has been prominently mentioned as a possible successor. Tuesday's meeting will be the regular annual summer meeting of the major leagues.

In his letter, Frick said in part, "... I have stated many times, and I am sure you are aware of, my intention not to seek reelection. In order that there may be no doubt on the subject, let me make my position clear."

## Driver Hurt In Practice Spin, Dies

COLOGNE, Germany (UPI)—Count Karel Godin De Beaufort of the Netherlands, who drove his own four-cylinder Prosche against the best drivers and cars in the world for eight of his 30 years, died Sunday night as a result of injuries sustained during training runs for the Grand Prix of Germany.

The announcement of his death, the result of a fractured skull, was made Monday by the Cologne University Neuro-Surgical Clinic, where Beaufort was transferred Sunday just two hours before his death.

Beaufort, who financed his own trips across the European continent to match his car against the Ferraris, BRMs and Lotuses which dominate the Grand Prix circuit, went off the Nuerburgring track Saturday and smashed into an embankment.

He was taken to a Koblenz hospital after the accident, then transferred to Cologne by helicopter when his condition worsened. Beaufort's mother, Countess Godin De Beaufort, who lived with her son at the Maarsberg Castle in Utrecht Province, rushed to Cologne when notified of her son's critical condition, but arrived too late.

McGrew, in revealing his tentative lineups, stressed that he was pleased with the hustle and attitude displayed by his charges during the first week of drills.

"These boys came to play. I don't think I could have picked a finer group of boys if I had my pick of all the players in the valley."

Offensively the Ohioans will lineup with Paul Briggs, Martins Ferry, and Andy Wiley, Pownatan, at ends; Lou Delbert of Bellaire and Mike Koran, Mt. Pleasant, at tackles; Wayne Peters, Bellaire, and John Livorno, Shadyside, at guards; Stewart Tolbert of St. John's at center; Frank Savarese, Yorkville, at fullback; Rick Terry, Steubenville, and Dave Trouten, St. John's, at the halfback posts; and either Greg Merrill of Barnesville or Ed Roman of Shadyside at the all-important quarterback position.

McGrew said that he is still in the dark about his starting quarterback, but that Merrill and Roman would probably share the job during the game.

Defensively, McGrew has named Chet Masloski, Adena, and Frank West, Martins Ferry, at ends; Claude Luke, Shadyside and Dave Ice, Bellaire, at tackles; John Yarbrough, Pownatan, middle guard; Peters and Livorno, linebackers; Jack Bernosky, Adena, and Doug Dubois, Union Local, or Dave Hall, Bridgeport, at the corners; and Frank Ropp, Brilliant, and Jim Thompson, Mt. Pleasant, at safeties.

Thompson, a 174-pounder who was the starting quarterback

at Mt. Pleasant, sustained a dislocated finger on Saturday but is expected to be ready for the game.

Briggs, who stands 6-10 and weighs 180 pounds, turned an ankle during a light workout yesterday. However, McGrew feels Briggs will be ready to resume workouts today.

West Virginia coach George Strager says he doesn't know when he'll pick even a tentative starting lineup. "We're still trying to get our offense clicking the way it should," said the former Central football tutor.

Strager believes it will be late in the week before he gets down to the business of who'll be on the field for the opening whistle.

However, he did point out that his quarterbacking problem may soon be solved because of the improved performances of former Warwood passer, Vince DiBias. "He's coming a lot faster than I expected," Strager. DiBias, a 5-9, 160-pounder, was only a one-year regular at quarterback for Jim Foti's Vikings. But he is an able passer and has shown a great desire to win the starting job.

Strager's biggest trouble spot right now is the offensive line. "Our backfield is coming along at a rapid pace while the linemen are making slow progress." He is hoping that the situation will be corrected in the next day.

The West Virginia team scrimmaged twice yesterday thanks to the rain which softened the hard gridiron at Cadiz.

Denny Deegan, former Central end, is showing signs of recovery from his leg injury. Deegan did not participate in either of the scrimmages but did quite a bit of running. Strager feels he'll be ready for contact work by tomorrow.

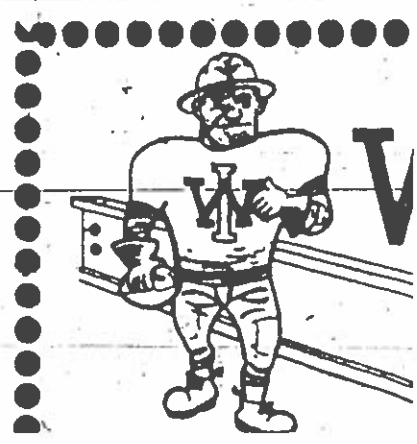
