Open Fire Wins Delaware

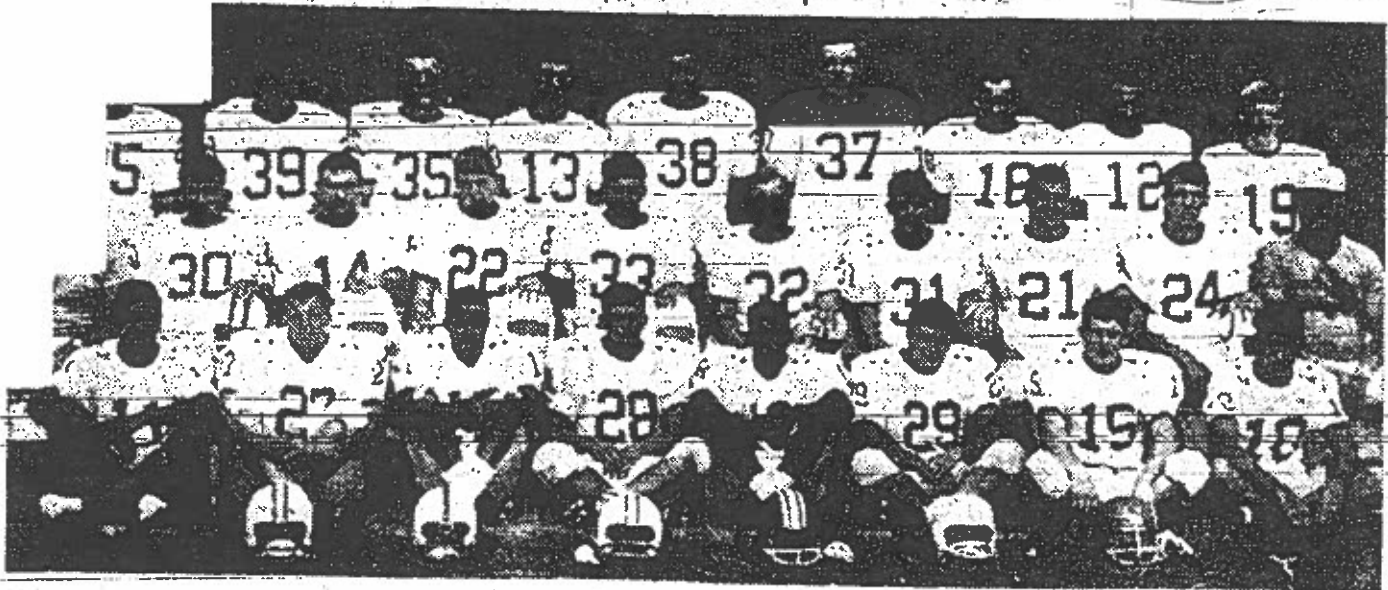

Secy-treas Austin L. King of the Association mailed out programs last week which call for 18-hole medal ~~day of five classes. These range from the 60 to 54 year~~ age group to the 70 years and over.

Play will be in foursomes with trophies for low gross and low net scores in each group. The U.S. Senior Golf Assoc handicap rule will be in force. The senior championship will go to the player making the lowest gross return.

The 1965 champion is Cyril J. Ackermann of the Wheeling C. C. with a card of 75. Winners in the other classes last year include young Clark Porter of Belmont Hills whose low gross of 83 topped the 70 years and over group. Pro Tom Carney predicts Porter will be shooting his age in another year.

Low gross in the 65-69 group is held by Ralph Boyd of Belmont with a score of 80 the same score that Cam Palmer recorded in the 60-64 class. W. B. Laughlin of last Liverpool holds the 55-59 crown with 76 and G. W. Pindler of Belmont the 50-55 class with 75.

The Association member clubs include Belmont, Cadiz, Dyer, East Liverpool, Moundsville, Pleasant Valley, Steubenville, Wheeling and Williams. H. C. (Hod) Marshall of Moundsville is president, Fred Seely of Belmont Hills vice president and A. L. King of Wheeling secy-treas.

A crowd estimated at 6,500 paid stayed until well into the fourth quarter, waiting for a West Virginia comeback that never materialized.

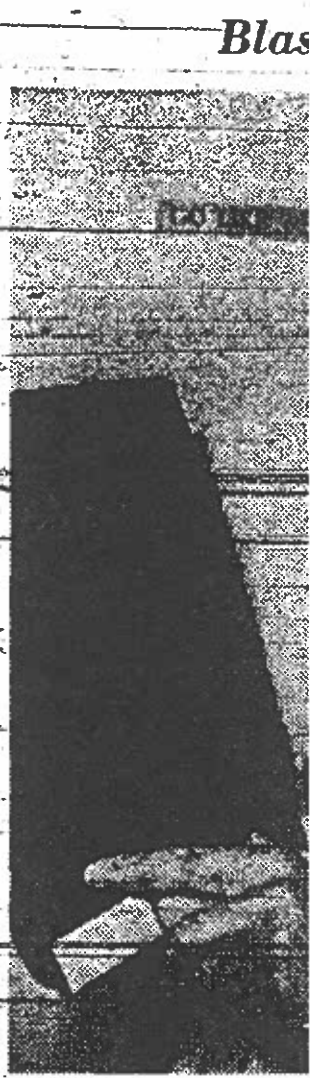
However, the West Virginians turned in an outstanding game in defeat as the Buckeyes did not wrap things up until they pushed across two TDs in the final eight minutes.

Jacobs was voted the Ohio team's most valuable player despite three TDs by Thornton, the former Wellsville star. But it was the passing arm of Jacobs that helped put the game on ice late in the first half as he guided his team 83 yards in the final four minutes.

Ohio took the opening kickoff and marched 57 yards to paydirt.

The Buckeyes never threw a pass in this surge as Thornton and Cadiz' Buddy Warrington shared the ball-toting, with a key seven-yard dash by Falbo on fourth and two giving Ohio a first down at the 15. After grinding out first down at the three, Thornton took a quick pitch from Jacobs and outraced two defenders around the right side for the TD. OHIO TEAM FAVORED

All-Stars Clash Saturday

The stars will be out at Wheeling Stadium Saturday night. The occasion will be the twenty-third game in the Ohio-West Virginia all-star football series, which had its inception in 1940 and has been interrupted only twice — for three years during World War II and again in 1963.

Ohio, which holds a 13-9 edge in the inter-state series, is a one-to-two favorite in this year's engagement, due primarily to the speed of the Buckeye backfield, featuring the touted Wellsville star, Chris "Thunder" Thornton.

While a brisk advance ticket sale has been reported by the sponsoring Booster organizations, plenty of choice seats are still available. Tickets will be removed from agencies tonight or early on Saturday but will be on sale tomorrow night at the stadium, where the entertainment begins at 6:30 p.m., with music by the Warwood High band.

The Queen of Queens entrants, riding in convertibles, will enter the stadium at 7 and pregame practice for the rival squads begins at 7:20. "The Star Spangled Banner" and the introduction of individual players precedes an 8 o'clock kickoff.

Ohio's team is piloted by Joe Ault, who posted a perfect record at Bridgeport last fall and was hailed as the valley's "coach of the year" as his Bulldogs won an OVAC double A crown. He is being assisted by Lewis "Red" Higginbotham, of St. Clairsville.

Fred Tweedie, Union's head coach, directs the Mountaineers, with the help of his Ironmen assistant, Rich Canestraro. Ohio squad suffered a

blow when it was learned Thursday that Ed Bondzaleske, stellar guard from Bridgeport, has been lost to the team with a hairline shoulder fracture.

With a running quarterback in Bob Jacobs, Bellaire, and a passer in Rich Marmie, Barnesville-mite, Ohio is expected to use a diversified attack. The Buckeyes boast tremendous halfback speed in Thornton, Cadiz star Bud Warrington, and Mingo sprinter Ralph Burke.

Tweedie is hoping that the Ohio offense can be contained by such linemen as Rick Blake (177), Union; Jim Taylor (204) and Harry Zekowski (238), both of Wheeling Central; John Zuk (235), Union; and Linebackers Dave Hodgson (177), of Wheeling, and Dave Shimek (179), of Union.

Tweedie's husky Union fullback, Herman Gongola, who weighs 246, is a question mark

because of an ankle injury but the big boy was jogging on his injured leg Thursday and may be ready by Saturday. If he's not, Shimek will step in at fullback while Magnolia's high-scoring mite, Tom Haught, teams with Hodgson at halfback. Joe Matkovich, Bishop Donahue, and "Rusty" Wolfe, Moundsville, will split the quarterbacking.

Ohio's defense features Monty Witzberger, 198 pound middle guard from Bridgeport; two giant tackles in Frank Vingia (253), of St. John's, and Joe Planey (279), of St. C., a pair of linebackers who won all-state honors in Ernie Smallis (195), of Martins Ferry, and Rich Mason, (162), Mt. Pleasant, and Larry Drummond, fiery terminal from Bellaire.

Free substitution will be permitted and the two-point option on extra points will be in vogue.

Offensive Lineups Announced For All-Star Football Struggle

With both squads expected to start tapering off heavy work after today, tentative starting offensive lineups were revealed for Saturday night's Ohio-West Virginia All-Star football game, scheduled for Wheeling Stadium.

Joe Ault, pilot of the Ohio standouts, plans to open with hard-running Bob Falbo, 195-pounder from Steubenville Central, at fullback and will have the Wellsville sensation, Chris "Thunder" Thornton, 193, at one halfback. Either Buddy Warrington, 158, of Cadiz, or Ralph Burke, 154, of Mingo, will supply speed at the other half.

Ault plans to alternate Bob Jacobs, 190, of Bellaire, and little Rich Marmie, 146, of Barnesville, at quarterback.

Up front, Gay Lucci, 180, of Bellaire, will start at one end. Either Dennis Covey, 172, or Gary Timko, 160, will be at the other. Both are from Bridgeport.

Strangely enough, both Lucci and Covey were in the offensive backfields at their respective schools last year but previously had experience at end.

Joe Schumacher, from Woodsfield, will apply his 208 pounds at one tackle and Frank Vingia, 253, of St. John's Central, will be the other. Steve Domyan, 177, of Martins Ferry, will be at one guard and one of two Bridgeport boys, Monty Witzberger (200) or Ed Bondzeleski (161) at the other. Either Dale Senatore (173), of Warren Consolidated, or Jim Shields (172), of Jefferson Union, will be the center.

Fred Tweedlie, the West Virginia coach, will probably open with Joe Matkovich, 180, of Bishop Donahue, at quarterback and Tom Haught, 163, of Magnolia, and Dave Hodgson, 180, Wheeling, at the halves. However, there's a question mark at fullback for West Virginia because of Herman Gongola's ankle

sprain. If the 246-pounder from Union isn't ready, the call will go either to Jack Klein, 180, of Warwood, or Gongola's Union teammate, Dave Shimek, 179.

Two Wellsburg products, Ed Donley (176) and Steve Robinson (187) will share the center job while the guards will probably be Don Murray (210), of Warwood, and Rick Blake (177), of Union. Wheeling Central's

Harry Zelkowskl (238) and Linsly Institute's Greg Donley (210) will be the tackles. At the ends, Tweedlie will choose from among Dan Forsythe (174), of Oak Glen; "Chuck" White, 185, of Wellsburg; and Tim Bostaph, of Magnolia.

Both coaches emphasized that they hoped to use all personnel at their command. Most of the offensive starters will get a rest on defense.

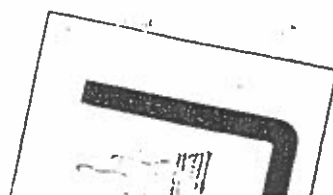

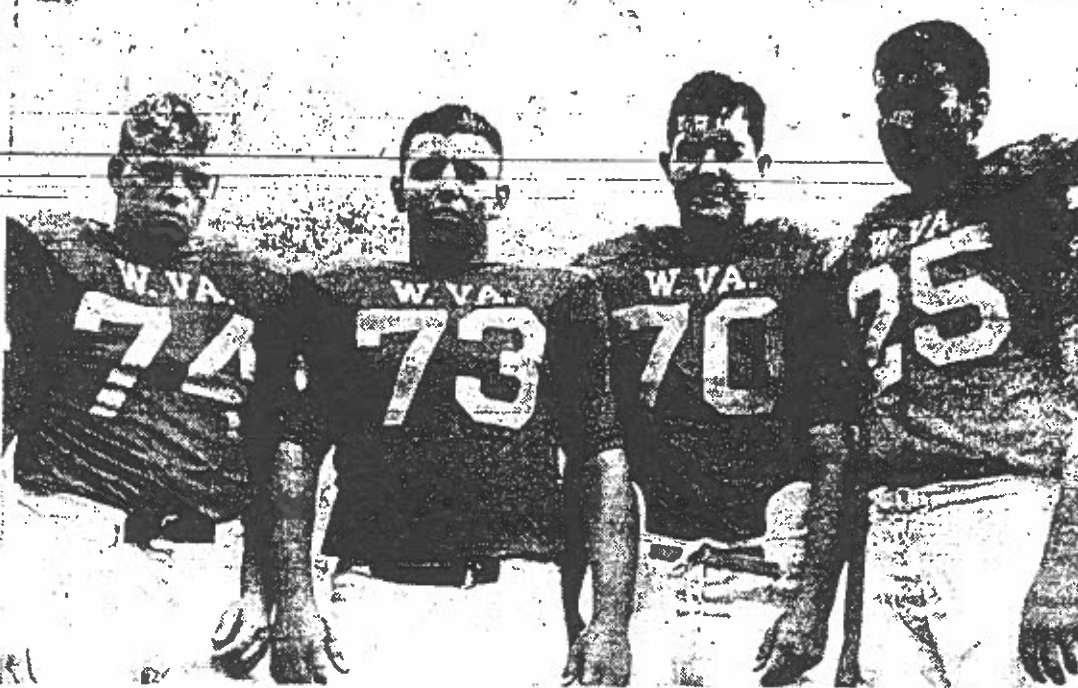
