
Wheeling Area Gridders on W. Va. All-Star Team

Buckeyes Out To Extend Victory Skein

The 1967 Ohio-West Virginia schoolboy all-star game unfolds tonight at the Wheeling Stadium with the Buckeyes expected to extend their domination of the series to a fifth straight year.

Kickoff will be at 8 p.m. with the game to be preceded by the entrance of the Queen of Queens candidates.

Both gridiron squads will break from their Cadiz training base shortly after 5 p.m. today and journey by two chartered buses to the game site. The teams will trot off the field for pre-game warmups at 7 p.m. with the procession of the queens candidates to start at 7:20. Providing the musical entertainment will be bands from St. Clairsville and Follansbee High Schools.

Tonight's game is the 24th in the long series between the two teams. Ohio, thanks to a run of four straight victories, has opened up a 14-9 edge. Plenty of seats are available and will be on sale at the gate tonight, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Both coaches are participating in a high-scoring battle with the offensive units to possibly stress a passing game. Both team boast quarterback with impressive passing credentials. Doing the ball-handling for the West Virginians will be Gene Weltz of Union and Pete Giglio of Follansbee. Johnny Bill Merrill of Barnesville and Tony Vavra of St. John's will split the quarterbacking duties for the Ohioans.

Ohio has been listed as a one-touchdown favorite but West Virginia coach Jim Foti doesn't believe it. "This looks like an even football game with breaks playing a key role. The team which makes the least number of mistakes should win."

Foti and Ohio coach Mike Matsakis are no strangers. Mat-

1967 Vogler Is Star, MVP For Foti

West Virginia defeated Ohio

Lights on Saturday night in the Valley All-Star football game at Wheeling Stadium.

Scoring once in the first half, when the lighting system at the Island park was on the blink, the Mountaineers added a pair of touchdowns after the electricity began working in the second half and presented the veteran Warwood coach, Jim Foti, with an 18-0 decision in his final appearance as a grid mentor.

Thus, the West Virginians broke an Ohio domination of the series that had extended back through 1964 and reduced the Buckeye margin in the interstate rivalry to four, at 14-10.

The electricians were unable to get the lighting system working until after intermission but the crowd of 7,300 which showed up on a pleasantly warm evening was surprised patient through a first half which saw the Mountaineers go ahead on a 12-yard sweep of left end by their starting quarterback, Gene Weitz, of Union, late in the second period. A 37-yard punt return by Wheeling's Bob Vogler set up the tally.

The aroused Buckeyes came on like gangbusters at the outset of the third period and drove from their own 20 to the W. Va. 8 before yielding the pigskin on downs. The Barnesville combination of little Johnny Merrill, at quarterback, and tall Dallas Adkins, at end, clicked on a 39-yard pass play and Bellaire's Rich Gianangeli reeled off a 17-yard run during the foray.

Follansbee's Terry Kidder, who did a tremendous job of punting throughout the game, extricated W. Va. from the hole with a 53-yard boot out of his own end zone.

In the opening seconds of the fourth quarter the Mountaineers jumped their lead to 12-0 when Pete Giglio hit his former Follansbee High teammate, Tim Stefan, on a 34-yard pass play. Stefan was wide open at the Buckeye 25.

Ohio advanced to the W. Va. 30 after the next kickoff but the alert Vogler thwarted the bid with an interception in his own end zone.

Late in the game another interception by Vogler, followed by his 26-yard return to the Buckeye 2, set up the final TD, which the Wheeling High grad made himself on a plunge with 1:25 left in the fray.

Vogler was stopped short on the point try but his outstanding performance won him an award as the Most Valuable Player on the winning side. Gianangeli was picked as Ohio's MVP.

The Mountaineers produced their three touchdown margin although garnering only 62





Scoring once in the first half, when the lighting system at the Island park was on the blink, the Mountaineers added a pair of touchdowns after the electricity began working in the second half and presented the veteran Warwood coach, Jim Foti, with an 18-0 decision in his final appearance as a grid mentor.

Ohio advanced to the W. Va. 30 after the next kickoff but the alert Vogler thwarted the bid with an interception in his own end zone.

Late in the game another interception by Vogler, followed by his 24-yard return to the Buckeye 2, set up the final TD, which the Wheeling High grad made himself on a plunge with 1:25 left in the fray.

One with the aid of a good roll traveled 56 yards from scrimmage and the second was good for 58 yards to push the Ohioans back to their seven.


