Queen-Of-Queens Pageant Adds Color To All-Star Tilt

The Stone and Thomas Queen of Queens Pageant will once again feature pre-game, halftime and post-game festivities arranged for the annual Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Charity All-Star Football Football Game at Wheeling Stadium this Saturday night.

Twenty-seven girls from Ohio Valley Athletic Conference schools are vying for the Queen of Queens title, with the winner receiving numerous gifts and a trip to New York City.

The winner will be announced during the colorful halftime ceremonies, along with members of her court and the girl voted "Miss Congeniality" by the queen contestants.

Harry Robbin, president of the sponsoring Wheeling department store, is expected to be on hand for the crowning ceremonies.

The Bellaire High band and cheerleaders will represent Ohio while the Brooke High band and cheerleaders will do the honors for West Virginia.

Pre-game activities will begin at 6:40 p.m., with the Queen of Queens professional, with the Bellaire band providing the music.

At 7, both squads will begin a 30-minute warmup period.

Guard and Legion of Honor will come on the field at 7:32 p.m. This will be followed by a prayer offered by Shriner Harry Hinerman and the Lord's Prayer to be sung by queen contestant Kathy Husek of St. John's Central.

The Bellaire band will then play the National Anthem and present a seven-minute show prior to the introduction of both All-Star squads:

Robert Otten, an official of Stone and Thomas, will be master of ceremonies for the Queen of Queens Pageant, with the Brooke High band providing the music. The Brooke band also will present halftime music following the crowning of the queen.

Also slated during halftime will be the presentation of plaques by the West Liberty State College Athletic Department to Jay Circosta of Woodsfield and Jim Yoho of Cameron, the head coaches in last year's All-Star Game. Edgar Martin, athletic director and head basketball coach at West Liberty, will make the presentations.

Rudolph Mumley, director for the All-Star Game, said the halftime festivities will be limited to 22 minutes.

Post-game entertainment will be provided by the Bellaire High band.

Attending the Saturday night clash, which gets underway at 8 p.m., will be a number of celebrities and high-ranking executives from both the Ohio High School Athletic Association and the West Virginia Secondary Schools Activities Commission.

Among the special guests will be players who suited up for the Ohio and West Virginia squads in the 1974 clash which also was played at Wheeling Stadium.

Whistle-tooters for the contest include Jack Prettyman, referee; Ed Weyrauch, umpire; Lou Kuntuplis, head linesman; Dick Millard, field judge; Jim Luparello, back judge; and Duane Powell, line judge. Working the chains on the sidelines will be Charles Paskalines, John Trovato and Quinn Marinacci.

Blank Buckeyes, 8-0

Newly-wed Mike Cain, the 195-pound power runner from John Marshall, exploded through Ohio's defense on a 15-yd scoring burst late in the third quarter Saturday night to register the only touchdown as West Virginia turned back the Buckeyes, 8-0, in the annual OVAC-sponsored charity football game and thus extended its domination of the inter-state classic through a third straight year.

A crowd estimated at 10,000 turned out on a warm August evening for the All-Star struggle and witnessed a game in which there was little sustained offense, though frequent turnovers and some dazzling defensive play added excitement to the evening.

After a scoreless first half, the Mountaineers, piloted by Brooke High coach Vincent "Sonny" Rea, put everything together for a 52-yd. scoring foray late in the third period. The touchdown was manufactured in just five plays after Oak Glen's Paul Kuzio returned an Ohio punt seven yards to the W. Va. 48.

Wheeling Central quarterback Chuck Hoose set the winning march in motion when he threw a quick out pattern to his Maroon Knight buddy, Greg Botizan, for nine yards. Then Hoose, who had experienced his difficulties in the first half, hit Brooke halfback Rich Thomaselli on a swing pass and the gummy Bruin dragged tacklers with him for a 19-yd. gain to the 24. Sturdy-legged Greg Babe, of Magnolia, a consistent ground gainer for W. Va., then hammered center to the 20 and Cain boomed to the 15.

On the next play Cain, who was married just a week before the game, fired quickly through a hole made

a fourth down there needing just inches for a stick-mover. But while the officials were measuring, a flag was dropped for unsportsmanlike conduct against the Buckeyes and the ball was moved back to midfield, thus forcing a punt.

However, the Bucks quickly got another opportunity when West Virginia punter Tim Richmond, of Paden City, under a hard rush by Toronto's Dan Cernansky got off a boot that traveled only eight yards from scrimmage to the W. Va. 33.

Ohio quarterback Hi Paknik, from Shadyside, then skirted end on a 13-yd. scamper to the 20. But on the very next play, Bellaire's Joe Masciarelli moved in at QB and fumbled when hit hard on a keeper. Kevin Beck, defensive end from Oak Glen, recovered at the 20 and that killed the last Buckeye chance of any consequence. Never were the Ohioans in West Virginia territory again.

The Mountaineers pitched a shutout largely due to the efforts of such stalwart defenders as Bernie Shalvey of Wheeling Central, Mike Yankavitch of Warwood, Steve Jeter of Weirton, Randy Rodgers of Wheeling, Butch Biondillo and Dan Griffith of Brooke and Oak Glen's Beck.

The Ohioans made only 111 yards rushing and were thrown for losses of 39 yards. The Bucks completed five of 10 passes for 51 yards and had just eight first downs.

West Virginia made 13 first downs. The winners picked up 140 yards rushing and clicked on five of 11 aerials for 69 yards, though suffering two interceptions. West Virginia backs were tossed for losses of just 21 yards.

Penalties played a key role in the game. Ohio lost 80 yards on assessments and West Virginia only 40.

opening half but clicked with only two of eight passes and when Wheeling Central quarterback Chuck Hoose dropped back to try long bombs twice in the late seconds of the half, he was dropped for losses.

W. Va. lost no time in mustering the initial threat of the night. On the third scrimmage play of the contest Magnolia's hard-running Greg Sabe broke through left tackle and cut back for 23 yards to midfield. Ohio was called for a personal foul on the play and the Mountaineers thus moved to the Buckeye 35. After Brooke's Rich Thomaselli was pulled down for a four-yard loss by Steubenville Central's Bob Petrella, Hoose passed to his favorite target, Central teammate Greg Botizan, for a 15-yard gain to the 24. Babe broke off tackle to the 19 but John Marshall's Mike Cain, running from the fullback spot in the wish-bone formation, was stopped by 260-pound Steve Mabbott, of East Liverpool, for a yard loss.

A motion penalty subsequently put the ball back on the 25, a Hoose pass went incomplete, and his fourth down throw to Botizan was completed out of the end zone.

Another Mountaineer threat later in the opening frame was blunted when Buckeye West's Chuck George picked off a Hoose pass on the Ohio 25 and returned all the way to the 44 before Babe made the tackle. Ohio then picked up its first first down on a 12-yd. run with a pichout by Mike Christian of Steubenville. But the Buck attack again sputtered.

After Wheeling's Randy

Rodgers and Warwood's Mike Yankavitch tossed Bellaire QB Joe Masciarelli for four-yd. loss, the Bucks were forced into a punt.

Early in the second frame Ohio took over on the W. Va. 33 when Botizan after snaring a pass from Hoose, fumbled and Barnesville's Sam Reynolds recovered. This ultimately led to a 44-yd. field goal try by Cambridge's Steve Jefferies, which faded under the crossbar.

West Virginia persisted on going to the air in its own territory and Dan Cernansky, of Toronto, intercepted a Hoose bullet at the Mountaineer 30 and returned to the 13. After three downs the Bucks had advanced only to the nine against the stout West Virginia defense thanks in part to the quick work of safety Paul Kuzio of Oak Glen, who came up fast on a third down play to stop Ray Gibbs, of Buckeye North, for a yard loss on an attempted sweep. Jefferies then tried a field goal from the left hash mark at the 15 but Brooke's Dan Griffith knifed through to block the boot and Weirton's Steve Jeter recovered at the 33.

Late in the half Ohio got a break when a pass by Shadyside quarterback Hi Paknik was deflected by defender Botizan into the arms of split receiver John Dobrovich, of Bellaire St. John's, for a 22-yd. gain to the Mountaineer 35. Paknik raced to the 27 but only 1:08 was left in the half and the Ohio bid ultimately died when two running backs got zilch and Paknik's fourth down pass was broken up by Brooke's Butch Biondillo.
