Thio trips West Virginia, 14-6

A quick, hard-hitting defense, d by Bellaire's Mark Doyle, artins Ferry's Rich Duncan nd Steubenville's John ownard, set up one Ohio score nd limited West Virginia to 22 ishing yards as the Buckeyes sted a 14-6 win in the 15th an-ial OVAC Charity All-Star ame at Harding Stadium in eubenville Saturday night.

Coach Sam Fornsaglio's uckeyes captured the brawlarred contest before a crowd nearly 8,500, a big boost over ie past few mid-summer assics. Ohio also boosted its cord over its cross-river foe to 7 since the OVAC assumed onsorship 1972. Overall, the uckeyes hold a 23-18 edge since e series started in 1940.

With the Ohio offense sputterg at times against the big West irginia defense, it was the uckeye defensive unit that eyed the win and gained most the praise from Fornsaglio

llowing the contest.

"I said earlier that we would eed to out-quick them (West irginia's offense)," Fornsaglio iid. "That's why we brought in

so many linebackers. These

guys played a great game. "They have an outstanding team, as you can see by the score. But we've got an outstan-ding group of kids and we got the breaks and won the game.

"We had the plays, but we just couldn't make them," he said referring to his offense's sub-par performance. "I was trying to set up some big plays, getting the ball to our quick kids, but it

just didn't work.

Ohio got on the board for the first time in the second quarter, but the scoring series was set up by a blocked punt by Beallsville's versatile Ric Faust. Big defensive plays by Steubenville Central's Todd Dugan and Doyle, forced the Mountaineers into a punting situation. Faust rushed in from the left side to block Shawn Straughn's punt and then recovered the ball on the WV nine.

Cadiz High's flashy Eric Peterson managed just one yard on two carries for Ohio to move the ball to eight as the first frame ended. On the first play of the second quarter, Wintersville Dean Ferguson completed his first pass of the game with an eight-yard toss to a wide-open Dugan with 11:55 on the clock. Bridgeport's Bob Stevens booted the placement.

West Virginia was unable to get its offense in gear on the ensuing possession that resulted in a short Straughn punt. Starting from the Mountaineer 37, Ohio

marched to its second score. On the first play, Ferguson tossed a soft pass to Steuben-ville's Julius Shackleford. The Big Red flanker grabbed Ferguson's pass at the 13 despite fine coverage. Peterson carried for nine yards, Bell-aire's Scott Blumling rushed twice getting four yards and the second Ohio TD with 8:23 on the clock. Stevens again booted the PAT.

West Virginia put together its most serious scoring threat of the first half following the second Ohio score. Starting from their 27 after a 22-yd. kickoff return by Oak Glen's John Fuccy, the Mountaineers gained 18 yards on a pass from Mark Moore (Magnolia) to Ray Miller (John Marshall) and 18 more by Brooke's Rich Ceglie. Downard and Duncan teamed on a sixyard sack of Moore, but the QB came back with a 10-yard pass to Terrell Burnworth of Weirton Madonna.

Later in the drive, Moo escaped the Ohio pass rush throw a 23-yard gainer to We ton's John Ziniach at the fiv But the Ohio defense, which cluded a sack by Wintersville Darrell Jackson, forced t Mountaineers into a 22-ya field goal try by BD's Dan Bal that was just wide.

Neither team could put its fensive game together in t second half as Downard, Es Liverpool's Carl Perry a Cadiz' Todd Atkins sparked t

Ohio defense.

In the fourth frame, Or thwarted two West Virgin scoring chances. S Clairsville's Scott Filicky car ed and recovered a We Virginia fumble and later in t segment Union Local's Va Moore intercepted a Mou taineer pass at the Ohio 18.

West Virginia finally scor with 43 second remaining, car ing a 57-yard drive with a fix yard scoring pass from Moore Miller. The pass for the tw

pointer missed.

Ohio rushed for 76 yards a passed for 46 stripes as the ti Buckeye signal-caller Ferguson and St. Johns' P Dimmick completed just four 20 passes. The winners garner seven first downs, were pen ized 10 times for 57 yards a regained their only fumble.

West Virginia managed just yards on the ground, but w relatively successful in the completing 11 of 23 passes i 121 yards. They had 10 fit downs, lost both fumbles a were set back 20 yards via fo

infractions.

Martins Ferry's Tony Ro was the Ohio's top rusher with yards on eight carries, wh Peterson was held to 17 yards nine tries. The game's t rusher was Ceglie with 33 yar in six tries. Summary:
