

I am proud to be the director of the Fifty First Annual OVAC Wrestling Tournament. I began directing the event in 1979 when it was first conducted in the Wheeling Civic Center. Throughout the last 50 years, many memorable milestones have taken place. Allow me to share them with you.


During the spring of 1970, we lost a phenomenal wrestler, David Bierkortte, to an untimely accident. Because of his athletic prowess, the Wheeling Central Catholic High School Boosters Club initiated the "David Bierkortte Award" for the outstanding wrestler in 1971.

The Wheeling Civic Center Manager in 1979 was Frank Rodriguez. Frank had a great deal of respect for the dedicated efforts of those involved with OVAC wrestling, and was instrumental in purchasing the world-class time clocks you now see by mat side during the competition. Presently, we are blessed with Dennis Magruder, who has given us the same positive support, along with the entire **WesBanCo Arena Staff**.

In 1980, OVAC wrestling initiated the first "George Kovalick Scholarship." Two years later, Bob and Dolores Burke lost their son Danny, a wheeling Park wrestler, to a tragic accident. Out of their love for him, the "Daniel M. Burke Wrestling Scholarship" was initiated in 1983. Recently, we lost a fantastic wrestling enthusiast in 1996 from Marshall County, affectionately named "Dead Eye". His devoted family established the James H.

Morris Sportsmanship Scholarship" in 1997 out of his love for the mat sport. In 1999, East Liverpool's 2-time OVAC Champ and Hercules Award winner, Matt Salsberry, was lost in a tragic auto accident. In 2003, "Friends in Memory of Matt Salsberry" established an annual academic/wrestling scho; arship. So, we now have five (5) permanently installed scholarship funds that over the years have afforded 49 deserving OVAC wrestlers an amazing \$49,000 in college scholarships.

In 1999 there was a unique change in the tournament format which promotes OVAC wrestling even further throughout the Valley. The championship finals are now being televised live by WTOV-9 for all viewers in the entire area to enjoy. This year we proudly celebrate the 51st Anniversary of the tournament and 26 years of a mutually beneficial relationship with the City of Wheeling and welcome the corprate sponsorship of the newly named **WesBanCo Arena.** I want to thank everyone of the workers, coaches, officials, and wrestlers. They are the people who make the Annual OVAC Wrestling Tournament a truly grand adventure for Ohio Valley athletics.



# "-to generate within the audience an enthusiasm uncommon in most wrestling arenas."

From the first time that he took the mike, we knew that the OVAC would never be the same, for Todd brings with him an avid love for and an insight to wrestling that has been honed with a lifetime of involvement in the sport,

He began wrestling at Jefferson Union High School (now Edison Local) under the tutelage of Coach Dan Doyle. He was a 3-time placer in the OVAC during his high school career. He was the recipient of the Daniel M. Burke Memorial Wrestling Scholarship in 1985.

Continuing his pursuit of education and athletics, Todd enrolled at Mount Union College in Alliance, Ohio. He excelled there as both a wrestler and a scholar. He was a 4-year varsity wrestler, honored twice as an All-American and received further recognition as an Academic All-American, with a cumulative 3.2 grade average.

Upon graduation from college, Todd worked in a number of community service organizations in the Wheeling area.

Moving on to Michigan State University, he earned his master's degree in Sports Psychology.

In June '92, Todd returned to Ohio to work at Wooster City Schools as a counselor for student assistance programs, such as, drug abuse prevention. While there, he became involved with the wrestling program, set the foundation for the now prestigious boys' cross-country program, assisted with track and learned the sport of lacrosse. After five years in the community, his restless enthusiasm and interest in sports continued to grow. His desire to be more involved in sports could not be stifled.

In '97, Todd and his wife, the former Karen Kane, headed back to Michigan State, where he began working on his Ph.D. in the departments of Communications and Kinesiology. His continuing love of wrestling led him to coaching, as a volunteer for one year, with the MSU wrestling team.

It was there that he recognized his "true calling", a desire to let the appreciative fans know as much about wrestling as he could impart. Todd became the "official voice of MSU wrestling". His energy, enthusiasm and knowledge educated the crowds, while exciting and elevating interest in the sport. His burning desire was to expand his announcing career by broadening the scope into other major events... his Ph.D. could wait.

In his quest for opportunity to pursue his ultimate goal and to share his love of wrestling, he reached out to those who shared in his dream. He contacted Coach Doyle regarding announcing the OVAC, and for the past five years Todd has looked forward to this tournament more than any other. His reputation has grown nationwide and the demands on his time and talent can be overwhelming. Yet, he maintains that he will let nothing prevent him from being involved in the OVAC Wrestling Tournament. He's a Valley boy and will never forget it!!!

In 2000, he moved to Battle Creek, Michigan where he covers local high school and college sports for the *Battle Creek Enquirer*. In October of '03, he received a prestigious award from Gannett Publishing for an article he wrote about summer outdoor activities in Michigan.

He has expanded into television by volunteering for Access TV, a local cable television channel. He does color commentary for high school volleyball, basketball, football and wrestling.

His national recognition has afforded him the opportunity to grow within the wrestling ranks. Three years ago, he was fortunate to be asked to announce the NCAA Div. III Finals, the following year both the NCAA Div. III and II Finals. In '03, his dream of announcing all three NCAA Division Finals came to fruition.

Todd stays involved in sports on the national level as Communications Director for the National High School Coaches Association. He is responsible for selecting the "Athlete of the Year" in 14 different sports and writing press releases for NHSCA events.

His accolades come from all over:





# DANIEL M. BURKE MEMORIAL WRESTLING SCHOLARSHIP



# THE OVAC Wrestling Tournament

Its birth . . . growth . . . and tradition

It began as all ideas . . . the dream of one man . . . the late George Kovalick.

In March of 1954, Wheeling, Bridgeport, Barnesville, and Linsley Institute competed in the inaugural OVAC Wrestling Tournament at Bridgeport.

The following year Weirton was added as the Tournament moved to Barnesville.

The tournament returned to Bridgeport in 1956, where it remained through 1958, while growing to 7 participating schools.

After 5 years as Tournament Director, Coach Kovalick relinquished the reins to John "Corky" Vrotsos when the tournament moved to Martins Ferry.

Over the next 9 years, the tournament grew to 18 teams, as schools, sometimes reluctantly, added wrestling to their inter-scholastic programs as fan interest blossomed.

There was a concern expressed by participating coaches that the OVAC had never been held in West Virginia.

A decision was made to move the tournament to Moundsville and thereafter to alternate between Ohio and West Virginia.

And so it was, that in 1968, under Co-Directors, George Walley and George Kovalick, the tournament opened with 20 participating schools.

Ironically, no significant mention of alternating tournament sites occurred for the next 8 years, as the tournament grew in both participant and fan numbers.

Several landmark events occurred during the Moundsville Era . . . With 23 schools competing in 1970, the OVAC crowned its first West Virginia team Champion, Wheeling Central Catholic . . . In 1971, following the tragic death of Dave Beirkorette, former OVAC Tournament Champion, the Wheeling Central Catholic Boosters Club established the Dave Beirkorette Wrestling Award to be presented annually to the Most Valuable Wrestler in the Tournament. The first recipient was Don Blum of Martins ferry . . . In 1974, with 32 schools competing, the OVAC became a 3 day event and 6 mats were used for the preliminary rounds . . . In 1975 with 34 schools competing, and as a result of recent large school district consolidations, it was decided that the smaller schools should be competing for team championships against schools of equal or

near equal enrollment. Therefore, classifications were established and in addition to the Overall Team Champion, three (3) Division Champions were also crowned ... Finally, little Warwood became the first school to win the Overall Team Title without an individual champion.

In 1976, the tournament moved to the Steubenville Diocesan Arena with Bob Hedmond as Director.

It was during this year that the most prestigious honor in OVAC wrestling, "MR. MAT" was established and bestowed. How fitting and appropriate that George Kovalick, affectionately known as, Coach "K", should be the initial recipient of an award earned for "a lifetime of dedication to the sport of wrestling". For this was his idea . . . his dream . . . his energy . . . and his enthusiasm that had made it a reality.

In 1977, school classifications were expanded to four (4) divisions, as paid attendance to the three day event soared to 9,465.

The OVAC Wrestling Tournament and foul weather seem to arrive as distinct, yet inseparable, entities. And so it was, that in 1978, when faced with treacherous highway conditions, resulting from an accumulation of ice and snow, it was deemed necessary to postpone the Friday session until Saturday.

In 1979, the Tournament moved to the Wheeling Civic Center with Ron Mauck as Director. Two (2) major improvements took place that year, (1) the massive floor area of the Civic Center now made it possible to wrestle on eight (8) mats, and (2) eight (8) individual and independent electronic match scoreboard/clocks were purchased.

In 1980, recognition of individual weight-class competitors was expanded to include the top eight (8) places.

That same year, the OVAC Wrestling Coaches Association created, to honor Coach "K", the George E. Kovalick Scholarship, to be presented annually to assist a college-bound scholar/wrestler.

Following the tragic 1982 death of Wheeling Park High School wrestler, Danny Burke, his parents established a living tribute to his memory. In 1983, the first annual Daniel M. Burke Memorial Wrestling Scholarship was awarded to John Witzberger of Wheeling Central.

"In 1997, following the untimely passing of James "Dead Eye" Morris, in tribute to his long abiding love for wrestling and his devotion to the OVAC, the Morris family and sons, Jeff and Greg (both former OVAC champions) established both an annual sportsmanship award and a scholarship in his memory."

The threatening flood was more a probability than a possibility when the 43rd Annual Tournament opened on Thursday, January 19, 1996. When it became evident that we had to deal with the certainty, a prudent, yet difficult and unpopular, decision was made to discontinue wrestling at 6:00 PM on Friday, January 19, 1996 and to resume at that point on Saturday January 27, 1996.

To accomplish this monumental task required the complete cooperation of everyone involved, including, but not limited to, wrestlers, coaches, athletic directors, tournament workers, referees, and the rescheduling or dropping of other meets and/or tournaments, and a host of individual problems faced by each and everyone associated with an undertaking of this magnitude.

An indication of the level of cooperation and commitment to the OVAC was never more evident than when the Tournament reconvened one week later, just as though it was part of the original plan.

However, none of this could have taken place without the cooperation, understanding and participation of the Civic Center Staff, under the supervision of its congenial and tireless Director, Dennis Magruder.

WTOV-Channel -9- Steubenville as a corporate sponsor, demonstrated their enthusiastic support for OVAC Wrestling when they initiated live television coverage of all weight class championship bouts in 1998.

In the spring of 1999, the dynamic force behind the growth and expansion of the OVAC, Sam Mumley, Executive Secretary for 32 years, succumbed to his battle with cancer. Steve Kish, Superintendent of Martins Ferry schools, willingly stepped in to fill the void and served as an interim Executive Secretary until Tom Rataiczak assumed the permanent position in the fall of 1999.

In November 2002, we mourned the untimely passing of Bob Hedmond, Mr. Mat in 1981, the former head football coach at East Liverpool, Brooke and Steubenville High Schools and OVAC Wrestling Tournament Director during its three-years at the Diocesan Arenas ('76-'78).

In 2003, "Friends in Memory of Matt Salsberry" established an athletic/academic scholarship "with a desire to honor and perpetuate his memory". He was a two-time OVAC champion ('98-'99) and Mr. Hercules winner from East Liverpool High School. He lost his life in a tragic 1999 auto accident.

The year 2003 also marked three significant milestones; OVAC Wrestling celebrated its 50th Annual Tournament, which is believed to be the largest and oldest continually operating high school tournament in the nation. Second, OVAC Wrestling commerated 25 years of a cooperative and nurturing relationship with the Wheeling Civic Center, which has served to generate an interest in wrestling while they act as congenial hosts for the annual tournament. Lastly, the OVAC honored and applauded Ron Mauck for 25 years of commitment and dedication as Director of Wrestling. More than 250 former champions were recognized and paraded before a packed house.

It is our fond wish that this tournament will continue to grow ... if not in size, hopefully in stature ... as a symbol of all that is good and decent. For there is no greater satisfaction than that which one receives from their investment of time and energy devoted to youth.

As you witness the pomp and pageantry, from the opening ceremonies on Thursday, through the Parade of Champions on Saturday night, only then will you realize that this is a true labor of love and a living tribute to all those, both past and present, who have strived to make it possible and memorable.





# George E. Kovalick (4/8/23 - 4/8/84)

# "Founding Father of OVAC Wrestling"

Teacher exceptionale ... competitive coach ... gracious mentor ... visionary, endowed with boundless energy and enthusiasm.

#### His accomplishments are legend, his influence unparalleled.

A man whose profound influence on coaches and athletes is a legacy which willm continue to have impact on generations yet to come.

Standing as tangible proof of all that he epitomized are his enshrinements in four separate and distinct Athletic Hall of Fame; Kent State University, West Liberty State College, Ohio Wrestling Coaches Association, and Ohio High School Athletic Director Association.

In 1980 a scholarship was established in Coah Kovalick's honor, by the OVAC Wrestling Coaches Association, to recognize a college-bound scholar/wrestler, in the amount of \$1,000 to be awarded annually.

During opening ceremonies of the 1985 Tournament a bronze plaque was unveiled, and now hangs in the lobby of the Wheeling Civic Center, inscribed in fitting tribute:

"The Ohio Valley Wrestling Coaches Association honors the memory of George Kovalick ... a man marvelously competitive, meticulous in organization and endowed with an enormous capacity for work.

He produced an unparalled record, with more championship teams in more sports than any other man who ever coached in this valley.

He was responsible for tremendous progress in the development and expansion of our wrestling program.

Teacher, strategist and fundamentalist, he was an inspiration and friend."

# RECRUITMENT and RETENTION

of New Wrestling Officials

Ideas regarding how to recruit and retain wrestling officials were discussed at a recent West Virginia interpreters' meeting.

In recent years, the ranks of officials and whistle-blowers in all sports have gradually dwindled. Thus, this topic was the thrust of the West Virginia wrestling interpreters' preseason meeting. The interpreters there were very resolved in their efforts to develop new official recruiting and retaining strategies.

Those in attendance freely shared the following in-depth ideas and suggestions for new official recruitment and retention tactics:

### RECRUITING NEW WRESTLING OFFICIALS

- 1.Attempt to recruit former wrestlers or wrestling enthusiasts who possess high ethical standards
- 2. Create programs in local officials associations to encourage high school seniors and college students who wrestled to join the officiating ranks. (Note: Officiating is a very positive athletic-oriented endeavor for college wrestlers to earn extra money.
- 3. Contact physical education departments of area colleges to see if the could incorporate a wrestling officiating class in their curriculum. Should this be possible, persuade the physical education professors to invite experienced local referees to present classroom lectures on the topic.
- 4.Entice former wrestling coaches to join the corps of referees. (Note: We have witnessed many mat mentors who have demonstrated an innate talent for officiating the mat sport.)
  5.Encourage recruiting women into officiating wrestling. You will be pleasantly surprised by

their ability to do the job, especially under pressure.

6.Assist in producing public service announcements regarding recruitment of wrestling officials on regional television and radio stations, as well as in local newspapers.
7.Conduct television or radio roundtable discussions on recruiting, as well as retaining, officials in the sport of wrestling.

### RETAINING NEW WRESTLING OFFICIALS

1. See to it that coaches offer the new officials the chance to officiate preseason open tournaments and practice room wrestle-offs. This gives the new official exposure with the coaches they may work for in the future. Likewise, coaches will undoubtedly express helpful suggestions of their own, having witnessed these young officials in action for the first time.

2.Make a concerted effort to get young officials matches at the youth, middle school and junior varsity levels. This further allows novice officials to display their officiating skills in front of wrestling coaches at various competitive levels.

3. Create a" mentor" or "adopt-a-ref" program. New officials should be allowed to assist veteran officials at dual, triangular and quadrangular meets. In doing so, it will allow the experienced referees to explain the reasons why they made the tough calls they did.

Secondly, veteran officials should take the time to observe and critique novice referees in action. Then later, they could tell the beginning official where he or she excelled and what he or she needs to improve upon in terms of officiating mechanics.

4. Suggest to local school districts that they schedule wrestling competitions later on weekdays, permitting officials who work, the opportunity to officiate. We often lose officials, because they cannot leave their place of employment to oversee matches during the week.

5. Teach young officials techniques on how to handle irate coaches and how not to react to unruly fans when close calls are made.

6. Explain to new officials that it is part of being human to make mistakes. In doing so,

stress the importance of not being defensive on such occasions.

When possible, correct your officiating mistakes during a match. Most coaches respect officials who own up to their errors and correct them. I once witnessed a wrestling official wipe off a fall when he realized that one shoulder was not even close to touching the mat. Neither coach said a word, because they knew that it was the right thing to do under the circumstances.

7. Approach your state athletic associations and ask them to consider a rotation system, affording younger, highly qualified wrestling officials the opportunity to officiate state tournaments. This approach will give these officials a goal on which to set their sights. Unfortunately, too many younger officials leave the officiating ranks out of frustration, feeling they will never be selected to officiate state tournaments.

In reality, the wrestling official should be perceived as the top point of a wrestling triangle, which is comprised of the participants, the coach and the referee. The official must always be there to serve the coaches, by fairly and consistently enforcing the rules and regulations of the mat sport. Just as important, he or she must also be there to protect the contestants, by keeping them out of harm's way.

#### **CONCLUDING REMARKS**

Officiating is a noble avocation that can be both a rewarding and enjoyable experience. Likewise, it allows us to become an integral facet of scholastic athletics. Hence, veteran officials must constantly pursue innovative avenues for recruiting and retaining new officials.


Excuses for losing they will never endure, "Don't blame the ref, son, because of the score, The coach, he will show you the best way to move. Keep working in practice if you want to improve."

### WINNING ISN'T EVERYTHING --- OR IS IT???

People love to cheer for the underdog, and celebrate an underdog victory.

In a wrestling tournament, nothing's sweeter than knocking off a top seed.

Sweet for everyone except the top seed, his family, coach and team, that is. For them, it can be like a death in the family.

For these people, I offer the "Ten Stages of Wrestling Grief."

Last season, our son Worshrag lost the championship match of his weight class at the 26-school middle school Ohio Valley Wrestling Championships. It almost killed me.

Worsh, a seventh-grader, was the top seed. He had beaten this particular wrestler before. Pinned him, in fact. In the beginning he was winning the championship match. Then suddenly he was losing, was injured, had lost.

The wave of shock, hurt and depression that washed over me was deep and all-encompassing. It truly felt like a loved one had died. For two days I could hardly think of anything else. My wife Honey went through her own slightly different grief anguish, as did his coach and Worshrag himself.

When I lost my job last year, my wife gave me a book on grief to read because, she said, a person may mourn the loss of a job like a death or any other loss. However, I had not even looked at the book, I didn't feel I needed it. My attitude was: emotional self-help books are for wussies.

The day after Worshrag's tragic defeat I picked up the grief book and - honestly - read it cover to cover. (It was only 64 pages.)

I have modified the stages slightly to apply to wrestling. To help other parents, coaches and wrestlers recover from a tragic defeat, here are my "Ten Stages of Wrestling Grief."

Stage One: "Noooooooooooooo!" (denial, disbelief)

Stage Two: "Nooooooooooooooo!" (shock, numbness)

Stage Three: "Nooooooooooooooo!" (yet more shock and denial)

Stage Four: "I feel sick." (physical distress)

Stage Five: "The ref stole that match from my son!" (anger, blame-fixing)

Stage Six: "Can't we appeal to somebody?" (bargaining)

Stage Seven: "I feel incredibly sad and tired." (depression)

Stage Eight: "We put too much pressure on our son to win." (guilt)

Stage Nine: "It was still a great season/tournament." (partial acceptance)

Stage Ten: "Son, we love you so much and have never been more proud of you." (full acceptance and hope for next season.)

"I can't go through this again. I want Worshrag to quit wrestling," said my wife after the loss. She was clearly out of her head. That soon was toned down to: "I would not be unhappy if he quit wrestling." My wife hates injustice, and she focused her anger on the ref, who had a reputation for being against our team. We had seen no stalling points awarded in the entire tournament, yet this referee gave our son's opponent two stalling points that kept him in the match. At first she was calling down God's wrath on the referee, asking for not death, but some kind of painful divine rebuke. Later she decided to let God decide guilt and punishment in His own good time.

She and I both felt guilty for always expecting our son to win, and for not being more appreciative of the incredible thrills he had given us all season, like when he edged out a strong opponent in the BMAC tournament finals, or gutted out a back muscle pull to pin his way through the Austintown Duals. He was always strong, always the wrestler to beat in his weight class, always first-class in his demeanor on and off the mat. He had a fantastic season, something like 25-2, not counting forfeit wins. Up until that last match, he lost only once, and that was a fluky pin early in the season when he was winning and put himself on his back. All but three of his wins were by fall. He had beaten the tournament second seed

twice. The boy he lost to in the finals, he had pinned earlier in the season. His teammates thought he was invincible. We all expected Worsh to win, and were crushed when the match didn't play out according to script.


For Worsh, I think the guilt stage was worst. While Honey and I talked through our feelings, Worsh kept insisting he was okay. But at one point he admitted to his mother he didn't feel he had wrestled his best. I think he felt he had let us all down. He also engaged in the bargaining stage, hoping - as we waited in the emergency department after the tournament for x-ray results - that his shoulder was broken so he'd have a better excuse for not winning. (A ligament had torn loose, pulling a bone chip away with it.) The fact is, Worsh did wrestle well, but the other young man is a good wrestler, too, and in that match was better. (He made his high school varsity as a freshman this year.)

Early in the championship match, Worshrag was getting the takedowns and seemed in control. In the third period an escape and stalling call had tied it at 6-6, but, I thought, surely Worsh would get another takedown; he'd come through as always; it would be okay. Instead, the other wrestler got the takedown with 18 seconds to go. Worsh cried out in pain as he landed hard on his shoulder and suddenly for us the match had become a nightmare.


I'll never forget the look of pain and loss on my son's face at that moment; he knew the championship was lost. After an injury timeout he bravely finished the match.

And the grieving process began.

### Matthew Salsberry 1980-1999



Within minutes after leaving for home from Ohio Northern University, where they had all just undergone freshmen orientation, Matt Salsberry; his girlfriend, Emily Bickerton; his best friend, Dan Aldrich, fell victims of tragedy. An inattentive and irresponsible teenage driver, in a moment of senseless exhilaration took the lives of all three and brought emotional devastation to the families and school community of a magnitude which can only be described as traumatizing and from which we are still laboring to recover. Matt Salsberry had a lust for life that dictated success. The commitment and enthusiasm which he brought to the wrestling mat, the playing field, the stage and classroom, motivated and inspired teammates, classmates and fans. He was a humble winner and a gracious loser, who gained the respect of all who came to know him.

If any single incident defined his commitment and enthusiasm for whatever the project might be, surely it had to be his humorous show stealing portrayal of "Earthquake" McGoon in the school musical, "Lil Abner".

Matt was a two-time OVAC Champion and winner of the Mr. Hurcules Award in 1999 by pinning his way to the 215# Championship in a cumulative time of less than a single match. He was 4th in the State of Ohio while compiling 124 career wins. He was All-State in football for three years and played in 32 consecutive games. He earned 11 varsity letters, was River Valley League discus champion, served as Junior Class President and Senior Class Vice President all the while maintaining a 3.5 GPA as a member of NHS.

"Friends in Memory of Matt Salsberry" having a desire to perpetuate the positive impact of his young life, have deemed it a fitting and proper tribute to establish a \$1,000 scholarship to be considered annually and awarded to an OVAC wrestler who has earned a varsity letter in one additional sport while likewise maintaining a minimum 3.5 GPA.

#### Richard "Dick" Edge Mr. Mat - '79

Dick earned a bachelor's degree in business education/health education and physical education from West Liberty State College in '64 and a master's degree from the University of Dayton in '75. He spent 40 years in education as a teacher/coach, assistant high school principal, elementary and high school principal and superintendent of Monroe and Belmont County schools. As a coach he touched the lives of many students who participated on the football, basketball, wrestling, track and cross-country teams.

His personal sports accolades include starting wrestling programs at Triadelphia and Warwood high schools, as well as, four other junior high schools in Ohio county. He also founded the first Pee Wee wrestling team in Ohio county.

With a distinguished career as an educator and coach, Dick is no stranger to awards. He was nominated Outstanding Young Educator in West Virginia in '66. In '75, he was named Eastern Ohio district "Coach of the Year" in wrestling and four years later was named OVAC Wrestling's "Mr. Mat", a distinction awarded for his contribution to Ohio Valley wrestling.

He was inducted into the WLSC Athletic Hall of Fame in '97 and served two terms as President of the WLSC Alumni Association Board of Directors.

During homecoming weekend in '03, Dick was inducted into the WLSC Alumni Wall of Honor, in recognition of his accomplishments.

### Dr. Vince Monseau Mr. Mat – '83

Coach Monseau began his association with West Liberty State College when he enrolled as a freshman student in 1958. He earned letters in wrestling, track and football as a "Hilltopper" athlete.

He received his bachelors degree in 1962, furthering his education by earning his masters and doctorate from West Virginia University in '64 and '77 respectively.

His high school coaching career began at Oak Glen ('63 - '68), Charleston High ('68 - '69) and Weir High ('69-'720. His Oak Glen "Golden Bears" won the West Virginia State Championshipo in '67.

Coach Monseau returned to his college alma mater in '73 and put his "Hilltoper" team on the national wrestling map for the next 30 years. He has produced 72 All-Americans, including five national champions: Dave LaMotte ('79 NAIA), Brian Davis ('95 NAIA), Scott Shipman ('96 NCAA Div. II), James Branch ('97 NCAA Div. II) and Nick Spencer ("01 NCAA Div. II).

Coach Monseau is extremely proud to have worked with 28 Academic All-Americans. In '02 the WLSC wrestling squad was the "Academic National Div. II Runners-up" and the '03 team was the "Academic National Div. II Champions".

The National Wrestling Hall of Fame honored Dr. Vince Monseau with a "Lifetime Service to Wrestling" award in 2003.

#### Dave Kovalick Mr. Mat - '88

Dave was a three-sport athlete on some of the most successful sports teams in West Liberty State College history. He excelled in baseball, football and wrestling, playing a key role on squads that won WVIAC conference championships in all three sports.

He played fullback on the WVIAC title team of '63, was the 177# individual champion during the '66 conference wrestling championships, and was the starting right fielder on the baseball team which won three WVIAC titles. He was a key contributor on the "Topper" squad that claimed the '64 NAIA baseball championship., the college's first national title in a team sport.

After graduation from West Liberty in '67, he began teaching and coaching at Barnesville High School that lasted until his retirement in '03.

During his 30-year career, Dave enjoyed coaching success in track, football and wrestling. In '88 he was the recipient of the prestigious OVAC Mr. Mat Award for his contributions to the sport of wrestling as both a coach and an official.

His '92 football squad finished 12-1, compiling an undefeated regular season mark while claiming an Ohio Regional Championship.

In formal ceremonies held in the Emmett Boyle Conference Center, prior to the Alumni Scholarship Bowl VIII in '03, Dave was inducted into the West Liberty State College — Athletic Hall of Fame.

## Remembering a "True Friend" of OVAC Wrestling by Dr. Bill Welker

Last June wrestling in the Ohio Valley lost a great supporter who cared about all area wrestlers - Joseph J. Thomas.

I had the honor of coaching Joe Thomas when he wrestled in high school, but it was he who later taught me about friendship. I was never one to make a lot of friends. However, Joe Thomas became my friend and this relationship lasted nearly 30 years. Allow me to tell you the rest of his story.

I never met an individual who loved the mat sport more than Joe Tho mas. In fact, he was always looking for ways to promote wrestling. This desire to be a "Public Relations" person for the mat sport was a constant personal priority of Joe Thomas.

A former Wheeling Park wrestler, Joe Thomas first decided to join the ranks of our local Ohio Valley Wrestling Officials Association. He put his heart into it. Joe studied the rules inside and out, asking questions that even stumped me at times. Unfortunately, refereeing was not for him.

By no means a quitter, Joe set his sites on coaching. Again he quizzed me on every aspect of teaching kids to wrestle. Joe then enrolled in the WVSSAC's mandatory coaching course, passes it, and began his mat mentor career as an assistant at Warwood Middle School. After that, there was no stopping him.

Joe Thomas moved on to become the head coach at Bridgestreet Middle School. There he produced numerous PAC-8 championships and future all-state wrestlers. But most important, his boys admired and respected him. Joe Thomas found his niche.

As to my relationship with Joe Thomas, he was my best friend and traveling companion for years. Most of our excursions were related to wrestling, but we also took a few vacations together.

My fondest experiences with Joe Thomas were our trips to my hometown. There he had the opportunity to meet my mom and late dad, my high school wrestling coaches, and my school-day wrestling buddies. They were some great times!

In closing, I wanted to extend my personal sympathies to his devoted mother, Betty Parsons, his adoring sister Sherry Bonham, and the love of his life, Jeannie Goletz.

As a last tribute to Joe Thomas - a true friend of OVAC Wrestling - the Mat Talk "wrestler of the week" will always bear his name.

Joseph J. Thomas will be deeply missed by the entire Ohio Valley wrestling community, especially the Welker family.
