





As with any prestigious ward, someone who is deservng is invariably going to be eft out.

That's what makes the accomplishments of Wheeling Central girls' basketball coach Penn Kurtz, Bellaire St. John Central girls' track and field coach Robert "Bubba" Kapral, Wheeling Central football coach Mike Young, Wheeling Park boys' cross country coach Michael Jebbia, and St. Clairsville football coach Brett McLean that much more meaningful, as they've been selected as the five finalists for this year's award by a panel of media and OVAC Board members.

Capsules of each coach's accomplishments follow:

Penn Kurtz (Wheeling Central girls' basketball). Kurtz certainly had his work cut out for him when, after a blistering start, Wheeling Central lost Kara DeSantis, one of its top players, to a knee injury. After an 8-1 beginning, the Maroon Knights lost their next two games, then went 14-1 the rest of the way. That included a victory in the West Virginia Class A state championship game - the school's second state title under Kurtz.

Still, Kurtz put together what might have been his best work

in his 15th season at the helm of the program. During the season-ending run, Central's only loss was to Barnesville in the OVAC Tournament semifinals.

Kurtz has led Wheeling Central to 14 sectional titles in his 15 seasons and 13 Region One titles. His teams have finished as the state runner-up five times.

Mike Young (Wheeling Central football). Young, recently selected as the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Man of the Year, has a record of 38-4 in three seasons as head coach at Wheeling Central, including three W.Va. Class A state titles and an overall active winning streak of 33 consecutive games.

Prior to returning to his alma mater as an assistant coach under the late Jim Thomas,

Young was the head coach at St. Clairsville for nine seasons, where he compiled a record of 51-42. His overall career record is 89-45 (.664).
