WHEELING, W.Va. — Some say winning isn't everything: it's the only thing. While that's not likely the mindset of the five finalists for the Wheeling News-Register/Bill Van Horne OVAC Coach of the Year Award, it's basically all they knew during the last 12 months.

In most cases, it's been much longer than that.

For Wheeling Central boys' basketball coach Mel Stephens, St. John Central cross country coach Jeremy Midei, St. John girls' track coach Bubba Kapral, Monroe Central girls' basketball coach Troy Baker, and Meadowbrook golf coach Mel Pesuit, the victories piled up at a near-record pace during the 2008-09 school year.

With more than 500 coaches in the OVAC, these guys are in the top 1 percent in their class. Included are the leaders of three state championship teams and multiple sectional, district, and regional titlists. Every one of them guided at least one OVAC championship team during the school year, with Baker at the helm of two OVAC champions (also volleyball).

Pesuit, who has led his teams to five OVAC titles in 16 seasons, is a three-time Ohio Division II Eastern District Coach of the Year. His Colts finished this season with a 17-6 dual match record and 119-47 overall record. Included in that was first-place finishes in the East Central Ohio League

(ECOL) Tournament, the OVAC Class AAA Tournament, and the Ohio Division II District Tournament. They wound up in eighth place in their first state-tournament appearance.

During Pesuit's career, his teams have compiled a 235-183 dual match record and an overall record of 1,172-866. That includes two sectional championships, six district tourney appearances, including a district title.

For the fourth time in its 40-year history, the Wheeling News-Register/Bill Van Horne OVAC Coach of the Year Award had two winners when it was announced Monday night at the annual OVAC Banquet of Champions at WesBanco Arena.

This time, it wasn't even close. The St. John girls scored in a record 11 events at the 2008 state tourney, won two gold medals (4X100 and 4X200) with the 4X200 relay team setting all-time record (1:42.77).



Bubba Kapral

This continued a four-year run of dominance (back-to-back runner-up finishes, followed by back-to-back titles) for the Irish girls, who are perhaps the most dominant girls' track team in the history of the OVAC. To that end, Kapral's teams have won a league record eight consecutive OVAC track and field titles and 11 overall in Kapral's 21 seasons. He's a six-time Eastern District Coach of the Year the last six years.

Kapral is also the girls' basketball coach at St. John, where his teams have won more than 200 games and eight more OVAC crowns.

Mel Stephens

Wheeling Central boys' basketball

Stephens, a two-time finalist for

this award, is a couple of months removed from leading Wheeling Central to its sixth West Virginia Class A state championship in eight seasons, including fourth in six years under his guidance. Stephens ushered the Maroon Knights to a 23-5 record this season, and he has a career record 124-37, winning an astounding 77 percent of his games. He has overseen five sectional and regional championship teams in his six seasons.

Stephens' Maroon Knights also won a fourth consecutive OVAC title — three in Class AA and one in Class AAA. Prior to being named the head boys' basketball coach, Stephens was an assistant on Dave Wojcick's back-to-back state title winning teams.

This season, he added the title of JV baseball coach to his name, along with his son, Chris, a former multi-sport standout at Wheeling Central.

Jeremy Midei

St. John Cross Country

In his fifth season in charge of the St. John cross country program, Midei led his boys to their first Ohio Division III State Championship after years of knocking on the door. In the previous three seasons, Midei's runners finished no worse than seventh in the state, while his girls' team finished sixth in 2007.

So dominant were the Irish boys,

they were undefeated against Division II and Division III competition, with their only losses to three Division I schools.

His boys' teams are four-time defending regional and district champions and they've completely dominated the OVAC meet.

The Irish have won six straight OVAC Class A/AA championships, a record for most consecutive titles. His girls' teams were district and regional champions in 2006 and 2007 and OVAC champions from '05-07.

Also an assistant on Kapral's track and field teams, Midei helped lead the girls' team's four-year run of back-to-back state runner-up finishes, followed by back-to-back state championships.

All told, Midei has coached more than 50 individual OVAC champions in track.

Troy Baker

Monroe Central girls' basketball

Baker led his girls' basketball team to a second consecutive OVAC Class AA title, a Pioneer Valley Conference title, and Ohio Division III sectional and district titles in 2008. The Seminoles, led by senior stars Aleisha Guiler and Karlie Davis, went 21-4, losing to powerful Oak Hill in the school's first appearance in a regional tournament.

Baker has also led the Seminoles' wildly successful volleyball team to four consecutive OVAC Class AA titles. The Seminoles advanced to district tournament this season.
