

COVID-19 could sack **Davis for** summer

 Standout QB vows to play somewhere By KIM NORTH

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. - The global COVID-19 pandemic could possibly do something that not many defensive players have done in Nate Davis's football career. For nearly a decade, Davis, a former 5th round draft pick of the San Francisco 49ers after a standout career at Ball State University, has quarterbacked a team somewhere indoors. However, that streak is in jeopardy at the present.

After seven years with the Amarillo Venom in several different leagues,

the latest being the Champions Indoor Football in 2019, the strong-armed Da-vis took his talents to Duke City, which had left the CIF for the Indoor American Football League (IFL) this season. The IFL was formed in 2008 in a merger



between the Intense and United football leagues.

Due to the concerns surrounding the pandemic, the 13-team league ceased operations for the 2020 season on April 13, leaving a multitude of talented players like Davis with not many options.

Davis was the CIF Most Valuable Player and Offensive Player of the Year last season when he passed for a CIF-leading 3,238 yards and an eye-popping 73 touchdowns (2nd was 54) while completing nearly 65 percent (63.9) of his passes (292-457) in 12 games. He also led the league in yards passing per game with 269.8 (2nd was

"I'm going to play somewhere. Be it in Wheeling with the (West Virginia) Roughriders or back in the CIF (with Amarillo)," he said over the Memorial Day weekend while visiting family and friends in the Ohio Valley. "There are plenty of teams that want me to play for them."

Although Davis has not had any talks with the Roughriders, he said he would welcome the opportunity.





NFL Coaches Could Return To Team **Facilities Next Week**

(AP) - NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell is hopeful that coaches will be able to return to their team facilities by next

Goodell said Thursday following an owners conference call that the virtual offseason is being extended for two

more weeks. In a memo sent to the 32 teams and obtained by The Associated Press, he out-lined the next phase of reopening of club facilities, which can GOODELL begin Monday.



"We expect that next week clubs will be permitted to include members of their coaching staffs among the employees permitted to resume work in the club facility," Goodell wrote. "We are actively working with governors and other state and local authorities in those states that have not yet announced definitive plans and will confirm the precise date on which coaches can return to the facility as soon as possible.'

Ticket offices, retail shops and other "customer-facing fa-cilities" that comply with state and local regulation can open, with employees counting in the current maximum number of employees (no more than 50 percent of staff not to exceed 75 persons) allowed.


