Jerry Narcisi

Jerry Narcisi (Shadyside High School, Class of 1967). He has been involved with the OVAC for more than a quarter of a century, displaying a passion for the youth of the Ohio Valley and the conference.

Narcisi has been a member of the OVAC Executive Board since 2000, including serving as president from 2005-

He's also been extremely active with track and field, serving on the OVAC Track Committee for more than 25 years—in several capacities including meet director and head of the rules committee. He also served as the referee when the OVAC Cal Giffin Track Championships took place in Bellaire and Shadyside.

Narcisi is a charter member of the Shadyside Relays Committee, serving as chairman for 16 years. He's also been a registered track official in Ohio since 1972, working in various capacities at the district and regional level countless times.

Narcisi is a trustee of the Shadyside High School Sports Foundation and belongs to countless professional organizations. He has served in various roles (teacher, supervisor, director) at the Belmont-Harrison Vocational School including superintendent from 1981-90; was superintendent of Shadyside Local Schools from 1990-2006; and interim superintendent of the Bridgeport Exempted Village School District in 2009. He is retired but still serves as a consultant and facilitator for several local schools.

He received a Bachelor of Science in Engineering Technology & Manage from Ohio University in 1971 and a Master's Degree in Vocational-Technical Education from The Ohio State University in 1974, completing his Superintendent License Coursework at Franciscan University and the University of Dayton in 1981.



Rich Wilinski

Rich Wilinski

Rich Willinski (Follansbee High School, Class of 1955). He enjoyed an outstanding 56-year career in education and has worn many hats including coach, administrator and television analyst for local high school football.

Wilinski was a head football coach for 19 years at four schools from 1965-85 with a combined record of 121-56-9. His first assignment was at Wayne (1966-67) which merged into Wintersville (he was an assistant to Bob Kettlewell in 1968-69); then to Toronto (1970-76), Steubenville Catholic (1977-84) and Buckeye South (1985).

His 1974 team at Toronto became the school's second unbeaten team and Wilinski was selected the OVAC Coach of the Year and the first recipient of the Dapper Dan Club's Robert McKelvey Memorial Award. His is also a member of the Ohio Valley Football Coaches Hall of Fame.

Wilinski began his career as the basketball coach during the final three seasons (1962-64) of Follansbee St. Anthony, winning the W. Va. Catholic Tournament Class A crown in his first season. He also coached boys' basketball at Wayne for three years and had a combined 52-9 record with one Class A Sectional title.

He has been a TV analyst for Ohio Valley high school football games for WTOV-TV9 for nearly three decades. As an athlete, Wilinski was a three-sport regular (football/basketball/baseball) at Follansbee, played on the Blue Wave's unbeaten state championship team in 1954, setting up a TD with an interception and kicking the game-

winning extra point in a 7-6 victory over Barboursville to snap that school's 28-game winning streak. He was named first team all-W. Va. Class A, all-OVAC and all-Valley "Big School."

Wilinski attend the University of Florida on a football grant, but returned home and played at West Liberty State College.

Scott Nolte

Scott Notice (Wheeling Park High School, Class of 1990). He has worked at WTRF-TV7 since 1993, serving as Sports Director since 1996.

During his tenure, TV7 has won numerous awards including "Outstanding Sports Operation," "Best Regularly Scheduled Sportscast" and "Best Play-by-Play" in both West Virginia and Ohio.

Nolte serves as Master of Ceremonies for the annual OVAC Banquet of Champions which honors the conference team champions and awards a host of scholarships to area athletes each May at WesBanco Arena in Wheeling. He's also a regular contributor at the George Strager "Evening with the Stars" Banquet held in conjunction with the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game.

He also worked as play-by-play announcer and sideline reporter for the West Virginia "Super Six" State Football Championships from 1996-2004.

The co-host of West Virginia University football's "Mountaineer Game Day", he also teaches part-time at Wheeling Park High School in the TV and Radio Career Tech Education Department.

Nolte has also worked at radio stations Eagle 107, WEEL FM 95.7 and WKKX AM 1600.

Nolte, who attended West Liberty and graduated from West Virginia Tech, is an avid fan of West Virginia University football and Cleveland Indians baseball.

Kim Clifford


Kim Clifford (Bellaire High School, Class of 1972). Clifford cut his coaching teeth as an assistant at Bellaire under Mark Matz and Gene Ammirante before taking the head coaching position at Cadiz where he spent six years and posted a 90-48 record and won the OVAC Class AA championship in 1986.

He then moved on to St. Clairsville where he spent the next 27 seasons (1991-2018), amassing a 372-234 record to boost his career total to 461-282 over 33 years as a head coach.

At St. C., Clifford led the Red Devils to two OVAC crowns (2012 and 2013) and six Buckeye 8 titles; eight sectional championships, two district championships (2012 and 2013) and one regional title (2012) to earn the school's only OHSAA "Final Four" berth (St. C. lost to Elida, 61-27, in the Division II State Semifinals). In addition to receiving several East District and District 12 honors, Clifford coached in the OHSBCA North-South All State Genes in 2000, was reproduced by the New York and Resketchell Geochem Association Genes of the Vision School Backetchell Genes of the Vision Backetchell Genes of the Vision Backetchell Genes of the Vision Backet

South All-Star Game in 2000; was named the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Association Coach of the Year in 2008; was a finalist for the OVAC Coach of the Year award in 2012 and 2013. He also served as president of the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association.

He received the OHSBCA's Bob Arnzen Award, given to a coach who devoted 20 consecutive years or more of service to the same school and for their loyalty and commitment to basketball, in 2014; and was inducted into the St. Clairsville High School Athletic Hall of Fame in 2019 and the District 12 Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame in 2021.



Kim Clifford

Clifford is a 1972 graduate of Bellaire High School where he was captain of the basketball team and played in the OVAC All-Star Basketball Classic. He attended Urbana University and graduated from West Liberty State College, earning master's degree from West Virginia University. In addition to coaching basketball, he also spent time as the head track coach and as an assistant football coach at St. C.

'Bubba' Kapral

Robert 'Bubba' Kapral

Robert 'Bubba' Kapral (St. John Central High School, Class of 1974). What Kapral accomplished in one sport was enough to land him in the "Hall," but he doubled down by getting it done in two sports as a highly-successful track and basketball coach.

In track, Kapral led St. John's to the pinnacle on the girls' side not once, but twice by winning the OHSAA Division III State Championship (2007/2008) on the heels of back-to-back runner-up finishes the two previous years (2005/2006). Overall, he coached 47 state place-winners, including 39 on the girls' side and nine on the boys' side. During his 21-year track tenure, the Irish captured 13 OVAC Class A team titles (girls = 1991, '92, '93, 2002, '03, '04, '05, '06, '07, '08, '09; boys = 1991, 2009).

Kapral was a two-time OVAC Overall Coach of the Year (2008/2009); the OVAC Cal Giffin Memorial Track Service Award recipient and he was inducted into the Eastern District Track and Cross Country Coaches Association Hall of Fame (2019).

In hoops, after assisting Kim Traversa Appolloni for six years and being a part of five OVAC titles, he elevated to the head coaching post and enjoyed 25 years of hardwood success with a sparkling record of 391-176. During that time, the Lady Irish captured nine OVAC Class A championships (1995, '96, '99, 2000, '01, '06, '07, '08, '16) and reached the OHSAA Division IV Regional Tournament in 2000-01 when SJC posted a school-

record 23-2 record. Kapral was named the AP Division IV Co-Coach of the Year in 2000 and he was named District Coach of the Year five times. Also tabbed the OHSBCA Girls' Basketball Coach of the Year in 2007, Kapral coached in the OVAC Samuel A. Mumley All-Star Basketball Classic four times; coached in the OHSBCA North-South All-Star Basketball Classic in 2002 and the Pepsi District 12 Basketball All-Star Classic in 2016. He has received the OVAC Rich Saffield Girls Coaches Award (2012) and the OHSBCA Bob Arnzen Award.

In addition to his coaching success, Kapral – a 1978 graduate of Bethany College with a B.A. in Communications and a four-year letterman on the Bison track squad – is a member of the OVAC Hall of Fame Committee, the OVAC Basketball Committee and the OVAC Coach of the Year Selection Committee. He's worked in various capacities at The Times Leader for more than four decades, and currently serves as Executive Sports Editor of the Times Leader/Wheeling News-Register/Intelligencer and since retiring from coaching he became a basketball referee.

Larry Deaton


Larry Deaton (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1964). Deaton was a mainstay as an official for more than 40 years, working countless high school matches in both Ohio and West Virginia; college matches at the NCAA and NAIA levels; and in freestyle wrestling.

His list of accolades is impressive, with the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference naming him the 1993 'Mr. Mat' award recipient and years later naming the conference's annual officials award in his honor – the Larry Deaton Official of the Year.

Deaton was also inducted into the Ohio Wrestling Officials Hall of Fame in 1994; was named the West Virginia Wrestling Official of the Year in 1997; the Wrestling USA National Official of the Year ini 2009; and he was the National Wrestling Hall of Fame's Ohio Chapter inductee in 2016.

As an athlete, he was a four-year letterman in wresting at Martins Ferry, winning an OVAC title in 1963 and an OHSAA District crown in 1964. Deaton was inducted into the Martins Ferry Wrestling Hall of Fame in 1998 and was chosen for the Martins Ferry Athletic Department's "Wall of Honor" in 2018. He was also a four-year letterman in football and a two-year letterman in track.

Deaton helped start the Ohio Valley Wrestling Club in the 1970s and headed Martins Ferry's flag football program

in that same era, and he served as president of the Purple Rider Booster Club and on the Board of Directors of the Martins Ferry Recreation Center.





Dr. William 'Bill' Welker

Dr. William 'Bill' Welker (Shamokin (Pa.) High School, Class of 1965). No one has been involved as an official or promoted the sport of wrestling not only in the conference, but far beyond, more than the "doctor".

Welker officiated in the OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Tournament from 1980-91 and served as the rules interpreter from 1992-2017. He was also the OVAC Tournament's souvenir program coordinator and editor for 18 years (1979-96).

He received the OVAC's prestigious "Mr. Mat" award in 1991 and was tabbed the OVAC Wrestling Official of the Year in 2003.

Welker was the West Virginia Wrestling rules interpreter and clinician and supervisor of officials at the state tournament from 1989-2017.

He received the 2001 NFHS Mideast Section 2 Distinguished Active Official Award and the 2002 National Wrestling Official of the Year Award from Wrestling USA Magazine.

Welker was selected the 1987 and 2013 (with his son Rick) National Sportswriter of the Year by Wrestling USA Magazine for his "Mat Talk" column which appeared in a host of publications and was named that publication's

West Virginia Wrestling Man of the Year in 2001. He was also tabbed the West Virginia Wrestling Sportswriter of the Year seven times.

He has also conducted numerous wrestling clinics over the years.

As an athlete, he was a three-time sectional and district champion; a two-time regional champion; the PIAA State Champion in 1963 and the state runner-up in 1965. He earned a wrestling scholarship to the University of Pittsburgh.

Welker served as head wrestling coach at Wheeling High (1970-72). Wheeling Central Catholic (1972-76) and Wheeling Park (1979-80).

Ralph Anastasio

Ralph Anastasio (Follansbee High School, Class of 1954). A three-sport Blue Wave athlete and do-it-all football player with a quartet of first team all-star honors, he earned a scholarship to West Virginia University where he lettered three years as a two-way back, kick returner and record-setting punter.

The triple-threat back led the Blue Wave to an 8-2 record his senior year, losing only to unbeaten and state runner-up Benwood Union by 13-12 and to 8-1 record Wheeling Central, the OVAC Class AA champion, by 7-6. He earned first team honors for OVAC largest Class AA, All-Valley "Big School", All-Northern West Virginia, and the largest All-State Class AA. As a senior, he accounted for 17 TDs including five on punt returns, one on a kickoff return, seven TD passes and he also intercepted five passes. He played in the Ohio-W.Va. All-Star game and a 13-0 W.Va. victory.

He also was a three-year letterman in basketball and baseball.

At WVU, he was a four-year football performer including three varsity seasons as a 5-foot-11, 165-pound multipurpose back (starting right halfback, defensive back, kick returner, punter) on teams with records of 8-2, 5-5 and 7-2-1 and two Southern Conference titles. In the only tie, 6-6 vs. Virginia in 1957, he made a near-impossible catch on a 62-yard pass play to tie the score and also set a school record, which lasted 40 years, with a 78-yard punt.

Career-wise, he had 141 carries for 569 yards, 20 receptions for 305 yards and a TD, 25 kick returns for 263 yards and averaged 37 yards a punt.

After college, he returned to the Ohio Valley and was a teacher-coach before retiring to his current home in Steubenville. He was head football coach at St. John's from 1960-62 and Toronto from 1964-69 including an 8-2 record in 1964.

Tom Bloom

Tom Bloom (Weir High School, Class of 1959). He led the Red Riders to state championships in football and baseball, both under Hall of Fame coach Jimmy Carey, before earning a football scholarship to Purdue University where he was a four-year performer.

At Weir, he earned 11 letters in three varsity sports with multiple honors in football and baseball plus being a basketball regular. He led the Red Riders to a two-year football record of 20-1 and a state largest class champion-ship as a junior. The 11-0 record team beat Fairmont Senior, 19-12 for the title at Wheeling Island Stadium. As a senior, OVAC champion Weir went 9-1, losing only to eventual state champion Parkersburg in the regular season finale. He earned first team All-State and All-OVAC and was selected captain of the "Big School" All-Valley team as a two-way back and kick returner.

As a senior, he had a 95-yard kickoff return TD in win over Steubenville and a 96-yard rushing TD and 217 rushing yards vs. Follansbee. He ended the season with team-best 943 rushing yards. Career-wise, on balanced teams, he had 1,869 rushing yards -- second best at Weir at the time -- and scored 25 TDs and 151 points. As a junior, he returned a kickoff 81 yards vs. Wheeling.

In baseball, the outfielder was an all-state tournament selection as Weir captured the one-class state title with a 6-2 finals' win over East Bank, the state's top championship program at the time.



Tom Bloom

At Purdue University, he was a two-way, do-it-all halfback who was selected the outstanding back on the freshman team and three-year varsity letterman and two-year starter. He was the team's second top rusher and receiver as a junior and top team receiver (13 catches for 217 yards and two TDs) as a senior. He scored two TDs in a 17-6 win over Michigan State in 1962. He was a kick returner and defensive back (47-yard interception TD). He was drafted by the Cleveland Browns in the 6th Round (No. 74 overall) and indicated he would sign with them, but was a victim of an automobile crash and passed away in 1963.





Tony Jeter

Tony Jeter (Weir High School, Class of 1962) -- He was a 6-foot-3, 225-pound four-sport, 11-letterwinning Red Rider athlete during a prime-time era in Weir High sports overall and football in particular when Weir won three state titles and lost only six games from 1957-61 under Hall of Fame coach Burdell (Jimmy) Carey.

Jeter, a four-year football letterman, was a starting defensive end on the 10-1 record Class AAA state title team of 1960 and a two-way end standout on the 10-1 record repeat state championship team of 1961 when he was selected first team All-State, All-Valley and All-OVAC. Weir routed Nitro, 40-0 and St. Albans, 26-7 in the two title games.

In baseball, Jeter won the team MVP award and was scouted by the Pittsburgh Pirates. He lettered three times in basketball and baseball and one year in track.

He accepted a University of Nebraska football scholarship and, after competing on the freshman team, was a three-year, 33-game starter at end on Cornhusker bowl teams - two Orange Bowl and one Cotton Bowl. In the 1966 Orange Bowl loss, 39-28, he landed two TD passes to tie a bowl record. Career-wise, playing on a running team, he landed 38 passes for 528 yards. The two-time All-Big Eight honoree, and team MVP as a senior for a 10-0 regular season team, earned first team All-America defensive honors by the American Coaches Association and second team by the two wire services as well as Academic All-America.



Tony Jeter

The Nebraska Football Hall of Famer was drafted in the NFL third round, 46th overall, by the Green Bay Packers and also by the AFL Oakland Raiders. Traded by the Packers to the Pittsburgh Steelers, he played three NFL seasons before a back injury halted his career. A brother of OVAC Hall of Famer, and former U. of Iowa and Green Bay Packer star Bob Jeter, he resides in Hampton, Ga.

Mike Palmer

Mike Palmer

Mike Palmer (Steubenville High School, Class of 1967) -- The 5-foot-10, 170-pound running back is one of only three Big Red stars to earn Ohio AP Back of the Year honors, joining OVAC Hall of Famers Harry Wilson and Zach Collaros. He was the featured back on two Ohio-ranked powers and earned two first team Associated Press largest Class AA All-Ohio honors plus two All-Valley "Big School", two All-OVAC Class AAA, and two All-Eastern Ohio honors. He was All-Valley co-captain as a senior when he led Big Red to a 9-1 record, losing only to Massillon, and ranked No. 4 in the state Class AA poll. As a junior, Big Red went 8-2 and was ranked No. 8 in the Ohio AP poll.

As a senior, he scored 126 points (18 TDs, 18 conversions) and rushed 149 times for 1,098 yards and landed 16 passes for 261 yards. Playing against top-caliber foes as a junior, he rushed 107 times for 882 yards, landed 17 passes for 292 yards, and scored 89 points on 14 TDs and 5 conversions.

He also competed in track and basketball. As a member of sprint relay units, he ran a leg on an OVAC meet record-setting 880-yard team which timed 1:31.1. Big Red won four straight OVAC Class AAA crowns from 1964-67.

Earning a football scholarship to Iowa State University, he was a two-year letterman, and starter, for the Cyclones while rushing 116 times for 443 yards and two TDs and landing 18 passes for 267 yards and two scores. He had an NFL tryout. He resides in Fremont, Calif.

Pete Abuls

Pete Abuls (Cambridge High School, Class of 1978) - Abuls was the second 1,000-point scorer in the history of Cambridge boys' basketball, finishing his career with 1,091 points.

The 6-6 dandy led the Bobcats as a senior with 543 points (a school record at the time), a 27.3 average, scoring in double figures in all 21 games including six 30-point games, topped by 40 against New Philadelphia. Abuls led the Bobcats to three OHSAA District Tournament finals.

As would be expected, he received many post-season honors. Abuls was named first-team all-Ohio as a senior, joining Ohio State legends Clark Kellogg and Art Schlichter on that list. He was also the AP Eastern District Class AAA "Player of the Year" and a first-team all OVAC Class AAAA and all-District 12 selection.

As a junior, he was an honorable mention all-Eastern District honoree when he scored 342 points.

Abuls was also a dynamic performer in track & field for the Bobcats.

The three-year letterman set what was then an OVAC record in the high jump with a leap of 6-6 and he also went 21-9 in the long jump, helping the Bobcats to the Class AAAA championship. Voted the school's Ray Voltz. Award winner as the top male athlete, he was also a two-year letterman in cross country.

Abuls continued his athletic and academic careers at Tennessee Tech where he was a four-year letterman and the team captain for three years. He finished his career with 1,187 points (a 12.2 avenge), 462 rebounds, 139

assists and 110 steals. He averaged 13.3 points as a freshman and led the team at 12.1 as a sophomore. After an injury-plagued junior campaign, he again led the team in scoring at 14.5 as a senior. Abuls carned all-Ohio Valley Athletic Conference accolades following his senior campaign. Abuls was inducted into the District 12 Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame in 2015.





Don 'Kip' McLane

Don 'Kip' McLane (Steubenville Catholic Central, Class of 1971) - McLane rates among the best hoopsters ever to suit up for the Crusaders.

He put together a dominating senior season, averaging 25.4 points and an amazing 20 rebounds per contest. Not surprisingly, a slew of honors came his way following that memorable campaign. He was tabbed first team all- OVAC, all-Eastern District and District 5 player-of-the-year. Moreover, McLane was selected by both UPI and AP as a first-team all-Ohio honoree. He was also chosen to play in the Ohio North/South All-Star Game.

His outstanding exploits also resonated on the national landscape as McLane was named to a pair of All-American teams: The U.S. Basketball Writers Association Coach and Athletic Magazine and the Surildst Growers A-A squad.

He ended his career at Steubenville Catholic – where he is a member of the school's Hall of Fame (Class of 1989) – with 1,008 points.

After his illustrious Crusader career, McLane received a basketball scholarship to Duquesne University - a national power in those days.

McLane was a three-year starter at Duquesne University, serving as team captain as a senior in 1975. With the Dukes, he tallied 861 points (12 ppg), 586 rebounds (8.1 ppg) and 127 assists. He passed away in 2014 at the age of 61.

Joseph 'JoJo' Blaha

Joseph 'JoJo' Blaha (Wheeling Central Catholic, Class of 1983) — In a school where athletic tradition runs deep, Blaha rates with the Maroon Knights' all-time greats. He was a first-team all-state honoree in three sports - football, basketball and baseball.

While starring in all three sports, Blaha's prep baseball exploits were staggering.

He was a two-time all-stater (1981/1983). He batted better than .400 as a junior and senior, earning all-OVAC and all-Valley first-team plaudits. He also helped lead Wheeling American Legion Post 1 to a pair of state championships, highlighted by being selected in 1983 as the West Virginia State Player of the Year.

In football, Blaha was a stud running back and led the team in rushing as a junior and senior, eclipsing the 1,000-yard mark as a senior. His ball-toting efforts landed him all-OVAC, all-State and all-Valley plaudits.

The versatile and multi-talented Blaha was a four-year basketball performer for legendary coach Skip Prosser. The Knights captured the 1982 state crown, their first as a member of the WVSSAC. Central advanced to the

state tournament again the following year. The savy guard was voted to the state all-tournament team in both 1982 and 1983. Blaha was a double-digit scorer in his final two years in hoops. He was an all-OVAC, all-Valley and all-State honoree both of those seasons.

Blaha opted to continue his baseball and academic careers at Valdosta State in Georgia, where he scripted another brilliant diamond resume, lettering all four years. He was a two-time All-American and two-time all-conference honoree during his collegiate playing days. The standout third baseman established eight school records. He was a .339 career hitter with 43 home runs, 52 RBI, 178 runs scored and 209 RBI. Blaha helped lead Valdosta to 157 wins in his career.

Carl Fodor

Carl Fodor (Weir High School, Class of 1982) - Fodor was a prolific three-year starter at quarterback for the Red Riders. He set the school career passing record of 2,090 yards (it lasted until 2005) despite playing on three losing record teams and missing several games with injuries.

As a senior, he was sidelined from Weir's first three games with a collarbone injury. In seven games, he passed for 1,213 yards, completing 74 of 165 passes with 8 TDs for a 1-9 record team. In their win over Mount View (27-12), he passed for 269 yards, then second-best in school history. Fodor earned second-team Class AAA all-state honors as well as all-Valley and all-Mountaineer League plaudits. He was selected to play in the W. Va. North-South All-Star Game in Charleston and quarterbacked the North (coached by Dave Cisar) to an upset victory.

Fodor also excelled on the diamond for the Red Riders. He was a three-year regular center-fielder who helped Weir earn a state Class AAA state tournament berth with section and regional titles including a 1-0 upset Region 1 semi-final win over John Marshall and OVAC Hall of Fame pitcher Chris Jones. He earned honorable mention largest Class AAA all-State plus all-Valley (all-class) second team.

Fodor went onto a record-setting career as Marshall University's quarterback. He ended his Thundering Herd career holding virtually every passing record in school annals. The talented quarterback completed 416-of-811 passes for 35 TDs. He established a Southern Conference record with his 6,627 passing yards.

Fodor's passing exploits at Marshall earned him the West Virginia Amateur Athlete of the Year Award (now Hardman Award). He is one of only seven OV prep products who have won the state's oldest award originated in 1933. The other six are already honored by the OVAC: Chuck Howley, Lee Patrone, Zach Amedro, John (Fuzzy) Filliez, Harold (Doe) Daugherty and Kenny Griffith.

Fodor signed a free agent NFL contract with the St. Louis Cardinals and was on the practice squad in 1986 before signing CFL contract with the Calgary Stampeders where he played two seasons. He then played a season with Chicago in the Arena League before ending his career with one season in Wheeling with Steel Valley Smash.

Fodor was inducted into the W.Va. Coaches Association Hall of Fame plus halls of fame at Marshall and Weir.





Daryl 'Boogie' Johnson

Daryl 'Boogie' Johnson (Wheeling Park High School, Class of 1992) -- It didn't matter the sport or season for this Patriot, he simply shined.

While earning accolades in multiple sports, it was on the football field where Johnson left his biggest impact. One of the best running games to ever suit up in the Ohio Valley, Johnson rushed for more than 4,100 career yards and 56 touchdowns. He saved his best for last, putting forth a highly memorable campaign in which he carried the ball 229 times for 2,062 yards and scored 31 touchdowns. During that senior season in 1991, Johnson had his biggest games against the biggest opponents. Against Morgantown, Johnson carried the ball 9 times for 231 yards and four touchdowns in the first half alone.

Following that season, accolades followed Johnson as he was named the recipient of the Kennedy Award, which goes to the top prep player in the Mountain State, as well as the Gatorade Player of the Year in the state. He was also named fourth-team All-American. Along with those, he was first-team All-State, All-OVAC and All-Valley. Johnson was listed on the All-OVAC team in all three years of his career.

In February of 1992, Johnson signed a National Letter of Intent to continue his football career at Oklahoma State University. He made an impact early, accumulating more than 600 yards of offense as a freshman, but saw his comparing out short due to a knee injury. As a sophomore, he had sained 300 yards, but a collection injury as

his campaign cut short due to a knee injury. As a sophomore, he had gained 300 yards, but a collarbone injury ended his season and his junior year was also cut short with another knee injury.

On top of his football prowess at Wheeling Park, Johnson shined on the baseball field. He had a career batting average of better than .400, including two all-OVAC seasons as a sophomore and junior where he hit .455 and .420, respectively.

Josh Watson

Josh Watson (Magnolia High School, Class of 1999) – Whether it was track or cross country, this former Blue Eagle ran...and he ran fast.

Watson is one of the most decorated distance runners in Ohio Valley history, achieving impeccable success in both sports.

In his OVAC and West Virginia State Meet careers, Watson finished with 15 gold medals, including 14 individual titles - the most in Ohio Valley history.

In cross country, Watson became the first Magnolia harrier to win the West Virginia State Championship, helping his team to the state team title as well. He also won the regional title and finished second in the OVAC. Watson didn't stop there. He won the regional and state championship as a junior and senior, too.

In the spring, it didn't matter the distance. Whether it was the 800, 1600 or 3200, Watson took on all comers. His junior season, he finished as the high scorer in the Class A/AA meet with 32.5 points. Those came via the state title in the 800, 1600 and 3200 and he anchored the champion 4x800 team. He won the 1600 and 3200 at the OVAC and finished as runner-up in the 800.

As a senior, Watson helped guide the Blue Eagles to the West Virginia Class A/AA state team title thanks to scoring 32 more points, which includes repeats in all three of the individual distance events and a runner-up finish in the 4x8. He was the OVAC champion in all three individual races and set the OVAC 3A record at the time at 1:59.05.

After high school, Watson signed to compete in both sports at William & Mary. He earned Academic All-American honors in both sports and a Phi Beta Kappa.

Leekycia Brown

Leekycia Brown (Monroe Central High School, Class of 2005). This right-handed ace lettered in multiple sports during her time with the Seminoles, but it was in the softball pitching circle where she made her biggest impact. Brown led the Seminoles to the 2004 Division III State Championship by pitching every inning of the 32-game season. In the state title game, against Wheelersburg, Brown pitched a complete game, striking out four and walking two in a 1-0 victory.

During that junior season, Brown finished with a 0.62 carned run average and an astounding 290 strikeouts. She pitched no fewer than 18 shutouts. She also shined at the plate.

As a junior, Brown guided the Seminoles to the regional championship game and batted .455. For her career, she was a .354 hitter.

All told, during her prep career, Brown finished with a 91-16 record, 900 strikeouts and just 49 walks. She pitched nine no-hitters and five perfect games. At the time of her graduation, she held the Ohio record for consecutive innings pitched without allowing a walk at 76.

Obviously, plenty of accolades followed Brown. She was a first-team All-Ohio selection as a sophomore and junior. She carned second-team accolades as a freshman and honorable mention as a senior. She was named

All-OVAC first team four times and was the Eastern District and OVAC Player of the Year as a sophomore and junior.

Her prep exploits earned her a scholarship to Norfolk State University where she competed for four seasons. As a freshman, she was named the team's Rookie of the Year after leading the squad in hitting (.339) and ERA (2.68). As a junior, she was named to the conference's All-Academic Team and finished 10-9 in the circle with a 3.07 ERA. She was named the team's MVP following the season.

Along with softball, Brown lettered in basketball for the Seminoles, earning all-OVAC honors.

Natalie Perzanowski (St. John Central High School Class of 2008). Distance running -- whether it was track or cross country -- was the way of life for this former Lady Irish standout.

Perzanowski was a key cog in the Lady Irish track team's four-year run of dominance that saw them win two state championship, two state runner-up trophies and four consecutive OVAC titles.

All told, she claimed seven state-level medals in track, including winning the 1600 and 3200 meter run state titles in 2006. She also has a trio of bronze medals in her collection along with a fifth and seventh in the 4x800 during 2008 and 2006, respectively.

At the OVAC Championship, Perzanowski finished with 14 conference titles, winning four golds as a sophomore and senior.

After her sophomore season, she was named the Eastern District's Female Athlete of the Year. In cross country, Perzanowski qualified to the OHSAA State Meet four times and earned all-Ohio in three of those appearances. Her best finish came in 2007 when she crossed the line in third. She was fourth as a junior and eighth as a sophomore.

She was twice (2005, 2006) the overall OVAC champion and in 2004 and 2007 won the Class 1A/2A title. Perzanowski was named Eastern District Athlete of the Year for Division III in both 2005 and 2006.

Along with her exploits on the track and CC course, she was a three-time Academic All-Ohio honoree in both sports.

While distance running was where she really made her presence felt she was also an impact performer for the Lady Irish basketball program during her four years. She scored 991 career points, had 388 steals, passed out 306 assists and pulled down 297 rebounds.

She was three times listed as first team All-Eastern District and All-OVAC, while helping to lead her team to three OVAC titles. She was second-team All-Ohio as a junior and was named The Intelligencer Sophomore of the Year in 2006 and twice was District 12 Player of the Year in 2006 and 2007.

After high school, Perzanowski went to the University of Toledo to continue her running career.

OVAC Embarks on 79th Year

The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference was organized in 1943 with F.W. Bowen, J.E. Ewing, J.C. Greer, M.S. Hattala, B.G. Lockhart, J.V. Nelson, C. Petty, C.F. Walker, and C.S. Wiseman among those responsible for its basic conception. C.S. Wiseman became the conference's first president.

A demand arose in 1943 for a conference which would help stimulate and promote a more lucrative program of competitive high school athletics in the upper Ohio Valley.

Today, the OVAC is the largest and most functional high school conference of its kind in the United States. A total of 50 schools supply the upper Ohio Valley with more than 10,000 athletes in the various competitive athletic areas.

It is the basic objective of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference to continue the promotion of all high school athletics and to serve in the overall development of proper school relationship, scholarship, and sportsmanship within the conference.

Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

Ed Bode (Bethel Township High School, Class of 1958). As a junior, he led one of Ohio's smallest high schools to the state Class A semifinals before bowing to Gratis, 73-72. He was selected all-tournament. Playing for OVAC charter Hall of Fame coach Dick Potts, Bethel won county, sectional, district and regional titles en route to a 27-2 record.

The 6-foot-4 center was even better as a senior when Bethel went 22-2 and advanced to the district finals. He not only earned first team All-Ohio Class A by The Associated Press, but was named Class A Player of the Year. He also repeated as All-Eastern Ohio while scoring 537 points in 24 games. He played in the first Ohio

North-South All-Star game along with future Ohio State greats John Havlicek of Bridgeport and Jerry Lucas of Middletown.

Bode earned a scholarship to West Virginia University where his three-year career was limited by a knee injury as he earned one letter and played in 43 games. He then served 23 years as a boys' basketball coach in Ohio with a 325-175 record. He succeeded his prep coach, Potts, at Skyvue where his 1964 team won 21 straight games before bowing in the district finals. After three seasons, he coached one year at Doylestown Chippewa before taking a coaching break for two years. He returned to Skyvue for four years, where a 24-2 team advanced to the regional finals. He coached at Martins Ferry from 1973-78 and ended his career at Strasburg with a nine-year stint. Bethel became part of the Skyvue consolidation which later was in the Monroe Central consolidation. Bode died in 2010.

Bob Bowen (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1942). He was a state honored two-sport Purple Rider athlete in basketball and tennis before becoming a three-year Ohio State basketball regular on nationally-ranked teams,

The four-year, two-sport standout was a junior starter on a 27-2 record 1941 Purple Rider team which won the Ohio Class A championship by finishing with 17 straight wins, capturing sectional and district titles before winning four games in the state event capped by a 37-30 finals' win over Lakewood.

In Bowen's senior season, the Riders hiked the win streak to 33 games before bowing to Steubenville, which also ended a 22-3 record Rider season in the district tournament. Bowen, nicknamed "Frosty", was a second team All-Ohio Class A choice by The Associated Press while teammate Lou Groza earned third team honors. Ferry started tennis as a prep sport in 1940 and Bowen excelled as he teamed as a senior with junior teammate Ken Kadar to win the area's only Ohio state doubles title in 1942. Ferry's team captured a district crown that year.

Bowen enrolled at Ohio State and became a three-year basketball starter in 1944 and 1946-47. The 1944 and 1946 teams won Big Ten Conference titles and played in the NCAA national tournaments where the Buckeyes placed fourth in 1944 and 3rd in 1946.

Bowen and Kadar were both inducted into the Martins Ferry Athletic Hall of Fame in 2016.

Russell (Bus) LaRue (Wheeling High School, Class of 1926). He was a four-year Wildcat standout in football, basketball and baseball that went on to earn seven letters in two sports at West Virginia University.

In football, he was a do-it-all running back, passer and punter and two-year team captain. In both his junior and senior seasons, he earned first team All-Valley and All-State and twice selected captain. As a senior, he led the Wildcats to an 8-1-1 record and, with no state playoffs and no in-state losses, while outscoring foes by 172-16, the Wildcats claimed an "unofficial" state title. They defeated Parkersburg, Huntington, Fairmont Senior, Clarksburg Victory, Moundsville, Benwood Union and Magnolia.

In basketball, the Wildcats were state one-class runner-up to Huntington in his junior season and he earned second team all-tournament honors. After the state event

at Buckhannon, the team competed in the National Tournament in Chicago, which invited all state champions and runners-up.

He enrolled at West Virginia University where he played for coach Ira (Rat) Rodgers and lettered three seasons at fullback. The 1928 team went 8-2. He was also a four-year letterman as a third baseman on the baseball team.

After graduation, he returned to Wheeling as an Ohio County high school and junior high teacher and coach.

He is deceased.

Robert Lilienthal (Cambridge High School, Class of 1953). He earned state honors in football and basketball for the Bobcats. A three-season football starter at quarterback, he led the Bobcats as a senior to its first Central Ohio League championship, and No. 11 state Class A ranking, including a 20-14 win over third-ranked Zanesville, 20-14. He was named second team All-Ohio and first team All-COL. He played for the South team in the annual Ohio North-South game opposite the first team All-Ohio quarterback Len Dawson of Alliance - a future Purdue University and Kansas City Chiefs' standout.

A four-year starter in basketball, he led the Bobcats, as a junior, to the Central Ohio League co-title and earned second team All-COL. In his senior season, the Bobcats recorded the school's first unbeaten regular season and went 23-0 before bowing in the district tournament. He repeated on the All-COL second team and was selected to third team All-Ohio Class A by United Press International.

He enrolled at Ohio State and was in the football program for three years. The 6-foot, 174-pounder was one of seven quarterbacks on the 10-0 record 1954 team which defeated USC, 20-7 in the Rose Bowl and was the national poll champion by the AP. The 1955 team went 7-2 and repeated as Big Ten Conference champion. The Cambridge resident was inducted into the Cambridge Athletic Hall of Fame in 2018.

Chris Yura (Morgantown High School, Class of 1999). He was a state record-setting running back (102 career TDs, 50 as senior) who earned the Kennedy Award as state all-class Player of the Year as a junior before placing third as a senior behind the only first place tie in history between two other state record-setters - J.R. House of Nitro (passing) and Quincy Wilson of Weir (rushing). A two-time first team Class AAA all-stater, he earned All-America mention from USA Today

The 5-foot-11, 185-pounder led the state in scoring two straight years and rushed for more than 2,000 yards in both his junior and senior seasons to end with more than 5,700 career yards in three years.

He led the Mohigans to a 12-2 record as a senior and state runner-up to a House-led Nitro in a memorable 69-52 "Super Six" shootout at Wheeling Island Stadium. Yura nursed an ailing ankle and didn't start the game, but was inserted to score his record 50th season TD.

As a junior, Morgantown was unbeaten in regular season but was upset in the playoffs. Yura rushed for 2,017 yards and scored 37 TDs. He was a three-time All-NCAC Conference selection.

Recruited by several Division I colleges, he opted for Notre Dame U., where he was a four-year letterman, mostly as a special teams player and backup fullback. The 2000 Irish team went 9-3 and ranked 15th nationally. The 2002 team was 10-3 with a 17th national poll spot.

George Kovalick (OVAC 'Family')

George E. Kovalick (Bridgeport High School), recognized as the "father" of high school wrestling in the Obio Valley. Kovalick previously has been honored with membership in numerous halls of fame, including those at Kent State University; the Ohio Valley. Association: Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Club: West Liberry State College: Ohio Athletic Directors and the Ohio Wrestling Hall of Fame.
Kovalick was selected as the first recipient (1976) of the prestigious OVAC Wrestling Committees prestigious "Mr. Mat Award." an honor given annually to an individual for outstanding contributions to the sport of wrestling.
Kovalick directed championship reams in football, baseball and wrestling at both the intercollegiate and interscholastic levels during an enormously-successful 24-year.
Among the athletes he utored in high school or college were all-time Ohio Valley greats John Havlicek. Phil and Joe Nickro, and Bobby Douglas. In baseball, Kovalick coached the Hilltoppers to the 1964 NAIA baseball championship, the only national title ever captured by the school. He also had West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championships. In 1979, Kovalick's Bulldogs made history by becoming the first school outside the Cleveland area since 1942 to win an Ohio state wrestling title since. He coached six individual state champions.
Kovalick'as other OVAC coaching stops were at Moundsville, Bellaire and Weir thigh schools. His 1973 Weir High football learn was a state runner-up, lowing to East Bank in the Class AAA state final. He retired from coaching in 1978 but then served as athletic director at Bellaire until the time of his death in 1984. He was OVAC Baseball Director for many years and also directed the conference's mat championship event.

Along with his great coaching knowledge, Kovalick was also recognized as a marvelous competitor.

Along with his great coaching knowledge, Kovalick was also recognized as a marvelous competitor, meticulous organizer and a man with an enormous capacity for work.

Samuel A. Mumley (OVAC 'Family')

Samuel A. Mumley (Benwood Union High School) served two terms—covering a total of 32 years—as executive secretary of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference. During the second term which lasted until his death in 1999, Mumley helped resurrect

total of 32 years — as executive secretary of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference. During the second term which lasted until fix death in 1999, Mumley helped resurrect the bis-state league from the brink of bankruptcy to its current standing as one of the great high school conferences in the entire country.

Some of the many highlights from his stewardship included: Helping to establish the OVAC Foundation as a major fund-raising arm for the conference; Securing XCAA certification for the Rudy Mumley OVAC Charity All-Star Football Classic; Attracting major financial sponsors to support all of the OVAC programs, including the Banquet of Champions, an awards dinner that honors more than 1300 althetes each spring and provides more than \$20,000 annually in scholarships; Establishing the all-star basketball game which was later renamed as the Samuel A. Mumley OVAC All-Star Basketball Classic.

Mumley's response to a call of duty went beyond the OVAC as he was one of the founders of the Wheeling Slaper Six Committee, which has hosted the West Virginia state stocer championship football games at Wheeling Island Stadium since 1994, He also helped secure the West Virginia state soccer championships for the city-Five years after his death, the fruition of another one of his dreams occurred when an artificial grass playing surface was installed at Wheeling Island Stadium

Although awards were never important to Mumley, he was the recipient of numerous honors. The major awards presented to him included: The National Federation of Officials Outstanding Service Award, Dapper Dan Man of the year; OVAC Man of the Year, and Outstanding West Virginian.

He was a basketball official for 23 years, an assistant coach, athette traner and athletic director at several area schools, including Cameron, The Linsly School and St. Clairsville. He was also a trainer at his college alma mater, the University of Maryland, along with the Washington Redskins and Philadelphia Eagles, Mumley served on the state of Ohio Board of Equity, was a memb

Bill Van Horne (Media)

Bill Van Horne (Martins Ferry High School), was the dean of Ohio Valley sports-writers during a legendary newspaper career that spanned 53 years. Van Horne was sports editor of The Times Leader for 25 years and the Wheeling News-Register for 28 years, during which time he was recognized by his peers as the most informational and influential writer in Ohio Valley history. His work with the OVAC over the years was especially instrumental in the success of the wrestling; track and field and cross-country. Van Horne was the second recipient of wrestling's "Mr. Mati" Award in 1977 and he also received the Calvin Giffin Monoral Teack Award.

His columns, "Van Horne on Sports," were masterpiece chronicles of the lives of others, A giant in his field and a role model for aspiring writers, Van Horne was admired and respected for his integrity, dedication, fairness, knowledge and compassion.

Van Horne's coverage and support for events like the Wheeling Distance Race (now The Ogden Newspapers 20K Classic), the West Virginia Tennis Open and the (now defunct) Wheeling LPGA Classic helped those events reach prominence in our area. His backing also was a factor in the popularity enjoyed by the Wheeling Ironnen, Wheeling Blues and Wheeling "Inunderbirds (now the Wheeling Nailers), professional football, basketball and hockey teams.

Numerous awards and honors were bestowed on Van Horne. The Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club named him Man of the Year in 1993; he was selected as the West Virginia Sportswriter of the Year three times; received the Gene Morehouse Memorial Award for contributions in sportswriting throughout the Mountain State; and he was inducted into numerous hails of fame. Among hose were the Wheeling Hall of Fame; the Lou Holtz Upper Ohio Valley Hall of Fame; Ohio Baseball Hall of Fame, Minut League Pro Football Hall of Fame among how were the Wheeling Plal of Fame; the Lou Holtz Upper Ohio Valley Hall of Fame; Ohio Baseball Hall of Fame, Minut League Pro Football Hall of Fame among president of the West Virginia Sports Writers Assiciation and was a member of the Football Writers of America. Bill was the first sportswriter from West Virginia to be elected to the Football Writers Board of Directors. He also served as state chairman for the Heisman Trophy selection committee.

Cal Pokas (Bellaire High School) was another giant in the sports writing profession who cut his eye teeth under Bill Vin Home and developed into one of the area's true newspaper greats in his own right.

Pokas, who deed in 2000, was employed for 4d years at The Times Leader, including 29 memorable years for Ohio Valley sports fain as the sports editor. He also was assistant sports editor. Cal continued to contribute to his newspaper's sports pages with his weekly "Eye on the Bucks" column about Ohio State football. Pokas also personally saw to it that many of the so-called minor sports such as cross-country, track and volleyball. received their share of coverage in his newspaper.

Pokas was deeply interested in the OVAC throughout his career and he devoted much of his spare time to serving on committees for the Rody Mumley Charity Foxball All-Star Classic, along with compiling standings for the football and baskeball championship races. He also served on a media relations committee for the bi-state league.

Pokas had a term as president of the Ohio Prep Sports Writers Association, and was commissioner of the Ohio

His interests in the community went beyond the world of sports as Pokas served on an advisory board for the Salvation Army; was Belmont County Chairman of the Multiple Sclerosis Association, and tilled a seat on the Martins Ferry Civil Service Commission for 32 years until Middle Baseball League for the Salvation Army; was Belmont County Chairman of the Multiple Sclerosis Association, and tilled a seat on the Martins Ferry Civil Service Commission for 32 years until Middle Press International. The Ohio Prep Sports Writers Association named him Sports Writer of the Year in 1976 and he was given a Distinguished Service Award from the Ohio Association of Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches. Cal was selected to the Ohio Prep Sports Writers Hall of Fame and the UPI Sports Editors Association, Ohio Baseball Hall of Fame and the UPI Sports Editors Association All Hall of Fame and the Walley Football Coaches Association, Ohio Baseball Hall of Fame and he was honored to be presented the first Sportsmanship Ethics and Integrity Award for the Eastern District from the OHSAA, Pokas was a "Mr. Mat" award honoree at the OVAC Westling Tounament, along with being selected for Bellaire High School's Wall of Fame. He was named as the Honorary Referee for the Wheeling Park Track Classic because of contributions to Ohio Valley youth.

Richard L. 'Dick' Potts (Coaches)

Richard L. "Dick" Potts finished his career as the Ohio Valley's all-time winningest

Richard L. "Dick" Ports finished his career as the Ohio Valley's all-time winningest basketball coache with 589 career victories.

Inducted into the Ohio High School Hall of Fame in 1983 by the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Association, Ports coached a total of 40 seasons, all of which where spent in Monroe County, He began in 1951 at Betche High School. His 1957 Blackhawks came out of the Monroe County hills at tournament time and advanced all the way to the Ohio Class A state finals where they lost by a single point. At the time the school had just 13 boys in grades nine through 12 and all but one of the male students was on the basketball team.

In seven years at Betchel, his teams won more than 20 games five times, including the 27-2 miracle team that played in the state tournament.

When the school was taken into the Skyvue consolidation after the '58 campaign, Potts was named coach

When the school was taken into the Skyvue consolidation after the '58 campaign, Potts was named coach of the Golden Hawks where he spent four years before moving on to River High in 1963. He remained at the Pilots' helm through the 1991 season.

The former Hannibal High School athlete was named in 1981 as the recipient of the prestigious Ohio Paul Walker Award, given in memory of Jerry Lucas' high school coach at Middletown, Ohio, Walker was the Buckeye State's all-time winningest coach.

The navy veteran, Potts was the first OVAC coach to reach the 500-win plateau in basketball, reaching that goal with a win over Monroe County rival Woodsfield in 1983.

Considered a master strategist and teacher of the game, Potts may have been at his best during critical situations in post-season play. His teams won seven overtime tournament games, including a nine-OT win achieved by River against Morgan in Class AA sectional play.



Jim Foti was a basketball coach for 38 years and a head football mentor for 20 seasons. He already has been inducted into the City of Wheeling, West Virginia Sports Writers Association, Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club and John Carroll University's Halls of Fame.

Foit, a native of Jamestown, N.Y., came to the area in 1942 after having coached at Erie (Pa.) Prep. He coached basketball at Warwood, Wheeling Central Catholic and Belliare, Overall, Foit posted 466 vastity basketball victories, all but 26 coming at OVAC schools. He coached Warwood High to seven West Virginia regional championships and his 1967 Viking squad won the state title. In 1976, his final year as a head coach and the last season before the Ohio County consolidation, Foit's Vikings advanced to the state cummanent semifinals before being eliminated. The 1975 team played in the state championship game. He had five W.Wa. Catholic title-winning teams at Wheeling Central and guided his squads to OVAC championships held at Newport, R. I.

Foit's football coaching career produced another 124 victories, including a 90-106-3 record at Warwood, where the Class AA school was saddled with playing one of the most competitive schedules in the area. His 1943 Wheeling Central football team went 9-1 and guined a Steel Bowl berth, where it lost a 20-19 thriller to Rochester, Pa., at Steubenville.

Tim Spencer (Athlete - 1970s)

Tim Spencer (St. Clairwille High School, Class of 1979) ranks with the greatest running backs ever to grace Ohio Valley high school gridirons. Spencer — who plied his trade for legendary coach George Strager — rushed for some 3,144 yards and 50 touchdowns. He scored 338 points during his Red Devil grid career.

As a sense, the Parade All-American gained 1,670 yards and scored 28 touchdowns while his junior numbers totaled 1,280 rushing yards and 18 touchdowns. Spencer's top prep game came as a senior when he mished for 306 yards and scored six touchdowns against Martins Ferry. All told, he scored 40 points in that contest.

He was awarded All-OVAC and All-Ohio football honors following his junior and senior seasons.

Spencer also played basketball and ran track for the Red Devils, excelling in the 100- and 200-meters. After his prep days, Spencer matriculated to Columbus to play for Coach Barle Bruce's Ohio State Buckeyes. The 6-1, 210-pounder was a three-year starter for the Buckeyes. He finished his career with 3,553 yards which still ranks bird on Ohio State's all-time rushing charts. Spencer led the Big Ten in rushing as a senior with 1,371 yards, eighth best in the nation. He was accorded All-Big Ten honors twice and was a second-team CPF All-American selection as a senior. He served as the Buckeyes' co-captain as a senior and was voted the team MVP that year. He was also named MVP of the Holiday Bowl as he rushed for 167 yards and two TDs in OSU's 47-17 win. Spencer was the second player selected in the United States Football League (ISFL) draft by the Chicago Blitz, After a three-year USFL stint, he signed with the San Diego Chargers where he started for four years at fullback.

He gained more than 5,000 rushing yards and scored 45 touchdowns as a professional.

Spencer served as Ohio State's running backs coach from [994 through the 2003 season, He left the Buckeyes for an assistant's role with the Chicago Bears.

Mitch Hannahs (Athlete - 1980s)

Mitch Hannahs (Skyvue High School, Class of 1985) was the epitome of a winner in high school as the tww-sport, four-year letterman sparked the tiny Golden Hawks to the state teurnament in both basketball and baseball.

state tearnament in both basketball and baseball. In basketball, Skyvue made the OHSAA state tournament in Hannabs' junior and senior seasons. Triishing as the Class A runner-up in 1984-85. He was selected first team All-Ohio as a senior and second team as a junior and was a two-time first team All-Ohio as a benior and second team as a junior and was a two-time first team All-Ohio Sorth-South All-Star classic following a senior season where the 5 liguard averaged more than 22 points per game. In baseball, the consistent-hitting and sure-handed short-stop helped the Hawks to the Ohio Class A state championship as a senior (1985) as well as the OVAC and PVC titles. He earned first team All-Ohio, All-Eastern District, All-OVAC and All-PVC honors and was selected for the Ohio Baseball All-Star Series.

He also received All-Eastern District, All-OVAC and All-PVC accolades following his sophomore (1983)

and junior (1984) seasons.

After graduation Hannahs pulled off a rare "double" when his college team - Indiana State University - advanced to the NCAA Division I College World Series in 1986 and that same season, he played for the Maynard Post 666 team which advanced to the American Legion World Series. Hannahs was voted MVP of the regional tournament that season and won the Louisville Slugger Award for the highest batting average in

urnament play. At Indiana State, Hannahs was a three-time All-Missouri Valley Conference performer [1987-89] and was

an NCAA Division I All-American following his sentor year (1989).

He was a 16th round draft pick of the Milwaukee Brewers, playing in their farm system from 1989-93.

Hannahs is currently athletic director and bead baseball coach at Lincoln Trail College in Robinson, Illinois, He previously coached for seven years at his alma mater - Indiana State University.

Geno Ford (Athlete - 1990s)

Geno Ford (Cambridge High School, Class of 1993) achieved the ultimate honor of a high school basketball player in the state of Ohio when he was selected "Mr. Basketball" following his sentor season.

The 5-8 sharpshotter finished a stellar four-year career with the Bobcats as Ohio's second all-time leading scorer with 2.680 points which also stands as the OVAC's

all-time high-water mark. Ford's name also appears in the OHSAA record book in the following categories: 288 free throws made in a season (1991-92), first all-time; 697 free throws made in a career (1989-93), first all-time; and 928 points in a season (1991-92), seventh

all-time. Playing for his father, highly-successful Cambridge coach Gene Ford, Geno earned All-Ohio Division II first team accolades following both his junior and senior seasons. He was also a two-time All-Eastern District Division II "Player of the Year" and two-time All-OVAC Class 4-A first team pick. Ford went on to become a four-year letterman at Ohio University, earning All-Mid American Conterence second team honors as a junior (1996) and first team plaudits as a senior (1997). He is the fifth all-time leading scorer at OU with 1.752 points. One of the most popular players at OU. Ford helped the Bobcats to one NCAA and one NIT appearance during his career.

Following graduation, he served as a graduate assistant (1998-99) and assistant coach (1999-2001) at Ohio University; was head coach for one season at Division II Shawnee State University (2001-02), leading his team to a 22-10 record and earning American Mideast Conference "Coach of the Year" honors; served as an assistant coach at Kent State University since the 2002-03 season.

Amy Gamble (Athlete - 1980s)

Amy Gamble (John Marshall High School, Class of 1982) is one of the Ohio Valley's greatest female athletes of all time. Gamble excelled in three sports – basketball, track

greatest female athletes of all time, Gamble excelled in three sports – basketball, track and women's handball.

She became Marshall County's first Olympian when she competed with the U.S. Womens were cowned as champions of the Pan American Games.

Gamble was selected as the West Virginia Women's Basketball Player of the Year in 1982 after leading John Marshall to the state Class AAA championship. She averaged 23 points and 18 rebounds on a 22-1 record team which averaged its only loss by defeating Elkins in the state finals. Captain of the All-State Team, Gamble was a two-time Class AAA first-team honoree. She was chosen All-OVAC and All-Valley three straight years.

She was the first JMHS girls' basketball performer to score more than 1,000 points and the initial Monarch athlete to have her jersey retired. She scored 1,498 cureer points. Gamble was ranked as the No. 4 girls' basketball player in the country her senior season when was named to the Parade, Street & Smith and USA Toddy All-American teams.

Recruited by Tennessee, she played as a backup on the 1983 Lady Vols' squad that finished as the NCAA tournament runners-up, losing to the Cheryt Miller-led Southern Cal powerhouse. She left Tennessee at the end of that season and transferred to West Virginia University but played just one season before deciding to reterm handball.

After her appearance in the Olympics, Gamble returned to basketball and enrolled at the University of Arizona. Despite having just one season of eligibility remaining, Gamble was the team's leading scorer and she carned Pacifics IO Conference player of the week laurels.

Her high school track carner was also brilliant, as Gamble set numerous invitational meet and OVAC records in the shot put and the discus. She established all-time OVAC standards in both events and was a West Virginia state champion in both events. She was a three-time All-Valley homone.

Vicki Pullie-Stokes (Athlete - 1980s)

Vicki Pullie-Stokes (Wellsville High School, Class of 1987) is believed by many Wellsville residents to be one of the greatest athletes in the school's history, attested to by her induction as a member of Wellsville High School's Athletic of Fame inaugural Class of 2004.

During her high school career, Pullie-Stokes collected 15 first-place finishes at the annual Cal Giffin OVAC Track Championships and she was selected as the area "Track Athlete of the Yea" three times. She also camed both All-Valley and All-Eastern District faurels four times each, She was a two-time long jump champion at the Ohio high school state meet and was a runner-up in the 200 meters.

In volleyball, she was two twice selected as the team MVP and earned All-Area (three times), All-Eastern District (twice), and All-OVAC (twice). Three times she was named to the All-Columbiana County team.

In basketball, she led the 1987 Lady Tigers to the state finals. Her 27-1 record Wellsville team ended one of the nation's longest basketball streaks at 108 when the Tigers defeated West Holmes in tournament play. She scored more than 1,480 punts and collected more than Pl 800 rebounds while helping the Tigers to a three-year record of 66-8. Pullie-Stokes was chosen OVAC "Player of the Year" that season and was a two-time All-Ohio honoree. She also earned All-Valley and All-Area recognition three times each on the hardwood.

All told, she won 11 varsity letters and was selected as the American Legion 1987 Ohio State "Allted of the Year". She went on to play collegiate basketball at Ohio State and was a member of the 1989 Buckeyes' squad that won the Big Ten Conference championship. She gained personal honors when in 1990 she was selected as the conference's player of the week.

Additionally, Pullie earned a gold medal with the North Team in the 1989 U.S. Olympic Festival, held in Norman, Okla.

Stephanie Petho (Athlete - 1990s)

Stephanie Petho (St. John Central, Class of 1992) remains the measuring stick for

Stephanie Petho (St. John Central, Class of 1992) remains the measuring stick for female basketball greatness in the OVAC.

The Fighting Irish three-sports luminary re-wrote the St. John Central and OVAC scoring books during her career on Guernsey Street. The 5-7 sharpshooter finished her four-year career with 2,667 points which is first in conference annals and still ranks sixth in the state of Ohio.

Petho was accorded first-team All-OVAC all four years. The Bellaire native earned All-Ohio honors three years, culminating by being named the state's Division IV "Player of the Year" following a season in which she averaged a staggering 37.1 rooms a game.

As a junior, she tallied 35.9 points per game in leading her Lady frish teammates to a 22-3 record a berth in the OHSAA regional tournament. She was named first team All-Ohio after scoring 910 points that winter alone. Petho twice cracked the 50-point plateau in a game, scoring 57 against Shadyside and 56

winter alone. Petho twice cracked the 50-point plateau in a game, scoring 57 against Shadyside and 50 against Toronto.

The two-year starter at the University of Pittsburgh carried St. John Central to four OVAC championships in basketball and an overall 75-16 record. Petho was no one-sport wonder, also starting in volleyball rank rack during her prep career. She earned All-OVAC in volleyball the rjunior and senior years. In track, Petho is one of the valley's all-time great throwers, earning five OVAC gold medals in the weight events — three in the discuss and two in the shot put. Petho tossed the platter a school-record 121-7 en route to a regional championship and a third-place showing in the state meet as a junior. She capped her high school career by being named co-valedictorian of her senior class and she went on to become an Academic All-American at Pitt. While there, she led the team in scoring in the 1994-95 season, became the career free throw percentage leader (81.4) and is 14th on the all-time scoring list.

Rudy Mumley (OVAC 'Family')

Rudy Mumley (Wheeling High Schoot, Class of 1936). If Rudy Mumley's heart was measured by the size of his love for his fellow men and women, it never could have fit inside his body.

Mumley, an educator, administrator, humanitarian, dynamic organizer and charity fund-raiser, served the OVAC and the rest of Ohio Valley in many different, but special ways. He was a two-time president, charter member of the conference's Foundation Board, served on the football and basketball committees and was the organizer and long-time game director of the Ohio-West Virginia Charity Football Classic. The mid-summer all-star fwotball closh was renamed in his honor in 1986. He also served as OVAC president during the 1967-68 school year. To help the game get off the ground, Mumley once mortgaged his honor to achieve the financing needed for the inaugural OVAC-sponsored contest in 1972. He also was a great supporter of the OVAC wrestling nourrament.

A graduate of old Wheeling High School and West Liberty State College with a master's degree from Wv.D. Mumley served in the Air Force during Wortd War II (and was recalled during the Korean conflict. He taught at Powhatan, Shadyside and Smithfield High Schools before being appointed principal at Warren Consolidated High in Tiltnosville in 1964, Rudy later served as principal at Yorkville High, Later, when the Buckeye Local School District was formed, he became principal at Buckeye South and remained there until his rettrement in 1979.

Mumley, who was born in 1918 and died in 1999, also provided great service to the Upper Ohio Valley.

Doug Huff (Media)

Doug Huff (Magnolia High School, Class of 1961). This narive of New Maritinsville has been writing sports since the age of 12, his first "job" being with the Weged Democracy, a weekly paper in his home town. Huff joined The Intelligencer as associate sports editor in 1967, a position he held until 1978 when he was named as that paper's sports editor, remaining in that position until his retirement in 1999. He previously was sports editor of the Furnment lines and worked on the sports staff of the Dominion News in Morgantown.

While the sports chief of The Intelligencer, Huff originated All-Valley Boys Baskethall and Basehall electrions in 1968, plus the OV All-Sports School and Athleie Awards and the All-OV Scholar-Athlete selections. Bob Burton (Coaches)

Robert W. (Bob) Burton (Magnolia High School, Class of 1957) coached several sports at Paden City High School, but is most remember for a sparkling 38-year career as head boys, basketball coach (1963-2001) where he amassed a record of

554-327.

During his tenure, the Wildcats won 21 sectional championships; eight regional titles; finished as state runner-up twice (1972 and '82) and captured the West Virginia Class A championship twice (1973 and '87). Paden City had 28 winning seasons under Burton, including nine 20-win campaigns, and won five OVAC Class A championships (1971, '75, '92, '93 and '94).

Burton received the West Virginia "Coach of the Year" honor in 1986 and was selected to coach in the OVAC All-Star Basketball Classic several times as well as the West Virginia North-South All-Star Game in 1987, He was a member of the West Virginia Basketball Coaches Association, the State Coaches Committee and the OVAC Basketball Committee.

Burton also served as an assistant coach in football at Paden City for 18 years, serving on the Wildcats staff during two state championship seasons (1970 and '79); coached track for more than 30 years winning several OVAC Class A and Intra-State League championships; coached cross country for two years and golf for one season; was assistant baseball coach for three years; and spent more than a decade as athletic director. as athletic director

as atmeter/orecord.

As an athlete, Burton was a three-sport athlete at Magnolia, carning all-West Virginia honors in football in 1955. At the college level, he was also a three-sport performer, playing football at Kent State University and their football, basketball and tennis after transferring to West Liberry State College where he graduated in 1961. He then received a master's degree in education from West Virginia University in 1968.



George Strager (Coaches)

George Strager (McKeesport, Pa. High School, Class of 1943) has often been called the "deam" of Ohio Valley high school football coaches thanks to a highly successful cancer that spanned some 38 years (1951/87) at 185 editheria schools. He posted a cancer coaching record of 246 wins, 115 losses and 15 ties whice stood as the all-time valley record until eclopsed in 2004 by Jay Circosta of Woodsfield Monroe Central.

Strager's coaching career began in 1950 at tiny Sisterwille High School, compiling a 42-22-3 record in seven seasons there and leading the Tigers to the West Virginia Class A state championship in 1953. He mosted on to Clark-burn Notre Dame High for four years as nead football and basketball canch in 1957-60; going 24-10 on the grid-ino and leading the basketball canch in the West Virginia Class A state semifinals. Next came a three-year stirit at Wheeling Central Catholic (1961-63) which featured two undefeated register of the Championship game, but the next year Strager's teath averaged that hoss to with the crown, I'p next was a five-year stay at Cambridge High (1964-68), posting a 25-23-2 record.

He then began a legendary 19-year min at St. Clairsville High in 1969, turning his trademark "belty series" to a record of 134-51-9 there. His Red Devil teams posted three andefeated seasons (1969, '77 and '85) and the 1983 agaid carned the school's 65rs-ever trip to the OHSAA play offs and the 1986 team advanced in the state semitmals before losing a heart breaker to Chagrin Falls Kenston.

Strager's top honors included induction into the Ohio High School Booball Coaches Hall of Fame in 1992, ohio Valley Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 1991, selection as ONAC Coach of the Year in 1979 and '81' and recognition by the Dapper Dan Club of the Upper Olio Valley in 1992. He also coached in the ONAC All Star Charms Football Classic tick (et 1972 and '87).

A graduate of Salem College, Strager passed away in 1990, but his memory lives on in the form of the George Strager Memoral Football Classic

John 'Corky' Vrotsos (Coaches)

John "Corky" Vrotsox (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1946) not only initiated the sport of wrestfulg at his alma mater, he quickly established himself as one of the premier mat coaches in conference history.

Vrotsox guided the Purple Rider grapplers from 1957-68, leading his team to seven consecutive OVAC Tournament of any journhips (1961-67) along with six straight Ohio District Tournament titles. His teams finished ranked in the top 10 in the state four times (1950, '60, '63 and '64) and the best finish at the state tournament was a fifth place effort in 1945.

During his tenure, Vrotsos coached 41 OVAC champions and 41 Ohio State Tournament qualifiers, including 10 state placeswinners and one state champion (175).

The initial inclusive into the Martins Ferry High School Wrestling Half of Fame in 1994 and the 1978 recipient of the OVAC Wrestling Tournament's "Mr. Mat. Award", he served as tournament director for the OVAC, sectional and district tournaments after yielding the coaching post.

In addition to serving as head wrestling creach Virstoss was also an assistant in football and track for the Purple Riders. He was on the football staff during Ferry's run of three consecutive undefeated seasons (1959-61) and four OVAC championships (also 1963).

As an athlete, he was a three-year letterman in football and basketball at Martins Ferry, In football, he was a center-linebacker under legendary coach Fred Thomas, playing center and linebacker on the 1944 and '45 OVAC championships yaugads, earning all-conference "AA" honors as a senior. He played guard in basketball under coaches Floyd Baker and Ralph Gartrell, After serving in the army, Vrotsos then attended West Liberty State College, graduating in 1951. He was a three-year varsty football player for the Hill toppers and a member of two undefeated teams that played in bowl games (Smokey Mountain Bowl and Pythian Bowl).

Chester Grossi (Officials)

Chester Grossi (Neir High School, Class of 1940) began officiating in 1942, claiming to be "drafted" into officiating by fellow hononee Walter Heil because many officials had been lost due to the military draft.

His love of sports saw him enter the world of officiating, not only in football, but also in basketball. He retired from officiating in 1987 after 45 years, During those year, he worked many district and regional fournaments ames as well as 14 state tournaments in bracketball and 12 state trians in brookball. He also worked several West Virgima Catholic State basketball and football play off games as well as agames in the West Virgima Intercollegistic Athletic Conference and the United Footbal League. He is a life member of the Ohio Valley Board of Officials and the West Virgimia Football and Basketball Officials Assectation. He was the 1997 recipient of the OVAC's Robert Dawson Officials' Award and was homored by the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club.

As an athlete at Weir, Grossi played football for coach Carl Hamill from 1936-39 and during that time, the Red riders won 27 straight games. He received a football scholarship to West Liberty State College where he played for Coach foe Barrell in 1941 and after World War II.

He graduated from West Liberty with a bachelor's degree in publical science, returning to Weir High School as a leacher and assistant coach, He left the education field to enter into the investment and insurance business in 1960. He enamins active in many cive, Insternal and service organizations. He is president of the Weirtonian Lodge of the Balian Sons and Daughters of America, serves on the Board of Directors of the Virantmal Lodge of the Balian Heritage Festival; the Weirton Council 3734 K., this of Columbus and an afficer of their Fourth Degree; a life member of Post 10 of the American Legion; board member of Comp Fire USA; the Weirton Elles, and is a member of the West Liberty State College Foundation's Finance Committee, Ball of Fame Committee, Hilloppers, Athletic Club and

Walter Heil (Officials)

Walter Heil (Bellaire High, Class of 1923) was regarded as one of the deans of Ohio Valley officiating thanks to a career that spanned some 38 years and involved three sports

He began as a baseball umpire in 1926 then added football in 1928 and basketball in 1929, working countless games until finally hanging up his whistle at the age of 62, Heil officiated football and basketball at the high school, collegiate and profes-ional levels. He worked five West Virginia High School State Tournaments, five West Virginia Catholic High School State Tournaments and three West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Tournaments. He also officiated in the semi-pro-

Continental Football League, which featured the Wheeling Ironnen.

He was a member of the Ohio Valley Board of Officials, the West Virginia Officials Association and the International Association of Approved Basketball officials and was

honored for length of service by each of these organizations

After retiring as an active official, Heit assumed the role of commissioner of both basketball and foot ball officials for the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference, a position he held from 1965/70

He was a charter member of the Belluire High Athletic Wall of Fame and the 1998 recipient of the OVAC's Robert Dawson Officials' Award

Heil worked for Weirton Steel Corporation and was a resident of Yorkville until his death in 1970,

Alex Groza (Athlete - 1940s)

Alex Groza (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1944), This 6-food-7, 220-pounder led the Purple Riders to two straight undefeated regular seasons in baskethall and 10 his Ohiostate tournament both years. Martins Ferry Jimshed 24 1 in 1943 and 26 1 the following season. The Purple Riders won the first OVAC Class AA baskethall championship in 1944 as Groza scored a valley record 628 points ta mark later broken by 2004 OVAC Halt of Fame inductee ken Alessat. Groza scored 41 vs. Filtonsville. He was an all-conference and all-Ohio first-team selection.

Alex was the top score and rebounder on the Cinversity of Kentucky's Fabulous Five," which won back to-back NC AA filles in 1948 and '29, with Groza being named the remainent MVP both years. He was a three-time alf-Southeastern Conference choice and a two-time consensus All-American, He set 22 individual SEC records. Groza still ranks seventh on Kentucky's all-time scoring list with 1.744 points. Alex's jersey number (15) was retired by the school Groza and four of his UK teammates. Ralph Beard, Wallage Jones, Ciff Barker and Kenny Rollins—won a gold medal as U.S. Olympians at the London Games in 1948. Groza, in 1949, was named the Helms-Foundation Baskethall Player of the Year. In a 1950 Associated Press nationwide pad of sport writers selecting the feading arbitetes of the half-century. Alex was chosen as one of the five top-rated baskethall players. In the NBA, Groza averaged 22.5 points in 140 pro games with the fudanaports Olympians in 1991 and 31. He coached Bellarmine (Ky). College from 1959 through 1966. The school had never won a baskethall championship before Groza's tenure. Chuck Howley (Athlete - 1950s)

Charles L, "Chuck" Howley (Warwood High School, Class of 1954) was a first team all-West Virginia and all-OVAC tackle in 1953. He lettered in football, basketball and baseball. As a teenager, he also competed for an independent All-America boys gym-

baseball Ava teenager, he also competed for an independent All-America boys—gymnastics group.

The West Virginia University graduate is still the only Mountaineer athlete to letter in five sports—footbal—ymnastics, wrestling track and swimming. In football he played guard, center, and linebacker white earning All Southern Conference launets three straight years. Also the long snapper on special teams, Howley was selected as a third-team All-American his senior year Howley, at 6-2, 220 peunds, was considered to be one of the fastest memor in WVU history. He started in three college all star games—East-West Shrine Game, Senior Bowl and the College Football All Star Game. He lettered for the Mountaineers on the transpoling in permissions a heart working in spristing a printer and weightman in track

East-West Shrine Game, Senior Bowl and the College Football All Star Game. He lettered for the Mountaineers on the trampolitie in gyrmastitis, a heavyweight in wrestling, sprinter and weightman in track and a diver in swimming. In 1951, Howley was selected as the West Virginia Amateur Ahlete of the Year. He was an NFL first-round draft choice (1958) of the Chicago Bears—only the third Mountaineer selected in the opening round. He played a year and a half in Chicago Bears—only the third Mountaineer selected in the opening round. He played a year and a half in Chicago before being sidelined by a serious knee injury. Howley was back home in Wheeling working at a gas station in 1961 when the expansion Dallas Cowboys raided two draft picks for him. The ex-Bear decided to give it one more try and wound up starting at outside linebacker (2) years for the Cowboys, earning all-pro laurels six times. He started in two Super Bowls, The 1971 game saw Howley intercept two passess and recover a furnible to earn MVP honors in a fe-13 loss to the Baltimore Colts. He remains the only player on a losing team to be selected as the Super Bowl's most valuable player. In 1972, he helped the Cowboys win Super Bowl VI over the Mianti Dolphins by intercepting a Bob Greise pass to set up a touchdown.

Howley is a member of the West Virginia Sports Writers Association, WVU, Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club and City of Wheeling halls of fame.

Mike Sherwood (Athlete - 1960s)

Mike Sherwood (Bellaire High School, Class of 1967). This soft-spoken athletic great rates with Bellaire High's all-time stalwarts in both football and basketball. He quartebacked the 1966 Big Reds to a 9-1 season as a senior for coach Don Ault. It remains arguably one of the best prep gnd teams in Ohio Valley Instory Sherwood led the OVAC with 20 TD passes that fall as he completed 73 of 110 passes for a 66-4 percentage and amassed more than 1,400 yards with only four interceptions. He was just as impressive on the hardwood for legendary coach Claire Cribbs, The sweet-shoxing 6-1 guard was a two-year starter for the Big Reds and surpassed the 1,000-point plateau while earning All-Ohio honors. He averaged 25 a points a game in leading the Big Reds to a 17-4 record. As a junior, be averaged 25 points, per game. He poured in a career-high, and school-record. Sp points against Guernsey Street rival St. John Central. He was also selected for the Ohio North-South Basketball Classic.

Following his illustrious prep career. Sherwood accepted a football scholarship to West Virginia University, where his father earlier played After competing on the freshman team, he started at quarterback for three seasons. As a sophomore, he passed for some 2,000 yards while establishing a school record with 416 yards against rival Pitt, completing 27 of 37 passes. He finished the year ranked 11th in the nation, averaging 198 passing yards a game. The Mountaineers went 7-3 that fall. Sherwood led the Mountaineers to a 25-7 record in his three years, including a 10-1 mark and a Peach Bowl win his senior season, He still ranks among WVU career leaders in total offense, passing yards, pass completions and attempts, TD passes, passing efficiency and completion percentage. He was selected to play in the 1970 Blue-Gray Game and won the Ira E. Rodgers Award the same year Sherwood was also selected Al-East by UPI in 1970. John 'Fuzzy' Filliez (Athlete - 1970s)

John Filliez (Magnolia High School, 1973). The first OVAC athlete to earn All-W. Va-first team benors in football, basketball and baseball also set an NCAA pass receiving record at Marshall University.

Nicknamed "Fuzzy" because of his bushy red hair, the Blue Eagles' wide receiver-defensive back led the Ohio Valley in pass receiving yards his last two seasons and ended his career with 81 catches for 1,434 yards and 16 touchdowns in regular season play. In his sentor season, Magnolia went 10-2 with a state Class AA runnerup finish to Ravenswead. Ravenswood

He tearned with Magnolia's all-state quarterback Brian Book to lead the W. Va. All-Stars to a victory over Ohio in the annual OVAC All-Star game at Wheeling Island.

In basketball, the guard averaged 19 points a game and earned all-state honors after the Blue Eagles were state "AA" runnerup to Gary.

In baseball, the outfielder batted 352 and completed his all-star trifecta with All-Valley, and all-state honors in three sports.

Recruited for foxball by Marshall, West Virginia, Virginia Tech, Pitt and Penn State, the 5-11, 175-pounder signed early with WVU, but opted for Marshall where he led the Thundering Herd in pass receiving for four straight years and set school records with 168 catches for 1954 yards and 14 TDs. His reception total ranked, at the time, eighth among all-time NCAA Division I receivers. Starting four years, he set a then-NCAA record by catching passes in 42 straight games. He broke the mark set by Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Rodgers from Nebraska. Automobile bumper stickers supporting the police showed up at Herd games, where they had a different meaning. They read: "I Love the Fuzz." The team co-captain was a two-time All-America honorable mention choice and a first team National Independent All-Star honoree.

Filhez also was selected as the state Amateur Athlete of the Year in 1976. In 1985, he was inducted into the Marshall Athletic Hall of Fame, Filliez currently resides in Delaware, Ohio.

Dee Davis (Athlete - 1980s)


Dee Davis (Wheeling Park High School, Class of 1981). The first OVAC girls' athlete to earn first team All-W. Va. honors three times set Ohio Valley and state scoring records which remain on the books after a quarter of a century. Overall, she set three OV and three W. Va. scoring standards.

A three-year Wheeling Park standout, she scored a school record 1.854 points including 716 for a 32.5 average as a senior, She was named state "Player of the Year" and captain of the Class AAA all-state team for the 1980 season. She scored a school-record 55 points vs. Weirnon Madonna and set a state tornamente Class AAA scoring record which remains on the books after 27 years. She tallied 43 points vs. Greenbrier East as a sophomore in 1978. In two state tournament games that year, she scored 76 points including 13 of 14 free throws.

Davis led Park to a state Class AAA runner-up spot as a senior when she also charted 104 steals, 71 assists and 87 rebounds. After the season, she was MVP in the state North South game where she secored 30 points. She earned All-America mention in Street & Smith's and Converse magazines.

AP Park, Davis also starred as a pitcher-shortstop on the first varsity softball teams and earned all-state recognition from the W. Va. Coaches Association.

She signed a basketball scholarship to Tennessee Tech where she played for two seasons before finishing her college career at West Virginia University. In her two seasons with the Mountaineers, she served as team co-captain in 1986 with Georgeann Wells, the first woman to dunk in a college basketball game. Dick Miller (Athlete - 1950s)

Dick Miller (Wheeling Central Catholic High School, Class 1952) was a first-team all-state and all-OVAC performer in basketball three straight years while performing for the Maroon Knights. Miller led Central Catholic to the conference and West Virginia Catholic championships all three seasons, scoring 1593 points during a stellar high school career. His three-year scoring average was 21.4 points per game. His career point total stood for 51 years until it was bested by David Contraguerro, a four-year letterman for the Maroon Rnights. Contraguerro's record was later toppled by a Central girls' basketball great, Kayleen Fitzsimmons. Miller also had a game high of 30 points in a West Virginia-Kenucky All-Star Game, Leading the Mountainere team to an R1-80 victory at Williamson. Twice, [1951 and '52], Miller was chosen as the state's basketball player of the vear He also was a standout performer in football and baseball in high school. He was a "T formation quarierback as a football performer and a shortstop/pitcher on the baseball team.

Recruited by the University of Wisconsin on a basketball scholarship, Miller was the Badgers' starting point guard for two years. Nicknamed "The Cat" because of his quickness, Dick averaged 19 points per game in Big Fen play, topping the 30-point mark three times during his career. In 1956, he set a conference reoff of the most consecutive free throws made, converting 29 in a row over two consecutive games. Miller also excelled as a floor leader and defensive player. He was wisted as the team MVP his senior year. Although drafted by the New York Knicks in 1956, Miller chose to play AAU basketball. He was voted to file AAU Alf-America team after participating in the National Tournament held in Denver where he led the Millawakee Allen Bradley Team to fourth place Brissh, Miller played twis seasons with the Phillips Oilers in the National Industrial Basketball League and York for the 1962-63 season.

Terry Snively (Powhatan High School, 1966). This all-round athlete starred in four sports for the Indians. He established an Ohio Valley football modern single season record by amassing 222 points, including 35 touchdowns, his senior season. The guick-footed running back finished with 398 career points. Snively was named Ohio's UPI Class A Back of the Year in 1965. He was an All-OVAC honore as a junior and senior while garnering All-Eastern Ohio and All-Valley laurels.

Captain of the Indians football, baseball and track teams. He also was a four-year letterman in baskelball, starting his last three seasons, Saively averaged better than 24 points a game in each of his final two seasons and finished his career with 1.146 points. He was a talented pitcher and outfielder in the diamond sport for four years. He earned All-Ohio football honors for coach Jake Olsavsky while serving as cocaptain of the 1975 team which went 9-1. He played in the Ohio North-South game in Columbus and turned in a sparkling defensive effort for the South all-stars.

Recruited by Penn State University for football, he was cited by coach Joe Paterno and defensive coordinator Jerry Sandusky as "one of the best inside linebackers" ever to play for "Linebacker U".

Mehl was the leading tackler for the unbeaten 1978 Nitrany Lion team which bowed
to Alabama, 14-7 in the Sugar Bowl and probably cost PSU from being declared national champion. In that
game, he led Lion defenders with 17 stops, including 11 unassisted tackles.

After that junior season, he was named the "Man of the Year" by the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club
and is one of only three college athletes to receive that honor.

The PSU defensive co-captain also led the Lions in tackles as a senior and earned second team AllAmerica honors by The Associated Press and United Press International.

Mehl was drafted in the NFL's third round by the New York Jets and played nine years before his career
was out short with a recurring kore injury.

He was the Jets' leading defender from 1982-86 before a knee injury. The Jets' defensive signal caller recorded 172 total tackles (105 solos and 67 assists) in 1984. In 1983, he intercepted seven passes and picked

off 15 career interceptions.

Mehl was selected to the Pro Bowl after the 1985 season when he recorded 115 tackles, 43 assists and

three pass interceptions.

After his NFL career ended, he returned to the Ohio Valley and resides in St. Clairsville

Brian Swisher (Athlete - 1980s)

Brian Swisher (Sistersville High School, Class of 1982). The 5-7, 145-pound dynamo became the first three-time first team All-W, Va. football honoree in Tyler County as he led Sistersville High to back-to-back state Class A championships in 1980 and '81.

Swisher led the Tigers to a 1340 record in 1981 as he set an Ohio Valley and W. Va. record for scoring by a lineman with 26 touchdowns (receiving, rushing, returns) and 156 points. He was runner-up for the Kennedy Award as state player of the year and was accorded the Hunt Award as state Lineman of the Year.

He set season and career pass receiving marks in the Ohio Valley and averaged 39.2 yards on kickoff returns and 20.2 yards on punt returns. He also was productive on end-around rushing plays. Swisher, who set an OV record by catching passes in 36 consecutive games — every game he started. His career regular season totals were 126 receptions for 2.174 yards and 23 TDs.

He led the OV in regular season pass receiving yards for 1980 (681) yards on 47 catches) and 1981 (906 yards and 14 TDs on 53 receptions). As a suphomore, he landed 26 passes for 582 yards.

Swisher was a three-time All-OVAC and All-Valley honoree as well as all-West Virginia three times. In the spring, he competed in track as a 100 and 200-meter sprinter, long jumper and relay member. He won eight individual medals in three state Class AA meets — a first in the 100 as a sophomore, six seconds and a third, and was a member of a first place 4x 100 relay team. He tied a state meet AA loneter record with a 10.9-second mark in the 1981 trials.

He concluded his sparkling Brooke career by being named the W. Va. "Player of the Year" as well as the Gatorade state "Player of the Year" in 1991, The 6-7 forward paced Brooke to records of 19-4, 22-4, 16-7 and 18-7 for a four-year career mark of 75-22.

Gardin was a two-time all-state Class AAA honoree and twice named to the all-state tournament team. He averaged 17,9 points and 10,1 rebounds as a sophomore and followed that up with a state Class AAA-best 24.8 scoring norm as a junior while averaging 11 rebounds.

Gaudio capped his superb prep career with a brilliam senior campaign, He averaged 24.3 points and

grabbed 13 rebounds to repeat as All-OvAC, All-Valley and All-W. Ya, honors while being accorded honorable mention All-America. He was the first Bruin to earn first team all-state in boys' basketball. Gaudio surpassed the 1,000 mark in career points (1.874) and career rebounds (1.108), both Bruin records.

He opted to continue his academic and athlette career at Penn State University, where he was planted by chronic back problems which required surgery. In spite of the medical woes, Gaudio endured to turn in a solid career, During his redshirt sophomore season, he averaged 9.4 points and 4.7 rebounds a game

Bayd Nelson (Bellaire High School, Class of 1945), Nelson spent 41 years as a photographer with The Times Leader in Martius Ferry, Fellow statters and transits have called thin a pioneer, a legend and, perhaps, the greatest producil ambassade in the newspaper's history, His work behind the camera, according to many area high school ocaseles, help bring the sports world alive to the readers of The Times Leader. Nelson, a quiet, unassiming man, let his camera do his talking for him. No assignment was too big foot too mental for Nelson, who had the opportunity to take pictures of seven U.S. presidents from Harry Transan though Ronald Reagan Nelson chronicled nearly every major happening throughout the Ohio Valley and was a familiar and much-welcome face at high school, coflege and professional games and matches from the start of his career in the fate 1940s until his retirement in 1988. As was pointed out at the time of his death in 2003, there wasn't a gymnasisim, football field or baseball fatamond in The Times Leader's covering area where Nelson didn't capture the exploits of athletes of all ages and abilities. Among the future professional greats he covered included baseball hall of famers Phil Niekro and Bill Mazeriski, basketball hall of famer John Haylock, Joe Niekro, Tim Spencer, Olympic wrestler and couch Bobby Douglas and Allian Hornyak, just a to mention a few.

Boyd's devotion to his work also made him a role model and an inspiration to aspiring and seasoned photographers alike. Nelson shunned the limefight throughout his life despite the urgings of cosworkers and admirers to enter his pictures in statewide competition. As a result, he was by passed for many awards that easily would have come his way. However, United Press International began presenting awards to newspaper and magazine photographers in the earty [970s and the very first honories was none other than Boyd Nelson, When The Times Leader published a pictorial history of Eastern Ohio in 1999, the book was dedicated to Ne

Paul 'Bud' Billiard (Coaches)

Richard "Lefty" Half (Barnesville High School, Class of 1959). Half was one of the most successful two-sport coaches (baseball golf) in OVAC history, compiling a whopping 1.116 victories over a 34-year span.

The began his baseball coaching career at Powbatan High School for a year before

taking the sume post at St. Clainville High School, In his 33 years with the Red Devik (1969-2001), his teams amassed an outstanding 515-320 record.

With "Lefty" calling the short from the dugout, St. Clainville won seven OVAC championships and made five Ohio High School Athletic Association regional tournament appearances (1978, 1982, 1986, 1990 and 1997). The Red Devik advanced

nament appearances (1978, 1982, 1986, 1999 and 1997). The Red Devils advanced to the state tournament "Final Four" in 1997, St. Clairsville also won five Eastern Ohio Baseball League titles under Hall's guidance.

Hall as named OVAC Coach of the year in 1991 and received the same accolade from the Eastern District three times, 1990, 1995 and 1997. He also served as one of the coaches in the Miruno All-Star Series in 1997, A true baseball "junkie," Hall was inducted into the Ohio High School Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame in 1996 and was named the Ohio Baseball Hall of Fame "Man of the Year" in 1999,

Half on rame in 1996 and was named the Onto Baseball Half of Paine. Man of the Year in 1997, Half concided six players who signed professional baseball contracts the first including Gerry Craft, Gene Cattane, Ted Rose, Scott Barnhouse, Jog Slavik and Joe Dudok.

In golf, "Lefty" coached St. Clairsville for 27 years (1974-2000), finishing with a 601-123 record. He had three unbeaten teams and also intored three squask that advanced to the Ohio state tournament. The Red Devils also collected 14 OVAC golf championships.

Half, a life-long resident of Barnesville, lettered in baseball and track while performing for the Shamrocks. He graduated from Ohio University.











Warren Pugh (Officials)

Warren "Nookie" Pugh (The Linsly School, Class of 1920), The Wheeling Island resident who died in 1983 at the age of 81 served the coaching and officiating profession very well and also was an outstanding contributor to his committee.

As an official, Pugh served as a football and basketball referee for over 40 years. In football, he worked in both high school and college, including the West Virginia Intercollegiste Athletic Conference and West Virginia University. Pitt and Penn State. A basketball Official for more than 40 years, Pugh officiated high school and college contests, In 1933 and 1934, he worked the entire West Virginia state high school basketball tournament, his partners being Judge Paul Camilletti the first year and Dink Westfall the second year. Pugh and John Gott of Bluefield blew the whistle for all 11 games of the first WYIAC tournament held in 1935 at Fairmont, Pugh served as president of both the Ohio Valley Board of Football and Basketball Officials, He also was the referee of the famed Bellaire Relays for many years and was later named as the meet's houstary referee. Phil Niekro (Bridgeport High School, Class of 1957). The Baseball Hall of Farner got his athletic start with the Bulldogs where he was a three-sport performer. Besides baseball, he was a football end and basketball forward and a teammate of fellow OVAC Hall of Famer John Haylicek.

Nicknamed "Knucksie" because of his staple pitch, the knuckleball, which he learned

Nicknamed "Knucksie" because of his staple pitch, the knuckteball, which he learned from his father, Niekro was a four-year Bulldog pitcher with a 17-1 career record. His only loss was 1-0 to Tittonsville in 1954, his freshman year, when fellow Baseball and OVAC Hall of Famer Bill Mazeroski bit the game-winning home run. The 1955 Bulldog team shared the East Ohio League title with Martins Ferry. In a 9-4 Ohio sectional tournament win over \$t, John's, Niekro won the game in relief and belted a two-run single. Bridgeport, however, was halted in the finals by Shadyside, a team twice defeated by the Bulldogs, In 1956, Niekro and the Bulldogs defeated Steubenville Central, 7-1, in the Class A district tournament after sectional wins over Barnesville and St. Clainsville. Bridgeport bowed to East Liverpool in the district finals, As a senior, Niekro tossed a four-hitter and struck out 10 in a 4-2 win over Steubenville Central for the OVAC Ohio-side title. He earlier hurded an

ter and struck out 10 in a 4-2 win over Steubenville Central for the OVAC Obio-side title. He earlier hurled an 8-2 win over East Liverpool in the Class AA district semifinals. Unbeaten Steubenville Central halted Brügeport, 6-1 in the finals.

Nickno, who also played for the Brügeport Legion team and Blaine in the summer Twilight League, was signed by the Milwaukee Braves for a \$500 bonus at a 1958 tryout camp in Bellaire.

In 1964, he started a 24-year major league cureer with the Braves, New York Yankees, Cleveland Indians and Toronto Blue Jays, He had a 318-274 cureer record while appearing in 864 games and striking out 3.342 batters, eighth on the all-time charts. He hurled a nv-hitter and won five Gold Gloves and was named to five All-Star teams. The Braves honored him by creeting a bronze statue in front of their home stadium and, in 1997, he was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fante, He resides in the Atlanta area,

Bob Hummel (Athlete - 1960s)

Rob Hummell (Moundsville High School, Class of 1966). This 6 ft, 3 guard was a coring machine for Moundsville High School before taking his vast hoop talents to West

Hummell finished his stellar four-year prep career with 1.941 points, good for a 22.6 per game average. That average still ranks sixth among Class AAA players in the state. His senior year was one for the record books at the Marshall County school. He poured in 897 points in 25 games for a 35.9 average, which is ited for the highest average in Class AAA archives.

Moreover, his scoring anties translated into team success as Moundsville finished as state runnerup in Class AAA, the school's first state final since 1920. Hummell torched Richwood for 45 markers in the state semifinal game. He established the Moundsville single-game scoring mark with 53 points in a win against Follansbee. Hummell was chosen as the West Virginia "Player of the Year" by the Morgantown Touchdown Club while also being named capitain of the Class AAA all-state team, all-OVAC and Scholastic Couch All-America. He also was a top-notch baseball player for Moundsville, earning second-team all-state honors as a pitcher.

Following his glorious stay at Moundsville, Hummell joined the WVU hoop squad and he wasted not time in making his presence felt, Hummell led the WVU frosh team in scoring with a 24.2 average, including a 45-point outburst against Maryland and 41 against Duquesnse. In those days, freshman were inelligible by NCAA rules from playing on the varsity level.

He went no to average 129, 15.5 and 140 points a game the following three seasons, all of which he served the Mountaineers as a starter. Hummell was the team's captain hi senior season.

Hummell totaled 1,137 points in his WVU career, placing him seventh in school annals at the time his career ended in 1970, he was an adept free throw shooter, bitting at an 80.7 clip for his career. Hummell — who had 14 games of 20 or more points — was selected to the 1966-75 all-time WVU hoop team.

Bob Gain (Athlete - 1940s)

Bob Gain (Weir High School, Class of 1947). An all-time great on the high school, college and professional levels, he started his football career for the Red Riders and twice carned first team All-OVAC honors as a lineman and was honored on the 1946 All-W.Va. selections.

In 1969, he was selected as a 'Modern Era' defensive tackle on an All-Time Ohio In 1969, he was selected as a "Modern Era defensive tackle on an All-time Onto Valley fotoball team selected by The Intelligencer newspaper. In 2005, he was honored on an All-Time W.Va. high school team selected by The Fairmont Times newspaper. At Weir High, he was the largest all-state honoree at 6-2, 210-pounds and was a two-way tackle as well as handling pointing and kickoff duties. His late coach Carl Hamilt never singled out his best Rod Rider football product but always started his list with Gain, a four-year starter

and his most bonored protégé.

Gain is regarded as the greatest lineman in University of Kentucky, where he was a three-time All-Southeastern Conference honoree and a two-time first team All-America choice in 1949 and 1950. As a senior, he won the Outland Trophy as the nation's outstanding lineman, the first from the SEC so honored, and one of only two from the Ohio Valley. The other Outland Trophy honoree was the University of Iowa's Calvin Jones from Steubenville High, Playing for the legendary Paul 'Bear' Bryant at Kentucky, the Wildcats were 33-10-2 in Gain's four seasons and he was co-captain of the 10-1 record team that upset national champion Oktaboma in the 1951 Sugar Bowl. Gain was the No. 5 choice — the highest ever for an OVAC athlete — in the first round of the 1951 NFL Draft by the Green Bay Packers. However, he opted for Otawa'in the CFL before starting a 12-year NFL career with the Cleveland Browns. The five-time Pro Bowler was a starter on three NFL championship teams under legendary coach Paul Brown in 1954, 1955 and 1964.

The Cleveland area resident has been inducted into seven Halls of Fame — College Foxball, West Virginia Sports, Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan, University of Kentucky, Cleveland and Akron Haffs and Cleveland Browns' Legends Hall.

Lee Patrone (Athlete - 1950s)

Lee Patrone (Bellaire High School, Class of 1956), For 50 years, Patrone was the all-Lee rairone (Beilaire Fign School, Class of 1936), For SU years, Patrone was the all-time leading career scorer in Big Reds' history with 1.842 points in three seasons. He led Bellaire High to three straight sectional titles with won-lost marks of 18-4, 20-3 and 19-4 while averaging 23.5, 26.7 and 32.9 points per game each season. His 27.1 point career average remains a school record.

The two-time first team All-OVAC honoree, and an All-Ohio first team honoree by

The Associated Press as a senior, he was a scoring machine with 57 career games over 20 points, including all 23 as a senior, and he had 28 straight games in which he scored

20 points, including all 23 as a senior, and he had 28 straight games in which he scored at least 20 points.

He tallied 54 points twice in a game in 1956, including his final game while playing with an injured led against Martins Ferry in the district tournament (ille game. Ferry prevailed, 91-87, while surviving a limping Patrone's berougs. Earlier, against a Bridgeport team featuring Basketball and OVAC Hall of Famer John Havlicek, he converted 25 goals. His 299 goals in a season remains a school standard.

After a brief stay at Ohio State, the stocky 6-0 guard enrolled at West Virginia University in 1957 and led the 1958 freshman team in scoring with a 20-point norm. A member of the 1959 NCAA runner-up team led by All-American Jerry West, he was second to West in 1960 team scoring with a 14.2 per game norm and was named to three all-tournament reams: NCAA regional, Southern Conference and University of Kentucky, A Virginia sportswriter described him as "good enough to be cooky and cooky enough to be good."

As a senior, he was a thrid team All-America honoree by Helms Foundation. He ended his career with 1,028 points — then seventh best in WVU history.

points — then seventh best in WVU history.

After graduation, he taught and coached five seasons at Wintersville High School where his first 1969 team went 14-4 and 1972 team was 16-4. After retiring, he relocated to his current home in Florida.

Harry Wilson (Athlete - 1960s)

Harry Wilson. (Steubenville High School, Class of 1963). This former Big Red star ranks with the elite running backs in OVAC history.

His gridieno career at Steubenville was nothing short of spectacular. His ability to carry the football took him to a starring role at the University of Nebraska and a short stint with the NFLS Philadelphia Eagles.

The 5 ft. 11, 190-pounder was also a safety and kick returner for Big Red, but rushing the fivotball is what Wilson did best.

He carried the Big Red to a 9-1 mark his senior season, a campaign in which the Jefferson County charges pocketed a prized 14-8 win over heralded Massillon. Wilson paced the Ohio Valley in both rushing yards and scoring with 1.756 infantry stripes and 23 touchdowns. The former standard is a modem day school record for a 10-game campaign.

His achievements garnered him Ohio "Back of the Year" designation by both the AP and UPI in Class AA, which was the largest class back then. He was named first team alt-Ohio and a Scholastic Coach All-American. Wilson was almost as dominating his junior year. The "Steubenville Stumper" rushed for 1.586 yards and scored 28 touchdowns and 168 points in 10 games. He was selected first team alt-Ohio by AP as a safety while also earning alt-ONAC and all-Valley lateris.

Wilson — who was also nicknamed "Lighthorse"— enjoyed a sparkling career at Nebraska. He led the Combuskers in rushing his junior and senior seasons, finishing his career with 1.702 yards and a stellar 5.0 per carry average.

He was named unanimous all-Big Eight as a senior and honorable mention All-America by UPI. He has the distinction of playing in three major bowl games —Cotton, Orange and Sugar.

After his playing days in Lincoln, Wilson was selected in the third round of the 1967 NFL draft by the Eagles. He spent three years with the team as a backup running back and kick returner.

Rnown for his averpowering pitching prowess, Burgy was also a tremendous shortstop and powerful hitter. Burgy etched his named in Bellaire High, Ohio Valley and OHSAA record books. The three-year Al-Valley first-team honoree completed his prep career with a 20-5 record, still the most win ever by a Big Reds' pitcher. Bruce Smith (Athlete - 1970s)

Bruce Smith (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1976). He is at the top of the list when it comes to distance running as a four-time Ohio state champion who set gountless meet, valley and school records along the way.

In cross country, Smith was a three-time All-Ohioan [1973, '74 and '75), capturing first place at the state meet in both his junior [943.0) and senior (9:33.4) easons after placing seventh (10:05.0) as a sophomore, His time in 1975 was the state record at the time.

As both a junior and senior, he also finished first in the sectional, district, OVAC and

He was a three-time All-Eastern District and All-Valley honoree in cross country as well.

In track, Smith earned All-Ohio status two times [1975, 76], winning the state championship in the two-mile run both years. He posted a time of 9:11.1 as a senior after winning in 9:31.1 as a junior. He also placed

seventh at the state event as a sophormore [9:39.9]. He finished first in the sectional and district meets all three years, winning the county event twice and finishing as runner-up once. In OVAC meets, he won the OVAC one-mile run and finished third in the 880-

trinsing as runner-up once. In OVAC needs, ne won the OVAC offer-time full aid intersted that the soary and run as a sentor; and captured the two-mile run as both a sophomore and junior.

Smith garnered All-Eastern District and All-Valley laurels three times in track. In the two sports at Martins Ferry, Smith was part of four undefeated teams, three sectional and district championship teams, one OVAC championship team and three OVAC runner up teams.

Smith was also a long-time competitor in most area road races, including several years as the top local runner in the Elby's Distance Race (now the Ogden 20K Classic).







Wendy Baker (Athlete - 1980s)

Wendy Baker (Tast Liverpool High School, Class of 1989), A two-sport standout for the Lady Potters, excelling in both basketball and softball.

On the court, she was a four-year varily performer, becoming the first player in school history to exceed 1300 career points. Hirshing with 1, 27 tallies. As a sentor, he averaged 21.5 points per game, Baker also excelled defensively, posting 291 career seals including 135 as a sentor.



On the diamond, Baker's career pitching numbers included 49 victories and 226 strikeouts and 400 plus batting average. Her sentor season numbers included a lofty 477 average along with some impressive pitching numbers — 19 vectories, 147 strikeouts and a 0.54 E.R.A. She batted 483 as a junior with 32 RBI and had 109 pitching wims, registering 109 strikeouts and a 1.77 ERA, As a sophomore, she hit 422.

Baker's softball all-star honors included two-time All-Ohio (first team as a senior, second team as a junior); and two-time All-OVAC Class 4-A.

She attended Wheeling College and played basketball for two seasons, scoring 882 points and posting 182 steals during that time. She gained first team All-West Virginia Intercollegiate Althetic Conference honors as a sophomore after gaining honorable mention as a freshman.



Dennis Swearingen (Athlete - 1980s)

Dennis Swearingen (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1982). He carned 10 varsity letters in four sports, making his biggest marks in football and basketball.

In football, he was a three-year letterman as starting quanterback delensive back, amissing 1616 yards passing into 890 yards risking while leading the Purple Riders to a combined 21-9 record, including a spoiless 10-0 mark in his sophomore season, Ferry's first perfect record in 21 years. On defense, he was credited with 125 tackles and had 11 pass interceptions. He was a two-time first team AP All-Ohio Class AA defensive back, earning second team all-star honors from UP both years as well. He also carnered first team All-OVAC Class AAA, All-Eastern District Class AA and All-Valley honors twice. Following his sentor season. Swearingen was named a Centennary Prep All-American, an Upper Ohio Valley Dupper Dan Club special honoree and participated in the OVAC Charity All-Star Football Game.

In basketball, Swearingen was a tiree-year starter and 1,000-point career scorer and he was a key member of Ferry's signal which posted a 20-5 record and advanced to the Ohio Class AA regional finals in Athens in 1982. Scoring 14.7 points per game as a sentor, he was named first team All-OVAC Class AAA and All-District 12 and All-Valley is well as second team All-Eastern District Class AAA and third team All-Walley.

Jeff Snedegar (Buckey Trail High School, Class of 1995). He put up lofty numbers during his four-year graditon career, culmmating in his selection as the AP All-Ohio Division V Oflensive Player of the Year and finishing as runner-up in the voting for Ohio's "Mr. Football" award following his senior season.

A 6 tt, 3, 210-poind four-year letterman at quarterback and linebacker for the Warriors, he racked up 7,000 yards offensively and registered 673 tackles on defense, the also earned second team All-Ohio following his sophomore and junior years and was a three-time All-Eastern District and All-OVAC selection.

As a senior, he led Trail to its first and only OHSAA playoff appearance (the Warriors finished with an 11-2 overall record, wrining two games before losing in the Division V state semifinals to Wellsviller. That year, he passed for what was then a school record 1,769 yards while roshing for 1,621 yards for a combined total of 3,290 yards. He participated in 212 defensive stops as a senior.

Snedegar was also a three-year letterman in basketball (he didn't play as a junior), finishing fourth on Traff's all-time scoring list with 834 points and third in career rebounding with 564. He averaged 16,1 points per game as a senior, carning special mention AP AB-Ohto as well as first team All-Lastern District and All-OVAC.

The 2000 Buckeye Trail Hall of Fame inductee went on to a stellar career at the University of Kentucky (1996-99), carning four letters as an outside linebacker. As a freshman, he had 42 tackles, started three games and was named the outstanding special teams, player and he followed that up with 97 tackles as a sophomore. Snedegar had 63 tackles and four sacks as a junior, helping Kentucky to an Outback Bowl berth where he recorded 11 tackles in a loss to Penn State University. In his final year at UK, he had 84 tackles, four sacks and two interceptions, earning him defensive MVP fromers. He was selected to the All-Southeast Conference squad and was named to the All-American Farm Football Team by Successful Teaming Magazine.

Snedegar was signed by the Miami Dolphins of the NFL, in 2000 as an ondrafted free agent.



Bill West (Athlete - 1990s)

Billy West (Buckeye Local High School, Class of 1993). He made his biggest impact on the football field, earning All-Ohio honors three times, including twice as a first team selection:

He finished with what still stands as a school-record 4.658 yards, including a single-season effort of 1.846 yards as a senior. He also owns six of the top seven individual game rushing records at Buckeye Local, headed by a whopping 335-yard game against Martins Ferry in 1991 (second atl-time).

West scored 352 points on the gridiron, including 152 in his final season.

Earl Klevins (Warwood High School, Class of 1934), One of the Ohio Valley's most prominent football and basketball officials during a 35-year career from 1938 to 1913.

Klevins attended Wheeling High School for one and a half years before transferring to

Warwood (figh, from which he graduated in 1934, He played high school basketball at both

schools.

Earl attended Berthany College where he played football and basketball along with competing in track under legendary costel John Kinght.

Klevins officiated in firs first basketball game in 1938 at the Madison gynmasium. The opporation on that occasion were Wheelling High and Bridgeport and his officiating partner was another ONAC Hall of Fame member, the late Wafter Heil. Thirty-five years later when he hing i whistle, Klevins had officiated in more than 1,200 basketball games and 570 football games on the high schocollegiate fevel.

The fournament was held in Myrile Beach, SC, At age 45, he won the West Virginia state singles title and fearined with the late Loran Mercer for do bles houses in their age group. Sam Andy (Coaches)

Sam Andy (Wheeling High School, Class of 1958). The winningest coach in Ohio Valley high school boys' busketball history with 611 wins over a 39-year career, Andy surpassed a record set by charter OVAC Hall of Fame inductee Richard L. "Dick" Potts. Andy's head coaching career included two seasons at Frazeysburg (0.) High School (1964-1966), seven years at Wheeling High School (1969-1976) and the last 30 years at Wheeling Park High School (1976-2006). Second all-time for victories in West Vriginia's big school class, Andy's teams won three Class AAA state championships (1976 at Wheeling High, 1980 and 1995 at Wheeling Park). The 1995 state final was one of the memorable championship games in W.Va. boys' basketball history as Andy's Patriots defeated Beckley Woodrow Wilson 99-96 in a triple-overtime masterpiece.

He also had one other Patriot squad finish as the state runner up (1997) and four semifinalist teams (1988, 1990), 1998 and 2000). Andy coached in 922 games and his clubs experienced only three losting seasons. Under his direction, Wheeling High and Wheeling Park qualified for an OVAC record 20 state tournaments. In 37 years at the two Ohio County schools. Andy produced 31 sectional champion-hip teams, 28 Region One titlists and six Ohio Valley Athletic

County schools. Andy produced 31 sectional championship teams, 28 Region One titlists and six Ohio Valley Athletic Conference division pennant winners.

Through most of his career, the Wheeling Wildcats and Park Patriots dominated their rivals in the conference, winning 18 percent of their games against OVAC Opponents. They also annually played a schedule that included many of the top basketball powers in the state, Andy couched four West Virginus Player of the Year standous and had 31 players carn college scholarships, including several Division I stalwarts.

He twice was knowed as the OVAC Couch of the Year along with Monroe Central Couch Jay Circosta, In 2007 he was the recipient of the Earl Haberfield Coaches. Award presented by the committee directing the annual Samuel A. Mumley OVAC Basketball Classic. A 1958 graduate of Wheeling High School. Andy graduated from West Liberty State College in 1963. He was a basketball starter and letterman at both schools.

Joe Fortunato (Athlete - 1940s)

Joe Fortunato (Mingo High School, Class of 1948). A nine-time letterwinner in three sports at Mingo (football, basketball and baseball), he was an All-Ohio Valley Athletic Conference performer as a football and basketball player. Fortunato enrolled at Virginia Military Institute, but transferred to Mississippi State when the Keydets' head coach Slick Morton accepted the job with the Bulldogs. At Mississippi State, Fortunato became an All-Southeastern Conference fullback-line-backer.

The honorable mention All American Conference fullback-line-backer.

The honorable mention All-America performer led Mississippi State in rushing and

had a game high of 169 yards against North Texas State.

Highlight of his collegiate career occurred when the Bulldogs defeated national champion Tennessee 7-0. Vulunteers' Coach General Tom Neyland praised Fortunato after the game by calling him one of the greatest players his teams at Tennessee had ever faced.

greatest players his teams at Tennessee had ever fueed.
Fortunato was drafted in the seventh round by the Chicago Bears, but played one season in the Canadian League before signing with the National Football League team.
He started at linebacker for 12 seasons (1955-1966) with the "Monsters of the Midway" and was named first team All-Pro three times along with being selected for the Pro Bowl on five occasions. The defensive captain of the Bears was also captain of the last Pro Bowl team coached by the legendary Viace Lombardi. After his playing career, Fortunato spent two seasons on the Bears' staff, coaching the linebackers one year and then serving as defensive coordinator the next year.
Fortunato also is the only Ohio Valley athlete to be selected to the National Italian American Sports Hall of Fame. He was the leading vote-getter in The Intelligencer's 1970 All-Time Ohio Valley Team, which was selected by a vote of the area sports fans.

Bill Hinegardner (Coaches)



Bill Hinegardner (Meadow Bridge High School, Class of 1960) Referred to by the late Bill Van Home as W.Va. Wrestling's "Man of Character," Hinegardner received his bachelor's degree from Concord College in 1965 and master's degree from West Virginia Burvestry in 1968. The former Concord basketball and baseball player entered the Marshail Coonty, School System as a mathematics teacher in the 1964-65 school year. He served as an assistant casch in wrestling and football at Moundsville High for three years before taking over the head wrestling position when the consolidated John Marshall High School opened its doors at the outset of the 1968-69 school year. During his 14 years as head coach, the Monarchs were also trunters-up four times and finished lower than sixth place only once in the W. Va. State Tournament. The Ron Mauck OVAC Wrestling Tournaments was Hinegardner's John Marshall powerhouses take the overall team title four times [1972, 73, 74, 77] and finish second five times. The Monarchs also earned five OVAC Class-4-A titles and emerged as Class-4-A Dual Meet winners five times. Va. Wrestling Coach of the Vear (three times); Uper Olio Valley D

Don Fleming (Athlete - 1950s)



Don Fleming (Stadyside High School, Class of 1955). The two-time All-Ohio Valley Athletic Conference first team honoree in football, Fleming was captain of the Tigers' undefeated conference champions in 1954. He also played center for the Shadyside squad that won an OvAC division title in basketball. This versatile athlete played in the Ohio East-West All-Star baseball game held unting the summer of 1955 at Wheeling Island Stadium. Fleming went on to the University of Florida on a football scholarship. He was a three-year starter and a two-way end performer for the Gators. He was elected captain of the 1958 learn than played in the Gator Bowl and was a member of the All Southeastern Conference team that same year. He Gator Bowl and was a member of the All Southeastern Conference team that same year. He was drafted by the Chicago Cardinals of the National Football League and the Boston Patriots of the American Football League. However, Fleming elected to remain in college to complete work on his degree and play baseball. As a senior, Fleming also was chosen captain of the Florida baseball team that won the SEC championship and earned a beerin the NCAA tournament. In the spring of 1959, Fleming aerned a degree as a construction engineer. When Paul Brown, uwner-coach of the Cleveland Browns, traded for Fleming's NFL rights. Fleming played defensive back, he started as a rookie with the Browns at safety and mode the NFL All Rookie team in 1960. After his third season with the Browns, Fleming was named to the All-NFL first team. In that off-season, while working on a construction job building at a bank in Florida, Fleming ms. killed in an electrical accident Room June 11, 1937, Fleming was just 25 years old at the time of his passing. Despite having played just three seasons with the Browns, she had such an impact on the franchise that they named their practice field, Fleming Field, and the Florida Alumnia Association established an award in his name that is given annually to the serior in any sport exemplifying the Fame and is a member of the State of Florida's Athletic Hall of Fame, Shadyside High School retired his number (59) and named its athletic complex Fleming Field.

John Reger (Athlete - 1950s)

John Reger (Linsty High School, Class of 1950). This all-OVAC honoree in football and hasketball was inducted into the Wheeling City Hall of Fame in 1998. Reger's football achievements were remarkable considering that he was less than sixfeet tall and weighed just 125 pounds when he began competing as a high school athlete. but he had more important attributes such as a huge, competitive heart and the determination of a youth two this size. He played fullback and linebacker at Linsty and captained the 1949 Cadet squad that lost just one game to Triadelphia (20-19) in what was regarded as the most memorable high school football contest played during that era at Wheeling Island Stadium.



Island Stadium.

Reger went on to the University of Pittsburgh on a football scholarship and his freshman team in 1950 went undefeated. After just three varsity games the following year, his collegiate career was ended by a knee injury. The Wheeling native returned home and was working in a gasoline station when his former high school coach, Itz Rine, arranged a tryout for him with the Pittsburgh Steelers even though he had not played football in three years. Displaying the same grit and determination he had shown in high school, Reger opened the 1995 season as one of the Steelers starting linebackers. During his nine seasons in Pittsburgh, Reger earned three Pro Bowl invitations. He became captain of the Steelers store defensive unit and was voted as the team's MVP during the 1959 season, Reger played in his first Pro Bowl in 1960 and made two more appearances in 1961 and 1962.

He sustained a life-threatening and near career-ending injury during his final season in Pittsburgh during a game against the Eugles at Franklin Field in Phitadelphia, Reger was hit in the head and had a spasm in his throat that cut off air. Fortunately, the ambulance they sent for included oxygen and he was revived. Following that harrowing incident, every team in the NFL was required to have oxygen on the sidelines.

Reger was placed on waivers by the Steelers prior to the start of the regular season in 1964 and he was picked up by the Washington Redskins, for whom he played three more years before retiring. Overall, he played 12 seasons in the NFL.

Bob Kelley (Athlete - 1960s)

Bob Kelley (Weir High School, Class of 1961). Kelley made the most of his gifted and speedy legs to carve his niche into the Weir High and OVAC record books in two sports. He was a star both on the gridiron and the track einders for the Red Riders.

Kelley — cuached by the legendary Jim Carey — rushed for 2,730 yards and 42 career touchdowns. Kelley led Weir to a 10-1 season and the West Virginia state championship in 1960. He gained 1,259 yards that year with 22 touchdowns. In the 40-0 rout of Nitro in the state championship game, Kelley was a one-man

In the 40-0 rout of Nitro in the state championship game, Kelley was a one-man wrecking crew. He tallied four TDs and passed for a fifth. Kelley was also a two-way starter as a junior for the Red Riders. He was the second underclassmen in state history to receive the Kennedy Award (1959), bestowed each year on the state's premier prep football player, and the first winner from the OVAC. The first-team all-West Virginia and all-OVAC honce captured the Wigwam and Scholastic Magazine All-American honors as the Red Riders were ranked 11th nationally. He played in the OVAC All-Star Game and left with Most Valuable Player accolades. Kelley also made his mark in track his senior season. He established a Steel Valley League record of 9.95 seconds for the 100-yard dash and an OVAC meet standard of 10.1 seconds at the same distance. He was voted most valuable performer at the OVAC meet where he won three gold medals and one silver He went on to win four regional track titles and four more medals in the state meet, including second place in the 100-yard dash.

the 100-yard dash. After graduation from Weir, Kelley matriculated to Cameron Junior College in Oklahoma. He led the Aggies

to the JUCO championship, beating Bakersfield, 28-20, in a game played in the Rose Bowl. Kelley led Cameron with 712 yards on the season, earning first-team all-Oklahoma Conference team honors. He was also honored on the 1961 Junior College Helms Athletic Foundation All-American team as a first-team halfback. He later attended Oklahoma State and Colorado, but was sidelined due to injuries

Robert 'Bo' McConnaughy (Athlete - 1960s)

Robert 'Bo' McConnaughy (Wheeling Central High School, Class of 1966). He was a two-sport phenom for the Maroon Knights in the mid 1960s, starring in basketball and base-

McConnaughy was a four-year letterman in both sports, gaining first-team all-state hon-ors in baseball as a senior. That same year be garnered second-team all-West Virginia lau-rels in hoops after helping lead the Maroon Knights to the West Virginia Catholic Tournament title.

In baseball, McConnaughy is considered one of the best shortstops the Ohio Valley prep ranks has ever produced. He went on to star at West Liberty State College in both sports.

In 1970, McConnaughy was named first-team al-WVIAC as a shortstop and shortly thereafter signed a professional contract with the Baltimore Orioles. A year previously, he was drafted by the Cincinnati Reds in the 24th round, five rounds ahead of Ken Griffey. Sc.

He spent three years in the Ortoles farm system before returning home and starring for the Warwood Reds of the Ohio Valley Baseball League.

Bo was a second-team all-conference selection as a sentor for the Hillioppers hoop team.

McConnaughy has maintained his relationship with West Liberty, finishing up his 25th year at the Hillioppers.

He has accumulated more than 500 wins at his alma mater to go with five conference crowns and a berth in the 1900 NAIA World Series. McConnaughy led the Black & Gold to their first-ever NCAA Regional Playoffs in

McConnaughy was elected to the West Liberry State College Half of Fame in 1988. He has been named WVIAC

Coach-of-The-Year on four occasions.

In addition to baseball, he has coached football, track and men's and momen's basketball at West Liberty. He is currently in charge of the WLSC Intramurals Program.

Gene Cattane (Athlete - 1970s)

Gene Cattane | St. Claicsville High School, Class of 1977|. Cattane put together an impressive four-year career on the diamond as a shortstop and pitcher for the Red Devils.

Some 30 years later, he still ranks in Ohio's top 10 in two statistical categories — No.4 on the all-time career hill list with 172 and No.7 in RBI with 145. In 109 varsity games, Cattane's career numbers also included a batting average of 431 with 127 runs scored, 29 home runs. 13 triples and 25 doubles, As a pitcher, he compiled a 14-11 career record.

He was a four-time all-Valley selection [second team as a freshman and first team the next

He was a four-time all-Valley selection [second team as a freshman and first team the next three years, including serving as captain as a senior) and he was selected to participate in four Eastern Ohio Baseball League All-Star Games. Cattane was also tabbed for the Ohio All-Star Geries in Columbus, equivalent to gaining all-state honors at that time. As a senior, Cattane helped the Red Devils to the OVAC Class 3-A championship and a 23-9 overall record. He asted .478 (fifth in the valley) with valley-leading totals of 54 hits, 10 home runs, 38 RBI and 35 runs secred. He also had four triples, six doubles and 16 stolen bases. On the mound, he was 6-2 with a 1.73 E.R.A. in 52.2 innings, striking out 71 while walking 27 and allowing 31 hits. Cattane's junior numbers included a .455 average (fifth in the OVAC) with valley bests in home runs (8) and RBI (36) along with 40 hits, five doubles, three triples and 25 runs secred. John Leon (Brooke High School, Class of 1976). This Brook starred in three sports

Leon — who was also a standaut grappler at Brooke — was a twistory line star for the powerful Bruins, earning a myriad of all-star accolades, including the 1975 Ken Hunt Award, going to the Lineman of the Year ai West Virginia, making Leon the first OVAC winner of the prestigaous honor.

Leon led Brooke to a 9-1 season or route to the OVAC championship in his jurior campaign before earning all-conference and all-state barrels as a senior. The powerful Leon played in the 1976 OVAC All-Star game, eaptraining the Mountainers to victory.

He was just as impressive in track circles, rewriting the OVAC record books in the shot put and discus. In the 1976 state meet, Leon launched the root ball 59-1, breaking the W. Va. standard by some two feet. The record lasted two years before being eclipsed by future Olympian Randy Barnes, Leon won three state throwing titles, two in the shotput and one in the discus.

Leon was also a force on the mats, compiling a 48-6 mark as a junior and senior heavyweight.



Telegraph from 1921 through 1929 and later became the sports editor of the News-

He eventually concluded his long transmission of the News-Register of the OvAC, the conference perhaps had no greater friend than 'limmy' Stewart slave painstakingly kept record books that proved invaluable to anyone interested in Ohio Valley sports lore. He also was recognized as a walking encyclopedia on local athletics. His head was a storehouse of sports information. What wasn't committed to his memory could be found in his pocket-sized record books and envelopes which filled his desk and filing eabinet.

Beginning in the early 1920s, Stewart's "Loukin' Em Over" column was one of the most widely-read throughout the area. In later years, he penned a golf column, "The 19th Hole," which appeared in the newspaper every Sunday from the spring months into the fall, He also initiated a popular Monday column on area collegiate sports which he titled, "With the Colleges."

He was also involved with the scheduling of basketball games worked by members of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials. His love of sandlot baseball was well known, as he almost metrulously covered happenings in the old Intelligencer and United Mine Workers baseball leagues.

A quiet man who never cast binnelf in the limelight during his career, Stewart was honored with a special award at the time of his retirement from an appreciative Ohio Valley Athletic Conference. He also received an award of appreciation from the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club.

Robert 'Bob' Kettlewell (Coaches)

Robert S. "Bob" Kettlewell (Linsly Military Institute, Class of 1947). During his 20 years as the head coach at Wintersville High School (1956-75), Kettlewell's teams posted a 143-40-10 record, the third-best winning percentage in Ohio Valley history for coaches with 100 or more wins. His teams earned nine league championships (four in the Big Eight and five OVAC titles). Wintersville won its first OVAC crown under Kettlewell in 1956, got its second in 1966 and then captured three in a row from 1970 through 1972, which equaled a record held previously by Bellaire and Martius Ferry.

Kettlewell had three undefeated teams at Wintersville - 1957, 1967 and 1972 - and even clubs that sustained just one loss, From 1966 through '73, the Warriors lost only 11 games. Under Kenlewell's direction. Wintersville scored in a record 140 straight games, ending with a scoreless tie against Bellaire in a contest that saw the Gold Warriors defined what would have been a game-winning and streak-contin-

uing touchdown because of a penalty

Among the stars coached by this highly-regarded mentor was Donnie Young, the Ohio Valley career rushing record holder. Among the other numerous college athletic football standouts tutored by Kettlewell were Ohio State aptain Afan Jack who played on an undefeated Rose Bowl team with the Buckeyes, and Roger Alford, the first black to sign at West Virginia University.

Kentewell also was a standout athlete while playing at Linsly Military Institute, He lenered in four sports and played football at West Virginia University, where he also lettered.

Indian Creek High School's (formerly Wintersville High) football facility was renamed "Bob Kenlewell

Memorial Stadium" in his honor, In 1990, Bob was the fourth Ohio Valley coach inducted into the Ohio Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame, He joined the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall of Fame in 1987.

Tom Keane (Athlete - 1940s)

Tom Keane (Linsly Military Institute, Class of 1944). The Bellaire native was a multi-sport standout for the Cadets and earned Alf-OVAC basketball and football on the first selections in 1943-44. He also was an All-City basketball selection. As a senior on a 7-4 record Cadet football team, the two-way back and punter returned a pass interception 106 yards to score in an 18-6 win over Warwood.

He enrolled at Ohio State where he lettered as a freshman before serving 20 months in the U.S. Navv.

Upon discharge, he enrolled at West Virginia University and lettered in 1946 and 1947, becoming a rure letterman at both OSU and WVU.

Keane was a third round pick and 18th overall National Football League Draft selection by the Los Angeles Rams in 1948. He played eight NFL seasons, and 87 games, as a defensive back-offensive end including the first four with the Rams. In 1952, he played with the Dallas Texans before two years with the Baltimore Colts and ended his career in 1955 with the Chicago Cardinals. He was a two-time All-Pro and played in the 1953 Pro Bowl, ranked second in the NFL in pass interceptions twice, and played in three NFL championship games including the 1951 Rams' title team. From 1948-52, both Keane brothers competed in the NFL.

He was a long-time assistant coach in the NFL including Chicago Cardinals from 1957-59, Pittsburgh 1965 and was an original member of the Miami Dolphins' staff in 1966 where he remained through 1985 as defensive backs and special teams coach. In 1962, he became the first head coach of the Wheeling frommen and served until joining the Steelers' staff. The frommen went 9-4 in 1962 before winning the United Football League title with a 12-1 record in 1963. In 1964, the frommen were 7-7.

Keane died at age 74 in 2001.

Tom Yakubowski (Athlete - 1950s)

Tom Yakubowski (Adena High School, Class of 1958). A three-sport standout for the Golden Wave who starred in the first year the school joined the conference, which expanded to three classes in 1957-58.

At Adena, he was a three-sport team captain in football, basketball and baseball and

earned 10 letters— four in baseball and three each in basketball and football.

The 1957 Adena football team went 6-2-2 and won the OVAC Class A crown. He was a fullback-linebacker-quarterback in football and an All-OVAC, All-Valley Small School and All-East Ohio Athletic League selection, He was the MVP of the 1958 Ohio-W.Va. All-Star game won by Ohio. 25-0. He scored 13 points and starred as fullback-

In basketball, he was a two-time All-East Ohio Athletic League honoree and averaged in double figures for three seasons, including 11.3 points per game as a sophomore; 17.5 points as a junior and 19.2 points as a

In baseball, the micher-infielder was an All-Ohio selection as a senior and he also pitched in the East-Wesl All-Star game in Columbus. He led the Golden Wave to a 12-1 record, losing in the regional finals to Northwestern High and future Major League pitcher Dean Chance. He tossed two one-hitters in a three-day span and had 32 2/3 consecutive scoreless innings in tournament play, which ranks second in the Ohio High School record book

He earned a football scholarship to Purdue University, where he lettered as a sophomore and senior fullback-linebacker while suffering a series of knee injuries. He was second on the team in rushing (310 yards) as a sophomore. He also played baseball one season at Purdue.

John Craig (Coaches)

John Craig (Follansbee High School, Class of 1967). Craig enjoyed an illustrious 26-year career as a head wrestling coach, including two seasons at Hillsboro (Ohio) High School, It years at Steubenville Big Red and five years at Indian Creck High School in Wintersville.

While at Big Red, his teams earned six overall championships in the OVAC Wrestling Tournament, Steubenville also captured seven divisional titles and finished in the top three a total of 13 times at the conference championships in the OVAC Wrestling Tournament, Steubenville also captured seven divisional titles and finished in the top three at the Ohio State meet, five of whom earned individual championships, and 23 who were state place-winners. His team finished in the top five at the Ohio State tournament four times, including a runner-up finish in 1988.

William 'Bill' Thomas (Officials)

The list includes the Martins Ferry and Shadyside Relays: the St. Clairsville, Barnesville and Wheeling Park Invitationals: Cal Giffin Track Classic; various OVAC championship meets; West Virginia Regionals and the Ohio High School Athletic Association Eastern Sectional and District meets.

He was a meet official for 10 OVAC schools, including Bellaire, Barnesville, Cambridge, John Marshall, Martins Ferry, Shadyside, Skyver, St. Clairsville, Wheeling Park and Union Local and Thomas also worked as a meet official at the Mansfield Relays (15 years); Bellaire Relays (48 years) Ohio regional championships (10 years) and the Ohio high school state meets for boys and girls (15 years). Thomas also served as meet director as numerous Buckeye State district and regional events, along with the OVAC Track Championships. He received the OVAC Cal Giffin Award for service to track and field in 1983; was honorary referee at the Bellaire Relays in 1996 and was honored again during the 50-year celebration of the famed Bellaire meet in 2004. The former Bellaire High athletic great is a member of the school's Wall of Fame.

Thomas attend Mississippi State on a football scholarship and also lettered there in track his freshman year. After two years with the Bulldogs, he entered the Army and served overseas before coming home and playing on the 1956 National Service football championship team, coached by Don Coryell, who fater coached the San Diego Chargers. Thomas finished his cullege career at West Liberty State College where he lettered in football and basketball. As a Wildest senior in 1955, the 6-foot-6 center was the anchor of the final team coached by OVAC Legends' honoree Everett Brinkman which won its first 18 games before bowing in the regular season finale at Bellaire. The OVAC title-winning team won the sectional and regional titles before bowing in the first round of the state tournament to Mullens to fin sh with a 22-2 record.

He also scored 30 points in a record-setting 146-110 victory over Weir High at Madison Gymnasium, a game which set Ohio Valley and West Virginia marks for combined points in a game (256).

He was the 51st overall NFL draft pick in 1959 by the Philadelphia Eagles, but opted to play in the new American Football League where he competed three seasons from 1960-62 with the New York Titans, a forerunner of the Jets, as a defensive end-offensive tackle. He played in a total of 42 AFL games

Bill Kennedy (Warwood High School, Class of 1967). Basketball and Bill Kennedy are synonymous. Some four-plus decades since starring at old Warwood High School, basketball still is a major part of his life.

Kennedy enjoyed a stellar prep career with the Vikings. The dazzling 6 ft. 2 guard led Warwood to state Class AA basketball tournament appearances in both the 1966 and '67 campaigns. He capped his prep houp career by sparking the Vikings to the school's only state basketball crown. That team finished with a stellar 24-2 mark, including closing the season on a 15-game victory run. Warwood captured its first OVAC hoop title in 21 years with Kennedy providing much of the frepnewer with his 26.2 points per game average.

The explosive backcourt dandy garnered first-team All-West Virginia, All-OVAC, and All-City plaudits. Just a season prior, Kennedy led the Vikings to a 22-4 mark and the state semifinals before being eliminated by Mullens. He was a first-team All-OVAC honoree that year and was named an all-state tournament selection, an honor he duplicated as a sentior. Kennedy led they like the vicing of the vicing of

as a freshman. His two years of impressive play with WLSC provided a springboard to a transfer to Arizona State University for the 19th and 7th2 seasons. Kennedy proved he was no small-school wonder as he led the Sun Devils in scoring both seasons, averaging 14 K and 14.6 points, per game, respectively. His two-year point total of 765 is the ninth best for a Sun Devil in a two-year career. All told, he scored 1.719 on the collegiate level. His play at Arizona State caught the eyes of professional scouts. He was drafted by Memphis of the ABA, but upted for a career as a baskelball official. Kennedy, who still resides in the Phoenix area, continues to be a Pac-10 college basketball official.













Bob Rieves (Athlete - 1960s)

Bob Rieves (Wheeling High School, Class of 1969), Some 40 years after running his final prep race. Rieves remains the measuring stick for sprint greatness in the Ohio Valley. The 156-pound mercurial heefed rocket was nothing short of sensational during his career with the Wildcars

Rivers scintillating 9.8 in the 100 equaled the state record, His assault on the state records resided in him becoming the first OVAC athlete in 28 years to be the state meet's high scorer.

Rivers was also the West Virginia state champion in the 220 as a juntor.

The Wildcat star captured five individual OVAC sprint gold medals in his final two years of high school. His impressive efforts helped lead Wheeling High to the 1969 OVAC team championship, the school's first such title in 23 years.

Joe Pettini (Brooke High School, Class of 1973), Pettini is without question on the short list of the greatest prep baseball players in Ohio Valley annals. His high school diamond resume is overflowing with accomplishments which led to a sparkling collegiate career at Mercer University.

The multi-talented Petiini started every game during his Brooke High career, some 140 contests. He didn't skip a beat at Mercer, starting all 196 games for the Macon. Georgia-based institution:

Pettini not only enjoyed individual success in his prep career, he also led the Bruins to a coveted state baseball championship. He was a two-time first-team all-West Virginia selection and was twice named captain of the all-Valley squad. He carned the distinction of being captain of both the all-Valley and all-OVAC teams as a senior.

Jay Peterson (Athlete - 1980s)

Jay Peterson (Cadiz High School, Class of 1980). A spectacular four-sport athlete. Peterson made his biggest impact on the football field.

The Hopedale native dazzled as a running back with numerous memorable performances, including a single-game modern Ohio Valley-record 377 yards against Mingo and games of 288 and 282 yards. He scored six touchdowns in a game twice. Peterson broke a 50-year old Ohio Valley single-season mishing record held by OVAC Tegends' honoree George (Puck) Burgwin when he mished for 2,348 yards on 203 carries to lead Cadiz to an 840-2 record. He just missed the modern single-season scoring record with 221 points (32 TDs. 28 PAY ickst, one point sky of OVAC Hall of Famer Terry Snively of Powhatan's mark of 222 points.

In his three-year gridition career with the Cardmals, he rushed for 3,959 yards (second at the time on the Ohio Valley career Fist) and scored 349 points. Peterson had his frostball No. 22 retired by the school.

In track, he recorded the Ohio Valley's fastest time in the H00-meters as a senior (11.0 seconds) and also had the fastest BOUs and time (10.3) that year He won the OVAC Class AA 100-meter race in 11.1 seconds.

He split spring duty between track and baseball and was an All-Valley honorable mention pick, fitting 352 and recording 25 stolen hases on an 18-7 record team. Peterson also participated in basketball as a sophomore and junior.

He was also the Gatorade "Player of the Year" in 1992 and was a two-time Class AA all-state capitain. He was a two-time All-OVAC and All-Valley selection

Cisar played quanterback, safety, placekicker and panter on Blue Eagle teams that compiled a two-year record of 25-3, finishing as the Class AA state runner-up twice under the tutelage of his father, Dave Cisar, In two seasons as a starter and one as a backup, he passed for Ohio Valley record totals of 5,194 yards and 64 touchdowns, As a junior, he passed for a record 27091 yards and 34 TDs. He also kicked a valley and state record total of 85 points and had a record ving 99-yard TD pass as a junior.

In basehall, he was a three-time All-West Virginia Class AA, All-OVAC and All-Valley pitcher. He was also a regular in baskebball, seeing 45 points in a game on one occasion.

He carreed a baseball Acholarship to Charleston Southern University in South Carolina where he was a four-year starter. He was named Big South Conference "Player of the Year" in 1997 and was a three-time all-conference pick.

Dr. Vincent 'Vince' Monseau (OVAC 'Contributor')

Dr. Vincent "Vince" Monseau (Weir High School, Class of 1958). Think of the sport of wrestling and you think of Monseau, who enjuyed success at the high school level locally before making his mark at West Liberry State College.

As a high school coach, he spent nine years at Oak Glen, Charleston and Weir high schools, guiding the 1967 Oak Glen squad to a W.Va. State Tournament championship.

After one year at Peru State in Nebraska, he spent 31 years (1973-2004), as head coach at West Liberry, compiling a 359-221-7 record. He coached 72 All-Americans, 34 Academic All-Americans and six National Champions and guided the Hilltoppers to a national runner-up finish in 1995.

Monseau, who also conclud feedball and cross country during his days at WLSC.

Monseau, who also coached football and cross country during his days at WLSC,
directed the NAIA Sational Wrestling Tournament in both 1979 and '87 and was an administrative assistant
for the NCAA Division II National Wrestling Tournament in 2003.

His awards are numerous, including the OVAC 'Mr, Mat' award in 1983; NAIA Hall of Fame in 1987;
USA Wrestling Bronze Level Member Coach in 1987; West Liberty State College Athletic Hall of Fame in
1997; NCAA Division II Southwest Regional Coach of the Year in 1996 and 1997; National Wrestling Hall
of Fame in 2002; NCAA Division II Wrestling Hall of Fame in 2003; and National Wrestling Hall
of Fame in 2003; NCAA Division II Wrestling Hall of Fame in 2003; and National Wrestling Coaches
Association Lifetime Member in 2004.

Ford's Cambridge teams compiled a 59-25 record in fournament play, withining 18 sectional intes, eight district crowns and five regional championshrips leading to five state tournament appearances (1987-88, 1991-92-1994-95, 1995-96 and 1999-2000), including a runner up finish in 1994-95. His teams also won 10 East Central Ohio League titles. He received "Coach of the Year" honors in the OVAC, Eastern District 12 and ECOL and was the OHSBCA Division II State "Coach of the Year" in 1988.

Ford served as president of the District 12 Coaches Association, as a trustee for the OHSAA Foundation and on the Board of Directors of the Ohio High School Basketball Hall of Fame Museum. The recipitent of the OVAC East Enberfield Combes Award to 2005 he was influenced from the Ohio High School Basketball. on the Board of Directors of the Onto High School Basketball Half of Fame Sulseum. The recipient of the OVAC Earl Haberfield Coaches Award in 2005, he was inducted finto the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2007.

As an athlete, he earned 11 varsity letters (four in baseball, four in track, three in basketball) at Midvale and Indian Valley North, He scored 1,310 career points and earned first team all-Ohio, all-Eastern District and all-Inter Valley Conference accolades in basketball and was a state qualifier in the pole vault in track. He was a four-year letterman at Muskingum College in basketball, coring 1,717 points second most in school history) while earning all-Ohio Athletic Conference "Athlete of the Year" honors and UPI "Small

America" accolades. He was a charter member of the Muskingum Athletic Hall of Fame in 1980.

Bill Paolisso (Officials)

Bill Paolisso (Weir High School, Class of 1946). He was a mainstay among area officials, working OVAC football and boys/girls basketball games for a 50-year period from 1948-1998, first with the Wheeling board and later with the Weirton-Steubenville

Paolisso officiated 10 West Virginia state championship football games during his career and several Ohio-West Virginia and OVAC All-Star football games.

In basketball, he officiated more than 100 postseason tournaments (sectionals, regionals, state), including 19 state tournaments. He worked the first Samuel A. Mumley

OVAC All-Star Basketball Classic in 1978 and also was a referee in the West Virginia Conference Among Paolisso's officiating awards are the OVAC Robert Dawson Officials Award; the Obio Valley

Football Coaches Association Officials Award: the West Virginia Secondary Schools Athletic Commission Award, and the Weirton-Steubenville Officials' Board Award

Paolisso was a three-sport athlete at Weir High (football, basketball and baseball). He was first team all state in football and basketball as a senior, earning all-OVAC honors in basketball twice and once in football. He was also all-tournament for the state champion Red Riders' baseball team

He played two years of professional baseball in the St. Louis Cardinals' organization (1952 and 1953) and he served two years in the U.S. Army.

Richard 'Dick' Edge (OVAC 'Family')

Richard "Dick" Edge (Wheeling High School, Class of 1954), To say Edge has

worn many different hats over the years would be a vast understatement.

He has spent 42 years in education, serving as a teacher, coach, assistant principal, principal and superintendent at various OVAC-member schools.

cipal and superintendent at various OVAC-member schools.

Edge coached in various capacities at Triadelphia, Warwood and Wintersville high schools, starting the wrestling programs at both Triadelphia and Warwood as well as four junior high programs in Ohio County. He coached Warwood to an undefeated season and an OVAC wrestling championship as well as sixth place finish in the W.Va. State Tournament when there was only one classification. He also confounded and coached summer track and girls' softbull programs in Wintersville.

Among his accolades were being named Ohio Eastern District Wrestling Coach of the Year in 1975 receiving the OVAC's prestigious 'Mr. Mat' Award in 1979; induction into the West Liberty State College Hall of Fame in 1997; and selection to the WLSC Wall of Honor for Outstanding Alumni in 2003.

Edge served as president of the OVAC during the 1986-87 and 1987-88 school years and served as a member of the OVAC Executive Board for many years. He was also a past president of the Tri-County Athletic League and the East Central Ohio League.

John Sorrenti (Media)

John Sorrenti (Weir High School, Class of 1956). Even if you don't know Sorrenti, you probably recognize his voice

Back in 1954, at the age of 16, he began what would be a 40-year career as a sports announcer for WEIR Radio in Weitron. During that time, he broadcast football, basketball and baseball games for four OVAC-member schools - Weir, Madonna, Brooke and Wintersville.

After retiring from that position in 1994, he worked four years for television station WTOV-TV9 on football "Game of the Week" telecasts and a so annou Wrestling Tournament telecast in 1996.

As a long-time friend and supporter of the OVAC, Sorrenti served as Master of Ceremonies for the OVAC Queen of Queens competition for five years in the mid-1980s and he has been the Master of Ceremonies a the OVAC Hall of Fame Banquet since its inception.

Among Sorrenti's awards, he was honored on the Weir High Wall of Fame in 1995 and received two

eparate honors from the Dapper Dan Club of the Upper Ohio Valley, including the 2009 Robert S. McKelvey Memorial Award

Sorrenti began a political career in 1982 when he was elected as a Weirton City Councilman, In 1986, he was elected as a Hancock County Commissioner - a position he was re-elected to twice for a total of 18 years in office.

He has also served as Purchasing Agent for Hancock County Schools and Adult Education and Placement Coordinator of the John D. Rockefeller IV Career Center and is currently Manager of Training at Mountaineer Casino, Resort and Racetrack.

Henry 'Hank' Lazasz (Coaches)

Henry "Hank" Lazasz (Warren Consolidated High School, Class of 1950). A pillar

Henry "Hank" Lazasz (Warren Consolidated High School, Class of 1950). A pillar of the boys' basketball croaching community for 34 years, Lazasz topped the 400-victory plateau as his teams at Warren Consolidated. Buckeye South, Buckeye SouthWest and Buckeye Local combined for a 405-301 record.

All told, Lazasz-coached teams wor four OVAC championships, 10 sectional titles and three district crowns while having two teams go undefeated in the regular season (1970 and 1977).

In 15 years at Warren Consolidated (1958-72), his teams were 179-120, winning two OVAC championships (1961 and 1970). The 1970 squad posted a 22-1 record, winning OVASA Class A sectional and district titles before bowing in the regional.

In 16 years at Buckeye South, his teams were 211-133 and won two OVAC championships (1977 and 1981), eight sectional titles and two district crowns. The 1977 team was 22-1 and ranked No. 1 in Ohio Class AA, losing in the regional finals. That year, Lazasz was named Ohio Class AA "Coach of the Year" by VPI and Eastern District "Coach of the Year" by AP.

He concluded with two years at Buckeye SouthWest and then was head coach in the first year of the complete Buckeye Local consolidation in 1990-91.

Lazasz also was the OVAC all-sports "Coach of the Year" in 1970 and received the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club's Carl Hamill Award in 1990. He coached in both the Ohio North-South All-Star Game and the OVAC All-star Classic and had two yearly OVAC basketball scholarships named in his hoon. He receive the OVAC's Earl Haberfield Coaches Award in 1986.

He was a member of the OHSBCA and served as president of the District 5 Basketball Coaches Association. He was also inducted into the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Association. He was also inducted into the Ohio High School Basketball at Warren Consolidated in both basketball and football. He then lettered two years in basketball and four in football at Bethany College before serving two years in the U.S. Army.

Harold 'Doc' Daugherty (Athlete - 1940s)

Harold "Doc" Daugherty (Weir High School, Class of 1945). In 1945, he became the first of only seven high school athletes to win the W.Va. Amateur Athlete of the Year Award, the state's oldest honor dating back to 1934. A first team, all-class, all-stater in football, basketball and baseball, he also earned All-OVAC football and basketball honors. as a Red Rider senior.

The two-way back led Weir to a 9-1 football record in 1943, losing only to state

champion Parkersburg. As a senior, in 1944, he led Weir to a 40-13 victory over Parkersburg and accounted for five touchdowns — a TD run, two TD passes a 101-yard pass interception return and an 80-yard kickoff return.

Daugherty's two-year career included running and passing for 1,925 yards and 31 touchdowns. He also returned kicks and was a star defensive back.

In basketball, the all-stater helped Weir to a 22-2 record. In basketball, he led the Red Riders to the one-class

state championship in 1945.

He signed a football scholarship to Ohio State University where he played on a 7-2 record team as a freshman starting safety. In the fifth game, he moved into the starting offensive lineup as tailback. He was drafted into the U.S. Army in April of 1946 and, after discharge, he signed a professional baseball contract with the Detroit Tigers and played pro baseball from 1948/53, Included were three years in Class AAA with Buffalo

and Toledo. He opened the 1951 season with the major league team, but returned to Toledo after a month.

When the Weir High football coaching job opened, he was hired and guided his second team, in 1955, to an 8-2 record and an OVAC title. He also continued his pro baseball career by playing in the late 1950s in Minot, N.D., and Mitchell, S.D., and was manager of farm teams in 1964 and 1965 in Coco Beach, Fla., and Duluth, Minn. He capped his high school coaching career in Bedford, Ohio.

Frank Baxter (Bridgeport High School, Class of 1949). When you think of Bridgeport High School, this is surely one of the names that comes to mind. After all, Baxter was part of the Bridgeport school system for more than 60 years as a student, athlete, teacher, coach and administrator.

As an athlete, he was an all-OVAC honoree in football as a center-linebacker and in basketball where he averaged 25 points per game as a senior. After a stint in the armed services during the Korean War, he enrolled at West Liberry State College where he played football and ran track and received a bachelor's degree, later receiving his master's from the University of Dayton.

After teaching and coaching at Barnesville High School for one season, he returned to his alma mater and began an incredible 47-year run as Bridgeport's athletic director — believed to be the longest tenure in OVAC history — retirning in 2004.

From 1962 to 1980, he also doubled as the Bulldogs' head boys' basketball coach, guiding the team to a solid 269-128 record. His teams won four OVAC championships (1963, '66, '72 and '74); 14 sectional titles; two district crowns and one regional championship. Bridgeport posted an unbeaten regular season in 1966, ending with a final 23-1 record and the UP1 Class A state poll championship, and finished as the 1969 Ohio Class A runner-up with a 25-2 record at a time when there were only two classes in the state.

Baxier was named the Ohio Class A "Coach of the Year" in 1966 and became the first recipient of the OVAC's all-sports "Coach of the Year" award in 1969. He was also selected Eastern Ohio and Eastern District "Coach of the Year" on several occasions. In 1988, Baxter was the Eastern District "Athlette Director of the Year" and he was inducted into the Ohio Athletic Administrators Hall of Fame in 1994. Stephenson-coached Cardinal squads won 12 OVAC Class AA dual meet titles, 12 OVAC Class AA tournament titles and the overall OVAC mat championship in 1981. His teams also won eight sectional championship by the 1981 team which captured the Ohio Class A State Westling Championship. That feat earned Stephenson the Ohio Class A "Coach of the Year" selection. Under his tutelage, Cadiz produced 29 state place finishers including two state champions and counter of OVAC Tournament champions. Stephenson was distinct for many years on the OVAC Westling Committee and as director of several sectional and distinct formaments, Stephenson was honored with the OVAC's prestigious "Mr. Mat Award" in 1993. Harrison Central later recognized the long-time coach with the naming of school's multipurpose building as The John W. Stephenson Center.

Stephenson received his degree in Indusmal Arts and Physical Education from Fairmont State College, where he was an NAIA All-American wrestler. After stepping down as wrestling coach, Stephenson served as assistant principal at Cadiz High School and then was promoted to principal at Harrison Central when the district reorganized in 1999 and he maintained that position until 2001. He has also served as principal at Harrison Lakeland Elementary, Harrison Lakeland Elementary and has been Buildings and Grounds Supervisor for the district.

Charles 'Chuck' Watt (Coaches)

Big Red won eight OVAC championships under Watt (1971, '75, '78, '79, '80, '81, '86 and '90) and he was named the District 5 Basketball Coaches Association 'Coach of the Year' in each of those seasons while being named OVAC 'Coach of the Year' in both 1971 and 1990. His teams won 12 sectional titles, including seven straight from 1983 through 1990; and captured four district championships (1970, '71, 85 and '90).

He was inducted into the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame. Watt also succeeded Vaccaro as the school's head baseball coach, serving in that role from 1965-75 and compiling a 192-87-4 mark. His Big Red teams won two OVAC championships (1968 and 1973); three sectional titles (1968, '72 and '75) and one district crown (1972).

He also coached the Steubenville American Legion Post 33 team for many years. After serving as an assistant to Vaccaro from 1957-82 before becoming the manager in 1983 and posting a 367-104 record, including state championships in 1984 and 1989.

Joe Niekro (Bridgeport High School, Class of 1962), The younger half of the most successful brothers pitching tandem in Major League Baseball history, Joe carved his promache after distinguishing himself on the mound at the prep and collegiste levels. Niekro pocketed 221 Major League wins as he and older brother Phil teamed for 539 victories, still the professional high water mark.

His altheits feats took root as Bridgeport High, where he was more than just a pitching standout, Niekro, in addition to his baseball accolades, was an all-OVAC basketball player at the Kirkwood-based school. Niekro was a major player in the Bulldogs capturing three straight Class AA baseball sectional and district tides, the largest class in Ohio at that time.

He closed out his prep career in stellar fashion, tossing a no-hitter against Martins Ferry in the sectional semificats. He was homeed as an all-Eastern Ohio baseball selection. Baseball had no OVAC All Star learn at that time.

Nickro died Oct. 26, 2006 after suffering a brain aneutysm, but his legacy lives on through The Joe Nickro Foundation created by his only daughter. Natalie, The foundation's proceeds are donated to various hospitals in an effort to expand aneurysm treatment and research.

He carned all-Eastern and CFL alf-star awards as a detensive back in 1985 and 1986. Browne moved on to star for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers from 1985-91, During the latter two years, be established CFL records for most interception return yards in a season with 273 and 267, respectively. 

Hammond was named second-team all-Ohio by The Associated Press twice and was selected to the Ohio North-South All-Start Game, She was captain of the all-OVAC team twice.

Hammond also doubled as a softball player and thrower for the track team.

Bernabet helped to guide the Lady Blue Dons to three straight state tournament appearances and, during her senior season of 1992, Madonna brought home the school's second state championship with a brilliant 24-2 record.

During that 1992 campaign, Bernabei averaged 17-5 points, six rebounds, seven assists and five steals per game while surpassing the 1,000-point mark. All told, she finished her prop career with 1,002 points and more than 500 career assists.

After her semior season, Bernabei was named captain of the West Virginia Class A All-State team and captain of the OVAC Class A-AA West Virginia team when basketball was a fild sport. She also competed in both the OVAC and North-South all-star games. All told, Bernabei was a three-time all stater. She was a second team chetice as a sophormer and a first team selection as a junior.

While basketball was where Bernabei made her mark, she also excelled for Madonna in track and field as well as tennis, earning letters in each sport. In 1993, Bernabei brought juvo gold medals home from the West Virginia state track meet. She was a part of the winning 4x200-meter relay as well as the winning shuttle hurdle relay. She ran a leg on the state runner-up 4x100-heter relay team. During the 1992 tennis season, Bernabei was a part of an OVAC-winning doubles team in tennis.

Bernabei completed her degree in 1997 from West Liberty State College. During her carner with the Lady Hillioppers, she scond 1,317 points and finished with 1,107 assists, which is the NCAA Division II record. During her senior season, Bernabei was a maned WVIAC Player of the Year and Division II All-American after helping to lead WTSC to a NCAA Tournament appearance. She was named first earn all-conference in the WVIAC atf four years and was inducted to the West Liberty Athletic Hall of Lame in 20x2.

He was a four-year mainstay for the program, spending time as a running back, defensive back and kick returner before shifting to quarterback.

As a senior, when the Bruins finished 11-2 as the state runner-up, Sweitzer set an Ohio Valley record for total yardage with 3,399. He also accounted for 36 touch-downs. Of his yardage total, he had 2,203 passing, 614 rushing and 522 on kick returns.

After that senior season, Sweitzer, who also shined in basehall for the Bruins, repeated on the first team all-state squad and was named the captain of the offensive unit. He was also runner-up for the Kennedy Award that season. He was twice named all-OVAC and all-Valley and was the Gatorade State Player of the Year. He was also listed in the USA Today as West Virginia Player of the Year and an honorable mention to the paper's All-American Team.

Sweitzer then accepted a scholarship to the University of Akron. As was the case at Brooke, Sweitzer began as a kick returner and running back before becoming the quarterback for his final two seasons.

In two years, Sweitzer passed for 2,744 which is 10th on Akron's career listing. He passed for 1,599 yards as a junior.

His first stoy was Cameron High School, where he compiled a three-year mark of 18-6-1, highlighted by an unbeaten (7-0-1) team in 1956 which was ranked No. 2 among West Virginia small school teams.

Thurnes then noved on to Warren Consolidated High School, serving as head coach for 12 years 1958-69] and posting a 78-26-6 mark. His teams put together unbeaten seasons in 1961, 762, 764 and 767. The first three of those teams won OVAC Class A champonships while all four were flastern Ohio Athletic League is kingpins.

After stepping aside for a couple of years, he returned to coach the newly-consolidated Buckeye South High in its first two seasons (1972-37), posting a combined 16-3-4 record.

He received several "Coach of the Year" awards - from the Wheeling Intelligencer in 1964; The Times Leader in 1967, and the Eastern Ohio Athletic League in 1961, 52, 768 and 67, and the AP Eastern District in 1964 and 67. Thurnes was also the recipient of the Belinont Hills Country Club's 27th Annual Achievement Iondball Coaches Asward in 1965 and the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club's Outstanding Achievement Award in 1967. Thurnes was also a long-time assistant baskethall coach to fellow OVAC Hall of Famer Henry Lazasz and he also coached baseball, track and golf at varrous times during his career.

In high school, Thurnes was a three-year letterman in football as a center-finebacker, gaining third team all-West Virginnia recognition and first team all-OVAC Ronors.

He went on to play at West Liberty State College in the "Golden Era" of Coach Joe Bartell, starting at center on two undefeated teams and playing in the Pythion Bowl and the Smoky Mountain Bowl, both Hilltopper victories.

Charles E. Petty (OVAC 'Family')

Charles E. Petry (Pomeroy High School). The entire Ohio Valley Athletic Conference owes a debt of gratitude to Petry and the other eight "Founding Fathers."

The original OVAC member schools included Bellaire, Follansbee, Linsly, Martins Ferry, Moundsville, Powhatan, Shadyside, St. John Central, Steubenville, West Liberty, Wheeling, Wbeeling Central Catholic and Yorkville.

Petry was a key cog in the OVAC in its early years, serving as the first official executive secretary for 13 years from 1944-56, longer than anyone has been in that position except for Sam Mumley to this point.

Petry cached the pre-OVAC boys' track program at Triadelphia High School, winning the 1941 West Virginia one-class championship after finishing as runner-up four times and placing third twice.

Plennie Clutter (Officials)

Plennie Clutter (Wheeling High School, Class of 1943). He ranks among the best officials of all-time in the Ohio Valley, spending 30 years as a football referee and 25 years as a basketball official.

Clutter's officialing career began at the urging of the late A. Wilson Murray, a charter member of the OVAC Hall of Fame in the officials' category, and the worked his way up from junior varsity games to the top of the officialing world in both sports. He earned assignments to work four West Virginia state high school football championship games and three state basketball fournaments.

Clotter officiated numerous sectional and regional fournament games in West Virginia and worked several OVAC All-Star Football Games. He was also selected as the referee in the 1982 Ohio North-South All-Star Game.

He is an Honorary Life Member of both the Ohio Valley Basketball Officials and



He was the West Virginia Class AA-A Wrestling Coach of the Year six times and is the only w restling coach to be selected the West Virginia all-sport Coach of the Year by Wrestling USA Magazine and was a finalist for the award in 2004.

After being selected to play in the Esta-West Shrine Ginne, he was the No. 2 draft choice of the Green Bay Packers in 1960 but opted to play in the Canadian Football League with the Vancouver B.C. Lions and the Hamilton Tiger Cats for two seasons. He then Joined the Packers as a detensive back-wide receiver and played in three straight NFL winning championship games and stared the first two Super Bowl games for the winning Packers in 1966 and 1967. As a senior, he canned All-OVAC Class A honors and All-WVA, mention when he sorted 613 points for a 29-2 per game average, both school records which lasted 45 years. In the third game of his sophonore season, he became a varsity starter for the rest of his career and, with Thorn, formed a top backcourt which fed WVU to three Southern Conference titles and a pair of NCAA Tournament berribs. He averaged double figures all three years and scored 1.156 career points which at the time, was fifth all-time in WVU history behind four All-Americans—Jersy West, Rod Hundley, Mark Workman and Thorn, McCornick and Thorn were featured on the cover of the 1962 WVU Basketball Media Guide.

After twice earning All-Southern Conference second team and honorable mention All-America, he reame Magnolia's only NBA draftee in the sixth round by the Cinemnan Royals, but a foot injury halted

his pro careers.

Rick Boron (Athlete - 1960s)

Richard L. Boron (St. John Central High School, Class of 1965). He was a three-sport performer for the Fighting Irish, but it was on the gridition where he gained national recognition.

Boron blossomed under the tutelage of Coach Dan MeGrew into a two-way star as a senior. The multi-talented gridder scored 126 points as a senior while rushing for 608 yards on just 91 carries. He also haulted in 28 passes for 563 additional stripes. While Boron was an offensive dynamo, he was just as highly regarded for his prowess at defensive back. As a senior, he intercepted three enemy passes and also returned a joint 88 yards for a FD. McGrew, a former Purdue and professional gridder, called Boron "the best defensive back I ever saw."

Tor his senior exploites, Boron was named to the prestigious Parade Magazine All-America High School Football Team. He was also a first team all-OVAC all-leastern Ohto and AP all-Ohio honorce Boron also lettered four years in baseball at SIC and two seasons in baseball.

Jastern Ohio and AP all-Ohio honoree Boron also lettered four years in pasenan at 520, and ewo scassins in baskethall.

He turned down an offer to play at Notre Dame and instead accepted a scholarship from Coach Bo Scheinbechler to play at Miant of Ohio. It was a decision Boron never regretted. He was a three-year regular for the Redskins as a defensive back. He was accorded second team all-Mid-American Conference honors as a juntor and first team plaudits as a senior. Crag Miller (Athlete - 1970s)

Craig Miller (Bridgeport High School, Class of 1979). He was an all-star football player and standout basketball player for the Bulldogs, but it was in track and field where Miller is remembered as one of the best to ever perform in the Ohio Valley.

Miller had superb size at 6 ft. 3 and 200 pounds to be the punishing fullbackhincheacker and the rugged post in baskethal that he was, but that size was combined with great speed which he utilized to excel in three distinct events in track, His all-around versatility drew him the tag as the Bulldogs' most versatile athlete since John Haylicek.

Miller was the greatest discus thrower of his era. He used his elongated frame

Miller was the greatest discus thrower of his era. He used his elongated frame and superb athleticism to become the first Ohio Valley prepater to twird the platter more than 170 feet, establishing a new valley standard with his 172-10 toss in the district meet as a senior, in the 32 years since, only two discus throwers have bettered that mark, Miller was state runner-up in the discus as a senior while also placing second in the Bellaire Relays as a junior and senior. The powerful Bulldog also ranked with the premier shotputters during that time, owning a best of 52 feet, Miller was equally adept on the track where he was a prime-time high hurdler, recording the best time in the Ohio Valley as a senior with a secrebring 14.7 clocking.

Miller was also a three-year letterman at Bridgeport in basketball where he was the leading rebounder for Coach Frank Baxter each season, Miller averaged 15.4 points a game as a senior. In football, he earned all-Ohio, all-OVAC and all-Valley honors after a senior year which saw him total 105 points, which included three field goals and 21 kicking PATs, another sign of his all-around tatents. He was a blocking fullback, but still managed 422 yards on just 90 totes for the 9-1 Bulldogs of Coach Dave Bruncy. He also averaged 40 yards per punt.

He opted to accept a football scholarship to Miami of Ohio University, where he lettered four years as a tight end and was accorded all-MAC honors as a junior.



Sharon Vincent (Athlete - 1980s)

Sharon Vincent (Athlete - 1980s)

Sharon Vincent (St. Clairsville High School, Class of 1981), This Lady Red Devil was easily one of the most decorated and successful sprinters ever to grace the ovals in the Ohio Valley.

Vincent finished her prep career with eight state medals and led St. C. to its only state championship in school history in June of 1981. In that state meet her senior season, Vincent feather an undefeated campaign in both the 100 and 2000-meter dashes by sprinting to the OHSAA state championships in both events in 12.18 and 24.79, respectively. Vincent won a state gold as a sophomore as well as a member of the Lady Red Devils 440-yard relay team. She was the state runner-up in the 200 and placed fifth in the 100 that season. Prior to breaking through in Columbus as a senior, vincent was the state runner-up in the 100 and phones medalist in the 200 as a junior.

The only individual loss Vincent siftered as a senior came in the 400-meter dash at the district meet where she took third, but still ran an impressive SR. En route to her state meet performances, athletes competed in sectionals and districts where she won 19 championships. She was a three-time sectional and district 100 and 200-theter champion.

At the OVAC meet, Vincent won a total of 12 conference championships. She was a three-time champion in the 100 and 200. At the time of her graduation, Vincent held eight meet necords and three all-time Ohio Valley records. Vincent, who still holds the 100, 200 and 400-meter dash school records, was named St. Clairsville's Most Valuable Athlete four times and was also named all-District Athlete of the Year. She also competed in the prestigious Midwest Meet of Champions in the 100-meter dash in 1981.

After her prep career, Vincent accepted a scholarship to Eastern Kentucky University. She competed there for two saons before transferring to The Ohio State University where she completed her bachelor of arts degree in economics. Vincent, who was inducted to the St. Clairsville Athletic Hall of Fam

Pat Miller (Athlete - 1970s)

Pat Miller III (Shadyside High School, Class of 1979). He was able to do what few

athletes can do, that being a star in two sports during the same season.

Miller was nothing short of sensational for the Tigers in baseball, lettering four times. His tremendous diamond time did nothing to adversely impact his track career where he was equally as exceptional.

The talented Tiger was also a stellar gridder and also possessed the prowess to graduate with a 3.94 GPA.

Miller captained the Tiger baseball team both as a junior and a senior, the latter season one in which he hit for a sizzling 431 average. That proved a springboard to be selected to participate in the All-Ohio Baseball Series.

He was selected an FOBE, all-star all four seasons and all-1 astern District three seasons. Miller's diamond exploits earned him a baseball scholarship to Ohio University.

While his prep basebalt resume is quite glittering, it may take a backseat to his track and field accomplishments. Miller achieved the ultimate by winning the state pole vault title in 1979. He also finished sixth in the high burdles in the same state meet. He won virtually every pole walft competition as a senior, except for the Bellaire Relays which was in its heyday. Miller was third in the pole vault and third in the high hurdles in that meet, finishing as the top local scorer in the state's second-largest meet at the time.

The terrific Tiger was a two-time all-Valley honorce and was selected to The Intelligencer's all-Decade Track Team.

Track Team. He enjoyed much gridiron success as well. The hard-running Tiger earned all-Ohio honors both his junior and senior campaigns. The three-year grid letterman was first team all-OVAC, all-Valley and all-Eastern District his last two seasons.

Miller, who served as the Tigers' captain as a senior, followed in his father's footsteps and played in the OVAC All-Star Game.

Willie Clay (Athlete - 1980s)

Willie Clay (Linsly School, Class of 1988). This former Cadet did it all during his four years on the Wheeling campus. While earning letters in three sports, it was on the football field where he made his biggest impact to the Cadets' program.

program.
Clay was the unquestioned leader and most recognized player on teams which won 23 consecutive games and recorded the first two undefeated seasons in the school's history when it finished 10-0 in 1986 and 9-0 in 1987. Excelling as a detensive back, wide receiver and kick returner, Clay carned numerous postseason bonors during his career. As a senior, despite the Cades' run-first offensive schemes, Clay managed to catch 30 passes for 428 yards and five touchdowns. He also took two kickoffs back for touchdowns and had five interceptions. He was named all-State, all-OVAC and all-Valley. He was the captain of the higs-school team after his senior season.
On the baskethall court, Clay led the Cadets in his senior season with a 17.5 points per game average while shooting 48 percent from the floor. He also passed out 170 assists en route to earning all-OVAC and all-Valley.

In the spring, Clay lit up area basebalf diamonds, He batted .423 as a senior and was named all-OVAC and all-Valley.

Despite his success on so many surfaces, it was footbalf that was his calling at the next level. Clay accepted a scholarship to attend Georgia Tech University where he earned all-ACC honors twice. At one time, Clay held the Yellow Jackets' school record for interceptions (16) after starting in the defensive backfield for three seasons.

In 1992, Clay was drafted in the eighth round by the Detroit Lions and played eight seasons in the NFL. He also played for the New England Patriots for three seasons and one with the New Orleans Saints. All told, he played in 118 NFL games and started 90.



T.J. Hannig (Linsly School, Class of 1996). This three-sport Cadet standout scelled as an all-around athlete, but it was on the soccer field where he made his

excelled as an all-around athlete, but it was on the soccer field where ne made inshiggest impact.

Hannig earned four letters for the Cadets as their starting goalkeeper for teams which posted a 76-13-40 record. Included in those seasons were two OAC all-class titles in 1992 and 1994. The Cadets were unning these titles because opposing teams just couldn't get the ball past Hannig, who set the Ohio Valley record with 41 career shutouts. Overall, he owned a 0.88 goals against average. His exploits didn't go unnoticed, He was twice named all-OVAC and captained the all-Valley team as a sentor. He was also named Gatorade Player of the Year and a Partide All-American. On the hashelball court. Hannig blossomed as a sentor, scoring nearly 17 points

senior. He was also named Gatorade Player of the Year and a Parade All-American.

On the baskelball court. Hannig blossomed as a senior, scoring nearly 17 points a game and grabbing eight rebounds en route to all-OVAC and all-Valley accelades. In track and field, Hannig competed in a bety of events, but it was in the long jump where he stood out. He set the OVAC record with a mark of 21 feet, 7.34 inches and won three conference titles high hurdles, high jump and long jump.

Hannig accepted a scholarship for societ to the University of Indiana where he started in net from 1997-2000 and finished No. 1 in 10 history with 42 shittouts and second in victories (63), The Hossiers played in four consecutive NCAA Final Fours, winning the NCAA titles in 1998 and 1999, defeating Stanford (3-1) and Santa Clara (1-0), respectively. Hannig and OVAC and NBA Hall of Famer John Havlicek (Bridgeport High) are the only two OVAC products to play in three consecutive NCAA title games. Hannig's name is all over the Indiana University record book. He runks seventh at 1U with 176 saves, and the 23 victories in 1998 are tied for the most in a season.

After his collegiate career, Hannig was selected in the MLS Draft and spent time with D.C. United. He also played for the Pittsburgh Riverbounds.



Quincy Wilson (Athlete - 1990s)

Quiney Wilson (Weir High, Class of 1999). This former Red Rider was a multi-sport standout, but it was on the football field where be earned his highest acclaim. Wilson rewrote Ohio Valley and West Virginia Class of the books as he helped lead the Red Riders to the 1998 West Virginia Class AA state championship. As a senior on the state championship squad, Wilson became the first Ohio Valley and West Virginia prep athlete to accumulate 3000 yards in a season. All told, Wilson rushed for 3,262 yards. He scored an Ohio Valley record 47 touchdowns and finished with 282 points, which is second best affeitine in the Ohio Valley, trailing only Jack Simons of New Cumberland, who scored 288 points in 1919.

Wilson, a four-year letterman, finished his peep cancer with 6,162 yards, but 5,624 of those came during his junior and senior seasons since he played primarily on defensive during his first.

Wilson, a four-year letterman, finished his prep cancer with 6.162 yards, but 5.624 of those came during his junior and senior seasons since he played primarily on defensive during his first two seasons. For his career, he scored 93 rouehdowns and 564 points, with all but seven 1Ts and 44 points came during his junior and senior seasons. Wilson took his play to another level when the postseason rolled around. He set all-time West Virginia records with 1.617 yards and 23 touchdowns in seven playoff games. Included is a single-game necord of 327 yards. In 1998 state title game against Dupont, Wilson ran for 250 yards and two scores. Wilson won nearly every postseason award imaginable. He was named Gaorades State Player of the Year and shared the Kernedy Award with Nitro's J.R. House after he finished fourth in the balloting as a junior. He was named lift-stead all-State twice and captained the All-Valley team and was twice named all-OviC. He also played baskethall at Weir High. After accepting a scholarship to West Virginia University, Wilson fought his way up the depth chart and through a medical redshirt before bursting onto the scene in a big way in 2003. He ran for 1,380 yards and 12 louchdowns en route to being named WVU's Offensive MVP and won the team's award for all-around excellence. Wilson played in 44 games at WVU, running for 2,608 yards and 20 TDs. He also caught 20 halls. Wilson was then selected in the seventh round as the 219th player taken by the Atlanta Faitons. He was released and eventually signed with the Cincinnati Hengals, with whom he spent parts of four seasons. He was also drafted in the inaugurat UH. Draft by the Florida Tuskers.



Ashley Battle (Athlete - 2000s)

At Linsly, she became the school's All-time leader in numerous statistical categories, including points (1,532), rebounds (823), assists (385) and steals (371).

She was named OVAC Class A Player of the Year four consecutive seasons and was a three-time at-listate pick in West Virginia.

After receiving countless recruiting letters. Battle eventually chose to continue her career at the University of Connecticut over the files of Duke. Penn State and Stanford.

At UConn, she poined with Dianna Taurasi and Maria Conlon and helped lead the Lady Huskies to three NCAA National Championships, including an undefeated season in 2003.

Battle was a standout on the defensive end of the floor as evidenced by the fact that she won the Big East Defensive Player of the Year award, but she also scored Lix00 career points.

Battle, who owns a degree in marketing and economics from UConn, was drafted by Seattle in the second round of the 2005 WNBA Draft. She then signed with the New York Liberty of the WNBA in 2006 and she also spent time playing for Seattle and San Antonio, All told, she appeared in 142 WNBA Games and averaged five points per game. She also played professionally in Spain in 2007 and 2008.

Overall, his Red Rider hoop teams won seven sectional titles, live regional crowns and made four state tournament appearances while also winning two OVAC championships (1962 and 1964).

At Follansbee High, Carey was a multi-sport athlete who went on to play three sports (football, basket-ball and baseball) at George Washington University before transferring and graduating from West Liberty State College.



Charles 'Red' Donley (Wellsburg High School, Class of 1941). An early pioneer of radio and television broadcasting in the Ohio Yalley, Donley got his start at WSTV-AM radio in 3946 where he served as play-by-play amounter for high school toothall and basketball games and was the station's sports director.

In 1954, when WTSV-TV Clannel 9 (now WTOV) went on the air, Donley became the sports director and soon thereafter, was selected to work with Joe Tucker on Pittsburgh Steelers' broadcasts, a position he held from 1955-62.

Ite also amounted house ricing a Wheeling Downs and Waterford Park from 1949-56. In 1964, he left to become sports director at Channel 11 in Pittsburgh, a position he held for 10 years. During his days in Pittsburgh, Donley won five "Golden Quill" awards for distinguished news coverage, including one for a documentary he wrote and narrated on the late Art Roomey and two others (on Roberto Clemente and Pie Traynor) that are in the Base-ball Hall of Faine.

In 1962, he was named to succeed legendary Ray Scott as play by play announcer for the University of Pinsburgh, Donley received the President's Media Award from what was then the College of Steubenville in 1989, received an honorary degree from 1efferson Technical College in 1987 and an honorary adaptate and gree effects in Technical College in 1987 and an honorary adaptate and prediction of the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club's Robert S, McKelvey Award in 1991; and was inducted into the Ohio AP Broadcasters Hall of Faine in 2010.

He also participated in many chantable projects including the United Way and Easter Seak and made countless appearances as a master of ceremonies at community events. His many contributions were recognized at a testimonal dinner in his honor back in 1979.

Gene Ammirante (Wheeling Central Catholic High School, Class of 1969), When you think of Ammirante, you think of two things—passion and success, During his 30-year career as head boys basketball coach at Bellaire High. "Coach A" displayed plenty of the former and anchieved plenny of the latter.

Ammirante began his coaching career in 1976 as an assistant to Mark Matz at Bellaire before beginning a successful run as head coach of the Big Reds.

He compiled an impressive 474-205 career record at Bellaire, the all-time best coaching record in boys basketball at the school. That included a 189-41 mark during the 1990s, an average of 19 wins per season during that 10-year span.

Bellaire High achieved Top 20 rankings in Ohio 15 times under Ammirante; won 14 Ohio Valley Athelic Conference champtonships. 14 sectional crowns, sw district titles and one regional championship as Bellaire earned its first ever-irg to the OHSAA Division III State Tournangent "Final Four" in 2003-304, tying the school record for win (22) before lossing to Versalles in double-over-nine in her seminals.

Gary Sprague (Needham (Mass.) High School, Class of 1964), He piloted the Linsly School basebatl program from 1974-2006, compiling an impressive 33-year record of 488-257-1, which ranks fourth all-time among Ohio Valley coaches. He led the Cadets to 13.0VAC Tournament championships - more fian any other conference coach (1982, '85, '86, '87, '89, '90, '91, '94, '95, '97, 2001, '03, '05, '06) and coached Earsly to five Eastern Ohio Baseball League titles (1987, '88, '80), '95 and '96).

Sprague was named OVAC "Coach of the Year in 1986 after guiding the Cadets to a 27-4 record and EOBL. "Coach of the Year" three times.

He coached six athletes who went on to play professional sports – Heath Haynes, Ron Stephens, Kevin Tutar, Mike Coss and Mark Seaver in baseball and Willie Clay in the NFL. He also coached a total of 13 first team all-state players including two captains; five OVAC "Player of the Year" winners and four West Virginia American Legion "Player of the Year" solections.

He also coached freshman football at Linsly

The arso contented freshman football at Lorsly.

Sprague received the Carl R. Hamill Award from the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club and was the recipient of the OVAC's Thomas E. Rataiczak Scorekcepen/Timer Award in 2009 after nearly three decades as the timer at Linsly basketball games.

Sprague graduated from West Virginia Wesleyan College in 1968.

Bill Tonini (Official)

Bill Tonini (Avella (Pa.) High School, Class of 1940), "Play ball." Considering the fact that his career as an umpire spanned an incredible seven decades, perhaps no one has uttered those words more than Tonini.

He spent a total of 52 years working countless baseball games throughout the Ohio Valley and beyond from 1957-2010 while also serving 30 years as a football official and 10 years as a basketball referee.

His expertise as an umpire, primarily behind home plate calling balls and strikes, earned Tonini numerous high school post-season assignments, including five state tournaments in Ohio and five in West Virginia, He also umpired more than 30 years of OVAC Tournament action.

ing five state fournaments in Ohio and five in West Virginia, He also umpired more than 30 years of OVAC Tournament action.

Tomini worked NCAA Division III College World Series games in Marietta a total of 10 times; several NCAA Division I games involving Ohio State and Ohio University; a host of American Legion games in the summer and three years in the minor leagues, including the Northwest League in Eugene, Oregon and Walla Walla, Washington.

He also was an instructor at Bill Barr's Umpire School in West Palm Beach, Florida.

Tonini is in the Western Pennsylvania Soccer Half of Fame and he received a special award from the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club.

A highly decorated World War II veteran who received commendations from both the United States and France, the 90-year old Tonini resides in Hamabal.

Eugene 'Eudie' Joseph (Athlete - 1940s)

Eugene "Eudie" Joseph (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1945). A three-sport AH-OVAC honorce in football, basketball and track, he was a major contributor to top-record Purple Rider football and basketball teams.

In basketball, playing for OVAC Hall of Finne Legend coach Floyd Baker, Joseph was a regular on teams which went 71-4 in three years including 21-2, with 20 straight wins, as a senior. He was a junior on a 26-1 record team which won the first OVAC Class AA tide in 1944. That team host is only game to eventual Obio champion Middletown, 38-34, in the state tournament semifinals, Joseph, along with teammate and OVAC Hall of Finner Ales Groza, were all-tournament selections. Joseph scored 421 points—second on the team to Groza's OV record total of 628 points. As a sophomore, Joseph was a member of a 24-1 record team.

In football, he was co-capitain of a 7-2-1 record team which won the first OVAC Class AA title and recorded eight shutouts. He earned All-Ohio UPI honors as well as Afl-OVAC and was a two-time All-Eastern Ohio selection at running back. Nicknamed the "Gliost" for his elusive style, he played on a 9-1 record team as a junior and Ferry was 22-6-1 in his three seasons.

In track, Joseph set an OVAC high hurdle record in the two-year-old meet as a junior and won the high jump, He didn't compete as a senior after being drafted for military duty.

After discharge, he enrolled at the University of Dayton and played four years of basketball with three as a starter on teams with school records of 24-8, 27-5 and 28-5. The last two years, the Flyers were romures up in the National Invitation Tournament and also were NCAA regional semifinalist in his senior year of 1952.

He spent his entire 37-syear professional career teaching and coaching at Linsly Military Institute where he was head coach of boys' basketball (1953-72) and track and assistant in football and also served as athletic director. His Cadet teams won three OVAC titles = 1971 basketball and 1961-62 in track. The top court records were 1









Art Hehr (Athlete - 1950s)

Art Hehr (Bridgeport High School, Class of 1959). He graduated as the winningest career wrestler in the OVAC, with two straight unbeaten seasons capped by Ohio titles in 1958 and 1959 after placing third in the state meet as a sophomore. He was captain of the 1959 Ohio state championship team—the first for an OVAC member, coached by OVAC Hall of Famer George Kovafick. He won his last two titles at 127 pounds after competing at 120 pounds as a sophomore. He also won three consecutive OVAC titles on conference championship teams. conference championship teams.

Conference championship teams.

He also competed in football and was a member of the Buildogs' first-ever unbeaten season in 1988 and the first Bridgeport team to defeat rival Martins Ferry in 1956. After serving in the U-S-Amy from 1959-62, he enrolled at West Liberty State where he was a member of the West Virginia Conference title teams in 1962 and 1963, also coached by Kovalick He was injured and couldn't compete for part of his college career.

After gradutation, he coached wrestling at Wheeling College and started the wrestling program at old Skyvue High School, He also coached Martins Ferry High to an OVAC title in 1968 as well as sectional and district crowns. He served as a wrestling official from 1970-86 and as athletic director at Skyvue for 28 years and Monroe Central two years plus three years as track coach at Skyvue. Hehr was inducted into the Bridgeport High School Sports Hall of Fame in 2011 and was the recipient of the OVAC Wrestling Coaches "Mr. Mat" award in 2012.

Dan Abramowicz (Athlete - 1960s)

Dan Abramowicz (Steubenville Catholic Central High School, Class of

Dan Abramowice: (Steubenville Catholic Central High School, Class of 1963). This glue-fingered wide receiver had to make believers out of countless doubters every step of his brilliant football career.

The Crusaders three-sport standout was deemed too slow and too small to make it in big-time college football. After he shredded that fallacy. Abramowicz did so even more emphatically on the professional level. After a sparkling career at Steubenville Central where he was honored as an all-OVAC and all-Ohio wide receiver, the college recruiters were nowhere to be found, turned off by his pedestrian-like 4.8 40-meter clocking. His lone college scholarship ofter came from Kavier University in Cincinnati.

Abramowicz made the most of that opportunity, and went on to enjoy a record-setting stay with the Musketeers.

Abramowicz established a host of Xavier receiving records during a brilliant four-year career,

Abramowicz established a host of Xavier receiving records during a brilliant four-year career, including 120 catches for L685 yards and 14 touchdowns.

His prodigious numbers f885 yards and 14 touchdowns.

His prodigious numbers resulted in him being tabbed by the New Orleans Saints in the 17th and final round of the 1967 NFL Draft. That 17th round pick turned out to be a gern for the Saints.

Abramowicz carved out a pro career that many first rounders would reliash.

He was instant impact in "The Big Easy," landing 50 passes for 721 yards and six touchdowns as he was one of the top contenders for NFL Rookie of the Year honors.

Two seasons later, Abramowicz led the league with 73 receptions. His biggest NFL achievement, however, was setting a league record for catching a pass in 104 consecutive games, which has since been broken. The Saints dealt Abramowicz to the Sain Francisco 49ers after the second game of the 1973 season for draft choices. After an adjustment period, he became a 49ers' starter the last 11 games, catching 35 passes for 442 yards and a TD. He retired after the 1974 season, a campaign which he grabbed 25 passes for San Francisco. Abramowicz put up some lofty numbers during his eight-year NFL career. He caught 369 passes for 5.686 yards and 39 TDs in 111 games.

Doug Swearingen (Athlete - 1970s)

Doug Swearingen Mann Ferry High School, Class of 1979). He was best known for his pitching prowess, but Swearingen was a multi-sport standout for the Purple Riders.

In addition to the diamond, Swearingen sparkled on the gridiron as well as the hardwood for Ferry. With that said, Swearingen remains one of the finest hurlers in Ohio Valley prep annals.

The crafty southpaw was a four-year baseball letterman for the Purple Riders. When not on the hill, Swearingen was a hard-hitting outfielder. He was a two-time all-Valley hontonere and was a first-team all-Ohio selection as a senior. There was no all-OVAC team back then.

Swearingen went 6:2 a senior, compiling a ministude 0.74 ERA. He fanned 130 batters in 62 innings. He was equally as potent at the plate, batting a robust 412 with eight doubles, three triples, one homer and 24 RBI. He lest the ultimate heartbreaker that spring, dropping a 1-0, 10-iming district final affair to Cadiz. He struck out 20 in a route-going effort.

Such an outstanding prep career had college baseball coaches covering the 6 ft, 2, 195-pound south-paw. He chose The Ohio State University, a decision he would not regret. Swearingen was a four-year lettermen for the Buckeyes. He compiled a sparkling 23-13 career mark with a 3.80 ERA. Swearingen was a superb 9-1 as a junior, losing only to Oklahoma in the NCAA Regional. He was second-team all-Big Ten that season, Swearingen finished his Scarlet & Gray career tied for 14th place for career mound wins, ninth in innings pitched (278) and 13th in strikeouts (224). He was the team's co-captain as a senior. as a senior

as a sentor.

He was drafted by the Seattle Mariners in the 23rd round. He pitched for four years in the minors, going 30-22 with a 3.36 ERA. Swearingen was also a member of the 1982 U.S. National Team which participated in South Korea. He posted a 3-1 record with a 2.25 ERA as the U.S. claimed the bronze medal.

A two-year in football and basketball letterman, he was a first-team all-OVAC defensive back as a senior and was chosen to play in the OVAC All-Star Football Game, but he opted to bypass the game due to his Ohio State baseball scholarship.

Chris Starr (Athlete - 1980s)

Chris Starr (Buckeye Trail High School, Class of 1986). You name the sport and this former Warrior shined en route to earning 12 varsity letters and eventu-

Chris Starr (Buckeye Trait High School, Class of 1986). Tou name the sport and this former Warrior shined en route to earning 12 varsity letters and eventually a scholarship to Michigan. While football and basketball were priorities for Starr, baseball was where he made his greatest impact.

Starr was a standout on the hill for the Warriors and earned first-team all-Ohio Class A, first-team all-Eastern District and first-team all-OVAC. He also played in the Ohio North-South All-Star Series.

During the summer months. Starr was a key contributor for the Maynard Post 666 American Legion squad which won two state titles and played in the American Legion World Series in 1986.

Starr earned a full baseball scholarship to play for the Wolverines in baseball. He played two seasons in Ann Arbor, winning a Big 10 championship in 1987. Due to injury, Starr eventually transferred to Muskingum College where he pitched for two years, earning all-Ohio Athletic Conference honors. He had 125 strikeouts in his two seasons with an ERA of 2.81 and was named a pre-season all-American, but tore his ACL in the first game of the season.

Continuing to overcome adversity, Starr was drafted in the 16th round of the Major League Baseball Draft by the Texas Rangers in 1991. He played three seasons of professional baseball. On the football field, Starr etched his name into Buckeye Trail history as the school's all-time leader in passing and rushing yards. He was an honorable mention all-Ohio pick, first-team all-OVAC and first-team all-Eastern District. He was chosen to play in the OVAC All-Star Football Game, but turned it down due to Legion baseball.

During basketball season, Starr also earned all-state accolades. He was named to the third-team as well as first-team all-OVAC and all-District 12 squads. All told, he scored 770 points, averaging 12 points a game. He grabbed 367 rebounds, passed out 154 assists and shot 45 percent from the field.

Joe Maroon (Athlete - 1950s)

Joe Maroon (St. John Central High School, Class of 1958). A four-year Irish letterman in football, basketball and baseball, he became the first St. John's gridder to earn first team All-Ohio football honors (as a defensive safety) and also was an All-Ohio baseball selection. A two-time All-ONC and All-Valley football honores, he was co-captain of the 1957 All-OV 'Big School' honor roll as a 5-foot-6, 150-pound two-way back. After earning second team All-OVAC honors as a sophomore, he helped the Irish record the school's first-ever perfect football season of 9-0 with an OVAC title as a junior under Coach Hen Healy in 1956. Then he posted major statistics in only seven games (6-1 record) in a senior season shortened by influenza.

As a senior, Martoon led the Irish in scoring and rushing in the seven-game season. He led Eastern Ohio with 107 points on 17 touchdowns and five conversion runs and also completed 16 of 35 passes for eight scores. He had eight TD runs between 50-80 yards; returned four kicks for TDs with a long of 78 yards; and had four-TD games against Wheeling Central, Mingo and Barnesville. On defense, he intercepted five passes and also punted.

A three-sport Irish team co-captain, he also was selected captain of the winning Ohio team in the annual Ohio-W, Va. All-Star game, He also was swarded the Coca-Cola Scholar-Athlete Award by the OVAC. gridder to earn first team All-Ohio football honors (as a defensive safety) and



Maroon attended Indiana University on a football scholarship and earned Academic All-America honors. He was a starting halfback in 1960 and averaged 5.3 yards a carry.

After receiving a medical degree from Indiana, he trained at Georgetown University and at Oxford University in England. Currently Viec-Chairman and Professor of Neurosurgery at the University of Pittsburgh, he is also the Team Neurosurgeon for the Pittsburgh Steelers. He also participates in numerous marathon races and triathlons. He was the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Man of the Year in 1987.

Richard 'Dick' Kerwood (Athlete - 1960s)

Richard "Dick" Kerwood (Bishop Donahue High School, Class of 1968). Some would have viewed it as a handicap; Kerwood used it as motivation. The Bishop Donahue star was born June 9, 1950 with just one arm. It never hindered him in life or athletics.

During his youth, he played basketball and baseball, excelling in both. He was also a pioneer in weightlifting. He bought a cast from set of weights while in grade school and used it passionately. The visionary strength training paid handsome dividends.

handsome dividends.

As a freshman at Bishop Donahue, Kerwood played football, basketball and baseball for Coach Turn O'Connell, lettering in all three sports.

During the next three years at the McMechen-based school, he opted to concentrate on just football and basketball. It proved a prudent decision.

The powerful 6 ft, 2, 190-pounder started on the gridiron his final three seasons as a center, middle labeling a proper production of the province of the powerful form.

During that time, he was accorded all-Valley, all-OVAC and all-State honors, named captain of the first two all-star squads.

Kerwood distinguished himself so much as a senior gridder that he earned honorable mention All-American plaudits. He was also invited to play in the OVAC All-Star Football Game.

His basketball career with the Bishops also took on all-star status. Kerwood was the team's center and gained all-OVAC and all-Valley honors. He was accorded the Sportsmanship Trophy at the West Virginia State Basketball Tournament as a senior.

Kerwood's sparkling prep play afforded him several college scholarship offers in both football and basketball. He opted to play football at Salem College, earning extensive playing time as a freshman. As fate would have it, Kerwood was tragically killed in an automobile accident shortly after his frosh grid season at Salem. frosh grid season at Salem,

Alex Welker (Athlete - 1970s)

Alex Welker (The Linsly School, Class of 1977). He is the Michael Phelps of

Alex Welker (The Linsly School, Class of 1977). He is the Michael Phelps of Ohio Valley swimmers.

Welker splashed his way to a career like none other in OVAC swimming annals. Simply put, Welker was unbeatable.

The Linsly star never lost a race in high school, including relays, so it is only fitting that he is the first swimmer to be inducted into the OVAC Hall of Fame. He entered Linsly as a sophomore and quickly established himself as an aquatic star. An exclamation point to his unblemished record was that he held an OVAC record in every event he competed in. He competed without ever shaving his body or tapering, methods use to lower resistance, yielding faster times.

Welker still holds school and OVAC records dating back to 1976. He earned the distinction of being named All-American as both a junior and senior.

His unparalleled swimming career proved a springboard to a scholarship from The Ohio State

named All-American as both a junior and senior.

His unparalleled swimming career proved a springboard to a scholarship from The Ohio State University, and Welker found more pool success in Columbus.

He was voted the Buckeyes' Freshman Swimmer of the Year, helping the Scarlet & Gray to a runner-up finish in the Big Ten. He was a two-time NCAA qualifier while establishing five Ohio State records. Welker, unfortunately, suffered a major shoulder injury during his sophemore seann, and many thought his swimming career was over. He proved the naysayers wrong as he earned "Comeback of the Year Award" while also setting a new Ohio State record in the 200-meter freestyle as a senior. He also set numerous records during his earlier years in AAU competition.

He also earned a piece of a world record, in 1975, he was a member of a 10-swimmer team that established a world mark in the 50-mile relay in Mount Vernon, Ohio, with Welker posting the fastest split,

Shawn Vincent (Athlete - 1980s)

Shawn Vincent [St. Clairsville High School, Class of 1987), Football was the name of the game for this Red Devils' icon.

You name the way to be involved in a football game and Vincent was the leader of a team that advanced to the OHSAA Division [II] state semifinals before falling to Chagrin Falk Kenston, 22-21.

Vincent triggered the Red Devils' attack at the quarterback spot, setting an Ohio Valley record for rushing yards from the position at 13-60 yards in 13 games. He also scored 150 points for a Red Devil squad which won the OVAC Class 3-A title. During the regular season, Vincent averaged 10.1 yards a carry and scored 20 touchdowns.

Vincent passed for 441 yards and four touchdowns during his senior companies.

20 rouchdowns.

Vincent passed for 441 yards and four touchdowns during his senior campaign.

All told, he scored 24 touchdowns. He was also a weapon as a punt and kick returner, accumulating 638 yards and three scores. On the defensive side of the ball. Vincent roamed in the secondary and had seven interceptions.

For his season, Vincent was an all-OVAC, all-Ohio and all-Valley selection.

Upon his graduation, he accepted a scholarship to play defensive back at the University of Akron. He started for the Zips for three seasons and in 1988 shared the top sophomore award. He still holds the school record with 265 interception return yards and his 13 career interceptions rank second in the Akron record book.

Vincent then signed a free-agent contract with the Pittsburgh Steelers, playing 10 games in 1991 and recording two interceptions.

Aside from his football prowess, Vincent lettered in basketball and track and field for the Red Devils. He was the track most valuable athlete and still holds the school long-jump record.









Amber Ellison (Athlete - 1990s)

Amber Ellison (Meadowbrook High School, Class of 1999). The ady Colts' basketball program is one of the most storied in the Ohio

Valley and Ellison is a major reason why
Ellison was a four-year letterwinner for the Lady Colts, twice earning first-team all-Ohio accolades en route to her honors and eventual

Inison was a four-year telerwinner for the Lady Colts, Iwice earning first-team all-Ohio accollades en route to her fionors and eventual basketball scholarship to Wheeling Jesuit University.

She's currently Meadowbrook's second all-time girls' leader in points (1.363) and rebounds (850) and the all-time leader in steals (506) and assists (472). Ellison also holds the Meadowbrook single-game record for 44 points, which she netted as a senior against John Marshall.

During that senior season, Ellison averaged 24.1 points and 14.6 rebounds per game en route to every first-team award imaginable. She was first-team all-Ohio in Division II. Eastern District Player of the Year; All-District 12; Player of the year in the East Central Ohio League and first-team all-OVAC. She was also chosen for the Ohio North-South and OVAC All-Star games.

As a junior, Ellison poured in 19 points, grabbed 10 rebounds, passed out 5.7 assists and snared 5.5 steals per game en route to first-team all-everything. She was also named honorable mention all-USA Today.

If basketball wasn't enough, Ellison is also one of the finest softball players to ever wear a Lady Colts' uniform. She batted better than .400 every year of her career. Ellison was a three-time all-Ohio softball selection and four-time all-district pick. She was player of the year, as ophonore, in the ECOL after batting 506 with seven home runs, seven triples and 37 RBL. All Wheeling Jesuit, Ellison scored 1.273 career pints, grabbed 521 rebounds, passed out 389 assists and made 218 steals and blocked 42 shots. A four year letterwinner, she was a two-year captain for the Lady Cardinals and was twice named to the all-WVLAC squad.

After her playing career at Jesuit, Ellison accepted a coaching position at Shenandoah where

After her playing career at Jesuit, Ellison accepted a coaching position at Shenandoah where she served as an assistant for a season before ascending to the head coaching job. She was with the Lady Zeps for three seasons, posting a 54-17 record while reaching three district tournaments. She also had brief coaching stints at Franklin Heights and Olentangy Orange.

Kenny Howell (Athlete - 2000s)

Kenny Howell (St. John Central High School, Class of 2000). It didn't matter the season or the sport for this former Irish standout. However, it was in track and field where Howell made his greatest

impact despite only participating in the sport for three years because he played baseball as a freshman.

After being encouraged to give track and field a try, Howell became the area's most decorated male thrower, shining in the discus and shot

Howell was a three-time all-Ohioan in the discus. He placed third in the state his first season in the circle and then captured the coveded Division III state championship in 1990. As a senior, Howell was undeleated until the state meet when he settled for silver despite a personal-best throw of 180 feet. That mark still stands as the best in Ohio Valley history. Along with his efforts in the state competition, Howell was a three-time OVAC

Champion in the platter event.

Howell placed fifth in the state shot put competition as a senior and was a two-time OVAC champion in the iron-ball event.

Howell also ran on high quality sprint relay teams for the Irish.

On the football field, Howell etched his name into St. John Central history as a three-year starter for squads which combined for a 25-6 record and qualified for the playoffs in 1999. after a 9-1 season.

Howell was the primary running back for the Irish, amassing 1,500 yards as a junior en route to second-team all-Ohio status. He was first-team all-stater as a senior when he ran for better than 1,300 yards and was twice named to the OVAC's first team. Howell was also a three-year starter for the Irish basketball program. After high school, Howell accepted a track scholarship to West Virginia University, but eventually transferred to The Ohio State University where he completed his career and degree. He now resides in Columbus and works in the construction business.

Thomas E. Rataiczak (OVAC Family)

Thomas E. Rataiczak (Bellaire High Schoot, Class of 1964). Succeeding the late Sam Mumley and his friend-to-all, get-it-done attitude as the guiding force of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference would not be an easy task, but it's one that Rataiczak has done with tremendous vision and class... and then some.

"Rat" has been the de facto head of the OVAC as Executive Secretary since 1999, and under his leadership, the bi-state conference has grown to an alf-time high of 50 member schools from Ohio and West Virginia.

During Rataiczak's watch, the Conference has grown by leaps and bounds in a variety of areas. Among them have been the formation of the OVAC Half of Fame and the OVAC Sports Museum thoth located in WesBanco Arena in Wheeling); instituting boys' and girls' basketball tournaments and expanding many of the other events, most notably the revised format of the track championships: creating an All-Conference Academic Feam in conjunction with Ohio University Eastern; the creation of an official OVAC website; standardizing all championship awards; developing a meet director's handbook; computerizing all financial accounts; providing countless SportsWorld speakers to the area for more than 600 school assemblies, raising more than \$250,000 to bring them in at no cost to the Conference; and placing the Conference on solid financial ground through a partnership with Scholastic Sports Marketing.

A retired Bellaire High School teacher, he served as a "Founding Father" and Director of

A retired Bellaire High School teacher, he served as a "Founding Father" and Director of the BHS Sports Foundation and has been chairman of the Bellaire Wall of Fame/Hall of Fame Committee for more than 20 years. Rataiczak has been the Big Reds' basketball Scorekeeper for 43 years, working at more than 1,700 consecutive varsity and junior varsity games. In fact, the OVAC's Scorekeeper/Timer Award presented annually at the OVAC All-Star Basketball Classic is named in his honor.

He has also served more than 30 years as the BHS record-keeper, publishing extensive media annually at the basketball classic is the control of the properties of the properties

Denver Williams (Cadiz High School, Class of 1996), When it comes to

peed, there have been very few, if any faster than Williams.

Regardless if it was on the track or on the football field, Williams was consistently running away from the opposition.

Williams was a four-year regular in both track and football for the Cardinals. On the oval, Williams wrote his name into Ohio Valley history in both the 100-meter and 200-meter dashes

He wasted little time in making a name for himself. He won the Division III state 200-meter dash title as a freshman in 1993. He proceeded to win

three more, making him one of just five athletes in state history to win the same event four straight years.

Williams didn't stop with the 200 titles. He added the Division III 100-meter crowns to his resume in both his junior and senior seasons. Williams ran his personal-best times of 10.55 and 21.50 to win the gold medals as a senior, and both still stand as alf-time OHSAA and Ohio Mellia, respectively.

and 21.50 to win the gold medals as a sentor, and both still stand as all-time OHSAA and Ohio Valley records.

On the football field, Williams also sparkled, earning first-team all-Ohio and all-liastern District twice. He owns the Cadiz school record for career rushing yards with 4,479,

After his prep career, Williams accepted a football scholarship to the University of Kentucky where he also ran track. He red-shirted as a freshman and then transferred to Youngstown State where he helped the Penguins win the NCAA Division 1-AA National Championship, All told, he lettered four years at YSU in football and three in track.

For the Penguins' track team, Williams was the 200 meter runner-up in the Mid-Continent Conference and was apart of school records in the indoor 4x400 and sprint medley.

Williams has now entered the coaching field, He's spent time at Ashland, Ohio Northern and Heidelberg. Currently, he's working as a football coach and track coach at Trinity College in Hartford, Conn.



The highly-regarded 'IT' is the fourth-winningest coach in Ohio Valley history behind Reno Saccoccia, Jay Circosta and the fellow Hall of Famer George Strager with a 35-year record of 235-134-2. He wound up only 35 wins off of the all-time West Virginia state record for football coaching victories (267).

His first hand coaching at the contraction of the second coaching with the second coaching at the second c

His first head coaching stint came at old Yorkville High where he spent three years (1968-70), guiding the Ductillities to an unbeaten season in 1970.

He then assumed the head coaching position as Wheeling Central (1971-80), and moved on to Wheeling Park for six seasons (1981-86). From there, it was back to his alma mater for a second stint, this time guiding the Maroon Knights from 1987-

He coached teams to seven Ohio Valley Athletic Conference championships (1974, 1976, 1978, 1979, 1990, 2000 and 2004) and four West Virginia state title. The Maroon Knights were Class AA state champs at the first "Super Six" event in Charleston in 1979 and they won the Class A crown in 2000, 2002 and 2004. The 2000 team set a school record for wins

(1.3-1). He also coached the West Virginia squad four times in the Rudy Mumley OVAC Charity All-Star Football Classic, Thomas was voted the West Virginia All-Sport "Coach of the Year" for 2004-05 and the OVAC All-Sport "Coach of the Year" in both 1980 and 2003, He was also The Intelligencer's "Coach of the Year" in 1979 and the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan "Man of the Year" in

He earned his bachelor's degree from West Liberty State College and a master's degree

from West Virginia University.

Thomas passed away in 2005 at the age of 60.

Don Zinni (Yorkville High School, Class of 1954). He began his offi-

Officials, remaining active until 1991.

He officialed at the district, regional and state level in the WVSSAC playoffs from 1975-09, working the 1977 Class AAA State Championship Game, and he worked games at the regional and state semifinal level in

Game.; and he worked games at the regional and state semifinal level in the OHSAA during that same time span.

Zinni officiated the Rudy Muntley OVAC All-Star Charity Football

Classic four times (three as referee and one as back judge) and worked the OHSFCA North-South All-Star Classic in Massillon in 1982.

A member of the OHSAA Football Advisory Committee for four years and a Past President and Rules Interpreter of the Ohio Valley Board of Football Officials, Zinni became OVAC Football Commissioner in 1995 and held that position until retiring in 2012 as the longest-tenured individual to serve in that capacity.

While serving as OVAC Football Commissioner, the affable Zinni expanded officiating crews from four men to five; expanded the officiating base to include several areas on both sides of the river including Wheeling, Weirton-Steubenville, Mason-Dixon, Parkersburg-Marietta, Columbiana County, Cambridge-Zanesville and Columbus; established rating of crews by coaches during the season and by the Commissioner after the season, served as a clearinghouse for schools seeking opponents for schedule openings; and assigned officials to

Zinni also spent several years in the coaching ranks. Aloi's coaching stay at East Liverpool began in 1986 and spanned 20

Adol's Coaching Stay at East Envergool began in 1780s and spanned 20 years, longer than any basketball coach in school history. He compiled a career record of 326-121, an impressive winning percentage of 73%.

His Potter-coached teams won four Ohio Valley Athletic Conference championships (1991, '94, '95 and '99); nine sectional titles: six district crowns and one regional championship with an OHSAA State "Final Four" Appearance in 1999. The '99 team finished with a 23-2 record, falling to Shaker Heights (71-63) in the Division total configuration.

He was selected Ohio Division I "Coach of the Year" in 1996 by the Ohio High School Basketball Association and 1999 by The Associated Press: was the District 5 Basketball Coaches Association "Coach of the Year" 11 times, Eastern District "Coach of the Year" seven times and received similar honors in Columbiana County numerous times.

He was previously inducted into the East Liverpool High School Athletic Hall of Fame, the Beaver County Sports Hall of Fame, the Midland High School Sports Hall of Fame and the District 5

Among Aloi's attributes were consistency, continuity and commitment, evident in the fact that he never missed an open gym, practice, scrimmage or game during his playing or coaching careers. He also started the popular "Potter Holiday Classic," a tournament known for quality competition, and conducted the "Little Potters Clinic" yearly for the district's elementary and middle school students free of charge.

As an athlete, Aloi was the leading scorer, MVP and team captain of Midland's 1962 unde-feated basketball team, earning All-WPIAL and All-State recognition. He then went to Bowling Green State University where he was a three-year starter and team co-captain, averaging 15 points per game. Aloi earned his bachelor's degree from Bowling Green and later obtained his master's degree from Duquesne University. He was drafted by the St. Louis Hawks of the NBA.

John Howell (Officials)

John Howell (Lancaster Fairfield Union High School, Class of 1967). When it comes to high school basketball officials, Howell is among the most recognized individuals throughout the Ohio Valley, After all, during a 38-year officiating career, he worked in practically every gymnasium out

Howell became a member of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials in 1972. He served as secretary of the board for 14 years; as a training class instructor for 14 years, as rules interpreter for 16 years and assigned junior varsity officials for 14 years.

He served as the OVAC's Assistant Basketball Commissioner from 1983-

He served as the OVAC's Assistant Basketball Commissioner from 198394 and became the Basketball Commissioner in 1995, a role he still has today.
Howell worked his first varsity basketball game in 1974 (Paden City vs. St. Marys) and his final appearance on the hardwood came March 11, 2009 in a West Virginia Class AA Regional game at Phillip Barbour High School.
Howell worked a total of 27 state tournaments: 14 Ohio boys (1987, '88, '90, '92, '94, '95, '96, '98, '99, 2000, '02, '04, '06, '08); 5 Ohio girls (90, 91, 93, 01, 03); 6 West Virginia boys (88, 91, 94, 97, 99, 03), and 2 West Virginia girls (83, 89). He also worked a total of 75 regional rournament games over the years.

In 1993, Howell worked a W. Va. boys' state semifinal game in Charleston with Mike Coyne in morning and then and Ohio girls' semifinal game in Columbus with Roger Levi later same day. He officiated the first three-man championship boys' game in Ohio in 1996 and the first 3-man championship boys' game in W. Va. in 1997.

Howell received a host of awards over the years, including NFIOA (National Federation of Interscholastic Officials Association) Official of the Year in West Virginia in 1992 and in Ohio in 1997; Ohio District 5 Official of the Year in 1991. Ohio District 12 Official of the Year in 1992; West Virginia Officials of the Year in 1994 and was the 2013 recipient of the OVAC's Robert Dawson Officials' Award. He was inducted into the OHSAA Officials Hall of Fame in 2003.

He scored 1,700 career points in four seasons and he also set the all-time Trojan singlegame record of 54 points, including 25 goals, in a 101-17 rout of Cameron, He earned first team, one-class All-State as a senior and was twice a first team All-OVAC largest Class AA honoree. He also was the first state High School Player of the Vear honorer in selections made from 1948-60 by the


















In addition to basketball. Howell has worked as a track official since 1972, serving in various



team All-OVAC largest Class AA honoree. He also was the first state High School Player of the Year honoree in selections made from 1948-60 by the Tri-State Independent Tournament held in Sistersville.

Moore led the Trojans to records of 15-2 in 1948 and 19-3 in 1946 when the team advanced to the W.Va. region finals.

He earned a scholarship to West Virginia University where he played on three varsity teams with a combined 60-20 record, including a Southern Conference regular season and tournament championship. Moore's 84 percent career free throw percentage ranks No. 2 all-time at WVU. He averaged 12-8 points a game as a senior and was selected honorable mention All-America. He also was chosen in the sixth round of the 1952 NBA Draft by the Syracuse Nationals. He served in the Army infantry from 1953-55 and was selected to play in the 1954 armed forces Pan-American Games in Mexico and International Games in Germany. In 2007, he was inducted into the West Virginia University Sports Hall of Fame.

Ron 'Cy' Godfrey (Athlete - 1950s)



Ken Vargo (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1952), A three-sport, four-year Purple Rider athlete who was team captain in football and basketball as a senior and a track team member, A 6-foot, 184-pound center-linebacker in football, he canned first team Associated Press All-Ohio defense as a senior and was selected captain of the All-OVAC, and All-Valley "Big School" honor rolls, The 1951 All-Valley selections were the first ones selecting Big and Small School teams, Vargo, a 48-minute player, also was a two-time All-liastern Ohio selection at center.

He earned a scholarship to Ohio State University where he became a threeyear regular at center and Buckeye co-captain as a senior when he earned
first (cam All-Big Ten Conference with two teammates in the College Football Hall of Fame—
Heisman Trophy winner Howard (Hopalong) Cassaday and Outland Trophy winner Jim Parker.
Vargo played in the 1956 Hula Bowl.

As a junior, he was a regular on a 10-0 record team which won the Rose Bowl, 20-7 over USC

As a juntor, he was a regular on a 10-7 record team which won the Rose Bowl, 20-7 over USC and was named the AP National Champions.

Vargo was drafted in the ninth round by the Chicago Bears of the National Football League, but opted to play in Canada with the Ottawa Rough Riders where he was Canadian Football League All-star Incabacker in his 1956 rookie season.

After his playing career, he remained in Canada and resides in Ottawa.

Jim Brown (Athlete - 1960s)

Jim Brown (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1961). A two-sport Purple Rider standout, he is the first OVAC athlete honored primarily for golf. In the OVAC all-class tournament, he improved each year to place fourth, third, second and first his four years. He also won three OVAC Ohio-side titles. He won three Ohio district crowns after placing second as a freshman. In the Ohio state tournament, he improved each season - 11th, 8th, 6th and 4th as a senior. His career match record was 43-4, including 13-1 as a senior after marks of 9-2, 11-0 and 10-1. He was medalist in 39 of 47 career matches.

In basketball, the 5-foot-11 guard was a two-time All-OVAC Class AAA choice, twice All-Eastern Ohio (co-captain as senior) and All-Ohio second and third team in two wire service selections. He was co-captain in the Ohio Norrth-South All-Star Game.

He earned a scholarship to play golf and basketball at Ohio State and became OSU's No 1 golfer, and senior team captain, and a three-year varsity basketball letterman.

After six years coaching at Rollins College in Florida and Kent State, he returned in 1973 to become Ohio State's ninth golf coach, the remained for 36 seasons as the longest tenned coach in any sport at OSU. His teams won 17 Big Ten titles and the 1979 NCAA championship among 11 NCAA Top 10 finishes and 31 appearances. A three-time Big Ten Coach of the Year, he won national honors in 1979 and 1986. He has been inducted into the Golf Coaches of America Hall of Fame, Brown splits Coaches of America Hall of Fame and the Ohio State Athletics Hall of Fame. Brown splits retirement time between Columbus and Florida

Rhonda Noble (Athlete - 1970s)

Rhonda Noble (St. Clairsville High School, Class of 1979). She was one of the first three-sport female athletes in Ohio Valley annals. She was also one of the best.

was asso one of the best.

Noble not only starred in volleyball, basketball and softball for the
Lady Red Devils, but she was also just as impressive in the realm of
academics. Noble's many talents helped elevate the Lady Red Devils to team success.

As a senior, she led St. C.'s volleyball team to the regional tourna-

ment. It was a milestone achievement as it marked the first time an Eastern Ohio team ever advanced to the Sweet 16. The Lady Red Devils were also crowned OVAC champions that season. She was named the team's MVP and was chosen to play in the OVAC All-Star Game. In softball, she was a three-year letterwinner and was again

in the OVAC All-Star Game, In softball, she was a three-year letterwinner and was again named MVP as a senior.

Her St. C. career featured 10 athletic letters and being voted the school's female athlete of the year for 1978-79. She was also a member of the St. Clairsville National Honor Society. She was inducted into the St. Clairsville High School Athletic Hall of Fame in 2008. After receiving her St. C. diploma, Noble went from one hilltop to another. She chose West Liberry State College to continue her athletic and cademic pursuit and she was a rare three-sport performer in college. She was an impact performer early on for the Lady Hilltoppers' volleyball program. She was named all-WVIAC as a sophomore, junior and senior. She helped lead WLSC to the conference crown in 1981. All-conference honors and Noble became synonymous. She earned all-WVIAC plaudits in basketball as a senior and as a junior and senior in softball. She was inducted into the West Liberry University Hall of Fame in 2000. She returned as West Liberry's head volleyball coach from 1986-1995. During that tenure, she was twice (1987 & 1981) voted WVIAC Volleyball Coach of the Year. Larry Marmie (Athlete - 1960s)

Larry Marmie (Barnesville High School, Class of 1960). An All-Ohio quarterback for the Shantrocks, he also earned All-OVAC honors in football

quarterback for the Sharthrocks, he also carried AIT-VAC indices in rootoout and AII-Eastsern Ohio honors in basketball and football as a senior, He also was selected AII-Valley "Small School" first team quarterback.

Playing for coach Bob (Smokey) Wion on a 7-2 record team as a senior in 1959, Marrine was selected to the UPI AII-Ohio Class AA team and played in the 1960 Ohio-West Virginia AII-Star game. The 1959 Shamrocks averaged 30.4 points a game with Marrine rushing for 626 yards and passing for 566 words in a platanced artisek. yards in a balanced attack.

In 1960, he walked on at Ohio State University and was a member of the

freshman team before transferring for his final three years at Eastern Kentucky University. A four-year starter at quarterback, he was team captain and MVP as a senior and set seven school

After five college assistant coaching jobs, he joined Arizona State as defensive coordinator in 1985 and became head coach for four years from 1988-91. After stops at Tennessee and UCLA, he joined the professional coaching ranks from 1996-2003 with the Arizona Cardinals. He then joined the St. Louis Rams (2004-05) and Seattle Seahawks (2006-09). Last season was his 47th year in coaching.

He currently resides in California.

Peri Powell (Athlete - 1970s)

Peri Powell (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1979). She distinguished herself as a superb college softball player. Unfortunately for Powell, her high

herself as a superb college softball player. Unfortunately for Powell, her high school did not field a prep softball team.

That didn't stop her, however, from being an exceptional athlete for the Purple Riders, lettering in three sports.

Powell still rates as one of the finest basketball players, male or female, in Martins Ferry history. She poured in 1.404 points in her prep career. In the process, the dynamite guard was accorded all-Ohio honors as a junior and senior, She was also honored as OVAC Player of the Year as a senior and was captain of the All-Valley team that same year.

Powell displayed her versatility by lettering four years in volleyball for the Ferrians while also lettering three years in track and field.

Softball came to the forefront at the next level, as Powell earned a full scholarship to the College.

Softball came to the forefront at the next level, as Powell earned a full scholarship to the College of Steubenville. As fate would have it, the college did away with the program after two years. Powell remained undamnted, however. She simply took her vast softball skills to West Liberry State College. It was a move that paid quick, albeit, short dividends. Powell earned first-team all WVIAC accolades in softball for the Lady Hilltoppers. She opted, however, to leave West Liberry. It was not the end of her collegiate exploits, as she decided to ply her trade at Wheeling College (now Jesuit University). She scripted a brilliant two-year career with the Lady Cardinals. She gained all-WVIAC honors both seasons and was named conference player of the year as a senior. She batted 437 that year. Powelf played in the NAIA national tournament in San Antonio, Texas. Powell was voted NAIA All-American, the first Lady Cardinal arhlete to ever gain that distinction. Wheeling College retired her softball jersey in 1987.

Alter her playing days, Powelf distinguished herself in the coaching ranks. She served as Wheeling College head softball coach for two years, being named the WVIAC Coach of the Year, only to have the college discontinue the program. Powell currently serves as assistant softball coach at Martins Ferry.

Mark Emmerling (Athlete - 1980s)

Mark Emmerling (East Liverpool High School, Class of 1989). Wrestling

Mark Emmerling (tast Liverpool High School, Class of 1989). Wrestling and Emmerling are synonymous.

The is the unquestioned greatest grappler the Columbiana County-based school has ever produced. Moreover, he is one of the most successful in Ohio Valley Athletic Conference annals.

Emmerling reached rarified air in January of 1989. That is when the talented and gritty Potter became only the second wrestler to win four OVAC mat championships, the other being legendary Hall of Famer Bobby Douglas. Emmerling established an East Liverpool school record, chalking up 135 career wrestling victories. He also owns Potter school records for most high school fournament places (24), most pins (100) and most duaf-match victories (92). His fourth OVAC Tournament title also brought him the covered David Bierkortte Award.

most high school fournament places (24), most pins (100) and most dual-match victories (92). His fourth OVAC Tournament title also brought him the coveted David Bierkortte Award, emblematic as the tourney's MVP. Emmerling captured three sectional championships, three district crowns and a regional crown. His state tournament hopes were dashed by injuries as a junior and senior. His mat success was widely embraced by the East Liverpool community. He received the Lou Venditif Award as the school outstanding westler while also being honored by the city's mayor with "Mark Emmerling Day" on Feb. 6, 1989.

His prep prowess led him to West Virginia University where he earned two mat letters for the Mountainers.

He also performed well in cross country, earning four letters for the Potters, and excelled in the classroom, being inducted in the school's National Honor Society.









Blaine Rose (Athlete - 1980s)

Blaine Rose (Stanton High School, Class of 1984). In its heyday, Stanton boasted some of the premier athletes in the Ohio Valley, but none were better than Rose. He was a three sport standout, who possessed decathlete like talents in track while also skilled enough to earn

sessed decathlete-like talents in track while also skilled enough to early a Division I football scholarship.

Rose could virtually do it all, whether on the gridiron, basketball court or in the track arena. When the dust settled on his success-laden prep career. Rose opted to continue his athletic and academic career at the University of Maryland, where he enjoyed a superb football career. The 6 ft. 5, 210-pounder was Stanton's only three-sports all-Valley first-team selection. He was also selected by The Intelligencer as the 1983-84 Ohio Valley

All-Sports athlete of the year.

Rose was a three-year starter in football, starring as a tight end and defensive end. He was selected as captain of the all-Valley Small School team as a senior, a season in which he collected more than 100 tack es and caught 23 passes for four touchdowns in a groundoriented offense.

Ben Taylor (Athlete - 1990s)

Ben Taylor (Bellaire High School, Class of 1997), There's tough and then there's the way this Big Reds' all-Ohioan played throughout

It didn't matter what side of the ball, Taylor was heavily involved in the success of the Big Reds' football program in the mid 1990s. During Taylor's career, in which he earned three letters, the Big Reds compiled a 35-3 record.

Two of those three losses came in the Ohio Division IV State Championship Game. During those seasons, Taylor saw time at line-backer, safety and wide receiver for Coach John Magistro's squad. Taylor, who was a first team all Ohioan and a "Mr. Football" finalists as a senior, finished his career with 348 tack-les and 12 interceptions on defense. He was also a mainstay in the passing game, catching 130 passes for 1.679 yards and 12 touchdowns in his career. He was also an outstanding punter. He also owns the Bellaire single-season record for receptions in a season (70) and career. His career tackle number ranks third in Bellaire history and his 192 tackles in a season ranks second, this receiving yardage is fourth, Taylor was chosen for the Ohio North-South All-Star Game and was chosen as a team captain. He also took part in the OVAC All-Star Game and captained that squad.

All-Star Game and captained that squad.

He landed a scholarship at Virginia Tech and shined for four years. The Hokies were 39-9 during Taylor's career in Blacksburg. En route to being named a semifinalist for the Butkus Award, which goes to the nation's premier collegiate linebacker. Taylor recorded 318 tackles and seven career sacks. He was twice named all-American and all-Big East. After finishing the regular season undefeated in 1999. Taylor and the Hokies (who had Michael Vick at quarterback) played in the Sugar Bowl for the BCS National Championship against Florida State. The Hokies lost, 46-29. Taylor was chosen for the East-West Shrine Game after the 2001 season. He was then drafted in 2002 by the Cleveland Browns in the fourth round. He spent four seasons at linebacker with the Browns and then signed with the Green Bay Packers in 2006, but injuries ended his professional playing career. All told, he recorded 218 career tackles in the NFL and had one interception.

Along with Taylor's football abilities, he was a member of two OVAC Championship basketball teams coached by OVAC Hall of Famer Gene Ammirante. The 1997 Big Reds' hoop squad won the district title. Taylor also played baseball early in his prep career and then ran track as a sprinter.

Taylor was inducted to the Bellaire High School Hall of Fame in 2005.



Bethany Piccolini (St. Clairsville High School, Class of 2001), It didn't matter the sport, this Lady Red Devils' product shined. A mainstay in basketball and a state champion in track and field, it was in volleyball where Piccolini really left her mark on the Lady Red Devils' athletic program.

Piccolini was a four-year letterwinner for the Lady Red Devils, earning the team's Most Valuable Player honor both as a junior and senior. Leading the Lady Devils in nearly every statistical category, Piccolini was named first-team all-Ohio as a senior. On top of the honor, Piccolini was named the District 12 Player of the Year and was a first team all-OVAC selection. She also captained the inaugural all-Times Leader team as a senior. As a junior, Piccolini earned first-team District 12, all-OVAC first team and honorable mention all-Ohio.

Her prowess in volleyball earned her a scholarship to Eastern Michigan University where she was a four-year letterwinner. She ranks 13th in EMU career rankings in both kills and attempts and is eighth in block assists. Her hitting percentage of 778 ranks third and she once had 10 blocks in a match, which is tied for 11th.

In track, Piccolini utilized her jumping ability as a high and long jumper. She won the Division II

match, which is tied for 11th.

In track, Piccolini utilized her jumping ability as a high and long jumper. She won the Division II state title in both events. She was a long jump champion as a junior and finished second that season in the high jump, Piccolini's all-time best high jump of 5 ft. 9 is still the Division II, Region 7 record as well as the best-ever in the Ohio Valley, As a senior, Piccolini brought home the state gold in the high jump, clearing 5 ft. 7. Her mark of 18 ft. 1/2 in., which ranks third all-time in the Ohio Valley, was good enough for third place. She also qualified to the state meet in the 400 once and ran on sprint relays for the Lady Red Devils that also qualified for the state meet. Piccolini was also a five-time OVAC champion. She was chosen to take part in the prestigious Midwest Meet of Champions, placing second in the long jump, fourth in the high jump and sixth in the 400.

On the basketball court, Piccolini scored more than 1,000 points in her career and earned first-team all-Ohio as a senior when she scored 18 points a game. She was first-team all-OVAC as a senior and she was also chosen for the OVAC All-Star Game. She was twice named team MVP.

While at EMU, Piccolini joined the Eagles' track team and finished fifth in the Mid-American

While at EMU, Piccolini joined the Eagles' track team and finished fifth in the Mid-American Confurence Outdoor Championship Meet in the high jump. Piccolini graduated from Eastern Michigan in 2006 with a degree in Sports Medicine-Exercise Science. She then earned a doctorate of Physical Therapy from Wheeling Jesuit University in 2008.

Jedidiah Stephen (Athlete - 2000s)

Jedidiah Stephen (Shenandoah High School, Class of 2002). There isn't a sport you can name that this former Zep didn't shine in during his high school career. While earning all-Ohio in football and basketball, it was on the baseball diamond where Stephen experienced his greatest success.

A four-year starter for the Zeps, Stephen was one of the finest hitters the Ohio Valley has ever seen. He led the Zeps in hitting as a senior at 541, which still stands as the school's all-time best. For his career, Stephen batted 475, He also had significant pop in his bat as evidenced by the 12 home runs he hit as a senior, which ranked second in Ohio that season.

Stephen made an impact early in his baseball career, leading the Zeps in home runs (6) and average (.474) as a freshman. He was named to the all-Eastern District team three times and earned first-team all-Ohio as a senior. Along with that, he was named all-OVAC and all-PVC numerous times during his career. As a senior, he was named OVAC Class AAA Player of the Year and was chosen for the Mizuno All-Star Team. He was a four-time recipient of the "Golden Bat Award."

Stephen signed a baseball scholarship with The Ohio State University and made an instant impact. A four-year letterman, he started 195 games at third base and shortstop and batted .286 for his career. He had 135 hits, 18 home runs, 95 RBI, scored 83 runs and drew 40 walks. A multiple-time all-Academic Bit of the respection he was named second team all-conference as senior. He time all-Academic Big Ten selection, he was named second team all-conference as a senior. He had a brief stint as a professional. He was drafted in the eighth round of the Major League Baseball Draft by the Baltimore Orioles.

Before settling strictly on baseball, Stephen was a four-year letterman in football. An outstanding punter and defensive back, Stephen had a brilliant senior season at quarterback, earning first-team all-Ohio, all-OVAC, all-PVC and an invitation to both the North-South and OVAC All-Star Games. He finished his prep career with 4,110 yards and 42 touchdowns passing. He ran for 1,992 yards and 32 touchdowns. On the defensive side, he picked off 19 passes.

On the basketball court, Stephen helped guide the Zeps to a 50-17 record during his career. He filled it up for 25 points a game as a senior and finished his career with 1,278 points. He scored 549 of those during his final campaign, including a single-game high of 55. Stephen was a first-team all-Ohioan as a senior and earned Ohio Division III State Player of the Year honors to go along with Eastern District Player of the Year, all-OVAC and all-PVC. Scholastic Sports Marketing, LLC began its association with the OVAC in the 2005-06 school year, overseeing marketing and promotions for the conference, Companion has secured local, regional and

tions for the conference. Companion has secured local, regional and national sponsorships (among them the likes of McDonald's, Huntington Bank and Subway Restaurants) and not only acquires the sponsors, but makes sure that the bills are paid.

Thanks to SSM, more than \$750,000 has been generated to help make the Conference run, including more than \$218,000 return to the schools through the basketball playoffs over the past seven year and more than \$42,000 to provide certified trainers at every Conference-run event. SSM has also served as the marketing arm for the West Virginia "Super Six" State Football Championships since 2008 and, along with WTOV-TV9, directs the "OVAC Kickoff Night" each year. Prior to forming Scholastic Sports Marketing, LLC, Companion performed marketing and prontotion duties at both Davidson College and the University of South Carolina; served as an associate commissioner of the Big South Conference; and served on national Association of Collegiate Marketing Administrators (NACMA) Board.

Bob Roe (Coaches)

Bob Roe (Warwood High School, Class of 1925). He did it all in the athletic realm: a talented athlete: a multi-sport coach who succeeded at both the high school and college level; and even an official.

At the time he retired from high school coaching in 1965 to take the West Liberty State College job, Roe was the winningest football coach in OVAC history with a 182-122-31 record. He coached at Warwood High for 10 years (1931-40) and then at Wheeling High for 24 seasons (1941-64). He was the winning co-coach (with Irwin Howell) of the first West Virginia-Ohio All-Star Football Game in 1940, beating Ohio 13-7. He later served as the All-Star Game Director from 1946-62.

served as the All-Star Game Director from 1946-62

served as the All-Star Game Dricctor from 1946-62.

He also led the Wheeling boys' track squad to three straight OVAC titles (1944-46) and a rare one-class W. Va. state championship in 1946 (this teams were runner-up in 1943 and "44).

At West Liberty, he coached the Hilltoppers for nine seasons including an unbeaten season in 1970 and into the NAIA playoffs in 1970 and "71 as West Virginia Conference champions. His WL coaching record was 50-24-7. He was twice named W.V.C. Coach of the Year.

Roe was also a basketball official for 20 years, serving three terms as president of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials.

As an athlete, he was a team captain of the Warwood High football team and a four-year varsity

As an athlete, he was a team capatil of the Warwood Fight Robust wall and a Robusty Survey performer at Bethany College.

Roe, who passed away in 1984, is a member of five other halfs of fame – West Virginia State Sports, City of Wheeling, Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan, West Liberty University and Bethany College. He was also the recipient of the OVAC Track Cal Giffin Award.

Paul Rickards (Athlete - 1940s)

Paul Rickards (Wheeling High School, Class of 1944). He was a threesport star who was labeled by Hall of Fame coach Bob Roc as the best football player he ever coached. The 6-foot-1, 190-pounder played center as a sophomore before becoming a running-passing quarterback-tailback-linebacker-punter for the Wildcats. He was the only two-time first team, one-class all-stater in 1942 and 1943 and was voted the top state passer for two years. As a senior, he completed 60 passes – a rare total at the time - for nine TDs and rushed for 10 scores. He also was the feam's top tackler, kick returner and punter. He earned nickname of "Pitching Paul"

because of passing in era or mostly running.

In basketball, he was a three-year regular and helped the Wildeas win the state one-class title as a junior when Wheeling capped 26-1 record by winning its final 21 games. He was first team All-OVAC on the first-ever selections and first team one-class all-state as a senior and second team as a junior

In track, he won a rare "double" in the one-class state meet, capturing the long jump and shot put for the state runner-up team. He also helped Wheeling win the first of three straight one-class OVAC crowns.

Recruited for football by Pitt, he was a four-year letterman who led the NCAA in passing yards as a freshman with a school-record 897 yards.

He also played one year in the NFL with the Los Angeles Rams. He passed away in 1999.

Bill Brubaker (OVAC Family)

Bill Brubaker (Mechanicsburg, Pa. High School, Class of 1974). Not only has Brubaker enjoyed an ultra-successful 34-year stint as head swimming coach at The Linsly School, he's been a driving force behind the con-tinued growth of the sport throughout the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference.

He has spent his entire high school coaching career at Linsly and has continued the school's amazing OVAC dominance in the pool. Brubaker's list of conference titles includes: combined titles (1981, '82, '83 and '84); boys titles (1985, '86, '87, '88, '89, '90, '91, '92, '99, 2003, '04, '5, '09, '10, '11, '12, '13); and girls titles (1990, '91, '93, '94, 2009, '11, '12, 13).

He has coached four All-American swimmers – Bert Hazlett, Jenny Loew, Therron Pappas and Kevin Rosepappa – and has coached a total of 31 Academic All-American State of the Color of th

1300. Theron Pappas and Kevin Rosepappa – and has coached a total of 31 Academic Arr-Americans, Brubaker serves as the meet director of the OVAC Swimming Championships and the event was renamed the Bill Brubaker Swimming Championships in 2013. For "Bru", swimming is a 365-day a year sport, everything from regular season high school meets to summer meets to AAU competitions.

As an athlete, Brubaker was a four-year letterman in swimming at Mechanicsburg High and a four-year letterman at West Virginia University. He served as team captain and won the John Law Award as the outstanding senior swimmer. After obtaining his Bachelor of Science degree in Education and Teaching from West Virginia University, he spent a year as an assistant coach with the Mountaineers' swim team and served one year as meet director of the Eastern Intercollegiate Swimming Championships. A teacher at Linsty since 1980, he serves as chair of the Social Studies Department. Studies Department.

Jim Potts (Buckhannon-Upshur High School, Class of 1964). Potts began teaching at Cameron in 1971 and he started the junior high wrestling program teaching at Cameron in 1971 and he started the junior high wrestling program there that year. He spent 31 years as head wrestling coach of the Dragons (1974-2005) and later returned as an assistant varsity coach for several years. Potts compiled an impressive 363-94-4 dual meet record, winning 87 tournament championships and finishing as runner-up on 36 oceasions. In OVAC competition, Potts-led mat squads amassed 15 OVAC Class A tournament championships (1984, '91, '92, '93, '94, '95, '96, '97, '98, '99, 2000, '01, '02, '03 and '05t, finishing as the overall second or third place finisher as well, His teams also won 15 OVAC Dual Meet championships. Potts was named OVAC Westling Coach of the Year a total of 15 times. His 1996 team won the first Bob Sandler Sportsmanship award.

Sandler Sportsmanship Award, In state competition, Cameron won four consecutive W.Va, Class AA/A championships (1991)

94) and finished as the runner-up three times. He was named West Virginia Class AA/A Coach of the Year five times (1989, '91, '92, '93 and '94). He received the OVAC's prestigious "Mr. Mat" award in 2008 for his dedication and service to

the sport of wrestling and was inducted into the West Virginia Chapter of the National Wrestling Hall of Fame in 2007.

He also served as head football coach at Cameron for 13 years, posting a 55-55 overall record including one appearance in the W. Va. Class A state semifinals. He coached W. Va. to a 22-14 win over Ohio in the OVAC All-Star Football Classic in 1989. Potts also spent time as the head track and baseball coach.

As an athlete, Potts competed in three sports (wrestling, football and baseball) at Buckhannon-Upshur where he was a member of the school's 1963 state championship football team and then played both football and baseball (a first team all-conference selection) at Glenville State College, earning his degree there in 1967.

Jack Prettyman (Officials)

Jack Prettyman (Moundsville High School, Class of 1958). One of the Jack Prettyman (Moundsville High School, Class of 1958). One of the best-known officials in the Ohio Valley, he retired in 2007 after working 43 years as a member of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Football Officials, spending two years as president, two years a vice-president and 10 years on the Executive Board; and 20 years as a member of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials, serving as president and vice-president.

He worked WVSSAC playoff games for 30 years, including the finals eight times, as well as the West Virginia North-South All-Star Game; and spent 20 years working OHSAA playoff games plus the Ohio North-South All-Star Game.

Prettyman officiated the Rudy Mumber (WACAD Star Chemistric Economy)

All-Star Game.

Prettyman officiated the Rudy Mumley OVAC All-Star Charity Football Classic five times and was the Honorary Referee at the game in 2008.

He officiated West Virginia Conference games for 30 years in basketball and 27 in football, including 20 years at the finals in basketball and eight years of playoffs in football; and he also worked games in the Fastern 8 and Atlantic 10 conferences for 25 years, including 10 years of playoff action.

Prettyman officiated thee years in the professional Indoor Football League, working the championship game in 2002.

A resident of Glen Dale, he received the Robert Dawson OVAC Basketball Officials Award in 2002; a Special Achievement Award from the Dapper Dan Club of the Upper Ohio Valley in 2008 and several service awards from various officiating organizations.

Mike Ingram (Athlete - 1950s)

Mike Ingram (Bellaire High School, Class of 1951). Nicknamed "The Tank" because of his physical play as a 5-foot-9, 220-pound fullback-linebacker, he was a three-sport Big Reds' stalwart in football, basketball and track. He led Bellaire to football records of 7-3, 9-0+1, 7-3 and 5-5. He was a two-time All-Eastern Ohio choice who was All-OVAC Class

AA first team, All-Valley second team, and AP All-Ohio second team as

a junior.

Recruited by Ohio State coach Woody Hayes, he was converted to an offensive guard-linebacker and became a three-year Buckeye starter and 1961 team co-captain for the 8-0-1 record Big Ten Conference champions which were ranked No. 2 in both wire service polls. The 8-2 record 1960 team

He earned first team All-Big Ten as a senior and played in the East-West Shrine game and Hula Bowl game. He was drafted by the NFL Washington Redskins and AFL Boston Patriots, but didn't play pro ball. He passed away in 1981,




























Jim Kerr (Athlete - 1950s)

Jim Kerr (St. Clairsville High School, Class of 1957) After playing quarterback as a junior, the first-year 6-foot, 180-pound running back led the Red Devils to a 7-0-2 record while leading the Ohio Valley in scoring with a school-record 150 points in nine games. He rushed for 1,298 yards (8.3 yards per carry) and landed six pass receptions for 81 yards.

As a defensive back, he had seven pass interceptions and the speed-ster also returned kicks (7 kickoffs for 323 yards and five punts for 133 yards). He earned All-Ohio, All-Valley, All-OVAC and All-Eastern

Ohio football honors and he also competed in track.

The multi-threat back earned a scholarship to Penn State where he was a three-year regular running back-defensive back and kick returner on teams with records of 7-3, 9-2 and 6-3-1. As a senior, he was the Nittany Lions' top rusher, pass receiver, kickoff returner and scorer. He scored three touchdowns against Army. In his last two seasons, Penn State won

the first two Liberty Bowls over Alabama and Oregon.

He was drafted by the Washington Redskins and was a regular safety in his only two seasons. As a rookie, he led the Redskins in pass interceptions (7) and kickoff returns (14 for 385 yards) before being slowed by a leg injury. He is deceased.

James 'Junior' Moore (Athlete - 1960s)

James "Junior" Moore (Wheeling High School, Class of 1969). He was a three-sport Wildcat all-star in football, basketball and baseball who earned a football scholarship to Wake Forest.

In football, the 5-foot-10, 170-pound running back-defensive back-kick returner was the OV's top Class AAA rusher with 1,142 yards on 189 carries with nine TDs plus 14 pass receptions for 181 yards and a score He was first team All-Valley, All-OVAC, All-Mountaineer League and All-City Offense and Defense while earning second team Class AAA All-State while placing sixth in voting for the Kennedy Award. He was second team All-Valley as a junior.

A two-year basketball letterman on top Wildcat teams, the left-handed point guard led the 1969 team in scoring (20 ppg), steals and assists as Wildcats went 19-1 in regular season to win the OVAC Class AAA crown and ranked No. 2 in the final state regular season poll. He earned first team Class AAA All-State, All-OVAC, All-Valley, All-City and All-Mountaineer League. As a junior, he was sixth man on a Wildcat team which advanced to the state Class AAA semifinals.

In baseball, he earned three letters as a first baseman-pitcher and started on the state one-class championship team as a junior. He earned second team one-class All-State twice and,

as a senior, was first team All-Valley while leading the Wildcats in hitting (.446).

At Wake Forest, he led the freshman team in rushing before earning three varsity letters and helping the Deacons, as a sophomore, win their first-ever Atlantic Coast Conference title. He was a running back, wide receiver, defensive back and kickoff-punt returner. He averaged over 20 yards per kickoff returns for his career and had an 89-yard TD return vs. Virginia Tech as a junior. Virginia Tech as a junior.

Gordon Gordon (Athlete - 1970s)

Gordon "Charley" Gordon (John Marshall High School, Class of 1977). He was nothing short of outstanding for the Monarchs in three sports — track, wrestling and football.

As a weightman in track for the powerful JM thinclads, Gordon established the all-time Ohio Valley discus mark on the strength of his 166-9 toss as a senior, a season in which he won the OVAC Class 3-A and West Virginia state discus championships. He was second in the state shot put event with a heave of 52-4. As a junior, he was OVAC and state discus runner-up to OVAC Hall of Famer John Leon of Brooke.

He oranghed for OVAC Hall of Fame Coach Bill Hiperardner and script

He grappled for OVAC Hall of Fame Coach Bill Hinegardner and scripted a senior season to remember. Gordon went undefeated, leading the Monarchs to the overall OVAC crown. He went on to cap his mat career with the W Va. Class AAA heavyweight title.

Gordon was also a standout on the football field, starting three years as an offensive line-

man and linebacker. He received all Mountaineer League and all-OVAC laurels as senior,

although the Monarchs won just one game.

The 6-2, 255-pounder received an offer to walk on to the WVU football program. The move paid off as Gordon earned a full scholarship while starting two seasons on the offen-

sive line and lettering three times.

His senior season of 1980 marked the inaugural campaign for Coach Don Nehlen and new Mountaineer Field. He was elected as a co-captain that season.

Mike Smith (Athlete - 1980s)

Mike Smith (Buckeye Trail High School, Class of 1983). He enjoyed both personal and team success as the first four-year basketball letterman

Mike Smith Buckeye 17al High School, Class of 1933). He enjoyed both personal and team success as the first four-year basketball letterman for the Warriors.

Individually, Smith finished a stellar hoops career with 2,188 points, which ranks 23rd all-time in the OHSAA record book.

He scored 25 points in his first varsity game as a freshman, finishing with 254 points that season. He then displayed remarkable consistency, scoring 625 as a sophomore; 643 as a junior and 666 as a senior for a four-year average of 22.8 points per game.

Smith was selected to the all-Ohio Class A first team three times, including being named the "Player of the Year" in 1983. He was also a three-time first team all-Eastern District and all-District 12 selection, named "Player of the Year" on both teams as a senior; and was a first team all-OVAC Class 2-A honoree. He played in the OVAC All-Star Basketball Classic and the Ohio North-South All-Star Game following his senior season. In addition to ranking as Trail's all-time leading scorer, he is also the leading rebounder with 643 and is third all-time in free throw percentage at 83.9 percent.

During Smith's career, Trail posted a sparkling record of 88-8 under the guidance of Coach Terry Leggett. The Smith-led Warriors won three sectional titles, three district crowns and one regional championship, making a state tournament appearance in 1983 with Smith scoring 33 points in that game. Trail also captured two OVAC crowns.

Smith continued to showcase his basketball talents at Rio Grande College, graduating in 1987 with a degree in business. A four-year letterman, he ranks ninth all-time on the Rio

1987 with a degree in business. A four-year letterman, he ranks ninth all-time on the Rio Grande scoring list with 1,741 points.

He was inducted into the District 12 Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame in 2010.



Alan Jack (Athlete - 1960s)

Alan Jack (Wintersville High School, Class of 1966). He was a three-year starter as a 6-foot, 205-pound fullback-linebacker on teams coached by OVAC Hall of Famer Bob Kettlewell that went 9-1, 8-1-1 and 9-1 with only one loss to Ohio Valley foes. The last two teams also won Big Eight

only one loss to Ohio Valley foes. The last two teams also won Big Eight League titles. He was a blocking fullback but, as a senior, he also rushed 115 times for 583 yards and scored 60 points.

His senior honors included All-OVAC Class AAA, All-Valley Big School, All-Eastern Ohio and All-Big Eight.

He earned a scholarship to Ohio State and, after playing on the freshman team, he became a three-year starter as a 6-foot, 220-pound offensive guard on teams with records of 6-3, 10-0 and 8-1. The unbeaten 1968 Big Ten Conference champion team defeated an OJ. Simpson-led Southern California team, 27-16 in the Rose Bowl and was crowned National Champion with a No.1 ranking in both national polls.

Jack was selected co-captain of the Buckeyes' 8-1 record 1969 team which was co-Big Ten Conference champion.

Rick Coles (Athlete - 1970s)

Rick Coles (Wheeling High, Class of 1971). He was a star for the Wild-cats in both football and basketball, earning a scholarship to West Virginia University in the latter.

The 6-3. 170-pound guard enjoyed a record-setting hoop career. He averaged 33.7 in the regular season as a senior, leading the Wildcats to a 21-3 record and OVAC championship honors. That squad also went on to win sectional and regional titles en route to a state tourney berth.

sectional and regional titles en route to a state tourney berth.

He tied the school's single-game scoring record, held by legendary Evertt Brinkman, with 54 points in a 147-88 conquest of Oak Glen. He also averaged an amazing 22 rebounds per game in his final campaign.

For his career, Coles netted 1,389 points, just 22 shy of Wheeling High's school standard. He was a two-time all-Valley "Big School", all-OVAC and all-W.Va. first team honoree. Coles was selected as state player of the year by the Morgantown Touchdown Club following his senior campaign.

Coles also strated on the original legislar three years while preferring a counterback.

nts sentor campaign.

Coles also starred on the gridiron, lettering three years while performing at quarterback, wide receiver and defensive back. As a senior, he ranked second in OVAC Class AAA passing yards with more than 1,100 yards.

Coles also used his versatility and athleticism on the Wildcats' track team, competing in

relays and as a high jumper.

At WVU, Coles was the second-leading scorer as the Mountaineers' freshman squad via his 14-point average. He earned a letter as a sophomore, playing in 22 games. As fate would have it, however, Coles suffered a broken leg in the pre-season of his junior year which limited his play over the next two years.

Basketball coaching icon Sam Andy called Coles one of the two best players he ever coached, the other being Hall of Famer Anthony Reed.

Stan Boroski (Athlete - 1980s)

Stan Boroski (Buckeye South High School, Class of 1981). He may be best known for his baseball career, but Boroski was a tremendous three-

best known for its baseoan career, but Boroski was a tremendous inteesport standout at Buckeye South. He earned all-Ohio honors in football, basketball and baseball for the Rebels.

Boroski quarterbacked South into the football post-season as a senior, becoming the first Ohio Valley school to play in the OHSAA grid playoffs. He, unfortunately, missed that game due to an injury incurred in the Buckeye North contest.

offs. He. unfortunately, missed that game due to an injury incurred in the Buckeye North contest.

As a junior, he was a hard-running tailback. He rushed for more than 1,200 yards and 15 TDs that season. He also booted four field goals, amassing 116 total points.

In hoops, Boroski finished as Buckeye South's fifth all-time leading scorer. As a senior, the Rebels got off to a 1-4 start while Boroski still nursed his football injury. Upon his return, South recled off 16 straight wins. He averaged 16 points a game in his senior season, after posting an 18-point average as a junior. The 6-2 forward was a three-year letterman for legendary coach Henry Laszasz.

In baseball, Boroski starged on the mound and at the plate for South.

man for regendary coach rienry Laszasz.

In baseball, Boroski starred on the mound and at the plate for South.

He batted .400 as a senior and nearly the same as a junior. He tossed a no-hitter as a senior.

Boroski led the Rebels to a pair of OVAC championships and two districts berths.

The talented right-hander also was a standout in Legion baseball, performing for Maynard.

In his final season for Post 666, be batted .327 while going 6-2 on the hill.

The Rayland native, who attended Ohio University earning a biology degree, played two

seasons in the Milwaukee Brewers' organization. He ended his professional playing days as a pitcher in the Kansas City Royals organization. His minor league career spawned a long and successful coaching career in professional baseball. Boroski spent 18 years coaching with the Houston Astros organization before being named bullpen coach for the Tampa Bay Rays on Dec. 17, 2009. He still holds that post today, overseeing one of the premier staffs in Major League Baseball.

Chad Brinker (Athlete - 1990s)

Chad Brinker (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1998), This Purple Rider legend shined in three sports during his four-year prep career, but it was in football where he really left a lasting mark.

eareer, but it was in football where he really left a lasting mark.

After lettering as a freshman, Brinker got his chance to be the Purple Riders' main tailback midway through his sophonuore season and clearly made the most of his opportunity. Brinker finished his prep career with 3,984 yards, which ranks second all-time at Ferry, and 51 touchdowns. The majority of his career yards came as a senior when he racked up 2,024 yards, After both his junior and senior seasons.

Brinker was named first-team all-Eastern District and first-team all-Ohio. As a senior, he



was the district's oftensive player of the year and also the district's nominee for Ohio's coveted Mr. Football Award. He was also named a USA Today All-American, Along with his state honors, Brinker was twice named first-team all-OVAC and all-Valley, serving as a co-captain both in 1996 and 1997. Brinker took part in the Rudy Mumley OVAC All-Star Charity Football Classic, but after rushing for 160 yards in the first half, he was injured and didn't play in the second half His success wasn't limited to the high school ranks. Brinker signed with Ohio University

and earned four letters for the Bobcats. He was twice named all MAC and was chosen to play in the 2002 Hula Bowl All-Star Game in Hawaii. Brinker finished his career with the Bobcats with 2,826 yards and 27 rushing touchdowns, which rank fifth and fourth on the O.U. career listing, respectively. Of his yards, he ran for 1,099 as a sentor. He put forth 10, O.U. career listing, respectively. Of his yards, he ran for 1,099 as a sentor. He put forth 10, 100-yard rushing games during his career. Brinker put forth those numbers despite missing four games as a junior because of an injury. Though he went undrafted, Brinker signed with the New York Jets in 2003 and played in the preseason before being released on the final cut. He scored two touchdowns that pre-season. He played in NFL Europe in 2004. Along with his football exploits, Brinker was an all-Ohioan in track and field. He finished seventh in the Division II 100-meter dash as a senior, running 11.27. He also lettered in basketball and baseball. He earned all-OVAC in hoops.

Since graduating from Ohio University with a degree in exercise science, Brinker served as a radio color analyst for Bobcats' football games, served as an assistant coach at Westerville Central and since 2010 has worked in the player personnel department with the Green Bay Packers. He received a Super Bowl ring after the Packers defeated the Steelers in 2010.

David Bertolino (Athlete - 2000s)

David Bertolino (Buckeye Local High School, Class of 2003), This Panther product was a one-sport athlete, but was one of the best wrestlers to ever grace the mats in the Ohio Valley.

Bertolino was a four-year regular at Buckeye, but really blossomed as a junior and senior. He won the individual championship at the OVAC Tournament in both seasons.

He was a state qualifier as a junior and came back as a man on a mission the following season. During his senior season, Bertolino put forth an unblemished 44-0 record and won the 160-pound Division II state championship in the process.

Hertolino finished his prep career with a strong 154-22 record and was named the 2003 Eastern District Wrestler of the Year. Bertolino didn't hang up the prep singlet immediately after receiving his OHSAA gold medal. He went to the National High School Senior Coaches Association Championship Tournament and placed third, earning all-American honors at 160 pounds;

Prior to his senior season, Bertolino was the gold medalist at the National Open Wrestling Championship and then won the gold at the AAU Junior Olympics.

He wrestled for four years at Iowa State University, three of those seasons were spent under Bridgeport High graduate and OVAC Hall of Famer Bobby Douglas.

During his senior season, Bertolino earned NCAA All-American by virtue of finishing in the top eight at 197 pounds in his only trip to the national tournament.

the top eight at 197 pounds in his only trip to the national fournament.

All told, Bertolino finished his collegiate career with a 68-41 record.

Following his collegiate career, Bertolino attempted to qualify to the United States
Olympic Team for the 2012 games in London, He spent more than a year at the United States Olympic Training Center in Colorado training.

Karrie Hutchins (Athlete - 2000s)

Karrie Hutchins (Wheeling Park High School, Class of 2001). This former Patriot helped officially put Wheeling Park soccer on the map locally and around the state of West Virginia during her splendid prep

Hutchins was a defensive standout and unquestioned leader of the Lady Patriots, which resulted in her twice being named the West Virginia Gatorade Player of the Year (2000 and 2001).

With Hutchins playing a key role, the Patriots claimed three straight West Virginia Class AAA state titles and four straight big-school OVAC crowns.

Along with those honors, she was a three-time first-team all-state selection and four-time all-OVAC pick. She was named OVAC Player of the Year as a junior and senior. Hutchins was inducted to the Wheeling Park High School Hall of Fame in 2007.

After her prep career. Hutchins played at West Virginia University where she became the first Mountain State native to start for the Mountaineers' women's program. Hutchins started 45 of 49 career matches as a defensive player and during her career, the Mountaineers projected 30 shutches.

Mountaineers posted 30 shutouts.

During the 2003 season, with Hutchins playing a key role, the Mountaineers advanced to the Sweet 16 in the NCAA Tournament, The season prior, WVU was the Big East Mid-Atlantic champion.

She was named a team captain for the 2005 season, but her career came to an end due to

injury in the second match of that season.

Hutchins was also a standout in the classroom at Park and WVU. She was presented the Red Brown Cup in 2006, which goes to WVU's most outstanding all-around student-athlete in terms of athletic, academic and civic achievement. She also earned CoSIDA Academic All-District team in 2005 as well as the WVU Foundation Outstanding Senior and was a four time Big East academic all star

Hutchins graduated with a degree in business administration and completed a Master of Professional Accountancy at WVU.

Eddie Drummond (Athlete - 1990s)

Eddie Drummond (The Linsly School, Class of 1998). Speed was the name of the game for this former Cadet, Nittany Lion and NFL Pro Bowler, Drummond was one of the fastest athletes to ever participate in the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference

the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference.

While he excelled in track and field, it was in football where Drummond truly left his mark with the Cadets, leading them to a 29-11 mark during his four years in the Orange & Black, Drummond ran for 3,918 yards and 55 touchdowns during his career. He finished with 70 TDs total and scored 424 points. He also closed his career with 5,729 all-purpose yards in 40 games, During his jumior season, in which Linsly finished 10-0. Drummond ran for 1,383 yards, which was his career high. The 168 points he scored that season ranked fifth in the state of West Virginia, Drummond was named Ohio Valley Player of the Year following that season. He was three times named all-OVAC and twice named to the first-team all-state unit in West Virginia, As a junior, he was named as a defensive back and as a running back as a senior. He was the runner-up for the Kennedy Award, which goes to the Mountain State's top prep player. He was also named first-team all-Valley three times. all-Valley three times

Drummond chose to play for Joe Paterno and Penn State over offers from the likes of Notre Dame, Michigan and Florida State, He was a wide receiver, primarily for the Nittany Lions, He made 71 receptions for 1.132 yards and five touchdowns. He also ran for 272 yards and a score.

After not being selected in the draft, Drummond signed with the Detroit Lions and made the team as a kick returner. He averaged 26 yards a kickoff return, ranked third in the NFC and

team as a kick returner. He averaged 26 yards a kickoff return, ranked third in the NFC and fifth in the NFL, He had a punt return for a touchdown. He was selected to the Pro Bowl and named all-Pro in 2004. All told, he played five seasons in the NFL (four with Detroit and one with Kansas City). He spent the 2008 season on the Steelers' practice squad.

Other than football at Linsly, Drummond was one of the top track sprinters in the Ohio Valley, He lost only one race to an Ohio Valley athlete and that was as a freshman. He had a PR of 10.37 in the 100, which he ran during a summer meet after his senior season. He ran 21.7 in the 200 and 48.9 in the 400. He was a four-time all-Valley selection.

Dan Stephens (Athlete - 2000s)

Dan Stephens (The Linsly School, Class of 2000). It didn't matter the

season, field or sport, this Cadets' product played and played well.

The only Linsly athlete to start for four years in football, basketball and baseball. Stephens shined exceptionally bright on the football and baseball fields.

Stephens was a four-year letterman for Terry Depew's football team, Mephens was a four-year letterman for lerry Depew's footbalt learn, amassing a school record 292 tackles, playing primarily along the defensive line. He had a senior season in which he registered 76 tackles and five sacks. On the offensive side of the ball, Stephens ran for 832 yards and 12 touchdowns. He was a first-team all-state selection in Class A and was a multiple-time

all-OVAC and all-Valley honoree on the gridiron.

On the baseball field, long-time Linsly head coach Gary Sprague called Stephens the "finest hitter" he'd ever coached. Stephens led the Ohio Valley in hitting as a senior at .537 and connected on eight home run and drove in a school-record 45 runs. He struck out just four times that season. Stephens still holds the Linsty career record for home runs and RBI. His efforts

On the basketball court, Stephens played on the interior. He still holds the Linsly record for rebounds and charges taken in his career. He was recognized on the all-Valley team for hoops. Stephens took part in the OVAC All-Star games for all three sports and was the winner of the Zimmerman Award which goes to Linsly's best male athlete.

After receiving more than 25 collegiate scholarship offers combined between football and baseball. Stephens elected to attend the University of Pittsburgh to play football, for the

were recognized by his selection to the all-OVAC team multiple times and the all-Valley team

Panthers, Stephens was a four-year letterman and started 41 games along the defensive line. The Panthers took part in five straight bowl games during his time in the Steel City, including the Fiesta Bowl. Stephens received the Fiesta Bowl Art Bodine MVP Award.

All told, Stephens was an all-Big East player and twice named an Academic All-American.

He was fisted on the All Big East Academic Team four times. Stephens also received the David Sandberg Award, which goes to the Pitt athlete with the best overall academic and athletic achievements. He received the Demale Stanley Award, which goes to a Pitt football player who has overcome the most adversity. Finally, Stephens received the Blue/Gold Award, All of the winners have their names on the 'Varsity Walk' on campus. It's the Pitt version of the

Dennis "Denny" Magruder (Wheeling Central Catholic High School, Class of 1967).

If there were a "best friends" list for the OVAC, his name would certainly be near the top.

Magruder has certainly opened his arms and given the nation's

Magruder has certainly opened his arms and given the nation's largest functional high school athletic conference a place to call "home", primarily in his role as Executive Director of WesBanco Arena in downtown Wheeling.

WesBanco Arena has been home to the OVAC Museum including the Hall of Fame display since 2009, with Magruder generously allowing the conference free reign of the outer concourse of the facility to showcase its rich history while also serving on the OVAC Museum Committee.

The arena is host to the OVAC Hall of Fame Banquet, OVAC Banquet of Champions, OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Championships, OVAC Cheering Championships and OVAC Media Night, and at one time it hosted the OVAC Samuel A. Mumley All-Star Baskethall Classic. Basketball Classic

Basketball Classic.

In addition to its OVAC affiliation, WesBanco also serves as the home of the Wheeling Nailers of the East Coast Hockey League and was the home of the Ohio Valley Greyhounds of the Indoor Football League for several years. Countless high school and college basketball games have also taken place there.

Magnider was the recipient of the first Distinguished Service Award presented by the OVAC Hall of Fame Committee in 2010, and the award was named in his honor thus all future recipients received the Denny Magnider Distinguished Service Award.

Having a graduate of West Liberty State College with degree in accounting/husiness.

tuture recipients received the Denny Magruder Distinguished Service Award.

He is a graduate of West Liberty State College with degree in accounting/business administration and a member of the first graduating class (1988) of the Public Assembly Facility Management School at Oglebay Resort and Conference Center; has served as a faculty member and/or as regent of the school ever since. In addition to his position at WesBanco, which he has held since 1986, he also oversees the historic Capitol Music Hall; serves on the City of Wheeling Hall of Fame Board and as Executive Director of the Greater Wheeling Sports and Entertainment Authority, Magruder has also served as rate analyst, budget director and Urban Renewal Treasurer of the City of Wheeling; Business Management of the Markell Country Schools and as Treasurer of the Eventuria. Manager/Comptroller of the Marshall County Schools and as Treasurer of the Executive Board of the Wheeling Convention and Visitors Center.

He received the 2005 Spirit & Leadership Award and was selected to the City of Wheeling Hall of Fame in 2011.

David 'Ty' Fleming (Coach)

David "Ty" Fleming (Coach)

David "Ty" Fleming (Shadyside High School. Class of 1965). An innovative football coach who ranks among the winningest in OVAC history, he finished 23 years as a head coach with a 165-92 record.

He began his coaching career as a football and basketball assistant at Newton Falls in 1971-72, and returned to the Ohio Valley as an assistant at Bellaire from 1972-74. He then served as head boys' basketball coach at St. John Central from 1974-79, coaching the Fighting Irish football team for one season (1978) to a 7-3 record. From there, he moved on to Woolridge High near Akron as the head boys' basketball coach for one year before finally coming back to his alma mater.

During his first tour of duty at Shadyside (1980-91), he coached two OVAC championship squads (1982 and 1989) and two OHSAA playoff squads (1989 and 1991), with his '89 team reaching the state semifinal game before losing to eventual state runner-up McDonald. In his second go-round (1999-2008), his teams went 89-24 and made eight more playoff appearances, claiming two regional titles (2000 and 2006) and reaching the Division V1 State Championship Game where they lost to Maria Stein Marion Local (17-0). The Tigers had five once-beaten seasons and won three more OVAC crowns (2002, 2003 and 2007). All told, he coached Shadyside for 22 years, compiling a career record of 158-89 there which ranks first in school history.

All told, he coached Shadyside for 22 years, compiling a careet record or 130-02 under which ranks first in school history.

During his time in Tigertown, he also coached track and girls' basketball and served as the school's athletic director for 10 years. His 1982 track squad captured an OVAC title and the '83 team was Class A District champions.

Fleming was a three-time Ohio Valley "Coach of the Year" and the 2000 recipient of the Carl Hamill Award from the Dapper Dan Club of the Upper Ohio Valley. He was inducted into the Ohio Valley Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame earlier in 2015.

A stellar athlete at Shadyside whose brother Don is also in the OVAC Hall of Fame, he was 12 latters in four sports (football) basketball, baseball and track) in high school and

won 12 letters in four sports (football, basketball, baseball and track) in high school and went on to earn three letters in basketball at Kent State University, graduating there in 1969. After retiring as a teacher/coach, he has worked as a color analyst for WTOV-TV9 and WKKX Radio on high school football broadcasts.



Linda Myers (Warwood High School, Class of 1967). It's been 35 years since she joined the "family", but there's been plenty of behind the scenes contributions made to the OVAC by this tircless, friendly face of the con-

Myers has been the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game Program Coordinator since 1994, organizing, billing and collecting ads and assisting in production of the massive program which generates thousands of dollars each year.

She served as liaison between the OVAC and what was then the Stone
& Thomas Queen of Queens Pageant starting in 1987, taking over as the
event coordinator in 1994 and continuing in that role for the conference until 2006. During that
time, she revamped the event to include the awarding of thousands of dollars in scholarships to

the participants.

Myers also has worked with the OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Tournament in various capacities since 1980; assisted with the OVAC Banquet of Champions for the past 20 years and the OVAC Hall of Fame Banquet for 12 years; and has served on the OVAC Museum Committee close its insection in 2009.

Myers has also assisted with the VIP hospitality for the West Virginia "Super Six" Football Championships in Wheeling for the past 21 years.

A resident of Wheeling who earned a B.S. degree from West Liberty State College in 1980 and a Master's degree from West Virginia University in 1985, she was employed by the Ohio County Schools for 29 years, teaching at Triadelphia Middle School and Warwood School until her retirement in 2009.

George Kellas II (Media)

George M. Kellas II (Triadelphia High School, Class of 1973). A sometimes controversial but always passionate broadcaster. Kellas simply loved the Ohio Valley sports scene, especially high school athletics, and could be found front-and-center as area teams made their way along the football or basketball tournament trail for nearly 30 years.

After getting his feet wet on the radio as far back as 1977 and graduating from West Liberty State College in 1980, Kellas spent 12 years at

ing from West Liberty State College in 1980, Kellas spent 12 years at WTRF-TV7 in Wheeling (1984-94) and then eight years at WTOV-TV9 in Steubenville, both as a sports anchor and commentator.

Later in his career, he co-founded radio station WKKX-AM 1600 and hosted The George Kellas Radio Talk Show from the station's inception in 2004 until he died of cancer in 2009 at the age of 53.

Kellas was a staunch supporter of the Pittsburgh professional sports teams, particularly the Steelers and the Pirtase. In 1997, he began writing the Black and Gold Newsletter, a monthly publication dedicated to coverage of the Steelers which was available throughout the Ohio Valley.

Among his passions was greyhound racing at Wheeling Downs (now Wheeling Island Racetrack). In 1985, he won the O.P. Smith Award for a story on My Tipper, the winner of the 1984 Commissioners Cup at Wheeling Downs, and a stakes race at the track was named in his honor after his passing: The George Kellas Memorial.

He was the founder, co-owner and general manager of the valley's first professional indoor football team, the Steel Vallac Wash is 1998.

He was the founder, co-owner and general manager of the valley's first professional indoor football team, the Steef Valley Smash, in 1999. The team later became the Ohio Valley Greyhounds and captured the National Indoor Football League championship in 2002 and 2003.

Rod Johnson (Coach)

Rod Johnson (Gahanna Lincoln High School, Class of 1965). He was a pioneer locally in the sport of high school volleyball, serving as a head coach for a total of 21 years, including 14 years where he built the Buckeye Trail High program into a respected state power and then closing out his career with a seven-year run where he injected life into a dormant Cambridge High program. Johnson's combined record was an impressive 400-109 combined record, which ranks 26th on the all-time Ohio High School Athletic Association's victory list. During his 14 years as Trail's volleyball coach, the team amassed an incredible

During his 14 years as Trail's volleyball coach, the team amassed an incredible 294-47 record, winning at least 22 games in each of the last 11 seasons. During his tenure, the Lady Warriors won four OVAC titles, eight district crowns and three regional championships. The 1985 squad advanced to the OHSAA Class AA state semifinals, finishing with a 26-2 overall record and then four years later, in 1989, Johnson and the Lady Warriors reached the pinnacle by wining the Class AA state championship and posting a spotless 27-0 record. Trail nearly went back-to-back under Johnson's guidance, finishing as the Division III state runner-up in 1990 with a 27-3 mark.

At one point (1985-87), Johnson-coached Trail teams put together the state's fourth-longest regular season winning streak of 48 games.

He was named Ohio High School Volleyball Coaches Association Class AA "Coach of the Year" in 1989 and he won the OVAC "Coach of the Year" award in 1986. He was also inducted into the Buckeve Trail/East Guernsey Athletic Hall of Fame in 1999 and is the OVAC's first selection in the

in 1989 and he won the OVAC "Coach of the Year" award in 1986. He was also inducted into the Buckeye Trail/East Guernsey Athletic Hall of Fame in 1999 and is the OVAC's first selection in the Coaches category who piloted a girls' sport.


Johnson stepped back into the coaching ranks in 2005, this time at Cambridge. Starting from the ground up, the Lady Bobcats went 6-18 his first year but that was the only losing season under Johnson. During his seven years, CHS posted a 106-62 mark. The best season came in 2009 when the Lady 'Cats were 22-4 and won OVAC, sectional and district championships before losing in the OHSAA Division II Regional semifinals. Cambridge put together an OVAC "threepeat" by also winning conference championships in 2010 and 2011, with overall records of 19-5 and 18-6, respectively. The Lady Cats were also East Central Ohio League runners-up four times under Johnson's watch. He was tabbed OVAC and District 12 Division II "Coach of the Year" in 2009 and 2010.













Duane Powell (Official)

Duane "Dibby" Powell (Bellaire High School, Class of 1952) is regarded among the best officials by area coaches as well as his peers, spending 25 years making the calls in both football and basketball.

He began officiating both sports in 1971 as a member of both the Ohio

Valley Board of Approved Football Officials and the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials (he received a lifetime membership to both organizations).

Approved Basketball Officials the received a metime membership to nonorganizations).

During his career, he worked several OHSAA football playoff games
and basketball tournament games and also officiated countless small college football games in the West Virginia Conference.

He was the honorary official at the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game; received
the OVAC Robert Dawson Basketball Officials Award in 2000 and received a Meritorious
Award from the OHSAA for outstanding service to high school athletics as an official,
Powelf was born in Dilles Bottom, and he was an outstanding athlete at Bellaire High
In basketball, he was regarded as one of the premier passers and playmakers in Ohio
Valley history, scoring 358 points as a senior while earning all-Ohio, all-Valley and allEastern Ohio accolades.

He also played baseball for the Bellaire Civies and, as a pitcher, he signed with the
Pittsburgh Pirates' farm team in Branswick, Georgia (Georgia State League) in 1954.

He was inducted into the Bellaire High Wall of Fame in 1989
Powell, a veteran of the U.S. Army, worked at the Martins Ferry Plant of WheelingPittsbugh Steel and after retring, he was a bus driver for the Martins Ferry City Schools,
He was a member of the Purple Rider Booster Club, American Legion Post 38 and the
Foresters of Lansing.

He passed away in 2013 at the age of 78, and in his memory Martins Ferry and Bellaire
established the Duane Powell Memorial Scholarship Softhall Game in 2014.

Clyde Eads (Athlete - 1950s)

Clyde Eads (St. Clairsville High School, Class of 1958). The 6-foot-5 pencil-thin cager rewrote the Red Devils' basketball record-book in a three-year career as a rare three-time first team All-OVAC honoree in the largest Class AA. He still holds the single-game scoring mark of 55 points (against Warwood in 1958) and his 1,661 career points lasted 45 years as the school standard until broken by Dan Monteroso. He averaged 27 points a game as a senior, 26.4 for his career and more than 25 points all three seasons including 25.1 as a sophomore.

His career (1956-58) was the same period as Bridgeport superstar

John Havlicek and Eads led the Red Devils to a 6-1 career record over
the Havlicek-led Bulldogs. As a senior on an 18-3 team coached by Myles Witchey, the foes
split games and St. C. handed Bridgeport its only regular season loss in a 17-2 overall campaign. As a junior, Eads led St. C. to three wins over Bridgeport including a sectional victory.

St. C. was 18-0 in regular season and ended 21-1 overall for the best record up to that time
at the school. The lone loss was to Zanesville in the Class AA district finals.

Fads led St. C. in scoring and rebounding for three seasons as the Red Devils compiled

He was recruited by Florida State University, but returned home the first year to enroll at West Liberty State and play for coach Al Blatnik, who had coached him as a sophomore and junior at St. C.

As a freshman in his only season at WLS, Eads averaged 20.7 points a game to lead the Hilltoppers and became only the second West Virginia Conference player ever to earn first

Hadappers and rectained in the second west virginal conference player of the saminar learn All-WVC as a freshman.

Each thus became a rare first team all-conference player in all four seasons he competed in high school and college. He's a member of the St. Clairsville High School Athletic Hall of Fame. His family settled in the Tampa, Fla., area and he is deceased.

Nau signed a scholarship with Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Va., where he was a three-year varsity regular after starting on the freshman learn. He was team co-captain as a senior and named the school's 1973 "Male Athlete of the Year." As a sophomore, he helped the Morarchs advance to the NCAA Division II national (file game where they limshed runner up to Evansville

Sam 'Buzz' Berry (Athlete - 1940s)

"Berry (Warwood High School, Class of 1946). He was the standout was selected to the first three All-OVAC Class A (smallest of two classes) basketball teams and the first two All-OVAC Class A (smallest of two classes) basketball teams and the first two All-OVAC Class A football teams as an end. Warwood won five OVAC titles and four City of Wheeling crowns (six schools) in football and basketball during that period and also advanced to the W Va. Basketball Tournament in 1945, his junior season.

Berry continued his basketball antics at Shepherd College from 1949-52 where he became the Rams' first prominent player. He set a school career scoring record of 1.947 points in 83 games for a 22.9 average, As a sophomore, he became the school's first-ever Alf-West Virginia Conference Tournament honoree and was all-tournament three years and three times all-conference. ence (twice second team and once first team).

He led state colleges in scoring as a junior (26.3) and senior (26.9), with the latter ranking sixth in the nation.

A Shepherd College Hall of Famer, he's a member of the All-Time West Virginia Conference

team.

Berry relocated to Florida and is deceased.

Gene 'Beef' Lamone (Athlete - 1950s)

Gene "Beef" Lamone (Wellsburg High School, Class of 1951). He was an all-start two-way lineman at both the high school and college level.

As a prep sentor, he carned first team Class AA All-OVAC and Class A third team All-West Virginia recognition before competing in the annual Ohio-West Virginia All-Star Game.

Recruited by West Virginia University, he became one of the Mountaineers' most honored football linemen. The four-year letterman and standout 6-foot-2, 215-pound two-way lineman from 1951-54 was team co-captain as a senior when WVU had an 8-1 record and was ranked No. 12 nationally in the final Associated Press poll, WVU was 28-7 in his four seasons including a 1953 Sugar Bowl berth as Lamone started 34 straight games. He earned second team All-America at guard as a junior and third team AP honors as a senior. He was the only manimous choice on the 1954 All-Southern Conference team and selected to play in the East-West All-Star Game Lamone was drafted in the fifth round of the 1955 National Football League Draft by the Philadelphia Lagles but an injury prevented him from competing.

He later coached footbalt at Linsly Military Institute from 1960-67 before joining the business world with a home base in the Columbus. Ohio area, The retiree currently resides in Fort

ness world with a nome base in the Columbus. Onto area, the retired currently resides in Port Myers, Fla.

He was given his nickname "Beef" as a hefty youth by a Wellsburg neighbor, Red Donley, an OVAC Hall of Fame sportscaster.

Lamone earlier was inducted into the West Virginia Sports Hall of Fame and the West Virginia University Sports Hall of Fame.

Ed Pastilong (Athlete - 1960s)

Ed Pastilong (Moundsville High School, Class of 1961). The 6-foot-1, 165pound Trojan quarterback set school passing records as one of the earliest 2,000-

pound Trojan quarterback set school passing records as one of the earliest 2,000-yard career pussers in Ohio Valley history.

Playing QB and middle linebacker, he led the Trojans to a 23-5-2 three-year record. His 30-game career passing marks — all school records — were rare for that run-minded era: 124 completions of 238 attempts for 2,065 yards and 24 touchdowns with only seven interceptions. As a senior on an 8-2 record team, losing only to WVn. Class AAA champion Weir and unbeaten OVAC 3-A titlist Martins Ferry, Pastiliong completed 55 of 108 acrials for 10 TDs and also rushed for six scores. Against Marshall County rival Benwood Union, he completed eight of nine passes with three TDs. Veteran Trojan coach Charley Helinski said "he is the best passer Moundsville ever had."

Pastilong was highly honored as a senior, He earned first team honors on three major selections; All-W.A. Class AAA. All-Valley "Big School" and All-OVAC Class AAA. As a junior, he was second team All-Valley "Big School" and mention on All-OVAC 3A and All-W.Va. Class AAA. He was a three-sport letterman in football, basketball and baseball and earned baseball All-W.Va.

mention, the only honor roll for the spring sport at the time. Also, outside of school, he won a Tri-State Golden Gloves boxing title

Pastilong carned a scholarship to West Virginia U, along with two of his backfield mates — Milt Clegg and Tom Yeater — and started on the 4-1 record freshman team. He starred in the spring Blue-Gold Gaine where he led an upset win over the upperclassmen by accounting for three TDs and appeared porsed to compete for a starting job as a sophomore.

However, a shortlder separation forced a red shirt season in his second year and he was limited in playing tube on the varsity although he lettered two years. In his sophomore season, he started a 38-7 win over Fluman and completed 5 of 10 passes for 197 yards and three TDs. In the opening game as a junior, he passed for two TDs in a 20-10 win over Refinemond.

Professionally, he coached at Salem College from 1969-75 before joining the WVU Athletic Department to start a 35-year career including the final 21 years as Adhletic Director, the longest tenure in WVU history.

He was selected by the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dans as "Man of the Decade" for the 1990s and for a special award, "Ohio Valley Ambassador" in 2010. He is in the WVU Sports Hall of Fame and the the WVa. Sports Hall of Fame

and the the W.Va. Sports Hall of Fame.

After WVU retirement, he joined West Liberty U. as Chair for the Athletic Campaign &

Institutional Advancement.













Rudy Jovicic (Athlete - 1970s)

Rudy Jovicie (Shadyside High School, Class of 1976). Jovicie was a three-sport performer at Shadyside, competing in baseball, football and track. He was nothing short of sensational in the latter two.

Jovicie was the unquestioned premier hurdler in the Ohio Valley during his Fleming Field days. As a senior, his hurdling prowess helped the Tigers of Tom Vichich lay claim to the state Class A championship, the first Eastern Ohio boys' track team to turn that trick.

In the state meet Jovicie finished runner-up in both the high hurdles and low hurdles. He was nipped in both races by Roland James, a future University of Tennessee defensive back and first-round draft choice of the New England Patriots. He also anchored a state-placing relay team.

New England Patriots. He also anchored a state-placing relay team.

Jovicic tied the all-time Ohio Valley standards in both hurdle events. He clocked a sizzling 14.2 in the highs and 19.5 in the lows.

The Intelligencer named Jovicic co-captain of the 1970s Ohio Valley All-Decade track team, along with Bridgeport's Craig Miller.

Jovicic was also a gridiron star. He was a two-time All-OVAC and All-Valley honoree. The 170-pound running back garmered some 700 infantry stripes and 11 TDs as a senior while also catching 12 passes for 206 yards and two more scores.

Jovicic also enjoyed a long career as a prep grid coach. He was head coach at Bridgeport High for three seasons after serving as a Bulldog assistant. He has also assisted with the grid program at his alma mater.

Kelly Swierkos (Athlete - 1980s)

Kelly Swierkos (Bishop Donahue High School, Class of 1986). Swierkos was a pioneer in the art of dominating pitching in the OVAC She was nothing short of tremendous on the hill.

She was nothing short of tremendous on the nitt.

During her prep days. West Virginia had just one classification for girls' softball. Despite being one of the smallest schools in the state, the Lady Bishops rode Swierkos' talented right arm to unparalleled heights.

Bishop Donahue finished third in the state in her freshman season. The next two years, Swierkos hurled the Lady Bishops to the top of the

mountain as they claimed a pair of state championships.

Swierkos' senior season was a bittersweet one. She battled injuries the second half of the season, but still managed to earn the mound win in the state opener. As fate would have it, the alling Swierkos was unable to take the circle in the remainder of the double-elimination tournament and the Lady Bishops did not win again.

She finished her remarkable career with an eye-popping 63-6 record. Of those wins, eight came via the populities variety.

She was accorded first-team all-state and all-OVAC plaudits her final two campaigns.

Swierkos was also a stellar hoopster. She finished her basketball career with 1,009 points, in an era when there was no three-point field goal, She also established school career records in rebounding and assists and was a first-team all-state basketball honoree as a senior.

Swierkos also delivered in quality fashion in the classroom, She graduated with a 3.85 GPA on a 4.0 scale. She also headlined The Intelligencer's All-Ohio Valley Scholar-Athlete honor roll.

Paul Hoover (Athlete - 1990s)

Paul Hoover (Steubenville High School, Class of 1994). Big Red has one of the richest baseball traditions in the Ohio Valley and this former all-Ohioan helped to form that tradition during his four years.

Playing for head coach Fred Heatherington, Hoover was a three-year regular for Steubenville, helping to lead it to the state tournament as a sophomore, back to the regional as a junior and three OVAC titles.

As a senior, Hoover had his most productive season. He batted .454, scoring 30 runs and driving in 32 more. He had 15 doubles, two triples and a home run.

Following that season, he was named Division II Eastern District Player of the Year, first-team all-OVAC and first-team all-Valley, He played in the Ohio Mizuno All-Star Series and was chosen for the Sun Belt Classic in Oklahoma.

Hoover exploded onto the prep baseball scene in 1992 when he batted 366 with six doubles, three home runs, a triple and 21 RBI. As a junior, Hoover batted 270 with 16 runs scored and 14 RBI, He had five doubles, a triple and a home run.

For his career, he finished with a .369 average, 64 runs and 67 RBI

Hoover was drafted in the Major League Baseball Draft in 1994 by the Houston Astros, but elected to attend Kent State University where he earned three letters as the starting catcher. As a Golden Flash, Hoover played in 158 games, batting .269 with 86 runs scored, 87 RBI, 23 daubte 12 heraustreed Courier and Courier RBI, 23

doubles, 12 home runs and four triples.
Following his junior season, Hoover was drafted in the 23rd round by the Tampa Bay Rays and he elected to sign. He played professionally from 1997 until 2010 and played in 40 major league games, batting 250 with eight RBI and five doubles. Hoover appeared in the big leagues with the Rays, Florida Marlins, Philadelphia Phillies and Boston Red Sox. He was the bullpen catcher

the Rays, Florida Martins, Philadelphia Phillies and Boston Red Sox. He was the bullen catcher for the Phillies in 2009 when they won the World Series.

Along with his baseball exploits, Hoover was a standout basketball player for Steubenville. He scored 1,186 points, which ranks sixth all time at Big Red. He averaged 16.5 points a game in his career. He was an all-OVAC and all-Valley performer multiple times.





Janis Trupovnieks (Cadiz High School, Class of 1977), Trupovnieks was big in stature and equally as big in athletic production. The 6-7.255-pounder was a two-way force on the gridiron while also etching his name amongst the elite weightman in track and field.

Trupovnieks helped Coach Ron Pobolish's grid team enjoy great success,

starting three years as a two-way tackle.

The Cardinals went 18-1-1 in Trupovnieks' final two years, losing to and tying St. John Central. The Cards bagged the OVAC 2-A title in his junior campaign.

campaign.

He earned a plethora of grid honors, including AP Eastern District
Lineman of the Year as a senior en route to garnering all-Ohio and all-OVAC plaudits, He
recorded 67 tackles, 31 assists and covered two fumbles as a senior.

Trupovnieks was also an accomplished kicker, making 42 consecutive PATS over a two-year
span, He also booted four field goals as a senior.

Trupovnieks used his lanky frame to the utmost ability in track, The All-Valley honoree
captured Cadiz High's first-ever state track title by winning the Class AA discus crown via his
prodigious toss of 165-3. At that time it was the third best toss in Ohio Valley annals.

As might be expected, Trupovnieks was an inside force in hoops. The three-year regular
was a first-team All-Valley Small School selection and All-OVAC honoree as a senior after
averagine 17 points per contest.

averaging 17 points per contest.

Trupovnieks was a nationally recruited football recruit, and he opted for the University of Tennessee. He was a two-year letterman for the Vols, starting as a senior on an 8-4 team which defeated Wisconsin 28-21 in the Garden State Bowl.

Jamie Taylor (Athlete - 1980s)

Jamie Taylor (Edison South High School, Class of 1989). Taylor played his first three prep years at Jefferson Union before consolidation changed the landscape to Edison South.

He was a baseball and basketball standout, earning all-OVAC honors

in both sports. On the diamond, however, Taylor was nothing sho sensational.

sensational.

As a senior, he was the OVAC "Player of the Year" to go with his All-Ohio honors. That campaign saw Taylor slam 10 home runs, driving in 33 runs to go with a robust 540 batting average.

He was no slouch on the mound, either, recording a 5-2 record with 47 Ks

and a 2.11 ERA in his final campaign.

Taylor's junior season was just as productive, batting .575 with 10 homers and 46 RBI, He was also 7-4 on the hill, recording 84 strikeouts in 47 innings of work.

He ended his Edison baseball career by establishing a new Ohio Valley standard with 32

home runs.

home runs,

Taylor's athletic exploits were almost as productive on the hardwood. The 6-2 guard ended his Edison South days with 1,439 points. He averaged 22.1 ppg as a senior.

Taylor's stellar baseball drew the attention of Division I college coaches from across the nation. He opted to stay close to home, signing with The Ohio State University and he enjoyed a sparkling three-year stay with the Buckeyes before heading off to the pros.

As a freshman, Taylor led OSU with seven home runs and was named to the Big Ten All-Tournament Team as the Buckeyes claimed the conference crown and placed third in the Midwest Perional

Midwest Regional.

As a junior, he was tabbed first-team all-Big Ten as a third baseman. It was a campaign in which he batted .382 with 36 walks.

Such success resulted in Taylor being chosen by the Cleveland Indians in the fifth round of the 1992 MLB Draft. He played seven seasons in the minors, topping out in Class AAA in 1998 before retiring. He batted .275 in 690 minor league games.

Mike McLeod (Athlete - 1990s)

Mike McLeod (Wheeling Park High School, Class of 1992). There's not a sport you can name that this former Patriot wouldn't have shined in had he opted to play.

opted to play.

In the three he did play — football, basketball and baseball — he made a lasting impression on Park and Ohio Valley history.

Football is where McLeod probably made his biggest impact, playing quarterback and linebacker. He helped guide the Patriots to the Class AAA state championship game in 1991 where they fell to Capital, 15-14, in overtime. Defensively, McLeod was one of the Patriots' leading tacklers for three consecutive seasons. As a senior, he recorded 49 tackles, two sacks and recovered two fumbles. From his quarterback spot, McLeod threw 11 touchdowns. He shared the offensive spotlight, that season, with eventual Kennedy Award winner, Boogie Johnson, who ran for 2,000 yards. McLeod's season didn't go unnoticed. He was first-team all-state, all-OVAC and all-Valley and attracted the eyes of college recruiters. He had scholarships offers from the likes of West Virginia, Indiana, Marshall and others.

Indiana, Marshall and others However, McLeod's ultimate passion lied with baseball where he was a two-year standout as an outfielder. He batted 490 as a senior, which was the second best in the Ohio Valley, regardless of

Class. He had 42 hits, seven doubles, a triple and three home runs. He drove in 20 and seven doubles, a triple and three home runs. He drove in 20 and seven doubles. Again, he was recognized as first-team all-state in Class AAA, all-OVAC and all-Valley.

On the basketball court, McLeod was a point-guard for the Patriots for three years, helping to lead them to the state tournament twice. He finished his career with L230 points and averaged 21.7 points and 11 rebounds per game as a senior, McLeod was a first-team all-state selection and was also first-team all-OVAC (three times) and all-Valley (twice).

also inst-team ait-OVAC (three times) and ait-valley (twice).

Despite the college football offers, McLeod opted for baseball right out of high school. Although that didn't pan out and he eventually enrolled at Youngstown State and joined the football team. He was a member of the Penguins' Division I-AA national championship squad in 1994, playing for Jim Tressel.

A member of the Wheeling Park Sports Hall of Fame, he is currently the Patriots' head baseball













Brittany Hocker (Athlete - 2000s)

Brittany Hocker (Bridgeport High School, Class of 2004). The Bridgeport Bullet, as she was nicknamed during her prep track and field days, set the standard for female sprinting in the Ohio Valley and the state of Ohio

Hocker burst onto the scene in 2001 when she won the 200 meter dash at Dayton's Welcome Stadium as a freshman, Earlier in that state meet.

at Dayton's wetcome Statutura's a resultant for the task state meet, she finished second in the 100-meter dash.

That 100-meter race proved to be the final time she lost in that event for the remainder of her prep career, Hocker was undefeated during her sophomore, junior and senior seasons in the short sprint, Prior to the state

final, she had been unblemished as a freshman, too.

As a sophomore, Hocker notched her first state championship in the 100 meters, but

As a sophomore, Hocker notched her first state championship in the 100-meters, but settled for second in the 200.

Hocker was a four-time OVAC Class 1A 100-meter dash champion and three-time Class 1A 200-meter champion, Though she never ran the race in the postseason, Hocker was a three-time OVAC Class 1A 400-meter champion.

As a prep sprinter, Hocker's personal best in the 100 was 11.81 seconds. That stood as a state record in Division III until 2011. Her mark, which was set during her senior season, still stands as a state meet record.

Her 200 personal best time of 24,22 is also a state meet record. She set that in 2004 when she completed her second consecutive sprint sweep.

After high school, Hocker opted to continue her track and field career at the University of Akron where she put forth an impressive career, earning all-Mid American Conference honors. She was the MAC Indoor and Outdoor conference champion in the 200 in 2008. She set the Akron school record indoor for the 400 and placed in both the 100 and 400 in She set the Akron school record indoor for the 400 and placed in both the 100 and 400 in 2005 as a true freshman. As a collegiate runner, Hocker focused more on the 400 and set the Akron record for both indoor and outdoor competition with times of 54.39 (indoor) and 54.22 (outdoor).

Along with track and field, Hocker also earned letters during her high school career in



Ted Talkington (Athlete - 200s)

Ted Talkington (Magnolia High School, Class of 2004). This Blue Eagle

Ted Talkington (Magnolia High School, Class of 2004). This Blue Eagle product could simply score the basketball during his prep career. Magnolia's all-time scoring leader finished his career with 2.024 points, which was more than 600 points better than his nearest competitor. As a sentor, Talkington scored at a 31 points per game clip, which followed up a junior season in which he poured in 29.5 points a contest.

During the 2003-04 campaign, Talkington established his career-high point total with 45. As a sentor, he shot 82 percent from the foul line and connected on 64 three propriets.

on 64 three-pointers.

Talkington's game wasn't limited to scoring, however, He also averaged 5.8 assists, 5.5 rebounds and 2.7 steals.

Along with leading the state in scoring twice, including the 2002-03 season, he helped guide the Blue Engles to the Class AA state championship. By doing that, he became just one of five Mountain State products to accomplish the feat, joining the likes of Jerry West, O.J. Mayo, Herbie Brooks and Bill Maphis.

Brooks and Bill Maphis.

Talkington's aforementioned career-point total ranks 16th in West Virginia history. He was a first-team all-state selection as both a junior and senior and captained the team both seasons. He was a second-team all-state pick after his senior season. He was also an all-OVAC and all-Valley performer, captaining the all-Valley team twice.

He also scored 20 points in helping West Virginia rally for a 92-82 victory in the Samuel A. Mumley OVAC All-Star Game.

After high school, Talkington turned down several collegiate offers to accept an academic placeher in a great of West Virginia University. He also well in 46 comes during his captor.

scholarship and walk on spot at West Virginia University. He played in 46 games during his career with the Mountaineers and lettered twice, He was a member of WVU's National Invitational

John Nese (OVAC Contributor)

John Nese (East Pittsburgh High School, Class of 1956). Teacher coach ... official ... broadcaster. He's done them all.
While spending 54 years in the education field, Nese coached boys/girls basketball and baseball; followed that up with a fine officiating career and all

the while worked as a radio broadcaster.

In basketball, he began his coaching career at Follansbee St. Anthony (1960-61), winning the W. Va. Class B State Catholic Championship with a 17-5 record. After two years (1961-63) as an assistant at East Pittsburgh High – his alma mater – he came to Steubenville Catholic Central where he

coached the boys' team 10 years (1963-73) with a 121-87 record; three sectional titles, three district titles and one OVAC championship (1973) when his squad compiled a

22-2 overall record – the best in school history – fed by fellow Hall of Famer Jim Wood.

He later returned to the hardwood as the Steubenville Catholic girls' coach (1987-90), posting a 56-10 record with two sectional titles; two OVAC crowns (1988 and '89) and the school's best

He closed out his hoops' coaching with the Indian Creek junior high girls' team (1995-2007) where he won an additional 116 games against 40 losses.

He was named Coach of the Year multiple times in the Eastern District and District 5 and was selected as the co-coach of the United States All-Stars for the 1973 Dapper Dan Roundbalf Closeds in Bitchbergh Co. Classic in Pittsburgh.

In baseball, Nese coached Steubenville Catholic from 1963-75 with a sparkling 197-77 record.

In baseball, seeke coached Stellbenville Catholic from 1965-75 with a sparking 1974-77 record. His teams won seven sectionals, five districts and one regional, finishing as the state runner-up to Shaker Heights in 1965. His 1974 squad posted a school-best 24-4 overall mark. After retiring from coaching, Nese wanted to remain close to high school athletics and became a baseball/softball umpire. He was a respected member of that profession as welf, and was honored to work in 10 consecutive OHSAA State Softball Tournaments. He also served as an instructor with the Steubenville Umpires Association, Nese also had a 30-plus year career as a WSTV

ior with the Steubenville Umpires Association. Nese also had a 30-plus year career as a WSTV radio play-by-play announcer and color commentator, working countless football, basketball and American Legion baseball games.

This marks Nese's sixth Hall of Fame selection. He's also in the Ohio High School Baseball Coaches Association (1981), the East Boros Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame (1986); the District 5 Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame (2006); and the Franciscan University Hall of Fame (2008).

At East Pittsburgh (Pa.) High, Nese was a three-year letterman and co-captain of the Class B Pennsylvania state runner-up. He graduated from the College of Steubenville in 1960 where he was a four-year letterman and a member of the No. 1-ranked small college basketball team (1957-58) and foram occapation is a senior. He obtained his master's deeper from the University (1957-58) and team co-captain as a senior. He obtained his master's degree from the University of Dayton in 1974.

Bob Koch (OVAC Family)

Bob Koch (John Marshall High School, Class of 1971). Back in 2009 when he retired from Cameron High School, Koch offered a telling quote: "My goal has always been to leave this a better place than it was when I found it."
In Koch's case, everywhere he's been and everyone he's known has been

better for it, and that certainly includes every corner of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference.

His association with the conference dates back to 1981 when began helping

His association with the conference dates back to 1981 when began helping with the hands-on calculations of the scores at the OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Tournament, a role he filled for the next 30 years until the results were computerized. At that point, he continued to assist by working the bullpen area, He received the OVAC Tournament Service Award in 1998 and the OVAC Tournament Director's Award in 2014.

Koch has been on the OVAC Executive Board – the governing body of the bi-state conference since 1989, first as the Class A representative and then as the Game Director of the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game.
It's in that role — one he assumed in 2001 - that he has shined above all others due to the vast

undertaking of the event from the selection of coaches and players, coordinating the week-long camp which is currently at Bethany College to all of the game-related activities which take place

the week of the game.

Respected for his opinions and his knowledge of the history of the conference, Koch has also been a member of the OVAC Hall of Fame Committee and the OVAC Museum Committee for

Koch graduated from West Virginia University and later obtained his master's degree in math education there. He spent one year at Martins Ferry High before moving on to Cameron where he began a 33-year career as a math teacher. He assumed the role of athletic director in 1989 and spent the next 20 years guiding the Dragons' athletic programs to countless successes and facilities upgrades before retiring in 2009. Koch also spent several years as an assistant wrestling coach at CHS under the highly-successful Jim Pots.

He served as co-chairman of the Friends of Cameron Football event for six years, and was a

special honoree of that group in 2015 for his contributions.



James A. "Jimmy" Mountain (St. John Central High School, Class of 1931). You might say he "looked down from the mountain" as far as Ohio Valley journalists were concerned.

Mountain chronicled the events of the area - both in and out of the athletic realm - with particular emphasis on the Bellaire area, but he was welf-known up and down the river for his writing style of accentuating the positive as welf as his legendary entertaining and informative columns dur-

positive as well as his legendary entertaining and informative columns during nearly a half century.


A two-sport athlete (football and basketball) at St. John's, he began his journalistic career right out of high school working for Greater Wheeling Home Talk and the Martins Ferry Daily Times. He served as Sports Editor for what became The Times Leader until he was called into military service in 1941 during World War II, and upon his return he began a fengthy tenure as head of the Bellaire Burcau of that newspaper. Although his primary focus shifted to news, he continued to cover sporting events and was a fixture at Nelson Field football games involving both Bellaire and St. John Central under media legends Bill Van Horne and Cal Pokas.

An amateur boyer and a talented softball pitcher, Mountain had a life-long passion for

An amateur boxer and a talented softball pitcher, Mountain had a life-long passion for American history. He was a member of Sigma Delta Chi – journalism's honorary fraternity – and received several honors including the first Man of the Year from the Bellaire Lodge 310 Chechoslovak Society of America; the Citizen of the Year from the Bellaire Fraternal Order of Police Associates; and was tabbed an honorary graduate of Bellaire High School and was selected for that school's Wall of Fame. He also served as Clerk of Council for the city of Bellaire. He passed away on July 24, 1988 at the age of 74.













Stan Blankenship (Coach)

Stan Blankenship (Nicholas County High School, Class of 1968). He Stan Blankenship (Nicholas County High School, Class of 1968). He put together a resume unrivaled by anyone in the girls' basketball coaching ranks, compiling a record of 542-240 during a career that began in 1979 and continued until his retirement in 2011. Those lofty numbers make him the all-time winningest coach in girls' hoops in both the Ohio Valley and the entire state of West Virginia.

Blankenship's Lady Monarchs reached the pinnacle in 1982 when they won the West Virginia Class AAA State Championship with All-American/OVAC Hall of Famer Amy Gamble as the star player.

He also led JMHS to West Virginia Class AAA runner-up finishes in 1992 and 1994. Under his guidance. JMHS wom 18 sectional titles and nine regional crowns.

The Lady Monarchs also won nine OVAC championships under Blankenship's watch (1981, 32, 83, 84, 85, '91, '94, 2000, 2002). The five straight titles from 1981-85 marks the longest consecutive string of girls' conference crowns recorded to date.

(1981, '82, '83, '84, '85, '91, '94, 2000, 2002). The five straight titles from 1981-85 marks the longest consecutive string of girls' conference crowns recorded to date.

Blankenship saw significant changes in high school hoops during his coaching career including the institution of the three-point line; the use of a smaller basketball and the most of girls' basketball in West Virginia from fall to winter. He coached an amazing 40 players who went on to play college basketball after graduating from JMHS. He also coached in the OVAC's Samuel A. Murnley All-Star Classic several times and received the OVAC's Richard Saffield Girls' Basketball Coaches Award in 2005.

Blankenship move to the area from Nicholas County where he was a multi-sport standout

in high school

That continued at the collegiate level when he attended West Virginia Wesleyan College, graduating in 1973 after amassing an unheard of 13 varsity letters (four in track, four in cross country, four in basketball and one in football).

Not surprisingly, he was inducted into the West Virginia Wesleyan Athletic Hall of Fame

in 2012.

Tom West (Coach)

Tom West (Mannington High School, Class of 1957). When he made the move to to coach and teach at Valley High, West did so for the long haul. After four years at Midview High in Grafton, Ohio, he came to Pine Grove where he became a coaching institution, guiding the Lumberjacks football team for a total of 36 years over two terms – his first from 1971-2000 and then, after a seven-year absence, he returned from 2008-2013. During his 40 years as a head coach, he amassed a record of 242-176-1 including a 223-151 mark at Valley.

West-coached Valley teams made the West Virginia Class A playoffs 10 straight years from 1991-200 and finished as the state runner-up five times (1993, '94, '95, '96 and '98). His 1993-94-95 teams all went undefeated in the regular season. The Lumberjacks won OVAC championships in 1995 and '97 and captured the Mason-Dixon Conference crown 11 times (1979, 85, 87, 89, 91, 92, 93, 94, 95, 96 and 97). West also served as an assistant basketball coach from 1971-83. The football field at VHS is named Tom West Field in his honor. West received his bachelor's degree in Education from Fairmont State College in 1961 and his master's degree in Administration from Akron University in 1971. He began his teaching career in Midview in 1961 where he was an assistant basketball Tom West (Mannington High School, Class of 1957). When he made the

He began his teaching career in Midview in 1961 where he was an assistant basketball and football coach and then the head football coach from 1967-70 before taking the job at Valley High.

Jay Handlan (Athlete - 1940s)

John "Jay" Handlan (Triadelphia High School, Class of 1946). He earned 12 varsity letters in five sports for the Little Reds during three years — three each in basketball, football and track, two in tennis and

one in switching.

In basketball, the 6-foot-2 forward earned All-City and All-OVAC largest Class AA and was all-state mention. In football, he was a regular end and punter. After high school, he served three years in the U.S. Army before enrolling at Washington & Lee University in Lexington, Va. Competing for W&L in the Southern Conference—then a major col-

lege basketball league which included West Virginia, Duke, Virginia, etc., and others which broke off and formed the Atlantic Coast Conference — he left his mark as one of the all-time most prolific basketball scorers in major college history.

He became only the third major college player to score more than 2,000 career points by capping his 94-game career with 15 points against WVU in his final game to reach 2,002. He averaged 216 points for his career.

capping his 94-game career with 15 points against WVU in his final game to reach 2,002. He averaged 21.6 points for his career.

As a junior, he averaged 26.2 points to nose out WVU All-American Mark Workman for second place nationally. He also led the nation in free throw shooting (86%) and set an NCAA record with 18-for-18 against Virginia. He also scored a school, and Southern Conference, record with 66 points (49 in the first half)—then the third highest-ever major college mark—against Furman. In that game, he took 71 goal attempts (making 30), which remains the oldest Division 1 NCAA record on the books.

Handlan earned Helms Foundation All-America as a junior and was twice All-Southern Conference. As a senior, he also became a kicker/punter for the football team and was offered a tryout with the Cleveland Browns. He also lettered in track.

He was drafted by the NBA Indianapolis Olympians, but opted to play in the National Industrial Basketball League with the Akron Goodyear Wingfoots. He played four years and was an NIBL All-Star in 1954.

In 2015, he was inducted into the City of Wheeling Hall of Fame.

Dave Linn (Coach)

Dave Linn (Zane Trace High School, Class of 1971). Linn made his mark as the Buckeye Trail High girls' basketball coach for a decade (1976-86), including am amazing four-year run of appearances in the OHSAA State Tournament (1978-81).

Trail's 1978 squad posted a 22-1 overall record, defeating Smithville (41-38) in the Class A state semifinals before falling to Ada (51-39) in the championship game.

the championship game,

the championship game.

The 1979 team reached the pinnacle, defeating Fort Loramie (56-38) in the state semifinals and then downing Holgate (51-32) in the Class A championship game to complete a 23-2 record season.

The Lady Warriors weren't finished, returning to the "Final Four" in 1980 where the beat Portsmouth Clay (59-44) in the semifinals before falling to Mansfield St. Peter's (61-57 in overtime) in the title game for a final 26-1 record; and then making it back to the championship game again in 1981, topping Edgerton (71-58) in the semis and losing another heart-breaker (54-52) to Anna in the finals for a 23-4 final record.

During his 10 years as the Trait girls' coach, he compiled an impressive 211-37 record, an 85 percent victory ratio. Trail also won the OVAC Class A girls' championship in 1984 under Linn.

under Linn.

After some time off, he had a 12-year run as the Trail boys' coach (1999-2010), amassing 119 wins including three or four sectional championships and a district title/regional appearance in 2009. Linn-coached boys' teams won the Pioneer Valley Conference title outright in 2005 and shared the crown with Frontier and Shenandoah in 2010. The 2005 team also won the OVAC Class 2-A crown.

During his career. Linn was selected "Coach of the Year" at various times in the Eastern District and District 12 and he was selected to coach in the OHSBCA North-South All-Star

Game in 1982.

A charter member of the East Guernsey/Buckeye Trail Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996, he's served as the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association Secretary/Treasurer and as the Pepsi/District 12 All-Star Game Director for many years. A graduate of Rio Grande College, he was District 12's selection for the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Honor in 2013 and was inducted into the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2015

Andy Cross (Official)

Andy Cross (Morgantown High School, Class of 1972). One of the more recognizable officials of the Ohio Valley, Cross enjoyed a remarkable career calling the action in baseball, basketball and later in volleyball.

His officiating career began as a student at Bethany College when he decided to follow in the footsteps of his father who had worked football, basketball and baseball games in the Morgantown area, with his young son

Dasketoar and osecoal games in the Mogantown area, with its young son accompanying him to many of the events.

Cross spent 36 years on the baseball diamond. Among the highlights were 23 regional and 13 state tournament assignments in Ohio and 10 regional and 13 state tournaments in West Virginia. He also umpired the Mizuno All-Star Series in Ohio eight times. The final game of his career came in the 2013 West

All-Star Series in Ohio eight times. The final game of his career came in the 2013 West Virginia State Tournament. His basketball officiating spanned 31 years. On the Ohio side, he had 13 regional and three state assignments in girls' hoops and seven regional assignments in boys' hoops while in West Virginia, he worked nine regionals and three state tournaments for the girls and 12 regionals and two state tournaments for the boys.

Cross was the 2009 recipient of the OVAC's Robert Dawson Officials Award presented at the OVAC Samuel A. Mumley All-Star Basketball Classic and was honored with the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association "Official of the Year" award in 1997.

In the latter stages of his officiating career, he added volleyball to the mix and worked eight years, including many games at the tournament level in both states.

In addition to his on-field/court work, Cross also served as president, secretary, interpreter and class instructor of the Ohio Valley Board of Baseball Umpires and vice-president and interpreter of the Ohio Valley Board of Basketball Officials. He was also a member of the National Federation of Officials (NFOA) in both West Virginia and Ohio.

Cross was inducted into the OHSAA Officials Hall of Fame in 2010,

Eddie Becker (Athlete - 1950s)

Eddie Becker (Wheeling High School, Class of 1950). A four-year Wildcat Leader Decker in neeting righ School, Class of 1930). A four-year Wildcat basketball player, he was the most highly honored player on two teams which played in West Virginia State Championship games in the large-school Class A. As a junior, the 'Cats finished state runner-up to Fairmont Senior. As a senior, Wheeling capped a 25-0 record season under OVAC Hall of Fame coach Everett Brinkman with the last of five titles and a state finals win over Elkins, 53-50.

Becker, a two-time All-State Tournament pick, earned first team all-class

Becker, a two-time All-State Tournament pick, carned first team all-class All-State as a senior as well as All-OVAC largest Class A and All-City honors. He averaged 16.1 points as a junior and led the 'Cats as a senior with more than 20 points a game — rare for that era. He scored 20 or more points seven times with a high of 29 as Wheeling averaged 64 points per game. He also played football. Recruited by West Virginia U., he left his mark on the WVU record books. The 6-foot forward led the freshman team in scoring with a 25-point gait. The dead-eye jump-shooter lettered three times on the varsity and ended a 75-game career with 1.127 points (15 ppg) — the second most instable that the time MVP. He also in school history at the time. He averaged 18.7 as a senior when he was team MVP. He also earned All-Southern Conference second learn and was selected to the All-SC Tournament team. At the time he graduated, he was one of 19 players listed on the All-Time WVU Team charts.















Neil Habig (Athlete - 1950s)

Neil Habig (Wheeling Central High School, Class of 1954). An

honored high school and college football player, he competed longer in major pro football than any Maroon Knight in history.

As a prep senior, the Martins Ferry native earned first team all-star honors on every eligible selection — Alf-Valley "Big School", Alf-OVAC largest Class AA, and the five-school Alf-City team. Rated the "best defensive end" in OV by coaches who selected Alf-Valley, the two-way end and punter was the top blocker on a run-oriented team and landed four touchdown passes.

landed four touchdown passes.

The 6-foot, 190-pounder helped the Maroon Knights win their first-ever OVAC Class AA flargest class at the time) title, with an 8-1 record. The lone loss was 13-7 to 10-0 record Benwood Union, the OVAC Class A champion which finished as the state runner-up. He earned a scholarship to Purdue University where he played both ways but was converted, on offense, from end to center. A three-year letterman and two-year starter at center-line-backer-defensive end, he was selected as team MVP as a senior on a roster which had 13 Ohio Valley products including OVAC Hall of Fame honorees Nick Mumley and Kenny Mikes. Habig, a second team All-Big Ten Conference selection, played in the Senior Bowl All-Star game. He was drafted by the Green Bay Packers, but opted for the Canadian Football League. He played seven seasons (1988-64) as a center-linebacker with the Saskatchewan Roughriders and was a dominant player at his position. He was a CFL All-Star six times As a linebacker, he was noted for his pass coverage and had 10 pass intercentions including As a linebacker, he was noted for his pass coverage and had 10 pass interceptions including six in 1963.



Rob Munn (Athlete - 1960s)

Rob Munn (Bridgeport High School, Class of 1966). The three-sport standout helped the Bulldogs record their best combined football/basket-ball school year in history.

In football, the team captain and quarterback-defensive back led the first perfect record (9-0) in school history. Coached by Joe Ault, the Bulldogs captured the OVAC Class As title and were ranked No. 5 in the final Ohio Class A poll by United Press International. Bridgeport capped the perfect season with a 22-11 win at rival Martins Ferry for only the third win in 45 series games vs. the Purple Riders.

In basketball, the two-year team captain anchored the school's first-ever unbeaten regular season team (18-0) which captured an OVAC Class AA title and was ranked No. 1 in the Ohto Class A poll by United Press International, Coached by OVAC Hall of Famer Frank Baster, the Bulldogs scored more than 100 points in five games and won sectional and district crowns before falling to Dalton, 71-70, in the Canton Regional to

The 6 foot-1, 175-pound forward averaged 24.1 points and 12 rebounds a game as a senior

after sporting a 20-point norm as a junior.

The senior was runner-up for Ohio UPI Class A Player of the Year to Kerry Myers of Celina and earned first team All-Ohio from UPI and third team from The Associated Press. He also

was twice an All-OVAC selection and an All-District honoree in Eastern Ohio.

Munn was also a pitcher infielder on the Bulldogs' baseball team.

The 2010 Bridgeport High Hall of Fame inductee earned a basketball scholarship to Marshall University where he was a three-year varsity player after averaging 9.4 points and shooting 46.8 percent from the floor on the freshman team.

Ben Wiley (Athlete - 1960s)

Ben Wiley (Powhatan High School, Class of 1963), He led his team to the school's best-ever basketball season (20-1) and only unbeaten (18-0)

The 5-foot-9, 150-pound guard was a four-year player who scored nearly 1.500 career points for the Indians. As a senior, he averaged 28.8 points a game and was named Ohio UPI Class A Player of the Year for the team as a deceased as the decease of the Wheeling frommen profootball team. Wiley was a two-time All-OVAC Class A choice and tabbed co-captain as a senior and captain as a junior. The two-time All-District honoree also was a first team All-Ohio choice by both The Associated Press and United Press International as a senior.

In 1963, the Indians shared the OVAC Class A crown with Paden City and ended with a

In 1963, the Indians snared the OVAC Class A crown with Faden City and ended with a 20-1 record after bowing to Strasburg, 73-61 in the Class A District Tournament.

In baseball, he was a senior regular on the second Indians' team to win an Ohio title. The Indians advanced to the regional tournament all four years [1960-63) during Wiley's career. The 1963 team, coached by Frank Bland, capped a 15-2 record season by winning the Ohio Class A crown with a 3-0 championship game win over Dublin after downing Spencerville, 2-1, in the semifinals.

Wiley, a senior class president and honor student, attended Gannon College in Eric, Pa., and played basketball for four years. The playmaker averaged 10.6 points as a senior with a high game of 28 points. He scored 896 points in his career and was inducted into the Gannon Sports Hall of Fame in 1986.

After graduation, he remained in the Eric area and became a civic leader who was recognized multiple times including the naming of a public building after him. He died in 2004



Jim Wood (Athlete - 1970s)

Jim Wood (Steubenville Catholic Central High School, Class of 1973). Jim Wood (Steubenville Catholic Central High School, Class of 1973). This Crasader was one of the most dominant basketball big men in the OVAC during the early 1970s. The talented 6-foot, 9-inch post help to earry Catholic Central to its first OVAC hoop crown, turning the trick in 1973 in Class AAA — the largest classification at that time. The Crusaders went 22-2 that season, winning sectional and district titles along the way. He averaged 20 points and 15 rebounds a game as a sentor. Those numbers, combined with the team's success, earned him first-team alt-Obia UPI and second-team AP all-state accolades to go with all-Eastern District clanding.

He was named first-team all-OVAC as a junior and senior, named a co-captain in 1973. In addition, one Florida newspaper tabbed him as honorable mention All-American as a senior. Wood was also a two-year lenerman in baseball for Catholic Central.

Wood was also a two-year lefterman in baseball for Catholic Central.

His superb bardwood exploits carned him a scholarship to Georgia Tech, where he became a four-year regular at center and was the team's leading scorer his first three years [11.1, 15.0] and 14.7) and second on the team as a senior (14.1). He also led the team in rebounds two years. His career totals included 1.459 points and 740 rebounds.

Wood was inducted into the Georgia Tech Hall of Pame in 1985, just eight years after earning his degree from the school. After his collegiate career, Wood played basketball in South

America for 12 years.

The Steubenville Catholic Central Hall of Famer still resides in the Ohio Valley and is an OVAC basketball official.

Jim Woofter (Athlete - 1970s)

Jim Woofter (Oak Glen High School, Class of 1973). He earned the honor of becoming the first Golden Bear athlete to attain All-American honors, earning those plaudits for his grid greatness at linebacker, center and fullback.

The 6-2, 225-pounder was a two-time first-team all-state, all-OVAC

and all-Valley honoree. As a senior, he was captain of the all-Valley "Big School" defensive team and runner-up for the Hunt Award, emblematic

As a senior, he recorded 126 tackles, 49 assists, five fumble recoveries and forced six fumbles in helping the Golden Bears to a 7-3 record. The tenacious defender registered 86 solo tackles, 46 assists, eight tackles for losses, three fumble recoveries and four

registered of soft tackies, a assists, eight tackies for tosses, infectionable recoveries and four interceptions as a junior.

Woofter's sparkling football exploits earned him All-American honors from Coach & Athlete and Scholastic Coach magazines.

His prep football success attracted recruiters from all the major schools, and Woofter opted

or the University of Tennessee. It proved to be a good choice as he was a three year letterman and two-year starter at defensive tackle for the Volunteers.

His athletic success was not limited to just the gridinon. As a senior, he was state shot put champion at Oak Glen with a 52-foot, 7-inch effort, and he also won the OVAC Class AAA shot put crown. Woofter was also a force in wrestling. He was the OVAC runner-up at

heavyweight as a senior.







Kim Augur (Athlete - 1980s)

Kim Augur (East Liverpool High School, Class of 1983). Her most impressive claim to fame is winning the OHSAA Class AAA 400-meter dash state championship as a senior in 54.87 seconds. She missed the state record by a mere one-tenth of a second, Later on in that same state meet. Augur claimed the silver medal in the 200-meter dash (25.18).

This Potter track great still holds the Ohio Valley record in the 400 meters at 54.87. She also established school records in the 100 (12.3) and 200 (24.56), the latter still ranking as the second-best in valley history behind the 24.22 turned in years later Bridgeport's Brittany Bocker, also an OVAC Haft of Famer.

Augur is also a member of the Potters' school-record 4x400-meter relay

team which turned in a 4-11.1 clocking during her junior campaign.

Her achievements earned her a track scholarship to The Ohio State University.

Augur was no one-sport wonder. She was also a talented basketball player for East Liverpool, earning first-team all-OVAC honors as a junior and senior. Augur was inducted into the East Liverpool High Athletic Hall of Fame in 1990.

Dave Delande (Athlete - 1980s)

Dave Delande (St. Clairsville High School, Class of 1982). This wrestling great distinguished houseff both on the prep and collegiate levels.

His Red Devits' mat career was nothing short of sensational. He finished with a stelfar 136-10-1 record. In the process, Delande was a three-time OVAC champion. He was also the runner-up as a freshman.

Delande was also a runner-up at the OHSAA State Wrestling Championships as 132-pound junior and be placed fifth at 138 pounds as a senior.

He continued his wrestling greatness at West Liberty under the nurturing of legendary coach Vince Monseau.

Delande was a three-time NAIA All-American for the Hilltoppers, achieving the feat in three different weight divisions. He was seventh at 142, fourth at 150 and national runner-up at 158. His four-year WL record was a sparkling 96-23.

He still ranks in the top 10 in eight Hilltopper all-time mat records: falls, shutouts, 2-point near falls, 3-point near falls, reversals, team points, wins and best winning percentage.

Just as impressively, Delande also was the Hilltopper wrestling program's first Academic All-American, earning back-to-back academic laurels in 1985 and 1986. He was also three-time team captain. time team captain.

He was inducted into the West Liberty University Athletic Hall of Fame in 2010, After gaining his West Liberty diploma, he became a CPA.















Jodi Bates (Athlete - 1990s)

Jodi Bates (Meadowbrook High School, Class of 1999). Speed to burn. That's exactly what this former Colt possessed as it pertained to track and field.

track and field.

A standout sprinter for the Colts, Bates shined in the 100- and 200meter dashes, winning 10 state medals during her career.

Bates burst onto scene in a big way as a freshman, placing second in
both the 100 (12,32) and 200 (25,12) at the Division II state meet. She

didn't slow down from there.

As a sophomore, Bates won her first state championship, blazing the Ohio Stadium track to a 24.87 to capture the 200-meter dash. She also finished second in the 100 (12.37) for the second straight season.


Bates broke through and climbed to the top of the state podium in the 100-meter dash as a junior. It was one of four medals she claimed in that meet. She won the 100 in 12.22 finished second in the 200 (25.25) and ran a leg on the fifth-place 4x100 (50.81) and eighth place 4x400 squads.

During her senior campaign, Bates ran consistently under the coveted 12-second barrier. She successfully defended her 100-meter title (12.10) and anchored the fifth-place 4x100 (50.33) during the first state meet at Dayton's Welcome Stadium.

En route to the state competition, Bates won 14 OVAC championships, including four straight 100- and 200-meter titles. She also claimed 12 district and 10 regional championships during her career, while running a personal best time of 11.95, which still stands as

Meadowbrook's all-time best and is the second-best in Ohio Valley history.

After her prep career, Bates signed to run at Wheeling Jesuit University. She competed just one season before developing an injury, which proved to be career ending. She attempted a comeback after transferring to Muskingum University, but the injury was simply too much to overcome.



Zach Amedro (Athlete - 2000s)

Zach Amedro (John Marshall High School, Class of 2005). The Ohio

Valley has produced several prolific passers in its history. This former Monarch is near the top in every passing category there is.

As a senior, Amedro finished fourth in the balloting for the Kennedy Award and was a first-team all-state selection after putting forth one of the most prolific statistical seasons in history. He completed 188-of-289 passes for 2,939 yards and 33 touchdowns. He also ran for six touchdowns.

That completed a brilliant three-year stint as quarterback in which he threw for more than 6,000 yards and 53 touchdowns. He completed 426-

Along with his state-wide honors, Amedro was named All-OVAC and was the offensive captain of The Intelligencer's Alf-Valley team. In 2002, he was the newspaper's "Sophomore of the Year.'

of the Year.

After originally attending then FCS member Appalachian State, Amedro transferred back to the Ohio Valley and had a remarkable career at West Liberty where he twice finished as runner-up for the Harlan Hill Award, which is the Division II equivalent to the Heisman Trophy.

Amedro set Division II passing records for yards (14,733) and completions (1,079). His thirty 300-yard passing games were also the best in Division II history.

In leading the Hilltoppers to the NCAA Division II playoffs as a senior, Amedro finished 329-of-485 for 4.058 yards and 38 touchdowns in 10 games. He had a season-high eight touchdowns and 44 completions.

During Amedro's junior season, the Hilltoppers won the WVIAC title and qualified for the playoffs, avenuing their only loss with a wild 84-63 victory against Edinboro.

Amedro was twice named WVIAC "Player of the Year" and was a first-team Division II

All-American and second-team Small College All-American by The Associated Press.







Matt Powell (Athlete - 1990s)

Matt Powell (Barnesville High School, Class of 1990). This former Shamrocks didn't just score the ball, he filled it up every night during an impressive four-year career with 2,174 career points (still in the top 30 all-time in Ohio).

Powell helped lead the Shattrocks to their first trip to the Ohio Sweet 16 during his senior season in which he scored 32 points per game en route to first-team all-Ohio accolades by both The Associated Press and United Press International.

UPI selected him as its Division III state player of the year, a worthy honor when you consider he scored 760 points that season, connected on 60, three-point goals and was 168-of-203 from the foul line. That senior-year explosion fol-

60, three-point goals and was 168-of-203 from the foul line. That senior-year explosion followed a junior season in which he scored 621 points and his 46 "treys".

Powell made an immediate impact for the Shamrocks. He scored 282 points as a freshman and then really took off, pouring in 510 points as a sophomore.

His presence is still felt at Barnesville. He owns three of the top four point totals ever recorded at Barnesville. His single-game high of 45 ranked third and his 60 bonus baskets rank second all-time. Powell's career points and free throws made (411) are school records. Along with being recognized as all-Ohio, Powell played in both the OVAC and the Ohio North-South All-Star Games. He was the captain of the all-OVAC Class AAA team, Eastern District Player of the Year, District 12 Player of the Year and captained the all-Valley Big School team. He was selected to the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2010. Fame in 2010.

After his prep career, Powell originally went to the Air Force Academy, but transferred back to Rio Grande College and etched his name into its lore

He scored 2,367 career points at the college level, which is second in Rio Grande history to only Bevo Francis. He led Rio Grande to the NAIA National Tournament in Tulsa, Oklahoma during his senior season. He was a three-time all-Mid Ohio Conference selection, a two-time all-District 22 honoree and a NAIA All-American Honorable Mention choice after the 1992. 93 campaign, As a senior at Rio Grande, Powell, who battled a foot injury during his junior campaign, scored 705 points and served as a co-captain.

Kacie Vavrek (Athlete - 2000s)

Kacie Vavrek (Bellaire High School, Class of 2002). You name the sport and this former Big Red shined brightly.

A four-year letterman in three sports, Vavrek left her biggest marks on the basketball court and on the track.

In basketball, Vavrek scored in bunches. She finished her prep career with 1.631 points, which at the time of her graduation was tops amongst Bellaire females. It's since been broken by her sister, Ashley.

During her senior season, Vavrek led the area in scoring at 23.9 points a game. She was named first-team All-Ohio, All-District 12, All-OVAC, Eastern District "Player of the Year" and finished fourth in the voting for Ohio's Ms. Basketball

Vavrek took part in both the Ohio North-South Game and the OVAC All-Star Game. She

led the South squad with 20 points in that contest.

As a junior, Vavrek scored at an OV-best 22.7 points per game clip. She was named first-team All-Ohio. All-Eastern District, All-District 12, All-OVAC and captained the All-Valley On the track, Vavrek was one of the area's all-time best high hurdlers and high jumpers.

Vavrek finished her prep career with 10 state medals. Taking that a step further, she won a trio of state championships.

After reaching the state final in the highs as a freshman and sophomore to come up short. Vavrek broke through as a junior by winning the state title. She was fourth in the low hurdles

As a senior, Vavrek went double-gold. She defended her high hurdle title and added the lows, which was an event she didn't compete in often early in her career. She was a four-time placer in the high jump. Vavrek's personal-best time of 14.53 had been the valley's all-time

Along with her state success, Vavrek was a four-time OVAC high hurdle champion. All told, she won or played a role in 11 conference track titles and helped the Big Reds claim two team crowns.

Vavrek was also a standout in volleyball. She was chosen as All-OVAC and played in both

the District 12 and OVAC All Star Games.

Vavrek was named the Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club's Female Athlete of the Year for 2002. With opportunities to run track or play hoops, Vavrek elected to continue her roundball career at Kent State University. She was a four-year player for the Flashes and started in 22 games during her career

Dave Caldwell (Coaches)

Dave Caldwell (Bealtsville High School, Class of 1973). He proved the theory of "the little engine that could" by achieving a fremendous amount of success coaching football and one of the smallest schools around, compiling a record of 196-102-1 during his 29 years as head coach of his alma mater.

Caldwell began his coaching career as an assistant at Caldwell High

under Mike Devol and then returned "home" to Beallsville where he assisted J.B. Majors for two seasons (1981-82). He was elevated to the

assisted J.B. Majors for two seasons (1981-82). He was elevated to the head coaching post in 1993 and held that job until retiring in 2011.

Under Caldwell's guidance, the Blue Devils won six Ohio Valley.

Athletic Conference Class A championships (1988, 1992, 1994, 2000, 2006 and 2011) and six Pioneer Valley Conference tiles. Bealtsville reached the OHSAA playoffs eight times (1994, 1999, 2000, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008, 2001) and posted a playoff record of 5-8. That included a run to the Division VI, Region 23 championship and a spot in the state semifinals in 1994 and a career-capping 10-3 season in 2011 when BHS advanced to the D-VI, Region 23 tile contest.

Caldwell was tabbed "Coach of the Year" in the Eastern District and PVC multiple times

Caldwell was tabbed "Coach of the Year" in the Eastern District and PVC multiple times and he coached in the OVAC Rudy Mumley Alf-Star Football Game five times (1989, 1993, 2001, 2005 and 2009) with a 2-3 record in the mid-summer classic.

Caldwell, who made a brief coaching return as an assistant at Shenandoah in 2014, also assisted in basketball and track during his time at Bealfsville.

As an athlete, he was a three-sport performer at Bealfsville High School (football, basketball and track), playing on the school's first unbeaten football team in 1972. He went on to play football for four years at Muskingum College, earning his degree there in 1977 and later obtaining a master's degree from Salem University.





Arthur 'Butch' Joseph (OVAC Family)

Arthur "Butch" Joseph (Bellaire High School, Class of 1963). When Arthur "Butch" Joseph (Bellaire High School, Class of 1963). When the conference needs to keep things "running" in the fall or the spring. Joseph has been the go-to guy for many years as a member of the OVAC. Track and Cross Country committees, serving as co-chairman of the track committee with his wife, Donna, an OVAC Hall of Fame inductee in 2007. A veteran of the United States Air Force who served during the Victnam War, he started officiating local track meets in the early 1970s and began his association with the OVAC in the late 1980s, assisting Floyd Deaton with the OVAC Volleyball Championships and being responsible for compiling the weekly conference standings in that sport.

Joseph has been an integral part of the OVAC Cal Gitfin Track Championships dating back to the days when the small school divisions were contested at Shadyside's Fleming Field, and he also assisted with the big school meets at Bellaire's Nelson Field either behind the scenes or as an on-track official.

or as an on-track official.

It was Joseph's vision to convert the OVAC Track Championships to their current format.

It was his desire to have the best athletes, regardless of class, compete against one-another in an overall championship meet, which is how the event has been contested since 2010 at St. Clairsville High.

Joseph has also been the man behind the computer responsible for the pre-event preparation and timing/scoring 'at the OVAC Cal Pokas Cross Country Championships on the campus of Meadowbrook High School in Byesville for more than 15 years.

Along with his wife, Joseph received the OVAC Cal Giffin Track Service award in 1997.

Jeff Harrison (Media)

Jeff Harrison (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1977). He has been a member of the sports media for 35 years and counting, including the last 17 at The Daily Jeffersonian in Cambridge where he has been the Sports Editor since 2007. Prior to that, he spent 18 years at The Times Leader in Martins Ferry.

He originated the concept of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Hall of Fame in 2004; is a member of the selection committee and in charge of of raine in 2004; is a member of the selection confinite and in charge of producing the program for that event. He's also a member of the OVAC Sofiball Committee and OVAC Coach of the Year Selection Committee and previously handled publicity for the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game for seven years.

Harrison was also the catalyst behind the formation of the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2008, serving as Chairman of the Hall of Fame Selection Committee and handling publicity since that time; and is a member of the Martins Ferry High School Athletic Hall of Fame Committee, serving as the primary researcher/biographer for that group.

He is a member of The Associated Press East District Selection Committee for football/ boys' basketball/girls' basketball, serving as chairman since 2009; an AP state poll voter; a member of the Ohio High School Athletic Association Media Advisory Committee and a member of the Ohio Prep Sportswiters Association. He was the 2006 recipient of the Eastern Ohio Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association's Media Award: District

He also served as public address announcer at several venues over the years, including Martins Ferry football and boys' basketball, Meadowbrook girls' basketball and the District 12 All-Star Basketball Classic; and was a youth baseball/softball coach for 22 years in the Martins Egrey Chicks Athletic Association and the Guernera Multay Baseball Association. Terry Leggett (Coaches)

Terry Leggett [Midvale High School, Class of 1965]. The ultra-successful Leggett began his coaching career as an assistant at Skyvue High School and then was head coach there for two seasons (1973-74 and '74-75). He went to old Zane Trace High School for the next two years ('75-76

and '76-77) and when that school consolidated with Madison High to become Buckeye Trail, Leggett was named the school's first coach.

His initial Warrior squad (1977-78) accomplished a remarkable feat, posting a perfect 18-0 regular season (21-1 overall) and winning the OVAC Class A championship, sectional and district titles and finishing runner-up in the regional, losing a 43-42 heartbreaker to Indian Valley

During his 12 years at Trait the called it quits following the 1988-89 season), the Warriors never had a losing season and amassed an incredible 225-50 record. That included two trips to the OHSAA Class A "Final Four" – his 1982-83 team went 25-1 and the 1986-86 team turned things around after a 4-5 start to make the state senitinals and finish 20-7.

turned things around after a 4-5 start to make the state sentimats and missi 20-2. Leggett-coached Trail teams won nine sectional titles, five district crowns and two regional championships and he was named UPI Class A Ohio "Co-Coach of the Year" in 1983. His teams won OVAC titles four straight years ('78, '79, '80 and '81) and were state-ranked six times. He was named overall OVAC "Coach of the Year" in 1978 and was also a four-time District 12 "Coach of the Year" honoree. All told, his teams compiled a 268-92 record in 16 seasons

He chached in the OVAC All Star Basketball Classic three times and was an assistant coach

He coached in the OVAC All-Star Basketbatt Classic three times and was an assistant coach in the Ohio North-South All-Star Game once.

A graduate of Findlay College, he served as an Fastern District Board member and was the Game Director of the District 12 Basketbatt All-Star Game for many years. He also served on the Rules Interpretation Committee of the OHSAA. Inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997, Leggett was also a physical education teacher and athletic director during his days at Buckeye Trail. He passed away in 2009.









Roger Sowers (Official)

Roger Sowers (Roseville High School, Class of 1952). He spent a number of years in various roles = coach, athletic director, guidance counselor, principal and instructor — but Sowers is probably best known as a longtime basketball official

Sowers, who spent more than 30 years in education, began as a bas ketball coach, serving four years as head coach at Pleasant City High and seven years at Barnesville High, posting a combined 130-99 record. He officiated his first varsity basketball game in 1959, and became a

full-time referee in 1968 once his coaching days were over. He worked
40 years over five decades, including nearly a quarter of a century as a tournament official
at the sectional, district and regional levels.
He was a charter member of the East Central Ohio Officials Association in the Cambridge

area, serving as president, rules interpreter and on the executive board over the years. He also served as president of the Ohio Association of Basketball Officials.

also served as president of the Ohio Association of Basketball Officials.

Sowers, who also officiated at the college level in the Ohio Athletic Conference, spent 20-plus years teaching a basketball officiating course at Ohio University Eastern, with several of his former students later becoming high school and college officials. He was inducted into the Ohio High School Athletic Association's Officials Hall of Fame in 1995; received a Distinguished Service Award from the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association and a Meritorious Award from the OHSAA in 1998 for 40 years of service. The Roger Sowers Memorial Scholarship was established by his family in 2000, with the yearly recipient a Barnesville High senior planning to attend Ohio University Eastern and major in education. major in education.

A Crooksville native, he earned a bachelor's degree from Marietta College where he was a four-year letterman in baseball and a one-year letterman in basketball, and obtained his

master's degree from West Virginia University He passed away in 1998 at the age of 64.

Bill Gompers (1940s Athlete)

Bill Gompers (Wheeling Central High School, Class of 1945). He was an honored running back on two top Maroon Knight football teams and also lettered on two state Catholic Tournament championship basketball

A two-time selection on the five team All-City football honor roll, the two-way standout helped Central win the 1943 City Championship with standout helped central with the 1943 city Champotottap with a 9-1 regular season record before the Knights competed in a post season Steel Bowl contest won. 20-19 by Rochester.

As a senior in the first year of OVAC competition, he was team co-captain on a 6-3-1 record Knight squad.

In basketball. Gompers competed on two teams which extended the Knights' streak to five consecutive W.Va. Catholic Tournament championships. The 1944 team went 22-3 in regular season and Catholic Tournament play before the Knights won two of three games in the Eastern States Catholic Tournament. That team was coached by charter OVAC Hall of Fame coach Jim Foti.

Both Gompers and Foti were among inductees into the charter Wheeling Central High School Sports Hall of Fame.

During Gompers' senior season, the 6-foot-1, 180-pound back was offered football scholarships at several colleges but opted for Notre Dame where he lettered for three seasons and played both ways on two Irish teams proclaimed as National Champions - 1946 (8-0-1 record) and 1947 (9-0), which was led by Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Lujack, Gompers, cited as a top blocker, averaged 6.8 yards a carry. He played in the 1946 scoreless tie vs.

Army which was labeled the "Game of the Century."

Gompers was selected to play on the College All-Star team which played the NFL champions, the Chicago Cardinals, in a post-season game.

Drafted by the Buffalo Bills of the pro All-American Football Conference, he played both

ways for one season as the team bowed to the Cleveland Browns in the championship game

Tom Franckhauser (1950s Athlete)

Tom "Knute" Franckhauser (Steubenville Catholic Central High School, Class of 1955).The 6-foot, 195-pound offensive end-defensive back was the leading scorer as a senior on a 9-1 record Crusader team, the school's best record since 1946. He landed nine touchdown passes – high for that era – and returned three pass interceptions for scores. His best output was in a 45-6 win over Wellsville when he scored on an 81-yard TD reception and returned two interceptions for 57- and 69-yard scores.

TD reception and returned two interceptions for 57- and 69-yard scores. An All-Valley and All-Eastern Ohio honoree, he competed in the Ohio-W-Va. All-Star game won by Ohio, 31-20.

He accepted a scholarship to Purdue University where he lettered three years and started as a junior and senior as the team's leading pass receiver. He was named team MVP as a senior. He helped the Boilermakers upset the nation's No. 1 ranked team, Michigan State, in 1957. A second team All-Big Ten honoree as a senior, he played in 17 career games with 30 receptions for 611 yards and four TDs.

He was the 33rd overall selection in the 1959 NFL Draft third round by the Los Angeles Rams. In his rookie season, the cornerback had three interceptions.

In 1960, he was selected by the Dallas Cowboys in the NFL Expansion Draft and became the first Cowboy to carry the ball by returning the opening kickoff in the inaugural regular season game.

After two years with the Cowboys, he capped his five-year, 58-game pro career with a two-year stint on the Minnesota Vikings. He was forced to retire in 1964 after suffering a brain injury during a tackle in a training camp scrimmage. He had 13 career interceptions.

A first cousin of OVAC Hall of Famer Danny Abramowicz, he passed away in 1997.





William 'Catfish' Hearst (1950s Athlete)

William "Catfish" Hearst (Wellsburg High School, Class of 1959). The first sprinter in the Ohio Valley and W. Va. to break the 50-second barrier at 440 yards, he was dominant at the quarter mile, which he didn't start running until his junior season, and 220 yards while also competitive in the 100 and long jump.

As a senior, he was unbeaten in the 440 with wins at the W.Va. Regional and star mosts a properly title—the openclass OVAC meet, where he

As a schor, he was unbeaten in the 440 with wins at the W.Va. Regional and state meets—a repeat title—the one-class OVAC meet where he was top scorer, the Bellaire, Toronto, Wellsburg and Mansfield Relays, and was one of only two Ohio Valley athletes to ever win an individual event at the most prestigious Midwest invitational meet. His 49.6 mark at Bellaire was the first Ohio Valley sub-50-second clocking, and he time and all-time best 49.1 at the W.Va. regional meet. At the one-class state meet, he repeated as 440 champion with a record 49.5 mark and also won the 220 with a record-tying 22.1 time. As a junior, he was the state 440 in \$5.05 seconds.

with a record 49.5 mark and also won the 220 with a record-tying 22.1 time, As a junior, he won the state 440 in 50.05 seconds.

He was high scorer at the Bellaire Relays event featuring athletes from three states and won by a Paul Warfield-led Warren Harding team. Hearst won the 100 (10.0), was second in the 220 and won the 440 (49.6) with two meet records.

A two-time All-Valley Track honoree at 100, 220 and 440, the Wellsburg Express was selected captain as a senior and noted as "the greatest quarter-miler produced in these parts.", Hearst also was a four-year football and three-year basketball player and competed in the 1959 W.Va., Ohio All-Star football game won by W.Va., 7-6.

He attended W. Va. State and also served in the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War. After returning home, he was a long-time coach of the Ohio Valley Track Club, a certified track official and helped coach at Bethany College, An annual Memorial Scholarship in his name is presented each year at Brooke High. is presented each year at Brooke High. Hearst passed away in 2002.

Roger Alford (1960s Athlete)

Roger Alford (Wintersville High School, Class of 1962). He was a

Roger Alford (Wintersville High School, Class of 1962). He was a racial pioneer at West Virginia University and the Southern Conference after a three-sport career at old Wintersville High.

Alford competed in football, basketball and track for the Golden Warriors and was labeled by Hall of Fame coach Bob Kettlewell as "one of the two best football players I coached" along with OVAC Hall of Famer Alan Jack, who later starred at Ohio State University.

In football, the 5-foot-10, 225-pound tackle was All-OVAC Class AA, All-Valley "Big School" first team, and All-Eastern Ohio first team all-class selection.

The Mountaineers broke the "color barrier" in 1962 when they recommended the selection of the selection of

au-crass selection.

The Mountaineers broke the "color barrier" in 1962 when they recruited Alford and fullback Dick Leftridge of Hinton, W.Va., the first African-Americans to wear a WVU football uniform. After playing on the freshman team, Alford lettered three varsity seasons and started the last two as an offensive guard. He was named to the 1960-69 All-Decade Team at WVU.

In 1999, he was inducted postumously into the WVU Sports Hall of Fame. He was the fourth Alford brother to attend college and play football. His brother Bob co-

captained the Kent State team in 1961. Roger earned four degrees from WVU. completing his studies for bachelor's, master's, physical therapy and dental degrees. He was a dentist in

Detroit when he died in 1996.

Alford was a starter in at least three memorable WVU games - the 63-48 win over Pitt in 1965; the 28-27 upset win over No. 9 Syracuse in 1964; and the 1964 indoor Liberty Bowl game vs. Utah in Atlantic City.

Dick Tomlinson (1960s Athlete)

Dick Tomlinson (Wheeling High School, Class of 1961), He was a 6-foot-5, 210-pound three-sport standout who was a rare two-year "Big" all-class, first team All-State basketball honoree: state and OVAC track star with rare combination (shot put champion and top placer in 100-yard sprint); and football quarterback. He earned a basketball scholarship to the University of Florida and set a school game point record.

the University of Florida and set a school game point record.

At old Wheeling High, he competed in basketball, football and track for three years and also golf as a senior.

In basketball, besides being a two-time "Big" all-class and Class AAA and the five-school All-City honor rolls. He averaged 23 points a name both as a junior and senior - the top marks in the city and OVAC Class AAA. As a senior and team captain, he led the Wildcast to sectional and regional titles and into the state tournament before bowing to Beckley Woodrow Wilson in the Class AAA semifinals. He earned All-Tournament honors. In track, the senior team captain won the state one-class shot put (51-4 1/2) and placed 4th in the 100-vard dash. He was second in the shot out as a junior.

in track, the senior team captain won the state one-class shot put 151-4 1121 and piaced 4th in the 100-yard dash. He was second in the shot put as a junior. Tomlinson was All-Valley both in sprints and weights. At the OVAC meet, he won the shot put (51-5 3/8) and placed second in the 100 and third at 220 yards. In football, the rangy quarterback was team co-captain and team MVP as a senior. He earned All-City two years and was selected captain as a senior. He rated mention on the All-OVAC and All-State Class AAA two years. As a senior, he led the Wildcats to their fourth straight City title and 6-3-1 record including an 18-14 upset of eventual state Class AAA champion. Weir, the only loss for the Red Riders led by Kennedy Award winner and OVAC Hall of

Famer Bob Kelley.

At the University of Florida, after playing on the freshman basketball team, he started three varsity seasons and played in 72 games with 863 points and 529 rebounds while shooting 49.2% from the floor and 73.2% at the line. As a junior, he set Gator school records with 44 points including 19 goals in a win over Tampa. The 44-points currently ranks No. 2 all-time in school history. As a senior, he averaged 12.9 points and 7.1 rebounds.











Gary Repella (1970s Athlete)

Gary Repella (1970s Athlete)

Gary Repella (Steubenville High School, Class of 1970). He enjoyed stellar careers in basketball, baseball and football for the Big Red.

It was in boops that led to a collegiate scholarship as Ohio State coaching legend Fred Taylor inked the talented 6-3 guard, one year after landing St. John Central star Allan Hornyak.

Repella helped lead Steubenville to a 23-1 mark as a senior as Big Red, under Hall of Fame Coach Chuck Wart, elaimed the OVAC Class AAA championship. He averaged 18.1 points per game in becoming the district player-of-the-year while being named first-team All-Ohio.

Repella was a two-time All-Valley "Big School" and All-OVAC honoree. He scored in double figures in every game as a senior for the well-balanced Big Red. He averaged 15 points per game as a junior.

He was also a gem on the diamond, starting for three seasons. The slick-fielding second baseman helped Steubenville win the OVAC title in his senior season of 1968 with a 22-7-1 mark. In his final campaign, he batted 357 on the strength of 35 his while being named first-team All-Valley. There was no All-OVAC team at that time.

Repella was selected to play in the Ohio All-Star Game in Columbus, which also signified All-State honors. He was also a key performer for the Steubenville Legion team which earned a berth in the state tournament in Athens.

Repella was a two-year starter in football at Steubenville, As a senior, he directed the ground-oriented Big Red to a 7-2-1 record, tying powerhouse Massillon. He completed 30-of-64 passes for 517 yards and five TDs that fall.

After graduating from Steubenville High, Repella took his versatile talents to Columbus to play basketball at OSU.

The NCAA had a rule in place prohibiting freshmen to play on the varsity squad, but Repella made the most of his time with the Buckeyes' frosh, leading the team with a 19.2 scoring average. A back injury slowed his sophonore campaign when he started two games and played in 15, He tallied 10 points in his first start that seas Repella made the most of his time with the Buckeyes frosh, leading the feam with a 19.2 scoring average, A back injury slowed his sophomore campaign when he started two games and played in 15. He tallied 10 points in his first start that season against Butler, As a junior, he served as a backup to Hornyak, a three-time first-team All-Big Ten honorec.

Repella became a full-time starter as a senior, and he was second on the team with 59 assists while averaging 7.6 points a game, with a high game of 19 points. He played in 23 of 24 games and started 19 as a two-guard.

He still resides in Steubenville, serving the city for many years as law director. His daughter, Liz, was a 2,000-point hoop scorer for Big Red before starring at WVU.

Chris Jones (1980s Athlete)

Chris Jones (John Marshall High School, Class of 1982). Bob Montgomery has authored a legendary career as the longtime head base-ball coach at John Marshall. In his four-plus decades at the Monarch helm. he has garnered nearly 900 wins, so when he says Chris Jones is the "best high school player I've coached," it has impact, The talented righthander,

who also yielded a potent bat, has the stats to back up that statement.

In his three years on the Monarchs' mound, Jones recorded an amazing 30-3 pitching mark. Two of his setbacks were shutout defeats. He helped JM capture three successive OVAC 4A titles (1980-82) while compiling a brilliant 84-15-1 record.

Jones started his JM career on a high note, compiling a 9-0 pitching mark as a sophomore Montgomery's charges won an amazing 31 of 33 starts. Jones was accorded second-team

all-Valley's honors that spring.

He raised his level of play even more as a junior, dazzling both as a hurler and a hitter as JM He raised his level of play even more as a junior, dazzling both as a hurler and a hitter as JM compiled a stellar 25-4 mark. At the plate, Jones led the valley with a smoking, 500 batting average, going 46-of-92 with eight doubles, six triples, three homers and 31 RB1 while scoring 26 runs, As a pitcher, he won 10 of 11 decisions, striking out 122 in 78 innings of work. He had a miniscule 1.62 ERA while walking just 31 batters. He earned first team, all-state, all-Valley and all-OVAC plaudits that spring.

Jones was just as dominating as a senior, helping JM garner a 28-9-1 record. He struck out 171 batters in 97 innings of work. He was 11-2 on the mound with a 1.61 ERA. He batted, 393 with 44 hits and an Ohio Valley-leading eight home runs. He knocked in 37 runs and scored 32 more. He blasted six triples and two doubles. He was named co-captain of the all-Valley team while also being named first-team all-West Virginia, all-OVAC and all-Mountaineer League. Jones also sparkled on the gridiron as a senior, carning honorable mention all-OVAC honors

Jones also sparkled on the gridiron as a senior, earning honorable mention all-OVAC honors as a defensive back.

The Ohio State University won the recruiting battle for the talented Monarch, Jones was in the Buckeyes' starting rotation as a sophomore and junior, going 8-8 with 134 strikeouts. The Toronto Blue Jays drafted him in the fourth round after his junior year. He pitched sevens seasons in the minors, reaching the Class AAA level.

Scot Maffe (1980s Athlete)

Scot Maffe (Bellaire High School, Class of 1985). Be it football, bas-ketball or baseball, Maffe delivered in quality fashion for the Big Reds.

Although equally productive in all three sports, baseball was his linch-pin. After his stellar Big Reds' diamond career, he matriculated to Ohio University where he played baseball three years for the Athens-based Bobcats, lettering twice.

Maffe was a four-year letterwinner in baseball at Bellaire, earning a myriad of honors after establishing a host of school records. When he completed his Big Reds' career, he owned the following baseball records:

season at-bats (105), career singles (85), doubles in a game (3), triples in a game (2), RBI in a game (6), career runs (95), stolen bases in a game (4), season (33) and career (55); innings pitched season (76), career (202) and pitching wins season (12),

career (26).

He was a first-team all-OVAC, all-District and all-Valley honoree in all three sports as a senior. He was also selected to play in all three OVAC All-Star games.

Maffe was a two-year starter at quarierback for Coach John Magistro in football. He was special mention all-Otio as a senior along with first team all-Eastern District and all-OVAC He was also the Big Reds' captain.

Maffe was a slick and savvy point guard for Coach Gene Ammirante on the hardwood, earning honorable mention all-OVAC as a junior and first team honors as a senior. The three-year hoop letterwinner was a second team all-Valley honore as a junior. He enjoyed a banner senior campaign, earning first-team all-OVAC, all-District and all-Valley honors while also being a special mention all-Ohio honoree.



Jami Bendle (1990s Athlete)

Jami Bendle (Edison High School, Class of 1994). This former Wildeat ace was absolutely dominant in the pitching circle throughout her prep and collegiate careers.

Her pitching stats were simply mind-boggling. Bendle finished with an 86-14 career record, which was an Ohio Valley record at the time of her graduation. She worked 649 innings, while recording 780 strikeouts against just 150 career walks. She allowed only 257 hits. Those stats certainly weren't hollow either, as they translated to three OVAC titles. three sectional crowns, three district titles and a pair of trips to the Ohio State Tournament.

As a senior, which was the first year of the Edison Local consolidation, Bendle's work in the circle helped the Wildcats reach the Division I regional tournament with a 29-0 record. She defeated Upper Arlington, while throwing a no-hitter, in the semifinals. Their quest for return trip to state came up short against Westerville South.

During her junior season, Bendle guided Edison South to the Division II state final where it fell, 6-1, to Talfmadge, As a sophomore. Edison South advanced to the state semifinals behind Bendle's right arm before falling to LaGrange Keystone, 4-2.

Bendle's necomplishments didn't go unnoticed. She was named alt-OVAC four times and twice earned conference player of the year. She was twice named to the first-team all-Olid squad and once to the second-team all-state unit. She was a four-time all-Eastern District pick and four-year member of the all River Valley League team.

Bendle's prep prominence carned her the right to pitch at the Division I level. She attended East Carolina University, helping the Pirates to win three consecutive Big South as a junior and second-team as a senior.

While earning four letters at ECU, Bendle led the team in wins and strikeouts for three straight seasons. She had 27 victories in 1997 and also had 32 complete games that season, She finished at ECU ranked second in school history in games pitched [136], games started (118), complete games (92), innings pitched (755), strikeouts (328), wins (79) and shutouts (27), She compiled a 1.86 earned run average, which ranked fourth in school history. Also a standout in the classroom, Bendle earned Academic All-American district honors in 1998,

Mike Snively (1990s Athlete)

Mike Snively (River High School, Class of 1992), There wasn't a sport

Snively played in the OVAC All-Star Game where he was voted a team captain. When the winter rolled around, Snively didn't slow down, On the basketball court, he scored 1.415 points and knocked down 214 career three-point goals, which was an Ohio Valley record when he graduated. As a senior, Snively led the Ohio Valley with 74 three-point goals. He scored 514 points during his senior season en route to third-team all-Ohio, first-team all-Eastern District, all-Valley, all-District 12 and all-OVAC co-captainey. As a junior, Snively poured in 22.4 points a contest to go along with 7.1 rebounds, three assists and 2.3 steals. He connected on 71 three-point goals that season en route to honorable mention all-Ohio, first-team all-Eastern District, all-OVAC and all-Valley.

As a sophomore, Snively scored 17.9 points a game and had an outing where he knocked in 10 bonus goals, which is still a River High record.

In the spring, Snively shined at shortstop and pitcher for the Pilots. He finished his career as a 377 hitter with 97 hits, 64 RBI and seven home runs. As a senior, Snively batted 617, which was an OVAC record at the time. He posted a 5-3 record on the mound with a 1.63 earned run average. He struck out 30 and walked 10 in 51 innings of work.

Snively was a first-team all-state selection as a senior and played in the prestigious


Snively was a first-team all-state selection as a senior and played in the prestigious Mizuno All-Star Game, He was the OVAC Class 3A Player of the Year along with all-Eastern District, all-Valley and all-EOBL. He batted .409 as a junior was all-OVAC, all-Eastern District and all-EOBL

After his prep career, Snively attended Glenville State College to play football and basketball. He later coached at Glenville and was the interim head basketball coach at Bluefield State College where he was the youngest head coach in the NCAA at 24 years old. He also coached women's basketball, women's tennis and softball at Bluefield.









Nate Davis (Athlete - 2000s)

Nate Davis (Bellaire High School, Class of 2006) -- It didn't matter the sport or season because this former Big Reds' standout just got it done.

A four-year letterman in basketball and a three-year letterman in foot-

ball. Davis re-wrote the Big Reds record books in both sports.

As a basketball player, Davis did it both on the inside and outside for Gene Ammirante's team. After helping to get the Big Reds to the OHSAA Division III State Tournament in 2004, Davis led the Big Reds back to the

regional in 2005 and to an undefeated regular season in 2006.

He finished his prep career with 2,562 points, which ranks ninth in Ohio history. Davis did much more than score the ball, however, as he also grabbed 1,175 rebounds, which ranks seventh in the Buckeye State, and he passed out

more than 500 assists

During his senior campaign, Davis averaged 38 9 points a contest en route to first-team all-Ohio accolades. He was a finalist for Mr. Basketball and was the Eastern District, District ant-Onto accordates, rie was a trialist for Air. Basketoatt and was the Eastern District, District 12 and OVAC Class 3A player of the year. He took part in both the Ohio North-South and Ohio-Kentucky All-Star games.

On the football field, Davis was just as impressive for Coach John Magistro's team. In his career, Davis completed 454-of-925 passes for 7,345 yards and 81 touchdowns. As a sophomore, Davis guided the Big Reds to the Division IV state semifinals, throwing for 2,296 yards and 22 touchdowns.

The Big Peder returned to the state semifinals in 2005 when Davis passed for 2,340 yards.

The Big Reds returned to the state semifinals in 2005 when Davis passed for 2,740 yards

and 35 touchdowns. Davis was Ohio's Division IV Offensive Player of the Year as a senior. He was a first-team all-Ohioan as both a junior and senior and earned second-team accolades as a sophomore. He was first-team all-OVAC three times and took part in both the Ohio North-South and

Along with his football and basketball prowess, Davis also lettered in baseball. He helped lead the Big Reds to the regional championship in 2003 when he was the club's every day catcher.

As a senior, Davis went out for track and won the OVAC discus title with a toss of 140 $\rm ft$, 9 in.

Davis inked a scholarship to Ball State University and won the starting quarterback job as a true freshman. All told, he spent three seasons as the Cardinals' starting quarterback before announcing he'd forego his senior season to enter the NFL Draft.

At Ball State, Davis passed for 9,233 yards and 74 touchdowns. He was named the Mid American Conference's Offensive Player of the Year in 2008 and a first-team all-MAC selection. He was a finalist for the Manning Award and also the Ball State team MVP both

as a sophomore and junior.

As a junior, he led the Cardinals to a 12-0 record and berth in the MAC Championship

After opting to enter the draft, Davis was selected in the fifth round by the San Francisco 49ers. He made the team as a rookie. He was released and later signed to the team's practice squad in 2010. He also signed contracts with the Colts and Seahawks, but has spent the last several seasons in an indoor league in Texas, playing for the Amarillo Venom.

Davis becomes the second member of his family to reach the Hall of Fame. His brother,

Jose, was inducted in 2007.



April Rotilio (Athlete - 2000s)

April Rotilio, St. John Central (Class of 2006) — Speed was the name of the game for this former Lady Irish track and field standout.

Rotilio is one of the area's most decorated track and field competitors, having compiled a whopping 12 medals as the OHSAA state meet. The premier event in Rotilio's career was the 400 meter dash. She placed four times at the state meet, including earning gold as both a junior and senior. As a senior, she needed a furious kick in the final 100 meters to win the title in a school-record time of 56.09. Along with the two golds, Rotilio also earned a silver in the lap dash in 2004 and a fourth place in 2003.



Her speed was limited to the 400, however. She was twice a bronze medalist in the 100 meter dash and once a bronze medalist in the 200. She briefly owned the Division III state record in the 200 meter dash when she won the OVAC title in 24.87. She owns the SJC record (12,12) in the 100 meters, too.

Rotilio's third state title came when she anchored the 4×2 team in 2006.

Along with her state prowess, Rotilio set the regional record in the 400 meter dash and also won 11 OVAC event titles as she led her teams to four consecutive conference championships. The Lady Irish finished as Division III state runnerup twice during her career, Along with the outdoor success she enjoyed, Rotilio was the 400 meter indoor state runnerup in 2006.

Earl Haberfield (OVAC 'Contributor')

Earl Haberfield (Wheeling Central Catholic High School, Class of 1954). He originated the OVAC Basketball Classic – the Ohio vs. West Virginia all-star game now called the OVAC Samuel A. Mumley All-Star Basketball Classic – serving as the game director for the first five years of

Basketoali Classic – serving as the game director for the first five years of the event and as an active committee member for several years.

He was the first recipient of the Coaches Award presented at that game in 1984 – an award renamed in his honor as the OVAC Earl Haberfield Coaches Award.

Coaches Award.

Haberfield's coaching career included several stops – both inside and outside the OVAC – and concluded with 382 career victories.

He coached nine years at his alma mater – Wheeling Central – winning five W. Va. Class AA Catholic Championships. In 1963, the Maroon Knights were undefeated: ranked No. 1 in the all-division W. Va. State rankings and were the OVAC AAA champions.

Haberfield coached two years at Bishop Donahue, leading the Bishops to the 1969 W. Va. Class A Catholic Championship: three years at Warren Local High, named Tri-Valley Conference Coach of the Year in 1970; one year at Crooksville, leading the Ceramics to the Ohio Class A Regional; five years at Wintersville, engineering a rebuilding of that program; and two years at Meadowhrook, leading the Colts to their best two-year won/loss record up and two years at Meadowbrook, leading the Colts to their best two-year won/loss record up to that point.

Outside the OVAC, he coached at Vanlue and Amherst Marion Steele.

Outside the OVAC, he coached at Vanlue and Amherst Marion Steele.

He was also the co-founder of the District 5 Basketball Coaches Associaton All-Star Game in 1978 and served as the president of District 5 that year.

Haberfield was awarded the Touchdown Club of Morgantown Certificate of Merit in 1963, '64 and '69 for contributions to West Virginia athletics; was given honorary memberships to the Ohio District Basketball Coaches Associations in Districts 3, 5 and 12; received an OVAC Certificate of Recognition for Exemplary Service in 1982; received the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club of the Upper Ohio Valley Saward for Outstanding Achievement in 1993; and was a charter member of the Wheeling Central Athletic Hall of Fame in 2017.

Haberfield graduated from West Liberty State College in 1958 and was inducted into the West Liberty Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996. A U.S. Navy veteran of the Korean War, he passed away in 2007.

Ron White (OVAC 'Family')

Ron White (Springfield Local High School, Class of 1966). A member of the OVAC Executive Board for many years, his "baby" for 23 years was one of the conference showcase events—the OVAC Banquet of Champions. White served as chairman until 2016 of the gala which featured more than 700 attendees honoring 75 championship teams, 50 scholarship winners and the conference coach of the year presentation.

White is also an Integral part of the conference in basketball, serving as the assistant basketball commissioner for nine years and then being named the successor to the late John Howell as basketball commissioner beginning with the 2016-17 school weer He's also stent many years on the OVAC Budy with the 2016-17 school year. He's also spent many years on the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game Committee.

He was a member of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials, working on the courts in both Ohio and West Virginia for 30 years. He officiated five state tournaments in West Virginia and drew seven regional assignments in Ohio.



As an individual with the Mountaineers, Rotillo still owns a pair of school records. Ste set the indoor and outdoor 400 meter dash benchmarks in 54.29 and 52.71, respectively.

Rotilio also earned Academic All-American honors during her career in Morgantown. Before concentrating fully on track at St. John, Rotilio lettered twice in basketball.

John Simonson (Media)

John Simonson (Beallsville High School, Class of 1966). A multimedia veteran, he has worked more than three decades in both radio and television covering football and boys' basketball games as a play-by-play announcer in the OVAC.

Simonson is well-known for his research and prep work regarding at fletes

Sanonson is well-known for his research and prep work regarding athletes and coaches prior to the broadcasts, compiling results, series records, coaching records, player statistics and other noteworthy information.

Known as the "Ohio Valley Sports Doctor", Simonson has served as an analyst for the WTOV TV9 "Game of the Week" and contributes to that station's high school football "playoff watch".

He also had a weekly sports talk show for 22 years on WWVA radio starting in 1988. While there, he earned the West Virginia Sportscaster of the Year award in 1997.

Simonson has provided assistance over the years to both the OHSAA and WVSSAC foot-ball playoff computer ratings' groups. He was a recipient of the East Ohio Interscholastic Athletic Administrator's Media Award.

He previously served as a voting member for the prestigious Heisman Trophy and many other awards including the Bear Bryant Coach of the Year award; basketball's Naismith and Wooden awards; and is an official donor to the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown where

he has a lifetime membership.

A graduate of West Liberty State College, he served two years in the U.S. Army; was a teacher at Wheeling Park High School for 31 years (retiring in 2002); and served on the Union Local Board of Education.

Jack Berger (Coaches)

Juck Berger (Shadyside High School, Class of 1944). He founded Shadyside track in 1961 and was the architect of the OVAC's all-time championship-winning boys track program, coaching the Tigers to their first seven OVAC titles (all in Class AA in a three-class format) from 1968-74 which started an OVAC record streak of 13 consecutive championships extended by his successor and former assistant Tom Vichich

He was also a co-founder of the Interstate Track League, guiding Shadyside to seven straight league titles and a record 46 consecutive dual meet victories. Berger led Shadyside to the school's first Ohio Class A District title in

1971 and to the Shadyside Relays crowns in the first year of the event which he helped establish in 1972 and a runner-up finish in '73; two Belmont County Relays

which the dependence statism is 1972 and a ruinter-up finish in 35 (Wo Sermont County Realys championships and runner-up finishes in the district and regional meets.

He also coached the Tigers' football team from 1960-69, posting a 56-36-6 record, Shadyside won the OVAC Class A title in 1963 with a 7-1-2 record white other top record teams under Berger included 9-1 in 1968, 8-2 in 1966 and 7-3 in 1965.

He was honored in Shadyside with "Jack Berger Day" on June 15, 1974.

Bob Montgomery (Coaches)

Bob Montgomery (Moundsville High School, Class of 1964). He was a fixture in the dugout for the Monarchs, serving 42 years as head base-ball coach and amassing an impressive record of 869-345 which ranks second in OVAC history behind Magnolia's Dave Cisar and third in West

Virginia prep history behind John Lowery of Jefferson High and Cisar.

Montgomery coached teams won 24 sectional titles; made the regional finals 13 times and reached the Class AAA State Tournament five times.

highlighted by the 1985 state championship where JM beat Huntington East, 8-7, in the title game.

His teams captured seven OVAC playoff championships, reaching the conference playoffs 25 times. The Monarchs also captured seven regular season crowns and

five playoff titles in the Mountaineer League from 1976-86.

Montgomery, who retired following the 2017 season, coached 35 all-state players and more than 70 who played college baseball including OVAC Hall of Famer Chris Jones. He is a member of the West Virginia Baseball Coaches Association and the American Baseball Coaches Association,

He was selected as the OVAC Baseball Coach of the Year three times and the West Virginia Coach of the Year five times. He also was honored as the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Co-Man of the Year (with Magnolia's Cisar) at the 42nd Charity Awards Banquet in 2009. Montgomery also doubled as a respected basketball and baseball official.

Montgomery also doubled as a respected basketball and baseball official.

A member of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials and a two-term president, he's been a referee since 1962, working more than 3,000 games including 29 state tournaments including 20 championship games in West Virginia and five tournaments/dree title games in Ohio. He also officiated collegiate hoops in the West Virginia Conference. He began umpiring American Legion baseball in 1972 and has worked five Set Virginia State Tournaments while also spending 20 years (1970-90) doing NCAA Division II and West Virginia Conference games including five tournaments.

He was the first West Virginia resident inducted into the OHSAA Officials Hall of Fame in 2008; was the 1989 Official of the Year honoree by the National Federation of Interscholastic Officials Association and received the Distinguished West Virginian Award in 2012.

He carned a football scholarship to the University of Pittsburgh where he became a four-year regular. Starting as a 17-year-old freshman, Plotz was selected to the All-Opponent team of backyard rival West Virginia University and was selected to the All-East team. As a senior, he was an honorable mention All-America selection.

Plotz was picked in the 11th round of the National Football League Draft by the Cleveland Browns but was also "drafted" by the U.S. Army and served in the Korean War.

He was inducted into the Martins Ferry Athletic Hall of Fame in 2016.

He was inducted into the Ohio Wrestling Officials Hall of Fame in 1999; the OHSAA Officials Hall of Fame in 1999; the Medina Invitational Hall of Fame in 2003; and most ecently into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame/Ohio Chapter in 2014. Kish, who retired as an official in 2014 but remains active as an OHSAA observer, currently

erves as the coordinator of the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game's 10-Year

Kish graduated from West Liberty State College with a bachelor's degree in Secondary Education in 1970 and received a master's degree in secondary education administration from West Virginia University in 1973.

He retired after 43 years as an educator including 36 years as a school administrator. He taught English from 1969-76 and served as head wrestling coach at Martins Ferry for six years (1970-76). His dual meet record was 33-16-1 with no losing seasons and he coached 13 sectional champions. 10 district champions, 15 state qualifiers and two state place-winners. His teams won the 1970 and '73 district titles and he was named East District Coach of the

1978-90 before returning to Martins Ferry to serve as Superintendent of Schools from 1990-99. Since that time, he has served as Muskingum County At-Risk Coordinator for four years, assistant principal of Zanesville High School for five years; assistant principal at West Muskingum High School for two years and as principal at West Muskingum Middle School for two years, He retired in 2012, but spent five months as interim principal at Woodsfield

Elementary School in 2014.

Among his education-related offices were president of the Belmont-Harrison Principal's Association; president of the Belmont-Harrison Superintendent's Association; member of the OVAC Executive Board and a past OVAC president (1982-83 and 1983-84); member of the Ohio Network: Training and Assistance for Schools and Communities (ONTASC) Executive Board; and president of the Ohio Valley Wrestling Officials Association.

As a Wildeat sophomore in 1951, he captured the state one-class 10.5-pound state title and followed with consecutive crowns in 1952 and 1953 in the 112-pound class. In the three finals, he defeated grapplers from Grafton, Beckley Woodrow Wilson and host Parkersburg.

During that cra, Wheeling High and other high school mat teams competed not only against other high schools, but against YMCA wrestling teams. Pritchard. nicknamed "Bull", was unbeaten as a sophomore and senior with his only loss in 106 matches to a YMCA grappler from Columbus, who he later defeated twice. He was unbeaten

against high school competitors.

The Wildcats' state championship coach was Ed Murphy, assisted by OVAC Hall of Fame coach Bob Roe, the Wildeats head coach in football and track, Pritchard also credits Barnesville's Jim Bradfield, who wrestled at Ohio State and led the Wheeling YMCA wrestling program, in his development along with his older brother Bill, who also wrestled at West Virginia U.

After graduation from high school, Bob Pritchard relocated to California and earned a degree from the University of California-Sacramento, which didn't sponsor a wrestling team, However, Pritchard continued to compete on the YMCA level.

Geno Sessi (Athlete - 1950s)

Geno Sessi (St. Clausville High School, Class of 1956). He is regarded as one of the Red Devils' best-ever multi-sport athletes while competing in football and track

In the spring sport, he was the leading scorer two straight years in the one-class OVAC Track Meet and led his team to three straight titles as part of six consecutive Red Devil crowns (1952-57) coached by Dave

part of six consecutive Red Devit crowns (1952-57) coached by Dave Porterfield. A sprinter, hurdler and relay member, Sessi led all scorers as a junior with 15 1/2 points and as a senior with 14 1/2 points. In football, the 5-foot-8, 174-pound two-way back and kick returner not only set a school record with 148 points as a senior, but led the Ohio Valley as well, That mark lasted one year when former teammate Jim Kerr scored one more point (149) before the OVAC hall of Famer went on to start at Penn State and with the Washington Redskins.



defensive back as a senior. He was a two-time All-Valley track co-captain.





Robert Pritchard (Athlete - 1950s)

Robert Pritchard (Wheeling High School, Class of 1953), He is, historically, among the elite wrestlers in OVAC history. He not only led Wheeling High School to the first state (one-class) championship for an OVAC member, in 1953, but became the first wrestler from the Ohio Valley and the state of West Virginia to win three state championships. As a Wildeat sophomore in 1951, he captured the state one-class 103-

Don Osby (Athlete - 1960s)

Don Osby (Steubenville High School, Class of 1968). A three-sport Big Red stalwart, he is regarded as the best ever track long jumper in OVAC history. He won Ohio's largest Class AA long jump title as a sophomore (23-feet, 3-inches) and junior (23-7 1/4) before being ruled ineligible (over age) as a senior.

As a junior, competing on one of the most talented track teams in OV history, he was one of 10 All-Valley Big Red selections and one of four Big Red co-captains while being cited as "the finest jumper ever on the local scene." That spring, he won the Ohio State meet, the prestigious Mansfield Relays, OVAC Class AAA, Martins Ferry and West Liberty Relays, the Ohio District meet and was second in the Regional meet. He also ran a leg on an OV moord earliest 3440 relay unit which timed 310.8

OV record setting 4x440 relay unit which timed 3:19.8.

As a sophomore, besides the state crown, he won he Martins Ferry Relays in 23-1 3/4

Big Red won its first four OVAC track crowns from 1964-67 with Osby featured on the

In football, he was a three-year standout at end on Ohio-ranked teams with records of

He was also a starter in basketball. He is honored on the Big Red Wall of Fame.
Osby accepted a football scholarship to the University of Iowa and started at wide receiver as a sopiomore when he landed 19 passes for 276 yards, third on the team. After sitting out his junior year with an injury, he returned as a starter at tight end as a senior. He passed away in early 2018 in Cincinnati.

Bill Tucker (Athlete - 1960s)

Bill Tucker (Weir High School, Class of 1962). A three-sport Red Rider athlete, he was a major player on back-to-back state Class AAA championship teams before starring in college and competing five years in the National Football League.

A two-way back and defensive tackle, he teamed with OVAC Hall of Famer Bob Kelley to lead Weir to the 1960 state crown with a 40-0 title game rout of Nitro. The anchor of the 1961 team, he scored two TDs in game rout of vitro. The anchor of the 1961 team, he scored two 10st an a 26-7 state title win over St. Albans. Both teams finished 10-1. Tucker earned first team All-State as a senior and third team as a junior. He was selected captain of the All-OVAC and All-Valley squads as a senior. In two seasons, he scored 116 points and rushed for 1.445 yards, In the annual Ohio-W.Va. All-Star game, he led W.Va. to a 12-6 win and was selected team MVP.

He played forward and center in basketball and started on the 1962 team which went

unbeaten in regular season, won an OVAC title, and ended 24-1 as state Class AAA runner-up to Beckley Woodrow Wilson. In track, he ran the hurdles, 220- and 440-yard sprints, and was a

member of 440, 880 and mile relay units in OVAC and state competition.

After taking a year off after high school, he accepted a football scholarship to Tennessee

State University to play for Hall of Fame coach John Merritt. A four-year player, he rushed 281 times for 1,321 yards. He was selected to play in the Blue-Gray Classic and Senior Bowl, the

first Tiger to play in the latter.

He was drafted by the San Francisco 49ers in the third round, as the 65th overall selection, and competed as a fullback for five years in the NFL- - four with the 49ers and one with the Chicago Bears, in 69 games, he rushed 127 times for 431 yards and 6 TDs and landed 59 passes for 496 yards and seven scores.

Tucker, who passed away in 2015, is inducted into the City of Weirton Hall of Fame, Tennessee State U. Sports Hall of Fame and Weir High Wall of Fame.

Keith Vrotsos (Athlete - 1970s)

Keith Vrotsos (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1979). Hpersonified versatility at an elite level, starring for the Purple Riders in football, bas-ketball and baseball, the diamond sport proving his pathway to a superb collegiate career. The four-year regular with the Purple Rider baseball team batted better than 330 his first two seasons before exploding in his junior campaign. Vrotsos earned first-team All-OVAC, All-Eastern

his junior campaign. Vrotsos earned first-team All-OVAC, All-Eastern District and All-Valley honors that campaign after hitting at a robust .458 clip. He concluded his prep career by turning in a superb senior season. He compiled a .386 average with 21 RBI. He was again accorded first team All-OVAC, All-Eastern District and All-Valley honors. The 5-11, 170-pounder was a four-time Eastern Ohio Baseball All-Star Game participant. Vrotsos was also a standout on the gridiron. He excelled as a placekicker as a sophomore, kicking 19 PATS and one field goal before becoming the Purple's starting QB his final two seasons. Vrotsos completed 49-of-100 tosses as a junior, good for 531 yards. He also rushed for 250 stripes. As a senior, he earned second-team All-Ohio UPI honors after completing 56-of-111 passes for 581 yards while also rushing for 423 stripes. He also picked off three passes as a defensive back. In addition to his all-state honors, Vrotsos was named first-team All-OVAC, All-Eastern District and All-Valley. He also played in the OVAC All-Star Game. He was also a three-year letterman in hoops. The talented point guard averaged some 7 points as a sophomore, 10.1 as a junior and 9.2 as a senior. He was named second-team All-OVAC as a senior. He helped lead the Purple Riders to sectional titles his final two campaigns and capped his hoop career by playing in the OVAC All-Star Game. Vrotsos earned a baseball scholarship to Ohio University where he lettered all four years and was named co-captain in both his junior and senior seasons. His final season with the Bobcats

was named co-captain in both his junior and senior seasons. His final season with the Bobcats was outstanding as he batted .341 with 12 doubles, I triple, 7 home runs, 32 RBI and 12 stolen bases. Vrotsos was a second-team All-Mid-American Conference selection as a senior. He finished his Bobcat career with a sharp .311 batting average. When he graduated, Vrotsos ranked in the top 10 in the following categories: games played (157), hits (141), home runs (15), RBI (79), doubles (20), total bases (201), runs scores (105) and stolen bases (30).





Ron Lee (Athlete - 1970s)

Ron Lee (Bellaire High School, Class of 1971). Lee is on the short list of

Non Lee (Beliare High Schoot, Class of 1971). Lee is on the short list of outstanding running backs who have graced Nelson Field.

The 6-3, 195-pounder carried the Big Reds of Jake Olsavsky to an 8-1-1 mark in his senior campaign. Bellaire finished second in the OVAC 3A title chase, trailing Wintersville. The teams tied 0-0 in regular-season play. The Big Reds finished No. 19 in the UPI Class AAA poll, the largest classification in the case.

Lee rushed for 989 yards and 16 TDs that fall. His 108 points led the OVAC 3A in scoring. He also landed 10 passes. Those numbers earned Lee first-team All-Valley and All-OVAC plaudits while being named second-team All-Ohio by UPL He also played in the Ohio North-South All-Star Game.

Lee was also a three-year letterman in basketball and he was voted the Big Reds' top athlete

Lee's prep heroics earned him a grid scholarship to WVU. He chose the Mountaineers over a slew of D-I offers. Freshmen were not eligible to play in those days, Lee, however, enjoyed a strong campaign with the Mountaineers' frosh squad, leading the team with 372 yards on 97 carries in five games.

As a sophomore, Lee moved into the No. 2 fullback slot, rushing for 304 yards and three TDs on 76 carries. His toughness was matched by his versatility, resulting in him being utilized as

fullback and tailback his final two seasons.

Dawson was the Hilltoppers' volleyball captain as a junior and senior, making the WVIAC All-Conference Team three seasons while being accorded Volleyball Athlete of the Year her senior season.



Roy 'Al' Glitch (Bridgeport High School, Class of 1969). When you're known as the "Voice of the OVAC", that's a pretty good place to start, but Glitch has also worn many other hats within the conference over the years from athlete to coach to director

Many known Glitch as a mainstay as the public address announcer for many years at both the OVAC Boys Girls Basketball Tournaments and the OVAC Samuel A. Mumley All-Star Basketball Classic (both events at Ohio University Eastern), and he's also been on the "mic" and behind the scorebook at countless regular season and tournament events at St. Clairsville High School.

Glitch also spent many years on the OVAC Baseball Committee, including 15 years as the port's director, and was the recipient of the 2013 OVAC Thomas E. Rataiczak Scorekeeper/ Timer Award

At St. Clairsville, he spent 32 years as a math instructor and coached multiple sports, including serving as head boys' basketball coach from 1978-85. He was the District 12 Coach of the Year in 1980 and coached in the OVAC All-Star Game in 1981. He was also named District ||2 Assistant Coach of the Year in 2002.

He also was an assistant baseball and football coach for the Red Devils for 11 years. Glitch had the St. Clairsville Junior High Tournament named in his honor in 20 ||2 and

Bruney amassed an impressive overall record of 284-135 (275-134 at Ferry High) which ranks among the top 20 in OHSAA history

Bruney-coached Purple Rider teams made the OHSAA playoffs 14 times in a 20-year span starting in 1998 (98, 99, 2000, 02, 03, 04, 06, 08, 09, 10, 11, 13, 14, 17) and had only six sub-500 seasons in 39 years with only one after 1990. The Purple Riders fashioned four undefeated regular seasons under Bruney (1979, 1998, 2002 and 2004), with the '04 team winning the OHSAA Division IV, Region 15 championship before falling to Youngstown Cardinal Mooney (27,6) in the state sentingly.

His teams also won six Ohio Valley Athletic Conference championships (1999, 2002, '04, '08, '11 and '13) and he coached in the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Games four

Bruney sports an impressive list of honors, including being named to the OHSECA Hall of Bruney sports an impressive list of honors, including being named to the OHSF CA Hall of Fame in 2010. He also received the Ohio Coaches Achievement Award from the Minor Pro Football Hall of Fame in Pittsburg in 2014; the entire Bruney family was honored by the Lou Holtz Upper "Ohio Valley Hall of Fame with the Heritage Family Award in 2010; and Martins Ferry's Dave Bruney Football Complex was named in his honor.

Bruney's coaching career began in 1973 as an assistant at Buckeye North under Bill McHugh. He then served as an assistant at Ferry three years (1974-76) under his cousin. Bob Bruney and then spent a year as a graduate assistant at Marshall University under Frank Ellwood (1977).

His first head coaching stop was at neighboring Bridgeport where he guided the Bulldogs

In 2001, Crosier was named the Larry Deaton OVAC Official of the Year by the OVAC Wrestling Coaches Association for his exceptional efforts as an overseer of the mats; he was inducted into the Ohio Wrestling Officials Hall of Fame in 2014 and was the recipient of the prestigious "Mr. Mat" award at the OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Tournament in 2016. Crosier spent 40 years as an educator, retiring in 2011. He taught and coached at Steubenville High for two years before moving on to Union Local where he was a teacher wrestling coach and athletic director during his 38 years there.

As head coach of the Jets for nine years, Crosier's mat teams won two OVAC Class 2A titles and one Class 3A championship. He coached four OVAC champions — Mike Gregg, Kelly Wallace, Randy Simpson and Jeff McCormick. He was named OVAC Coach of the Year three times (Class AA in 1974 and '75 and Class AAA in 1980).

He was the founder of the Ohio Valley Junior High Championships in 1976 (now called the OVAC Junior High Championships).

A past president of the West Virginia Sportswriters Association (WVSWA), Clegg chaired numerous all-state boys' and girls' basketball and baseball committees for the WVSWA. He also did publicity for the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Stat Football Game for several years.

Circosta achieved both, coaching a total of 50 years including 47 as a head coach and amassing a superb record of 336-144-5 -- second only to Steubenville Big Red boss Reno Saccoccia in Ohio Valley history and ranking in the top 10 all-time in the state of Ohio

The Monroe County legend began his coaching career in 1968, serving as an asthree years at Woodsfield under former Ohio State University standout Bob Butts.

three years at Woodsfield under former Ohio State University standout Bob Butts. When butts left for Union Local, Circosta took over to begin a 47-year head coaching run, the first 23 seasons at Woodsfield and then, following consolidation, for 24 years at Monroe Central.

Circosta-coached teams enjoyed six undefeated regular seasons (1973, '76, '91, '93, '99 and 2002); captured 14 OVAC championships (nine at Woodsfield, five at Monroe Central) and earned 14 OHSAA playoff appearances (five at Woodsfield was crowned the 1976 Class A state champions by The Associated Press and Monroe Central won the Division V, Region 19 championship in 2001 before falling to Bedford Chanel in the state semifinals.

He coached in the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game four times (1974, '77, '81 & 2000) with a 2-2 record and he coached in the BACF All-Star Game once.

Circosta also coached baseball for 14 years with nearly 150 victories.

He was previously inducted into the West Liberty University Athletic Hall of Fame (1996)

He earned a football scholarship to the University of Oregon, where he excelled for four years — one year on the freshman team and three varsity letters as a two-way guard. The 1948 Oregon team went 9-1 overall and 7-0 in Pacific Coast Conference play and accepted an invitation to play Doak Walker-led Southern Methodist University in the 1949 Cotton Bowl. The Ducks bowed, 21-13 in the game with Daniels, an All-Pacific Coast Conference selection, kicking the extra-point in the fourth quarter. The 1948 Oregon football team, with Daniels, was inducted into the state of Oregon Hall of Fame in 1990.

His 140 career goals is still a record at Linsty. Adams was the first West Virginia athlete and OVAC player to garner Parade All-American honors in soccer. He was named All-American by National Soccer Coaches Association and was an ESPN McDonald's Scholastic Player of the Week in 1992.

Locally, Adams was named first-team all-OVAC three times, conference player of the year twice, first-team all-Valley three times and captained the squad twice. He was named first-team all-IPSL three times and IPSL Player of the Year as a senior.

After sifting through more than 30 offers, Adams elected to continue his career at Princeton and Player of the Tear as a senior.

University. He was a four-year starter with the Tigers and served as a team captain in 1997. He was also named to the all-Ivy League team that season.

Adams was also heavily involved with the United States Olympic Development Program. He was a member of the Region I team which played in Europe. He was also selected for the Region I pool five times and was a part of six state ODP teams.

Scott Coyne (Athlete - 1990s)

Scott Coyne (Bellaire High School, Class of 1994). This former Big Reds' point guard was a wizard with the ball in his hands for OVAC Hall of Fame coach Gene Ammirante during his prep career.

While it was in basketball where Coyne achieved some of his greatest while it was in basketball where Coyne achieved some of his greatest moments, his success wasn't limited there. He was a three-sport standout for the Big Reds, shining in track and football as well.

Coyne finished his prep career with 1,051 points, including a 19.1 points per game average as a senior. He did more than score the ball. He

stuffed the stat sheet to a tune of nine assists and seven rebounds a game as he led the Big Reds to their first undefeated regular season and an eventual 21-1 record. During his junior season, Coyne averaged 20.4 points a game. He netted his career high of 43 points that season against St. Clairsville. The Big Reds finished 17-4 and won the OVAC that season.

Coyne ranks in the top 10 in numerous Bellaire categories, including 3-point shooting (44 percent), free-throw percentage (77 percent), steals (141) and his points are the 15th best Coyne earned all-everything as a senior, He was all-Eastern District, District 12, OVAC and all-Valley and was named to the McDonald's All-American and Street and Smith's All-American honorable mention lists. He was also named one of the top 25 players in Ohio by USA Today and played in the Ohio North-South All-Star Game.

As a wide receiver, Coyne was the go-to guy for the Big Reds during his three-year career.
He finished with 1,764 yards. Included was a 1993 campaign in which he caught 61 passes for 967 yards, which ranks seventh in BHS history. Coyne was named to the all-Ohio first team. He was also named all-OVAC and all-Eastern District.

On the track, Coyne qualified for the state track and field championship meet twice in the 300 intermediate hurdles. He was a multiple-time OVAC placer in that event as well as running key legs on relay teams for the Big Reds.

He dud traceically in a plane crash in 2002 at met 26 years old. At the time of his death

Coyne was inducted to the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2015.

The Scott Coyne Memorial Scholarship exists at Bellaire High School to honor his legacy.

Tyler Engle (Athlete - 2000s)

Tyler Engle (Fort Frye High School, Class of 2007) It didn't matter the season for this former Cadet multi-sport standout because he shined brightly. The winner of 11 varsity letters. Engle really stood out on the basketball court and baseball field where he earned eight of those monograms.

It was baseball where Engle earned his opportunity to compete colle-giately at The Ohio State University. Playing for the late Sorny Bidwell, Engle hit 502 for his career with 12 home runs and 117 RBIs in leading the program to a 74-25 record.

As a senior. Engle batted a robust .515 with four homers and 34 RBIs As a sentor. Engle batted a robust \$15 with four homers and 34 RBIs en route to earning all-Ohio first team honors and was chosen for the OVAC. Eastern District and Mizuno All-Star Games. He was named first-team all-Eastern District four times and was the player of the year as a senior. Twice, Engle was named first-team all-OVAC and was the Class 2A Player of the Year as a senior. He earned all-PVC four times and the Class 2 victories by scoring 1,760 career points. He grabbed 400 rebounds, passed out 240 assists and had \$130 steals during his career. He also drained \$29, 3-point goals, which is the Ohio state regular.

During his senior season. Engle averaged 19.8 points en route to first-team all-Ohio, all-Eastern District, all-OVAC, all-Pioneer Valley Conference and all-District 12. He also took part in the Ohio North-South and OVAC All-Star Games. That followed up a junior campaign in which he was named third-team all-Ohio. He was actually listed on the all-state team each year of his career.

Engle also lettered three times in football, but elected not to play his senior season.

After high school, Engle elected to become a Buckeye. He lettered four times as a short-stop. He played in 193 career games and batted 2.56. He had four home runs, 82 RBIs and had 155 hits. When he finished his career, he ranked second in OSU history with 189 starts. With his playing days behind him, Engle entered coaching. He coached at Ohio Valley

University, where he finished his Master's Degree, Elon University and Manetta College He's currently the baseball coach at Meadowbrook High School

Liz Repella (Athlete - 2000s)

Liz Repella (Steubenville High School, Class of 2007) Whether it was at Big Red or West Virginia University, this standout basketball player simply scored the ball.

The multi-talented combo guard earned all-Ohio honors four times during her prep career. She was named first-team as both a junior and senior Repella was named the state's player of the year, averaging 26.9 points a game as a semoi

She was named to the third team as a freshman and second team as a sophomore

She is the all-time leading scorer in Steubenville history -- regardless of gender -- with 2,065 points.

Along with her state accolades, she was named all-OVAC four times and first-team all-Eastern District four times, gamering player of the year as a junior and senior. Repella, who was also a multi-year letter winner in soccer, was ranked the 63rd best

player in her class as a senior, which garnered several Division I offers. She eventually settled on becoming a Mountaineer.

At WVU, Repella lettered four years and scored 1,612 points, grabbed 712 rebounds. She also collected 207 steals, passed out 162 assists and blocked 76 shots.

She was named first-team all-Big East as a junior and senior and was just the second WVU female to garner first-team honors in back-to-back seasons. Repella was an honorable mention all-American after her senior season in which she

Repella was an honorable mention all-American after ner senior scason in which she helped lead West Virginia to a 24-10 record and a second-round NCAA Tourney appearance. During her final season in Morgantown. Repella led the team in 12 statistical categories.

All told, she played in 134 games, which is the most in WVU history, and she was part of 96 victories. Her college point total was seventh best in WVU history at the time of her

graduation. Away from athletics, Repella was a standout student. She graduated with a degree in exercise physiology and a GPA of 3.96. She was a representative on the WVU Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. She also received the Bij East Scholar Athlete Sports Excellence Award and was an Academic All-American

Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

V. Everett Brinkman (Wheeling High School, Class of 1923)

One of only three [3-letter winners in football, basketball, basketball and track at Wheeling High, he was an all-state football end and scored 54 points in a basketball game as a freshman. He became a three-sport, nine-letter standout at W, Va. Wesleyan College before returning to the Ohio Valley to earn his mark in coaching.

A pioneer of the jump shot and fast break. Brinkman coached Benwood Union from 1928-33 and Wheeling High from 1934-55 to a combined 405-193 record. At Wheeling, his teams were 356-138 with five state titles in seven trips to the finals. The 1938 and 1950 teams were unbeaten. Other state titles were won in 1936, 1940 and 1943. The '40 and '43 teams lost but once.

Brinkman also coached football for 14 years — six at Benwood Union and eight at Wheeling, with a combined record of 87-32-15 including 40-9-4 at Union. Four of his gridiron teams claimed state titles in the pre-official state playoff cray 1928 and 1931 Union, both unbeaten, and at Wheeling in 1934 and 1937. The '34 team was unbeaten but twice tied.

He also was a top-flight football official for several years and active in state coaches and officials' organizations,

Brinkman earlier was elected to four Halls of Fame - West Virginia Sports, Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan, City of Wheeling, and W. Va. Wesleyan Sports,

Clarence 'Bevo' Francis (Wellsville High School, Class of 1952)

A record-setting basketball scoring machine in high school and college who attracted national attention and was profiled in numerous books, national magazines and major newspapers. Two books were written on his career.

The 6-9, 190-pounder played only one season at Wellsville High after sitting out a year following transfer from Irondale. In 1952, he scored 776 points in 25 games with 31-point average, second best in Ohio. He outscored six opposing teams with highs of 57, 54 and 50 points. Wellsville lost only to 28-1 record state runner-up Steubenville and handed W, Va, Class B champion Newell two of its three losses.

He followed Wellsville coach Newt Oliver to Rio Grande College and played two seasons. In 1953, he scored 1.954 points in 39 games for national record 50.1 per game average. He scored 116 vs. Ashland Junior College. In 1954, he averaged 46.5 points and scored 113 vs. Hillsdale College. The schedule included wins over Wake Forest, Providence, Butler and Creighton and games in Madison Square Garden, Boston Garden and Miami Beach Auditorium.

The NAIA Hall of Famers left school to join the Boston Whirlwinds and tour with the Harlem Globetrotters. He also played in the Eastern and ABL pro leagues before

Lou 'The Toe' Groza (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1942)

The Purple Rider luminary is best known as a record-setting professional football placekicker, but he was much more.

In high school, he was a three-sport standout and All-Ohio in football and basketball, He was center, and the state tournament's leading scorer, on the 27-2 record Rider team which won the 1941 state Class A title. He also was a tackle on the 10-0-1 record 1941 football team which claimed an Ohio co-championship after a 14-14 tie with Toledo Libbey in a post-season challenge game. Groza, by the way, kicked only one field goal in high school.

He played football as a freshman at Ohio State before joining the armed services which preceded his 21-year career with the Cleveland Browns which ended in 1967. When he retired, he was pro football's all-time leading scorer with only one TD and 1,609 points. He booted 234 field goals, with a long of 53 yards. He had conversion streak of 134 and scored in 107 straight games. The Lou Groza Award is given annually to college football's top placekicker.

A nine-time Pro Bowl offensive tackle, as well as kicker, he played in nine NFL title games, with four titles, and played on four All-American Conference title teams. The Pro Football and Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall of Famer had his jersey No. 76 retired by the Browns. A portion of Route 7 is named for him in Martins Ferry.

Clarke Hinkle (Toronto High School, Class of 1926)

This versatile early era football player left such an impression on his alma mater that the Toronto High School Football Stadium behind the school is named in his honor. The 5-11, 195-pound athlete also left an enduring imprint at Bucknell University, where he was inducted into the first Hall of Fame class, and in the National Football League. He was inducted, in 1964, in the second class of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He's also a member of the Halls of Fame for College Football and the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dans

At Bucknell from 1929-31, he led the East in scoring with 128 points in 1929 and later his team to an unbeaten season in 1931. He then played in the East-West Game

where he was selected the Most Outstanding Player.

From 1932-41, the Green Bay Packer star was one of the most versatile players in the National Football League. He was a fullback-linebacker-punter-placekicker, and was cited for his running, blocking, receiving, kicking and tackling.

Hinkle was first or second team all-league all 10 seasons and four-time All-Pro. He was on the NFL All-Time Two-Way team selected in 1994. One of the Packer

practice fields is named in his honor.

When he retired, he was the leading rusher (3.860 yards on 1.171 carries) in NFL history and his totals now rank sixth in Packer history. He scored 379 career points and averaged 40.8 yards punting.

Calvin Jones (Steubenville High School, Class of 1952)

This two-sport Big Red standout was a high school basketball rival of fellow honoree Bevo Francis but is best known for football.

At Big Red, he helped the 1952 basketball team to a school-best 28-1 record and Ohio Class A runner-up finish. En route, Big Red handed the Francis-led Wellsville team its only two losses

In football, the All-Ohio lineman selected the University of Iowa over Ohio State and went on to All-Big Ten Conference honors three times. He made 22 All-America teams at guard, including a record 15 in 1954. As team captain, he earned the Outland Trophy given to the nation's top interior lineman and became one of only two consensus All-America picks at Iowa, where he played both of ense and defense

A member of the College Football and Helms Athletic Foundation Halls of Fame, he was inducted into the first lowa Hall of Fame class and is a member of the All-Time Hawkeye team. His jersey No. 62 was retired by Iowa, one of only two at the school.

He was the first African American athlete pictured on the cover of Sports Illustrated

Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

Bernie Allen (East Liverpool High School, Class of 1957)

A 10-letter winner in three sports for the Potters, he was a quarterback-placekicker for the 8-2 record 1956 football team; a regular basketball player on team which upset unbeaten Steubenville in the sectional tournament; and an all-state baseball infielder. He played in the Ohio All-Star Baseball Game and was on winning Ohio football team in annual Ohio-West Virginia All-Star Game.

At Purdue University, he earned six letters as football quarterback and baseball shortstop and was team MVP in both sports and All-Big Ten in baseball.

Allen earned National Football Back of Week honors from The Associated Press and Sports Illustrated for play in upset of Ohio State. He was Purdue's Outstanding Senior Athlete for 1960-61.

Allen signed a pro baseball contract in 1961 with the Minnesota Twins. After spending one year in the minor leagues at Charlotte, N.C., he went on to a 12-year major league career from 1962-73 with the Twins, Washington Senators, New York Yankees and Montreal Expos. In 1962, he was runner-up to the Yankees Tom Tresh for the American League Rookie of the Year honors. He batted .269 with 12 home runs in 1962. In 1972, he hit three home runs in the Hall of Fame game in Cooperstown, N.Y. He's been inducted into four other halls of fame. In 1999, he became the fifth inductee into the Purdue Hall and was a charter inductee into the East Liverpool Hall of Fame. He's also in the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan and Lou Holtz Ohio Valley Halls of Fame.

Russ Craft (Wellsburg High School, Class of 1939)

He was a three-sport performer in football, basketball and baseball for the Orange Knights and earned All-Valley and All-State honors as a senior football back,

Craft played football, baseball and ran track at the University of Alabama, where he was a two-way back regular in football and earned second team All-Southeastern Conference honors.

Drafted in 1943 by the Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football League, he played eight seasons (1946-53) as a defensive back-kick returner and was selected to the All-Time Eagles' Team. He played on Eagles' teams which won NFL titles in 1948 and 1949 and finished second in 1947. He was named to the Pro Bowl in 1951 and 1952. He is tied for the current NFL record of four pass interceptions in one game against the Cardinals in 1950. He also blocked three Pittsburgh Steeler extra-point kicks in 1952 game and returned a kickoff for a ten team record 103 yards against the Rams in 1950.

Craft is credited as the first player in the NFL to wear the new hard plastic helmet in 1951. He ended his NFL career in two seasons as a player-assistant coach with the Steelers. In 1995, he was included in the NFL Films' presentation of the 100 Greatest Touchdowns in NFL History. It featured his defensive theft, and 20-yard TD return, of a pass reception caught by NFL Hall of Famer Elroy (Crazylegs) Hirsch of the Rams.

Craft is inducted into the W. Va. Sports Hall of Fame and the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall.

Carl Hamill (Linsly School, Class of 1922)

A legendary athlete and high school coach in the Ohio Valley, he was a three-sport standout at Linsly and Bethany College. An All-Valley football player, he also scored an unheard-of 330 points in 21 basketball games in 1920, a rare total in the center jump, low-scoring era.

From 1929-51, he was the three-sport coach at Weir High. His football teams scheduled top-notch programs from three states and went 166-35-13 including a 111-10 mark vs. Mountain State teams. He coached six unbeaten teams and four with only one loss. Three state titles were claimed in 1935, 1942 and 1949 when the Red Riders won the first-ever WVSSAC largest class state playoff title and the school narrowly missed a state title trifecta. Later that school year, he coached the 1950 baseball team to its second state one-class crown (the other was in 1945). The 1949-50 basketball team lost a 38-37 regional title game to unbeaten Wheeling High, which went on to win the championship. He was selected West Virginia "Coach of the Year" for high school and college all sports.

In basketball, he guided Weir to a 370-127 record and six state tournament berths. Weir was runner-up in 1942.

Hamill has been inducted into several halls of fame, including W. Va. Sports, Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan, Bethany College and was the first inductee into the Ohio Valley Football Coaches Hall. The annual Dapper Dan coaching award is named for him and he was one of three prominent Weirton community leaders pictured on a downtown mural. The Weir High Fieldhouse is named in his honor.

Bernie Mehen (Wheeling High School, Class of 1938)

The first Ohio Valley athlete to be selected first team all-state basketball three straight years, he led the Wildcats to W. Va. state titles in 1936 and 1938 including a 24-0 record in 1938.

During those three years that he was the leading scorer, Wheeling High was 65-4 under Hall of Fame coach Everett Brinkman. Mehen scored 1,193 points in 84 career games with many coming during the center jump, low scoring era.

He later earned All-America and All-Southeastern Conference recognition at the University of Tennessee, where he helped the Vols win the 1941 Southeastern Conference championship. After serving in World War II, where he was wounded, he played professionally with the Youngstown Bears and Toledo Jeeps.

He was inducted into the City of Wheeling Hall of Fame in 1992.

Jule Rivlin (Triadelphia High School, Class of 1935)

He was an all-state basketball guard in high school where he led the Triads to a 20-1 record in 1934. He also was the high-point scorer in the 1935 one-class state track meet where he won three gold medals. He timed 10.2 for 100 yards, 22.8 for 220 yards and was a member of the medley relay winning unit.

At Marshall College, he was one of the first guards to run the fast break offense for state Hall of Fame coach Cam Henderson and earned Little All-America honors while setting a school season scoring record with 530 points. He helped the Herd to two Buckeye Conference titles. He later coached the Marshall basketball team to two Mid America Conference titles.

He played professionally with the Toledo Jeeps and was player coach of the Wheeling Blues from 1950-52.

In 1947, he was the Most Valuable Player in the World Tournament in Chicago which featured the nation's best pro teams including the Harlem Globetrotters.

He was a 1980 charter inductee into the City of Wheeling Hall of Fame and is a member of four other halls of fame, including W. Va. Sports, Marshall and Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan.

Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

Rudy Baric (Benwood Union High School, Class of 1938)

He was a first team All-W.Va. basketball honoree as a senior when the OVAC charter member school bowed to unbeaten Wheeling High in the section finals. As a junior, he helped the Ironmen to a state tournament berth and the school's best-ever record of 23-2.

At West Virginia University, the 6-3 center captained the 1942 team which won the National Invitation Tournament championship in New York's

Madison Square Garden when the NIT was more prestigious than the NCAA Tournament. After a 16-4 regular season record, the Mountaineers were seeded last in the eight-team event before they upset top-seeded Long Island U., 52-49, in the first round, WVU then defeated Toledo, 51-39, and Western Kentucky, 47.45, before 17,000 fans in the finals. The team's only 6-footer was the team's leading rebounder and second-highest scorer and was selected tournament MVP. The three-year regular helped WVU to a 45-20 record.

In 1943, with WVU coach Dyke Raese in the armed services, Baric served as interim coach and guided WVU to a 14-7 record. He then went on to coach high school basketball for 19 years at Penns Grove, N. J., where his teams won more than 300 games.

A member of the All-Time WVU era team, he was inducted into the second WVU Hall of Fame class and is a W. Va. Sports HOF inductee.

Mike Basrak (Bellaire High School, Class of 1931)

The 6-3, 210-pound football center started 22 games in his Big Reds' career and earned All-Eastern Ohio and All-Valley honors before becoming the first college All-America player from Bellaire and the first in Duquesne University history. He started 30 games at Duquesne and was selected All-America by the A-A board, The Associated Press and other major selectors. Bellaire displayed its pride for its hometown hero by placing a 10-foot pictorial banner above the front entrance to the City Building.

In the second National Football League Draft of 1937, Basrak was the fifth overall league selection in the first round by the Pittsburgh Pirates, later renamed the Steelers. No other OVAC product has been drafted earlier than Basrak. Weirton's Bob Gain, inducted into the OVAC Hall in 2006, also was a fifth pick. Basrak played two seasons in the NFL.

Les Carney (Wintersville High School, Class of 1952)

A [0-letter winner in four sports — football, basketball, baseball and track — for the Warriors, the football running back played in only one losing game in three seasons for Coach Bob McFarren. Wintersville, however, didn't join the OVAC until 1955 after Carney accepted a scholarship to Ohio University. As a sophomore OU running back, he earned honorable mention All-Mid American Conference for the MAC champions before being called to military

After returning, he led the Bobcats' track team to the 1958 and 1959 MAC titles while earning NCAA All-America honors as a senior. He held the NCAA 220-yard dash record of 20.8 seconds for one day. The two-time MAC 220-yard champion set a conference record which lasted 21 years. He also won the conference 100-yard crown with a 9.7-second clocking. At one time, he claimed all or parts of five school individual or relay records.

Carney was drafted by the NFL Baltimore Colts, but bypassed the offer for a job in his current hometown of Akron where he competed in AAU track meets. He earned a spot on the U.S. team for the 1959 Pan-American Games and won a silver medal at 200 meters.

In 1960, he placed third in the U.S. Olympic Trials at 200 meters and earned a spot on the U.S. team for the Rome Olympics. In the 200-meter finals. he earned a silver medal in a photo finish with hometown hero Livio Berutti of Italy, who set an Olympic record of 20.5 seconds. Carney's time of 20.6 would have won every previous Olympic final including the 1936 Games won by the legendary Jesse Owens in 20.7.

Charles 'Doc' Hartwig (Benwood Union High School, Class of 1930)

An All-Valley and All-West Virginia football lineman who went on to earn national fame and recognition at the University of Pittsburgh. He played for Coach Everett Brinkman at Union and helped the Ironmen to the school's first unbeaten season of 8-0 in 1928. At Pitt, he was selected team captain, starred in the 1933 Rose Bowl, and earned All-America honors in 1934 after coming back from an injury which forced him to miss his sophomore season. The 1934 Pitt team was acclaimed national champions. The three-year letterman played on Panther teams with a combined 24-3-2 record.

He also played in the East-West Shrine Game along with fellow honoree Jim Moscrip and Michigan's Gerald Ford, a future U.S. president. Hartwig became a national hero when he was pictorially featured on a Wheaties cereal box, the only Ohio Valley athlete so honored.

He coached Moundsville High in 1938 and Martins Ferry High the next two years before returning to Pitt to join the athletic department. Hartwig died in 1950 after a lingering illness and Benwood Union named its football field, Hartwig Field, after the school's only All-American.

Jim 'Monk' Moscrip (Adena High School, Class of 1931)

He earned 10 letters in three sports - football, basketball and baseball - and was an All-Eastern Ohio and All-Valley football end under Coach Fred Thomas. He led the 1930 football team to a 9-1-1 record as the Golden Wave outscored foes, 284-19. He also the MVP of the county basketball tournament. After spending a year at Kiski Prep in Saltsburg, Pa., the 6-foot, 186-pounder became a three-year starter at Stanford University and played on the famed "Vow Boys" team - so named for vowing not to lose to Southern California during their career. Moscrip and teammates kept their promise and defeated USC three times and compiled a 25-4-2 record while becoming the first team to play in three straight Rose Bowls. Stanford won twice and Moscrip. a two-way end and placekicker, was MVP of the 1936 Rose Bowl win over SMU. He also played in the East-West Shrine Game.

He was selected by the old NFL Brooklyn Dodgers in the first NFL Draft in 1936, but his NFL career was two seasons with the Detroit Lions. A member of the All-Time Stanford team, he was inducted into the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall of Fame and the College Football Hall of Fame.

Ernie Bell (East Liverpool High School, Class of 1953).

He was a two-way line standout on the unbeaten 1952 Potter football team regarded as one of the best in school history.

The 160-pound guard was named to five All-Ohio first team selections, and an Ohio Lineman of the Year selection by the International News Service after the 9-0-1 record team was voted No. 3 in the final statewide poll.

The Potters defeated Cleveland West, Steubenville, New Philadelphia, Youngstown Rayen, Alliance, Martins Ferry, Salem, Ashtabula and Wellsville and tied Sandusky, 13-13.

Opposing teams found it almost impossible to keep Bell out of their backfield. Alliance quarterback Len Dawson, a future star at Purdue University and the Kansas City Chiefs, was sacked several times by Bell and he lauded the Potter defender as the best he faced all season.

Bell also blocked four punts in one game of his four-year career.

An inductee into the East Liverpool High School Hall of Fame, Bell also was a member of the winning North team in the annual Ohio North-South game.

John Blatnik (Bridgeport High School, Class of 1939).

He was a two-sport Bulldog standout who signed a pro baseball contract before his senior high school season. He was a member of two teams which advanced to the Ohio state basketball tournament in the largest Class A division.

The 1938 team, coached by Floyd Baker, defeated Bowling Green and Akron St. Vincent before bowing to eventual champion Newark in the semifinals. In 1939, under coach Stan Plummer, the Bulldogs defeated Akron Buchtel in the tournament before bowing to eventual champion Akron North in the quar-

Baseball was where Blatnik earned fame in high school and the pros, however. He competed for Coach Orville (Tubby) Edmundson in high school and played for the Fred Englehardt-coached Bridgeport National Bank Juniors in the summer. Between his junior and senior prep seasons, he worked out for six weeks with the Cleveland Indians and signed a contract with scout Bill Bradley but played his final high school season.

After graduation, he started his pro career with Greensburg, Pa., in the Class D Penn State League. He then competed, as a first baseman and outfielder, in Fargo, N.D., and Charleston, W.Va., before serving from 1942-46 in the Air Force. He returned to play in Harrisburg and Wilkes-Barre, Pa., before being called up by the Philadelphia Phillies. He competed for the Phillies and St. Louis Cardinals for two full seasons, plus minor league stops, from 1948-56 before retiring from baseball.

George 'Puck' Burgwin (Steubenville High School, Class of 1933).

A legendary early era four-sport Big Red who set school and Ohio Valley football rushing records while playing for 31-3 record teams against top tri-state competition from 1929-32.

He was the anchor of the 9-0 record, unscored-upon Big Red team of 1930 and a program which reeled off an OV record 17 straight shutout wins. As a junior, he rushed for 2,126 yards and scored 196 points in nine games — both Big Red records after 75 years and OV standards for six decades.

His career totals of 541 points and 5,614 rushing yards are both Big Red school records.

A two-way football player and kicker, he also excelled in track, baseball and basketball and some of his school track records lasted until the early 1950s. He played one college season for Western Reserve before leaving school and played in 1947-48 for the Steubenville semi-pro team. He's inducted into the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall of Fame.

Burgwin died of a heart attack at age 37 in 1951.

Kenny Griffith (Wellsburg High School, Class of 1937).
He was a senior standout on the 1937 Orange team which won its first, and only, OVAA championship with an 18-1 regular season record. It ended a school-best 22-2 season, under coach Reed Clark, in the regional finals with a loss to Benwood Union.

He enrolled at Alderson-Broaddus College, where he became a national scoring sensation under Coach Rex Pyles. He broke the national career scoring record of 1.596 points set by national Hall of Famer Hank Luisetti of Stanford by scoring 1.941 points in four seasons. Griffith led the nation in scoring his last two seasons (1940 with a 23.9 average and 1941 at 22.0) and became the first West Virginia Conference player to average 20 points for a season.

In 1941, the small college All-American became the first state basketball player to be selected the W. Va. Amateur Athlete of the Year. He also competed in a national All-Star game in Chicago.

An Alderson-Broaddus Hall of Famer who is featured on the walls of the school gymnasium, he was selected to the all-time West Virginia Conference team. After college, the 6-foot-2 Griffith played briefly in 1942 with the pro Akron Goodyears.

Jim Keane (Linsly Military Institute, Class of 1941).

The Bellaire native was a six-sport Cadet letterman in football, basketball, track, golf, tennis and boxing. He earned All-Valley honors in football and received a football scholarship to the University of Iowa. He finished his career at Northwestern University in Chicago.

A 6-foot-4, 208-pound end, he was drafted in the 18th round by the Chicago Bears in 1945 and played seven seasons in the National Football League the first six with the Bears and one with the Green Bay Packers. In his rookie season, the Bears defeated the New York Giants, 24-14 in the NFL championship game.

In his second season, he led the NFL in pass receiving with 64 catches for 910 yards and 10 touchdowns in 12 games.

His seven-year, 81-game NFL career included 224 pass receptions for 3,222 yards and 24 touchdowns.

Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

Tom Kinkade (Toronto High School, Class of 1938)

He was a football and basketball standout for the Red Knights before excelling in football at Ohio State University.

As a senior in high school, he led Toronto to a school record 19-2 record with only a regular season split with Weir High marring an unbeaten season. The 1938 team advanced to the regional tournament finals, the farthest in school history, before bowing, 50-49 to state tournament-bound Bridgeport.

The 6-foot-1, 190-pound Kinkade was selected All-Ohio by The Associated Press and led all scorers with a 25-point average. Toronto averaged 53 points a game.

In a 82-31 rout of Midland, Pa., Kinkade scored a school record 52 points on 23 goals and six free throws. It was the second highest Ohio Valley effort at the time and lasted as a school record for 30 years.

A quarterback in football, he was recruited by Ohio State and was a three-year letterman and two-way regular as a running back-linebacker on teams which finished 6-2 and Big Ten Conference champions in 1939 and 6-1-1 in 1941 under first-year coach Paul Brown. He was drafted by the Green Bay Packers in 1942, but opted not to play pro football.

Fred Negus (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1940)

He was a three-sport, three-year Purple Rider athlete in football, basketball and baseball and earned All-Valley honors as a junior center and senior fullback while serving as team captain in two sports.

After a year in prep school, he played football two years at the University of Wisconsin and earned All-Big Ten as a sophomore center on an 8-1-1 record team ranked No. 3 in the nation. After enlisting in the Marine Corp Reserve, he earned All-Big Ten center as a junior at the University of Michigan and also lettered in track. After a year in the active U.S. Marine Corp where he competed on the Marines' football team, he was drafted by the NFL's Cleveland Rams, but opted to return to the University of Wisconsin. He earned his third All-Big Ten first center honors and competed for the College All-Star team against the Chicago Bears.

After college, he played three seasons in Chicago in the All-American Football Conference and the 1950 season with the Chicago Bears. In 1998, he was inducted into the University of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame. In 2005, he died at age 83 in Fort Atkinson, Wis.

Charley Seabright (Benwood Union High School, Class of 1937)

He was a three-sport standout in football, basketball and baseball at old Benwood Union High, earning All-West Virginia one-class honors in football and basketball and was All-Valley in football. As a senior, he led the Ironmen to a school-best 23-2 basketball record and sectional and regional titles plus a state tournament berth. During that run, the Ironmen ended a 33-game winning streak of defending state champion Wheeling.

At West Virginia University, he earned seven letters and is one of only 12 athletes in school history to earned letters in football, basketball and baseball. A three-year starter as blocking back, single-wing quarterback and linebacker, he also batted .300 as a left-handed baseball first baseman and played guard in basketball.

He was selected to the WVU football all-time decade team (1940-49) and was a 2004 inductee into the WVU Sports Hall of Fame. In 1977, he was inducted into the West Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

In 1941, Seabright played with the NFL's Cleveland Rams before serving in the U.S. Army. After the war, he played five seasons (1946-50) as one of the last two-way offensive-defensive players in the NFL as blocking back-linebacker with the Pittsburgh Steelers. He started on the 8-4 record 1947 team regarded as the best in team history prior to the 1970s. He was selected in the 1970s on an All-Time Steeler Defensive Team. After residing and working in the Ohio Valley for three decades, he died in 1981.

Nick Skorich (Bellaire High School, Class of 1939)

He was a three-sport Big Reds' athlete in football, basketball and track and earned All-Valley honors as a football center while playing on three teams which won titles in the OVAA, the forerunner of the OVAC. The three teams had records of 9-1, 8-2 and 9-1.

He earned a football scholarship to the University of Cincinnati where he was team captain as a senior and earned honors on the All-Ohio college selections. Skorich was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1943 before serving in the U.S. Navy. After military service, he played three seasons as guard for the Steelers before turning to coaching - first in high school before serving as an assistant with the Steelers. Green Bay and Philadelphia before becoming Eagles' head coach for three seasons. He then joined the Cleveland Browns' staff and became the Browns' head coach from 1971-74. After leaving Cleveland, he capped his career as supervisor of officials for the National Football League. He died in 2004.

Moffat Storer (The Linsly School, Class of 1939)

He was a three-sport Cadet standout in football, basketball and track where he set the longest-lasting Ohio Valley and W. Va. record in the 100-yard dash. An All-Valley fullback, he helped Linsly to 7-2 and 9-2 records as a sophomore and junior but is best known for his record-setting first place finish in the 1939 Intelligencer Tri-State Track Meet, the most prestigious meet in the area at the time. He clocked 9.7 seconds for 100 yards which remained on the OV record books for four decades and was the best-ever in West Virginia until 1972.

He continued his football and track career at Duke University where he was a starting back in the 1942 Rose Bowl game against Oregon State. It was played in Durham, N.C., the only time outside Pasadena, Calif., because of World War II in the Pacific. He also starred on the Blue Devils' track team and led the sprint relay unit to a victory in the prestigious Penn Relays

Storer was drafted by the NFL Chicago Cardinals but, after graduation, served in the armed forces,

He lived in Chattanooga, Tenn., for several years, and is deceased.

Floyd Baker — The graduate of Wittenberg University left his boys' basketball coaching imprint on the Ohio Valley from 1932-45. He put Bridgeport High on the roundball map during a golden era from 1934-40 when the Bulldogs had three straight 20-win seasons (20-5, 27-4 and 23-3, all by Baker), five sectional crowns (three by Baker), and four straight Ohio state tournament berths (three by Baker), reaching the semifinals in 1936 and 1938, a team that included OVAC Legend John Blatnik. His seven-year Bulldog coaching record was 118-56.

Baker then moved over to rival Martins Ferry, where he enjoyed even more success and became the only area coach to guide two different schools to the Ohio state tournament, highlighted by the 1941 Ohio championship squad.

He started the Purple Riders' golden era in basketball, which lasted from 1939-54 and included 12 sectional titles, six by Baker-coached teams.

His final six Ferry teams won more than 20 games. From 1941-45, his teams went 122-9. That included the 29-2 record title team of 1941, led by Hall of Famer Lou Groza, and followed by records of 22-3, 24-1, 25-1 and 21-2. A 33-game winning streak ended in 1942. The 1944 team (26-1), led by Hall of Famer Alex Groza, won the first OVAC Class AA title. His seven-year Ferry record was 159-21.

Baker's 14-year Ohio Valley coaching record was 277-77, with seven Ohio state tournament berths and the 1941 Ohio largest Class A championship. He left Ferry for a job in Richmond, Ind.

Carl Hoppel (Beaver Local High School, Class of 1962). The youngest of five sons to Everett and Lee Hoppel, a famous wrestling family known throughout Ohio, he became the first freshman to win an Ohio wrestling championship in 1959. Had it not been for a highly-disputed takedown in the last few seconds of his semifinal match as a sophomore, where he placed third, he could have been a four-time state champion. He went on to win Ohio titles as a junior and senior to become a three-time champion.

Hoppel, who also played football at Beaver, was never pinned in four years and finished his career with a 99-2 won-loss record and three state championships. He was honored at the 2000 Ohio State Wrestling Tournament as one of the Top 15 "Greatest Ohio High School Wrestlers."

For 10 straight years, from 1953-62, the five Hoppel brothers competed in the Ohio State Tournament and had 12 state placers including six champions — three by the youngest son, Carl. The four oldest sons competed for East Liverpool High.

Carl Hoppel, a retired businessman, was once owner of Hoppel Enterprises, Hoppel Block and Brick and co-owner of West Point Electric.

Dick Mehen (Wheeling High School, Class of 1940). He and older brother Bernie Mehen, who was honored as an OVAC Legend in 2006, became the first two West Virginia basketball players to earn all-class, first team all-state basketball honors three times. The 6-foot-5 center was honored as all-state captain in 1940 when the Wildcats went 23-1 and won the second state title in three years and also claimed the OVAA championship. The OVAA was a conference forerunner of the OVAC.

In 1938, when both Dick and Bernie Mehen started for the Wildcats, Wheeling High went 24-0 and won a state title for Coach Everett Brinkman, an OVAC Legends charter selection. The Wildcats went 64-3 in the three years that Dick Mehen was a starter.

As a senior, Mehen scored 556 points to lead the Ohio Valley, and probably the state of West Virginia, and ended his prep career with more than 1,300 points, a high total for that era.

Dick joined Bernie at the University of Tennessee and earned two first team All-Southeastern Conference honors and was second team All-America. He then played five years of pro basketball in the pre-NBA era, including the Toledo Jeeps coached by Triadelphia High product and OVAC Legend, Jule Rivlin.

Will Robinson (Steubenville High School, Class of 1933). A five-sport Big Red letterman in football, basketball, baseball and track, he was the "T" quarterback on the 1930 9-0 record football team which was unbeaten, untied and unscored-upon and also featured OVAC Legend George (Puck) Burgwin. Big Red went 26-1 in his three years at quarterback.

He was also a fine golfer, placing second in the Ohio state tournament.

At West Virginia State, Robinson captained three teams in three sports, won 12 varsity letters, and quarterbacked the 1936 national Negro championship team. He became a legendary high school coach in Detroit where his 28 teams won 85 percent of their games while producing numerous college and pro athletes at Cass Tech and Pershing High School.

In 1970, he became the first black to become head basketball coach at a major university — Illinois State — where he coached Olympian and NBA player Doug Collins. After five winning seasons, he returned to Detroit to join the NBA Pistons' staff as a scout.

He's also a member of several Halls of Fame including W. Va. State, Illinois State, Michigan Sports Hall, and Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dans. He died, at age 96, in 2008.

Jack Simons (New Cumberland High School, Class of 1920). He has held the Ohio Valley single-season football scoring record for 90 years. In 1919, he scored 38 touchdowns and 60 extra points for a record 288 points. He was a four-year, four-sport (football, basketball, baseball, track) performer at the school which was merged, along with Chester and Newell, into the current Oak Glen High School. He became the first New Cumberland athlete, in 1919, to earn first team all-state football honors.

At West Virginia University, he was a four-year starter (1920-23) at halfback and fullback as well as linebacker. He started on the 10-0-1 record 1922 team, the only unbeaten team in school history, He was captain of the 7-1-1 record 1923 team and is a member of the 1919-29 all-time WVU decade team.

In 1924, he spent one year as player-coach of the professional Steubenville Pros. He also became athletic director and started the football program at old St. Francis High School in 1931 and coached until 1938 including two 9-0 record teams. Simons has been inducted into the WVU Sports Hall of Fame and the W. Va. State Sports Hall of Fame. He died, at age 96, in 1997 in Morgantown, where he operated an insurance agency.

Bob Bentz (Beaver Local High School, Class of 1972). In high school, he dominated the area and Ohio distance running scene while setting school 1,600- and 3,200-meter school records which remain on the books.

He became the first sub-nine minute 3,200-meter runner in Ohio history (8:58) and his 4:20 time in the 1,600 remains on the school record books.

As a junior, he won the Ohio Class AA cross country title and placed second in the state meet 2-mile run.

As a senior, Bentz was undefeated in cross country and track while setting an Ohio two-mile record. He earned All-America status by placing third with a time of 8:58.4 for two miles at the High School Track & Field National Meet in Baton Rouge, La.

Recruited by the University of Tennessee, he led the Vols to four unbeaten cross country seasons, four Southeastern Conference titles and the 1972 NCAA title. In track, his teams won three SEC crowns and the 1974 NCAA championship. He contributed to 11 SEC titles in four cross country and track seasons while earning All-SEC honors.

Charles "Punque" Cartledge (Steubenville High School, Class of 1912). The first area inductee into the Ohio Football Coaches Hall of Fame and the initial honoree in the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall of Fame, he put Big Red football on the area and Ohio maps with a 22-year record of 140-38-11 from 1916-40.

His teams outscored foes by 3,772-870 and dealt famed Massillon its worst loss ever, 68-0, in 1931. That team was led by OVAC Half of Fame Legends George (Puck) Burgwin and Will Robinson. The Big Red schedule during that era included top team from around Ohio and western

In a pre-playoff era, his Big Red teams were acclaimed Ohio state champions five times (1925, 1926, 1930, 1931, 1935). He coached seven unbeaten teams and three one-loss squads.

From 1922-26, Big Red was unbeaten in 45 games against high school teams, with a lone defeat in 1924 to the Carnegie College freshmen. They had 35 shutouts in 46 games. In 1930-31 seasons, they had an Ohio Valley record 17 straight shutouts.

He also coached Big Red basketball to a 181-139 record from 1919-39 and also coached the tennis team.

As a high school senior (1911-12), he captained Big Red football, basketball and baseball teams and was a football quarterback. He died in 1978. Jim Jordan (Chester High School, Class of 1943), A 6-foot-3, 195-pound basketball center, he was selected captain of the 1943 one-class West Virginia All-State team after leading Chester to a 20-4 record. Two of the losses, including the regional tournament, were to 26-1 record state champion Wheeling High.

In five years of college play, Jordan competed for four conference championship teams. Enrolled in the Navy V-12 program at Mount St. Marys

(Md.) College, he was the leading scorer in the Mason-Dixon Conference.

He enrolled at the University of North Carolina in the Naval ROTC program and earned second team and first team All-America honors in two seasons with the Tar Heels. The 1946 UNC team finished as NCAA runner-up to Oklahoma A&M. He was the only unanimous choice for All-Southern Conference and led the league in scoring. Featured on a Tar Heel trading card of basketball legends, his jersey No. 8 hangs from the rafters of the Dean Smith Center.

Jordan finished his college career with two season at the University of Kentucky and played on the Wildcats' 1947 NIT title team and the 1948 NCAA championship squad led by fellow OVAC Hall of Famer and All-American, Alex Groza of Martins Ferry. Both Groza and Jordan were later selected to the All-Time Ohio Valley Pre-1950 team by The Intelligencer.

Jordan, who died in 1999, was an attorney in Chester for 35 years.

Casimir Myslinski (Steubenville High School, Class of 1941). In high school, he was a football running back and captain of the 1940 Big Red team, the final one for fellow OVAC Legend honoree Charles (Punque) Cartledge.

He entered West Point in the last pre-World War II class and under the stepped-up wartime program, he graduated in three years with a B.S. in

He served as captain of the 1943 Army team and earned the Most Valuable Player award while being named to every first team All-America selection as a 6-foot. 195-pound center. He also received the Knute Rockne Award as the nation's outstanding lineman in 1943.

After graduation in 1944, Myslinski entered the Air Force and returned to West Point in administration in 1952. In 1956, he became head of the Physical Education Department at the Air Force Academy and from 1968-82, he served as Athletic Director at the University of Pittsburgh.

He was selected Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Man of the Year in 1977. Myslinski died in 1993.

Norman "Wild Man" Willey (Pine Grove High School, Class of 1945). He is the Ohio Valley's most prominent product of the old six-man football teams at the smaller enrollment schools.

The 6-foot-2, 225-pound athlete played football, basketball and baseball for the Tornados.

After high school, he enrolled for one year in the U.S. Navy and briefly attended Salem College before enrolling at Marshall College, where he played football and basketball.

A fullback-defensive end in football, he was drafted in the 13th round by the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles, where he played eight seasons from 1950-57. He was a two-time Pro Bowl selection and is a member, along with Reggie White, as a defensive end on the All-Time Eagles' honor roll. Willey is credited as the reason the NFL started charting defensive sacks after it was reported he was unofficially credited with 17 sacks against New York Giants' quarterback Charley Conerly on Oct. 26, 1952. He earned the nickname "Wild Man" from his pass rushing resulting in opponents'

vardage losses An inductee into the Marshall and West Virginia State Sports Halls of Fame, he was honored in Pine Grove with a "Norman Willey Day" on Sept. 15, 2006. Signs proclaiming "Home of Wild Man Willey" were erected at the entrance to the town as well as at Valley High School.

Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

Tony Carna (Caldwell High School, Class of 1987). He is one of only four boys to win three Ohio cross country championships and led the star of the most successful team program in state history. He captured individual Class A titles from 1984-86 and had a winning senior time of 15:44.2. Th Redskins started a record run of eight straight state team titles, with Carna the main cog in the first two crowns of 1985 and 1986. The 1986 team wen unbeaten with a 137-0 mark and was ranked No. 1 in the nation by The Harrier publication, with Carna as an All-American selection.

He was a nine-time All-Ohioan in cross country and track, claiming two Ohio state crowns—the 1,600-meters as a junior and 3,200-meters as senior. His personal best times were 4:18 at 1,600; 8:38 at 3,000; 9:18 at 3,200; and 15:12 at 5,000 meters. He also set a national meet record in the

5,000-meter run in the 15-16 age group at The Athletics Congress (TAC) Junior Olympics in 1985.

Carna earned a scholarship to the University of Michigan where he won eight varsity letters in track and cross country and was an All-Big Ten and All-America honoree. He led the Wolverines to sixth place in the 1991 NCAA Division I National Cross Country Meet, where he finished 21st is individual competition. He resides in Jersey City, New Jersey.

Jim George (Smithfield High School, Class of 1950). A three-sport Spartan, he was a 190-pound fullback-tackle-end who was selected to th first All-Ohio Associated Press Class B team in 1949 and also was an All-Ohio Class B honorable mention basketball honoree as well as a basebal standout. The two-time All-Eastern Ohio football player led the Spartans to a school record 22-game win streak with a 22-1-1 record from 1947-49 including unbeaten seasons in 1947-48. As a senior, the Spartans opened the season with a 40-6 victory over the Massillon reserve team before playing their regular varsity schedule. He also started for the winning Ohio team in the 1950 Ohio-West Virginia All-Star Game.

In basketball, he led the Spartans to a 22-3 record —second best in school history — and the Jefferson County title. He accepted a football scholarship to Syracuse University, where he was a three-year letterman and regular for the Orangemen. He became the only Smithfield product drafted by the National Football League when he was selected by the Detroit Lions. He opted to join the Air Force.

Carter Howell (Flushing High School, Class of 1955). The 6-foot-5 center led the Orioles to the two best seasons (43-3 combined record) in school history, including an unbeaten regular season in 1954 and an overall 21-2 mark in 1955. A four-year starter, he scored 905 points — second most in area history at the time — as a senior for a then Ohio Valley record 39.3 points per game norm after sporting a 40.2 average in regular season. He scored 74 points against New Athens — second best in Ohio Valley history at the time — and also had games of 58 and 55 points. In the 118-52 rout of New Athens, he hit 26 of 37 goals and 22 of 30 free throws.

A two-time All-Eastern Ohio selection, he also was honored on the 1955 five-player first team All-Ohio Class B selections by the three major wire services. The four-year basketball regular ended his career with what was then a Belmont County record 1,961 points including 905 and 513 his last two

Howell, who also played on the Orioles' six-man football team and baseball team, enrolled at West Virginia State before joining the armed services. He returned to Flushing where he served as mayor for two years before passing away in 1990.

Dave Jones (Jewett-Scio High School, Class of 1981). The 6-foot-2 basketball guard led the Ohio Valley in scoring his last two seasons with averages of 33.6 and 32.1 points and he scored a Harrison County record 1,885 career points. He had a game high 50 points twice and averaged 12 rebounds a game as a senior.

A two-time first team All-Valley captain, he was Ohio Class A player of the Year and first team All-Ohio as a senior and second team as a junior. His basketball jersey was retired by the school and is displayed in the Scio Museum. In 1982, he was selected to the All-Time Ohio Valley Post-1950 Team

by The Intelligencer newspaper.

A three-sport, 11-letter winner, he was an All-Valley selection at end as a junior when he led the "Small Schools" with 51 receptions for 766 yards. In track, he cleared 6-foot-7 as a high jumper.

Jones accepted a basketball scholarship to Ohio State where he was a four-year letterman and one of three seniors featured on the cover of the 1984-85 OSU Media Guide. He was a full-time starter as a senior and part-time regular as a junior.

He resides in Manhattan Beach, Calif.

Ken Mikes (Sistersville High School, Class of 1954). The only Tiger to earn all-state recognition in football, basketball and baseball, he led the 1953 football team to a 10-0-1 record and the first state title (Class B) in school history. Playing for OVAC Hall of Fame coach George Strager, he starred in the 27-12 state title game victory over Romney. He was selected first team Class B All-State as well as co-captain of the All-Valley "Small School" team. He also started for West Virginia's winning team over Ohio in the annual Ohio-West Virginia All-Star Game. He was accorded National

All-American High School Team honors.

In basketball, he led the Tigers to a 22-2 record as a senior, the school's best mark at the time, and he scored 582 points for a 23-point average. He had a game high of 44 points against Pine Grove. Mikes was selected the state Player of the Year at the Tri-State Independent Basketball Tournament

In baseball, he was a pitcher-shortstop and helped the Tigers to their first ever one-class sectional championship.

Recruited by numerous major colleges for football, he enrolled at Purdue and was a three-year letterman and two-year regular as a two-way back and punter. He led The Big Ten in punting as a senior and was fourth in the nation with a 41.2-yard average. He was featured in Sports Illustrated for a major role in Purdue's upset of No. 1 ranked Michigan State, 20-13 in 1957, and is also featured in a book entitled "The Greatest Moments in Purdue Football History." Mikes played on the winning (21-20) North team in the North-South Shrine All-Star Game.

He declined offers to try out for NFL teams and served in the armed forces. He resides in Parkersburg.

John 'Zip' Behen (Cambridge High School, Class of 1918). The former Bobcat was one of the first 1,000-point scorers in Ohio, and Ohio Valley, hoops history. He finished his four-year high school career with 1,271 points, which still ranks fifth on the all-time Bobcat scoring charts.

In his senior season, Behen rewrote school and Ohio Valley records by scoring 68 points against Woodsfield. The mark remains as the Bobcats' single-game school record and was the standard for Ohio Valley schools until Yorkville's Ken Alessi, a charter member of the OVAC Hall of Fame, broke the record with 70 points in 1949 versus Shadyside.

Behen wound up with 454 points as a senior while leading the Bobcats to a second straight 18-2 record.

As a junior, he scored 386 points, His sophomore total for a 10-10 record team was 302 points. He started his career as a freshman with 129 points for a 16-2 record squad. During his four-year career, the Bobcats posted a combined 62-16 record.

Behen played one season at West Virginia University, lettering as a freshman forward and scoring 123 points for an 8,2 per game average, In 2007, Cambridge High School retired Behen's jersey number 18.

Ken Cunningham (East Liverpool High School, Class of 1961). A three-sport Potter athlete, he earned All-Ohio honors in basketball and football and was the Ohio High School Basketball Player of the Year selection for 1960-61 by The Associated Press, the only Potter ever accorded the honor. He also was selected to the Scholastic Coach All-American team.

During his prep career. Cunningham became the Potters' all-time leading scorer in basketball, including a school-record 41 points in a game while scoring 439 season points for a 24-point per game average. He also led the Potters in scoring as a sophomore and junior.

In football, he was a quarterback-defensive back and earned All-Ohio and team Most Valuable Player honors in 1960 while also being honored on the All-Eastern Ohio and All-County selections. He also played three baseball seasons for the Potters

He accepted a basketball scholarship to the 1961 NCAA national champion University of Cincinnati and the Bearcats repeated as titlist in 1962 when he was a freshman. As a sophomore on the varsity, Cincinnati went 26-2 and finished as NCAA runner-up to Loyola-Chicago.

Cunningham led the Bearcats in assists as a junior and the three-year letterman was elected team captain as a senior.

He later returned to Cincinnati as an assistant coach and was head coach at Akron University for three seasons before leaving the coaching ranks. He currently resides in Stow. Ohio.

Russell 'Tuss' Edwards (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1923). He was an honored, record-setting Purple Rider athlete who served as team captain of football, basketball and baseball as a senior. He was an All-Valley halfback as a senior after two years as an All-Valley end. In his senior season, he set record which was listed as an Ohio Valley record for several years. He scored 56 points on eight touchdowns plus eight conversion kicks in an 81-0 blanking

Edwards enrollod at Washington & Jefferson College, then a "major college" football power under coach John Heisman, for whom the Heisman Trophy is named. He played his final three years as a regular end for coaches Allie Miller and Andy Kerr. As a senior, he was All-East and earned some second team All-

After rejecting an offer to play pro football with the Philadelphia Yellow Jackets, he returned to the Ohio Valley to coach high school at Adena, Warwood and Linsly, Af Adena, his 1927 football team went 10-0, the girls' basketball team was 18-0 and the boys' hoop team had a winning season. He coached OVAC Legends honoree Jim (Monk) Moscrip, a Stanford University Alf-American who started in three Rose Bowls, at Adena. His 1930 Linsly boys' basketball team took a 21-0 record to Chicago to compete in the National Scholastic Basketball Tournament. The Cadets won two games before howing in the quarterfinals.

He helped found the Wheeling Midget Baseball League in 1950 and served as president from 1953-68. He was named Wheeling Jaycees' Citizen of the Year in 1956. In 1984, he was inducted into the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall of Fame.

Bob Hugh (Scio High School, Class of 1950). The most honored athlete in Scio High history, he set school and Harrison County basketball scoring records which remain six decades later. He was the second Eastern Ohio athlete to twice earn first team, five-player Associated Press All-Ohio Class B honors (the first was one year earlier by OVAC charter Hall of Famer Ken Alessi of Yorkville). He was the second-leading Ohio Class B scorer both his junior and senior years. He scored 744 points in 30 games as a junior, second best in Ohio to Alessi. Hugh scored 1.386 points in 55 games for an average of 25 points during his last two seasons.

The 6-foot-3 forward scored a school, and current Harrison County, record 60 points in a 96-50 win over New Athens. He also scored 50 in an earlier 96-36

In his senior season, he led the Panthers to their best-ever season of 24-1. Scio won its first 24 games, and the Harrison County and sectional tournaments, before bowing to Strasburg in the district. In his four seasons on the varsity, Scio went 88-13 with records of 24-1, 26-4 and a regional tourney berth, 22-5 and 16-3, Hugh also played on the Scio six-man football team which went unbeaten (9-0) in 1949 and 8-0 in 1947. The four-year record was 26-5-1. He played freshman basketball at Ohio University.

Joel Jones (Weirton Dunbar High School, Class of 1954). The first graduate of a segregated high school to be honored by the OVAC, he was a three-season football standout for the Raiders before competing in the Big Ten Conference as a member of a nationally-ranked Michigan State University team.

At Dunbar, the 6-foot-1, 215-pound Jones was a fullback for Coach Jim Wares from 1950-53 and served as captain of the once-beaten 1953 teams which defeated the other Ohio Valley segregated school, Lincoln of Wheeling, twice by 28-6 and 19-0. He was the team's leading scorer and ground-gainer his last two seasons and was a multiple-year all-star.

In an era when many college athletic teams were segregated, his talents were noticed by scouts from Penn State, Indiana and West Virginia State, then a national contender in the black college ranks. He enrolled on his own at Michigan State and walked on to the football team. In his four seasons at the school, the Spartans played in two Rose Bowl games including the 17-14 win over UCLA on Jan. 1, 1956 with Jones at defensive end. He lettered two seasons and played guard and tackle in the fall of 1956 when he earned some all-star recognition.

The Spartans were 9-1 in 1955 and 7-2 in 1956 with Jones in the lineup.

After college, he remained in Michigan, where he currently resides, as a high school educator and was a counselor at Henry Ford High School in Detroit,

Porter Mackey (East Liverpool High School, Class of 1936). In the final year of the jump ball-after-every-goal era, this Potter shooting whiz also noted for his passing finesse was listed by media as leading Ohio preps in scoring.

He tallied 408 points during a senior season when the Potter's recorded an 18-3 record. Rules were changed in 1937 to eliminate the center jump after every goal and scoring totals, both for individuals and teams, generally increased with the faster, uninterrupted play.

In the era of low scoring games, the four-year Potter performer set a school career scoring record and reached a game high of 28 points three times during his final season.

He was recognized on local all-star teams, but played before the All-Ohio selections were originated by The Associated Press in 1939.

Mackey, who was among the charter inductees into the East Liverpool High School Sports Hall of Fame, is acclaimed by some Potter historians as the school's finest high school cager. He retired to Peoria, Ariz., and is deceased.

Connie Sanford Richardson (Caldwell High School, Class of 1982). A 10-time, three-sport All-Pioneer Valley Conference honoree regarded as the best all-round female athlete in school history, she capped her basketball career by earning second team UPI All-Ohio Class A honors. As a senior, she led the Redskins to an 18-4 record and averaged 22.7 points and 13.7 rebounds while shooting 65% from the floor. As a junior, she had norms of 25.2 points and 19.5 rebounds. Her sophomore averages were 17.6 points and 17.3 rebounds. There was no team her freshman year because of gymnasium construction problems. Her career totals were 1,254 points and 855 rebounds with three All-PVC selections plus team MVP honors. She also was a four-time All-PVC pick in softball and three times in volleyball.

A four-year starter at Heidelberg College, the 5-10 forward led the Ohio Athletic Conference in scoring (20.1) and rebounding (14.2) as a senior and earned first team Kodak All-America honors. A four-time team MVP and three-year co-captain, she was twice All-OAC. She scored 1,691 career points with a school record 1.161 rebounds

with a school record 1,161 rebounds.

The winningest coach in Otterbein College history, she just completed her 23rd season with a 319-276 record. She resides in Westerville.

Andy Tonkovich (Benwood Union High School, Class of 1940). The 6-1 forward-guard and leading Ironman scorer earned All-Ohio Valley Athletic Association (OVAA) honors and was mentioned on the all-class West Virginia all-state selection before earning college and professional fame. The OVAA was the predecessor to the OVAC.

was the predecessor to the OVAC.

After high school, he served in the U.S. Armed Forces before enrolling at Marshall in 1944. He played four seasons with the Thundering Herd and graduated in 1948 with a school career record of 1,578 points. He was captain as a junior and second leading scorer of the 32-5 record 1947 team which won the school's only national championship, the NAIB (now NAIA) Tournament in Kansas City, Mo. He earned first team Little All-America honors as a junior and second team as a senior. He has been featured with a full-page photo in the Marshall media guides and was among the charter basketball honorees into the Marshall Athletic Hall of Fame. He also is in the NAIA Hall of Fame.

He became the only Ohio Valley athlete drafted overall No. 1 in the National Basketball Association Draft when the Providence Steamrollers selected him

in 1948. He played the 1949 season before returning to the Ohio Valley to be a player-coach with the local professional team, the Wheeling Blues, from 1950-52 in the Tri-State Pro Basketball League. He then served as basketball coach from 1952-54 at St. John Central High School in Bellaire and guided the Irish to a 16-6 record in his first season. He relocated to Florida where he passed away in 2006.

John Wood (Magnolia High School, Class of 1932). This triple-threat football player is the only Blue Eagle athlete selected as captain of the All-West Virginia one-class honor roll picked from 1917-47 before class selections started in 1948. This is comparable to the current Kennedy Award given to the

He played quarterback, running back, defensive back, drop-kick placekicker and punter as a 5-11, 165-pound three-year standout. He was shifted from running back as a sophomore and junior to quarterback as a senior and led the Blue Eagles to a 7-3 record while playing mostly larger schools. One of the losses was 14-6 to overall state champion Benwood Union, which selected Wood to its All-Opponent Team.

Noses was 14-6 to overall state champion Benwood Union, which selected wood to its Alf-Opponent Team.

Wood also was a two-year basketball team captain and a standout tennis player in summer tournaments.

He accepted a football scholarship to the University of Pittsburgh, then a national power which lost only 10 games from 1930-38. He played three seasons, mostly at defensive back, for teams with records of 8-1, 7-1-2 and 8-1-1. In 1936, Pitt upset then-unbeaten Notre Dame, 26-0 as Wood broke the game open with a long interception return. He also played in the 1937 Rose Bowl win over Washington, 21-0.

After graduation, he turned to college coaching/teaching at Harvard and Northeastern before joining the Wesleyan University staff in Middletown, Conn. He was head basketball coach from 1947-68 and also coached football and golf. He passed away in 1970.

Bill Young (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1943). He was a three-sport standout in a Golden Era of Purple Rider sports. He was honored on Ferry teams which won, or shared, two Ohio state championships in 1941.

He was the only sophomore starter on the Lou Groza-led 1941 basketball team which capped a 27-2 record by winning the first Ohio basketball team title-the largest Class A-of any Ohio Valley school. He was named All-Tournament. Later that year, the junior led Ferry to a 10-0 regular season football record and an invitational to play Toledo Libbey for a mythical state title. The teams tied, 14-14. In regular season, Ferry outscored 10 foes by 333-19 including a 54-6 rout of Steubenville.

The rare four-year Rider football letterman and three-year basketball starter on teams with records of 27-2, 22-3 and 24-1, he was team captain in both

sports. As a senior on the 24-1 record state semifinalist--the first unbeaten regular season team in school history, he was team MVP on a squad featuring sophomore Alex Groza, an OVAC Hall of Famer and later college All-America and Olympic star.

In 1942, Young became the first Rider to wear football jersey No. 44, a school tradition for several years to the team's top player. He also played baseball. After graduation, he entered U.S. military service before returning to enroll at West Liberty State. He starred on three teams which lost only one game. He earned Little All-America and Small All-America honors in 1947 when he led the nation in rushing with 1,353 yards. He held the West Virginia Conference career total offense record until the 1970s. He's a charter member of the WLS Athletics Hall of Fame. Young retired to live in Martins Ferry and is deceased.

Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

Cathy Clark Borich (Fort Frye High School, Class of 1986). She is the all-time leading career scorer at one of the area's top roundball programs. The four-year performer scored 1,598 points during a consistent career with 180, 444, 479 and 495 points in each of her seasons. She also charted 430 career rebounds and 265 career assists.

After earning All-Ohio Division III mention as a junior, she was tabbed first team All-Ohio as a senior and was District 12 D-III Player of the Year. She was a three-time All-Pioneer Valley Conference honoree and twice first team All-Eastern District and District 12.

After her senior year, she played in both the Ohio North-South All-Star Game and the District 12 All-Star Game.

The Lady Cadets were 69-32 in her four seasons with four section titles and two Pioneer Valley Conference crowns.

As good as she was in high school, she may have been better in college.

At Marietta College, she not only set the school scoring record but also the all-time Ohio Athletic Conference standard of 2,311 points.

The four-time first team All-OAC honoree was selected a first team NCAA Division III All-American as a senior and was the OAC Player of the Year her final two seasons while serving as Pioneer team captain.

After her senior season, she was accorded the OAC's highest honor, the Clyde Lamb Scholarship, and the Marietta College Betty Cleland Award.

She currently holds six Marietta College records. Besides the career point mark, she set standards for game scoring (42), season scoring (636), career goals (039), career goal attempts (1,918), free throws made in a game (18), season assists (209) and career assists (501).

She has been inducted into three Halls of Fame — Marietta College, Mid-Ohio Valley Sports and the District 12 Basketball Coaches Hall.

Hutchinson (Junior) Hart (Irondale High School, Class of 1944). The 5-foot-8, 160-pounder was a two-sport prep standout in basketball and football for this tiny school in northern Jefferson County.

As a senior, he earned first team, five-player All-Ohio Class B honors in basketball when only two classes (Class A & B) were selected. The Class A first unit included OVAC Hall of Famer Alex Groza of Martins Ferry.

Hart scored 350 points as a senior including several 20-30 point games and also was cited for his defensive play. A highlight was during the Jefferson County Tournament when Irondale upset Yorkville, the defending Ohio Class B champion, by 64-41 as Hart nearly matched the entire Ductillite team with a rare at-the-time 40 points on 16 goals and eight free throws.

In football, Hart was a mercury-heeled running back whose forte was speed. Hart enrolled at Delaware State University where he competed in football, basketball and track. In 1986, he was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame.

After coffege, he served in the U.S. Navy and was a high school teacher/coach for several years in Mound Bayou. Miss., and then taught and coached in Dover, Delaware at William Henry Comprehensive High School (the only black high school in the county) and at Dover High School. He passed away at age 69 on May 21, 1995 at his home in Felton, Delaware.

Irondale became part of the Stanton Local consolidation which is now part of the Edison schools.

Brian Hesson (Caldwell High School, Class of 1993). He was a major cog in the Redskins' running dynasty of the 1980s and 1990s, helping Caldwell win Ohio state cross country championships in 1990, '91 and '91, graduating one year before his school joined the OVAC.

The distance runner captured three state titles in cross country and five in track — two each in the 3,200 meters and 1,600 meters plus one as a member of a 3,200-meter relay unit. All told, he was a 17-time All-Ohion in the two sports.

After placing sixth in the Ohio cross country meet as a freshman, he won the title trifecta with times of 15:35, 15:30 and 15:20 in his final three years.

A four-time All-Ohioan in cross country, he was cited as a three-time prep All-American, He competed in the Foot Locker National Cross Country championships three times, placing 15th, 3rd and 8th. He also was a member of the 1994 Junior National Team. Recruited to run cross country and track by the University of Alabama, he became a four-letterman in both indoor and outdoor track. He earned All-Southeastern Conference honors three times and competed in three NCAA Track Championships.

Conference honors three times and competed in three NCAA Track Championships. He scored in three events in the 1997 SEC Championship Meet — running a 30:24 in the 10K on Friday, a 9:19 in the Steeplechase on Saturday, and 14:31 i the 5K on Sunday. He was honored by the University of Alabama with the Career Achievement Award in 1998.

Hesson has been inducted into the Ohio Track & Cross Country Coaches' Hall of Fame and the Mid-Ohio Valley Sports Hall of Fame.

Low Mott (Pine Grove High School, Class of 1956). The 5-foot-9 Tornadoes' basketball and baseball performer is considered the school's best-ever prep athlete. After 59 years, he still holds the Wetzel County career scoring record of 2,117 points and the single season point average mark of 33.0 points a game set in his senior year.

His career point total broke the W.Va, state mark of 1.956 points set from 1951-53 by the legendary "Hot Rod" Hundley of Charleston and Mott became the first 2.000 point scorer in Mountain State history. Mott's total also bettered the Ohio Valley standard of 2.077 points set by charter OVAC Hall of Famer Ken Alessi of Yorkville from 1947-49. His career total currently ranks 15th on the all-time W.Va, charts and Top 10 in Ohio Valley annals. Mott held the W.Va, career record until 1958 and the Ohio Valley standard until 1959.

As a prep senior, he scored 693 points in 21 games. In his junior year, he averaged 29.4 points including a school-record 51 points in a 127-58 win over Wallace. The 127 points set a state standard which lasted two weeks before Wheeling outscored Weir, 146-110, at Madison Gym in a game which set a then-national record total of 256 points.

Mott's senior average of 33.0 ranked third in the OV behind OVAC Hall of Famer Henry Josefczyk of Yorkville (42.2) and Legends honoree Jack Thayer of New Cumberland (33.95) and was ahead of two OVAC Hall of Famers — Lee Patrone of Bellaire (32.9) and Ron "Cy" Godfrey of Martins Ferry (32.4). In W.Va., Mott ranked third behind the legendary Jerry West of East Bank (34.3) and Thayer.

As a senior, Mott was selected Class B (smaller of two classes) first team All-State and also picked as the state Player of the Year by the Sistersville-based Tri-State Invitational Tournament.

After his senior year, he was selected to play on a combined W.Va.-Ohio All-Star team to play the Kentucky All-Stars. His teammates included West and Josefezyk. In baseball, he was a four-year regular pitcher/shortstop and also played American

Legion baseball. He also competed in the Wheeling Outdoor Basketball League.

He carned a basketball scholarship to Marshall and played three varsity seasons after a year on the freshman team.

Jack Thayer (New Cumberland High School, Class of 1956). He was a 6-foot-4, 200-pound multi-sport standout (football quarterback, basketball forward, baseball shortstop) who is regarded as the school's top multi-sport athlete.

He earned his most fame in basketball as a senior when he scored 679 points in 20 games for a school-record 33.95 average which ranked No. 2 in both the state and Ohio Valley. The top OV mark was 42.2 by OVAC Hall of Famer Henry Josefczyk of Yorkville and the leading W.Va. average was 34.3 by the legendary Jerry West of East Bank.

Thayer scored 56, 58 and 53 points in three straight late-season wins over Sherrard, Cameron and Follansbee St. Anthony. That gave him a remarkable 167 points in three games and 114 in back-to-back outings. He also had other games of 52, 49, 46 and 41 twice.

In football, he played for W.Va. in the annual W.Va.-Ohio All-Star game and was recruited by West Virginia University as an invited-walk-on candidate.

At WVU, he was one of two regular quarterbacks on a freshman team which won all five games. After his freshman year, he left school to join the U.S. Army and played armed service football before being discharged in 1961.

He signed a free agent contract for a tryout with the Cleveland Browns in 1962, the same year that OVAC charter Hall of Famer John Haylicek was in eamp.

After Thayer was cut, he returned to the Ohio Valley and earned a roster spot as a backup quarterback on the first Wheeling frommen team which went 9-4 and won the 1962 United Football League title in Thayer's only season on the team.





Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

Dick Larkins (East Liverpool High School, Class of 1927). Hewas a two-sport prep standout before becoming the only Ohio Valley athlete to earn three Ohio State letters in both football and basketball.

In high school, he was a four-year football lineman and served as team captain as a senior when he earned All-County honors. He also played two

varsity years of basketball for the Potters.

At Ohio State, he played tackle on three Buckeye teams (1928-30) and also was a guard on the OSU basketball team for three seasons while earning six varsity letters.

After graduation, he served in the Navy before returning to OSU in 1933 to join the athletic and physical educations staffs. In 1946, he became Athletic Director and served until his retirement in 1971. During his tenure, he guided one of the most extensive athletic programs in the Big 10 Conference and the country. The school named a recreation and physical activity facility, Larkins Hall, in his honor.

Amie Marks Cormell (Jewett-Scio High School, Class of 1994). The most honored female athlete in Lady Vikings' history, she earned 12 letters

in basketball, track and volleyball.

In basketball, Marks scored 2,319 points in 86 games with scason game averages of 26.3, 25.8, 28.5 and 27.9 as a senior. Her career point total ranks No. 2 in Ohio Valley history behind charter OVAC Hall of Famer Stephanie Petho of Bellaire St. John's.

Other career totals include 837 rebounds, 576 assists, 463 steals, 42% field goal and 74% free throw shooting. She cashed 120 of 314 3-point goals. Marks carned All-Ohio Player of the Year Division IV first team honors as a junior and senior and third team as a freshman and sophomore. She was D-IV Co-Player of the Year as a junior and senior with Ashley Bland of Zanesville Rosecrans and was a four-year Eastern District and District 5 selection and Player or Co-Player of the Year as a junior and senior. She was a three-time first learn All-Valley selection and a four-time All-Inter-Valley Conference choice. In track, she was twice an All-Valley selection. She won the Ohio Division III high jump as a junior and placed lifth as a senior.

Marks carned a basketball scholarship to Akron University where she was a four-year letterman and team co-captain as a senior. The 5-foot-9 forward/guard scored 853 career points, including 16 against nationally No. 1 ranked and two-time national champion Tennessee.

She currently resides in Northfield, Ohio and teaches and coaches at Nordonia High School.

Ron Martin (Tiffin Columbian High School, Class of 1971). The architect of the most dominant cross country program in Ohio Valley and Ohio history, he guided Caldwell from 1975-86 to a dual record of 1,195-186 and the first two of a record eight straight Ohio Class A state titles. In 1983, the Redskins finished two points behind champion McDonald in the state meet. A year later, Caldwell placed second, one point behind Dayton Christian. but the best was yet to come.

In 1985, Martin guided the Redskins to a perfect 136-0 dual record and the school's second state title. The 1986 team, however, is regarded as the school's best with a 137-0 dual record capped by a state record low 26 points to repeat as Ohio champion. The Redskins were declared the mythical national champion by Cross County Magazine. The 1984-86 Caldwell teams were led by three-time Ohio medalist Tony Carna, an OVAC Legends' honoree and one of only five state harriers to win three individual crowns.

Martin left Caldwell after the back-to-back Ohio crowns and was succeeded by current coach Dugan Hill, who extended the Redskins' state title run to eight in a row through 1992.

Martin, who also coached at alma mater Tiffin Columbian and Seneca East, also coached in the collegiate ranks at Tiffin University and Heidelberg University. He was inducted into the Ohio Association of Track and Cross Country Coaches Hall of Fame in 1997.

Ray Montgomery (Warwood High School, Class of 1926). The first Viking all-stater in football and basketball later became and all-time great at the University of Pittsburgh. He earned one-class All-State in football (1925), as well as All-Valley, and was selected to the five-player, one-class All-State (1926) in basketball as he led the second Viking team into the state tournament. He also played baseball.

For his high school, and later college honors, the school featured his All-America recognition with a large pictorial display in the school for many years. That display currently is featured in the OVAC Museum inside WesBanco Arena. In a 1969 series by The Intelligencer, he was selected to the Early Era guards on an All-Time Ohio Valley Football team based on staff research and reader polling.

He enrolled at Pitt on a basketball scholarship and tried out for the football team after national Hall of Fame coach Jock Sutherland reportedly

promised him a trip to the Rose Bowl if he made the team. He did and dropped basketball to concentrate on football. In his three seasons, Pitt won 23 lost four, had two ties and made two Rose Bowl trips after unbeaten regular seasons (8-0-1 in 1927 and 9-0 in 1929 when Pitt was crowned national champion by regular season polls.) Pitt, however, lost both Rose Bowls by 7-6 to Stanford and 47-14 to USC.

As a senior, he earned consensus first team All-America as a 6-foot-1, 188-pound guard. The two-way standout, also cited for his defense, was labeled by Sutherland as "the perfect guard" and was hailed as one of the greatest linemen Pitt ever produced. In 1958, he was selected to an All-Time Pitt team. Pete Zinaich (Weir High, Class of 1943). The most honored player on the first OVAC team to claim an "official" W.Va. all-class football championship. In the pre-playoff era, the W.Va. Sports Writers Association voted the 1942 Red Riders, coached by Hall of Famer Carl Hamill, the state champion despite a 6-3-1 record. Weir was unbeaten (4-0-1) vs. in-state teams with close losses to Massillon and Youngstown Chaney in Ohio and Clairton, Pa. The three-year regular fullback-linebacker on teams unbeaten vs. in-state foes was the Riders' leading rusher as a junior and senior and earned first

tam all-class 11-player All-State as a senior.

After military service, he enrolled at West Virginia University and became a rare team captain of two sports (football and baseball) as a 1949-50 senior. He lettered four years in football and was a regular as a junior fullback on the 9-3 record team which won the Jan. 1, 1949 Sun Bowl with a 21-12 win over Texas Western. After his senior season, he was drafted by the San Francisco 49ers in the ninth round as the 115th overall NFL pick but opted for an education career. He also was a three-year letterman at shortstop on the WVU baseball team.

After WVU, he spent his entire teaching/coaching career in Eastern Ohio. He was head football and baseball coach at Adena High School from 1956-69. His best football team (1965) went 9-1 and won the OVAC Class A championship.

Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

George Cheroke (Shadyside High School, Class of 1940). He was a football and wrestling standout for the Tigers, which produced the area's first wrestling power under coach Art Kirkland. The four-year grappler won the one-class Ohio heavyweight fitle in 1940 after capturing the 1939 crown at 165 pounds. As a sophomore, he placed third at 154 pounds. The Tigers placed second to Cleveland John Hay, 21-20, for 1940 team laurels after Shadyside defeated John Hay in a dual meet earlier. Cheroke, nicknamed Chief, also was a stellar 5-foot-9, 185-pound football guard. The three-year gridder and two-time team captain earned All-Valley honors as a two-way standout. The Tigers went 9-1 and 7-2-1 during his final two seasons.

He enrolled at Ohio State University to compete in both football and wrestling. Playing for coach Paul Brown on 6-1-1 record team, the sophomore moved into starting

Ineup in fifth game after a teammate's injury. He left OSU before 1942 season to serve in the Air Force during World War II.

After his discharge in 1946, he again opted to play for Paul Brown, who was starting the Cleveland Browns in the first year of the All-American Conference. Cheroke played in 12 games for the 13-2 record Browns, who defeated New York, 14-9 in the championship game. After one season, he re-enlisted in the Army for a 20-year career, retiring in 1965 to enter business in California. He passed away in 1986.

Harry Diehl (Mt. Morris, Pa. High School, Class of 1952). When he joined the Stanton High athletic program in 1960 as head basketball coach and assistant coach. there was no track program, so be guided the 1961 and 1962 basketball teams to unbeaten regular seasons and overall 19-1 and 23-1 records.

In 1963, without a home track, he started the Stanton boys' track program and competed in the Indian League at Mingo. Four years later, the first all-weather track in the Ohio Valley was installed at Stanton and the Indian League moved its meets from the Mingo cinder track to Stanton. Diehl's teams then recled off 75 consecutive dual meet wins, reportedly an Ohio Valley record, from 1967-76 as Stanton fielded one of the most dominant small school track programs in the area. Other teams in the Indian League included Mingo, Jefferson Union, Toronto, Cadiz, Springfield, United Local and Beaver Local,

League included Wrings, refersor Onton, Toronto, Cachz, Springfield, United Local and beaver Local.

Stanton won multiple Ohio district titles, two Class A regional crowns and competed in state events. While no first places were recorded, sophomore sprinter Bob Haught, who signed a University of Alabama football scholarship, posted the state's fastest 440-yard Class A time in 1970 before placing second at the state meet, OVAC Hall of Famer Blaine Rose also competed for Diehl, who ran track and cross country at West Virginia U.

Stanton joined the OVAC in 1981 and Diehl's teams won Class A titles in 1983 and 1986, his final year at the helm.

Diehl also served as an assistant football coach including the 9-0 record 1966 team with head coach Glenn Trout.

Diehl received several awards before retiring in 1986, including the second Robert McKelvey Award from the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dans in 1976 and the Cal Giffin Award from the OVAC in 1993.

He resides in Boynton Beach, Fla.

Frank Gilliam (Steubenville High School, Class of 1952). He, and charter OVAC Legend honoree Calvin Jones, led Big Red to its most successful football-boys baseline. ketball year (1951-52) in history. The court team is the winningest (28-1) in Big Red history with an unbeaten regular season followed by eight post-season wins in Ohio's largest Class A sectional, district and regional tournaments plus wins over Toledo Central Catholic and Akron North in the state event. Big Red bowed to Middletown. 63-53, in the finals, Gilliam was team captain.

The 1951 Big Red football team went 9-1, losing only to Massillon (13-6) and routing Canton McKinley (63-6) before being ranked No. 2 behind Massillon in the final AP state poll.

Gilliam, nicknamed Shag, was a two-way end who earned third team largest class All-Ohio plus All-Eastern Ohio and All-Valley honors. He played in the W.Va.-Ohio All-Star Game

He lettered three years in basketball and two each in football and baseball. The baseball team went 16-3 his junior year.

The University of Iowa recruited Jones. Gilliam and running back Eddie Vincent and the threesome were called the "Steubenville Trio" by Iowa media. Gilliam was a three-year starter at end including a sophomore season when the Hawkeyes tied Notre Dame. 14-14, and ranked No. 9 nationally. He sat out the 1955 season with a broken leg and returned in 1956 as fowa went 9-1 to win the Big Ten title and a first-ever trip to the Rose Bowl, beating Oregon State, 35-19. Gilliam was All-Big Ten and second team All-American.

In 1989, for Iowa's 100th football anniversary fete, fans selected Gilliam (and Jones) to an Alf-Time Iowa team.
Gilliam was drafted in the seventh NFL round by the Green Bay Packers, but opted to follow Jones to the Canadian Football League. He played three seasons at Winnipeg

before becoming an assistant coach (1966-70) at lowa. He then joined the Minnesota Vikings for a 36-year career in scouting and personnel.

He resides in Windermere, Fla.

Tom Harp (Barnesville High School, Class of 1945). A Shanrock football and basketball standout and college athlete who later made his mark in the coaching world.

A four-year quarterback and fullback in football, he was a three-year basketball standout who helped the Shanrocks to won-lost records of 18-4, 16-6 and 16-4 and titles in the East Ohio Athletic League. He was selected Alf-Conference his last two years.

He was recruited by Hall of Fame coach Sid Gillman to play football at Miami of Ohio and lettered as a freshman fullback before he was drafted into military service.

for two years with the Navy.

Returning home in 1948, he enrolled at Muskingum College and played quarterback and fullback on two Ohio Athletic Conference title teams in 1949-50.

After graduation, he turned to coaching and became head coach at Carrollton High from 1951-53 with a 20-6-1 record. He became one of over 100 coaches to apply

Army team, led by Heisman Trophy winner Pete Dawkins, was ranked No. 3 in the nation.

Ed Oliver (East Liverpool High School, Class of 1953). Regarded by some veteran Potter observers as the best all-round prep player at the school, he was a statewide honoree on both sides of the ball as a three-year regular. The runner, passer, placekicker, punter, linebacker and defensive back was a first team All-Ohio linebacker pick by The AP as a senior after rating second team All-Ohio defensive back honors as a junior. The UPI selected him a first team All-Ohio offensive back as a senior.

The Potters went 9-0-1 in 1952 and 8-2 in 1951 as Oliver was the team leading rusher and scorer. The program only produced one previous nine-win season.

He was also the leading basketball team scorer as a senior and lettered in baseball,

Awarded a football scholarship to the University of Miami (Fla.), he was a three-year letterman at running back. As a senior on an 8-1-1 record team ranked 6th in the national AP Poll, he was second on the team in rushing and scoring.

After graduation, he coached in the high school ranks. He is deceased.

Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

Dominic (Mac) Cara (Bellaire High School, Class of 1933). An All-Valley end, and four-year multi-sport performer, for the Big Reds, he earned three football letters at North Carolina State and served as 1936 team captain as a senior. He was selected on an All-Time Wolfpack team. All-State, All-Conference, All-South and honorable mention All-America. He was the first Wolfpack to be drafted — in the 19th Round of the 1937 NFL Draft by the Boston Redskins and played two seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

He returned to the Ohio Valley and coached old Powhatan High School to the Ohio Class B state championship in 1940 with a 3-1 finals win over Milford Center after 14-0 and 13-0 tourney wins. From 1940-47, he coached the Steubenville Central football team to a combined 50-17-7 record including marks of 9-0-1, 8-0-1, 8-1 and 8-1. Also, during that period, he coached the Steubenville Pros team for three years.

In 1948, he started a 12-year college assistant coach stint including a year at Georgetown, five years (1949-53) at Mississippi State and six years (1954-59) at the University of Florida. He recruited 37 Ohio Valley players to those schools including OVAC Hall of Famers Joe Fortunato (Mingo) and Don Fleming (Shadyside).

He returned to the Ohio Valley in 1961 and was an assistant coach under head coach Tom Keane from 1962-65 with the Wheeling fronmen, which won a United Football League title in 1963.

Cara, who was inducted into the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan and Bellaire High Halls of Fame, is deceased.

Dail Harper (Caldwell High School, Class of 1986). A three-sport prep athlete who set shot put records in track and earned all-state honors in football. As a senior trackman, his school record shot put effort of 64-feet, 9-inches at the Fulton Relays in Lancaster was the record for an area weightman for 23 years and ranks second all-time. After a state Class A runner-up finish as a sophomore with a 52-9 1/4 toss, he won two Ohio titles with efforts of 58-7 and 59-2 1/4. He also was a state discus qualifier as a senior.

The three-time Pioneer Valley Conference shot put champion also won the Kiebler International Meet in Chicago and was runner-up at the National Junior Olympics. USA Today selected him as Ohio Track Athlete of the Year for 1986.

In football, he was a four-year letterman/starter at running back and earned three All-Pioneer Valley Conference honors while leading team to two PVC championships. A two-time All-Eastern District pick, he was named Offensive Player of the Year as a senior when he rushed for 1,625 yards and 25 TDs. In Caldwell's first-ever Ohio playoff game, he rushed for 260 yards vs. Crooksville. He ended with 3,486 career rushing yards. Harper was also a three-year starter in basketball.

A Kent State recruit for track, he was a three-year letterman and a two-year Mid-American Conference outdoor champion in the shot put (58-6, 58-9) and an NCAA All-American as a junior when he placed 5th in the national indoors. He ranks 4th all-time in school indoor and 7th all-time in school outdoor shot put.

Bob Henderson (Cambridge High School, Class of 1955). One of the Bobcats' most honored football players, the center-linebacker was a first team All-Ohio selection as a center by both wire service polls and also the first Bobcat to be cited on an All-America team by Scholastic Coach. He also is in rare company by having his uniform No. 24 retired by the school.

The three-time All-Central Ohio League first team honoree helped the Bobcats win back-to-back league titles in 1952 and 1953. He also was a four-year basketball player and All-COL honorable mention choice as a senior and competed two years in baseball.

The 6-foot-1, 205-pound athlete earned a scholarship to the University of Illinois where he was a three-year letterman at center-linebacker. In a 20-13 upset in 1956 of nationally-ranked No. 1 Michigan State, he had an ironman game by playing 58 minutes of the 60-minute contest. Future Pro Football Hall of Famer Ray Nitschke was a fellow linebacker.

After serving armed services duty, he coached the Illinois freshman team for a year with a roster including another future Pro Football Hall of Famer. Dick Butkus. He later coached high school football for 25 years in Illinois. He passed away in 2016.

Eddie Sterling (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1943). The 6-foot-1 forward competed at high levels on the high school, college and professional levels. He carned first team All-Ohio in the largest Class A as a senior Purple Rider while scoring 357 points for an unbeaten regular season team which ended 24-1 including sectional, district and regional titles before bowing to Newark in the Ohio State Tournament. At Ferry, he was a four-year basketball player, three years as a track long jumper and one year in football and baseball.

At West Virginia University, he was a three-year starter on teams with a combined 48-20 record and was team captain as a senior. He scored 559 career points. He later returned to the Ohio Valley where he played fro 1950-52 with the Wheeling Blues of the Tri-State Pro Basketball League.

He also coached basketball from 55-60 at old Cadiz High School where his final five teams went 88-14 after a 4-17 first year start. His 1959 and 1960 Cardinal teams won the OVAC Class A titles and he led teams with won-lost marks of 17-2, 16-3, 19-3, 18-2 and 18-4.

Kim Tullis (Jewett-Scio High School, Class of 1984). The 5-foot-4 guard was the first Ohio Valley girl to break the 2,000-point career mark with 2.072 in 90 games during a four-year starting career. She scored in double figures in 89 games with a single game high of 53 vs. Indian Valley North, the fourth valley player to reach the 50-point mark. She led the valley in scoring two straight years and, as a senior, averaged 27.5 points, 7.5 rebounds, 8.0 assists and 5.4 steals while shooting 46.4% from the floor.

Tullis was a first team all-Ohio selection as a senior and she was a three-time first team All-Valley honoree - named co-captain as a senior. She averaged 25.1 as a junior and was a second team All-Ohio pick and scored 25.2 as a sophomore and gained third team All-Ohio honors. She also was a three-time choice as All-Eastern District and All-District 5

A resident of Kent, she was a four-year letterwinner at Miami of Ohio and a senior team co-captain while earning All-Mid American Conference Tournament and honorable mention All-MAC her final season. In 110 career games, she scored 940 points with 315 assists and 172 steals. She led her team in assists as a senior.

Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

Ed Bartrug (Magnolia High School, Class of 1927). He was a two-sport (football and basketball) prep and college standout. Bartrug earned all-class All-State and All-Valley honors as a Blue Hagle senior for an unbeaten team which played unbeaten Williamson in an all-class "unofficial" state title game in Huntington. Williamson won, 14-13 on the field but ineligible players were discovered later and the result nullified. The 9-0 record regular season team outscored nine foes 356-20 including seven shutouts. He scored a school record nine touchdowns in one game and returned a pass interception a record 98 yards against Warwood as a junior. As a senior, he was team captain for both football and basketball.

Bartrug was a five-letter winner in football (3) and basketball (2) at West Virginia U, and also competed in basehall and track. A two-way back in football, he is regarded as one of the best punters in school history. He had an 80-yard punt vs. Oregon State in 1927 and a 75-yard punt the following year. In 1928, he starred for the 8-2 record team which beat rival Pitt for the first time in four years, 9-6. He landed a 47-yard pass to set up WVU's only TD in the win. He was selected to the 1930-39 era All-Time Team.

After college, he was head football coach for 23 years at three southern W.Va. high schools — Mount Hope, St. Albans and Charleston — with a coaching record of 129-

After college, he was head football coach for 23 years at three southern W.Va. high schools — Mount Hope, St. Albans and Charleston — with a coaching record of 129-50-7. He also coached the South to a 28-13 win in 1947 in the annual North-South Game. After retirement from the education field in 1973, he became a high school track and football official. He was one of 10 charter Magnolia Life Achievement honorees for student-athletes and is inducted into both the W. Va. Sports Hall of Fame and WVU Sports Hall of Fame. He died in 1996.

Guido De Vecchis (Weir High School, Class of 1942). The 5-foot-8 sparkplug was one of the most celebrated Red Rider football-basketball athletes in the pre-OVAC era. Playing for OVAC Hall of Fame Legend coach Carl Hamill, he earned all-class All-State in both sports as a junior and senior as well as All-Valley in football, the only All-OV sport honors at the time.

In basketball, he set a school career point record of 1,169 points in four seasons during a low-scoring era. The mark lasted 22 years before broken by OVAC charter Hall of Famer Ron (Fritz) Williams. He averaged 19 points a game as a senior when he was named to the eight-player, all-class All-State team as the Red Riders finished W. Va. Class A runner-up to Fairmont Senior (38-37). He was a repeat all-tournament selection. As a junior, the guard was picked on the second all-class All-State unit as the Red Riders (21-4) won the regional title before beating Woodrow Wilson in the state Class A tourney and bowing to Huntington Hast.

In football, the running back was a second unit, all-class All-State honoree as a senior when he scored a Rider-best 17 TDs for a 9-1 record team which lost only to Massillon (Ohio), 6-0. In a 32-0 blanking of Clairton, Pa., he returned a punt 95 yards to score. He played on three Rider teams (1939-41) with records of 9-1, 7-2 and 9-2 competing against a ton-flight tri-state schedule. He onted to play football at West Virginia U. and lettered on the 1946 Mountaineer team. He died in 1996.

Stan Goletz (Bridgeport High School, Class of 1936). The 6-foot-3, 200-pound Bulldog was a two-sport standout who led his team into state tournaments in both basketball and baseball. Nicknamed "Stash" and "Lefty", the southpaw was a four-year regular first baseman-pitcher in baseball and the top player on the 27-4 record basketball team which advanced to Ohio's largest class tournament semifinals before bowing to eventual champion Newark after defeating Cleveland Holy Name and Bowling Green for OVAC Hall of Fame Legend coach Floyd Baker.

After going 18-3 in regular season play in the old Ohio Valley Athletic Association — the predecessor to the OVAC — the Bulldogs went 9-1 in post-season play to advance the farthest in school history at the time. He was team captain and carned All-State Tournament honors as a guard. Post-season victims included Steubenville, East Liverpool, Shadvside Toronto and Carrollton. Goletz also starred as a junior on a 20-5 record team.

In baseball, as a senior, he pitched two no-hit, no-run games in one week during the Eastern Ohio regional tournament to advance to the state largest Class A event. The Bulldogs then defeated Toledo Libby, 5-4, in the first round before bowing, 5-4, to Columbus Aquinas in the semifinals.

After high school, he enrolled at Ohio State and played four seasons of baseball while being scout by several pro teams in the pre-draft era. While in college, he played pro baseball as a pitcher during the summers. In 1938, he went 12-5 with Springfield, Ill., and played for Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in 1939. After college, in 1940, he played for three pro teams — Charleston, W.Va., Pine Bluff, Ark., and Oklahoma City, Okla. Playing outfield pitcher for Oklahoma City in 1941, he hit .300 in 59 games and was 15-10 as a pitcher before being called up by the Chicago White Sox. He played in five games as a pinch-hitter and had three hits in five at bats in the majors. A year later, he enlisted in the U.S. Army and upon release in 1945, he returned to minor league baseball as a pitcher, first baseman, outfielder and manager until the mid-1950s. He died in 1997.

Charles *Hank* Morus (McKeesport, Pa. High School, Class of 1939). He made his boys basketball coaching mark at old Newport High (1955-68) before the school

He made his boys basketball coaching mark at old Newport High (1955-68) before the school became part of the current Frontier (1968-81) High in New Matamoras. His first coaching job was in August, Mo. from 1950-55. Overall, his 31-year coaching record was 409-247 with 11 league titles, seven sectional championships and a district crown in 1969. After Frontier joined the OVAC, he guided the Cougars to Class AA titles in 1979 and 1981. He won league Coach of the Year honors six times; won District 12 honors in 1974 plus Eastern District Coach of the Year in 1969 and 1981, the year he coached in the OVAC All-Star game. In 1994, he earned the Earl Haberfield OVAC Basketball Coaches Award.

Besides coaching boys basketball, he served as Athletic Director at Newport from 1960-67 and at Frontier from 1968-81. In his first coaching job — girls basketball — his Missouri teams went 79-29. At Newport, he also coached the baseball team for 12 seasons with a 97-57 mark and four league, three sectional and one district title. The 1964 team advanced to the regional finals.

He graduated from Salem (W.Va.) College where he was captain and co-captain of the basketball and baseball teams and selected as the Outstanding Senior Athlete. In 1999, he was inducted into the Mid-Ohio Valley Athletic Hall of Fame and the Frontier High School Gymnasium was named the Hank Morus Gymnasium and an annual Hank Morus Athletic Scholarship was started for senior male and female student-athletes. He also is inducted in the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Hall. Ho died in 1998.

Steve Swisher (Parkersburg South High School, Class of 1969). South's first honoree was a three-sport Patriot all-stater during the first two years of the school who went on to an honored college baseball career before playing nine seasons in the major leagues. He was a sophomore starter at football end for Parkersburg High before South opened its doors and he became the school's first major multi-sport athlete. He also was a shortstop for a state championship Parkersburg Post 15 American Legion team.

In two years at South, he was an all-class, all-state baseball shortstop, a second team all-stater as a basketball forward; and an all-state mention as a football end. In two seasons of basketball, he scored 1,077 points and converted all 20 free throws in one game with a high point output of 33 points. Baseball was his future, however, as he accepted a scholarship to Ohio University, which advanced to the College World Series in his freshman season. That team featured Baseball Hall of Famer Mike Schmidt. Bobeat coach Bob Wren converted Swisher to eatcher and he became a three-time All-Mid American Conference honorce and an All-America selection as a senior.

He became the Bobcats' first Major League draft pick in the first round — and the first from West Virginia — as the 21st overall choice by the Chicago White Sox in 1973. Traded to the crosstown Chicago Cubs, he competed for the National League team from 1974-77 before playing with the St. Louis Cardinals from 1978-80 and the San Diego Padres from 1981-82. He was the Cubs' representative in the 1976 All-Star Game. After his playing days, he became a minor league manager from 1985-93 and 1997 plus 2005 and major league coach. He won three minor league championships in the Cleveland Indians and New York Mets' organizations and was the Mets' bullpen coach from 1994-96. He was a charter inductee into the Mid-Ohio Valley Sports Hall of Fame in 1998.
