

OVAC HALL OF FAME CLASS OF 2022

Dr. Dianna M. Vargo (St. Clairsville High School, Class of 1977). A true "goodwill ambassador" of the conference, Dr. Vargo has the distinction of being the first female member of the OVAC Executive Board when she came aboard in 2001, and she remains the only female more than 20 years later. She also served two years (2007-08 and 2008-09) as president of the board.

Dr. Vargo has done yeoman work as chairman of the George Strager "Evening with the Stars" Banquet at Wheeling Park's White Palace, an event showcasing the players, coaches, cheerleaders and Queen of Queen candidates participating in the annual OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game.

The OVAC Varsity Board was also the brainchild of Dr. Vargo. The premise of the Varsity Board – which includes two students (one boy, one girl) from a majority of the conference schools – is "empowering student-athletes to promote leadership, character and knowledge" and includes discussions on various topics such as sportsmanship and community involvement.

Dr. Vargo is a 1981 graduate of Ohio University with a Bachelor of Arts and Sciences in Mathematics. She earned a Master of Arts in Science/Mathematics Education from Wheeling Jesuit College in 1987, a Master of Arts in Education Administration from West Virginia University in 1993 and a Doctoral in Educational Leadership from West Virginia University in 2009. She spent more than three decades with Ohio County Schools, first as a

math teacher and track/cross country coach at Wheeling Park High School in the early 1980s; served as assistant principal and then in 2001 became high school principal at Park; assistant superintendent in 2005 and then in 2009, she was appointed the Deputy Superintendent of C County Schools. In 2012, Dr. Vargo was named Superintendent of Ohio County Schools, serving in that capacity until 2016.

A resident of Wheeling, she also serves on the City of Wheeling Hall of Fame Board and is a member of the City of Wheeling Municipal Civic Servi Commission. Dr. Vargo currently serves as the Director of Graduate Education and Accelerated Certification for Teaching Programs at Wheeling Univ

Henry 'Hen' Healy

Henry (Hen) Healy (St. John Central High School, Class of 1944). He enjoyed success as a head coach i sports at two conference schools – St. John Central and Paden City – amassing an overall football record o 52-3 and a basketball record of 151-48 and is one of only two OVAC-era coaches who won state champior in both sports (the other was Hall of Famer Burdell "Jimmy" Carey of Weir High.

Healy was at St. John Central from 1954-57, coaching the school's only perfect-record football team (* 1956) which was led by Hall of Fame running back Joe Maroon. He was named OVAC Coach of the Y 1957. His three-year record with the Irish was 19-7. He was also head basketball coach three years at SJC ning the OVAC Class A championship in 1956 and posting a three-year record of 39-18.

He moved on to Paden City, coaching there from 1957-1971, guiding the Wildcats to early successes ir football and basketball. In football, he coached 15 years with a record of 98-45-3 with three unbeaten rc seasons and three West Virginia Class A championship game appearances. The Wildcats won their first crown in 1970 after losing in the finals twice to a powerhouse Monongah squad led by the likes of Marbury and Nick Saban. Healy's 1959 and 1963 teams were unbeaten, but they didn't compete in the two

state playoffs. His 1966 team went 9-0-1, but again didn't make the playoffs. Among the Wildcat stars of time were future Syracuse back Dennis "Dink" Blatt: future WVU backs Mike Nelson and Larry sine; and Arcelius "Ace" Lyle, brother of 1 Chicago Bears' defensive back Garry Lyle. In basketball, he coached Paden City to a six-year record of 112-30, highlighted by the school' West Virginia Class A state title in 1960. The 23-4 record team was led by Marshall University recruit Walter "Nook" Smittle. None of h Wildcat teams won less than 15 games. Healy also served as Paden City's athletic director and principal.

He played football and basketball at St. John's, then served in the U.S. Army during WWI before attending West Liberty State College v he was a four-year letterman in two sports, graduating in 1951. He was a standout at fullback and defensive back under Coach Joe Bartell forward on the basketball team. He was inducted into the West Liberty Athletic Hall of Fame in 1984 and the Wetzel County Hall of Fame in He passed away in 2003 at the age of 76.



Seth Staskey (Shadyside High School, Class of 1998). There have been members of the Ohio Valley media with longer tenures than Staskey, but probably none more passionate about the conference and its athletic programs. In 23 years (and likely for another two decades or more), Staskey has reported on sporting events up and down the Ohio River on both sides, in every sport imaginable.

He started his journalism career in 1999 at The Times Leader, quickly elevating to the position of sports editor. In addition to articles, columns and photographs appearing in the eastern Ohio newspaper, his works also appear regularly in The Intelligencer. Wheeling News Register and The Herald Star. He is also a frequent guest sports commentator for WKKX Radio and WTRF-TV7.

Staskey is a member of the Ohio Prep Sportswriters Association, the Ohio High School Athletic Association (OHSAA) Media Advisory Committee and a member of the OPSWA East District Football, Boys Basketball and Girls Basketball All-Star Selection Committee.

His direct involvement with the OVAC includes serving as a member of the Hall of Fame Committee, the I Track Committee, the Golf Committee and the Basketball Committee; handling media releases for the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game and OVAC Samuel A. Mumley All-Star Basketball Classic; and he is the public address announcer for the OVAC Cal Giffin Track Championships at Red Devil Stadium in St. Clairsville.

Dave Cisar

ve Cisar (Bishop Donahue High School, Class of 1964). Cisar enjoyed a historic coaching career at nolia High School in New Martinsville, W.Va., collecting an incredible 1,051 combined victories in baseball ootball - the most in OVAC history.

8 years as head baseball coach. Cisar posted an 893-440 record (most wins in OVAC history; second allin West Virginia) with nine OVAC tournament or regular season titles (1976, '80, '82, '94, '98, 2000, '01, 09), 10 regional championships, one West Virginia Class AA State Championship (2006 with 24-7 record) hree state runner-up finishes (1984, 2003, 2013). His teams enjoyed nine 20-wins seasons and five 30-win ins. Cisar was the 2007 West Virginia State High School Baseball Coach of the Year.

went 158-107 in 24 seasons as head football coach with four OVAC titles (1981, '91, '92, '98); seven SAC playoff appearances (1978, '81, '83, '86, '88, '92 and '93) and three state runner-up finishes (1981, nd '93). He coached in the 1979 OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game and the 1982 West Virginia h-South All-Star Football Classic. He was the 1981 and 1988 Intelligencer/Wheeling News Register ball Coach of the Year.

ar is a member of the West Virginia Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame (2012), the Ohio Valley Football thes Hall of Fame (2003), the Bishop Donahue Hall of Fame (2006) and the West Liberty University

etic Hall of Fame (2021). He received the Carl R. Hamill Award from the Dapper Dan Club of the Upper Ohio Valley in 1993 and was ed that group's Co-Man of the Year in 2009.

cond team all-state baseball player as well as the quarterback in football at Bishop Donahue, Cisar transferred to West Liberty State ege after one year at Miami-Dade Junior College and was a three-year standout pitcher on the diamond (1967-69) and two-year captain. Hilltoppers were 1969 WVIAC champions and went 30-5 in league play during Cisar's three years on the diamond. v Martinsville named the road near the athletic fields "Dave Cisar Way".

Terry Depew

Terry Depew (Juniata (Pa.) High School, Class of 1969). This versatile coach spent more than a quarter century patrolling the sidelines of Lockhart Alumni Field on the Linsly campus in Wheeling and he was also the valuable right-hand man to a fellow Hall of Famer with the highly-successful Cadet baseball program.

Depew served as head football coach at Linsly for 26 seasons (1980-2005), putting together a 156-96-1 career record. That included the first three perfect record teams in the history of the private school which has a football history dating back to the late 1890s - 10-0 in 1986, 9-0 in 1987 and 10-0 in 1996.

Depew-coached squads had two lengthy winning streaks - a school record 26 straight (1986-88) and then 19 in a row (1989-90). He guided four teams to Ohio Valley Athletic Conference titles, winning in three different divisions - Class 3A in 1987, Class 2A in 1989 and Class 1A in 1996 and 2004.

He coached the West Virginia squad in the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game five times (1984, '87, '92, '97 and 2005). Depew - who coached three Hall of Fame gridders in Willie Clay, Eddie Drummond and Dan Stephens - received the Carl Hamill Award for coaches from the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club

in 1993. He was succeeded as Linsly's head football coach in 2006 by his son, B.J. Depew, who led the Cadets r fourth unbeaten season (10-0) in 2011.

e spring, Depew served as an assistant coach under Hall of Famer Gary Sprague, helping lead the Cadets to 13 OVAC championships. dition to his coaching, Depew - a native of Mifflintown (Pa.) and a 1973 graduate of Bucknell University where he was a three-year man on the Bison football team - served as Linsly's business manager and later as the assistant headmaster.

Mike Coyne

ke Coyne (St. John Central, Class of 1967). For more than four decades, the easily-recognizable and highlyded Coyne made his way up and down the basketball court as an official before finally hanging up his tle following the 2020-21 season at the age of 71.


12-year active member of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials (he's was awarded onorary lifetime membership upon his retirement), Coyne worked primary in the Ohio Valley Athletic erence, but officiated games throughout Ohio and West Virginia.

told, Coyne worked a total of 24 state basketball tournaments (17 in Ohio and seven in West Virginia) ell as countless sectional/district/regional level contests, OVAC Tournament games and OVAC Samuel A. iley All-Star Basketball Games.

yne also refereed the highly-publicized match-up featuring LeBron James and Akron St. Vincent-St. Mary ist Carmelo Anthony and Oak Hill in Columbus in 2002.

yne was honored with induction into the Ohio High School Athletic Association's Officials Hall of Fame in . He was named the OHSAA Official of the Year in 1990; the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association ial of the Year in 1989 and the District 5 Basketball Coaches Association Official of the Year in 2019.

was the first inductee into the Cancer Research Classic Hall of Fame in 2020, having worked at least one : in each of the first 12 years of the prestigious hoops event.

received an Outstanding Achievement Award from the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club in 1992 and was the recipient of the OVAC rt Dawson Officials Award in 2021.

OVAC HALL OF FAME CLASS OF 2022 Edmund DiBacco

Edmund DiBacco (Follansbee High School, Class of 1969). He began calling balls and strikes right out of high school and became a fixture on high school and college baseball diamonds for 34 years (1969-2002). DiBacco worked at the highest level in West Virginia prep ranks, unpiring six WVSSAC State Tournaments

in either Parkersburg or Charleston. He also had 31 West Virginia Sectional games and 20 Region 1 Tournament games to his credit along with eight Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Tournament games. DiBacco also spent 31 years working colling basefull contests including the NCAA Divide ULD.

DiBacco also spent 31 years working college baseball contests, including the NCAA Division III Regional Tournament in Marietta and home games for countless teams including Bethany, West Liberty, Washington & Jefferson, Pitt, West Virginia, Kent State, Duquesne, Point Park and LaRoche.

He also had 32 years with American Legion action, including eight West Virginia State Tournaments, six National Legion Regional Tournaments and the 1991 American Legion World Series in Boyertown, Pa. DiBacco umpired at the U.S Olympic Trials in 1992 in Millington Tennessee.

Jim Capito (Bellaire High School, Class of 1958). A school and Ohio Valley sprint and jump record-sette earned three All-Valley track honors including four events as a senior: 100-yard, 220-yard and 440-yard da and long jump.

As a senior, he set Big Reds' school records in the 220 (22.0), 440 (50.8) and in the long jump (23-10 1/2 latter an Ohio Valley record which lasted 30 years until 1988. He was the individual top scorer in three n meets - OVAC. Bellaire Relays and the District meet qualifier for the Ohio state meet where a leg injury e his prep career.

He set OVAC records in the 100, 220 and long jump. At the prestigious Bellaire Relays, he won the 100, and set a meet record of 51.25 in the 440.

As a junior, the Big Red was All-Valley in three events and placed seventh in the 220 at the Ohio State i for All-Ohio honors. He also set an OVAC and Martins Ferry Relays 220 standard and set two Bellaire Re records. He anchored a school-record 880-yard relay unit mark of 1:33.8.

In his sophomore season, he tied the 220-yard mark of 23.3 at the Belfaire Relays, the area's top invitati regular season meet during that era.

He also was a member of Big Reds' football and basketball teams.

His track exploits started as a freshman when he was the individual top scorer in the OVAC Freshman Meet by winning the 100 and 220 spi anchoring the winning sprint relay unit and placing second in the long jump.

Roger Holdinsky

Roger Holdinsky (Moundsville High School, Class of 1958). Football and track were his best sports but he competed in four sports as a Trojan and three sports at West Virginia University.

As a prep senior, he led the Trojans to a 9-1 record and was first team All-State Class AA, first team All-OVAC and co-captain of the All-Valley "Big School" selections. He led state largest class scoring with 129 points while "Mr. Everything", according to the All-State release, also passed, quick kicked, punted, kicked off and booted conversions, and played defense. He rushed for 1,106 yards on 163 carries (6.8 avg.).

The Trojan flash scored 19 TDs, added 125 PATs and passed for two TDs. He averaged 50.7 yards on seven quick kicks and intercepted eight passes on defense. He amassed 1,753 all-purpose yards in 10 games for rushing, passing, returns and interceptions.

He also was captain and top scorer as a senior basketball player. A four-year football and basketball performer, he also competed two each year in baseball and track, where he was a sprinter, jumper and pole vaulter.

The 5-foot-11, 160-pounder earned a football scholarship to West Virginia U., where he not only was a fouryear performer (one year on the freshman team and three varsity letters as a two-way back and kick returner) and the Mountaineers' first varsity athlete to letter in three unrelated sports in several years.

He was a record-setting track sprinter-jumper with a school-record 21.5 seconds for 220 yards and 46-foot,

4-inches for the hop, step and jump. He won the Southern Conference 220 as a senior and was WVU's top track scorer his last two years. H lettered in swimming and earned WVU's "Outstanding Minor Sports Athlete" award for 1962.

Despite his size, he was drafted by the Green Bay Packers in the 15th Round (210 overall pick) of the 1962 NFL Draft, but opted to return for employment.

Bob Bruney

Bruney (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1960). He was a football-wrestling standout for the Purple s before joining the Ohio State University football program.

wn as "Bullet Bob", the 5-foot-9, 165-pound two-way football back averaged six yards a carry for the 10-0 d Ferry team which won OVAC Class AA honors in 1959 and was ranked ninth in the Ohio largest Class oll. He earned All-Eastern Ohio honors, second team All-OVAC and honorable mention on the largest Class II-Ohio team at defensive back.

vrestling, he was a standout on the second and third wrestling teams at the school which were coached by of Famer John (Corky) Vrotsos. As a junior, he was OVAC runner-up at 145 pounds before improving as a r to OVAC 154-pound champion, district titlist and third place in the Ohio championships. The senior coin sported a 22-1 record.

went on to play football at OSU where he earned two varsity letters as a defensive back after being a more member of the 1961 team which went 8-0-1, won the Big Ten Conference title, and was ranked No. 2 hally in both wire service polls.

er college, he served as Ferry's head wrestling coach (1976-77), football coach (1974-78) and athletic

or (1985-94). He was a wrestling official for 17 years and is inducted into the Martins Ferry Athletic Hall of Fame and the school tling Hall of Fame. He received the OVAC's Mr. Mat award in 1995.

ney's Ferry football coaching record was 26-24 after coaching Ironton High (1966-71) to a 29-29-2 mark including 9-1 in his final season.

Gary (Tony) Marvin (Wheeling High School, Class of 1962). One of the most honored prep athletes in Wildcat history, he earned nine letters as a three-sport regular and served as team co-captain in football, basketball and track.

In basketball, he scored 1,399 career points (22.5 average) in three seasons, one of the top two totals in school history. As a senior, he averaged 25.0 points and earned first team all-class "Big All-State" plus Class AAA and UPI All-State. He was first team All-OVAC Class AAA captain and co-captain of the All-City team. As a junior, he averaged 22.1 points on an 18-7 record team which won sectional and regional titles to qualify for the state event, where he was all-tournament. He earned first team All-OVAC, All-City and third team all-class "Big All-State". As a sophomore, he averaged 20.3 points and earned second team All-OVAC, honorable mention all-class "Big All-State" and was the only sophomore on the first team All-City.

In football, the 5-foot-11, 145-pound two-way back was selected Mr. Football and Wildcat team MVP as a senior when he was first team All-OVAC largest Class AAA, second team All-Valley "Big School", second ary 'Tony' Marvin Team All-State "AAA" and captain of All-City team. As a junior, he was second team All-OVAC Class AAA and All-City after being honorable mention All-City as a sophomore.

lossomed as a senior in track when he was the leading scorer in the all-class OVAC Track Meet with 17 points, the second highest total in ts at the time. He won the 440-yard and 220-yard sprints, placed second in the 100 and tied for third in the high jump. He also won titles Dity Meet, Steel Valley League Meet and the regional before placing fourth in the 440 at the W.Va. Class AAA State Meet in Charleston. ied All-Valley track honors.

larshall, he was a basketball walk-on and competed on the freshman team. college, he was a long-time Ohio County basketball coach/assistant coach in junior high, junior varsity and at Wheeling Park High School.

Courtney Snyder

rtney Snyder (Steubenville High School, Class of 1973). The 6-2, 190-pounder enjoyed a tremendous season for Big Red, playing in a power-laden league that featured teams such as Massillon, Canton nley, Warren Harding and Niles McKinley.

der rushed for 1,039 yards and 11 TDs in nine games as a senior, a season in which Coach Abe Bryan's ed went 7-3. He also landed 13 passes for 161 yards.

legendary Steubenville grid boss called Snyder, "the best all-around back I've seen this year, including oponents."

der garnered Class AAA All-State, All-OVAC, All-Valley and All-Eastern District grid honors.

was also a standout for the Big Red hoop squad, earning first-team All-OVAC Class AAA plaudits. talented runner was recruited by a host of Division I schools, finally opting for Indiana University, coached e Corso. Snyder scripted a tremendous career with the Hoosiers, earning a starting berth as a freshman.

yder hit the ground running in Bloomington, establishing school records for season and career rushing after his first three years. He was named first-team All-Big Ten as a sophomore after gaining 1,254 yards, as tagged second-team All-Big Ten team as a junior after gaining 1,103 yards.

fate would have it, his senior career was cut short in his first game after just five carries for 8 yards.



OVAC HALL OF FAME CLASS OF 2022 **Richard Summers**

Richard Summers (Sistersville High School, Class of 1978). This basketball standout put up some prolific numbers while performing for the Tigers, earning the nickname "Radar Richard."

Summers finished with 1,824 career points before heading off to Concord College where he played for three seasons.

The 6-2 dandy averaged a whopping 38.2 points per game as a senior (1978) the highest total since St. John Central's Allan Hornyak's 41.9 in 1969. As a result, he was the top scorer in the state that season.

That same season, Summers scored 74 points in a 113-88 win over Wirt County. He also tallied games of 59, 55 and 54 that winter.

He was accorded first-team honors for the All-W. Va. Class A, OVAC Class A and All-Valley Small School teams.

As a junior, Summers averaged 26.1 points, seventh best in the state. He led the Tigers to a 20-5 campaign, falling to Gauley Bridge in the state semifinals. The talented sharpshooter was first-team All-W. Va., All-OVAC Class A and All-Valley "Small School".

Summers enjoyed a sparkling sophomore season, averaging 17 points a contest as Sistersville compiled a 21-3 campaign. He was a third-team All-Valley selection.

Summers has also scripted a superb coaching resume, guiding the Tyler Consolidated volleyball team to much success.

Lori Heady

Lori Heady (Buckeye Trail High School, Class of 1980). Heady was nothing short of dominating for C Dave Linn's basketball juggernaut.

The talented 6-foot center tallied 1,594 career points during her illustrious Trail career. Her final campaigns saw Linn's charges compile a 71-4 record while advancing to the state tournament each seasor As a senior, Heady averaged 19 points and 12 rebounds per contest. She garnered first-team All-Ohio he from both the UPI and AP. Both wire services named her the Class A Player of the Year.

Woofier was a three-year starter on the offensive line and linebacker for Oak Glen while also handling the punting chores. During his senior campaign, he was named first-team All-W. Va. in Class AAA, first-team All-Valley and first-team All-OVAC. The Golden Bears enjoyed a winning campaign that fall, marking just the fourth such season in school annals.

An exclamation point on his banner senior campaign was Woofter receiving the coveted Hunt Award, which is presented to the West Virginia All-Class Lineman of the Year.

He charted 120 tackles at linebacker as a senior while picking off three passes, covering three fumbles and forcing five others. Woofter topped all Ohio Valley punters with a 40.7 average.

As a junior, he was accorded second-team All-State honors while being tabbed first-team All-OVAC. He graded out at 90 percent blocking efficiency before grading 91 percent as a senior.

Woofter's bulk and athleticism lended themselves nicely to the basketball hardwood. He was a three-year hoop starter for the Golden Bears, netting more than 800 career points.

He was also standout in track and field, earning three letters. He qualified for the West Virginia state meet in the shot put and discus two placing third as a senior in the discus with a toss of 153-8.

h clocked a school-record time of 42.74. He was named the team's most outstanding track performer as a junior and senior. I was named the recipient of the Cambridge High School Ray Volz Award, which goes to the school's most outstanding male athlete. He was also ted as part of the charter class of the Cambridge High School Athletic Hall of Fame in 2017.

r his prep career, Ford went to the University of Akron where he played football and lettered twice. He played primarily on special teams in 1992, ed his way into the offensive rotation in 1993 by starting four games. He amassed 202 yards rushing, 194 yards receiving and saw action as a returner. He was a team captain for the Zips in 1994 and when he ranked second on the team with 45 carries for 205 yards. He was named an Outing Senior Award winner and an Offensive Back of the Year award winner.

Though he lettered multiple times in three sports, it was on the football field where McGhee left his biggest impact. McGhee tallied an impressive 4,487 all-purpose yards during two seasons as the chief option for the Knights. Included in that total are 3,883 yards rushing and he also scored 48 touchdowns.

As a senior, McGhee did the bulk of that damage. He actually led the entire OVAC and state of West Virginia in rushing yards en route to placing third in the voting for the prestigious Kennedy Award. He trailed only OVAC Hall of Famer Mark Cisar and future Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss in the voting. During that season, McGhee posted 2,690 of the aforementioned all-purpose yards. Stephanie Morgan (Barnesville High School, Class of 2009). The term 'greatest of all time' gets thrown around quite frequently. However, when it comes to Ohio Valley female distance running, the acronym GOAT is totally accurate.

Morgan arrived at Barnesville High after competing as an eighth grader and freshman in Clarkston, Mich. Her family moved back to the Ohio Valley in the summer of 2006 and as it pertains to distance running, records and awards, the rest is history.

Morgan wasted little time in asserting herself in the Ohio prep running scene. After finishing fifth in the Division III state cross country meet. Morgan basically never lost another race inside the state of Ohio.

All told, Morgan claimed eight OHSAA state championships. She won a pair of cross country titles in 2007 and 2008. She didn't just win those races, she ran away from the field. As a junior, Morgan broke the tape in 17:27.36, which was 61 seconds faster than her nearest competitor.

Morgan won three OVAC cross country titles, three district titles and three regional crowns. She also claimed the Nike Midwest Regional meet and went on to finish 16th at Nike Nationals. She was a finalist at the National Cross Country Foot Locker nationals as a senior.

As a senior, she won the state CC title with a time of 17:57 and was 38 seconds ahead of the runner-up finisher. On the track, Morgan was even more dominant. After finishing state runner-up in the 1600 in Michigan as a frosh,

Morgan didn't lose again. She won the 1600-meter run title as a sophomore, junior and senior. Her winning time as a sophomore was 4:45.21, whi was a state and state meet record.

She claimed the 3200-meter run crown as a sophomore and then shifted to the 800 for her final two prep campaigns, but the distance didn't matter still dominated, running a 2:09.77 as a senior, which was a state and state meet record.

Morgan was named both Ohio's Gatorade Female Cross Country (2007 and 2008) and Track Athlete of the Year twice (2008 and 2009). As a sen junior, she was an All-American in the 1500M thanks to a third-place finish at the USA Junior Nationals. As a senior, she won the mile at the prest Penn Relays in Philadelphia.

After high school, Morgan attended Baylor University. She ran in the NCAA Division I National Championships for the Bears as a freshman. SI transferred to the University of Illinois after one season and had an impressive career there, too. With the Illini, she competed at the NCAA Outdoc Nationals in the 1500 in 2011; she was part of a Big Ten Indoor Track championship squad in 2013 and earned All-Big Ten acclaim twice, includit runner-up finish in the 800 during the 2011 indoor campaign.

Teddi Jo Maslowski (Steubenville Catholic Central High School, Class of 2011). As it pertains to fe hurdling in the Ohio Valley, very few, if any, have done it better than this former Crusader.

Maslowski put forth a career that won't ever be forgotten. After all, it included an amazing seven championships, 15 total All-Ohio finishes, a Division III team state championship in 2011 and a perfect 16 in OVAC championships.

Though she did win an OVAC title in the 100-meter dash as a freshman, it didn't take long for Catholic Ce coaches to realize that hurdles were going to be the keynote event(s) for Maslowski.

As a freshman, Maslowski got her feet wet at the state meet by finishing seventh in the 100 high hurdle: third in the 300 lows.

Maslowski returned in 2009 and claimed her first state championship, winning the high hurdles in 14.71 was part of a state runner-up 4x200 team and also finished with silver in the low hurdles.

In 2010, Maslowski continued her domination in the high hurdles, skimming the flight in 14.44, which a time was a state meet record. She then anchored the 4x200 team to a gold medal and made it a hurdle sweep a 42.61, which was both a Division III state and state meet record at the time. She was also part of the 4x100 team that finished fifth.

Continuing her brilliance as a senior, Maslowski made it a three-peat in the high hurdles in 2011, breaking her own state-meet record with a 1 She anchored the 4x2 to another title in 1:42.64 and repeated in the lows with a 44.79. She completed her brilliant career with a state running finish in the long jump in what was really the only season she focused on the event.

With Maslowski's 28 individual points, the 10 from the 4x2 and the 4x1 team's ability to register a sixth-place finish, the Crusaders wor team title with 41 points.

Maslowski was named the Eastern District's Division III Female Track Athlete of the Year four times.

A standout in the classroom as well, Maslowski signed to continue her career at Duke University where she eventually shifted to a multi-c performer. She qualified to the NCAA Division I Outdoor Nationals in 2015, earning honorable mention All-America in the heptathlon. In 2 she took part in the NCAA Indoor National Meet and earned second team All-America in the long jump. She also ran on a 4x4 at the national in 2014. She was All-ACC three times during the indoor season and twice during outdoor,

When she departed Durham, Maslowski owned seven Duke University records and the indoor long jump mark of 20-9 1/4 still stands.

Maslowski competed professionally for a few years after college and worked for the prestigious Santa Barbara Track Club as an instructor youth track and field coach.

Duke turned down several Division I track offers to attend Division II power Ashland University. He qualified for the NCAA Division II national meet indoor and outdoor and earned All-America honors in both.

Duke's provess on the football field was also impressive as he was a four-year mainstay along both lines for the Pilots. He was named first teamAll-Division VI after his junior and senior seasons as well as Eastern District D-VI Defensive Player of the Year twice. He also took part in the OVAC AI Football Game.

Richard L. 'Dick' Potts (Coaches)

Richard L. "Dick" Potts finished his career as the Ohio Valley's all-time winningest

Richard L. "Dick" Poils initiated init career as the Onto valley's attentice winning with basketball coach with 589 career victories. Inducted into the Ohio High School Hall of Fame in 1983 by the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Association, Potts coached a total of 40 seasons, all of which where spent in Monroe County. He began in 1951 at Bethel High School. His 1957 Blackhawks came out of the Monroe County hills at tournament time and advanced all the way to the Ohio Class A state finals where they lost by a single point. At the time the school had just 13 boys in grades nine through 12 and all but one of the male stu-dents use on the basketball term.



dents was on the basketball team. In seven years at Bethel, his teams won more than 20 games five times, including the 27-2 miracle team

that played in the state tournament. When the school was taken into the Skyvue consolidation after the '58 campaign. Ports was named coach of the Golden Hawks where he spent four years before moving on to River High in 1963. He remained at the

of the Golden Hawks where he spent four years before moving on to River High in 1963. He remained at the Pitots' helm through the 1991 season. The former Hannibal High School athlete was named in 1981 as the recipient of the prestigious Ohio Paul Walker Award, given in memory of Jerry Lucas' high school cuach at Middletown, Ohio. Walker was the Buckeye State's all-time winningest coach. The navy veteran, Potts was the first OVAC coach to reach the 500-win plateau in basketball, reaching that goal with a win over Monrie County rival Woodsfield in 1983. Considered a master strategist and teacher of the game. Potts may have been at his best during critical situations in post-season play. His teams won seven overtime tournament games, including a nine-OT win achieved by River against Morgan in Class AA sectional play.

He also officiated football in the Canadian League, the United Football League and the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. 

County team. In basketball, she led the 1987 Lady Tigers to the state finals. He was a star both on the gridron and the track cinders for the Red Riders. Kelley — coached by the legendary Jim Carey — rushed for 2.730 yards and 42 career touchdowns. Kelley led Weir to a 10-t season and the West Virginia state championship in 1960. He gained 1.239 yards that year with 22 touchdowns. In the 40-0 rout of Nitro in the state championship game, Kelley was a one-man



wrecking crew. He tallied four TDs and passed for a fifth

wrecking crew. He tallied four TDs and passed for a fith. Kelley was also a two-way starter as a junior for the Red Riders. He was the second underclassmen in state history to receive the Kennedy Award (1959), bestowed each year on the state's premier prep football player, and the first winner from the OVAC. The first-team all-West Virginia and all-OVAC honoree captured the Wigwam and Scholastic Magazine All-American honors as the Red Riders were ranked 11th nationally. He played in the OVAC All-Star Game and left with Most Valuable Player accolades. Kelley also made his mark in track his senior season. He established a Steel Valley League record of 9.95 seconds for the ION-are in the OVAC met standard of 10 L seconds at the same distance.

He later attended Oklahoma State and Colorado, but was sidelined due to injuries.

Leon — who was also a standout grappler at Brooke — was a two-way line star for the powerful Bruins, earning a myriad of all-star accolades, including the 1975 Ken Hunt Award, going to the Lineman of the Year in West Virginia, making Leon the first OVAC winner of the prestigious honor. Leon led Brooke to a 9-1 season en roate to the OVAC championship in his junior campaign before carring all-conterence and all-state faurels as a senor. The powerful Leon played in the 1976 OVAC All-Star game, captaining the Mountaineers to victory. He was just as impressive in track circles, rewriting the OVAC record books in the shot put and discus. In the 1976 state meet, Leon launched the iron ball 59-1, breaking the W. Va, standard by some two feet. The record lasted low years before being eclipsed by future Olympian Randy Barnes. Leon won three state timw-ing titles, two in the shotput and one in the discus. Leon was also force on the mais, compiling a 48-6 mark as a junior and senior heavyweight. Upon graduation from Brooke, Leon accepted a loobball scholarship to Noter Dame. He was a three-year letterman for the Fighting Irsh as a guard. The firsh won two Cotton Bowls and one gator Bowl during his career at Stath Bend, After graduating from Notre Dame, he received his MD degrae from West Virginia University in 1984.

University in 1984. He has been a radiologist for 20 years. He is the current president of Radiological Physicians Associates. He is past president of the West Virginia Radiological Society, past president of the Marion County Medical Society as well as past president of the Fairmont Field Club. 

His play at Arizona State caught the eyes of professional scouts. He was drafted by Memphis of the ABA, but opted for a career as a basketball official. Kennedy, who still resides in the Phoenix area, continues to be a Pac-10 college basketball official.

He tied for high-point honors in the prestigious Bellaire Relay his senior year while being the high scorer in every other meet that spring.

As a senior, when the Bruins finished 11-2 as the state runner-up. Sweitzer set an Ohio Valley record for total yardage with 3,399. He also accounted for 36 touch-downs. Of his yardage total, he had 2,203 passing: 674 rushing and 522 on kick returns. After that senior season. Sweitzer, who also shined in back-all for the Bruins, repeated on the first team all state squad and was named the captain of the offensive unit. He was also runner-up for the Kennedy Award that season. He was twice named all-OVAC and all-Valley and was the Gatorade State Player of the Year. He was also listed in the USA Today as West Virginia Player of the Year and an honorable mention to the paper's All-American Team. to the paper's All American Team.

Sweitzer then accepted a scholarship to the University of Akron. He then joined Lindy Military Institute in 1942-43, serving as athletic director and was the head basketball coach from 1944-51. A two-time All-OVAC and All-Valley football honoree, he was co-captain of the 1957 All-OV Big School' honor roll as a 5-foot-6. 150-pound two-way back, After earning second team All-OVAC honors as a sophomore, he helped the lrish record the school's first-ever perfect football season of 9-0 with an OVAC tile as a junior under Coach Hen Healy in 1956. Then he posted major statistics in only seven games (6-1 record) in a senior season shortened by influenze. As a senior, Maroon led the Irish in scoring and rushing in the seven-game season. He led Eastern Ohio with 107 points on 17 touchdowns and five conversion runs and also completed 16 of 35 passes for eight scores. The Bishop Donahue star was born June 9, 1950 with just one arm. It never Indered him in life or athletics. During his youth, he played basketball and baseball, excelling in both. He was also a pioneer in weightlifting, He bought a cast iron set of weights while in grade school and used it passionately. The visionary strength training paid



handsome dividends. As a freshman at Bishop Donahue, Kerwood played football, basketball and baseball for Coach Tom O'Connell, lettering in all three sports. During the next three years at the McMechen-based school, he opted to concen-trate on just football and basketball. It proved a prudent decision. The powerful 6 ft, 2, 190-pounder started on the gridiron his final three seasons as a center, middle linebacker and kicker. During that time, he was accorded all-Valley, all-OVAC and all-State honors, named captain of the first two all-star sounds.

first two all-star squads. Kerwood distinguished himself so much as a senior gridder that he earned honorable mention All-American plaudits. He was also invited to play in the OVAC All-Star Football Game. His basketball career with the Bishops also took on all-star status. Kerwood was the team's center and gained all-OVAC and all-Valley honors. He was accorded the Sponsmanship Trophy at the West Virginia State Basketball Tournament as a senior.

virginia state Basketball Tournament as a senior. Kerwood's sparkling prep play afforded him several college scholarship offers in both football and basketball. He opted to play football at Salem College, earning extensive playing time as a freshman. As fate would have it, Kerwood was tragically killed in an automobile accident shortly after his frosh grid season at Salem.



Alex Welker (Athlete - 1970s)

Alex Welker (The Linsly School, Class of 1977). He is the Michael Phelps of Ohio Valley swimmers. Welker splashed his way to a career like none other in OVAC swimming annals.

Ono valley swimmers. Welker splashed his way to a career like none other in OVAC swimming annals. Simply put, Welker was unbeatable. The Linsly star never lost a race in high school, including relays, so it is only fitting that he is the first swimmer to be inducted into the OVAC Hall of Fame. He entered Linsly as a sophomore and quickly established himself as an aquati-star. An exclamation point to his unblemished record was that he held an OVAC record in every event he competed in. He competed without ever shaving his body or tapering, methods use to lower resistance, yielding faster times. Welker still holds school and OVAC records dating back to 1976. He earned the distinction of being named All-American as both a junior and sentor. His unparalleled swimming career proved a springboard to a scholarship from The Ohio State University, and Welker found more pool success in Columbus. He was voted the Buckeyes' Freshman Swimmer of the Year, helping the Scarlet & Gray to a runner-up finish in the Big Ten. He was a two-time NCAA qualifier while establishing five Ohio State records. Welker, unfortunately, suffered a major shoulder injury during his sophomore season, and many thought his swimming career was over. He proved the naysayers wrong as be earned "Comeback of the Year Award" while also setting a new Ohio State record in the 200-meter freestyle as a sentor. He also earned a piece of a world record. In 1975, he was a member of a 10-swimmer team that estab-lished a world mark in the 50-mile relay in Mount Vernon, Ohio, with Welker posting the fastest split.



Shawn Vincent (St. Clairsville High School, Class of 1987). Football was the

As a senior, Howelf was undefeated until the state meet when he settled for silver despite a personal best throw of 180 feet. That mark still stands as the best in Ohio Valley history. Along with his efforts in the state competition. Howell was a three-time OVAC Champion in the platter event.

Rataiczak (Bellaire High School, Class of 1964), Succeeding the late sam Mumley and his friend-to-all, get-it-done attitude as the guid-ing force of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference would not be an easy task. but it's one that Rataiczak has done with tremendous vision and class... and then some.

"Rat" has been the de facto head of the OVAC as Executive Secretary since 1999, and under his leadership, the hi-state conference has grown to an all-time high of 50 member schools from Ohio and West Virginia. During Ratalezak's watch, the Conference has grown by leaps and the conference has been the formation of the O bounds in a variety of areas. Among them have been the formation of the OVAC Hall of Fame and the OVAC Sports Museum (both located in WesBanco Arena in Wheeling); instituting boys and girls' basketball tournaments and expanding many of the other events, most notably the revised format of the track championships: creating an All-Conference Academic Team in conjunction with Ohio University Eastern, the creation of an official OVAC website; stan-

dardizing all championship awards: developing a meet director's handbook; computerizing all financial accounts; providing countless SportsWorld speakers to the area for more than 600 school assemblies, raising more than \$250,000 to bring them in at no cost to the Conference; and placing the Conference on solid financial ground through a partnership with Scholastic Sports Marketing

A retired Beltaire High School teacher, he served as a "Founding Father" and Director of the BHS sports Foundation and has been chairman of the Beltaire Wall of Fame/Hall of Fame Committee for more than 20 years. Rataiczak has been the Big Reds' basketball scorekeeper for 43 years, working at more than 1.700 consecutive varsity and junior varsity games. In fact, the OVAC's Scorekeeper/Timer Award presented annually at the OVAC All-Star Basketball Classific monued in his bases. Classic is named in his honor.

He has also served more than 30 years as the BHS record-keeper, publishing extensive media guides for both football and basketball

He compiled a career record of 326-121, an impressive winning percentage of 73%. His Potter-coached teams won four Ohio Valley Athletic Conference cham-pionships (1991, '94, '95 and '99); nine sectional titles; six district crowns and one regional championship with an OHSAA State "Final Four" Appearance in 1999; The '99 team finished with a 23-2 record, falling to Shaker Heights (71-63) in the Division I state semifinals.

He was selected Ohio Division I "Coach of the Year" in 1996 by the Ohio High School Basketball Association and 1999 by The Associated Press; was the District 5 Basketball Coaches Association "Coach of the Year" 11 times, Eastern District "Coach of the Year" seven times and received similar honors in Columbiana County numerous times.

He was previously inducted into the East Liverpool High School Athletic Hall of Fame, the Beaver County Sports Hall of Fame, the Midland High School Sports Hall of Fame and the District 5 Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame,

Among Aloi's attributes were consistency, continuity and commitment, evident in the fact that he never missed an open gym, practice, scrimmage or game during his playing or coaching careers. John Howell (Lancaster Fairfield Union High School, Class of 1967). When it comes to high school basketball officials, Howell is among the most recognized individuals throughout the Ohio Valley. After all, during a 38-year officialing career, he worked in practically every gymnasium out



Howell became a member of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials in 1972. He served as secretary of the board for 14

Basketball Officials in 1972. He served as secretary of the board for 14 years: as a training class instructor for 14 years; as rules interpreter for 16 years and assigned junior varsity officials for 14 years. He served as the OVAC's Assistant Basketball Commissioner from 1983. 94 and became the Basketball Commissioner in 1995, a role he still has today. Howell worked his first varsity basketball game in 1974 (Paden City vs. 5t, Marys) and his final appearance on the hardwood came March 11, 2009 in a West Virginia Class AA Regional game at Phillip Barbour High Schol.

Howell worked a total of 27 state tournaments: 14 Ohio boys (1987, '88, '90, '92, '94, '95, '96, '98, '99, 2000, '02, '04, '06,' 08); 5 Ohio girls (90, 91, 93, 01, 03); 6 West Virginia boys (88, 91, 94, 97, 99, 03); and 2 West Virginia girls (83, 89). He also worked a total of 75 regional tournament games over the years.

tournament games over the years. In 1993, Howell worked a W. Va. boys' state semifinal game in Charleston with Mike Coyne in morning and then and Ohio girls' semifinal game in Columbus with Roger Levi later same day. He officiated the first three-man championship boys' game in Ohio in 1996 and the first 3-man championship boys' game in W. Va. in 1997. Howell received a host of awards over the years, including NFIOA (National Federation of Interscholastic Officials Association) Official of the Year in West Virginia in 1992 and in Ohio in 1997; Ohio District 5 Official of the Year in 1991. Ohio District 12 Official of the Year in 1992: West Virginia Officials' award. He was inducted into the OHSAA Officials Hall of Fame Robert Dawson Officials' Award. Harry "Moo" Moore (Moundsville High School, Class of 1948). The 6-foot-2 forward set school career scoring records which lasted 18 years until broken in 1966 by OVAC Hall of Famer Bob Hummell, He scored 1,700 career points in four seasons and he also set the all-time Trojan single-game record of 54 points, including 25 goals, in a 101-17 rout of Cameron. He earned first team, one-class All-State as a senior and was twice a first




School Player of the Year honoree in selections made from 1948-60 by the Tri-State Independent Tournament held in Sistersville. Moore led the Trojans to records of 15-2 in 1948 and 19-3 in 1946 when

the team advanced to the W.Va. region finals. He earned a scholarship to West Virginia University where he played on three varsity teams with a combined 60-20 record, including a Southern Conference regular season and tournament

with a combined 60-20 record, including a Southern Conference regular season and fournament championship. Moore's 84 percent career free throw percentage ranks No. 2 all-time at WVU. He averaged 12.8 points a game as a senior and was selected honorable mention All-America. He also was chosen in the sixth round of the 1952 NBA Draft by the Syracuse Nationals. He served in the Army infantry from 1953-55 and was selected to play in the 1954 armed forces Pan-American Games in Mexico and International Games in Germany. In 2007, he was inducted into the West Virginia University Sports Hall of Fame. Moore, who retired in 1995 from the oil industry, resides in Moundsville.







Ron 'Cy' Godfrey (Athlete - 1950s)

Ron "Cy" Godfrey (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1956). The 6-foot-5 stringbean set school scoring records which remain on the books for more than 50 years. He shattered Purple Rider career, season and single game marks set in 1944 by legendary OVAC Hall season and single game marks set in 1944 by legendary OVAC Itall of Famer Alex Groza. His records include current standards of 1,300 career points in a game against Wheeling and Benwood Union. The singlegame mark has been tied, the others unbroken. Mention Au-America, He later served as head coach for four seasons of the Hurricanes before resigning in 1971. His prize protege was future Basketball Hall of Famer Rick Barry, Godfrey has been inducted into the University of Miami Sports Hall of Fame and the Atlantic Coast Conference Legends Class of 2012 although he never played an ACC game. Miami is currently a member of the ACC, Godfrey resides in Coral Springs, Fla.

Jim Brown (Athlete - 1960s)

Jim Brown (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1961). A two-sport Purple Rider standout, he is the first OVAC athlete honored primarily for golf. In the OVAC all-class tournament, he improved each year to place fourth, third, second and first his four years. He also won three OVAC Ohio-side titles. He won three Ohio district crowns after placing cound as a feedman. It the Ohio state tournament he improved each second as a freshman. In leading St. C. to the OVAC champion-ship her senior campaign. Noble landed every concervable honor. She was voted, all-OVAC, all-District, all-Valley and all-Ohio. She was named the team's MVP and was chosen to play in the OVAC All-Star Game. In softball, she was a three-year letterwinner and was again named MVP as a conver named MVP as a senior.



Paul Rickards (Athlete - 1940s)

Paul Rickards (Wheeling High School, Class of 1944). He was a threesport star who was labeled by Hall of Fame coach Bob Roe as the best football player he ever coached. The 6-foot-1, 190-pounder played center as a sophomore before becoming a running-passing quarterback-tailbackinebacker-putter for the Wildeats. He was the only two-time first team, one-class all-stater in 1942 and 1943 and was voted the top state passer for two years. As a senior, he completed 60 passes - a rare total at the time - for nine TDs and rushed for 10 scores. He also was the team's top tackler, kick returner and punter. He earned nickname of "Pitching Paul" because of passing in era or mostly running.



In basketball, he was a three-year regular and helped the Wildents win the state one-class title as a junior when Wheeling capped 26-1 record by winning its final 21 games. He was first team All-OVAC on the first-ever selections and first team one-class all-state as a senior and second team as a junior In track, he won a rare "double" in the one-class state meet, capturing the long jump and

shot put for the state runner-up team. He also helped Wheeling win the first of three straight one-class OVAC crowns.

Alan Jack (Wintersville High School, Class of 1966). He was a threeyear starter as a 6-foot, 205-pound fullback-linebacker on teams coached by OVAC Hall of Famer Bob Kettlewell that went 9-1.8-1-1 and 9-1 with only one loss to Ohio Valley foes. The last two teams also won Big Eight



only one loss to Ohio Valley foes. The last two teams also won Big Eight League titles. He was a blocking fullback but, as a senior, he also rushed 115 times for 583 yards and scored 60 points. His senior honors included All-OVAC Class AAA. All-Valley Big School, All-Eastern Ohio and All-Big Eight. He earned a scholarship to Ohio State and, after playing on the fresh-man team, he became a three-year starter as a 6-foot, 220-pound offen-sive guard on teams with records of 6-3. 10-0 and 8-1. The unbeaten 1968 Big Ten Conference champion team defeated an O.J. Simpson-led Southern California team, 27-16 in the Rose Bowl and was crowned National Champion with a No.1 ranking in both national polls. Jack was selected co-captain of the Buckeyes' 8-1 record 1969 team which was co-Big Ten Conference champion.

Rick Coles (Athlete - 1970s)

Rick Coles (Wheeling High, Class of 1971). He was a star for the Wild-cats in both football and basketball, earning a scholarship to West Virginia University in the latter.

The 6.3, 170-pound guard enjoyed a record-setting hoop career. He aver-aged 33.7 in the regular season as a senior, leading the Wildcats to a 21-3 record and OVAC championship honors. That squad also went on to win sectional and regional titles en route to a state tourney berth

sectional and regional titles en route to a state fourney berth. He tied the school's single-game scoring record, held by legendary Ev-ertt Brinkman, with 54 points in a 147-88 conquest of Oak Glen. He also averaged an amazing 22 rebounds per game in his final campaign. For his career, Coles netted 1.389 points, just 22 shy of Wheeling High's school standard. He was a two-time all-Valley "Big School", all-OVAC and all-W Va, first team honoree. Coles was selected as state player of the year by the Morgantown Touchdown Club following his career and the state player of the year by the Morgantown Touchdown Club following

his senior campaign Coles also starred on the gridiron, lettering three years while performing at quarterback. wide receiver and defensive back. As a senior, he ranked second in OVAC Class AAA pass

To years with more than 1,100 yeards. Coles also used his versatility and athleticism on the Wildcats' track team, competing in relays and as a high jumper.

At WVU, Coles was the second-leading scorer as the Mountaineers' freshman squad via his 14-point average. He earned a letter as a sophomore, playing in 22 games. As fate would have it, however, Coles suffered a broken leg in the pre-season of his junior year which limited his

play over the next two years, Basketball coaching icon Sam Andy called Coles one of the two best players he ever coached, the other being Hall of Famer Anthony Reed.

Stan Boroski (Athlete - 1980s)

Stan Boroski (Buckeye South High School, Class of 1981). He may be best known for his baseball career, but Boroski was a tremendous three-sport standout at Buckeye South. He carned all-Ohio honors in football, basketball and baseball for the Rebels.

As a junior, he was a hard-running tailback: He rushed for more than





He ended his professional playing days as a pitcher in the Kansas City Royals organization. His minor league career spawned a long and successful coaching career in professional baseball. Boroski spent 18 years coaching with the Houston Astros organization before being named bullpen coach for the Tampa Bay Rays on Dec. 17, 2009. He still holds that post today, overseeing one of the premier staffs in Major League Baseball.









Chad Brinker (Athlete - 1990s)

Chad Brinker (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1998). This

Chad Brinker (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1998). This Purple Rider legend shined in three sports during his four-year prep career, but it was in football where he really left a lasting mark. After lettering as a freshman, Brinker got his chance to be the Purple Riders' main tailback midway through his sophomore season and clearly made the most of his opportunity. Brinker finished his prep career with 3.984 yards, which ranks second all-time at Ferry, and 51 touchdowns. The majority of his career yards came as a senior when he racked up 2.024 yards. After both his junior and senior seasons. Brinker was named first-team all-Eastern District and first team all-Ohio. As a senior, he was the district's offensive player of the year and also the district's nominee for Ohio's

Brinker was named institutem alt-raisem District and fust-team an-Onto, its a senior, the was the district's offensive player of the year and also the district's noninee for Ohio's coveted Mr. Football Award, He was also named a USA Today All-American, Along with his state honors, Brinker was twice named first-team all-OVAC and all-Valley, serving as a co-captain both in 1996 and 1997. Brinker took part in the Rudy Mumley OVAC All-Star Charity Football Classic, but after rushing for 160 yards in the first half, he was injured and dida't their in the serving half. didn't play in the second half

His success wasn't limited to the high school ranks. Brinker signed with Ohio University and earned four letters for the Bobcats. He was twice named all. MAC and was chosen to play in the 2002 Hula Bowl All-Star Game in Hawaii, Brinker finished his career with the Bobcats with 2.826 yards and 27 rushing touchdowns, which rank fifth and fourth on the O.U. career listing, respectively. Of his yards, he ran for 1,099 as a senior. He put forth 10, 100-yard rushing games during his career. Brinker put forth those numbers despite missing four games as a junior because of an injury. Though he went undrafted, Brinker signed with the New York Jets in 2003 and played in the preseason before being released on the final cut. He scored two touchdowns that pre-season. He played in NFL Europe in 2004.


Along with his football exploits, Brinker was an all-Ohioan in track and field. He finished seventh in the Division II 100 meter dash as a senior, running 11.27. He also lettered in basketball and baseball. He earned all OVAC in hoops,

Since graduating from Ohio University with a degree in exercise science. Brinker served as a radio color analyst for Bobcats' football games, served as an assistant coach at Westerville Central and since 2010 has worked in the player personnel department with the Green Bay Packers. He received a Super Bowf ring after the Packers defeated the Steelers in 2010.

David Bertolino (Athlete - 2000s)

David Bertolino (Buckeye Local High School, Class of 2003). This Panther product was a one-sport athlete, but was one of the best wrestlers to ever grace the mats in the Ohio Vatley,

Bertolino was a four-year regular at Buckeye, but really blossomed as a junior and senior. He won the individual championship at the OVAC Tournament in both seasons.



Bertolino finished his prep career with a strong 154-22 record and was named the 2003 Eastern District Wrestler of the Year. Bertolino didn't hang up the prep singlet immedi-ately after receiving his OHSAA gold medal. He went to the National High School Senior Coaches Association Championship Tournament and placed third, earning all-American honors at 160 pounds.

Prior to bis senior season, Bertolino was the gold medalist at the National Open Wrestling Championship and then won the gold at the AAU Junior Olympics. He wrestled for four years at Iowa State University, three of those seasons were spent under Bridgeport High graduate and OVAC Hall of Pamer Bobby Douglas.

During his senior season. Bertolino earned NCAA All-American by virtue of finishing in the top eight at 197 pounds in his only trip to the national tournament. All told, Bertolino finished his collegiate career with a 68-41 record.

Following his collegiate career. Bertolino attempted to qualify to the United States Olympic Team for the 2012 games in London. He spent more than a year at the United States Olympic Training Center in Colorado training.

Karrie Hutchins (Athlete - 2000s)

Karrie Hutchins (Wheeling Park High School, Class of 2001). This former Patriot helped officially put Wheeling Park soccer on the map locally and around the state of West Virginia during her splendid prep career.

Hutchins was a defensive standout and unquestioned leader of the Lady Patriots, which resulted in her twice being named the West Virginia Gatorade Player of the Year (2000 and 2001).

With Hutchins playing a key role, the Patriots claimed three straight West Virginia Class AAA state titles and four straight big school OVAC

Along with those honors, she was a three-time first-team all-state selection and four-time all-OVAC pick. She was named OVAC Player of the Year as a junior and senior, Hutchins was inducted to the Wheeling Park High School Hall of Fame in 2007.

After her prep career. Hutching haved at West Virginia University where she became the first Mountain State native to start for the Mountaineers' women's program.

Hutchins started 45 of 49 career matches as a defensive player and during her career, the

Mountaineers posted 30 shutouts. During the 2003 season, with Hutchins playing a key role, the Mountaineers advanced to the Sweet 16 in the NCAA Tournament. The season prior, WVU was the Big East Mid-Atlantic champion.

She was named a team captain for the 2005 season, but her career came to an end due to injury in the second match of that season.

Hutchins was also a standout in the classroom at Park and WVU. She was presented the Red Brown Cup in 2006, which goes to WVU's most outstanding all-around student-athlete in terms of athletic, academic and civic achievement. She also earned CoSIDA Academic All-District team in 2005 as well as the WVU Foundation Outstanding Senior and was a four-time Big East academic all-star.

Hutchins graduated with a degree in business administration and completed a Master of Professional Accountancy at WVU.

Eddie Drummond (Athlete - 1990s)

Eddie Drummond (The Linsly School, Class of 1998). Speed was the name of the game for this former Cadet, Nittany Lion and NFL Pro Bowler, Drummond was one of the fastest athletes to ever participate in the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference

Myers also has worked with the OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Tournament in various capaci-ties since 1980; assisted with the OVAC Banquet of Champions for the past 20 years and the OVAC Hall of Fame Banquet for 12 years; and has served on the OVAC Museum Committee since its inception in 2009.

Myers has also assisted with the VIP hospitality for the West Virginia "Super Six" Football

Myers has also assisted with the VIP nospitality for the west Virginia Super Six Football Championships in Wheeling for the past 21 years. George Kellas II (Media)

George M. Kellas II (Triadelphia High School, Class of 1973). A some-times controversial but always passionate broadcaster, Kellas simply loved the Ohio Valley sports scene, especially high school athletics, and could be found front-and-center as area teams made their way along the football or basketball tournament trail for nearly 30 years.



After getting his feet wet on the radio as far back as 1977 and graduat-ing from West Liberty State College in 1980. Kellas spent 12 years at WTRF-TV7 in Wheeling (1984-94) and then eight years at WTOV-TV9 in State State

Steubenville, both as a sports anchor and commentator. Later in his career, he co-founded radio station WKKX-AM 1600 and hosted The George Kellas Radio Talk Show from the station's inception in 2004 until he died of cancer in 2009 at the age of 53.

Kellas was a staunch supporter of the Pittsburgh professional sports teams, particularly the Steelers and the Pirates. In 1997, he began writing the Black and Gold Newsletter, a monthly publication dedicated to coverage of the Steelers which was available throughout the Ohio Valley.

valley. Among his passions was greyhound racing at Wheeling Downs (now Wheeling Island Racetrack). In 1985, he won the O.P. Smith Award for a story on My Tipper, the winner of the 1984 Commissioners Cup at Wheeling Downs, and a stakes race at the track was named in his honor after his passing: The George Kellas Memorial. He was the founder, co-owner and general manager of the valley's first professional indoor football team, the Steel Valley Smash, in 1999. The team later became the Ohio Valley Greyhounds and captured the National Indoor Football League championship in 2002 and 2003.

Rod Johnson (Coach)

Rod Johnson (Gahanna Lincoln High School, Class of 1965). He was a pioneer locally in the sport of high school volleyball, serving as a head coach for a total of 21 years, including 14 years where he built the Buckeye Trail High for a total of 21 years, including 14 years where he oblit the Buckeye Hart man program into a respected state power and then closing out his career with a seven-year run where he injected life into a dormant Cambridge High program. Johnson's combined record was an impressive 400-109 combined record, which ranks 26th on the all-time Ohio High School Athletic Association's victory list. During his 14 years as Trail's volleyball coach, the team amassed an incredible



294-47 record, winning at least 22 games in each of the last 11 seasons. During this tenure, the Lady Warriors won four OVAC titles, eight district crowns and three regional championships. He was named Ohio High School Volleyball Coaches Association Class AA "Coach of the Year" in 1989 and he won the OVAC "Coach of the Year" award in 1986. He was also inducted into the Buckeye Trail/East Guernsey Athletic Hall of Fame in 1999 and is the OVAC's first selection in the Coaches category who piloded a girls' sport. Johnson stepped back into the coaching ranks in 2005, this time at Cambridge. Starting from the ground up, the Lady Bobcats went 6-18 his first year but that was the only losing season under Johnson. During his seven years. CHS posted a 106-62 mark. The best season came in 2009 when the Lady 'Cats were 22-4 and won OVAC. sectional and district championships before losing in the OHSAA Division II Regional semifinals. Cambridge put together an OVAC "threepeat" by also winning conference championships in 2010 and 2011, with overall records of 19-5 and 18-6, respec-tively. The Lady Cats were also East Central Ohio League runners-up four times under Johnson's watch. He was tabbed OVAC and District 12 Division II "Coach of the Year" in 2009 and 2010.

Duane Powell (Official)

Duane "Dibby" Powell (Bellaire High School, Class of 1952) is regarded among the best officials by area coaches as well as his peers, spending 25 years making the calls in both football and basketball.

He began officiating both sports in 1971 as a member of both the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Football Officials and the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials (he received a lifetime membership to both

Organizations). During his career, he worked several OHSAA football playoff games

During his career, he worked several OHSAA football playoff games and basketball tournament games and also officiated countless small col-lege football games in the West Virginia Conference. If the was the honorary official at the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game; received the OVAC Robert Dawson Basketball Officials Award in 2000 and received a Meritorious Award from the OHSAA for outstanding service to high school anthetics as an official Powell was born in Dilles Bottom, and he was an outstanding athlete at Bellaire High. In basketball, he was regarded as one of the premier passers and playmakers in Ohio Valley history, scoring 358 points as a senior while earning all-Ohio, all-Valley and all-Eastern Ohio accolades. He also played baschall for the Bellaire Civies and as a nitebar, he signed with the

Eastern Ohio accolades. He also played baseball for the Bellaire Civics and, as a pitcher, he signed with the Pittsburgh Pirates' farm team in Brunswick, Georgia (Georgia State League) in 1954. He was inducted into the Bellaire High Wall of Fame in 1989. Powell, a veteran of the U.S. Army, worked at the Martins Ferry plant of Wheeling-Pittsbugh Steel and after retiring, he was a bus driver for the Martins Ferry City Schools. He was a member of the Purple Rider Booster Club, American Legion Post 38 and the Isometry of Lowing.

Foresters of Lansing. He passed away in 2013 at the age of 78, and in his memory Martins Ferry and Bellaire established the Duane Powell Memorial Scholarship Softball Game in 2014.

Clyde Eads (Athlete - 1950s)

As a freshman in his only season at WLS, Eads averaged 20.7 points a game to lead the Hilltoppers and became only the second West Virginia Conference player ever to earn first team All-WVC as a freshman.

Eads thus became a rare first team all-conference player in all four seasons he competed in high school and college. He's a member of the St. Clairsville High School Athletic Hall of Fame, His family settled in the Tampa, Fla,, area and he is deceased.

Rick Nau (Athlete - 1960s)

Rick Nau (Wheeling Central High School, Class of 1969), The 5-foot-10 three-year Maroon Knight guard bettered some of the Central scoring records set by OVAC Hall of Famer Dick Miller while earning every eligible all-star honor as a junior and sentor. As a sentor, he scored 556 points in 22 games for a 25.3 average to break Miller's sentor mark of 24.4 set in 1952, the year Miller was selected the state all-class Player of the Year by the WVa. Sports Writers Association. Nau's 25.3 gait was tops in the Ohio Valley largest Class AAA and led all OV players with an 83.7% free throw percentage. He was team co-captain as a senior and named the school's 1973 "Male Athlete of the Vear." As a sophomore, he helped the Motarchs advance to the NCAA Division II national title game where they finished runner-up to Evansville (Ind.). He was named to the South Atlantic Regional All-Tournament team as a senior, 113 as a junior, and 10.5 as a sophomore. Career-wise, he scored 1.028 points in 81 varsity games and disted out 423 assists, His game highs were 25 vs. Mt. St. Mary's and 24 vs. Virginia Tech and Fayetteville Curve.

Sam 'Buzz' Berry (Athlete - 1940s)

Sam "Buzz" Berry (Warwood High School, Class of 1946). He was the first five-time All-OVAC honorce in football and basketball. The Viking standout was selected to the first three All-OVAC Class A (smallest of two classes) basketball teams and the first two All-OVAC Class A football teams as an end. Warwood won five OVAC titles and four City of Wheeling crowns (six schools) in football and basketball during that period and also advanced to the W.Va. Basketball Tournament in 1945, his junior season. He was a multiple All-City honoree.



He also carned All-State honors in both sports. In the one-class basketball honors, he was a second team pick as a senior and third team as a junior. In football, he was a third team All-State end as a junior.







Brittany Hocker (Athlete - 2000s)

Brittany Hocker (Bridgeport High School, Class of 2004). The Bridgeport Bullet, as she was nicknamed during her prep track and field days, set the standard for female sprinting in the Ohio Valley and the state of Ohio.

Hocker burst onto the scene in 2001 when she won the 200 meter dash at Dayton's Welcome Stadium as a freshman. Earlier in that state meet, she finished second in the 100-meter dash.

That 100-meter race proved to be the final time she lost in that event for the remainder of her prep career. Hocker was undefeated during her sophomore, junior and senior seasons in the short sprint, Prior to the state final, she had been unblemished as a freshman, too

As a sophomore. Hocker notched her first state championship in the 100-meters, but settled for second in the 200,

Hocker was a four-time OVAC Class 1A 100-meter dash champion and three-time Class 1A 200-meter champion. Though she never ran the race in the postseason. Hocker was a three-time OVAC Class 1A 400-meter champion.

As a prep sprinter, Hocker's personal best in the 100 was 11.81 seconds. That stood as a state record in Division III until 2011. Her mark, which was set during her senior season. still stands as a state meet record.

Her 200 personal best time of 24.22 is also a state meet record. She set that in 2004 when she completed her second consecutive sprint sweep.

She completed her second consecutive sprint sweep. After high school, Hocker opted to continue her track and field career at the University of Akron where she put forth an impressive career, earning all-Mid American Conference honors. She was the MAC Indoor and Outdoor conference champion in the 200 in 2008. She set the Akron school record indoor for the 400 and placed in both the 100 and 400 in 2005. 2005 as a true freshman. As a collegiate runner, Hocker focused more on the 400 and set the Akron record for both indoor and outdoor competition with times of 54.39 (indoor) and 54.22 (outdoor).

Along with track and field, Hocker also earned letters during her high school career in basketball

Trail's 1978 squad posted a 22-1 overall record, defeating Smithville (41-38) in the Class A state semifinals before falling to Ada (51-39) in

Andy Cross (Official)

Andy Cross (Morgantown High School, Class of 1972). One of the more recognizable officials of the Ohio Valley. Cross enjoyed a remarkable career calling the action in baseball, basketball and later in volleyball. His officiating career began as a student at Bethany College when he



He earned a scholarship to Purdue University where he played both ways but was convert-ed, on offense, from end to center, A three-year letterman and two-year starter at center-line-

Habig, a second team AII-Big Ten Conference selection, played in the Senior BoxI AIL-Star game. He was drafted by the Green Bay Packers, but opted for the Canadian Football League. He played seven seasons (1958-64) as a center-linebacker with the Saskatchewan Roughriders and was a dominant player at his position. He was a CFL All-Star center in 1962, the first year this honor was awarded, and a Western Conference All-Star six times. As a linebacker, he was noted for his pass coverage and had 10 pass interceptions including six in 1963. six in 1963

Ben Wiley (Athlete - 1960s)

Ben Wiley (Powhatan High School, Class of 1963). He led his team to the school's best-ever basketball season (20-1) and only unbeaten (18-0) regular season in school history.

The 5-foot-9, 150-pound guard was a four-year player who scored near-1.500 career points for the Indians. As a senior, he averaged 28.8 points a game and was named Ohio UPI Class A Player of the Year for the team coached by Lou Blumling, later a head coach of the Wheeling Ironmen pro Control team. Wiley was a two-time All-OVAC Class A choice and tabbed co-captain as a senior and captain as a junior. The two-time All-District honoree also was a first team All-Ohio choice by both The Associated



Press and United Press International as a senior. In 1963, the Indians shared the OVAC Class A crown with Paden City and ended with a 20-1 record after howing to Strasburg, 73-61 in the Class A District Tournament.

In baseball, he was a senior regular on the second Indians' team to win an Ohto fitle. The Indians advanced to the regional tournament all four years (1960-63) during Wiley's career. The 1963 team, coached by Frank Bland, capped a 15-2 record season by winning the Ohto Class A crown with a 3-0 championship game win over Dublin after downing Spencerville. 2-1, in the semifinals,

Wiley, a senior class president and honor student, attended Gannon College in Eric, Pa., and played basketball for four years. The playmaker averaged 10,6 points as a senior with a high game of 28 points. He scored 896 points in his career and was inducted into the Gamon Sports Hall of Fame in 1986.

After graduation, he remained in the Eric area and became a civic leader who was recog nized multiple times including the naming of a public building after him. He died in 2004

Jim Woofter (Athlete - 1970s)

Jim Woofter (Oak Glen High School, Class of 1973). He earned the honor of becoming the first Golden Bear athlete to attain All-American honors, earning those plaudits for his grid greatness at linebacker, center

and fullback. The 6-2, 225-pounder was a two-time first-team all-state, all-OVAC and all-Valley honorce. As a senior, he was captain of the all-Valley "Big School" defensive team and runner-up for the Hunt Award, emblematic of the state's top lineman,

As a senior, he recorded 126 tackles, 49 assists, five fumble recoveries and forced six fumbles in helping the Golden Bears to a 7-3 record. The tenacious defender registered 86 solo tackles, 46 assists, eight tackles for losses, three fumble recoveries and four interceptions as a junior.

Woofter's sparkling football exploits earned him All-American honors from Coach & Athlete and Scholastic Coach magazines.

His prep football success attracted recruiters from all the major schools, and Woofter opted for the University of Tennessee. It proved to be a good choice as he was a three-year letterman and two-year starter at defensive tackle for the Volunteers.

His athletic success was not limited to just the gridiron. As a senior, he was state shot put champion at Oak Glen with a 52-foot, 7-inch effort, and he also won the OVAC Class AAA shot put crown. Woofter was also a force in wrestling. He was the OVAC runner-up at heavyweight as a senior.



Rob Munn (Athlete - 1960s)

Rob Munn (Bridgeport High School, Class of 1966). The three-sport standout helped the Bulldogs record their best combined football/basketball school year in history.

In football, the team captain and quarterback-defensive back led the first perfect record (9-0) in school history. Coached by Joe Ault, the Buildogs captured the OVAC Class AA title and were ranked No.5 in the final Ohio Class A poll by United Press International, Bridgeport capped the perfect season with a 22-11 win at rival Martins Ferry for only the third win in 45 series games vs. the Purple Riders.

Kim Augur (East Liverpool High School, Class of 1983). Her most impressive claim to fame is winning the OHSAA Class AAA 400 meter dash state championship as a senior in 54,87 seconds. She missed the state record by a more one-tenth of a second. Later on in that same state meet. Augur claimed the silver medal in the 200-meter dash (25,18).



This Potter track great still holds the Ohio Valley record in the 400 meters (24.56), the latter still ranking as the second-best in valley history behind the 24.22 turned in years later Bridgeport's Brittany Hocker, also an OVAC Hall of Famer.

lowed a junior season in which he scored 621 points and his 46 "treys". Powell made an immediate impact for the Shamrocks. He scored 282 points as a freshman





Region 25 championship and a spot in the state semifinals in 1994 and a career-capping 10-3 season in 2011 when BHS advanced to the D-VI, Region 23 title contest.

Caldwell was tabbed "Coach of the Year" in the Eastern District and PVC multiple times and he coached in the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game five times (1989, 1993, 2001, 2005 and 2009) with a 2-3 record in the mid-summer classic. Caldwell, who made a brief coaching return as an assistant at Shenandoah in 2014, also

assisted in basketball and track during his time at Beallsville. 

As a senior, he was unbeaten in the 440 with wins at the W.Va. Regional

and state mets-a repeat title—the one-class OVAC meet where he was top scorer, the Beliaire, Toronto, Wellsburg and Mansfield Relays, and was one of only two Ohio Valley athletes to ever win an individual

and was one or only two onto valley attricts to ever win an individual event at the most prestigious Midwest invitational meet. His 49.6 mark at Bellaire was the first Ohio Valley sub-50-second clocking, and he time and all-time best 49.1 at the W.Va, regional meet. At the one-class state meet, he repeated as 440 champion with a record 49.5 mark and also won the 220 with a record-tying 22.1 time. As a junior, he won the state 440 in 50.05 seconds.

Roger Alford (1960s Athlete)

Roger Alford (Wintersville High School, Class of 1962). He was a racial pioneer at West Virginia University and the Southern Conference after a three-sport career at old Wintersville High

Alford competed in football, basketball and track for the Golden Warriors and was labeled by Hall of Fame coach Bob Kettlewell as "one of the two best football players I coached" along with OVAC Hall of Famer Alan Jack, who later starred at Ohio State University. In football, the 5-foot-10, 225-pound tackle was All-OVAC Class AA, All-Valley "Big School" first team, and All-Eastern Ohio first team



all-class selection.

The Mountaineers broke the "color barrier" in 1962 when they recruited Alford and fullback Dick Leftridge of Hinton, W.Va., the first African Americans to wear a WVU football uniform. After playing on the freshman team, Alford lettered three varsity seasons and started the last two as an offensive guard. He was named to the 1960-69 All-Decade Team at WVU.

In 1999, he was inducted postumously into the WVU Sports Hall of Fame.

He was the fourth Alford brother to attend college and play football. His brother Bob co-captained the Kent State team in 1961. Roger earned four degrees from WVU. completing his studies for bachelor's, master's, physical therapy and dental degrees. He was a dentist in Detroit when he died in 1996.

Alford was a starter in at least three memorable WVU games - the 63-48 win over Pitt in 1965; the 28-27 upset win over No. 9 Syracuse in 1964; and the 1964 indoor Liberty Bowl game vs. Utah in Atlantic City.

Dick Tomlinson (1960s Athlete)

Dick Tomlinson (Wheeling High School, Class of 1961). He was a 6-foot-5, 210-pound three-sport standout who was a rare two-year "Big" all-class, first team All-State basketball honoree: state and OVAC track star with rare combination (shot put champion and top placer in 100-yard sprint); and football quarterback. He earned a basketball scholarship to

the University of Florida and set a school game point record. At old Wheeling High, he competed in basketball, football and track for three years and also golf as a senior.

three years and also golf as a senior. In basketball, besides being a two-time "Big" all-class and Class AAA all-stater, he was twice captain of both the OVAC largest Class AAA and the five-school All-City honor rolls. He averaged 23 points a game both as a junior and senior - the top marks in the city and OVAC Class AAA. As a senior and team captain, he led the Wildcats to sectional and regional titles and into the state tournament before bowing to Beckley Woodrow Wilson in the Class AAA semifinals. He carned All-Tournament honors. In track, the senior team captain won the state one-class shot put (51-4 1/2) and placed 4th in the 100-yard dash. He was second in the shot put as a junior. Tomlinson was All-Valley both in sprints and weights. At the OVAC meet, he won the shot

In football, the rangy quarterback was team co-captain and team MVP as a senior. He earned All-City two years and was selected captain as a senior. He rated mention on the All-OVAC and All-State Class AAA two years. As a senior, he led the Wildcats to their fourth straight City title and 6-3-1 record including an 18-14 upset of eventual state Class AAA champion Weir, the only loss for the Red Riders led by Kennedy Award winner and OVAC Hall of Famer Bob Kelley.

At the University of Florida, after playing on the freshman basketball team, he started three varsity seasons and played in 72 games with 863 points and 529 rebounds while shooting 49 2% from the floor and 73.2% at the line.

As a junior, he set Gator school records with 44 points including 19 goals in a win over Tampa. The 44-points currently ranks No. 2 all-time in school history. As a senior, he averaged 12.9 points and 7.1 rebounds.











Gary Repella (1970s Athlete)

Gary Repella (Steubenville High School, Class of 1970). He enjoyed stellar careers in basketball, baseball and football for the Big Red.

It was in hoops that led to a collegiate scholarship as Ohio State coaching legend Fred Taylor inked the talented 6-3 guard, one year after landing St. John Central star Allan Hornyak,

Repella helped lead Steubenville to a 23-1 mark as a senior as Big Red, under Hall of Fame Coach Chuck Watt, claimed the OVAC Class AAA championship. He averaged 18.1 points per game in becoming the district player of the year while being named first-team All-Ohio. Repelta was a two-time All-Valley "Big School" and All-OVAC honoree, He scored in

double figures in every game as a senior for the well-balanced Big Red. He averaged 15 points per game as a junior.

He was also a gem on the diamond, starting for three seasons. The slick-fielding second hase-nan helped Steubenville win the OVAC title in his senior season of 1968 with a 22-7-1 mark. In his final campaign, he batted .357 on the strength of 35 hits while being named first-team All-Valley. There was no All-OVAC team at that time. Repella was selected to play in the Ohio All-Star Game in Columbus, which also signi-fied All-State bonors. He was also a long to the strength of the Star field which also signi-

fiel All-State honors. He was also a key performer for the Steubenville Legion team which earned a berth in the state tournament in Athens.

Repella was a two-year starter in football at Steubenville, As a senior, he directed the 30-of 64 passes for 517 yards and five TDs that fall. After graduating from Steubenville High, Repella took his versatile talents to Columbus

to play basketball at OSU.

The NCAA had a rule in place prohibiting freshmen to play on the varsity squad, but Repella made the most of his time with the Buckeyes' frosh, leading the team with a 19.2 Repella made the most of instrime with the buckeyes trosh, leading the team with a 19.2 scoring average. A back injury slowed his sophomore campaign when he started two games and played in 15. He tallied 10 points in his first start that season against Butler, As a junior, he served as a backup to Hornyak, a three-time first-team All-Big Ten honoree. Repella became a full-time starter as a senior, and he was second on the team with 59 assists while averaging 7.6 points a game, with a high game of 19 points. He played in 23 of 24 cames and starter 19 as a two-more

of 24 games and started 19 as a two guard.

He still resides in Steubenville, serving the city for many years as law director. His daugh-ter, Liz, was a 2,000-point hoop scorer for Big Red before starring at WVU.

Chris Jones (1980s Athlete)

Chris Jones (John Marshall High School, Class of 1982), Bob Monigomery has authored a legendary career as the longtime head base-half coach at John Marshall. In his four-plus decades at the Monarch helm. he has garnered nearly 900 wins, so when he says Chris Jones is the 'best high school player I've coached,'' it has impact. The talented righthander, who also yielded a potent bat, has the stats to back up that statement.

In his three years on the Monarchs' mound, Jones recorded an amazing 30-3 pitching mark. Two of his setbacks were shutout defeats. He helped JM capture three successive OVAC 4A titles (1980-82) while compiling a brilliant 84-15-1 record.

Jones started his JM career on a high note, compiling a 9-0 pitching mark as a sophomore as Montgomery's charges won an amazing 31 of 33 starts. Jones was accorded second-team

all-Valley is honory that spring. He raised his level of play even more as a junior, dazzling both as a hurler and a hitter as JM compiled a stellar 25-4 mark. At the plate, Jones led the valley with a smoking .500 batting average, going 46-of-92 with eight doubles, six triples, three homers and 31 RBI while scor-ing 26 mms. As a nichar, he way 10 of 11 decisions, striking out 122 in 78 innings of work.

Jones was just as dominating as a senior, helping JM gamer a 28-9-1 record. He struck out 171 batters in 97 innings of work, He was 11-2 on the mound with a 1.61 ERA. He batted .393 with 44 hits and an Ohio Valley-leading eight home runs. He knocked in 37 runs and scored 32 more. He blasted six triples and two doubles. He was named co-captain of the all-Valley team while also being named first-team all-West Virginia, all-OVAC and all-Mountaineer League-Jones also sparkled on the gridiron as a senior, earning homorable mention all-OVAC honors. Scot Maffe (1980s Athlete)

Scot Maffe (Bellaire High School, Class of 1985). Be it football, basketball or baseball. Maffe delivered in quality fashion for the Big Reds. Although equally productive in all three sports, baseball was his linch-pin, After his stellar Big Reds' diamond career, he matriculated to Ohio University where he played baseball three years for the Athens-based



Bobcats, lettering twice, Maffe was a four-year letterwinner in baseball at Bellaire, earning a writed of honors after establishing a host of school records. When he completed his Big Reds' career, he owned the following baseball records: season at bats (105), career singles (85), doubles in a name (3), triples

in a game (2), RBI in a game (6), career runs (95), stolen bases in a game (4), season (33) and career (55); innings pitched season (76), career (202) and pitching wins season (12). career (26)

He was a first team all-OVAC, all District and all-Valley honoree in all three sports as a senior. He was also selected to play in all three OVAC All-Star games.

Maffe was a two-year starter at quarterback for Coach John Magistro in football. He was special mention all Ohio as a senior along with first team all Eastern District and all-OVAC



April Rotilio, St. John Central (Class of 2006) — Speed was the name of the game for this former Lady Irish track and field standout. Rotilio is one of the area's most decorated track and field competitors.

having compiled a whopping 12 medals as the OHSAA state meet The premier event in Rotlio's career was the 400 meter dash. She placed four times at the state meet, including earning gold as both a junior and senior. As a senior, she needed a furious kick in the final 100 meters to win the title in a school-record time of 56.09. Along with the two rolds. Rotilio also earned a silver in the lap dash in 2004 and a fourth place in 2003

Her speed was limited to the 400, however. She was twice a bronze medalist in the 100 meter dash and once a bronze medalist in the 200. She briefly owned the Division III state record in the 200 meter dash when she won the OVAC title in 24.87. She owns the SJC record (12.12) in the 100 meters, too.

Rotilio's third state title came when she anchored the 4x2 team in 2006.

Along with her state prowess, Rotilio set the regional record in the 400 meter dash and also won 11 OVAC event titles as she led her teams to four consecutive conference championships. The Lady Irish finished as Division III state runnerup twice during her career.

Along with the outdoor success she enjoyed, Rotilio was the 400 meter indoor state run-nerup in 2006. After her prep career, Rotilio competed at West Virginia University, earning all-American

After her prep career, Rottito competed at west Virginia University, earning all-American honors twice during the indoor campaign. She was a member of the Mountaineers' Distance Medley Relay, which achieved the honor at the nationals along with a 4×4 team that scored in the NCAA Championship Meet. As an individual with the Mountaineers, Rottilo still owns a pair of school records. She set the indoor and outdoor 400 meter dash benchmarks in 54.29 and 52.71, respectively. Rottilo also earned Academic All-American honors during her career in Morgantown.

Before concentrating fully on track at St. John, Rotilio lettered twice in basketball.



Earl Haberfield (OVAC 'Contributor')

Earl Haberfield (Wheeling Central Catholic High School, Class of 1954). He originated the OVAC Basketball Classic – the Ohio vs. West Virginia all-star game now called the OVAC Samuel A. Mumley All-Star Basketball Classic – serving as the game director for the first five years of the event and as an active committee member for several years. He was the first recipient of the Coaches Award presented at that game in 1984 – an award renamed in his honor as the OVAC Earl Haberfield



Coaches Award. Haberfield's coaching career included several stops – both inside and outside the OVAC – and concluded with 382 career victories.

He coached nine years at his alma mater - Wheeling Central - winning five W. Va. Class

He coached nune years at his aima mater – wheeling Central – winning five W. Va. Class AA Catholic Championships. In 1963, the Maroon Knights were undefeated; ranked No. 1 in the all-division W. Va. State rankings and were the OVAC AAA champions. Haberfield coached two years at Bishop Donahue, leading the Bishops to the 1969 W. Va. Class A Catholic Championship: three years at Warren Local High, named Tri-Valley Conference Coach of the Year in 1970: one year at Crooksville, leading the Ceramics to the Ohio Class A Regional; five years at Wintersville, engineering a rebuilding of that program; and two years at Meadowbrook, leading the Colts to their best two-year won/loss record up to that rout. to that point.

Outside the OVAC, he coached at Vanlue and Amherst Marion Steele. He was also the co-founder of the District 5 Basketball Coaches Associaton All-Star Game in 1978 and served as the president of District 5 that year.

Haberfield was awarded the Touchdown Club of Morgantown Certificate of Merit in 1963, '64 Haberheld was awarded the Touchdown Club of Morgantown Certificate of Mert in 1963, '64 and '69 for contributions to West Virginia athletics; was given honorary memberships to the Ohio District Basketball Coaches Associations in Districts 3, 5 and 12; received an OVAC Certificate of Recognition for Exemplary Service in 1982; received the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club of the Upper Ohio Valley's Award for Outstanding Achievement in 1993; and was a charter member of the Wheeling Central Athletic Hall of Fame in 2017. Haberfield graduated from West Liberty State College in 1958 and was inducted into the West Liberty Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996, A U.S. Navy veteran of the Korean War, he nased away in 2007.

John Simonson (Media)

John Simonson (Beallsville High School, Class of 1966). A multi-media veteran, he has worked more than three decades in both radio and television covering football and boys' basketball games as a play-by-play announcer in the OVAC

Simonson is well-known for his research and prep work regarding athletes

Simonson is well-known for his research and prep work regarding athletes and coaches prior to the broadcasts, compiling results, series records, coach-ing records, player statistics and other noteworthy information. Known as the "Ohio Valley Sports Doctor". Simonson has served as an analyst for the WTOV TV9 "Game of the Week" and contributes to that station's high school football "playoff watch". He also had a weekly sports talk show for 22 years on WWVA radio starting in 1988. While there, he canned the West Virginia Sourcester of the View award in 1907.

there, he earned the West Virginia Sportscaster of the Year award in 1997.

Simonson has provided assistance over the years to both the OHSAA and WVSSAC football playoff computer ratings' groups. He was a recipient of the East Ohio Interscholastic Athletic Administrator's Media Award.

He previously served as a voting member for the prestigious Heisman Trophy and many other awards including the Bear Bryant Coach of the Year award; basketball's Naismith and Wooden awards, and is an official donor to the Baseball Halt of Fame in Cooperstown where he has a lifetime membership,

A graduate of West Liberty State College, he served two years in the U.S. Army; was a teacher at Wheeling Park High School for 31 years (retiring in 2002); and served on the Union Local Board of Education.

Jack Berger (Coaches)

Jack Berger (Shadyside High School, Class of 1944). He founded Shadyside track in 1961 and was the architect of the OVAC's all-time championship-winning boys' track program, coaching the Tigers to their Inst seven OVAC titles (all in Class AA in a three class format) from 1968-74 which started an OVAC record streak of 13 consecutive cham-Pionships extended by his successor and former assistant Tom Vichich. He was also a co-founder of the Interstate Track League, guiding Shadyside to seven straight league titles and a record 46 consecutive dual meet victories.

Berger led Shadyside to the school's first Ohio Class A District title in 1971 and to the Shadyside Relays crowns in the first year of the event which he helped establish in 1972 and a runner-up finish in '73; two Belmont County Relays championships and runner-up fin shes in the district and regional meets.

He also coached the Tigers' football team from 1960-69, posting a 56-36-6 record Shadyside won the OVAC Class A title in 1963 with a 7-1-2 record while other top record teams under Berger included 9-1 in 1968, 8-2 in 1966 and 7-3 in 1965.

He was honored in Shadyside with "Jack Berger Day" on June 15, 1974.

Bob Montgomery (Coaches)

Bob Montgomery (Moundsville High School, Class of 1964). He was a fixture in the dugout for the Monarchs, serving 42 years as head base-ball coach and amassing an impressive record of 869-345 which ranks Second in OVAC history behind Magnolia's Dave Cisar and third in West Virginia prep history behind John Lowery of Jefferson High and Cisar, Mongomery coached teams won 24 sectional titles, made the regional

finals 13 times and reached the Class AAA State Tournament five times, highlighted by the 1985 state championship where JM beat Huntington East, 8-7, in the title game

His teams captured seven OVAC playoff championships, reaching the conference playoffs 25 times. The Monarchs also captured seven regular season crowns and five playoff titles in the Mountaineer League from 1976-86.

Montgomery, who retired following the 2017 season, coached 35 all-state players and nore than 70 who played college baseball including OVAC Hall of Famer Chris Jones, He is a member of the West Virginia Baseball Coaches Association and the American Baseball Coaches Association.

He was selected as the OVAC Baseball Coach of the Year three times and the West Virginia Coach of the Year five times. He also was honored as the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Co-Man of the Year (with Magnolia's Cisar) at the 42nd Charity Awards Banquet in 2009. Montgomery also doubled as a respected basketball and baseball official.

A member of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball official, A member of the Ohio Valley Board of Approved Basketball Officials and a two-term president, he's been a referce since 1962, working more than 3,000 games including 29 state tournaments including 20 championship games in West Virginia and five tournaments/three title games in Ohio. He also officiated collegiate hoops in the West Virginia Conference. He began umpiring American Legion baseball in 1972 and has worked five West Virginia State Tournaments while also spending 20 years (1970-90) doing NCAA Division II and West Virginia Conference games including five tournaments.

He was the first West Virginia resident inducted into the OHSAA Officials Hall of Fame in

2008; was the 1989 Official of the Year honoree by the National Federation of Interscholastic Officials Association and received the Distinguished West Virginian Award in 2012.

Mongomery, a three-sport allete (football, baseball, baseball, baseball) at Moundsville High, graduated from West Liberty State College in 1969 and obtained his master's degree in com-munications from West Virginia University in 1977.


Bob Plotz (Athlete - 1940s)

Steve Kish, Jr. (Bridgeport High School, Class of 1965). His list of assignments during a 40-year career as a wrestling official is impressive, headed by 28 OHSAA State Tournaments, five WVSSAC State Tournaments and 30 OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Tournaments He also worked the Medina Invitational 28 times and the Walsh Jesuit Tournament 20 times along with 10 Ohio Junior High School State Tournaments.

Among his awards, Kish received the prestigious OVAC 'Mr. Mat' honor in 1989; was selected Ohio Official of the Year in 1997 and 2010; OVAC Official of the Year in 1997; and West Virginia Official of the Year in 1999

He was inducted into the Ohio Wrestling Officials Hall of Fame in 1999; the Officials Hall of Fame in 1999; the Medina Invitational Hall of Fame in 2003; recently into the National Wrestline Hall of Fame/Ohio Chapter in 2014. Kish, who retired as an official in 2014 but remains active as an OHSAA observer

Since that time, he has served as Muskingum County At Risk Coordinato years, assistant principal of Zanesville High School for five years, assistant principa Muskingum High School for two years and as principal at West Muskingum Midd for two years. He retired in 2012, but spent five months as interim principal at W Elementary School in 2014,

Among his education-related offices were president of the Belmont-Harrison F Association; president of the Belmont-Harrison Superintendent's Association; memil OVAC Executive Board and a past OVAC president (1982-83 and 1983-84), memt Ohio Network; Training and Assistance for Schools and Communities (ONTASC) I Board; and president of the Ohio Valley Wrestling Officials Association.

Robert Pritchard (Athlete - 1950s)

Robert Pritchard (Wheeling High School, Class of 1953). He is, historically, among the elite wrestlers in OVAC history. He not only led Wheeling High School to the first state tone class championship for an OVAC member, in 1953, but became the first wrestler from the Ohio Wheeling High School (Weat Merce and School (School (Scho Valley and the state of West Virginia to win three state championships

As a Wildcat sophomore in 1951, he captured the state one-class 103pound state title and followed with consecutive crowns in 1952 and 1953 in the 112-pound class. In the three finals, he defeated grapplers from Grafton, Beckley Woodrow Wilson and host Parkersburg.

During that era. Wheeling High and other high school mat teams competed not only against other high schools, but against YMCA wrestling teams, Pi-nicknamed "Bull", was unbeaten as a sophomore and senior with his only loss matches to a YMCA grappler from Columbus, who he later defeated twice, He was u

against high school competitors. The Wildcats' state championship coach was Ed Murphy, assisted by OVAC Bane coach Bob Roc, the Wildcas head coach in football and track. Pritchard alse Barnesville's Jim Bradfield, who wrestled at Ohio State and led the Wheeling wrestling program, in his development along with his older brother Bill, who also a at West Virginia U.

After graduation from high school, Bob Pritchard relocated to California and e degree from the University of California-Sacramento, which didn't sponsor a w team. However, Pritchard continued to compete on the YMCA level.

Geno Sessi (Athlete - 1950s)

Geno Sessi (St. Clairsville High School, Class of 1956). He is regarded as one of the Red Devils' best-ever multi-sport athletes while competing in football and track.

In the spring sport, he was the leading scorer two straight years in the one-class OVAC Track Meet and led his team to three straight titles as part of six consecutive Red Devil crowns (1952-57) coached by Dave Porterfield, A sprinter, hurdler and relay member, Sessi led all scorers as a junior with 15 U2 points and as a serior with 14 U2 points. In football, the 5-foot-8, 174-pound two-way back and kick returner



not only set a school record with 148 points as a senior, but led the Ohio

Valley as well. That mark lasted one year when former teammate Jim Kerr scored o point (149) before the OVAC Half of Famer went on to start at Penn State and Washington Redskins.

In football. Sessi was All-OVAC largest Class AA two years, All-Valley "Big Sch captain as a senior. All-Eastern Ohio two years and All-Ohio largest Class AA seco defensive back as a senior. Ron Lee (Athlete - 1970s)

Ron Lee (Bellaire High School, Class of 1971). Lee is on the short list of outstanding running backs who have graced Nelson Field. The 6-3, 195-pounder carried the Big Reds of Jake Olsavsky to an 8-1-1 mark in his senior campaign. Bellaire finished second in the OVAC 3A title chase, trailing Wintersville. The teams tied 0-0 in regular-season play. The Big Reds finished No. 19 in the UPI Class AAA poll, the largest classification in the state. tion in the state.

Lee rushed for 989 yards and 16 TDs that fall. His 108 points led the OVAC 3A in scoring. He also landed 10 passes. Those numbers earned Lee first-team All-Valley and All-OVAC plaudits while being named second team All-Ohio by UPI. He also played in the Ohio North-South All-Star Game.

Lee was also a three-year letterman in basketball and he was voted the Big Reds' top athlete as a senior.

Lee's prep heroics earned him a grid scholarship to WVU. He chose the Mountaineers over a slew of D-I offers. Freshmen were not eligible to play in those days. Lee, however, enjoyed a strong campaign with the Mountaineers' frosh squad, leading the team with 372 yards on 97 carries in five games.

As a sophomore, Lee moved into the No. 2 fullback slot, rushing for 304 yards and three TDs on 76 carries. His toughness was matched by his versatility, resulting in him being utilized as fullback and tailback his final two seasons.

Lee was the team's second leading rusher both of those campaigns, gaining 543 yards as a junior and 623 stripes as a senior, while also leading the team with 10 TDs. A member of two WVU Peach Bowl teams, he was selected as No. 74 on the list of top 100 all-time WVU football players in the WVU Athletic Department Book, "Saturday Snapshots," published in 2015.

His success at Morgantown resulted in Lee being chosen in the third round of the NFL Draft by the Baltimore Colts. He played in 42 games, starting eight. He ended his Colts' career with 940 yards on 206 carries.

Georgia Dawson (Athlete - 1980s)

Georgia Dawson (Bellaire High School, Class of 1984). Dawson was a tremendous three-sport standout for the Big Reds, excelling in basketball, volleyball and track & field. She achieved a rarity in the realm of Bellaire athletics, becoming a four-

year letter-winner in basketball, surpassing the 1,000-point plateau while also grabbing more than 1,000 rebounds. Dawson, who served as hoop captain as both a junior and senior, was a three-time all-OVAC selection while making the All-Valley first-team as a senior. Dawson was named a two-time All-District 12 basketball honoree and was a special mention all-Ohio choice as a senior.



Dawson was just as dominant in volleyball. The three-year letterwinner served as the team captain in her final two seasons, garnering first-team all-OVAC honors as a junior and senior. Dawson was also a three-year standout in track for the Big Reds. In all, she finished her illustrious prep career with 10 letters.



Dawson was inducted into both the Bellaire High and the West Liberty halls of fame. She was honored by the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan in 1988 and inducted into the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2017.

Ron Stephens (Athlete - 1980s)

Ron Stephens (The Linsly School, Class of 1985). He is remembered as one of the greatest baseball players in Linsly history, but the 6-4, 185-pounder was also a gifted gridder and hoopster for the Cadets. He was twice tabbed Linsly's baseball MVP. The talented shortsop was



captain of the All-State Class A team as a senior while being an All-Valley first-team honoree as both a junior and senior. Stephens batted a robust .403 as a senior with 11 doubles. 29 runs soared and a school record 28 stolen bases. That same season, he was a sparkling 5-1 on the mound with a 1.65 ERA, helping the Cadets win the OVAC Class 2A crown and script a 20-8 record. Stephens batted .349 as a sophomore and he hit at a .345 clip as a junior with a pair of grand slams. The versatile performer was a two-time first team Eastern Ohio Baseball League selection, earning player of the vers thorars as a senior of the year honors as a senior.

On the gridiron, the wide receiver/defensive back/kick returner was so dynamic that he received scholarship offers from many D-I schools, including WVU and Pitt. He set an Ohio Valley record with 61 catches in 10 games, a mark that has since been erased. Stephens was a three-year starter in football for the Cadets. He was a first-team All-State. All-Valley and All-OVAC honoree as a senior.

He was no slouch in basketball either, earning first-team All-OVAC and second-team All-Valley honors as a senior after leading the Cadets in scoring and rebounding. He was third-team All-Valley as a junior.

Stephens was drafted out of high school by the Boston Red Sox in the 13th round (413th overall). He opted, however, to go the collegiate ranks and accepted a baseball scholarship to the University of Circinnati, At UC, he was utilized as an infielder, but his meal ticket was on the mound. He was 6-5 as a junior, leading the Bearcats in strikeouts and a 3.84 ERA. He was selected by the Chicago White Sox in the 58th round after his junior campaign and plued in the minor the many first energy of the second strike the second stri played in the minor leagues for five seasons, advancing to the AAA level with the Vancouver White Sox of the Pacific Coast League. Eric McGhee (Athlete - 1990s)

Eric McGhee (Wheeling Central Iligh School, Class of 1991). There have been a lot of football standouts come through the Maroon Knights' program and this multiple-time all-state selection is right near the top of the list

Actually, McGhee was a standout in three sports during his time at Central, but it was on the football field where he left his biggest mark. Unginia's top prep player, as a senior. McGiliee rushed for a modern Ohio Valley record of 2,479 yards on 307 carries in 12 games while seoring 30 touchdowns. As a junior, McGhee finished second which was the best in the Mountain State mat season. As a jumor, McOnee thisned second in the Kennedy Award balloting after leading the Ohio Valley in rushing. He accumulated 1.565 yards on 201 carries. He scored 28 touchdowns on the ground and 172 total points to lead the state. Along with his all-state and Kennedy Awards, McGhee was also recognized as the Gatorade Player of the Year, Morgantown Touchdown Club Player of the Year, all-USA Today team and the Touchdown Club of Atlanta also recognized McGhee's efforts. Locally, the awards were obviously plentiful, too. He was twice named captain of the all-Valley Small-School team and he was captain of the all-OVAC Class AA team. After his prep carcer, McGhee accepted an offer to attend Bowling Green State University.

He played two years and served primarily as a kick returner. He was a part of the Falcons' 1992 team which finished 10-2 and won the Las Vegas Bowl. He led the team in kickoff returns with 14 for 269 yards that season, including 125 yards against Wisconsin. He played two seasons of

professional football for the Steel Valley Smash. Along with his football exploits, McGhee was part of the Maroon Knights' 1990 Class AA state championship basketball team. He was also the OVAC Class AA baseball player of the year after serving as the Knights' lead-off hitter.

Adam Hoppel (Athlete - 2000s)

Adam Hoppel (Beaver Local High School, Class of 2004). Whether it was on the football field or the wrestling mat, this talented athlete shined brightly during all four years of his prep career. In football, Hoppel was a four-year mainstay for Coach Rich Wright's

Kelly Shields (Edison High School, Class of 1993). This former Wildest made a decision to focus on the sport of wrestling as a youngster, and it was a decision that paid the ultimate dividends.

A four-year mainstay for the Wildeats, Shields helped to put Edison on the map at the state level through his exploits on the mat during his career

the map at the state level through his exploits on the mat during his career which saw him rack up 137 career wins. Shields is one of just hine OVAC wrestlers to win four championships at the OVAC Ron Mauek Wrestling Tournament. He won the 1990 and the 1991 crowns at 103 pounds; bumped up a class to 112 in 1992 and then captured his fourth title at 119 as a senior. Shields put forth a brilliant career at the state level, too, becoming a constant at the Center on the campus of Wright State University.

Shields won the district championship as a freshman, sophomore and senior. Upon graduation, Shields enrolled at Kent State University with intentions of con-

his wrestling career, however he suffered a knee injury which led to the end of com wrestling. Shields' abilities also carned a spot on Team Ohio, which allowed him to t places such as Hawaii, Australia and New Zealand in the summer of 1992.

Zach Collaros (Athlete - 2000s)

Zach Collaros (Steubenville High School, Class of 2007). Eligible for induction for the first time, this former Big Red multi-sport standout was a no-brainer.

During his prop career, it didn't matter the sport that Collaros played, He simply shined in them all, earning four letters in basketball, baseball and football. However, it was on the football field for Coach Reno Saccoccia's team where Collaros made arguably his biggest impact.

Collaros was a three-year starter at quarterback and amassed an incred-ible 41-1 record while helping to lead Big Red to back-to-back 15-0 state championship in 2005 and 2006. During those seasons, he broke every Steubenville passing record.

Steubenville passing record, As a senior, en route to first-team all-Ohio and state player of the year honors in E. IL. Collaros passed for 2.550 yards and 30 touchdowns against just four interceptic also rushed for 15 touchdowns and 720 yards. All told, he passed for 4,306 yards touchdowns, while running for 1,304 yards and 25 touchdowns. Collaros wasn't a one-way player, either. He shined at defensive back, recorc interceptions. He ran six of those back for touchdowns, while also recovering five t and computing twice.



Circosta achieved both, coaching a total of 50 years including 47 as a head coach and amassing a superb record of 336-144-5 -- second only to Steubenville Big Red boss Reno Saccoccia in Ohio Valley history and ranking in the top 10 all-time in the state of Ohio The Monroe County legend began his coaching career in 1968, serving as an assistant three years at Woodsfield under former Ohio State University standout Bob Butts. When wret hed foel Union local Circosta took over to begin a 47-year bead coaching un the first

butts left for Union Local, Circosta took over to begin a 47-year head coaching run, the first

butts left for Union Local, Circosta took over to begin a 47-year head coaching run, the first 23 seasons at Woodsfield and then, following consolidation, for 24 years at Monroe Central. Circosta-coached teams enjoyed six undefeated regular seasons (1973, '76, '91, '93, '99 and 2002); captured 14 OVAC championships (nine at Woodsfield; five at Monroe Central) and earned 14 OHSAA playoff appearances (five at Woodsfield; five at Monroe Central). Woodsfield was crowned the 1976 Class A state champions by The Associated Press and Monroe Central won the Division V, Region 19 championship in 2001 before failing to Bedford Chanel in the state semifinals.

He coached in the OVAC Rudy Mumley All-Star Football Game four times (1974, '77,

He coached in the OVAC Rudy Mumiley All-Star Football Game four times (1974, 77, '81 & 2000) with a 2-2 record and he coached in the BACF All-Star Game once. Circosta also coached baseball for 14 years with nearly 150 victories. He was previously inducted into the West Liberty University Athletic Hall of Fame (1996) and the Ohio High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame. He was named the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Club's "Man of the Year" in 2005 and was named Eastern District and Pioneer Valley Conference "Coach of the Year" numerous times. The road through Memorial Park in Woodsfield is named "Jay Circosta Boulevard" and the "Jay Circosta Fieldhours' is name of the athletic facilities

Fieldhouse" is part of the athletic facilities. He received an A.B. in Secondary Education (P.E. Health, Speech and Driver Education) from West Liberty where he played both football and baseball and an M.S.in Education in Guidance and Counseling from the University of Dayton.

Chet Daniels (Athlete - 1940s)



Chet Daniels (Bellaire High School, Class of 1947). He earned seven varsity Big Reds' letters — three each in football and basketball plus one in track

He earned about every major football honor as a center in football his final years — a two-time All-OVAC largest Class AA, two-time Al-Eastern Ohio, and second team All-Ohio as a senior and third team All-Ohio as a junior in the one-class Associated Press selections. He was team Meet Valueble Blaster and team contained on the 1 second 1045 team Most Valuable Player and team captain on the 9-1-1 record 1946 team which won the OVAC championship. He was selected on Ohio's South All-Star team.

South All-Star team. He earned a football scholarship to the University of Oregon, where he excelled for four years — one year on the freshman team and three varsity letters as a two-way guard. The 1948 Oregon team went 9-1 overall and 7-0 in Pacific Coast Conference play and accepted an invitation to play Doak Walker-led Southern Methodist University in the 1949 Cotton Bowl. The Ducks bowed, 21-13 in the game with Daniels, an All-Pacific Coast Conference selection, kicking the extra-point in the fourth quarter. George Deiderich (Athlete - 1950s)

George Deiderich (Toronto High School, Class of 1954). He was a nine-letter, four-year performer in football, basketball and track for the Red Knights

A teammate of OVAC Hall of Famer Don Sutherin, they served as football team co-captains and also were starting guards on a 17-2 record basketball squad, the best record at the school in 17 years. In track, Deiderich was in a class by himself. He was the leading scorer

In fack, Denerich was in a class by hintself. He was the leading scorer two straight years in the one-class OVAC Track Meet, scoring 16 points as a junior and 16 1/2 points as senior with first-place finishes in the high and low hurdles, second in the shot put and running a leg on the winning shuttle hurdle team. In Ohio's largest Class A state meet, he placed third in the 120-yard high hurdles. After a year at Valley Forge Military Academy in Wayne, Pa., where he played foothall, he earned a scholarship to Vanderbilt University where he starred in football and track. A three-year football letterman he was a two-year starter at upard on offense and defines and three-year football letterman, he was a two-year starter at guard on offense and defense and was a two-time first team All-Southeastern Conference selection while becoming a rare consensus first team All-America selection in 1958. The 11-player A-A honor roll included two Heisman Trophy winners in Peter Davkins of Navy and Billy Cannon of LSU. The 6-foot-1, 200-pound Deiderich also started in track as he broke the school record with

a 14.46 second clocking in the 120-yard high hurdles.

He was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in the 23rd round of the NFL Draft but opted to sign with the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League. He played in 19 games in three CFL seasons — 2-1/2 with Montreal before finishing up with the Ottawa Roughriders. He had a 52-yard interception return for a touchdown in 1960. He died in 1999.

Bob DiStefano (Athlete - 1960s)

Bob DiStefano (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1964). A four-sport performer, this Purple Rider is best known for three starting years in foot-ball plus baseball and track as well as four years of basketball.

He was the starting quarterback as a junior and sector after starting at halback on a 10-0 record, state-ranked and OVAC Class AAA champion

The team co-captain, who was also a standout defensive back, earned first team earned All-Ohio from both The Associated Press and United Press International at quarterback as welf as All-OVAC Class 3A and All-Eastern Ohio honors. He was selected Ohio Class AA "Back of the Year" and also gained national attention as a Scholastic Coach All-America selection. In the committee area of the season. the opening game of the season, Ferry defeated Canton McKinley, 20-8, and the only blemish on the record was a 14-14 tie at New Philadelphia.

The 6-foot, 180-pounder, who carried first team All-Valley "Big School" as a senior, passed for 1,240 yards and rushed for 500 yards while scoring 66 points. He also landed four passes for 41 yards.

Ferry went 7-3-1 in his junior season as he earned second team All-Valley "Big School" and first team All-Eastern Ohio,

In basketball, DiStefano played guard and was the team's second leading scorer.

He earned a football scholarship to Purdue University where he was the starting quarterback on the freshman team in an era of three-year varsity teams. He is deceased,

Jeff Patterson (Athlete - 1970s)

Jeff Patterson (Brooke High School, Class of 1979). Patterson was one of the finest performers ever in the tradition-rich Brooke football history, starring as as a big-play wide receiver for legendary coach Paul "Bud" Billiard

Patterson's exploits helped to lead the Bruins to their first playoff berth in 1978. He landed 22 passes for 501 yards and eight TDs that fall. He earned second-team all-state honors to go with first-team recognition on the all-OVAC, all-Valley (serving as co-captain) and all-Mountaineer squads.

Moreover, the glue-fingered wideout was chosen to play in the OVAC Rudy Mamley All-Star Football Game. He was also awarded the Clark Hinkle Scholarship. Patterson also enjoyed a banner junior grid campaign. He caught 36 passes for 686 vards for eight TDs while also returning a punt for a six-pointer. The versatile performer was accorded first-team all-state honors for his efforts that fall. He was also named to the first team of the all-OVAC, all-Valley and all-Moontaineer League squads.

Patterson was also a two-year letterman in basketball for the Bruins. He helped Brooke to a 15-win campaign and a sectional crown his senior year.

The talented guard averaged 14.2 ppg that winter, earning him third-team all-Valley lau-rels. He was also chosen to play in the OVAC Sam Mumley Basketball Classic. Football earned Patterson a scholarship to Youngstown State, but he was just as excellent



T2th in career receiving yards. His college production spawned a professional grid career in the Canadian Football League. He played four seasons with Montreal and was named the Alouettes' Rookie of the Year in 1983, Patterson had 76 career catches with Montreal for 980 yards and seven TDs. Patterson ended his pro career with Saskatchewan, leading the Eastern Conference in punt return average.

Pete Gongola (Athlete - 1950s)

Pete Gongola (Benwood Union High School, Class of 1954). He was an honored three-sport fronmen athlete and the most acclaimed of the 12 Gongola brothers who played sports for the old Marshall County school.





In football, he was a two-way standout end and kneer who earned first team All-OVAC Class A, first team All-Valley "Big School" co-captain, and first team largest class All-State. He led the Ohio Valley with 9 TD catches as a senior and, along with 13 PAT kicks and 67 points, second in OV Class A. Leon Jenkins (Athlete - 1960s)

Rider letterman in football, baseball and baskeball, he led football teams to 8-2 and 1-3 records his last two years at quarterback. As a senior, Jenkins recorded nearly 1,500 all-purpose yards in 10 games, rushing 109 times for 825 yards and 15 TDs; scoring 103 points; and completing 27 of 65 passes for 525 yards and four TDs. He also played defensive back and returned kicks. In a season opening 26-19 win over Follansbee, he tied a school record with four TDs, including runs of 86 and 75 yards, while rushing for 225 yards. II rushed for 154 yards in a loss to Steubenville, then ranked No. 1 in Ohio, and he had a 94-yard quarterback TD in a 4-28 win at Moundsville.

Carcer-wise, he scored 182 points (28 TDs), which was then No, 2 in the Weir books. He also rushed for 1,436 yards, possibly the Ohio Valley record for a quar at the time

As a senior, he earned first team All-Valley "Big School", All-OVAC Class AA Mountaineer League and third team All-State

Jenkins was a standout baseball outfielder and was a first team, 20-player all-cle Valley choice in the first selections by The Intelligencer. He batted over .300 and wa as a top defensive player. The 5-foot-11, 165-pounder earned a football scholarship to West Virginia Uni

returner for three seasons with two TD returns. He was drafted in the 16th round by the Detroit Lions and played four games in He also played one season (1975) for the Shreveport (La.) Steamers in the World F League. In 12 games, he had six pass interceptions and returned punts and kickoffs.

Ron Sismondo (Athlete - 1970s)

Ron Sismondo (Mingo High School, Class of 1978). Sismondo was one of the linest hurle's ever to grace the mound in Ohio Valley his-tory. In addition, he was also a sparkling quarterback for the Indians, Sismondo's pitching provess was so superh that he earned a scholarship to the University of Arizona, where he became the only OVAC product to play for an NCAA Baseball World Series champion when the Wildeats turned the trick in 1980



The crafty southpaw was a two-time All-Valley and All-OVAC baseball honoree.

Sismondo authored a 7-2 mound mark as a senior for an 11-9 Mingo squad, with his two blemishes being a 1-0 loss to Jewett-Scio. He yielded only two hits in that championship setback

Sismondo struck out 93 batters in just 53 innings of work that spring while comp miniscule 0.38 URA.

He was also dominant during his junior campaign, leading the Ohio Valley in stri that spring, faming 94 batters in 50 innings to go with a 1,01 HRA. He had a 5-2 m the 8-8 Indians.

He was also lethal with the bat, finishing third in the Ohio Valley via his 500 I average (29-ol-58). He had six doubles, one triple and one home run.

When he finished his career, he ranked second in OSU history with 189 starts. his playing days behind him, Engle entered coaching. He coached at Ohio Valley ity, where he finished his Master's Degree, Elon University and Marietta College. rrently the baseball coach at Meadowbrook High School.

Mike Gulan (Athlete - 1980s)

Mike Gulan (Steubenville Catholic High School, Class of 1989). Gulan was a three-sport star at Catholic Central, but baseball proved to be his future calling card.

He was first-team All-Valley, All-OVAC Class AAA and All-Eastern District his senior season in baseball, a campaign in which he batted 452 with five home runs, seven doubles, 25 hits, 15 RBI and 18 stolen bases in 19 attempts. The talented third baseman was named second team All-Valley as a junior.

In football, he was a second-team All-Valley honoree as a senior and earned honorable mention All-OVAC Class AAA in basketball.

His sparkling prep diamond career earned him a scholarship to Kent State University, His sparking prep diamond career earned him a scholarship to Kent State University, where he excelled for three seasons before being selected in the second round of the Major League Draft (53rd overall pick) by the St. Louis Cardinals. Gulan was named Mid-American Conference Player of the Year and second team All-America. He was first-team All-MAC as a junior and second team as a sophomore. As a Golden Flash junior, Gulan led the MAC in hitting (.430), home runs (17), RBI (68) and triples (6). As a sophomore, he batted .311 with 11 homers. He batted .336 as a

freshman.

Gulan was one of 90 players in the nation invited to the U.S. Olympic team tryouts in 1992. He was inducted into the Kent State Hall of Fame in 1999. Gulan enjoyed a 13-year career (two in majors, part of 12 in the minors and one in Japan) from 1992-2004. He was a member of the Cardinals' major league club in 1997 and the Florida Marlins in 2001 and also signed with the Pirates in 2002 and White Sox in 2003. He was also was a Steubenville American Legion Post 33 baseball standout.

Scott Coyne (Athlete - 1990s)

Scott Cayne (Bellaire High School, Class of 1994). This former Big Reds' point guard was a wizard with the ball in his hands for OVAC Hall of Fame coach Gene Ammirante during his prep career.

of Fame coach Gene Ammirante during his prep career, While it was in basketball where Coyne achieved some of his greatest moments, his success wasn't limited there. He was a three-sport standout for the Big Reds, shining in track and football as well, Coyne finished his prep career with 1.051 points, including a 19.1

points per game average as a senior. He did more than score the ball. He source the stat sheet to a tune of nine assists and seven rebounds a game as he led the Big Reds to their first undefeated regular season and an eventual 21-1 record.

During his junior season, Coyne averaged 20.4 points a game. He netted his career high of 43 points that season against St. Clairsville. The Big Reds finished 17-4 and won the OVAC that season

Coyne ranks in the top 10 in numerous Bellaire categories, including 3-point shooting (44 percent), free-throw percentage (77 percent), steals (141) and his points are the 15th best.

Coyne earned all-everything as a senior. He was all-Eastern District, District 12, OVAC and all-Valley and was named to the McDonald's All-American and Street and Smith's All-American honorable mention lists. He was also named one of the top 25 players in Ohio by

American nonorable mention lists, rice was also named one of the top 25 players in Ohlo by USA Today and played in the Ohlo North-South All-Star Game. As a wide receiver, Coyne was the go-to guy for the Big Reds during his three-year career. He finished with 1,764 yards. Included was a 1993 campaign in which he caught 61 passes for 967 yards, which ranks seventh in BHS history. Coyne was named to the all-Ohlo first team. He was also named an II-OVAC and all-Eastern District.

team. He was also named all-OVAC and all-Eastern District. On the track, Coyne qualified for the state track and field championship meet twice in the 300 intermediate hurdles. He was a multiple-time OVAC placer in that event as well as running key legs on relay teams for the Big Reds. He died tragically in a plane crash in 2002 at just 26 years old. At the time of his death, he was one of the area's rising basketball officials. Covne was inducted to the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2015. The Scott Coyne Memorial Scholarship exists at Bellaire High School to honor his legacy.

Liz Repella (Athlete - 2000s)

Liz Repella (Steubenville High School, Class of 2007). Whether it was at Big Red or West Virginia University, this standout basketball player simply scored the ball.

The multi-talented combo guard earned all-Ohio honors four times during her prep career. She was named first-team as both a junior and senior. Repella was named the state's player of the year, averaging 26.9 points a game as a senior

She was named to the third team as a freshman and second team as a

sophomore She is the all-time leading scorer in Steubenville history -- regardless of gender -- with 2,065 points.

Along with her state accolades, she was named all-OVAC four times and first-team all-Eastern District four times, garnering player of the year as a junior and senior. Repella, who was also a multi-year letter winner in soccer, was ranked the 63rd best

player in her class as a senior, which garnered several Division I offers. She eventually settled on becoming a Mountaineer.

At WVU, Repella lettered four years and scored 1,612 points, grabbed 712 rebounds. She also collected 207 steals, passed out 162 assists and blocked 76 shots.

She was named first-team all-Big East as a junior and senior and was just the second WVU female to gamer first-team honors in back-to-back seasons. Repella was an honorable mention all-American after her senior season in which she

helped lead West Virginia to a 24-10 record and a second-round NCAA Tourney appearance.

During her final season in Morgantown, Repella led the team in 12 statistical categories. All told, she played in 134 games, which is the most in WVU history, and she was part of 96 victories. Her college point total was seventh best in WVU history at the time of her

graduation.

Away from athletics, Repella was a standout student. She graduated with a degree in exer-cise physiology and a GPA of 3.96. She was a representative on the WVU Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. She also received the Big East Scholar Athlete Sports Excellence Award and was an Academic All-American.

Rich Wilinski (OVAC 'Contributor')

Rich Wilinski (Follansbee High School, Class of 1955). He enjoyed an outstanding 56-year career in education and has worn many hats including coach, administrator and television analyst for local high school football.



Wilinski was a head football coach for 19 years at four schools from 1965-85 with a combined record of 121-56-9. His first assignment was at Wayne (1966-67) which merged into Wintersville (he was an assistant

to Bob Kettlewell in 1968-69); then to Toronto (1970-76), Steubenville Catholic (1977-84) and Buckeye South (1985).

His 1974 team at Toronto became the school's second unbeaten team and Wilinski was selected the OVAC Coach of the Year and the first recipient of the Dapper Dan Club's Robert McKelvey Memorial Award. His is also a member of the Ohio Valley Football Coaches Hall of Fame.

Wilinski began his career as the basketball coach during the final three seasons (1962-64) of Follansbee St. Anthony, winning the W. Va. Catholic Tournament Class A crown in his first season. He also coached boys' basketball at Wayne for three years and had a combined 52-9 record with one Class A Sectional title.

He has been a TV analyst for Ohio Valley high school football games for WTOV-TV9 for nearly three decades.

As an athlete, Wilinski was a three-sport regular (football/basketball/baseball) at Follansbee, played on the Blue Wave's unbeaten state championship team in 1954, setting up a TD with an interception and kicking the game-winning extra point in a 7-6 victory over Barboursville to snap that school's 28-game winning streak. He was named first team all-W. Va. Class A, all-OVAC and all-Valley "Big School,"

Wilinski attend the University of Florida on a football grant, but returned home and played at West Liberty State College

Kim Clifford (Coach)

Kim Clifford (Bellaire High School, Class of 1972). Clifford cut his coaching teeth as an assistant at Bellaire under Mark Matz and Gene Ammirante before taking the head coaching position at Cadiz where he spent six years and posted a 90-48 record and won the OVAC Class AA championship in 1986.



He then moved on to St. Clairsville where he spent the next 27 seasons (1991-2018), amassing a 372-234 record to boost his career total to 461-282 over 33 years as a head coach.

At St. C., Clifford led the Red Devils to two OVAC crowns (2012 and 2013) and six Buckeye 8 titles; eight sectional championships, two district championships (2012 and 2013) and one regional title (2012) to earn the school's only OHSAA "Final Four" berth (St. C. lost to Elida, 61-27, in the Division II State Semifinals).

In addition to receiving several East District and District 12 honors, Clifford coached in the OHSBCA North-South All-Star Game in 2000; was named the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Association Coach of the Year in 2008; was a finalist for the OVAC Coach of the Year award in 2012 and 2013. He also served as president of the District 12 Basketball Coaches Association.

He received the OHSBCA's Bob Arnzen Award, given to a coach who devoted 20 consecutive years or more of service to the same school and for their loyalty and commitment to basketball, in 2014; and was inducted into the St. Clairsville High School Athletic Hall of Fame in 2019 and the District 12 Basketbacll Coaches Hall of Fame in 2021.

Clifford is a 1972 graduate of Bellaire High School where he was captain of the basketball team and played in the OVAC All-Star Basketball Classic. He attended Urbana University and graduated from West Liberty State College, earning master's degree from West Virginia University.

In addition to coaching basketball, he also spent time as the head track coach and as an assistant

Robert 'Bubba' Kapral (St. John Central High School, Class of 1974). What Kapral accomplished in one sport was enough to land him in the "Hall," but he doubled down by getting it done in two sports as a highly-successful track and basketball coach.



In track, Kaprał led St. John's to the pinnacle on the girls' side not once, but twice by winning the OHSAA Division III State Championship (2007/2008) on the heels of back-to-back runner-up fintshes the two previous years (2005/2006). Dr. William 'Bill' Welker (Official)

Dr. William 'Bill' Welker (Shamokin (Pa.) High School, Class of 1965). No one has been involved as an official or promoted the sport of wrestling not only in the conference, but far beyond, more than the "doctor".

Welker officiated in the OVAC Ron Mauck Wrestling Tournament from 1980-91 and served as the rules interpreter from 1992-2017. He was also the OVAC Tournament's souvenir program coordinator and editor for 18 years (1979-96).

He received the OVAC's prestigious "Mr. Mat" award in 1991 and was tabbed the OVAC Wrestling Official of the Year in 2003.

Welker was the West Virginia Wrestling rules interpreter, clinician and supervisor of officials at the state tournament from 1989-2017 and the NFHS National Wrestling Rules Committee from 2012-2015.

He received the 2001 NFHS Mideast Section 2 Distinguished Active Official Award and the 2002 National Wrestling Official of the Year Award from Wrestling USA Magazine.

Welker was selected the 1987 and 2013 (with his son Rick) National Sportswriter of the Year by Wrestling USA Magazine for his "Mat Talk" column which appeared in a host of publications and was named that publication's West Virginia Wrestling Man of the Year in 2001. He was also tabbed the West Virginia Wrestling Sportswriter of the Year seven times.

He has also conducted numerous wrestling clinics over the years.

As an athlete, he was a three-time sectional and district champion; a two-time regional champion; the PIAA State Champion in 1963 and the state runner-up in 1965. He earned a wrestling scholarship to the University of Pittsburgh.

Welker served as head wrestling coach at Wheeling High (1970-72), Wheeling Central Catholic (1972-76) and Wheeling Park (1979-80).

Tom Bloom (Athlete - 1950s)

Tom Bloom (Weir High School, Class of 1959). He led the Red Riders to state championships in football and baseball, both under Hall of Fame coach Jimmy Carey, before earning a football scholarship to Purdue University where he was a four-year performer.



At Weir, he earned 11 letters in three varsity sports with multiple honors in football and baseball plus being a basketball regular. He led the Red Riders to a two-year football record of 20-1 and a state largest class championship as a junior. The 11-0 record team beat Fairmont Senior, 19-12 for the title at Wheeling Island Stadium. As a senior, OVAC

champion Weir went 9-1, losing only to eventual state champion Parkersburg in the regular season finale. He earned first team All-State and All-OVAC and was selected captain of the "Big School" All-Valley team as a two-way back and kick returner.

At Purdue University, he was a two-way, do-it-all halfback who was selected the outstanding back on the freshman team and three-year varsity letterman and two-year starter. He was the team's second top rusher and receiver as a junior and top team receiver (13 catches for 217 yards and two TDs) as a senior. He scored two TDs in a 17-6 win over Michigan State in 1962. He was a kick returner and defensive back (47-yard interception TD).

He was drafted by the Cleveland Browns in the 6th Round (No. 74 overall) and indicated he would sign with them, but was a victim of an automobile crash and passed away in 1963.

Mike Palmer (Athlete - 1960s)

Mike Palmer (Steubenville High School, Class of 1967) -- The 5-foot-10, 170-pound running back is one of only three Big Red stars to earn Ohio AP Back of the Year honors, joining OVAC Hall of Famers Harry Wilson and Zach Collaros. He was the featured back on two Ohio-ranked powers and earned two first team Associated Press largest Class AA All-Ohio honors plus two All-Valley "Big School", two All-OVAC Class AAA, and two All-Eastern Ohio honors. He was All-Valley co-captain as a senior when he led Big Red to a 9-1 record, losing only to Massillon, and ranked No. 4 in the state Class AA poll. As a junior, Big Red went 8-2 and was ranked No. 8 in the Ohio AP poll.



As a senior, he scored 126 points (18 TDs, 18 conversions) and rushed 149 times for 1,098 yards and landed 16 passes for 261 yards. Playing against top-caliber foes as a junior, he rushed 107 times for 882 yards, landed 17 passes for 292 yards, and scored 89 points on 14 TDs and 5 conversions.

He also competed in track and basketball. As a member of sprint relay units, he ran a leg on an OVAC meet record-setting 880-yard team which timed 1:31.1. Big Red won four straight OVAC Class AAA crowns from 1964-67.

Earning a football scholarship to Iowa State University, he was a two-year letterman, and starter, for the Cyclones while rushing 116 times for 443 yards and two TDs and landing 18 passes for 267 yards and two scores. He had an NFL tryout.







As a senior, he had a 95-yard kickoff return TD in win over Steubenville and a 96-yard


81 yards vs. Wheeling.

In baseball, the outfielder was an all-state tournament selection as Weir captured the program at the time.

Pete Abuls (Athlete - 1970s)

Pete Abuls (Cambridge High School, Class of 1978) - Abuls was the second 1,000-point scorer in the history of Cambridge boys' basketball, finishing his career with 1,091 points.



As would be expected, he received many post-season honors, Abuls was named first-team all-Ohio as a senior, joining Ohio State legends Clark Kellogg and Art Schlichter on that list. He was also the AP Eastern District Class AAA

"Player of the Year" and a first-team all-OVAC Class AAAA and all-District 12 selection As a junior, he was an honorable mention all-Fastern District honoree when he scored 342 points.

Abuls was also a dynamic performer in track & field for the Bobcats.

The three-year letterman set what was then an OVAC record in the high jump with a leap of 6-6 and he also went 21-9 in the long jump, helping the Bobcats to the Class AAAA championship. Voted the school's Ray Voliz. Award winner as the top male athlete, he was also a two-year letterman in cross country.

Abuls continued his athletic and academic careers at Tennessee Tech where he was a four-

year letterman and the team captain for three years. He finished his career with 1,187 points (a 12.2 avenge), 462 rebounds, 139 assists and 110 steals. He averaged 13.3 points as a freshman and

led the team at 12.1 as a sophomore. After an injury-plagued junior campaign, he again led the team in scoring at 14.5 as a senior. Abuls earned all-Ohio Valley Athletic Conference accolates following his senior campaign. Abuls was inducted into the District 12 Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame in 2015

Joseph 'JoJo' Blaha (Athlete - 1980s)

Joseph 'JoJo' Blaha (Wheeling Central Catholic, Class of 1983) - In a school where athletic tradition runs deep. Blaha rates with the Maroon Knights' all-time greats. He was a first-team all-state honoree in three sports - football, basketball and baseball,

While starring in all three sports, Blaha's prep baseball exploits were staggering

He was a two-time all-stater (1981/1983). He batted better than .400 as a junior and senior, earning all-OVAC and all-Valley first-team plaudits, He also helped lead Wheeling American Legion Post 1 to a pair of state

championships, highlighted by being selected in 1983 as the West Virginia State Player of the Year.

In fontball, Blaha was a stud running back and led the team in rushing as a junior and senior, eclipsing the 1,000-yard mark as a senior. His ball-toting efforts landed him all-OVAC, all-State and all-Valley plaudits.

The versatile and multi-talented Blaha was a four-year basketball performer for legendary coach Skip Prosser. The Knights captured the 1982 state crown, their first as a member of the WVSSAC. Central advanced to the state tournament again the following year. The savy guard was voted to the state all-tournament team in both 1982 and 1983. Blaha was a double-digit scorer in his final two years in hoops. He was an all-OVAC, all-Valley and all-State honoree both of those seasons.

Blaha opted to continue his baseball and academic careers at Valdosta State in Georgia, where he scripted another brilliant diamond resume, lettering all four years. He was a twotime All-American and two-time all-conference honoree during his collegiate playing days. The standout third baseman established eight school records. He was a 339 career hitter with 43 home runs, 52 RBI, 178 runs scored and 209 RBI, Blaha helped lead Valdosta to 157 wins in his career.

Daryl 'Boogie' Johnson (Athlete - 1990s)

Daryl 'Boogie' Johnson (Wheeling Park High School, Class of 1992) - It didn't matter the sport or season for this Patriot, he simply shined. While earning accolades in multiple sports, it was on the football field where Johnson left his biggest impact.

One of the best running games to ever suit up in the Ohio Valley, Johnson rushed for more than 4,100 career yards and 56 touchdowns. He saved his best for last, putting forth a highly memorable campaign in which he carried the ball 229 times for 2,062 yards and scored 31 touchdowns, During that senior season in 1991, Johnson had his biggest games



against the biggest opponents. Against Morgantown, Johnson carried the ball 9 times for 231 cards and four touchdowns in the first half alone.

Following that season, accolades followed Johnson as he was named the recipient of the Kennedy Award, which goes to the top prep player in the Mountain State, as well as the ratorade Player of the Year in the state. He was also named fourth-team All-American, Along with those, he was first-team All-State, All-OVAC and All-Valley,

Johnson was listed on the All-OVAC team in all three years of his career.

In Februrary of 1992, Johnson signed a National Letter of Intent to continue his football areer at Oklahoma State University. He made an impact early, accumulating more than 600 ards of offense as a freshman, but saw his campaign cut short due to a knee injury. As a ophomore, he had gained 300 yards, but a collarbone injury ended his season and his junior ear was also cut short with another knee injury.

On top of his football prowess at Wheeling Park, Johnson shined on the baseball field, le had a career batting average of better than .400, including two all-OVAC seasons as a ophomore and junior where he hit 455 and 420, respectively,

Don 'Kip' McLane (Athlete - 1970s)

Don 'Kip' McLane (Steubenville Catholic Central, Class of 1971) McLane rates among the best hoopsters ever to suit up for the Crusaders. He put together a dominating senior season, averaging 25.4 points and an amazing 20 rebounds per contest.

Not surprisingly, a slew of honors came his way following that memorable campaign. He was tabbed first team all-OVAC, all-hastern District and District 5 player-of-the-year. Moreover, McLane was selected by both UPI and AP as a first-team all-Ohio honoree. He was also chosen to

play in the Ohio North South All-Star Game.

His outstanding exploits also resonated on the national landscape as McLane wa to a pair of All-American teams. The U.S. Basketball Writers Association Coach and Magazine and the Surildst Growers A-A squad.

He ended his career at Steubenville Catholic - where he is a member of the school' Fame (Class of 1989) - with 1,008 points,

After his illustrious Crusader career, McLane received a basketball scholarship to E University - a national power in those days,

Mef ane was a three-year starter at Duquesne University, serving as team captain as in 1975. With the Dukes, he tallied 861 points (12 ppg), 586 rebounds (8.1 rpg) and 12 He passed away in 2014 at the age of 61.

Carl Fodor (Athlete - 1980s)

Carl Fodor (Weir High School, Class of 1982) - Fodor was a prolific three-year starter at quarterback for the Red Riders. He set the school career passing record of 2,090 yards (it lasted until 2005) despite playing on three losing record teams and missing several games with injuries.

As a senior, he was sidelined from Weir's first three games with a collarbone injury. In seven games, he passed for 1,213 yards, completing 74 of 165 passes with 8 TDs for a 1-9 record team. In their win over Mount View (27-12), he passed for 269 yards, then second-best in school history Fodor earned second-team Class AAA all-

state honors as well as all-Valley and all-Mountaineer League plaudits. He was to play in the W. Va. North-South All-Star Game in Charleston and quarterbacked th (coached by Dave Cisar) to an upset victory.

Fodor also excelled on the diamond for the Red Riders. He was a three-year regular fielder who helped Weir earn a state Class AAA state tournament berth with sect regional titles including a 1-0 upset Region 1 semi-final win over John Marshall and Hall of Fame pitcher Chris Jones. He earned honorable mention largest Class AAA a plus all-Valley (all-class) second team.

Fodor went onto a record-setting career as Marshall University's quarterback, H his Thundering Herd career holding virtually every passing record in school anna talented quarterback completed 416-of-811 passes for 35 TDs. He established a S Conference record with his 6,627 passing yards.

Fodor's passing exploits at Marshall earned him the West Virginia Amateur Athlet Year Award (now Hardman Award). He is one of only seven OV prep products wi won the state's oldest award originated in 1933. The other six are already honorec OVAC: Chuck Howley, Lee Patrone, Zach Amedro, John (Fuzzy) Filliez, Harole Daugherty and Kenny Griffith.

Fodor signed a free agent NFL contract with the St. Louis Cardinals and was practice squad in 1986 before signing CFL contract with the Calgary Stampeders w played two seasons. He then played a season with Chicago in the Arena League befc ing his career with one season in Wheeling with Steel Valley Smash.

Fodor was inducted into the W.Va. Coaches Association Hall of Fame plus halls of at Marshall and Weir.

Josh Watson (Athlete - 1990s)

Josh Watson (Magnolia High School, Class of 1999) -- Regardless if it was track or cross country, this former Blue Hagle ran ...and he ran fast. Watson is one of the most decorated distance runners in Ohio Valley

history, achieving impeecable success in both sports. In his OVAC and West Virginia State Meet careers, Watson finished

with 15 gold medals, including 14 individual titles - the most in Ohio Valley history

In cross country, Watson became the first Magnolia harrier to win the West Virginia State Championship, helping his team to the state team title as well. He also won the regional title and finished second in the OVAC

Watson didn't stop there. He won the regional and state championship as a juni senior, too.

In the spring, it didn't matter the distance. Whether it was the 800, 1600 or 3200, v took on all comers. His junior season, he finished as the high scorer in the Class A/A. with 32.5 points. Those came via the state title in the 800, 1600 and 3200 and he an the champion 4x800 team. He won the 1600 and 3200 at the OVAC and finished as 1 up in the 800

As a senior, Watson helped guide the Blue Eagles to the West Virginia Class A/A. team title thanks to scoring 32 more points, which includes repeats in all three of th vidual distance events and a runner-up finish in the 4x8. He was the OVAC champion three individual races and set the OVAC 3A record at the time at 1:59.05

After high school, Watson signed to compete in both sports at William & Mary. He Academic All-American honors in both sports and a Phi Beta Kappa.







Leekycia Brown (Athlete - 2000s)

a Brown (Monroe Central High School, Class of 2005). This led ace lettered in multiple sports during her time with the 4, but it was in the softball pitching circle where she made her upact.

ed the Seminoles to the 2004 Division III State Championship g every inning of the 32-game season. In the state title game, heelersburg, Brown pitched a complete game, striking out four ng two in a 1-0 victory.

nd an astounding 290 strikeouts. She pitched no fewer than 18 shutouts. She also the plate.

nior, Brown guided the Seminoles to the regional championship game and batted her career, she was a .354 hitter.

, during her prep career, Brown finished with a 91-16 record, 900 strikeouts and ilks. She pitched nine no-hitters and five perfect games. At the time of her graduateld the Ohio record for consecutive innings pitched without allowing a walk at 76. sly, plenty of accolades followed Brown. She was a first-team All-Ohio selection more and junior. She earned second-team accolades as a freshman and honorable s a senior. She was named All-OVAC first team four times and was the Eastern of QOVAC Player of the Year as a sophomore and junior.

p exploits earned a scholarship to Norfolk State University where she competed easons. As a freshman, she was named the team's Rookie of the Year after leading in hitting (.339) and ERA (2.68). As a junior, she was named to the conference's mice Team and finished 10-9 in the circle with a 3.07 ERA. She was named the VP following the season.

with softball, Brown lettered in basketball for the Seminoles, earning all-OVAC



Natalie Perzanowski (Athlete - 2000s)

Natalie Perzanowski (St. John Central High School Class of 2008). Distance running -- whether it was track or cross country -- was the way of life for this former Lady Irish standout.

Perzanowski was a key cog in the Lady Irish track team's four-year run of dominance that saw them win two state championship, two state runner-up trophies and four consecutive OVAC titles.

All told, she claimed seven state-level medals in track, including winning the 1600 and 3200 meter run state titles in 2006. She also has a trio of bronze medals in her collection along with a fifth and seventh in the 4x800 during 2008 and 2006, respectively.

At the OVAC Championship, Perzanowski finished with 14 conference titles, winning four golds as a sophomore and senior.

After her sophomore season, she was named the Eastern District's Female Athlete of the Year. In cross country, Perzanowski qualified to the OHSAA State Meet four times and earned all-Ohio in three of those appearances. Her best finish came in 2007 when she crossed the line in third. She was fourth as a junior and eighth as a sophomore.

She was twice (2005, 2006) the overall OVAC champion and in 2004 and 2007 won the Class IA/2A title.


Perzanowski was named Eastern District Athlete of the Year for Division III in both 2005 and 2006.

Along with her exploits on the track and CC course, she was a three-time Academic All-Ohto honoree in both sports.

While distance running was where she really made her presence felt she was also an impact performer for the Lady Irish basketball program during her four years. She scored 991 career points, had 388 steals, passed out 306 assists and pulled down 297 rebounds.

She was three times listed as first team All-Eastern District and All-OVAC, while helping to lead her team to three OVAC titles. She was second-team All-Ohio as a junior and was named The Intelligencer Sophomore of the Year in 2006 and twice was District 12 Player of the Year in 2006 and 2007.

After high school, Perzanowski went to the University of Toledo to continue her running career.

Legends of OVAC member schools honors those great athletes who played or coached in the Ohio Valley prior to the formation of the conference in 1943 or who played or coached after that date but before their school became a member of the conference.

V. Everett Brinkman (Wheeling High School, Class of 1923)

One of only three 13-letter winners in football, basketball, baseball and track at Wheeling High, he was an all-state football end and scored 54 points in a basketb as a freshman. He became a three-sport, nine-letter standout at W. Va, Wesleyan College before returning to the Ohio Valley to earn his mark in coaching. A pioneer of the jump shot and fast break, Brinkman coached Benwood Union from 1928-33 and Wheeling High from 1934-55 to a combined 405-193 re

Wheeling, his teams were 356-138 with five state titles in seven trips to the finals. The 1938 and 1950 teams were unbeaten. Other state titles were won in 19. and 1943. The '40 and '43 teams lost but once.

Brinkman also coached football for 14 years - six at Benwood Union and eight at Wheeling, with a combined record of 87-32-15 including 40-9-4 at Union his gridiron teams claimed state titles in the pre-official state playoff era: 1928 and 1931 Union, both unbeaten, and at Wheeling in 1934 and 1937. The '34 tu unbeaten but twice tied.

He also was a top-flight football official for several years and active in state coaches and officials' organizations.

Brinkman earlier was elected to four Halls of Fame - West Virginia Sports, Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan, City of Wheeling, and W. Va. Wesleyan Sports.

Clarence 'Bevo' Francis (Wellsville High School, Class of 1952)

A record-setting basketball scoring machine in high school and college who attracted national attention and was profiled in numerous books, national magaz major newspapers. Two books were written on his career.

The 6-9, 190-pounder played only one season at Wellsville High after sitting out a year following transfer from Irondale. In 1952, he scored 776 points in 2 with 31-point average, second best in Ohio. He outscored six opposing teams with highs of 57, 54 and 50 points. Wellsville lost only to 28-1 record state n Steubenville and handed W. Va. Class B champion Newell two of its three losses.

He followed Wellsville coach Newt Oliver to Rio Grande College and played two seasons. In 1953, he scored 1,954 points in 39 games for national record game average. He scored 116 vs. Ashland Junior College. In 1954, he averaged 46.5 points and scored 113 vs. Hillsdale College. The schedule included wins ov Forest, Providence, Butler and Creighton and games in Madison Square Garden, Boston Garden and Miami Beach Auditorium.

The NAIA Hall of Famers left school to join the Boston Whirlwinds and tour with the Harlem Globetrotters. He also played in the Eastern and ABL pro league retiring in 1962.

Lou 'The Toe' Groza (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1942)

The Purple Rider luminary is best known as a record-setting professional football placekicker, but he was much more.

In high school, he was a three-sport standout and All-Ohio in football and basketball. He was center, and the state tournament's leading scorer, on the 27-2 reco team which won the 1941 state Class A title. He also was a tackle on the 10-0-1 record 1941 football team which claimed an Ohio co-championship after a 14-14 Toledo Libbey in a post-season challenge game. Groza, by the way, kicked only one field goal in high school,

He played football as a freshman at Ohio State before joining the armed services which preceded his 21-year career with the Cleveland Browns which ended i When he retired, he was pro football's all-time leading scorer with only one TD and 1,609 points. He booted 234 field goals, with a long of 53 yards. conversion streak of 134 and scored in 107 straight games. The Lou Groza Award is given annually to college football's top placekicker.

A nine-time Pro Bowl offensive tackle, as well as kicker, he played in nine NFL title games, with four titles, and played on four All-American Conference title The Pro Football and Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall of Famer had his jersey No. 76 retired by the Browns. A portion of Route 7 is named for him in Martir

Clarke Hinkle (Toronto High School, Class of 1926)

This versatile early era football player left such an impression on his alma mater that the Toronto High School Football Stadium behind the school is named in hi The 5-11, 195-pound athlete also left an enduring imprint at Bucknell University, where he was inducted into the first Hall of Fame class, and in the National I League. He was inducted, in 1964, in the second class of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, He's also a member of the Halls of Fame for College Football and the Ohio Valley Dapper Dans.

At Bucknell from 1929-31, he led the East in scoring with 128 points in 1929 and later his team to an unbeaten season in 1931. He then played in the East-Wes where he was selected the Most Outstanding Player.

From 1932-41, the Green Bay Packer star was one of the most versatile players in the National Football League. He was a fullback-linebacker-punter-placekiel was cited for his running, blocking, receiving, kicking and tackling,

Hinkle was first or second team all-league all 10 seasons and four-time All-Pro. He was on the NFL All-Time Two-Way team selected in 1994. One of the practice fields is named in his honor.

When he retired, he was the leading rusher (3.860 yards on 1.171 carries) in NFL history and his totals now rank sixth in Packer history. He scored 379 caree and averaged 40.8 yards punting.

Calvin Jones (Steubenville High School, Class of 1952)

This two-sport Big Red standout was a high school basketball rival of fellow honoree Bevo Francis but is best known for football.

At Big Red, he helped the 1952 basketball team to a school-best 28-1 record and Ohio Class A runner-up finish. En route, Big Red handed the Francis-led We team its only two losses.

In football, the All-Ohio lineman selected the University of Iowa over Ohio State and went on to All-Big Ten Conference honors three times. He made 22 All-A teams at guard, including a record 15 in 1954. As team captain, he earned the Outland Trophy given to the nation's top interior lineman and became one of or consensus All-America picks at Iowa, where he played both offense and defense.

A member of the College Football and Helms Athletic Foundation Halls of Fame, he was inducted into the first Iowa Hall of Fame class and is a member All-Time Hawkeye team. His jersey No. 62 was retired by Iowa, one of only two at the school, He was the first African-American athlete pictured on the cover of Sports Illustrated.

In 1962, he was runner-up to the Yankees' Tom Tresh for the an League Rookie of the Year honors. He batted .269 with 12 home runs in 1962. In 1972, he hit three home runs in the Hall of Fame game in Cooperstown, N.Y. been inducted into four other halls of fame. In 1999, he became the fifth inductee into the Purdue Hall and was a charter inductee into the East Liverpool Hall of He's also in the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan and Lou Holtz Ohio Valley Halls of Fame.

ss Craft (Wellsburg High School, Class of 1939)

as a three-sport performer in football, basketball and baseball for the Orange Knights and earned All-Valley and All-State honors as a senior football back. played football, baseball and ran track at the University of Alabama, where he was a two-way back regular in football and earned second team All-Southeastern ence honors

ted in 1943 by the Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football League, he played eight seasons (1946-53) as a defensive back-kick returner and was selected to the ne Eagles' Team. He played on Eagles' teams which won NFL titles in 1948 and 1949 and finished second in 1947. He was named to the Pro Bowl in 1951 and le is tied for the current NFL record of four pass interceptions in one game against the Cardinals in 1950. He also blocked three Pittsburgh Steeler extra-point kicks game and returned a kickoff for a ten team record 103 yards against the Rams in 1950.

t is credited as the first player in the NFL to wear the new hard plastic helmet in 1951. He ended his NFL career in two seasons as a player-assistant coach with the s. In 1995, he was included in the NFL Films' presentation of the 100 Greatest Touchdowns in NFL History. It featured his defensive theft, and 20-yard TD return, ss reception caught by NFL Hall of Famer Elroy (Crazylegs) Hirsch of the Rams.

t is inducted into the W. Va. Sports Hall of Fame and the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall.

rl Hamill (Linsly School, Class of 1922)

endary athlete and high school coach in the Ohio Valley, he was a three-sport standout at Linsly and Bethany College. An All-Valley football player, he also scored eard-of 330 points in 21 basketball games in 1920, a rare total in the center jump, low-scoring era.

a 1929-51, he was the three-sport coach at Weir High. His football teams scheduled top-notch programs from three states and went 166-35-13 including a 111-10 s. Mountain State teams. He coached six unbeaten teams and four with only one loss. Three state titles were claimed in 1935, 1942 and 1949 when the Red Riders e first-ever WVSSAC largest class state playoff title and the school narrowly missed a state title trifecta. Later that school year, he coached the 1950 baseball team econd state one-class crown (the other was in 1945). The 1949-50 basketball team lost a 38-37 regional title game to unbeaten Wheeling High, which went on to : championship. He was selected West Virginia "Coach of the Year" for high school and college all sports.

irst Ohio Valley athlete to be selected first team all-state basketball three straight years, he led the Wildcats to W. Va. state titles in 1936 and 1938 including a 24-0 in 1938.

ng those three years that he was the leading scorer. Wheeling High was 65-4 under Hall of Fame coach Everett Brinkman. Mehen scored 1,193 points in 84 career with many coming during the center jump, low scoring era.

ater earned All-America and All-Southeastern Conference recognition at the University of Tennessee, where he helped the Vols win the 1941 Southeastern Conference ionship. After serving in World War II, where he was wounded, he played professionally with the Youngstown Bears and Toledo Jeeps. vas inducted into the City of Wheeling Hall of Fame in 1992.

le Rivlin (Triadelphia High School, Class of 1935)

as an all-state basketball guard in high school where he led the Triads to a 20-1 record in 1934. He also was the high-point scorer in the 1935 one-class state track where he won three gold medals. He timed 10.2 for 100 yards, 22.8 for 220 yards and was a member of the medley relay winning unit.

Rudy Baric (Benwood Union High School, Class of 1938)

He was a first team All-W.Va. basketball honoree as a senior when the OVAC charter member school bowed to unbeaten Wheeling High in the finals. As a junior, he helped the Ironmen to a state tournament berth and the school's best-ever record of 23-2.

At West Virginia University, the 6-3 center captained the 1942 team which won the National Invitation Tournament championship in New Madison Square Garden when the NIT was more prestigious than the NCAA Tournament. After a 16-4 regular season record, the Mountaineers wer ed last in the eight-team event before they upset top-seeded Long Island U., 52-49, in the first round, WVU then defeated Toledo, 51-39, and V Kentucky, 47-45, before 17,000 fans in the finals. The team's only 6-footer was the team's leading rebounder and second-highest scorer and was ed tournament MVP. The three-year regular helped WVU to a 45-20 record.

In 1943, with WVU coach Dyke Raese in the armed services, Baric served as interim coach and guided WVU to a 14-7 record. He then wen coach high school basketball for 19 years at Penns Grove, N. J., where his teams won more than 300 games.

A member of the All-Time WVU era team, he was inducted into the second WVU Hall of Fame class and is a W. Va, Sports HOF inductee.

Mike Basrak (Bellaire High School, Class of 1931)

The 6-3, 210-pound football center started 22 games in his Big Reds' career and earned All-Eastern Ohio and All-Valley honors before becomfirst college All-America player from Bellaire and the first in Duquesne University history. He started 30 games at Duquesne and was selected All-A by the A-A board. The Associated Press and other major selectors. Bellaire displayed its pride for its hometown hero by placing a 10-foot pi banner above the front entrance to the City Building.

In the second National Football League Draft of 1937, Basrak was the fifth overall league selection in the first round by the Pittsburgh Pirate: renamed the Steelers. No other OVAC product has been drafted earlier than Basrak. Weirton's Bob Gain, inducted into the OVAC Hall in 2006, al a fifth pick. Basrak played two seasons in the NFL,

Les Carney (Wintersville High School, Class of 1952)

A 10-letter winner in four sports - football, basketball, baseball and track - for the Warriors, the football running back played in only one losing in three seasons for Coach Bob McFarren. Wintersville, however, didn't join the OVAC until 1955 after Carney accepted a scholarship to Ohio Univ

As a sophomore OU running back, he earned honorable mention All-Mid American Conference for the MAC champions before being called to m service

After returning, he led the Bobcats' track team to the 1958 and 1959 MAC titles while earning NCAA All-America honors as a senior. He held the 220-yard dash record of 20.8 seconds for one day. The two-time MAC 220-yard champion set a conference record which lasted 21 years. He als the conference 100-yard crown with a 9.7-second clocking. At one time, he claimed all or parts of five school individual or relay records.

Carney was drafted by the NFL Baltimore Colts, but bypassed the offer for a job in his current hometown of Akron where he competed in AAL meets. He earned a spot on the U.S. team for the 1959 Pan-American Games and won a silver medal at 200 meters.

In 1960, he placed third in the U.S. Olympic Trials at 200 meters and earned a spot on the U.S. team for the Rome Olympics. In the 200-meter he earned a silver medal in a photo finish with hometown hero Livio Berutti of Italy, who set an Olympic record of 20.5 seconds. Carney's time c would have won every previous Olympic final including the 1936 Games won by the legendary Jesse Owens in 20.7.

Charles 'Doc' Hartwig (Benwood Union High School, Class of 1930)

An All-Valley and All-West Virginia football lineman who went on to earn national fame and recognition at the University of Pittsburgh. He play Coach Everett Brinkman at Union and helped the Ironmen to the school's first unbeaten season of 8-0 in 1928. At Pitt, he was selected team cr starred in the 1933 Rose Bowl, and earned All-America honors in 1934 after coming back from an injury which forced him to miss his sophomore si The 1934 Pitt team was acclaimed national champions. The three-year letterman played on Panther teams with a combined 24-3-2 record.

He also played in the East-West Shrine Game along with fellow honoree Jim Moscrip and Michigan's Gerald Ford, a future U.S. president.

Hartwig became a national hero when he was pictorially featured on a Wheaties cereal box, the only Ohio Valley athlete so honored. He coached Moundsville High in 1938 and Martins Ferry High the next two years before returning to Pitt to join the athletic department.

Hartwig died in 1950 after a lingering illness and Benwood Union named its football field, Hartwig Field, after the school's only All-American.

Jim 'Monk' Moscrip (Adena High School, Class of 1931)

He earned 10 letters in three sports - football, basketball and baseball - and was an All-Eastern Ohio and All-Valley football end under Coact Thomas. He led the 1930 football team to a 9-1-1 record as the Golden Wave outscored foes, 284-19. He also the MVP of the county basketball tourna After spending a year at Kiski Prep in Saltsburg, Pa., the 6-foot, 186-pounder became a three-year starter at Stanford University and played on the f "Vow Boys" team - so named for vowing not to lose to Southern California during their career. Moscrip and teammates kept their promise and d ed USC three times and compiled a 25-4-2 record while becoming the first team to play in three straight Rose Bowls. Stanford won twice and Mo

a two-way end and placekicker, was MVP of the 1936 Rose Bowl win over SMU. He also played in the East-West Shrine Game. He was selected by the old NFL Brooklyn Dodgers in the first NFL Draft in 1936, but his NFL career was two seasons with the Detroit Lions.

A member of the All-Time Stanford team, he was inducted into the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall of Fame and the College Football Hall of I

Griffith led the nation in scoring his o seasons (1940 with a 23.9 average and 1941 at 22.0) and became the first West Virginia Conference player to average 20 points for a season.

Tom Kinkade (Toronto High School, Class of 1938)

He was a football and basketball standout for the Red Knights before excelling in football at Ohio State University.

As a senior in high school, he led Toronto to a school record 19-2 record with only a regular season split with Weir High marring an unbeaten s The 1938 team advanced to the regional tournament finals, the farthest in school history, before bowing, 50-49 to state tournament-bound Bridger The 6-foot-1, 190-pound Kinkade was selected All-Ohio by The Associated Press and led all scorers with a 25-point average. Toronto averaged 53 a game.

In a 82-31 rout of Midland, Pa., Kinkade scored a school record 52 points on 23 goals and six free throws. It was the second highest Ohio Valley at the time and lasted as a school record for 30 years.

A quarterback in football, he was recruited by Ohio State and was a three-year letterman and two-way regular as a running back-linebacker on which finished 6-2 and Big Ten Conference champions in 1939 and 6-1-1 in 1941 under first-year coach Paul Brown. He was drafted by the Gree Packers in 1942, but opted not to play pro football.

Fred Negus (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1940)

He was a three-sport, three-year Purple Rider athlete in football, basketball and baseball and earned All-Valley honors as a junior center and senic back while serving as team captain in two sports.

After a year in prep school, he played football two years at the University of Wisconsin and earned All-Big Ten as a sophomore center on an 8-1-1 team ranked No. 3 in the nation. After enlisting in the Marine Corp Reserve, he earned All-Big Ten center as a junior at the University of Michig: also lettered in track. After a year in the active U.S. Marine Corp where he competed on the Marines' football team, he was drafted by the NFL's Cle-Rams, but opted to return to the University of Wisconsin. He earned his third All-Big Ten first center honors and competed for the College All-Sta against the Chicago Bears.

After college, he played three seasons in Chicago in the All-American Football Conference and the 1950 season with the Chicago Bears.

In 1998, he was inducted into the University of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame. In 2005, he died at age 83 in Fort Atkinson, Wis.

Charley Seabright (Benwood Union High School, Class of 1937)

He was a three-sport standout in football, basketball and baseball at old Benwood Union High, earning All-West Virginia one-class honors in fc and basketball and was All-Valley in football. As a senior, he led the Ironmen to a school-best 23-2 basketball record and sectional and regional title a state tournament berth. During that run, the Ironmen ended a 33-game winning streak of defending state champion Wheeling.

At West Virginia University, he earned seven letters and is one of only 12 athletes in school history to earned letters in football, basketball and bas A three-year starter as blocking back, single-wing quarterback and linebacker, he also batted .300 as a left-handed baseball first baseman and played in basketball.

He was selected to the WVU football all-time decade team (1940-49) and was a 2004 inductee into the WVU Sports Hall of Fame. In 1977, h inducted into the West Virginia Sports Hall of Fame.

In 1941, Seabright played with the NFL's Cleveland Rams before serving in the U.S. Army, After the war, he played five seasons (1946-50) as (the last two-way offensive-defensive players in the NFL as blocking back-linebacker with the Pittsburgh Steelers. He started on the 8-4 record 1947 regarded as the best in team history prior to the 1970s. He was selected in the 1970s on an All-Time Steeler Defensive Team. After residing and working in the Ohio Valley for three decades, he died in 1981,

Nick Skorich (Bellaire High School, Class of 1939)

He was a three-sport Big Reds' athlete in football, basketball and track and earned All-Valley honors as a football center while playing on three which won titles in the OVAA, the forerunner of the OVAC. The three teams had records of 9-1, 8-2 and 9-1

He earned a football scholarship to the University of Cincinnati where he was team captain as a senior and earned honors on the All-Ohio college select Skorich was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1943 before serving in the U.S. Navy. After military service, he played three seasons as guard f Steelers before turning to coaching - first in high school before serving as an assistant with the Steelers, Green Bay and Philadelphia before becc Eagles' head coach for three seasons. He then joined the Cleveland Browns' staff and became the Browns' head coach from 1971-74. After le Cleveland, he capped his career as supervisor of officials for the National Football League. He died in 2004.

Moffat Storer (The Linsly School, Class of 1939)


He was a three-sport Cadet standout in football, basketball and track where he set the longest-lasting Ohio Valley and W. Va. record in the 100-yard An All-Valley fullback, he helped Linsly to 7-2 and 9-2 records as a sophomore and junior but is best known for his record-setting first place finish 1939 Intelligencer Tri-State Track Meet, the most prestigious meet in the area at the time. He clocked 9.7 seconds for 100 yards which remained on th record books for four decades and was the best-ever in West Virginia until 1972.

He continued his football and track career at Duke University where he was a starting back in the 1942 Rose Bowl game against Oregon State. I played in Durham, N.C., the only time outside Pasadena, Calif., because of World War II in the Pacific. He also starred on the Blue Devils' track tear led the sprint relay unit to a victory in the prestigious Penn Relays.

Storer was drafted by the NFL Chicago Cardinals but, after graduation, served in the armed forces.

He lived in Chattanooga, Tenn., for several years, and is deceased.



He became the first sub-nine minute 3.200-meter runner in Ohio history (8:58) and his 4:20 time in the 1.600 remains on the school record As a junior, he won the Ohio Class AA cross country title and placed second in the state meet 2-mile run.

As a senior. Bentz was undefeated in cross country and track while setting an Ohio two-mile record. He earned All-America status by third with a time of 8:58.4 for two miles at the High School Track & Field National Meet in Baton Rouge. La

Recruited by the University of Tennessee, he led the Vols to four unbeaten cross country seasons, four Southeastern Conference titles and the NCAA title. In track, his teams won three SEC crowns and the 1974 NCAA championship. He contributed to 11 SEC titles in four cross of and track seasons while earning All-SEC honors,

Charles "Punque" Cartledge (Steubenville High School, Class of 1912). The first area inductee into the Ohio Football Coaches Fame and the initial honoree in the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall of Fame, he put Big Red football on the area and Ohio maps with a 2 record of 140-38-11 from 1916-40.

His teams outscored foes by 3,772-870 and dealt famed Massillon its worst loss ever, 68-0, in 1931. That team was led by OVAC Hall o Legends George (Puck) Burgwin and Will Robinson. The Big Red schedule during that era included top team from around Ohio and v Pennsylvania.

In a pre-playoff era, his Big Red teams were acclaimed Ohio state champions five times (1925, 1926, 1930, 1931, 1935). He coachee unbeaten teams and three one-loss squads.

From 1922-26, Big Red was unbeaten in 45 games against high school teams, with a lone defeat in 1924 to the Carnegie College freshmer had 35 shutouts in 46 games. In 1930-31 seasons, they had an Ohio Valley record 17 straight shutouts. He also coached Big Red basketball to a 181-139 record from 1919-39 and also coached the tennis team.

As a high school senior (1911-12), he captained Big Red football, basketball and baseball teams and was a football quarterback. He died in 1 Jim Jordan (Chester High School, Class of 1943). A 6-foot-3, 195-pound basketball center, he was selected captain of the 1943 on West Virginia All-State team after leading Chester to a 20-4 record. Two of the losses, including the regional tournament, were to 26-1 record. champion Wheeling High.

In five years of college play, Jordan competed for four conference championship teams. Enrolled in the Navy V-12 program at Mount St. (Md.) College, he was the leading scorer in the Mason-Dixon Conference.

The 1946 UNC team finished as NCAA runner-up to Oklahoma A&M. He was the only unanimous choice f Southern Conference and led the league in scoring. Featured on a Tar Heel trading card of basketball legends, his jersey No. 8 hangs from the of the Dean Smith Center.

Jordan finished his college career with two season at the University of Kentucky and played on the Wildcats' 1947 NIT title team and the NCAA championship squad led by fellow OVAC Hall of Famer and All-American, Alex Groza of Martins Ferry. Both Groza and Jordan were selected to the All-Time Ohio Valley Pre-1950 team by The Intelligencer.

Jordan, who died in 1999, was an attorney in Chester for 35 years.

Casimir Myslinski (Steubenville High School, Class of 1941). In high school, he was a football running back and captain of the 19-Red team, the final one for fellow OVAC Legend honoree Charles (Punque) Cartledge.

He entered West Point in the last pre-World War II class and under the stepped-up wartime program, he graduated in three years with a I engineering

He served as captain of the 1943 Army team and earned the Most Valuable Player award while being named to every first team All-America tion as a 6-foot, 195-pound center. He also received the Knute Rockne Award as the nation's outstanding lineman in 1943.

After graduation in 1944, Myslinski entered the Air Force and returned to West Point in administration in 1952. In 1956, he became head Physical Education Department at the Air Force Academy and from 1968-82, he served as Athletic Director at the University of Pittsburgh. He was selected Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Man of the Year in 1977. Myslinski died in 1993.

Norman "Wild Man" Willey (Pine Grove High School, Class of 1945). He is the Ohio Valley's most prominent product of the old si football teams at the smaller enrollment schools.

The 6-foot-2, 225-pound athlete played football, basketball and baseball for the Tornados.


After high school, he enrolled for one year in the U.S. Navy and briefly attended Salem College before enrolling at Marshall College, wh played football and basketball.

A fullback-defensive end in football, he was drafted in the 13th round by the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles, where he played eight seasons from 57. He was a two-time Pro Bowl selection and is a member, along with Reggie White, as a defensive end on the All-Time Eagles' honor rol. Willey is credited as the reason the NFL started charting defensive sacks after it was reported he was unofficially credited with 17 sacks t New York Giants' quarterback Charley Concrly on Oct. 26, 1952. He earned the nickname "Wild Man" from his pass rushing resulting in oppo vardage losses.

An inductee into the Marshall and West Virginia State Sports Halls of Fame, he was honored in Pine Grove with a "Norman Willey Day" or 15, 2006. Signs proclaiming "Home of Wild Man Willey" were erected at the entrance to the town as well as at Valley High School,

He captured individual Class A titles from 1984-86 and had a winning senior time of 15:44.2. Th ins started a record run of eight straight state team titles, with Carna the main cog in the first two crowns of 1985 and 1986. The 1986 team wen en with a 137-0 mark and was ranked No. 1 in the nation by The Harrier publication, with Carna as an All-American selection.

As a nine-time All-Ohioan in cross country and track, claiming two Ohio state crowns —the 1,600-meters as a junior and 3,200-meters as His personal best times were 4:18 at 1,600; 8:38 at 3,000; 9:18 at 3,200; and 15:12 at 5,000 meters. He also set a national meet record in the meter run in the 15-16 age group at The Athletics Congress (TAC) Junior Olympics in 1985.

a earned a scholarship to the University of Michigan where he won eight varsity letters in track and cross country and was an All-Big Ten an nerica honoree. He led the Wolverines to sixth place in the 1991 NCAA Division I National Cross Country Meet, where he finished 21st is lual competition. He resides in Jersey City, New Jersey.

George (Smithfield High School, Class of 1950). A three-sport Spartan, he was a 190-pound fullback-tackle-end who was selected to th Il-Ohio Associated Press Class B team in 1949 and also was an All-Ohio Class B honorable mention basketball honoree as well as a basebal ut. The two-time All-Eastern Ohio football player led the Spartans to a school record 22-game win streak with a 22-1-1 record from 1947-45 ing unbeaten seasons in 1947-48. As a senior, the Spartans opened the season with a 40-6 victory over the Massillon reserve team before playing egular varsity schedule. He also started for the winning Ohio team in the 1950 Ohio-West Virginia All-Star Game.

isketball, he led the Spartans to a 22-3 record —second best in school history — and the Jefferson County title. ccepted a football scholarship to Syracuse University, where he was a three-year letterman and regular for the Orangemen. He became the only ield product drafted by the National Football League when he was selected by the Detroit Lions. He opted to join the Air Force.

ter Howell (Flushing High School, Class of 1955). The 6-foot-5 center led the Orioles to the two best seasons (43-3 combined record) in history, including an unbeaten regular season in 1954 and an overall 21-2 mark in 1955. A four-year starter, he scored 905 points — second most history at the time — as a senior for a then Ohio Valley record 39.3 points per game norm after sporting a 40.2 average in regular season. He 74 points against New Athens — second best in Ohio Valley history at the time — and also had games of 58 and 55 points. In the 118-52 rout Athens, he hit 26 of 37 goals and 22 of 30 free throws.

His vall jersey was retired by the school and is displayed in the Scio Museum. In 1982, he was selected to the All-Time Ohio Valley Post-1950 Team Intelligencer newspaper.

ee-sport, 11-letter winner, he was an All-Valley selection at end as a junior when he led the "Small Schools" with 51 receptions for 766 yards. c, he cleared 6-foot-7 as a high jumper.

accepted a basketball scholarship to Ohio State where he was a four-year letterman and one of three seniors featured on the cover of the 1984-J Media Guide. He was a full-time starter as a senior and part-time regular as a junior.



He was selected first team Class B All-State as well as co-captain of the All-Valley "Small "team. He also started for West Virginia's winning team over Ohio in the annual Ohio-West Virginia All-Star Game. He was accorded National nerican High School Team honors.

John 'Zip' Behen (Cambridge High School, Class of 1918). The former Bobcat was one of the first 1,000-point scorers in Ohio, and Ohio Valle history. He finished his four-year high school career with 1,271 points, which still ranks fifth on the all-time Bobcat scoring charts.

In his senior season, Behen rewrote school and Ohio Valley records by scoring 68 points against Woodsfield. The mark remains as the Bobcats' sing school record and was the standard for Ohio Valley schools until Yorkville's Ken Alessi, a charter member of the OVAC Hall of Fame, broke the record points in 1949 versus Shadyside.

Behen wound up with 454 points as a senior while leading the Bobcats to a second straight 18-2 record,

As a junior, he scored 386 points. His sophomore total for a 10-10 record team was 302 points. He started his career as a freshman with 129 points fo record squad. During his four-year career, the Bobcats posted a combined 62-16 record.

Behen played one season at West Virginia University, lettering as a freshman forward and scoring 123 points for an 8.2 per game average.

In 2007, Cambridge High School retired Behen's jersey number 18.

Ken Cunningham (East Liverpool High School, Class of 1961). A three-sport Potter athlete, he earned All-Ohio honors in basketball and foot was the Ohio High School Basketball Player of the Year selection for 1960-61 by The Associated Press, the only Potter ever accorded the honor. He a selected to the Scholastic Coach All-American team.

During his prep career, Cunningham became the Potters' all-time leading scorer in basketball, including a school-record 41 points in a game while scor season points for a 24-point per game average. He also led the Potters in scoring as a sophomore and junior. In football, he was a quarterback-defensive back and earned All-Ohio and team Most Valuable Player honors in 1960 while also being honored on the All-

Ohio and All-County selections. He also played three baseball seasons for the Potters.

He accepted a basketball scholarship to the 1961 NCAA national champion University of Cincinnati and the Bearcats repeated as titlist in 1962 when h freshman. As a sophomore on the varsity, Cincinnati went 26-2 and finished as NCAA runner-up to Loyola-Chicago.

Cunningham led the Bearcats in assists as a junior and the three-year letterman was elected team captain as a senior.

He later returned to Cincinnati as an assistant coach and was head coach at Akron University for three seasons before leaving the coaching ranks. He ei resides in Stow, Ohio.

Russell 'Tuss' Edwards (Martins Ferry High School, Class of 1923). He was an honored, record-setting Purple Rider athlete who served captain of football, basketball and baseball as a senior. He was an All-Valley halfback as a senior after two years as an All-Valley end. In his senior sec set record which was listed as an Ohio Valley record for several years. He scored 56 points on eight touchdowns plus eight conversion kicks in an 81-0 b of Coshocton.

Edwards enrollod at Washington & Jefferson College, then a "major college" football power under coach John Heisman, for whom the Heisman Tr named. He played his final three years as a regular end for coaches Allie Miller and Andy Kerr. As a senior, he was All-East and earned some second te America honors.

After rejecting an offer to play pro football with the Philadelphia Yellow Jackets, he returned to the Ohio Valley to coach high school at Adena, Warwe Linsly, At Adena, his 1927 football team went 10-0, the girls' basketball team was 18-0 and the boys' hoop team had a winning season. He coached OVAC L honoree Jim (Monk) Moscrip, a Stanford University All-American who started in three Rose Bowls, at Adena. His 1930 Linsty boys' basketball team took

record to Chicago to compete in the National Scholastic Basketball Tournament. The Cadets won two games before bowing in the quarterfinals. He helped found the Wheeling Midget Baseball League in 1950 and served as president from 1953-68. He was named Wheeling Jaycees' Citizen of the 1956. In 1984, he was inducted into the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan Hall of Fame.

Bob Hugh (Scio High School, Class of 1950). The most honored athlete in Scio High history, he set school and Harrison County basketball scoring which remain six decades later. He was the second Eastern Ohio athlete to twice earn first team, five-player Associated Press All-Ohio Class B honors (the f one year earlier by OVAC charter Hall of Famer Ken Alessi of Yorkville). He was the second-leading Ohio Class B scorer both his junior and senior years. He

744 points in 30 games as a junior, second best in Ohio to Alessi. Hugh scored 1.386 points in 55 games for an average of 25 points during his last two sease. The 6-foot-3 forward scored a school, and current Harrison County, record 60 points in a 96-50 win over New Athens. He also scored 50 in an earlie rout of New Athens,

Joel Jones (Weirton Dunbar High School, Class of 1954). The first graduate of a segregated high school to be honored by the OVAC, he was a threefootball standout for the Raiders before competing in the Big Ten Conference as a member of a nationally-ranked Michigan State University team.


At Dunbar, the 6-foot-1, 215-pound Jones was a fullback for Coach Jim Wares from 1950-53 and served as captain of the once-beaten 1953 teams which d the other Ohio Valley segregated school, Lincoln of Wheeling, twice by 28-6 and 19-0. He was the team's leading scorer and ground-gainer his fast two s and was a multiple-year all-star.

In an era when many college athletic teams were segregated, his talents were noticed by scouts from Penn State, Indiana and West Virginia State, then a n contender in the black college ranks. He enrolled on his own at Michigan State and walked on to the football team. In his four seasons at the school, the S played in two Rose Bowl games including the 17-14 win over UCLA on Jan. 1, 1956 with Jones at defensive end. He lettered two seasons and played gai tackle in the fall of 1956 when he earned some all-star recognition,

The Spartans were 9-1 in 1955 and 7-2 in 1956 with Jones in the lineup.

After college, he remained in Michigan, where he currently resides, as a high school educator and was a counselor at Henry Ford High School in Detro

He played the 1949 season before returning to the Ohio Valley to be a player-coach with the local professional team, the Wheeling Blues, from in the Tri-State Pro Basketball League. He then served as basketball coach from 1952-54 at St. John Central High School in Bellaire and guided to a 16-6 record in his first season. He relocated to Florida where he passed away in 2006.

Wood (Magnolia High School, Class of 1932). This triple-threat football player is the only Blue Eagle athlete selected as captain of the All-West one-class honor roll picked from 1917-47 before class selections started in 1948. This is comparable to the current Kennedy Award given to the iver of the Year.

yed quarterback, running back, defensive back, drop-kick placekicker and punter as a 5-11, 165-pound three-year standout. He was shifted from back as a sophomore and junior to quarterback as a senior and led the Blue Eagles to a 7-3 record while playing mostly larger schools. One of the as 14-6 to overall state champion Benwood Union, which selected Wood to its All-Opponent Team.

also was a two-year basketball team captain and a standout tennis player in summer tournaments.



Cathy Clark Borich (Fort Frye High School, Class of 1986). She is the all-time leading career scorer at one of the area's top roundball programs. The four-year performer scored 1.598 points during a consistent career with 180, 444, 479 and 495 points in each of her seasons. She also charted 430 career rebounds and 265 career assists.

After earning All-Ohio Division III mention as a junior, she was tabbed first team All Ohio as a senior and was District 12 D-III Player of the Year. She was a three-time All-Pioneer Valley Conference honoree and twice first team All-Eastern District and District 12

After her senior year, she played in both the Ohio North-South All-Star Game and the District 12 All-Star Game.

The Lady Cadets were 69-32 in her four seasons with four section titles and two Pioneer Valley Conference crowns,

As good as she was in high school, she may have been better in college,

At Marietta College, she not only set the school scoring record but also the all-time Ohio Athletic Conference standard of 2,311 points.

The four-time first team All-OAC honoree was selected a first team NCAA Division III All-American as a senior and was the OAC Player of the Year her final two seasons while serving as Pioneer team captain.

After her senior season, she was accorded the OAC's highest honor, the Clyde Lamb Scholarship, and the Marietta College Betty Cleland Award,

She currently holds six Marietta College records. Besides the career point mark, she set standards for game scoring (42), season scoring (636), career goals (939), career goal attempts (1.918), free throws made in a game (18), season assists (209) and career assists (501).

She has been inducted into three Halls of Fame --- Marietta College, Mid-Ohio Valley Sports and the District 12 Basketball Coaches Hall,

Hutchinson (Junior) Hart (Irondale High School, Class of 1944). The 5-foot-8, 160-pounder was a two-sport prep standout in basketball and football for this tiny school in northern Jefferson County.

As a senior, he earned first team, five-player All-Ohio Class B honors in basketball when only two classes (Class A & B) were selected. The Class A first unit included OVAC Hall of Famer Alex Groza of Martins Ferry.

Hart scored 350 points as a senior including several 20-30 point games and also was cited for his defensive play. A highlight was during the Jefferson County Tournament when Irondale upset Yorkville, the defending Ohio Class B champion, by 64-41 as Hart nearly matched the entire Ductillite team with a rare at the time 40 points on 16 goals and eight free throws,

In football. Hart was a mercury-heeled running back whose forte was speed.

Hart enrolled at Delaware State University where he competed in football, basketball and track. In 1986, he was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame.

After college, he served in the U.S. Navy and was a high school teacher/coach for several years in Mound Bayou, Miss., and then taught and coached in Dover. Delaware at William Henry Comprehensive High School (the only black high school in the county) and at Dover High School. He passed away at age 69 on May 21, 1995 at his home in Felton, Delaware.

Irondale became part of the Stanton Local consolidation which is now part of the Edison schools.

Brian Hesson (Caldwell High School, Class of 1993). He was a major cog in the Redskins' running dynasty of the 1980s and 1990s, helping Caldwell win Ohio state cross country championships in 1990, '91 and '91, graduating one year before his school joined the OVAC.

The distance runner captured three state titles in cross country and five in track ---two each in the 3,200 meters and 1,600 meters plus one as a member of a 3,200-meter relay unit. All told, he was a 17-time All-Ohion in the two sports

After placing sixth in the Ohio cross country meet as a freshman, he won the title trifecta with times of 15:35, 15:30 and 15:20 in his final three years.

A four-time All-Ohioan in cross country, he was cited as a three-time prep All-American. He competed in the Foot Locker National Cross Country championships three times, placing 15th, 3rd and 8th. He also was a member of the 1994 Junior National Team.

Recruited to run cross country and track by the University of Alabama, h a four-letterman in both indoor and outdoor track. He earned All-Sou Conference honors three times and competed in three NCAA Track Champ

He scored in three events in the 1997 SFC Championship Meet - runnin in the 10K on Friday, a 9:19 in the Steeplechase on Saturday, and 14:31 in Sunday, He was honored by the University of Alabama with the Career Act Award in 1998.

Hesson has been inducted into the Ohio Track & Cross Country Coache Fame and the Mid-Ohio Valley Sports Hall of Fame.

Mott's total also bettered the Ohio Va dard of 2.077 points set by charter OVAC Hall of Famer Ken Alessi of Yorky 1947-49. His career total currently ranks 15th on the all-time W.Va. charts 10 in Ohio Valley annals. Mott held the W Va. career record until 1958 and Valley standard until 1959.

As a prep senior, he scored 693 points in 21 games. In his junior year, he aver points including a school-record 51 points in a 127-58 win over Wallace. The 1 set a state standard which lasted two weeks before Wheeling outscored Weir, 14 Madison Gym in a game which set a then-national record total of 256 points.

Mott's senior average of 33.0 ranked third in the OV behind OVAC Hall Henry Josefczyk of Yorkville (42.2) and Legends honoree Jack Thayer Cumberland (33.95) and was ahead of two OVAC Hall of Famers — Lee P Bellaire (32.9) and Ron "Cy" Godfrey of Martins Ferry (32.4). He earned his nost fame in basketball as a senior when he scored 679 poi games for a school-record 33.95 average which ranked No. 2 in both the Ohio Valley. The top OV mark was 42.2 by OVAC Hall of Famer Henry J of Yorkville and the leading W.Va. average was 34.3 by the legendary Jerry Jone Dark East Bank.

Thayer scored 56, 58 and 53 points in three straight late-season wins over l Cameron and Follansbee St. Anthony. That gave him a remarkable 167 point: games and 114 in back-to-back outings. He also had other games of 52, 45 41 twice.

In football, he played for W.Va. in the annual W.Va. Ohio All-Star game recruited by West Virginia University as an invited-walk-on candidate.

At WVU, he was one of two regular quarterbacks on a freshman team which five games. After his freshman year, he left school to join the U.S. Army an armed service football before being discharged in 1961



George Cheroke (Shadyside High School, Class of 1940). He was a football and wrestling standout for the Tigers, which produced the area's first wrestlin under coach Art Kirkland. The four-year grappler won the one-class Ohio heavyweight title in 1940 after capturing the 1939 crown at 165 pounds. As a sopl he placed third at 154 pounds. The Tigers placed second to Cleveland John Hay, 21-20, for 1940 team laurels after Shadyside defeated John Hay in a dual meet e Cheroke, nicknamed Chief, also was a stellar 5-foot-9, 185-pound football guard. The three-year gridder and two-time team captain earned All-Valley honors a way standout. The Tigers went 9-1 and 7-2-1 during his final two seasons.

He enrolled at Ohio State University to compete in both football and wrestling. Playing for coach Paul Brown on 6-1-1 record team, the sophomore moved into lineup in fifth game after a teammate's injury. He left OSU before 1942 season to serve in the Air Force during World War II.

After his discharge in 1946, he again opted to play for Paul Brown, who was starting the Cleveland Browns in the first year of the All-American Conference. (played in 12 games for the 13-2 record Browns, who defeated New York, 14-9 in the championship game. After one season, he re-enlisted in the Army for a 20-yea retiring in 1965 to enter business in California. He passed away in 1986. Harry Diehl (Mt. Morris, Pa. High School, Class of 1952). When he joined the Stanton High athletic program in 1960 as head basketball coach and assistan

there was no track program, so he guided the 1961 and 1962 basketball teams to unbeaten regular seasons and overall 19-1 and 23-1 records.

In 1963, without a home track, he started the Stanton boys' track program and competed in the Indian League at Mingo. Four years later, the first all-weather the Ohio Valley was installed at Stanton and the Indian League moved its meets from the Mingo ender track to Stanton. Diehl's teams then reeled off 75 consecut meet wins, reportedly an Ohio Valley record, from 1967-76 as Stanton fielded one of the most dominant small school track programs in the area. Other teams in the League included Mingo, Jefferson Union, Toronto, Cadiz, Springfield, United Local and Beaver Local.

Stanton won multiple Ohio district titles, two Class A regional crowns and competed in state events. While no first places were recorded, sophomore sprin Haught, who signed a University of Alabama football scholarship, posted the state's fastest 440-yard Class A time in 1970 before placing second at the state meet Hall of Famer Blaine Rose also competed for Diehl, who ran track and cross country at West Virginia U.

Stanton joined the OVAC in 1981 and Diehl's teams won Class A titles in 1983 and 1986, his final year at the helm.

Diehl also served as an assistant football coach including the 9-0 record 1966 team with head coach Glenn Trout.

Dichl received several awards before retiring in 1986, including the second Robert McKelvey Award from the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dans in 1976 and Giffin Award from the OVAC in 1993.

He resides in Boynton Beach, Fla.

Frank Gilliam (Steubenville High School, Class of 1952). He, and charter OVAC Legend honoree Calvin Jones, led Big Red to its most successful football-be ketball year (1951-52) in history. The court team is the winningest (28-1) in Big Red history with an unbeaten regular season followed by eight post-season wins ir largest Class A sectional, district and regional tournaments plus wins over Toledo Central Catholic and Akron North in the state event. Big Red bowed to Mide 63-53, in the finals, Gilliam was team captain,

The 1951 Big Red football team went 9-1, losing only to Massillon (13-6) and routing Canton McKinley (63-6) before being ranked No. 2 behind Massillon in t AP state poll.

Gilliam, nicknamed Shag, was a two-way end who earned third team largest class All-Ohio plus All-Eastern Ohio and All-Valley honors. He played in the W/V All-Star Game.

He lettered three years in basketball and two each in football and baseball. The baseball team went 16-3 his junior year.

The University of Iowa recruited Jones, Gilliam and running back Eddie Vincent and the threesome were called the "Steubenville Trio" by Iowa media. Gilli a three-year starter at end including a sophomore season when the Hawkeyes tied Notre Dame, 14-14, and ranked No. 9 nationally. He sat out the 1955 seasor broken leg and returned in 1956 as Iowa went 9-1 to win the Big Ten title and a first-ever trip to the Rose Bowl, beating Oregon State, 35-19. Gilliam was Alland second team All-American.

In 1989, for Iowa's 100th football anniversary fete, fans selected Gilliam (and Jones) to an All-Time Iowa team.

Gilliam was drafted in the seventh NFL round by the Green Bay Packers, but opted to follow Jones to the Canadian Football League. He played three seasons at W before becoming an assistant coach (1966-70) at Iowa. He then joined the Minnesota Vikings for a 36-year career in scouting and personnel. He resides in Windermere, Fla.

Tom Harp (Barnesville High School, Class of 1945). A Shamrock football and basketball standout and college athlete who later made his mark in the coaching A four-year quarterback and fullback in football, he was a three-year basketball standout who helped the Shamrocks to won-lost records of 18-4, 16-6 and F

titles in the East Ohio Athletic League. He was selected All-Conference his last two years. He was recruited by Hall of Fame coach Sid Gillman to play football at Miami of Ohio and lettered as a freshman fullback before he was drafted into military for two years with the Navy,

Returning home in 1948, he enrolled at Muskingum College and played quarterback and fullback on two Ohio Athletic Conference title teams in 1949-50.

After graduation, he turned to coaching and became head coach at Carrollton High from 1951-53 with a 20-6-1 record. He became one of over 100 coaches t for the vacant Massillon Washington High head coaching job and landed the job vacated by Brilliant native Chuck Mather, who compiled a 57-3 record before op University of Kansas job. Harp coached Massillon two years to 17-2-1 record and the state No. 1 and No. 2 rankings by The Associated Press.

He then joined the college ranks as backfield coach at Army before a 15-year stint (1961-77) as head coach at three colleges - Cornell. Duke and Indiana State. TI Army team, led by Heisman Trophy winner Pete Dawkins, was ranked No. 3 in the nation.


Ed Oliver (East Liverpool High School, Class of 1953). Regarded by some veteran Potter observers as the best all-round prep player at the school, he was a sti honoree on both sides of the ball as a three-year regular. The runner, passer, placekicker, punter, linebacker and defensive back was a first team All-Ohio lineback by The AP as a senior after rating second team All-Ohio defensive back honors as a junior. The UPI selected him a first team All-Ohio offensive back as a senior. The Potters went 9-0-1 in 1952 and 8-2 in 1951 as Oliver was the team leading rusher and scorer. The program only produced one previous nine-win season.



After college, he was head football coach for 23 years at three southern W.Va, high schools — Mount Hope, St. Albans and Charleston — with a coaching record 50-7. He also coached the South to a 28-13 win in 1947 in the annual North-South Game. After retirement from the education field in 1973, he became a high school and football official. He was one of 10 charter Magnolia Life Achievement honorees for student-athletes and is inducted into both the W. Va. Sports Hall of Fame an Sports Hall of Fame. He died in 1996.

Guido DeVicchis (Weir High School, Class of 1942). The 5-foot-8 sparkplug was one of the most celebrated Red Rider football-basketball athletes in the pre era. Playing for OVAC Hall of Fame Legend coach Carl Hamill, he earned all-class All-State in both sports as a junior and senior as well as All-Valley in football, t All-OV sport honors at the time.

In basketball, he set a school career point record of 1,169 points in four seasons during a low-scoring era. The mark lasted 22 years before broken by OVAC charter Famer Ron (Fritz) Williams. He averaged 19 points a game as a senior when he was named to the eight-player, all-class All-State team as the Red Riders finished W. V A runner-up to Fairmont Senior (38-37). He was a repeat all-tournament selection. As a junior, the guard was picked on the second all-class All-State unit as the Rec (21-4) won the regional title before beating Woodrow Wilson in the state Class A tourney and bowing to Huntington East.

In football, the running back was a second unit, all-class All-State honoree as a senior when he scored a Rider-best 17 TDs for a 9-1 record team which lost only to M (Ohio), 6-0. In a 32-0 blanking of Clairton, Pa., he returned a punt 95 yards to score. He played on three Rider teams (1939-41) with records of 9-1, 7-2 and 9-2 cor against a top-flight tri-state schedule. He opted to play football at West Virginia U, and lettered on the 1946 Mountaineer team. He died in 1996.

Nicknamed "Stash" and "Lefty", the southpaw was a four-year regular first baseman-pitcher in baseball and the top player on the 27-4 record ba team which advanced to Ohio's largest class tournament semifinals before bowing to eventual champion Newark after defeating Cleveland Holy Name and Bowling for OVAC Hall of Fame Legend coach Floyd Baker.

After going 18-3 in regular season play in the old Ohio Valley Athletic Association — the predecessor to the OVAC — the Bulldogs went 9-1 in post-season play to a the farthest in school history at the time. He was team captain and earned All-State Tournament honors as a guard. Post-season victims included Steubenville, East Liv Shadyside, Toronto and Carrollton, Goletz also starred as a junior on a 20-5 record team.

In baseball, as a senior, he pitched two no-hit, no-run games in one week during the Eastern Ohio regional tournament to advance to the state largest Class A eve Bulldogs then defeated Toledo Libby, 5-4, in the first round before bowing, 5-4, to Columbus Aquinas in the semifinals.

After high school, he enrolled at Ohio State and played four seasons of baseball while being scout by several pro teams in the pre-draft era. Playing outfield/pitcher for Oklahoma City in 1941, he hit, 300 in 59 games and was 1 a pitcher before being called up by the Chicago White Sox. He played in five games as a pinch-hitter and had three hits in five at bats in the mid-1950s. He died in 1 in the U.S. Army and upon release in 1945, he returned to minor league baseball as a pitcher, first baseman, outfielder and manager until the mid-1950s. He died in 1

He won league Coach of the Year honors six times; won District 12 honors in 1974 plus Eastern District Coach of the Year in 1969 and 1981, the year he c in the OVAC All-Star game. In 1994, he earned the Earl Haberhield OVAC Basketball Coaches Award.

Besides coaching boys basketball, he served as Athletic Director at Newport from 1960-67 and at Frontier from 1968-81. In his first coaching job — girls basketbal Missouri teams went 79-29. At Newport, he also coached the baseball team for 12 seasons with a 97-57 mark and four league, three sectional and one district title. The team advanced to the regional finals.

He graduated from Salem (W.Va.) College where he was captain and co-captain of the baskethall and baseball teams and selected as the Outstanding Senior Athlete In 1999, he was inducted into the Mid-Ohio Valley Athletic Hall of Fame and the Frontier High School Gymnasium was named the Hank Morus Gymnasium and an Hank Morus Athletic Scholarship was started for senior male and female student-athletes. He also is inducted in the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Hall of Fa the District 12 charter Basketball Coaches Hall. He died in 1998.

Steve Swisher (Parkersburg South High School, Class of 1969). South's first honoree was a three-sport Patriot all-stater during the first two years of the school whon to an honored college baseball career before playing nine seasons in the major leagues. He was a sophomore starter at football end for Parkersburg High before opened its doors and he became the school's first major multi-sport athlete. He also was a shortstop for a state championship Parkersburg Post 15 American Legion te

In two years at South, he was an all-class, all-state baseball shortstop, a second team all-stater as a basketball forward: and an all-state mention as a football end. In ty sons of basketball, he scored 1.077 points and converted all 20 free throws in one game with a high point output of 33 points. Baseball was his future, however, as he ac a scholarship to Ohio University, which advanced to the College World Series in his freshman season. That team featured Baseball Hall of Famer Mike Schmidt. Bobca Bob Wren converted Swisher to catcher and he became a three-time All-Mid American Conference honoree and an All-America selection as a senior.

He became the Bobcats' first Major League draft pick in the first round — and the first from West Virginia — as the 21st overall choice by the Chicago White Sox in Traded to the crosstown Chicago Cubs, he competed for the National League team from 1974-77 before playing with the St. Louis Cardinals from 1978-80 and the Sar Padres from 1981-82. He was the Cubs' representative in the 1976 All-Star Game. After his playing days, he became a minor league manager from 1985-93 and 199 2005 and major league coach. He won three minor league championships in the Cleveland Indians and New York Mets' organizations and was the Mets' bullpen coact 1994-96. He was a charter inductee into the Mid-Ohio Valley Sports Hall of Fame in 1998.
