All-Star Squads To Don Pads In Practice Today

All 25 members of the West Virginia squad and 20 of the Ohio gridders checked in at their West Liberty State college quarters late yesterday evening and will don pads this morning in the first practice session which will be culminated by the 10th All-Star football game at Island Stadium on Friday, August 22.

Princeton's Charley Caldwell huddled with his Ohio charges immediately after the evening meal, but the West Virginia squad was still awaiting the arrival of Tommy Mont and Warren Geise, Maryland assistants who will handle the Mountaineer eleven until Head Coach Jim Tatum arrives Saturday from the College All-Star-Los Angeles Rams game in Chicago.

The two Terp aides left College Park, Md., at noon yesterday and were expected to arrive late last night in time for the first drills at 9 o'clock this morning. Practice sessions are also booked for 3 o'clock this afternoon and they will continue on a twice-a-day basis until the middle of next week.

CALDWELL, the great record coach of Princeton's Tigers, said he will have his Ohioans in pads for this morning's initial session and it is expected that Geise and Mont will follow suit with their West Virginia proteges.

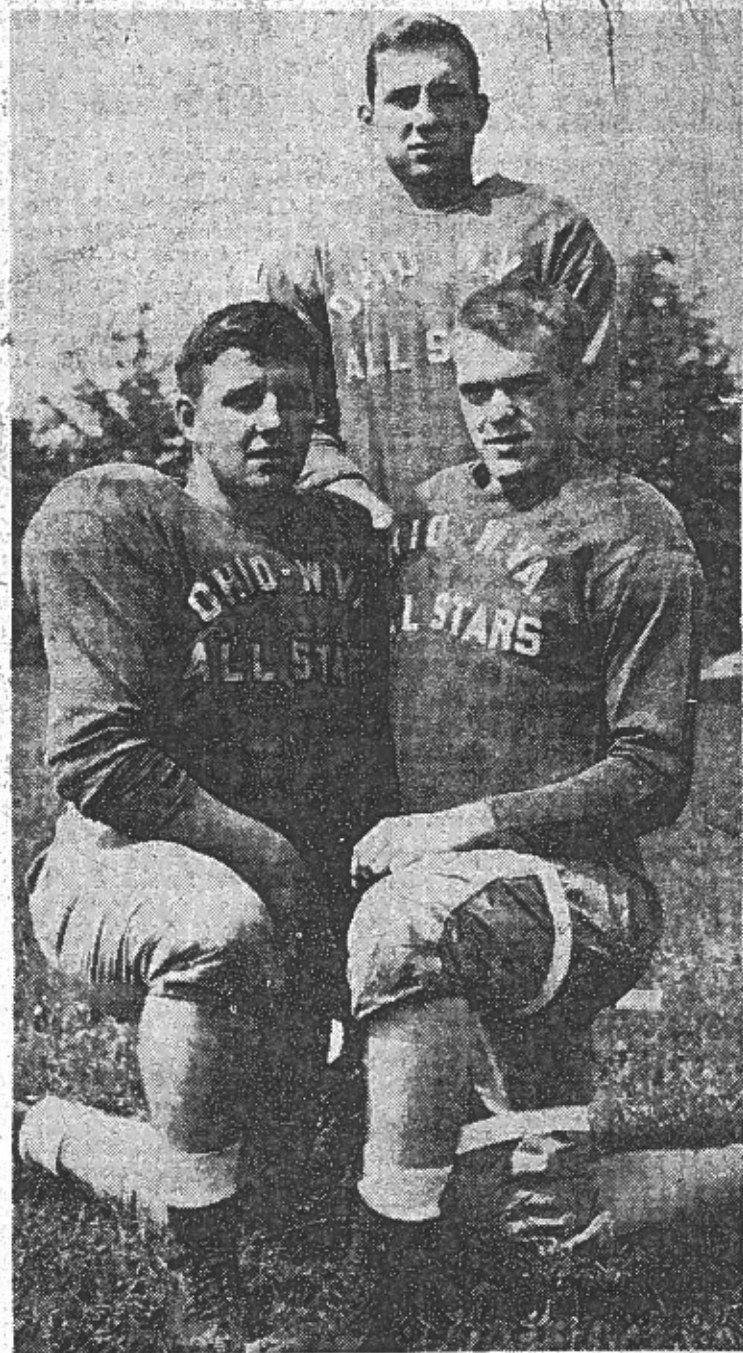
First day practice will consist largely of speed tests and calisthenics before the coaching staffs begin pounding their pet plays into the heads of their Valley stars.

Ohio had five absentees as the squads checked into camp yesterday and they reportedly were Jim Bittenge of Shadyside, Clair Evans of St. Clairsville, Jack Slenska of Dillonvale, one boy from Bellaire St. John's and one from Steubenville. All five are expected to check in early this morning.

The two squads left Wheeling High school at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon and arrived at the West Liberty base of operations in time for the evening meal.

And did those gridders gobble it down. If their appetites pick up (and they will after a good day's work) Game Director Bob Roe had better double the food budget. Yesterday's menu consisted of pork chops, dressing, green beans, Spanish rice, muffins, iced tea and ice cream.

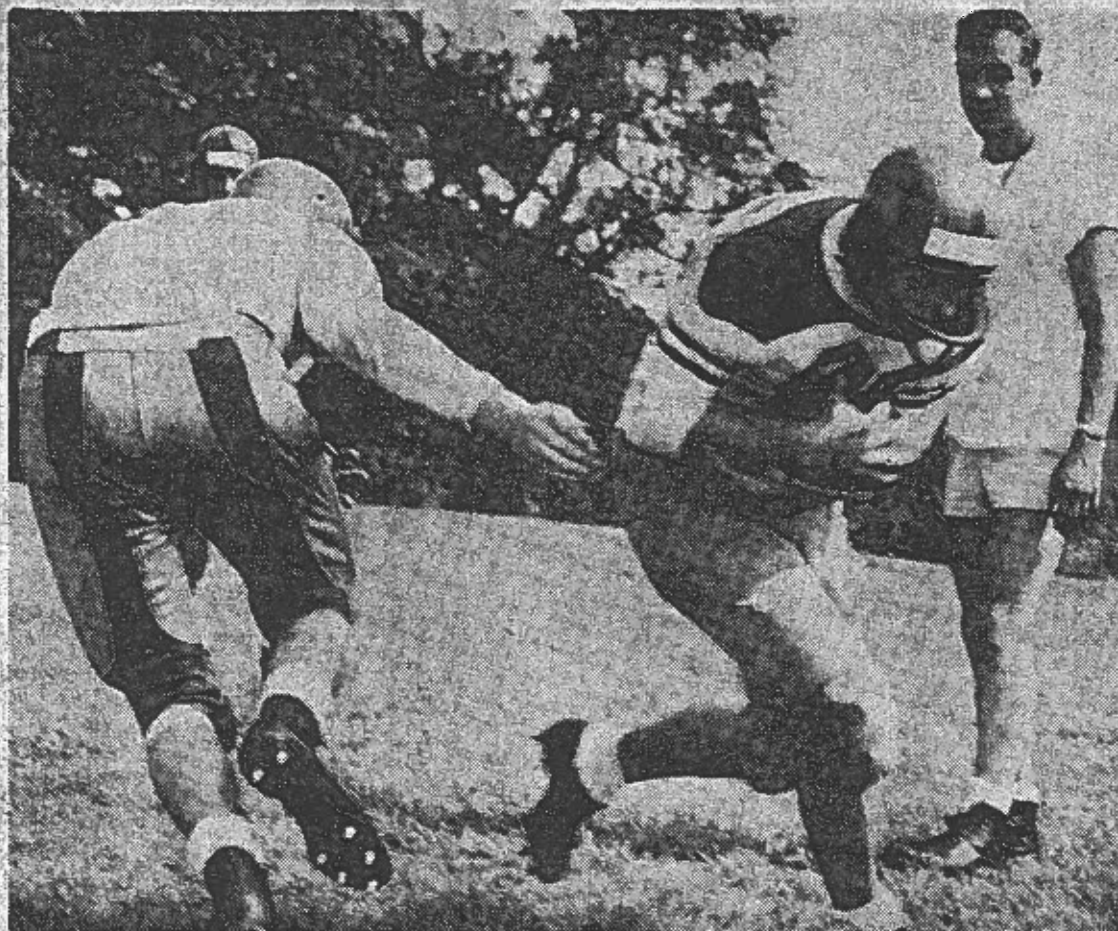
Former Cadets Turn All-Stars

26 to 19 Victory

Ohioan Steps Out of Bounds on 11-Yard Stripe

Paul Kramer Tallies Three TDs for Losers

The Buckeyes were just too tough for the Mountaineers to crack as they blasted out a comeback, 26 to 19, victory in the Tenth Annual All-Star game last night at the Island Stadium.

A crowd of 9,000 fans were brought to their feet by a blistering last period 20-point rally by the Ohioans that turned apparent defeat into victory. Trailing, 6-13, Ohio punched out a 20-13 lead before the Mountaineers picked up their final touchdown.

It was the third straight win for the Ohioans and their sixth victory against four defeats in the annual All-Star classic that wakes up Ole Man Football from his long off-season nap.

A pair of lightning footed halfbacks from Wintersville high, Steve Drazich and Lee Carney spearheaded the Buckeyes' fourth period spurt. Drazich blasted his

Paul Kramer Wins 'Star' Grid Award

Paul Kramer, the big six-foot-two right end of Union high school, was voted the 'Star of Stars' player following last night's Ohio-West Virginia All-Star game, won by Ohio 26-19, at the Island Stadium.

Kramer was the unanimous choice for the award by virtue of his scoring all three West Virginia touchdowns on passes from Wheeling's Tom Shively, and an extra point on a pass from John Simms of Moundsville.

He was presented with the 'Star of Stars' trophy by Miss Nancy Lee Ricker of Martins Ferry, Ohio, the Hub's Teen Queen.

way to touchdowns, which Carney scooted around right end for 34 yards and the TD that sewed up the comeback victory.

BIG PAUL KRAMER, of Union high school, the game's outstanding player, stole the spotlight by snatching three Tom Shively passes to account for West Virginia's three touchdowns. He also pulled in a pass from Moundsville's John Simms for an extra point in the second stanza to rack up all 19 of the Mountaineers' points.

Ohio started out like it was going to roll over the Mountaineers by reeling off a 38-yard touchdown drive that saw Bellaire's Bill Thomas batter his way to paydirt from the one-yard line.

The Ohio TD drive started after Drazich returned a Simms' punt from his own 48 to the Mountaineer 38. Ed Vincent, of Steubenville, a fleet-footed back went off right guard for seven yards to the 31, from where Drazich dashed off right tackle for 20 yards to the 11. Vincent got seven at left end before going out of bounds on the two. Drazich got a yard in two tries and then Thomas scored.

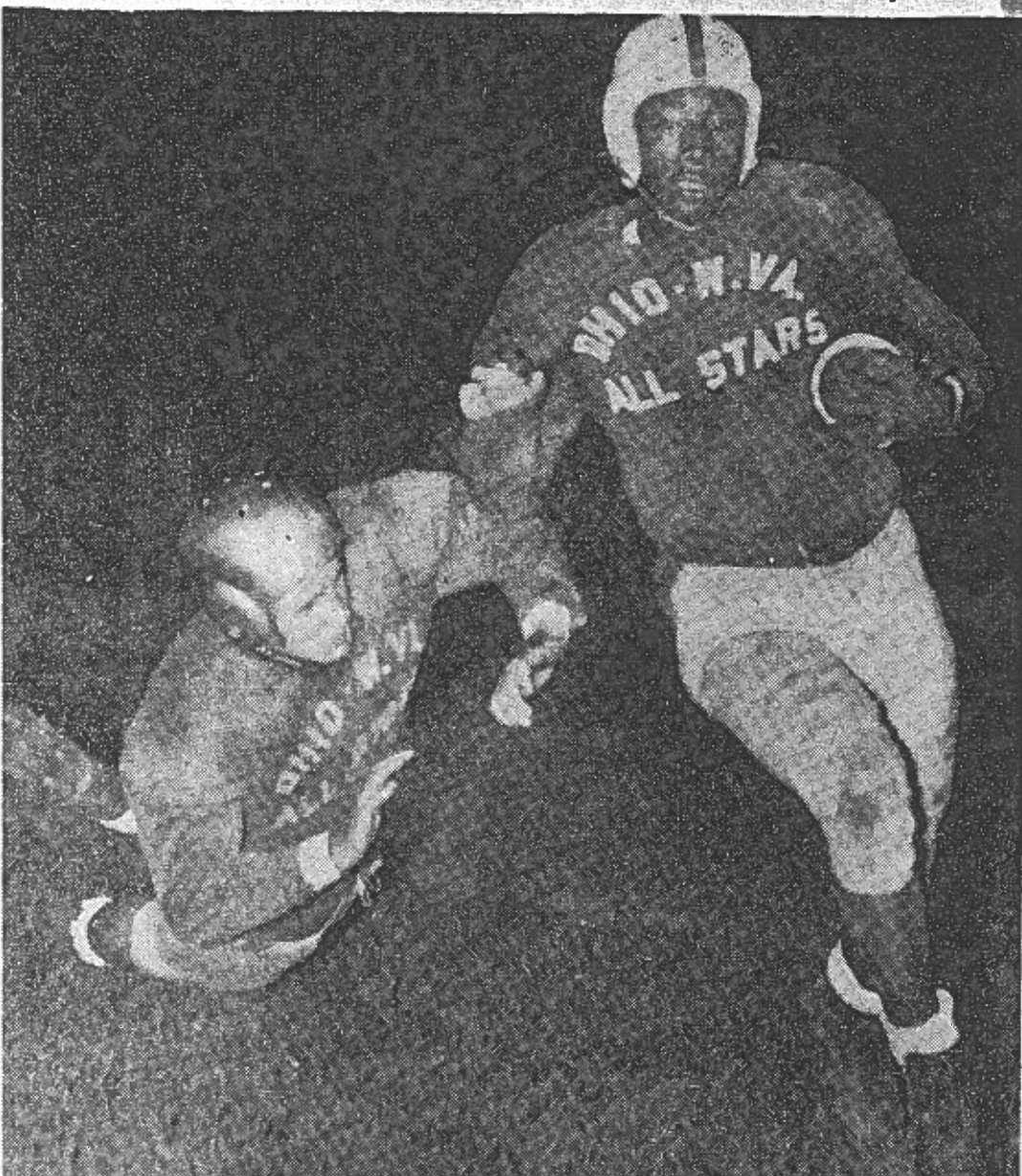
WEST VIRGINIA then came to life to score a touchdown in the second period and gain a 6-6 half-time tie. West Virginia drove 85 yards for its first touchdown, the last 45 yards of which were covered by Shively's 35-yard pass to Kramer who took the ball in on the ten and raced to paydirt.

The Shively-Kramer aerial team clicked for another touchdown in the third period and sent West Virginia ahead, 13-6. Kramer went deep into Ohio territory to snap a Shively pass that covered 38-yards and resulted in a visit to touchdown lane.

The touchdown play was setup when Shively covered a fumble by Thomas on the Ohio 38. Thomas attempting to pull in a 30-yard punt by Simms fumbled the ball and Shively pounced on it, as it bounded back up field. The Mountaineers failed to kick the extra point, but Ohio was penalized for offsides. Then Simms tossed a pass for Kramer for the point.

WEST VIRGINIA'S final touchdown came on a 66-yard pass play with Shively pitching and Kramer catching. Kramer caught the ball with a short leap on the Ohio 35 and kept on travelling to paydirt. Prior to the Mountaineers' final

Ohioans Rule TD Choice on Island Tonight

10,000 May View Star Fray

With glamour as a new and not displeasing innovation, the football bruisers will be back at Wheeling Stadium tonight. Attired in the all-star regalia that denotes the valley's 10th grid-iron spectacle between Eastern Ohio's stars and West Virginia's like stalwarts, the game figures to draw 10,000 or more fans to the Island park.

The kick-off, billed for 8:30 o'clock, finds one bit of glamour restored to the game in that the rival squads will be directed by two of last fall's standout college mentors. But whether Charley Caldwell, who has given Princeton university two unbeaten teams, can repeat his 1949 all-star win is a moot point.

Jim Tatum, U. of Maryland's split-T exponent, will be opposing Caldwell tonight and Tatum's charges, the Virginia all-stars go into their first Ohio valley battle sans their traditional offensive maneuver—the single wing.

Tatum matched Caldwell's

1951 season with his Terps, sending them on to score a stunning Sugar Bowl conquest of Tennessee in a post-season appearance that capped the Maryland campaign.

But football experts recognize the undeniable fact that manpower makes the football system and tonight it will be a question of whether single-winger Caldwell, who beat Ohio by a touchdown in 1949, can take the current Buckeyes and repeat the feat against Tatum's Mountain-eer troupe.

The Ohioans, by virtue of their successive victories of 1950 and 1951, for the first time lead in victories, five to four. Not once have the two rivals played to a stalemate and it is not likely that tonight will be an exception.

The Buckeyes, fortified by standouts of the strong teams which represented Steubenville Big Red and Bellaire St. John high in 1951, rule one touchdown favorites. It is possible that the lines may make the difference although West Virginia

can throw a defensive combine averaging 198 pounds against the Buck offensive forwards, who scale 189. Ohio's defensive line averages 190 to the West Virginia offensive rushers' 185.

Fresh new glamour will be imparted to tonight's presentation when, at half-time, the winner of the Queen of Queens contest will be revealed in dramatic fashion. The 16 senior high school girls who vied for the honor on Tuesday night at Oglebay park will make their stadium entrance at 7:45 o'clock but not until tonight will Chairman Budd Haberstick scan the judges' score sheets to ascertain the victor.

Four high school bands will engage in massed drill evolutions during the half-time ceremonies, the collaborating directors fitting together their respective units as in a mammoth jigsaw puzzle. The participating bands are from Bellaire high, Warwood, Moundsville and Shadyside.

Caldwell is expected to call upon an offensive line of Eli

Pilya, Steubenville and Bill Collmar, the game captain from St. John's, at ends; Tiny Linn and Bob Yohn, both Steubenville, tackles; Harry Karanthasis of Martins Ferry and Tom Jenkins, Liverpool, guards; Wilson Adams, Bridgeport, center, and a backfield quartet of Bellaire's Bill Thomas, left half, Eddie Vincent of Steubenville, right half, Steve Drazich, Wintersville, fullback and Charley Hanlon, Barnesville, quarter.

For West Virginia, Tatum will hand the split-T helm to Tom Shively, Wheeling high, with John Simms, Moundsville, and Bob Bringman, Wheeling, at the halves. Hugh Stobbs, Linsly, is slated to start at fullback.

Fronting this foursome will be the offensive line of Wellsburg's Dave Hercules and Paul Donahie, Wheeling Central, ends; Ernie Galloway, team captain from Warwood and Joe Hovel, Moundsville, tackles; Gary Philabaum, Triadelphia and Stan Barezinsky, Follansbee, guards and Dick Tracy, Warwood, at center.

Both coaches will vary their platoons on defense and to all appearances, as the rival squads approach their mass movement into Wheeling from the West Liberty State training camps, every member of the two 25-player squads but Allen Rieck, West Virginia's end from Wheeling high, will see action. Rieck has been sidelined with an ankle injury of this week.

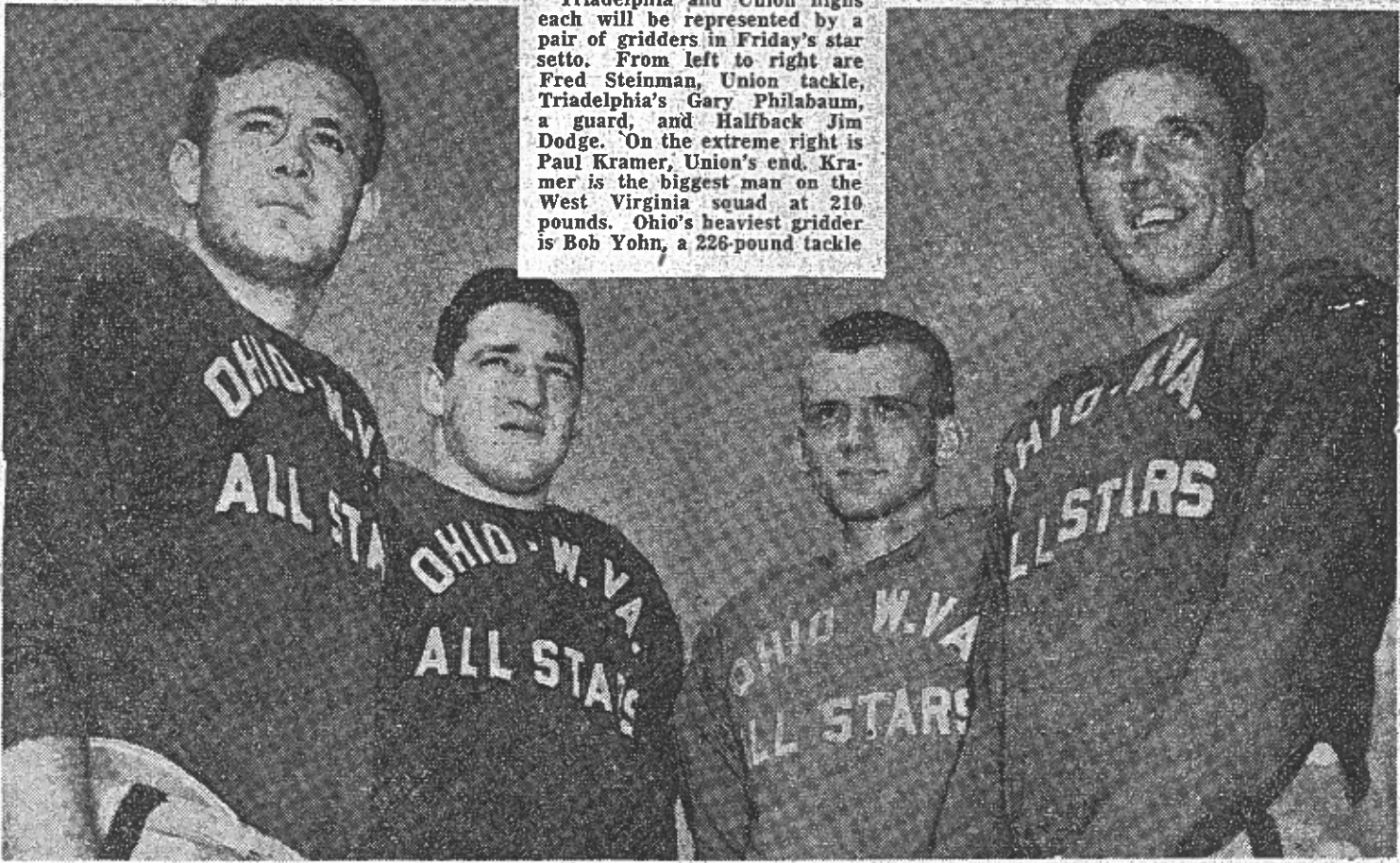
