Many of the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference's top athletes will be showcased this weekend on two fronts.

On Saturday, it's the 7th Annual OVAC Basketball Classic with a four-game format at the Wheeling College Fieldhouse.

A matinee twin bill featuring the valley's top girls' hoopsters unfolds at 1 p.m. with the Ohio and West Virginia AA-A squads squaring off. Immediately following the small schools' tilt, it's the AAAA-AAA contest. The doubleheader featured a split in 1983 as the Lady Buckeyes won the AA-A affair, 82-29, while West Virginia, behind prep All-American Amy Gamble, captured the big school battle, 50-45.

The above format will be followed in boys' action beginning at 6 o'clock with small school squads vying preceding the big school confrontation at 8.

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Ohio will be bidding for another sweep in boys' competition. The Bucks were 83-72 victors in the small school skirmish a year ago while Martins Ferry's Chuck Allen drilled a sudden death two-pointer as the Ohioans prevailed, 80-78, in the AAAA-AAA tussle.

Fans are reminded that the afternoon-evening twin bills are split sessions with tickets priced at \$3.00 per session.

On Sunday, the Brookside diamond plays host to the third Ohio-West Virginia All-Star Baseball-Softball Games.

Both contests will be nine innings in duration with the softball game starting at 1 p.m. Baseball action begins with the first pitch at 4.

Admission at the gate is \$2 for adults and \$1 for students. One ticket is good for both games.

The dean of Ohio Valley girls' basketball coaches is calling it a career after 17 illustrious seasons.

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RECIPIENTS of scholarships provided by the Ohio Valley Basketball Coaches Association and the OVAC were Bob Mroczkowski of Bridgeport and Ann Osborne of St. Clairsville. They received the scholarship awards from Gene Ammirante, head basketball coach at Bellaire High and director of the OVAC Cage Classic held at Wheeling College Saturday. Mroczkowski will attend Wheeling College while Osborna in head of the Ovac Cage.

And in Saturday afternoon's OVAC Basketball Classic. Ohio's 60-43 victory over West Virginia made it 280 career wins for the Red Devils' mentor.

In the small-school contest, Ohio staged a frantic fourth quarter rally to pull out a 44-43 decision over the Lady Mountaineers.

HESS WAS ecstatic after guiding the Buckeyes to victory. "It was a terrific experience to be able to work with such a fine group of young ladies," she said following the game.

"This group was rare. They were totally unselfish and extremely hard-working. They played very well together and I feel our quickness made a difference."

The Lady Bucks broke open a tight game midway through the third quarter and won it going away.

Co-directing the Ohioans was River High's Tom Tisher, who watched former Pilot star Shirley Merckle dazzle the Mounties in the first half.

Merckle was all over the court, firing in 13 of her gamehigh 20 points before intermission. Merckle also dished off several fine assists as the Bucks forged into a 29-21 halftime advantage.

West Virginia self-destructed after the break, committing 14 turnovers and connecting on only seven-of-38 field goal attempts. Ohio had opened a 48-30

wheeled-and-dealed for 10 second half counters and the Bucks' also received a superior effort from Martins Ferry's Jill Myers, who crashed the boards and triggered several Ohio fast breaks. Steubenville's Anna Worrels contributed 11 markers.

Ohio was forced to play with only two guards with St. Clairsville ace Ann Osborne sidelined due to injury.

In nearly the same fashion, the Ohio big and small school all-stars continued their domination of the annual OVAC Ohio-West Virginia Basketball Classic by scoring thrilling wins in the seventh annual affair at the Wheeling College Fieldhouse, Saturday night.


A good-sized crowd looked on as the Ohio Class A-AA stars edged the West Virginians, 80-76, in the prelim on the late heroics of the Bridgeport tandem of Bob Mroczkowski and Jim Mayfield and the AAA-AAAA Buckeye unit clinched a tough 79-77 overtime win on a steal and two free throw conversions in the final three seconds by Martin Ferry standout, Ken "Junior" Holmes.

The win was the sixth straight without a loss under the AAA-AAAA format for the Ohloans, while the Buckeyes boosted their small school record to 5-1,

losing in 1979.

period and hold a 46-37 command at the half, only to have the upstart Mountaineers rally with a 21-13 third period outburst that pulled the hosts to within 59-58 entering the final segment.

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In the fourth canto, Mroczkowski put the winners on the board first with a jumper from the corner, but the Mountaineers shocked the Ohioans with a free throw conversion by Tyler's John McGrew, and four straight points by Weirton Madonna's Shawn Vestal to

Shenandoah's Ron Warner sank a charity toss, Mayfield hit on a 15-footer, Vestal countered for the Mountaineers, before Mroczkowski sealed the win with a three-point play with just 10 seconds remaining.

The Ohioans capitalized on five three-point goals, two each by Mayfield and Wellsville's Mark Sheridan and one by Shadyside's Trent Stupak, as they put four players in double figures and all ten players scored.

Aside from Mroczkowski's team-high 17 markers on eight buckets and a free throw, Wellsville's high-jumping Greg Pullie added 14 counters and Mayfield and Sheridan tacked on 14 tallies each.

Gilbert used his agressive play to garner 17 points to team with Schodzinski for team scoring honors. Vestal closed with 16 markers and Sistersville's Chris Beaver finished with 11.

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Ohio canned 32 of 64 shots from the floor, while the West Virginians sank 46 percent of their field attempts, netting 29 of 63

The winners were outrebounded by 32-29 as Mroczkowski hauled down nine to lead the Ohlo squad and McGrew grabbed nine to pace the losers Scoring.

HOLMES DOMINATED action in the first and third frames of the nightcap, but proved to be the deciding factor in overtime. After Wintersville's Rob Lucas sank two free throws with just 22 seconds remaining to put the Ohioans ahead by 77-75, West Virginian seemed to be in line for a game-tying score when a missed Mountaineer shot was knocked out-of-bounds by two Ohio rebounders enabling the hosts to put the ball in play under their own bucket with four seconds remaining.

Kupchak closed his outstanding career with a 22-point game-high effort. Christman closed with 18, including two three-point buckets and Fullum added 12.

The winners sank 49 percent of their shots, meshing 33 of 67 tries, while the Mountaineers connected on 31 of 72 for 43 percent.

Ohio held a 39-32 edge in rebounding with Martins Ferry's Doug Kepreos leading the way with six rebounds and Helms, Lucas, Bragg and Meadowbrook's Trent Roederer grabbing five each. Allison paced the Mountaineers with eight, Scoring:

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
