# Bolock, Dunnigan capture OVAC titles • Zanesville boys, Ferry girls capture overall team crowns

BYESVILLE -- Like a pair of thoroughbreds going postward as the favorites, Cambridge sophomore Ashley Dunigan and Buckeye Local junior Ben Bolock lived up to their billing in the annual Ohio Valley Athletic Conference cross country championships at nearby Meadowbrook High School Saturday.

Dunigan, the defending girls' champion, made it two straight with a convincing victory, while Bolock, the highest returning finisher from last year's meet when he placed sixth, was an equally impressive victor over a well-groomed course that was a bit soft in the early morning from Friday night's

Zanesville, making its conference debut under new head coach Herb Fitzer, won the boys' overall title, while Martins Ferry High's girls ended a three-year Barnesville reign as the girls' overall titlist.

Division team champions in the boys' division are Zanesville, 4-A, Harrison Central, 3-A, Caldwell, 2-A and Shadyside, 1-A. Shadyside entered the meet as the defending overall champion, but had to settle for third overall behind Zanesville and Caldwell.

Division team champions in the girls' division are John Marshall, 4-Martins Ferry, 3-A, Barnesville, 2-A and Shadyside, 1-A.

Barnesville finished fifth overall in girls' team scoring. Ferry had a comfortable margin over secondplace Shadyside, which finished well ahead of third-place John Mar-

Veteran Martins Ferry coach Joe Ellis was pleased with his girls' performances.

"I sent our girls in expecting them to challenge for the overall

team," Ellis said. "We knew that Shadyside and Barnesville are very good, but all of our girls experienced their best day. I'm very

Spearheading the Ferry victory were the performances of junior Mandy Bruney, senior Heather Stewart and sophomore Katrina Jones who finished second through fourth, respectively. Senior Sarah Ellis finished 11th.

"I have a good group of girls." Ellis beamed. "I get them together at the start of practice and tell them what we have to do. I could probably leave because I have enough faith that they would do it. Our two seniors (Ellis and Stewart) and junior co-captain Mandy (Bruney) know how to keep a team together.'

Ellis said he hopes that this is the start of the peaking process for his team. "We'll continue to work hard through the district and then start to taper off. I hope that they will fulfill their potential."

The overall title was the firstever for Ferry High, which had won three division titles previously.

Fitzer made his return to head coaching a successful one. "It was nice to come back and win," said Fitzer, who produced five OVAC track championship teams and four OVAC cross country title teams while at Meadowbrook High,

Zanesville produced third through fifth-place finishers to carry the Blue Devils to the overall ti-

Bolock and Dunigan continued their unbeaten status this season and they did so with opposite strategies.

The Buckeye Local junior said he wanted to "pick it up" after the first mile and a half and was content to stay on the heels of early leader Eric Davy of Zanesville who eventually faded to fifth place.

Bolock said he ran the same course last week in the Meadowbrook Invitational and decided that he wanted someone else to lead the first half of the race.

"I got used to the course last week and I felt I would like to be in position to take off after the first mile and a half," added Bolock, who was also a top 20 finisher (All-OVAC) as a freshman before last year's sixth-place effort. "The course was a little damp and you could feel your feet sink in the soft ground. I would have liked a better time, but I just concentrated on winning."

Bolock toured the 3.1-mile course in 16:31.9 and finished about 10 seconds ahead of Barnesville sophomore Chris Perun, who finished about 10 seconds ahead of the first of the three Zanesville runners who were next

Buckeye Local coach Pete Frye was pleased with the performance of his standout. "Ben's a good kid and I know today's race meant a lot for him. This was his first real chance at a major championship. He was focused in going out and running a good second mile and taking it from there. I could see it in his eyes that he would not be denied.

The boys' varsity race attracted a highly-competitive field of 185 runners.

The diminutive Dunigan had her own idea on how she would run in the conference meet.

'I wanted to take command early and let them chase me," she noted. "That's better than me chasing them.'

Dunigan felt confident that she had the race under control at about the half-way mark.

"I could sort of see from the side

of my eye that I had a pretty good lead," said Dunigan, who also tested the course a week ago in the invitational. "It was a different kind of day. It was more stressful than a week ago, and the soft ground made my legs cramp up a bit."

Dunigan fashioned a time of 19:28.7, to finish several hundred meters ahead of Bruney who came on strong in the second half of the race to garner runnerup honors with a 20:02.3 clocking.

Ferry teammates Stewart and Jones finished in the next two spots with 20:11.8 and 20:14.0 clockings, respectively.

Leading Mark Brown's Lady Shamrocks to another division title were Rachael Miller who was fifth in 20:36.2, while teammate Jennie Castle was next at 20:43.1.

Two other runners from the immediate Eastern Ohio area posted top 10 finishes. Buckeye Local's Julie Hajny was eighth in 21:00.7 and Shadyside's Jessica Melanko was 10th in 21:14,1.

The girls' varsity race drew a field of 152 runners.

New Shadyside head coach Joel Joseph experienced a double victory with his kids, having taken over the Tiger program that his mother, Donna, had built up over the years.

While the Lady Tigers were runnersup overall, the Shadyside boys were third overall in addition to winning their respective division ti-

"I was excited for our seniors," said Joseph. "I don't feel the kids are satisfied. There are still some goals to be achieved. I'm just glad to be a part of it, but what they achieved in the conference meet is something they should relish and enjoy. They are the ones who put the time and effort into it."



# Meadowbrook to host annual event Saturday



The cross country season has reached its midway point, and that means the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference will crown its new


This year's event will be held Saturday at Meadowbrook High

Action will get under way Saturday at 10 a.m. with the boys' varsity race, which will then be followed by the girls' team race,

All runners will be placed into the same field, and then divided up by class, with the top 10 in each class earning awards and the top 20 overall being named all-OVAC Cross Country.

Class AAA will be the meet's biggest class with 12 schools all running in search of the OVAC banner. Included in the 12 will be these schools: Bellaire, Martins Ferry, Tyler Consolidated, Magnolia, Union Local, Harrison Central, Indian Creek, St. Clairsville, Meadowbrook, Oak Glen and Beaver Lo-

Class 4-A will be the other class in the meet along with AAA to have every school in its division entered. Those schools consist of Buckeye Local, Cambridge, Weirton, Steubenville, Edison, East Liverpool, Zanesville, Brooke, John Marshall and Wheeling Park.

The overall winner of the girls' race returns, while the highest finisher on the boys' side is the thirdplace runner from a year ago.

The female is Cambridge's super sophomore Ashley Dunnigan, while the male is Buckeye Local junior Ben Bolock.

Both Bolock and Dunnigan will carry undefeated records to the OVAC field.

"The OVAC is very competitive and we try to run at our highest level. I hope to run a better time than I did the previous week," Bolock commented.

On the boys' side some of the big talent to watch along with Bolock will be Union Local's Matt Abel; Shadyside's Andrew Lewis, David Jack, and Dane Runyon; Bellaire's Jed Perko; Barnesville's Chris Perun, Travis Taylor, and Ben Fisher; St. Clairsville's Cody

The single A class will consist of Creamer; Martins Ferry's John Tierney, Kirk Roth and Derek Suto; St. John's Zac Suto and Eddie Sargus; and Buckeve's Dustin Meeker. The boys' team races will all be

highly competitive.

In single A, Shadyside appears strong and will receive a challenge from St. John's and Linsly.

"We are really looking forward to the challenge. In the past, we have been consistently been in the top 10 overall; however, this is a rebuilding year and the kids are inexperienced," Irish boss Dennis Delbert remarked.

Barnesville and Caldwell appear to be the favorites in AA bovs'

The girls' field is well stocked with talent. The race for the top 20 spots will be heated and furious. Four of the top five from a year ago will be returning.

The Class AA race will once again this year feature Barnesville. The Shamrocks pocketed the overall title a year ago in this meet and also captured the last three OVAC overall crowns.

The Lady Shamrocks have had a strong showing this fall already at Watkins Memorial, which featured some stiff competition.

"In AA I think we should be right in there. I really think we have an excellent chance to win our class. In the overall, I really expect Shadyside and Martins Ferry to be right up there and there are some West Virginia schools, which we do not know a lot about," Brown said.

Class 3-A could be a sea of Purple. The Lady Riders will look for the repeat and have the same nucleus back from a year ago.

"I am really hoping that every-one is healthy. If everyone is healthy and we are focused we should be all right. Our fifth and sixth girls will be the key to our success. Our top four have really proven that they are tough combelitors. All six of our girls will stand at the line and give it their best," Ellis

" I told the girls just keep doing what they are doing. It is a real good group of girls."

Bellaire will take a solid team to Guernsey County this weekend and could also push for the team title:

"The girls are working real hard. We have a few injuries, but we will have six at the line. We are coming along. We did well Saturday (at Meadowbrook) and our goal is top two," Big Reds' coach Chris Arno

St. Clairsville is yet another squad with high hopes entering this weekend.






