Just three days earlier, the Fighting Irish suffered a tough loss to upstart Hiland in the Division III District finals in West Lafayette.

One game remains for the Irish as they take on Buckeye Local on Thursday at Perkins Field in Brookside for the EOBL title.

Coach Gary Sprague's Cadets suffered the tough OVAC title game loss as they closed the season at 20-6. Linsly was edged out for the regular season title by St. John Central.

"Two days rest, that's pretty gut-" Sliva said about his mound ace SY. who pitched last on Wednesday. "He was (tired), but he was going to have to fall before he was coming out. I wasn't going to take him out. He is a senior, it's his last OVAC.

That kid's all heart, Sliva added. "I told him, this is yours. You've played four years for me. I told him that after four years, this is yours. This is yours to win.

Swift didn't start on the mound, but came on with just one out in the first after starter Mark Hartlieb was the victim of three first inning doubles by the Cadets and found himself trailing 3-0.

Once Swift came to the mound, the momentum seemed to switch quickly to the Irish dugout as he ended the Cadets' first inning rally with two quick outs, then struck out two of three batters in the second. He finished with 10 Ks while walking five. Swift was touched for only three hits during his stint.

'Mark has done a good job for us this year for a sophomore," Sliva said. "We didn't know how strong Rocky would be so we tried to go as long as we could with Mark.

"Linsly has a very good hitting team so you can't make any mistakes against them and he made a couple early that they made him pay

for it, the Irish coach added. "But Mark pitched well for us all year and we look for some real big things from him the next two years.

Linsly jumped out to a quick 3-0 lead in the first after lead-off hitter Jon Kurtz opened with a double to left. Jason Clay's sac bunt moved Kurtz to third and a wild pitch brought him home.

DH Dan Buchwach reached on an error and scored as Dan Stephens blasted a shot off the left field fence for another double. Stephens advanced on a wild pitch then scored as Ryan Saari went to right center for a double. Swift came to the mound at that point and stopped the outburst with a K and pop up.

Once he got them out of that inning, I think they knew he could work with them and that they would have to hold us off, Sliva said. They've got a good pitcher and we jumped on him when we had to and they just played exceptional.

Those four seniors really deserve that win. The district finals was a real disappointment. We had three championships to play in and we feel very fortunate to get the win in this one," Sliva said. In the bottom of the third, St.

The Irish rally continued as Matt Nardo doubled down the first base line for a pair and a 7-3 lead. Vavra's single to right scored Nardo.


Linsly managed to score once more in the sixth after R. J. Zitzelberger was hit by a pitch, advanced on a Buchwach single and scored on an error.

Three of the four defending OVAC baseball champions will return to the diamonds on Saturday looking for a repeat.

Thirteen others will be looking to start a streak.

At four locations on Saturday, the OVAC baseball playoffs will kick off with a pair of semi-final games at each site. The winners on Saturday will advance into next Saturday's OVAC championship games at Vaccaro Field in Steubenville.

By noon Saturday, eight teams will be taking the field to open semi-final action.

Bridgeport's Perkins Field in Brookside will host a pair, as will Magnolia High's diamond in New Martinsville, Brooke High in Wellsburg and Toronto High's Red Knight Field.

The top four finishers in the final OVAC regular season standings earned berths in Saturday's semis.

At Brookside, Class 3-A combatants St. Clairsville, the third seed, and Bellaire, the second seed, will play at noon. At 2 p.m. at Perkins, a Class 1-A contest will pit thirdseeded Shadyside against secondseeded Linsly.

At Toronto, two defending champs and top seeds will look to advance. At noon, Class 4-A fourthseeded Buckeye Local will taking on a powerful Steubenville Big Red nine that comes in as a No. 1 seed with the valley's best record. At 2 p.m., possibly the valley's secondbest, Toronto, takes on fourth seed Barnesville in a 2-A contest.

At Magnolia, fourth-seeded Frontier takes the field against defending Class 1-A champion and top-seeded St. John Central at noon. In the 2 p.m. fray, Class 3-A topseed Magnolia battles fourth-seeded Harrison Central.

John Marshall's Bob Montgomery was another Ohio Valley coach who moved into the 500-win club this season. The Monarch coach opened the season at 497-228 and added 11 wins through the May 6 cut-off.

Linsly's Gary Sprague is closing in on the 400-win mark after his Cadets added 17 more wins to his 370-201 record that he started the season with.

Barnesville's Brad Wilson eclipsed the 300-win mark early in the season. He opened the season with a 296-196 career record.

Steubenville's Fred Heatherington, in only his 12th year, continues to get closer to the 250-win mark. He opened the season at 211-82 and his Big Red squad reeled off 25 more this season.

Edison's Bill Beattie started the season at 168-104 in 12 seasons,





It was a Saturday to forget for the Ohio Athletic Valley Conference.

A worst-case scenario developed at two of the four sites where baseball semifinals were being conducted. As a result, support-ers of both St. and Clairsville Harrison Central High

Schools were up in arms. And for good reason, it certainly appears.

AT NEW MARTINSVILLE, where we were stafloned for a scheduled doubleheader at the Magnolia High diamond, an early morning downpour made playing conditions treacherous at best.

The 12 noon class 1-A tilt between Frontier and St.

John's had to be postponed until later in the day. As conditions improved, the ground crew worked tilligently to ready the field for a 2:00 start between Magnolia and Harrison Central.

The 3-A game got underway at 2:15, but was halted shortly before 3:00 under gray skies and a steady driz-

As umpires and coaches gathered at home plate about zle. 30 minutes later, the rain had practically come to an end.

Following several minutes of discussion, the field was deemed unplayable and the game suspended, to be resumed (today) at the point of interruption, the bottom

Both Blue Eagles' veteran coach Dave Cisar and Huskies' mentor Mike Saffell questioned the sudden decision to permanently halt play.

Not 20 minutes after the ruling, skies were clearing and the sun shining.

Furthermore, the ground crew returned to work as a few remaining Huskies' fans looked on in disbelief.

Some 90 minutes later, St. John's and Frontier were vying in a 1-A encounter which was played without incident.

No one suggested decision-making is easy, but umpires in the 3-A contest clearly botched the call, infuriating Harrison Central followers, many of whom traveled two hours to the site.

asidering More the is involved in state secplay beginning Tuesday, every effort should have been made to continue Saturday's game. In that regard, both schools and their fans were unnecessarily and unfortunately inconvenienced.

NOT THE case at Brooke High where Bruins' coach Rob Robinson encountered similar weather-related predicaments.

"We were able to get the (2-A) game (between Wheeling Central and Steubenville Central) completed before a fairly heavy downpour set in," Robinson recalls.

"Under no circumstances, though, was the field playable for the (scheduled) Edison-John Marshall game

at 2. "The umpires approached and related they were willing to wait as long as possible. Both coaches agreed to the same," Robinson added.

"I even had one of (my) kids check the weather forecast and we determined conditions were improving. It took a couple hours to get the field ready. Once we did,

the game was played in its entirety." WHICH LEAVES St. Clairsville fans grumbling concerning the decision to declare Saturday's 3-A semifinal an official game after play had to be stopped at Bridgeport in the top of the seventh inning.

Trailing 5-3 after six frames, St. C. mounted a late rally, pulling within a run. The Devils had two runners on base with no out when umpires had little choice but to stop play.

Considering the rule states such a scenario results i n no suspension of play, the outcome reverted to the last completed inning, relegating the Red Devils to a 5-3 setback.






The Red Knights got two runs back in the bottom of the first on an error and an infield grounder and then went ahead to stay with two more in the second frame.




