Cold Start to Second Half Spells Trouble for WV Stars

'We just couldn't make anything ... and it killed us' - Pancho Flores

Executive Sports Editor Leading 54-43 at halftime, the West Virginia All-Stars made just five of 22 shots during the first 10 minutes of the second half, as Ohio rallied for a 94-89 vic-tory in the boys' division of the Samuel A. Mumley OVAC All-Star Basketball Classic on Saturday afternoon

Cambridge's 6-4 strong man Adam Davenport mus-cled his way inside to score 10 of his 16 points in the second-half of the fast-paced battle held at Ohio University Eastern's Ney Center. "We just couldn't make anything early in the second half and it killed us," said

Mountaineer Coach Pancho Flores of John Marshall. "I thought we had a good run right at the end of the first half to take the lead but it wasn't enough.

The opening minutes saw seven ties and four exchanges of the lead, as Wheeling Park's Durran Goodwin connected for eight of his 13 points prior to the intermission.

Ohio, coached by Joe Dunlevy of Indian Creek,

43 lead. With the Buckeyes continuing to struggle. W.Va. added a goal by Weirton Madonna's Jeff Geisinger to up the lead to nine points.

Geisinger scored again just ahead of the halftime buzzer when an unthinking Ohio inbounder passed the ball right to the Blue Don all-stater who connected on the layup for a 53-43 advantage. The Mountaineers got even for the final time at 62 on Geisinger's reverse layup. But Ohio exploded again on a 9-2 spurt to take charge for keeps.

The closest West Virginia got the remainder of the was three points, which

never led until Bridgeport all-stater Willie McCrary stepped behind the three-point line and drained a 20footer for a 27-25 Buckeye advantage.

Bellaire's Matt Materkoski, with a nice drive to the basket, later regained the lead for Ohio at 30-29 just before the 10-minute mark and West Virginia didn't catch up again until Weir's Jason Jeter got loose underneath for a easy hoop and a stalemate at 42.

After Justin Davis of Indian Creek cashed the back end of a two-shot foul to put the Buckeyes in front again, West Virginia embarked on a 12-0 run to close the half and open up a double-digit advantage.

"We caught them with some tired legs right there," W.Va. assistant coach Bob Burton of Paden City remarked during the halftime break.

The Mountaineers put a fresh quint on the floor for the final four minutes and it paid off handsomely. Goodwin, a Class AAA first-team all-stater for the Patriots this past season, led the charge.

After draining a three-pointer from the wing, Goodwin dished off to Magnolia's Eric Burke for an easy lay-in after a steal.

Travis Storm of John Marshall, who opened the game with a bonus bomb, cashed another trey for a 50-

Geisinger and Goodwin bombed in treys during the

final 10 minutes for the Mountaineers. "It was a fun game," Ohio coach Dunlevy said. "I thought all our kids played well. Our scoring was pretty balanced. This was a great game and a very good experience for the kids on both teams.

Buckeye Girls Ruin Statler's Party

For a long time it looked as if it was going to be Mary Pat Statler's day.

The sensational all-West Virginia Class AA backcourter from Oak Glen High School went 6-for-7 from the floor and scored 14 points in the first half as the West Virginia girls took a 58-53 lead over Ohio in the Samuel A. Mumley OVAC Basketball Classic, played Saturday afternoon at Ohio University's Ney Center.

Then during halftime, Statler wowed the crowd even more in the three-point shootout. After watching Union Local's Jenny Chillinsky drain 14 of her attempts, Statler squared herself just outside the circle on the right side and cashed 15 threepointers within the allotted oneminute time frame to win the competition.

Unfortunately for Statler and her teammates, the Mountaineer Buckeyes paid more attention to the presence of the St. John's University recruit during the second half, enabling Ohio to rally for a 100-93

victory. "She's quite a player," comment-ed West Virginia coach Penn Kurtz of Wheeling Central after watching Statler finish the game with 23 points overall. In the second half, Statler hit just one field goal, a threepointer in the final minute, but she also went 6-for-6 at the foul line.

Wheeling Central's Tiffany Schnupp, who had a strong game inside for West Virginia, backed up Statler with 14 points, while John Marshall's Danielle Frazier also played well in the paint and finished with 13 points.

Ohio, coached by Rick Jones of Union Local, won the game by playing better defense on Statler during the second half and putting together a balanced offense. Five of the Buckeyes finished in double figures, led by St. John's Central All-Ohioan Kayla Magistro with 13 points. Shadyside's Ashley Holenka, also a first-team all-stater in Division IV, scored 12 points, including six key

tallies in the latter stages of the game Finishing with 10 points each were Ashley Bates of Buckeye Trail, Jessica Gehrig of River and Amanda Mercer of Union Local. Chillinsky and Bethany Piccolini tallied eight points each, giving Ohio seven play-ers with eight points or more.

"We knew we a lot of balance from our first practice,' said Buckeye assistant coach Mickey Blatnik. "The girls played well together the whole way."



After the Buckeyes closed to within 52-51, West Virginia sandwiched In 52-51, west virginia sandwiched three-point goals from Melissa Witzberger of John Marshall and Megan Finneran of Madonna around a Heidi Kemp (Union Local) two-pointer for its 58-53 lead.

West Virginia led by as many as nine at 67-58 after a steal and goal by Schnupp in the second half before the Buckeyes exploded for a 16-3 run to take the lead for keeps. Yvonne Hamilton of Cambridge got the Buckeyes rolling with a goal, followed by five straight points from Ashley Bates, of Buckeye Trail. Bates turned in a three-point play and then scored a layup off a dish from St. John's Control's Jossics St. John's Central's Jessica Seivertson.

Maria Slawinski temporarily halted the West Virginia dry spell with a bonus bomb for a 70-65 lead, but the Ohioans finally tied it on a Holenka foul toss. Magistro put the Buckeyes ahead to stay at 72-70 with two free throws.






IN THE GIRLS' contest, Division IV all-Ohio

Holenka added 12 markers.

West Virginia took a 58-53 lead into intermission thanks in large part to the tremendous talents of Oak Glen High guard Mary Pat Statler.

The St. John University recruit poured in 14 points in the opening half for the Mountain State

"I thought she was tremendous," Jones said. 'It was a great opportunity for her to showcase her talents because a lot of local people don't get to see her play because she is at Oak Glen."

West Virginia took a 12-point lead early in he second half when Wheeling Central's Fiffany Schnupp capped a 7-0 West Virginia un with a layup.

Ohio answered immediately with a 23-5 run sparked by Magistro, Buckeye Trail's Bates and Union Local's Amanda Mercer to take a 78-72 lead.

The Mountain State bounced back with free hrows from John Marshall's Danielle Frazier and Statler to pull within 78-76, but River High's Jessica Gehrig drained a clutch threepointer with 6:20 left to make it 81-76.

The triple sparked a 10-2 Buckeye run that gave Ohio a 88-78 lead.

West Virginia wouldn't quit as Schnupp and Statler meshed two free throws to make it 88-82, but Union Local guard Jenny Chillinsky drilled a trifecta which extended the lead back to nine.

Ohio then sank seven-of-eight free throws down the stretch to seal the verdict.

The other three players that broke doubledigits were Bates, Mercer and Gehrig. Each finished with 10 points.

Beallsville's Beth Stalder added nine points, while St. Clairsville's Bethany Piccolini and Chillinsky had eight each.

All but one of the Buckeye state performers dented the scoring column.

Statler closed with 23 points to lead West Virginia. Schnupp chipped in 14 counters and Frazier added 13 points. Magnolia guard Maria Slawinski donated 10 markers to the West Vir-

ginia cause.

Davenport, a 6-foot-6 first-team all-Ohio performer from Cambridge, led the way with 16 points. Dudley, a 6-foot-5 cager from Shenandoah, added a dozen counters.

Radakovich, a 6-foot-7 all-Ohio first-team member from Steubenville High School, added nine points for the Buckeye state.

The Mountain State closed the first half on a 12-0 run closed by Weirton Madonna's Jeff Geisinger's steal and layup just before first half the buzzer sounded.

Ohio rallied to take the lead at the 13:40 mark of the second half on a basket from Dudley which made it 61-60.

Shortly after that, Ohio went on 10-2 run to take a 71-64 lead.

Down the stretch Ohio overcame several missed free throws and turnovers, and never allowed West Virginia to get any closer than three points.

"I was having flashbacks to last night's District 5 game," Ohio head coach Joe Dunleavy, who also coached in that all-star game. "Last night we had a five point lead with 18 seconds

left and ended up going to overtime and losing. "But, today we made enough free throws to hold on for the victory," the personable Indian Creek head coach added.

Steubenville's Keith Petteway also topped twin digits with 11 markers.

Bridgeport's all-Ohio performer Willie Mc-Crary donated nine points for Ohio. Bellaire High gaurd Matt Materkoski chipped in eight counters and Shadyside's Trent Ging had seven








