OVAC baseball tourney set

Action at four sites to begin Saturday

With the long regular season coming to a close and the post-season tournaments already in full swing in Ohio, 16 teams have qualified for the OVAC playoffs set to get under way at four sites on Saturday.

Saturday's cut-off for qualifying for the conference baseball playoffs produced some surprises, but the race itself provided the real excitement.

The season pro-

The season provided the closest races ever in all four classes and selecting the final qualifiers wasn't completed until after the last out was recorded on Saturday.

In Class 4-A, the conference found its tightest race with the fourth and final spot in the playoffs being decided by just under four-tenths of a point.

Edison closed out on top in the big school race with its 16-5 mark and 40.9 average while Buckeye Local, the division leader until being dethroned last week, finished in second at 15-7 with a 36.8 mark. East Liverpool, which closed the

season with a string of success, was third at 35.8.

The fourth spot was filled by Steubenville Big Red, who closed the regular season with an impressive win streak that enabled the 14-7 club to edge last week's leader, John Marshall by the smallest of margins.

In Class 3-A, coach Dave Cisar's Magnolia Blue Eagles led from start to finish

as they led the division with a 16-3 record and 37.9 average. Buckeye Trail, which opened the season with an eight-game win streak, was second at 15-5 and 33.0.

Harrison Central, which drew more atten-

tion with its ace pitcher on the mound, capped out a good season with a 12-8 record and a 30.0 average for third in 3-A.

Meadowbrook, at 9-8, edged out Tyler Consolidated for the fourth spot while St. Clairsville failed to make the playoffs in what could be veteran coach Lefty Hall's last season.

In Class 2-A, Wheeling Central

was another wire-to-wire leader as the Maroon Knights lead their division into the playoffs with a 21-3 record and a 34.6 average. The

Knights season-long lead dwindled as the season progressed and lead second place Toronto (17-7) by just four-tenth of a point.

Barnesville also posted a 17-7 record and held on to the third spot in 2-A with a 30.0 average. Linsly is the fourth playoff qualifier with a 28.3 average and an identical 17-7 record. Steubenville Central just missed the playoffs by four-tenths of a points.

In Class 1-A, St. John Central was another division-leader that was atop its class throughout the season as the Fighting Irish will take an impressive 17-5 record into the weekend action. Coach Tom Sliva's club holds the top spot by the biggest with its 28.6 average.

Cameron, at 12-5, is nestled in second place with a 21.8 mark and Beallsville is third at 10-13 and 14.3. Bishop Donahue used a string finish to notch the fourth sport with its 9-13 record and 13.2 mark.

Pairings, times and location for Saturday's semi-finals games will be announced n Tuesday. The semi-finals will be played at four sites - Bridgeport, Toronto, Magnolia and Brooke.

St. John's advances to OVAC Class A Final

He switched his speeds with consistency – or was it inconsistency? – all evening. Only the results remained constant during Benshuter's dominating Monday night on the Perkins Field mound.

Shutler struck out four of the first five hitters he faced. Through five innings, he had 12 of his 14 strike-


And once his Irish offense - and, more specifically, his brother David - staked him to an early lead, he was virtually unhittable.




Ball later scored on a groundout

Don't call the Linsly School baseball team a bunch of overachievers even though the Cadets' starting lineup in Saturday's Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Class AA cham-

pionship game included a junior battery and just three seniors.
"They can play," said a delighted head coach, Gary Sprague, just following his squad's 5-2 victory over two-time defending conference 2A champion Toronto (20-11) at Vaccaro Field in Steubenville.

"They are talented kids. They believed they could do this."

Yesterday's victory finished off a 20-8 season for Linsly, and Sprague pointed out that the key to winning an OVAC baseball championship for the first time since 1997 was the demanding schedule the Cadets played late in the season.

"We beat Wheeling Central twice in 10 days. When the kids did that, they knew they had a chance at this." Central is the two-time defending West Virginia Class AA state champions. The Maroon Knights head into regional play this week just two wins away from another trip to the state tournament.

The Cadets got some big help from a shoddy Toronto defense in the OVAC final, as the Red Knights had three errors in the third inning that paved the way for the Cadets to take a 4-0 lead.

On the other hand, Sprague's team played errorless ball, collected 10 hits and got some clutch pitching from junior lefty Garrett Powell, who allowed just five hits and worked his way out of several jams.




