

Barnesville, Bellaire, St. John's win titles

The real cross country season has begun.

The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference crowned its long-distance running champions Saturday morning in Byesville.

The 2001 version of the OVAC meet proved

to be one of the most competitive in a long time.

Barnesville's girls won yet another overall title with an impressive 42 point total. With the overall title came the Lady Shamrocks' seventh consecutive along title. tive class title. John Marshall won yet another 4-A title and finished second overall.

East Liverpool's boys took the overall male title with 91 points. Bellaire settled for second overall as the Big Reds tallied 128 markers.

The Lady Shamrocks continued their dominance of local teams with the most recent performance.

Coach Mark Brown's Lady 'Rocks placed all five runners into the top 24 of the field, which included the individual overall champion.

"The girls really ran super. Our fifth girl had an off day, but her sister picked it up for her. That is the thing about this team...we have so many kids who are so strong and they can pick it up for each other," said an elated Brown. "We have a lot of depth and what can you say about the Morgan sisters?'

Though the Lady 'Rocks have won the OVAC banner for several years, the feeling never changes for Brown and company.

"It never gets old because it is different kids. We tell the kids this is the biggest meet of the reg-

ular season. We are now going to get some work in and get ready for the districts," Brown said.

The Lady 'Rocks were once again led by sophomore dandy Molly Morgan who captured her inaugural OVAC title with a 19:38 clocking.


"It feels good. I was tired today running. It was cold out, but that didn't bother me. I really like this course and I thought I ran pretty well," Morgan said.

Senior Ruthie Morgan took the bronze medal with a time of 20:01. Freshman ace Kris Schuerle also performed well as she turned in a 20:50 to gain all-OVAC honors with a 10th place finish.

Bellaire finished second in 3-A and third overall as the Lady Big Reds accumulated 190 points.

Sophomore dandy Aimee Vavrek led the Lady Big Reds as she gained all-OVAC with a fourth place run and a time of 20:20.

Martins Ferry, which captured the overall title a season ago, was sixth overall and third in Class 3-A as the Lady Riders mustered 208 points.

The Lady Riders were led by sophomore ace Amy Bruney who was fifth overall with a time of 20:23.

Senior standout Katrina Jones finished eighth and gained all conference accolades with a time of

ST. JOHN CENTRAL also enjoyed a stellar day as the Lady Irish captured the school's first-ever 1-A/2-A girls' title.

Coach Dennis Delbert's charges finished fourth overall with 191 points and that number was seven better than class runner-up Shadyside.

"This is something we have worked towards. The girls had several goals early in the season and this was definitely one of them. It always seemed that we had been snake-bitten with an injury or something had gone wrong, so this is special to these kids to get that redemption," an elated

Delbert said. The Lady Irish were led by their one-two punch of sophomore Brianne Cattran and freshman Andrea Zeno.

Cattran turned in a strong sixth place finish in a time of 20:25. That was good enough to earn the talented tenth grader all-conference honors.

Zeno, meanwhile, crossed the line in 13th place with a time of 21:21. That finish also enabled Zeno to become all-OVAC.

Senior Natalie Kozel was third on the team as she crossed the line as the 31st runner with a time of 22:28.

Marri Kajfez was fourth on the team with a 56th place run and a time of 23:22. Katie Tierney rounded out the top five of the Green.

THE BELLAIRE BOYS' cross country program has come leaps and bounds in the six years Arno has been at the helm.



Six Cross Country Champs Crowned

Six team champions were crowned at the OVAC's annual cross-country championships in Byesville Saturday but two of the squads didn't need maps to the winners circle.

The Barnesville girls' cross-country team had won three straight Class AA titles before moving up to Class AAA status this season but nothing changed when the trophies were handed out as the Lady Shamrocks claimed five of the top 10 individual spots to run away with their first triple-A crown at the Meadowbrook

High course. The John Marshall girls won their third straight Class AAAA championship in convincing fashion over Zanesville while Bellaire St. John's edged Shadyside for small-school

honors.

East Liverpool dominated the boys' Class AAAA meet with Weir a distant second.

The boys' Class AAA championship went to Bellaire in a mild surprise over the Barnesville boys who had also claimed Class AA honors a year ago — while Class A-AA honors went to Steubenville Central.

Oak Glen's Justin Simpson ran away with top individual honors as he blistered the 3.1-mile layout in 15:56.75. East Liverpool's Mark Montgomery was second overall and led the Class AAAA finishers at 16:28,92 while Caldwell's Dave Hesson was the top small-school harrier with a time of 16:43.50.

OVAC C-C championships Saturday at Meadowbrook

With October, comes the beginning of what many cross country coaches and enthusiasts view as the real season.

When the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference hosts its cross country championship Saturday morning at Meadowbrook High

School, the real season will definitely be under way.

The OVAC has found a new home on the schedule. After coming during week four of the season, the cross country board and coaches opted to move the meet to the first weekend in October.

Though the date is different, the goal is still the same.

Action will begin in Byesville at 9 a.m. with the high school open races. At 10 a.m., the varsity races will hear the sounding of the gun.

When the race begins, there will be runners from 33 schools competing in three classes. The single- and double-A field will be combined.

Of the three classes, the 3-A event appears to be the most wide open.

Leading the list of contenders in the boys' race will be Bellaire, under the guidance of Coach Chris Arno.

Arno's army has enjoyed a stellar season thus far, gaining titles at Newcomerstown, the Cal Pokas Memorial, Cambridge and the OVCCL this past weekend.

The Big Reds are led by junior Jed

Perko and sophomores Mike Carpenter and Eric Wise.

"We need to build on what we did this past weekend, but can't dwell on our accomplishments. I really think Barnesville and Martins Ferry – along with us – all have good chances. We have to have a complete team effort to hold off those other two schools," Arno said.

The Shamrocks do have title aspirations as they captured the A-AA title a season ago, but have bumped up a class for this season.

Coach Mark Brown's Shamrocks are led by senior standout Chris Perun who is seeking to defend his overall title from a season ago.

Perun is joined in the leadership reigns by classmate Travis Taylor and sophomore Matt Fiutem.

"I really feel we will be right in the mix for both our class and the overall title. Three of the best teams in the OVAC are all in triple-A. I think it is going to be an exciting meet," Brown offered.

Martins Ferry, which has been a strong second in several events so far this season, is hoping to have a bust-out meet.
