Ohio overpowers West Virginia in Mumley Classic

• Buckeyes prevail, 102-78

A 62-point second half proved decisive in Ohio's 102-78 win over West Virginia in Saturday's Samuel Mumley OVAC All-Star Basketball Classic.

A crowd in excess of 1,000 looked on in OU-Eastern's Ney Center and watched the Buckeyes pull away after leading by only one point at halftime, 40-39.

"We kept sending five guys out there and eventually, wore them down," said Ohio coach Jeff Sabatino of Martins Ferry, now 5-0 in the OVAC showcase hoopfest. "I thought we were the quicker team and we took advantage."


In less than 24 hours, Sabatino and fellow coaches Mike Podlasiak (Union Local) and Rod Gray (Barnesville) produced two postseason triumphs. The trio were on the bench in a 98-96 East decision Friday in the District 12 All-Star tilt.

"As far as I'm concerned, the most beneficial aspect of these games are the lifelong friendships involved. They're priceless," Sabatino added.

Saturday's matinee encounter was closely competitive two-thirds into the fray before Ohio erupted for 14 unanswered points to take control.

The Buckeyes held a 45-43 upperhand prior to the 14point spurt that resulted in a 59-43 lighting.

Mountaineer girls pocket 83-72 vedict

The West Virginia girls all-stars had a point to prove Saturday afternoon.

The Mountaineer girls entered the Samuel A. Mumley Basketball Classic as underdogs to their highlytouted Ohio counterparts -- a squad which featured five Division I collegebound athletes.

West Virginia, however, used a great start and a strong finish to post an 83-72 triumph at the Robert Ney Center on the campus of Ohio University Eastern.

"We knew Ohio had some big time players, but we felt we had some nice talent, also," said Weirton Madonna's Mike Delre, who guided the Blue & Gold squad. "We divided our teams real well. All three rotations were well balanced.

"Rhythm was the key. We meshed real well," he added. "Our game plan was to get out and run and just let our girls play."

West Virginia got out of the box like banchees, sprinting to a 16-6 lead at the 15:23 mark of the opening half. Wheeling Central's Nathalie Paulis

fueled the surge with six points.

Ohio -- under the guidance of Beallsville's Terry Jarrett -- clawed back to tie matters at 22-all on a goal by Tiffany Crum of Beallsville at the 8:40 lighting.

The balance of the half was nip-and-tuck with West Virginia emerging with a 42-40 edge at intermission.

The first 13 minutes of the second half was battled on even terms, with the final deadlock coming at 67-all. The final seven minutes belonged to West Virginia.

The Mountaineers went on a 15-5 spree to break matters open. Wheeling Park's Emily Duffin meshed two free throws with 1:40 left, giving West Virginia an 82-72 upperhand. Ohio would never threaten again.

West Virginia displayed excellent offensive balance as four players reached double figures and 12 got into the scoring column.

Wheeling Park sharpshooter Lauren Gompers a St. Francis (Pa.) recruit -- led the winners with 16 points. She also prevailed in the three-point contest at halftime.

Weirton Madonna's Sarah Setcavage – a 6 ft. 2 Wheeling Jesuit recruit -- finished with 11 counters while Duffin and Magnolia's Hannah Heinzman each netted 10 points.

"We knew Ohio had tons of talent, so we were pumped to play today," Setcavage noted. "We took it as a challenge and everybody stepped up and played well. It was a lot of fun."

Ohio had 13 players enter into the scoring, however, just one reached double figures. Steubenville Central dandy Jenn Fletcher paced the Buckeyes with 10 counters, including three trevs.

St. Clairsville Lindsay Piccolini -- coming off a 16-point outburst in the District 12 game just the night before -- netted nine points for the Scarlet & Gray as did East Liverpool's Heather Smith and Meadowbrook's Chrissy Devore. Smith also buried three treys for the Buckeyes.

"It just wasn't our day," Jarrett said. "Give West Virginia credit, they played very well. But it was an honor to be a part of this game and I enjoyed coaching these girls."

Ohio drained 28-of-66 shots for 42 percent. The Mountaineers converted 37-of-75 attempts for just under 50 percent.

Both teams encountered problems at the charity stripe. Ohio misfired on eight-of-17 attempts while the winners were a rugged eight-of-18.

The game marked the final Ohio Valley appearance for three local Division I hoop recruits: Bellaire's Kacie Vavrek (Bellaire), St. John Central's Arin Kress (Winthrop) and River's Leighann Fry (Marshall).







Martins Ferry High School boys' basketball coach Jeff Sabatino apparently knows a lot about coaching in all-star basketball games,

W.Va. Girls Win, 83-72

West Virginia went on a 13-2 run over the last four minutes game to move out to an 83-72 victory over Ohio in Saturday's girls Samuel A. Mumley Memo-rial OVAC Basketball Classic.

In the see-saw game played at Ohio University Eastern's Ney Center, Coach Mike DelRe's Mountaineer squad moved in front to stay at 72-70 on a stick-back goal from Magnolia High School's Hanna Heinzman. The 6-ft. Heinzman, who

scored six of her 10 points during the game's final stages, had previously put West Virginia up 70-67 with a baseline jumper. But the Lady Buckeyes forged one final tie when Heather Smith, from East Liverpool, swished a 3-pointer to knot the contest. It was the quick-triggered Smith's third frey of the afternoon.

After Heinzman put the Mountaineers back in front, Sarah Setcavage found Nathalie Paulus breaking to the hoop for a layup and a four-point advantage.

Ohio then got its last points when Chrissy Devore scored on a short jumper, trimming its deficit to 74-72. West Virginia then closed things out with nine straight points. Maria Rohrig's strong move inside boosted the lead to 76-72, followed by a rebound basket from Lauren Gompers and a bucket by Setcavage as the clock turned under two-minutes.

The only p way came from the foul line as Emily Duffin cashed two free throws and Setcavage addd another to pad the Mountaineer advantage. "This was a lot of fun," said DelRe, who during the regular DelRe, who during the regular season coached Weirton Madon-na to a W.Va. Class A state tour-nament berth. "It should be enjoyable with all these good players to coach." DelRe felt the difference for his talent-laden squad had a lot to do with the Lady Moun-taineers being willing to sacrifice personal goals. "Sometimes when good players come togeth-er they have to give up a little bit of themsevles," he said. "Ohio had a big team and I didn't want to play toe-to-toe with them.

When we spread the floor some of our guards who ordinarily would be looking to shoot the ball, had to go stand in the corner a little bit."

Gompers, the three-year standout at Wheeling Park who is headed to St. Francis (Pa.) College next season, had a strong game for West Virginia.

The guard/forward scored 16 points, nine of which came in the second half. During halftime, Gompers displayed her outside shooting ability to the crowd by winning the 3-point girls' shootout as she nailed 11 bonus bombs. Her only trey during the game came early in the second half and it gave the Lady Mountaineers a 47-45 lead.

Joining Gompers in doublefigures for the were Weirton Madonna's Setcavage, who scored 11 points and Emily Duffin of Park and Heinzman with 10 each.

The well-balanced Ohio squad had just one doublue-digit performer as Jenn Fletcher of Steubenville Catholic Central tossed in 10 markers. Devore (Meadowbrook), Lindsay Piccolini (St. Clairsville) and Smith (East Liverpool) finished with nine each.

The Lady Buckeyes terrific guard tandem of Arin Kress (St. John's Central) and Kacie Vavrek (Bellaire) were limited to four points each. Kress, bound for Winthrop (N.C.) College in the fall, played well handling the ball for Ohio and she got a favorable response from the crowd on one occasion with a terrific spin move to the basket for a layup. The Mountaineers were able to use Jade Eckleberry, from Oak Glen; Jessica Yarter, a Brooke High standout, and Setcavage to run the point when needed.

Hensler to earn **Saffield Girls'** Coach Award


One of the Valley's best girls' coaches, Charles "Chuck" Hensler, will be returning to the from Annapolis, Maryland this weekend...and for good a reason.
