# Ohio wins eighth straight OVAC Classic

• Buckeyes prevail, 19-12

But it did not come quite as easy as some of the previous 30 OVAC games, the Buckeyes pulling out a hard-fought 19-12 win Sunday evening at Wheeling Island Stadium.

"This was an exciting game for the fans, but it was a little too close for comfort on my end of it," Ohio head coach Dave Everson said. "This game was a battle and I give Coach Linsky and his staff credit because they were big underdogs and their kids really came to play."

Though the Mountaineers fell short in the game for the eighth consecutive summer, West Virginia head coach Mike Linsky could not have been prouder of the way his kids performed.

"We can't ask for anymore out of our kids," Linsky explained. "They absolutely played their hearts out. I told the kids I was happy that they left everything they had out on the field."

Both teams seemed to use the opening panel to feel each other out, but in the second quarter, both squads were unable to uncork their offenses.

Ohio was able to score the game's first two touchdowns thanks to adept passing from Shadyside's Mike Kernik.

"Mike Kernik is a good quarterback," Everson said. "We were able to put some points on the board and he did a good job for us."

For the first Buckeye touchdown, Kernik threw a fade route to Steubenville's John Lester, who used all of his 6-ft-2 frame to haul in the 22-yard scoring play. Wellsville's Matt Engle tacked on the PAT and with 7:36 to play in the opening half, Ohio led 7-

After Lester came up with an interception on the next

Mountaineer possession, Ohio set up shop on its own 36.

The Buckeyes needed 11 plays and 3:23 before Kernik found St. John Central's Joey Vavra on a short four-yard pass after Vavra looped out of the backfield into the flat. The point after play went astray and Ohio found itself with what appeared a commanding 13-0 lead.





After Oak Glen's Derrick Stickles picked off his second Kernik pass of the first half and returned it 56 yards to the Ohio 27, West Virginia was in scoring position once again with 1:15 remaining in the half.

On the first play from scrimmage, John Marshall's Luke Cunningham caught an Edwards pass of a deflection, giving the Mountaineers\_a first-and-10 at the Ohio 15-yard line. But two running plays and a pair of incompletions netted just 1 yard, giving the ball back to Ohio.

"It came down to Keith Keenan making a couple of big plays for us there in the fourth quarter and that was probably the difference," Everson said.

Fast forward to the fourth, when Wheeling Central's Jon Gordon - the only three-time all-stater in Maroon Knight history — got a hand on a Devon Singleton punt, giving West Virginia the ball back at its own 36 with 6:52 remaining in the contest.

But three plays later, Edwards, who was in the shotgun, had the snap go over his head. Edwards attempted to dive on the loose football, but had it go off his leg.

Ten yards later, Steubenville's Luke Hartman fell on it at the Mountaineer 7. 'The snap, which all the kid was trying to do was beat the clock ... the kid was trying to make an intelligent play," Linsky said. "Justin said, 'I was thinking timeout, timeout.

The events leading up to the 31st annual Rudy Mumley Charity All-Star Classic kicked into full swing Wednesday evening.



"We are starting to figure things out personnel wise with what we want to do both offensively and defensively," Everson pointed out.

One battle for a starting job which hasn't been decided yet is the quarterback with Shadyside's Mike Kernik and St. Clairsville's Adam Quirk both taking reps with the first team.

'We still have to decide who is going to start, but there is no question that both guys are going to play," Everson admitted. "Both are intelligent young men and both have picked the system up quite well."

Linsky has already named his starting quarterback for Sunday's tussle. Wheeling Central's Justin Edwards has been named to the starting spot for the Mountaineers.

'Justin will be the starter, and Jimmy (Scherich) will play some receiver and be the top backup," Linsky said. "When the kids got into camp, we told them that we may ask some of them to try different positions and all have done really well."

Not that any coach in an all-star game puts a lot into a game plan, but both Everson and Linsky report that fans on the Island Sunday can expect the ball to be in the air.

"We are going to spread it out and throw the ball, then try to create a numbers advantage and then run the ball," Everson said. "We want to ge the ball into our athletic kids' hands. Our receiving corps and running backs are all excellent athlete: and we want to get the ball into their hands a: much as possible.

Linsky, who is known for his throwing offense at John Marshall, expects it to be a game of speed against speed.

"The big thing is our speed against their speed especially out on the perimeter and the kids are doing a good job," Linsky said.















Wells, a National Honor Society member at Shenandoah High, has signed to continue his athletic and academic careers at national power Mount Union






Five plays later, St. Clairsville's Adam Quirk connected with Union Local's Dave Thomas on an 18-yard score to seal the game.
