Juniors Phil Green and Chris Marling have also been running well for Arno's army.

Another team which could be factor is Oak Glen who legitimately could have two runners near the front of the pack in seniors Justin and Josh Simpson. Justin is the defending champion in the race and also the defending West Virginia state champion.

In the 1-A/2-A boys race, St. John's and Caldwell appear to be the two teams to watch in the field.





## Bellaire girls, St. C. boys win **OVAC** crowns

Except for respective state competitions in both Ohio and West Virginia, local cross country teams' most important meet took place Saturday morning in Byesville.

Under overcast skies with ideal running temperatures, local harriers ran for conference titles as the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference championship took place at Meadowbrook High School.

The Bellaire girls -- who have been the area's premier team all season -- kept that going, rolling to both the overall and 3-A championship. The Lady Big Reds closed with an impressive 44 markers.

The area's premier boys team -- St. Clairsville -- kept its fine season going, winning the overall title with 67 points and in the process captured its second OVAC 3-A title in the last three years.

St. John Central's girls, who have followed Bellaire all sea-
