UL girls stun Ferry in **OVAC** tourney

Twice-beaten and twice-blanked by Martins Ferry during the regular season, Union Local's Lady Jets turned the tables in a big way Wednesday

Not only was UL finally able to solve Lady Riders' mound ace Natalie Vinci, the Jets did so in stunning fashion, recording a 10-0 rout at the J.B. Chambers Complex.

Wednesday's OVAC 3-A semifinal conquest sends Bill Weller's now 15-6 squad to Saturday's title game where UL opposes Oak Glen.

"We were involved in two very close (regular season) games with Ferry," Weller advised. "I'll gladly trade those two losses for an opportunity to play in a championship game on Saturday. Who wouldn't?"

Entering with a 13-2 record, Ferry found the going tough against UL's talented Megan Jack.

'She was really fired-up for this one and may have been a little too pumped in the beginning," said Weller of his sophomore ace. "Once Megan settled down and got in a good groove, she was very effective."

The Riders managed but three singles and had runners cut down at home

plate and third base.

"About all you can do is congratu-late Union Local," said Ferry coach Jess Cordery. "We just got hammered tonight, plain and simple. But I know our kids haven't lost any confidence. They realize there's a lot more to play for out there."

Ferry is scheduled to make its sectional tournament debut next Tuesday at Cambridge versus Buckeye Trail. "It's not out of the question we could meet up with Union Local again,' Cordery theorized.

Vinci, one of the valley's premier pitchers, experienced a very rare per-formance, yielding all 10 runs and 10

hits.
"I can't recall Natalie getting roughed-up like that - probably since her freshman year," Cordery confessed. "But she's the type kid who won't let something like this get her down. She'll go back out and dominate someone the next time.

Vinci had no-hit the Jets early in the season, then returned to do another number on Weller's club in a 1-0 Purple triumph.

Once we got a base hit tonight, it seemed everyone started swinging the bat. I could see it in the kids' eyes," the Jets' coach pointed out.







Holt hammered a two-out single in the UL seventh before Cashdollar recorded the final out.


The Bears' junior mound ace struck out two and did not permit a base on balls. Jack struck out one and also walked a batter.






