Breeden stymies 'Rocks

• Bellaire cpatures OVAC opener, 3-0 By RICH MATERKOSKI Times Leader Sports Writer

Fueled by a excellent showing on the mound from Lysa Breeden and some defensive gems from the rest of the Lady Big Reds, Bellaire and head coach Melissa Kaldor disposed of visiting Barnesville, 3-0, in the opening round of OVAC 3-A softball action Tuesday at Badia Field.

Bellaire now moves on to meet Union Local in the semifinals, which defeated Martins Ferry by a 3-0 count.

Breeden sparkled on the mound against the Lady 'Rocks. She went the distance, striking out 10 batters, while giving up just one free pass in the top of the seventh.

Kaldor knew coming in that Breeden was going to be the go-to pitcher in the tourney and was not surprised at the excellent showing from the right-hander.

"Lysa has really been our go-to girl all year long, and today was no different," said Kaldor. "I told her before the game that this was a big game and she responded. She does get a little frustrated sometimes when the calls aren't going her way, but she fights through and gets things done.

"Today she got her defense behind her and she pitched a nice game," Kaldor expressed.


The defense was definitely behind Breeden as the Lady Reds turned three double plays, derailing any effort of a Shamrock comeback.

"We work hard on good defense and double plays every time we practice," noted the first year boss. "I tell them not to get too anxious on double plays, they will come to them."



"This is just a testimony to beliveing in each other, the coaches and your self." Hofreuter-Landini added.



The Cadets opened tournament play with a win over fourth-seeded Weirton Madonna before edging topseeded St. John Central, 1-0.


Beallsville, meanwhile, overcame some late season adversity to get to the championship game.

"This was an excellent soft-ball game," Leary said following his team's defeat.


"It hurts to lose this way but we played exceptionally well. I just wish we could find a way to beat Edison."




