Buckeye Boys Hammer West Virginia

Shadyside's Luckhardt scores 16 points to lead a balanced Ohio scoring effort

Ohio tried to turn the 14th annual Sam Mumley OVAC All-Star Basketball Classic into a track meet Saturday after-noon at the Ney Center on the campus of Ohio University Eastern.

Unfortunately for West Virginia, the Mountaineers could not keep up as the Buckeyes broke the tape well ahead of

broke the tape well ahead of their cross-river rivals. Shadyside All-Ohio point guard Steve Luckhardt paced five double-figure scorers with 16 points and hot-shooting Ohio used a whopping 67-29 rebounding margin to pull away as the Buckeyes rolled to a convincing 117-62 victory in front of a large crowd in Flush-

ing. It was definitely an all around team victory for head coach Donnie Madzia's squad as the Harrison Central mentor watched eight players score at least eight points and had nine with five or more rebounds in the context. the contest.

After Ohio jumped to a quick 7-2 lead, Weir High's Mike Granato saw his team knot the score on a triple and a hoop from Tyler Morando, fresh off of helping to guide his Wheel-ing Central squad to a fourth consecutive W.Va. Class A crown

But that would be the closest the Mountaineers would get in the game as Luckhardt and River's Ryne Romick would pace an 11-0 spurt that would put the hosts in control for good. That run would eventual-ly turn into a 23-4 rally with Ohio pulling out to a 30-11 advantage.

The Buckeyes would led by 27 on three separate occasions in the first half, including 51-



24 at the break on a pair of free throws from Martins Ferry standout Ryan Church.

And while the game was already all but decided at the break, Ohio would run off the initial 10 points of the second half to move the lead to 61-24. The biggest lead of the game would come at 113-57 with just 2:00 showing on the clock.

Buckeye Local's Chase Groves backed Luckhardt with 14 points and eight rebounds while Church, East Liverpool All-Ohioian Brian Kreefer and Beallsville's Casey Tolzda dumped in 10 points apiece. Romick, Cambridge's Pat Byrne and Buckeye's Sean Call all had eight.

Every Ohio player scored at

least four points and pulled in at least two rebounds while Kreefer completed the double-double with 10 caroms.

The Buckeyes sizzled from the field, hitting 54-of-100 attempts, including 31-of-54 in the second half. Meanwhile, the Mountaineers were a mere 25-of-88 and had only one double-figure scorer with Morando finishing with 12 tallies

Ohio also put together eight runs of at least seven points or more, including five doublefigure runs.

Wheeling Park teammates Derek Syrylo and E.J. Schramm finished with eight and seven points, respectively.

West Virginia also turned the ball over 18 times to 14 for the

designated hosts. During halftime festivities, Frontier's Daun Lutes won the slam dunk competition with an acrobatic performance.

River's Romick sat in a chair under the front of the rim and tossed the ball upwards as Lutes came soaring overtop of him.

Lutes' third and final dunk was enough to edge Meadowbrook's Brad Mitchell for first place.

Youel Ignites for Ohio

Meadowbrook senior cans eight treys in win

Facing a tall and talented West Virginia squad, Ohio entered Saturday's 14th annual Sam Mumley OVAC All-Star Basket-ball Classic with a rare underdog

tag. However, led by Meadow-brook's Tiffany Youel and Shadyside's Shayla Holenka, the

streaky Buckeyes proved they were highly underrated. Youel dropped in eight three-pointers and scored 25 points while Holenka kicked in with 17 tallies as Ohio erased an 11point second half deficit to record an entertaining 85-79 victory over the Mountaineers at the Ney Center on the campus of Ohio University Eastern.

Buckeye head coach Kevin Barr of Steubenville Central watched his team struggle out of the gate as West Virginia shot to a 12-3 lead just 3:42 in with Wheeling Central all-stater Kayleen Fitzsimmons scoring five early points. The Mountaineers would extend their advantage to 23-12 at the 8:49 mark of the first half before Ohio, led by seven points from the "Byesville bomber", would go on a 15-0 run to claim the lead for the first time at 27-That lead would be short-lived, however, as West Virginia would close strong and take a 39-33 upperhand into the intermission. Less than two minutes into the second half, coach Nikki Hard-man of W.Va. Class AA state champion Magnolia watched her team's lead grow to 46-35 as it appeared the blue-and-gold were getting ready to put the designated hosts away for good. But again, facing adversity and a double-figure deficit, Holenka and Youel would take command and bring the Buckeyes back. This time it would be a 15-2

Ohio rally that would push Ohio back into the driver's seat.

Holenka would score six to help cut the margin to 48-44 before back-to-back triples from Youel would give the Buckeyes a 50-48 advantage with 15:57 showing. The Ohio run also peeled just 2:39 off the clock.

West Virginia's final lead of the contest would come at 54-52 on a hoop by John Marshall's Megan Gouldsberry at 12:58. Ohio's biggest spread of the afternoon would by 84-74 with 36 seconds showing on a pair of Rachel Cruz charity tosses.

While Youel and Holenka would combine for 42 for the winners, Shenandoah's Cruz would add nine, and Bellaire's Nikki Driscoll and Edison's Lauren Flood would evenly divide 16 for Ohio.

Youel and Holenka would ombine to I the second half alone, with all five of Youel's hoops coming from beyond the arc.



Fitzsimmons tallied a teamhigh 15 for the Mountaineers with Tyler Consolidated's Lyncee Perkey finishing with 14 points, six rebounds and three blocked shots. Mount de Chantal's Chantelle Handy, who will attend Marshall, added 11 while Mountain Lion teammate, and University of Pittsburgh recruit, Sylvie Tafen had seven points and 10 rebounds.

Defensively, Ohio did an out-standing job shutting down a pair of West Virginia first team all-staters in Magnolia's Allison Rothlisberger and Valley's Heather Brown as the two combined for just seven points.

West Virginia grabbed a 45-40 edge off the glass and committed just 13 turnovers to 23 for Ohio. However, the Buckeyes were a solid 31-of-70 from the floor while the Mountaineers canned just 28-of-87.

Ohio sweeps in OVAC All-Star Classic Youel's three-point barrage keys girls' 85-79 win; Buckeye boys romp, 117-62

ST. CLAIRSVILLE - Meadowbrook High's Tiffany Youel stole the show with a sizzling threepoint shooting display in the girls' game while the boys' contest proved to be a serious mismatch at the annual Samuel A. Mummy Memorial/Ohio Valley Athletic Conference All-star Basketball Classic at Ohio University-Eastern's Ney Center on Saturday.

Youel delighted the crowd with no less than eight long-range connections to lead the Ohio girls to a come-from-behind 85-79 victory before the Buckeye boys were never challenged in a 117-62 romp which completed the all-star sweep.

In the girls' game, West Virginia got off to a solid start with a 12-3 lead and were still in front by double-digits, 23-12, at the 10:35 mark.

Ohio put together an 11-point run, however, sparked by two Youel "triples" and a pair of goals from Edison's Lauren Flood to forge a 23-23 deadlock at the 5:00 mark. The Mountain State squad closed the half with a 16-10 spurt to move in front, 39-33, at the intermission.

The lead moved to 46-35 early in the second half, but a 15-2 run by Ohio, capped by consecutive "threes" from Youel, gave the Lady Buckeyes a 50-48 upperhand with 15:01 remaining. The action see-sawed over the next 10 minutes, with Ohio leading 66-65 when Youel again stepped up with two long-range daggers to extend the lead to cent); 8-of-23 on "threes" (34.8 percent); and 15-74-65 with 3:05 left.

West Virginia clawed back within four, 76-72, with 1:30 left on a three-pointer by Magnolia's Katie Blatt but that was as close as the Lady Mountaineers would get.

Youel finished 8-of-12 from beyond the arc (8of-13 overall) and took game scoring honors with 25 points. She also contributed five rebounds and four assists to the winning effort.

Shadyside's Kayla Holenka provided top support with 17 tallies and four rebounds. Shenandoah's Rachel Cruz had a nine-point, fourrebound effort; Edison's Flood collected eight points and six boards; and Bellaire's Nikki Driscoll had eight markers.

Ohio connected on 31-of-65 field goal attempts (47.7 percent); hit 11-of-26 from three-point range (42.3 percent) and 12-of-20 at the free throw line (60 percent). West Virginia, meanwhile, was 28-of-82 on action shots (34.1 perof-22 at the charity stripe (68.2 percent).

The Buckeyes led off the glass, 51-45, and overcame 23 turnovers, 10 more than the Mountaineers.

In the boys' game, it was all Ohio, all the time rebounds. including leads of 18-7 with 13 minutes left in the first half and 30-11 at the midway point. It was all but over at the half, with the Buckeyes on top 51-24 and if West Virginia had any thoughts of a comeback, a 22-3 explosion to start the second 20-minute period erased them.

Shadyside's Steve Luckhardt led a quintet of double figure scorers for Ohio with 16 points along with five rebounds and three steals.

Buckeve Local's Chase Groves tallied 14 points, had seven boards and three assists; Martins Ferry's Ryan Church netted 12 counters; East Liverpool's Brian Kreefer had 10 points and eight rebounds: and Beallsville's Casey Tolzda had 10 points and five caroms. The Buckeyes had a huge 71-35 rebounding advantage and were charted with 13 turnovers, one less than the Mountaineers.


Halftime activities included a three-point shootout for the girls and a slam dunk contest for the boys.



West Virginia Girls Feature Plenty of Depth






Buckeye players will play in six-minute intervals during the first half, but Madzia has reserved the right to switch the groups in the second half.







But the guards for Ohio simply can't be overlooked.


