


West Virginia head coach Terry Depew can also see his team getting tired of beating up on each other and ready to get onto the field.







"We do such things as conditioning, assessment of injuries, flexibility conditioning and making sure the athletes are hydrated," he

While Elliott might officially be on the Ohio side this year, he said he has some interaction with the West Virginia players and staff, as well.

Doctors instead performed a spinal fusion. This left Elliott in a full-body east for about eight months.

'I lost 40 pounds," he recalled.

Elliott recovered well enough to graduate with his class. But his dream of playing drums in the West Virginia University marching band was put on

Instead of heading to Morgantown, Elliott enrolled at trainers. In fact, he is working West Liberty with the intent of transferring to WVU.

He never left the hilltop. "I loved West Liberty so much that I just stayed here,'

Elliott majored in education, but was soon introduced to athletic training by Jim Watson, now the school's athletic director.

After graduating from West Liberty, Elliott later attended graduate school for sports medicine at WVU.

He went on to teach world history and serve as the trainer at Weir High, before moving back to his alma mater to serve in those same capacities.

Nowadays, Elliott is sharing his ever-growing knowledge of



Ohio all-stars romp to OVAC win, 35-6

Frontier's Mossburg, Buckeye defense shine; Cambridge's Daugherty hits five PATs

WHEELING, W.Va. — It was apparent early-on that Ohio didn't take too kindly to the fact that West Virginia had snapped its long winning streak in last year's Rudy Mumley Ohio Valley Athletic Conference All-Star Football Charity Classic.

Chio scored on its first offensive series to take control and the Buckeye defense turned in a dominating performance, resulting in a 35-6 mismatch in the 34th annual midsummer classic Sunday evening at muggy Wheeling Island Stadium.

With Ohio coached by Beallsville High's Dave Caldwell, it was only appropriate that a player from a Pioneer Valley Conference school would be among the standouts. Frontier's Anthony Mossburg didn't get the nod at quarterback, but the talented southpaw more than made his mark out of the backfield as he rushed for

and also unloaded a 74-yard halfback option TD pass to Martins Ferry's Clay Tucker to spearhead the Buckeye offense which piled up 402 yards on the night.

The Ohio defense, meanwhile, had numerous heroes in limiting West Virginia to just 98 total yards (including 62 on the Mountaineers' lone scoring play), but three sacks by Indian Creek linebacker Bruce Palmer stood out.

"Our defense was fantastic." Ohio's Caldwell beamed, "We had so many athletes on that side of the ball. We only had one defensive lineman and the rest were linebackers, fullbacks and wideouts who can cover and we just got after them. They didn't have any answer for our speed.

"They caught us sleeping on that one run, but other than that, we really shut them down." he added.

Offensively, Caldwell credited Mossburg for his unselfish

110 yards and two touchdowns switch of positions due to the fact that Ohio's roster had more from Steubenville's Antonio than enough OBs.

> "That goes to show when you take athletes, they can help you out," Caldwell offered, "and Mossburg is a great athlete. He came to play for us."

Ohio pounded out 227 yards rushing, with Caldwell crediting the size and strength of his line and backs for that total.

"When you have a big line and

big backs," the Ohio coach stated, "you want to run the ball. It's also tough to get the timing in the passing game in one week, so when you're having success running the

ball, that's what you do." A short punt to the West Virginia 33 set up Ohio's first score, with Bellaire's Mike Fisher scampering 22 yards around the right side to break the ice. Cambridge's Mike Daugherty drilled the first of five successful point-after kicks. giving Ohio a 7-0 lead at the 9:09 mark of the opening quar-

The Buckeye State gridders put together a 12-play, 74-yard drive to double their lead midway through the second quarter. A 34-yard pass completion Magnone to Wellsville's Derek Thompson sparked the series and it was a one-yard keeper by Magnone on third down that got the six-pointer. Daugherty's PAT gave Ohio a 14-0 halftime advantage.

Despite gaining just 13 net yards in the first half, West Virginia caught an early break in the third period when

Dana Brooke's Davis pounced on an Ohio fumble at the 30, but the Buckeye defense forced a three-and-out and gave the offense the ball back.

It took just five snaps for Ohio to widen the gap, with Mossburg taking a pitchout around the right side, cutting back across the field and eluding a tackler at the 10 for a 66yard touchdown scamper. Daugherty's boot made it 21-0 at the 6:07 juncture of the third quarter.

A swap of interceptions followed, with St. Clairsville's A.J. Twardoski picking one off for Ohio and Linsly's Wayne Gree returning the favor for West Virginia. The Mountain State squad turned it right back with a


fumble, however. Steubenville Catholic's Kenny Davis recovering at the West Virginia five-yard line.

Mossburg got the TD on the next play off the left side, and Daugherty's kick pushed the Ohio advantage to 28-0 with 2:48 left in round three.

West Virginia finally hit the scoreboard on the first snap of the fourth quarter, with Brooke's Davis breaking free for a 62-vard TD. Bellaire's Dirk Soland easily blocked the PAT kick, leaving Ohio on top 28-6 with 11:49 left.

Ohio got that score back in a hurry as Mossburg turned passer on a halfback option and found Ferry's Tucker wide-open behind the fooled West Virginia secondary for a 74-yard TD. Daugherty's fifth PAT closed the scoring with 11:27 remaining.

The Buckeyes finished with 402 total yards, including 227 rushing and 168 passing as 6-of-10 passes hit the mark. Ohio had 14 first downs; lost one-of-three fumbles; and had two penalties for 15 yards. In addition to Mossburg's total, Fisher added 54 rushing yards on nine carries Annual Rudy Mumley Ohio and Ferry's Ben Smith had eight totes for 40 stripes.

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





The final pieces of the Ohio All-Star puzzle came together today as head coach Dave Caldwell announced his defensive backs and specialty players.

The defensive backs are all cover guys with a knack for getting to the football, while he?s got a standout punter and placekicker ers: for the annual Rudy Mumley OVAC All-Star Charity Football Classic to be held July 24 at Wheeling Island Stadium.

"We feel that we have some pretty good talent in the secondary," Caldwell said. "We're in both his junior and senior seapleased with the defense we have assembled because we have such a nice blend of size and speed.

"It's also a nice luxury when you can find a quality kicker and punter for the team," Caldwell continued.

Set to compete in the defensive secondary are: Martins Ferry's Clay Tucker, Frontier's Anthony Mossburg, St. Clairsville's A.J. Twardoski, Caldwell's Brian Leasure. Handling the punting duties will be St. John's Chris DiCeasre and Cambridge's Mike Daugherty will do the kicking.

BRIAN LEASURE, Caldwell - This former Redskin speedster was a standout under head coach Josh Perkins.

The 5-ft-10, 155 pounder rushed for better than 1,000 yards son as a running back.

For his fine senior season, he was named first-team all-OVAC, all-PVC, second-team all-District and Honorable Mention all-Ohio. He was also the MVP of the Noble County Super Bowl. Along with



this all-star game, Leasure also took part in the BACF game.

Along with football, Brian has been active in track and wrestling. Away from the field, he's involved in yearbook, drama, volunteer coaching and lifting.

Brian -- who will attend Muskingum College? is the son of Danny and Lisa Leasure of Caldwell.

CLAY TUCKER, Martins Ferry ? This two-way Purple Rider standout was another of the big reasons why the Riders won their first-ever regional crown.

The 5-ft-11, 165 pounder was a standout at both defensive back and wide receiver for Coach Dave

As a wide receiver, Tucker caught 19 balls for 478 yards and three scores. In the secondary, Tucker was a lock-down cover corner and also a sure tackler.

Tucker was a first-team all-District, all-OVAC and all-Times Leader pick.

The Ohio University-bound athlete was also a standout in wrestling, winning the state title as a junior. He was a four-time OVAC champion, four-time sectional champion, four-time district champion and four-time state plac-

ANTHONY MOSSBURG, Frontier -- This Cougar did almost everything except sell popcorn for the Cougars this past fall, helping them to a 10-0 season.

As a quarterback, Mossburg threw for 1,164 yards and 15 touchdowns. He also rushed for 565 yards and seven touchdowns.

From his secondary spot, the 6-ft, 215 pounder was in on 66 tackles and had four intercep-

Mossburg was a first-team all-Ohio, all-District, all-OVAC player. He was also named Player of the Year by the Marietta Times.

Anthony – who is the son of Stephanie Mossburg of New Matamoras -- will attend Robert Morris College.

A.J. TWARDŎSKI, St. Clairsville -- This two-way standout was one of the most versatile players in the area for Coach Brett McLean.

Twardoski served as the Red Devils quarterback and also lined up at defensive back. As a quarterback, he passed for 671 yards. He also led the team in rushing with 764 yards and nine scores.

He was one of the top tacklers on the squad and had a team-high five interceptions.

The 6-ft-1, 185 pounder was a first-team all-Ohio, all-district, all-OVAC, all-Valley, all-Times Leader selection this



past season. All told, he earned nine varsity letters through football, basketball, baseball and track.

 Twardoski is also a standout in the classroom. He?s a twoyear member of the National Honor Society, four-year class officer, student council member, Culture Club, Prom Committee, Float Committee, Ohio Scholastic Team in both English and French. He's also received all-OVAC academic for four years and he's listed among Who's Who Among American High School Students. Twardoski has received the National Bausch and Lomb Science Award and twice earned the Chamber of Commerce Academic Award.

The 6-ft-2, 205-pounder had a net punting average of 29.9 yards. He had nine punts of better than 50 yards and 67 punts better than 40 yards.

DiCesare was a second-team all-Ohio selection, first-team District, all-Times Leader and . all-OVAC.

DiCesare also took part in basketball for the Irish.

Away from the field, DiCesare was a member of National Honor Society, Who's Who, all-OVAC Academic, Spanish Club and Interact Club.

Chris -- who is the son of Thomas and Juliana DiCesare of St. Clairsville -- will attend Miami, Ohio in the fall.

MIKE DAUGHERTY, Cambridge -- This Bobcat kicker was nearly automatic for Coach Rick Goodrich?s playoff-qualifying team last fall.

The 5-ft-9, 170 pounder made good on 41-of-46 PAT attempts and had one field goal.

He was an honorable mention all-District, all-ECOL player as a senior.





Ohio's defense starting to take shape

With his offensive players basically in tact, Ohio head coach Dave Caldwell selected some of his defensive linemen and linebackers for the upcoming Rudy Mumley OVAC All-Star Classic.

The players -- who are scheduled to report to training camp Sunday at noon at West Liberty State College -- are preparing for the July 24 game at Wheeling Island Stadium.

Caldwell announced his intended linebackers and defensive ends, which include Buckeye Local's Jake DaGrava, Union ball some 198 times. He was also one of the Local's Anthony Carson, Indian Creek's Bruce Palmer, Martins Ferry's Chas Yoder, Beallsville's John Skinner, Cambridge's Matt Lyons and East Liverpool's Lou Ward.

"The kids we think are going to play linebacker or defensive end are all hard-nosed kids," Caldwell said. "They are an athletic group with good size and speed. We plan to play a 50 defense in the game.

"In all-star games the defense is always well ahead of the

defense, so we knew we had to pick some quality kids at these positions," Caldwell continued.

BL PLAYERS OPT OUT OF DVAC GAME

CALCUTTA - Clearing up questions pertaining to the Ohio roster for the OVAC All-Star Football Game, Beaver Local coach Rich Wright said two of his players were asked to play in the game, but declined.

Dathan Ferrainolo and Dan Kinsey were selected by Ohio coach Dave Caldwell (Beallsville), but the duo has opted not to play in the contest, slated for July 24, because of the closeness to their departures for college - Aug. 4.

In the June 27 edition of The Review, a story was published with the list of participants for Ohio and West Virginia. Despite its 10-0 record and state ranking, Beaver Local did not have a player on that roster, prompting questions.

We had two guys picked," Wright said. "But the game was just too close to when they were leaving for their college seasons."

Wright noted that he had other players willing to replace Ferrainolo and Kinsey, but that option was never presented to him.

"(Steve) Mercer, (Josh) Weese and (Mark) Frederick would have replaced them," Wright said. "But I didn't talk to anyone about the game so I'm not sure what the situation is."

According to Wright, he sent Caldwell a list of his senior players and from that, Ferrainolo and Kinsey were contacted with letters inviting them to play. When the two declined their invitations, no other Beaver Local players were asked.

"I'm sure (Caldwell) doesn't know much about our guys," Wright said. "I'm not upset or anything, it's just the way things work out some-

Despite their success in the last half decade, which includes three 10-0 seasons, the Beavers have had just five participants in the game during that time span.

Josh Stoica (1999), Rick Prescott (2000), Jordan and Jared Williams (2002) and Jeff Dalrymple (2004). Adam Hoppel and Josh Pastore were selected for the game last year, but both declined. Wright said he believes that's because of an incident in 2000.

Breaking his leg during practice leading up to the all-star contest, Prescott was forced to sit out his entire freshman year at Mount Union College

"I think the kids might be a little hesitant to play because it's so close to when they go away to college and they don't want to risk injury, Wright explained. "I think the guys saw what happened to Ricky and they don't want that to happen to them."

Although no Beavers will be on the Ohio roster, East Liverpool's Lou Ward and Wellsville's Derek Thompson will play in the game, while Oak Glen's Mark Ice will play for West Virginia.



the most satisfying. Caldwell was often second-guessed and frequently blasted for his selection of his 33-man roster.



A host of Ohioans came up huge Sunday.

None more than Anthony Mossburg.

The multi-talented southpaw from Frontier was an all-Ohio quarterback, leading the Cougars to a

trio of state playoff berths. Caldwell didn't pick Mossburg to be a quarter-back for the Ohio team. Those chores were left for the capable hands of Martins Ferry's Ryan Church and Steubenville's Antonio Magnone.

Instead Mossburg torpedoed the Mountaineers as a running back, accounting for some 200 yards in total offense. He ran for more than 100 yards, scored two touchdowns (5 and 66 yards) and tossed

for another (74 yards). Mike Fisher of Bellaire was not a first-ballot choice for the Ohio team. But when Shenandoah's Jacob Zerkle encountered health problems, Fisher quickly and very effectively filled the void.

The University of Toledo-bound gridder set the tone for the night, scoring the game's first TD on a 22-yard gallop. He ended the night with some 51 yards to go with an acrobatic catch for 31 stripes.

The night's most dominating defensive player?

That was a no-brainer. Indian Creek all-Ohio linebacker Bruce Palmer stole the show. The rangy and relentless rusher recorded four QB sacks and

forced a fumble on the night. Coach Dave Bruney saw four of his Martins Ferry gridders suit up for the game, Bruney -- who guided the Purple to the state semifinals this past fall - witnessed four splendid efforts from his former players.

Fullback Ben Smith flashed an elusive running style to go with his always-punishing lead blocking. He gained 44 yards on eight totes. Church started under center for the Ohioans and was workmanlike before yielding to Magnone.



Ohio rolls in OVAC Mumley Classic

WEST VIRGINIA'S victory in the 2004 OVAC All-Star Charity Football Classic was forgotten quickly Sunday evening.

Ohio's more physical and athletic squad simply manhandled West Virginia to a tune of 35-6 in the 34th annual Rudy Mumley OVAC All-Star Classic at Wheeling Island Stadium.

"You can't coach speed and athleticism," said Ohio head coach Dave Caldwell who now owns a 2-2 record in the OVAC game. "We had athletes all over the place on both sides of the ball, and I am just proud of my team because they worked extremely hard all week to get ready for this game."

While there was much celebration in the Buckeyes' dressing room, the outcome left veteran West Virginia and Linsly head coach Terry Depew just scratching his head.

"They were a lot more physical up front than we were, and we just couldn't handle them," Depew said. "We knew their size was going to be a factor, but we didn't think it would be as big a factor as it was."

To say the Ohio defense was dominating might still be the understatement of the year.

The Buckeyes limited the West Virginia offense to 95 yards of total offense, 50 of those were rushing yards. They accumulated some nine quarterback sacks and allowed only four first downs.

"What a fantastic defense," Caldwell said. "We only had one defensive lineman, but we had linebackers playing there because they were athletes, and we just got after them and they really had no answer for our defense."

After the Buckeyes' defense forced a quick three-andout on the first West Virginia possession of the contest, the Ohio offense showed it was by no means a slouch

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"I could stand here and praise this defense all night long," said Ohio head coach Dave Caldwell. "I don't want to single anyone out because that was a collective effort."

Palmer could have been considered a one-man wrecking crew. He had some four sacks, forced a fumble and was basically unblockable.

"Coach Caldwell worked us real hard all week and we just had a bunch of good players all over the field defensively," Palmer said. "This was the best defense I have seen in years of watching this game. We flipflopped a lot of players to different positions, and it worked."

"I came in just trying to help the team," Fisher explained. "I got a good opening from the line on the (touchdown) play and just ran through it, and to score in this game is just really exciting."

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The Ohio defense kept holding up its end of the bargain for the remainder of the first quarter, holding the Mountaineers to two net yards in the first quarter.


"It's hard to single out one guy on our defense," Caldwell said. "They all played great. (West Virginia) couldn't run right or left because we just had people flying all over the place."

Steubenville High's Antonio Magnone -- who shared quarter backing time with Martins Ferry's Ryan Church -- capped a 12-play Ohio march with a 1-yard plunge. That drive -- which chewed up 5:48 off the game clock -- took 12 plays. The big play of the drive was a 44-yard pass from Magnone to Wellsville's Derek Thompson.

"When you got the big line and the big backs that we had you want to run the ball," Caldwell said. "You almost have to run the ball more because of the timing being a little bit off."

The half ended with Ohio owning a commanding 14-0



He was in on some three sacks and some 10 tackles in the game.








This is by no means Caldwell's first goaround in the game. He's coaching in the OVAC Classic for the fourth time and owns a 1-2 record.






