## Park Sweeps 4-A Titles for First Time

Patriots' Beabout claims overall crown; Yaeger leads girls to fourth straight triumph

Saturday was a historic day for the Wheeling Park High School cross country pro-

For the first time in the nearly 30-year history of the Ohio County consolidation, the Patriots brought home both the boys' and girls' Class AAAA trophies from the Cal Pokas OVAC Cross Country

Championships.
"The hard work is starting to pay off," said an elated Park head coach Michael Jebbia after action concluded at Meadowbrook High School in Byesville.

"But we still have more goals we would like to accomplish.'

The Patriots' Ryan Beabout, the favorite by many to capture the overall individual title, proved the prognosticators correct as he broke the tape in 16:47 for his first OVAC title.

Wheeling Park finished with 47 points, just two behind Bellaire St. John for the meet's overall team championship. It was the Patriots first boys' crown since 1994

Buckeye Local, who had won the last three Class AAAA titles, was second with 189 points. East Liverpool was third with 222 points,







The Maroon Knights' senior duo of Stephanie Caruso and Lauren Bauer crossed the finish line, fifth and sixth overall, respectively.






The bottom line is, I was really impressed with both of
