Magnolia bats come alive in 11-4 pasting of Wheeling Central

But Indian Creek had the only two runs it needed to upset John Marshall (15-4) for the second time in a week. In their first meeting, the Redskins took advantage of nine John Marshall errors to capture a 16-12 upset nod in eight innings. It required only one Monarchs miscue to help the Redskins accomplish an OVAC stunner.

With the upset nod, Indian Creek (8-12) moves on to Saturday's AAAA semifinals against another lower seed, Wheeling Park. The fifth-seeded Patriots defeated No. 4 Edison, 4-2, on the Wildcats' home field.

Mike Cottis, the Redskins' head coach, admitted he had clipped a portion of the newspaper article and attached it to his lineup card before the game.

'I have nothing against the media, but I saw it and thought this might be a good motivational tool for our kids," he explained.

'I know a lot of people have been saying that eight teams shouldn't be in there (the playoffs) and this proves that on any given day a team can step up and win a big game.'

Both sides received excellent pitching. Carney, who relies on his ability to throw strikes and hitting spots to keep opposing batters off balance, tossed a five-hitter. Carney issued one walk and struck out three. In one stretch, he retired 10 straight hitters, beginning with the final out of the second inning and continuing through the third fourth and fifth frames.

'Tyler has three, sometimes four pitches that he is able to control very well," Cottis said. "He has grown by leaps and bounds this year as a pitcher.'

Lewicki also was on his game after the early control problems as he matched ki popped out to Dunlevy at Carney's five-hit effort. 







The Red Knights will welcome winless St. John Central today. All told, Toronto owns four OVAC titles and the Irish have eight championships to their credit, but none since 2002.

Weirton Madonna earned the second seed and will host winless Valley this afternoon. The Blue Dons have two OVAC crowns in their possession with the last coming in 2004.

Paden City is the third seed in class 1-A and will host sixth-seeded Beallsville. The Wildcats come into the tournament with a 15-7 mark. Those 15 wins are the most in the entire OVAC. Beallsville, meanwhile, enters with a 3-9 mark. The Blue Devils have previously won two OVAC titles.

Bridgeport owns a 8-6 record and garnered the fourth seed, meaning Niekro Diamond will host this Bishop Donahue this evening. The Bishops are 8-14 on the year.

"For us, it's a matter of what team comes to play." said Bridgeport head coach Steve Wojick. "Anyone can beat anyone, and if you don't bring your 'A' game to the field, it doesn't matter how good you are because you're not going to get past this round.'

The Bulldogs have won four OVAC titles in their history, but the last came in 1977. Bishop Donahue also owns four brass rings with the last coming in


