


Veteran skip-per Bob Montgomery got the performance he was looking for offensively



Jellison missed on his next two and the Jets went to the bullpen for the second time in the



Magnolia's Blue Eagles are in the OVAC 3-A championship







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


UNION LOCAL'S Tyler Grant slides safely into third base with a stolen
