



to score 13 points in a row, including nine from Oak Glen's Clay Owings who demonstrated the ability to score in a bevy of ways from both the inside and outside.


A two and a three from Crozier just before half allowed the Buckeyes to inch within eight at the intermission.

Ron Smyth's coaching career indicates why it's good to pay attention to the advice of your parents.

Having no desire to really get into girls' basketball coaching. Smyth stopped at his parents house when he was just out of the college and coaching the Springfield Local freshman squad.

Smyth enjoyed his biggest success at Edison South and had expected a big season, but South and Edison North

No matter the event, no matter the time of the year at Union Local High School, Tug Robson's right there looking to do what he can to help.

Robson has been serving the Union Local Athletic Department in a bevy of ways for the past 15 years and that's what made him the choice to receive the Bob Burton Distinguished Service Award at the annual Samuel A. Mumley OVAC All-Star Classic, which will be held Sunday. April 11 at Ohio University-Eastern.

"Any award means a great deal to me, but an award coming from (the OVAC) means even more," Robson said. "This is the biggest conference in the nation and includes the entire Ohio Valley, so that makes it an even bigger deal to me.

Robson was almost in a state of shock when he heard about the award from Gene Ammirante, who is the assistant OVAC All-Star Game director.

"I remember it was Oct. 1 when Gene called me and I asked, 'didn't you have anyone else'." Robson recalled. "I'm confident there are people out there more worthy than me, but I am definitely honored."

Robson started working in the Jets' athletic programs during his high school days, serving

under Bob Liapple before his graduation in 1967. After a brief hiatus, Robson was asked to serve as equipment manager when Kevin Lucas was hired as the

boys' basketball coach.

There was no definitive reason as to his gap in services

other than "no one asked" him to help.
"Right after I graduated, I was still involved," Robson said. "But, during the 80s and early 90s, no one ever asked me to help, so I wasn't really over (at the high school) too much.

Robson has been a staple of both the football and bas-

ketball programs since.

With his position of equipment manager, Robson's not ashamed to admit that he runs a tight ship with the uniforms and gear. He sometimes sleeps in fieldhouse after football games, washing all of the players' uniforms and if there's a home reserve game Saturday morning, he doesn't head home until it finishes.

"I've been known to be pretty strict every once in a while with the uniforms," Robson joked, "Football definitely takes the most time.

His efficiency and dedication to the youth of the Union Local School District also jumped out at now former Buckeye Trail head football coach Randy Thompson who coached and attended UL. During the 2008, OVAC All-Star Game, Thompson asked Robson to join the

·Buckeyes' staff. "Working or being a part of the football all-star game has been on my to-do list since I was in high school," Robson said. "It's just a special event and the way the OVAC treats those kids and coaches during the week is

Dailer has been highly successful in both Ohio and West Virginia as a head basketball coach, serving lengthy terms of duties at both Bridgeport and Wheeling Central High Schools.


The award takes on a special meaning for Dailer since he played for Haberfield at Wheeling Central.

He was selected to coach West Virginia in the OVAC All-Star Game four times (1983, 1990, 1992 and 1998) and coached the West Virginia North-South Game once (1990).

His teams won five sectionals and made four trips to Charleston.

'Anytime you receive an honor as a coach, it's the result of the athletes you had the opportunity to coach." Dailer said. "Plus, I had great assistants working with me.

After being out of coaching for a few years. Dailer's urge returned and he coached the Bulldogs during the 2003 and 2004 seasons before he retired from teaching in 2005.

He wasn't retired long before he accepted a teaching position at Bishop Donahue, which he currently maintains. He's also the Bishops' athletic director.

"When I got out of coaching, I really missed being around the kids and the other coaches." Dailer said, During his career, Dailer also






