-OVAC Softball Tournament-Ferry, St. C. denied in 3-A

Lady Riders fall in 8 to Edison

The Edison and Martins Ferry softball teams met three weeks ago and the Lady Wildcats cruised to a 10-1 victory.

The two squads met again Wednesday evening in the semifinals of the OVAC Class 3-A softball tournament at the Chambers

I-470 Complex in Elm Grove. The Lady Riders showed they've closed the gap on their Buckeye 8 rival, but Edison is moving on. The Lady Wildcats will go after their eighth conference title Saturday at 12:30 p.m. against Meadowbrook after outlasting a valiant Lady Rider effort, 7-6, in a two-hour, eight-inning

marathon.

"This was a great game for the fans...particularly our fans at the end," said Edison skipper Spencer Bendle. "We've been struggling to put a full ball game together all year long and that was the case again tonight, but we're finding ways to win a majority of our games.

Edison appeared to be prime to win the game in seven innings.

After the see-saw affair, the Lady Wildcats took a one-run lead in the fifth and then added an insurance tally in the sixth when

senior Abby Connelly scored on a two-out single by senior Kayla Marcus,

"Edison always seemed to have an answer for us," said Martins Ferry head coach Paige Williams. "Give them all of the credit and we knew what their lineup was capable of. We had a few bad pitches and they capitalized on them at times, but our girls fought to the very end."

However, the Lady Riders were far from finished. Freshman Kylie Stalder belted a one-out single and Kylie Clark followed with a base knock of her own. Stalder eventually scored as an out was recorded, but Clark raced home on a wild pitch, knotting the game at six.

rally for a 8-5 victory and a spot in Saturday's Class 3-A final against Edison, which dispatched Martins Ferry in eight innings in the lidlifter.

"We came out hard and had an awesome start." said St. C. head coach Rachel Duncan. "We didn't have room for any mistakes and we made some. I am not disappointed, but it's a tough loss because I felt like we deserved it."

While St. C. (14-8) was making its first appearance in the semifinals in quite sometime, the Lady Colts are going back to the title game for the second straight year. They fell in last year's epic final to Harrison Central.

"St. Clairsville came out and hit the ball hard from the first pitch on," said Meadowbrook head coach Bridgett George. "But, we made some plays and we're just excited to be back in the finals."

The Lady Red Devils assumed a 3-0 lead after junior slugger Taylor Clark connected on a belthigh fastball and took it out of the yard in left.

They pushed the margin to 5-1 in the second when talented junior Jesse Machovina got a pitch to drive and deposited deep into the evening for a 2-run blast.

The Lady Colts then began to chip away. They got a single run in the third and tied the game in the fifth.

St. Clairsville pitcher Sarah Sienski struggled with her control and walked the bases loaded. Alyse Dudley plated a run with the first hit of the inning. Kylee Williams then drove in a run with another single, but Meadowbrook had a run thrown out at the plate.

Slenski then appeared to induce the second out of the frame when she got Alyssa Wright to lift a high fly ball to leftcenter. However, the Lady Red Devils' misplayed it and Dudley was able to knot the game.

The Lady Devils threatened in the sixth. Britany Saffel roped a triple to the right-field gap. The ensuing Red Devil batter appeared to have driven her home with a single, but Lady Colts' shortstop Candace Neff made a brilliant diving catch and then doubled off Saffel to thwart the rally.

The Lady Colts continued to build on the momentum. Ashley Clark poked a one-out single





The Dragons (20-4) advanced a runner to third in their half of the fifth, but Cera worked her way out of the miniiam.


However, she couldn't get out of the sixth as Cameron, which successfully defended its title, banged out five of its seven hits in the inning while tallying all three of its runs.




