Red Devils capture overall title

• St. C.'s Thornburg wins individual title; St. John prevails in Class 1A/2A By SETH STASKEY Times Leader Sports Editor

BYESVILLE - The cross country season is getting down to the nitty gritty.

The annual OVAC Cal Pokas Cross Country Championship kicked off a a fiveweek stretch of important meets Saturday morning at Meadowbrook High School.

As coaches and runners strategically plan their workout regimines for the next couple of weeks before the postseason begins, all hands were on deck as teams were aiming to win the conference title.

St. Clairsville's boys, who have been the area's pre-

mier team all season, continued to flex its muscle as it captured the overall title with just 61 points. Along with the overall title, the Red Devils claimed their ninth class championship, but first in 4A after moving up in the OVAC's new five-class system.

"The boys ran well," said Devils' head coach Tony Ciroli. "All of my kids stepped up today. Every one of them, and that's something we'll

continue to need as we continue on."

St. John Central got back to its winning ways after winning the 2010 title only to have it stripped by the OHSAA due to the use of an ineligible runner. The Fighting Irish took care of the ineligible runner. their business in the 1A/2A combined race, accumulating 169 points, which was good enough for fifth overall. The Irish finished just

Lady Devils capture 4A class crown



BYESVILLE - When the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference expanded, many thought University, Morgantown and Parkersburg South

would significantly alter the landscape.

After Saturday's OVAC Cal Pokas Cross Country Championship at Meadowbrook High School, it's highly evident the thoughts have turned into reality.

The Lady Hawks and Lady Mohigans ran away from the field

school's first overall title. Both University and Morgantown finished with 49 points.

St. Clairsville finished third overall and claimed its fifth consecutive OVAC class 4A title with 115 points.

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said Irish head coach Jeremy Midei. "By in large, I thought we ran a pretty good race. I think we have some things we need to work on before the postseason, but I think every team could probably say that. We knew Caldwell would be tough. We just wanted to get back to winning that single A, double A title.

Magnolia won its 10th OVAC cross country title, but first since 1990. The Blue Eagles finished with 209 points in a Class 3A division, which featured just one other school (Bellaire) with a full squad.

University won the 5A class and finished second overall 68 points. The Hawks edged out city-rival Morgantown for the largeschool banner. Wheeling Park finished third in 5A.

THE RED DEVILS not only won their second consecutive overall crown, but they also produced the meet's individual champion for the third consecutive scason.

Senior standout Andy Thornburg turned in a strong time of 16:03 to win his second consecutive title and kept it in his family for the third straight year as his brother, Alex, won in

"I feel like my brother and I have made a mark (on this meet)," Thornburg said. "I am feeling pretty good. I had a couple of meets in the middle of the season where I was struggling a little bit, but I felt good today. Hopefully, I can keep it going.

Thornburg and University's Jordan Stobbe-Brown went back-and-forth through much of the race. Thornburg led the race early, but between the first and second mile marks, slipped and fell for the first

time in his running career, allowing Stobbe-Brown to surge to the front.

However, the Hawks' senior proceeded to go down, himself, which reaway. From there, the Red Devils' all-Ohioan didn't look back.

"There's a little bank out there, and I just slid down it," Thornburg said. "He just slid around a turn, so I guess we both needed longer spikes."

Thornburg won the race by more than seven sec-

"The race pretty much went as I expected,' Thornburg said. "(Stobbe-Brown) and I battled throughout much of the race. We went back-andforth. I don't think either of us had a lead much bigger than a quarter of a mile.

Four of the five Red Devils' scorers earned all-Ohio recognition and the fifth just missed the top 25.

Junior standout Drake

Walker continued his strong season, posting a fifth place finish in a time of 16:40. Junior Joey Davies was 14th overall and third for St. C. in opened the door for 17:13. Senior Cole Antolak Thornburg, who had turned in a sharp effort, regained the lead, to pull placing 15th in a time of 17:16.

Rounding out the scoring for the Red Devils was sophomore Alex Timko, who placed 28th in a time of 18:04.

THE **FIGHTING** IRISH didn't even talk about last year's events as they prepared and geared up to try to win their 10th OVAC title and eighth under Midei's watch.

"None of the stuff from last year played into this,' Midei said. "It's a good feeling to win an OVAC title regardless of what's happened in the past. We just wanted to come out and run our best because the ghosts of that don't carry over to today for these guys. They just wanted to run well.'

The Irish were led by tal-

ented senior Ramon Nieves, who finished third in the race overall in a time of 16:29.

He was joined on the all-OVAC squad by junior Corey Leasure, who finished sixth overall in a time of 16:46, and senior Matt Thomas, who placed 19th in 17:36.

Sophomore Aaron Ebbert was 78th overall and fourth for SJC in 19:23. Sophomore Garrett Garrett Holubeck finished 83rd overall in a time of 19:40 to round out the Green's scoring.

"I didn't want these guys to try to run for this or for that," Midei said. "We wanted them to run for themselves, run for their teammates and, most importantly, run for the OVAC title. There's enough value in that to make it worth our while."

THE BLUE EAGLES might have been the happiest team of any when the OVAC announced it was expanding to five classes.

The Blue Eagles were led by senior Bill Feeney, who finished fourth overall in a time of 16:31. Classmate Alec Himerman was ninth overall in a time of 16:50.

Barnesville's Christopher Baker earned a spot on the all-OVAC team by virtue of his 24th place finish in a time of 17:55.

THE HAWKS prevailed by virtue of having all five of their runners earn allconference.

Wheeling Park, which owns 10 OVAC titles, finished third and was led by all-OVAC runner Tyler Long, who placed 22nd in a time of 17:51.





Area harriers to run for titles

The cross country season kicks into high gear this weekend, which is where it will remain for basically the next month.

The first of five consecutive big meets gets under way Saturday morning at Meadowbrook High School in Byesville with the Cal Pokas OVAC Cross Country Championship meet.

Action begins with the girls' race at 10 a.m. and the varsity boys' competition will begin immediately following the female race.

The OVAC cross country format stayed the same as the conference added its fifth class this season. All of the runners — regardless of class — will line up and run against each other. From there, the class champions will be crowned.

In the team standings, the 1A and 2A classes will be combined and each of the other classes will crown its own champion.

A new boys' champion in the smallschool event is assured as defending champion Barnesville has moved up to OVAC CC Championship

St. John Central, which won the meet title a year ago, but later had it stripped by the OHSAA due to an ineligible runner, will be one of the favorites.

Coach Jeremy Midei's Irish are somewhat of a mystery team because they don't run too many meets in the immediate area.

"Winning the A/AA championship has definitely been a theme for us this year," Midei said. "Our focus has been on being the best team we can be, and we get closer to realizing that each week. We'll have to be sharp this week if we hope to win the title."

Midei expects Caldwell to be one of the

chief competitors to the Irish.

On the girls' side, Shadyside is the defending champion. However, the Lady Tigers have yet to put it all together this season as they've struggled to find a consistent fifth scorer. The Lady Tigers are led by the strong one-two punch of junior Tara Tollett and senior Brooke Meintel.

Caldwell's girls — led by Jenna Furr — are a strong competitor as is River and St. John Central, which boasts one of the meet's overall favorites in heralded freshman Fallon Doyle.

"The girls have worked very hard to put our team back in the position where it can compete for the OVAC title," Midei said. "Caldwell, Shadyside and River are good teams, but we feel we'll be right in the mix"

IN CLASS 3A, another new champion is assured in both boys and girls as St. Clairsville, which has been the kingpin for the last several years, has bumped up to 4A this season.

Magnolia's boys must be listed amongst the favorites. Matt Quinett's team was strong in last weekend's

Cambridge Invitational and have ran well much of the season. Alec Hinerman and Bill Feeney lead the way. Both were in the top 10 of last year's meet.

All told, the Red Devils' boys own eight conference crowns and they've all came since 2000.

Senior Andy Thornburg is the defending overall boys' championship. He'll try to keep the crown in his family for the third straight year as his older brother, Alex, won the crown in 2009.

Senior Drake Walker, senior Cole Antolak, junior Joey Davies and Alex Timko have been solid.

"We are looking forward to running at Meadowbrook," said Red Devils' head coach Tony Ciroli. "The kids have always liked the course."

The Red Devils could receive a challenge from Meadowbrook and Harrison Central.

The St. C. girls own four OVAC banners and those have all come since 2007 under now retired head coach Heidi Mooney.

Ciroli now coaches the Lady Devils, too,

and they've not skipped a beat.

Despite losing defending overall champion Jamie Perzanowski, who now runs at Central Florida, to graduate, the Lady Devils have still been solid.

Juniors Amy Castle and Juliana Madzia lead the way, while senior Melanie Hannan has been a steady contributor.

THE MOST wide open class race appears to be in 5A with always powerful Wheeling Park being amongst the favorites.

University, which is running in just its second OVAC meet, won the big-school girls' crown a season ago, while another fairly new OVAC entrant, Parkersburg South, won the boys' crown. Morgantown's girls also figure to be in the thick of the title chase.

Wheeling Park, which trails only Shadyside for the most OVAC boys' titles and only John Marshall for the overall girls' lead, expects to challenge the defending champions.

The Lady Patriots are currently ranked fifth in the West Virginia state rankings and are led by Lauren Tarovisky, Madi Morris and Elena Romanek.

"Our girls are running very well at this point," said Park head coach Michael Jebbia. "The main goal this weekend is to go out and run our best and compete. We have a very quality team, but University and Morgantown are in a league of their own in the OVAC and West Virginia right now."

The Patriot boys, meanwhile, are ranked ninth in the Mountain State poll, but Jebbia still concedes the favorite tag to University.

"The boys are coming off a very good week where we ran well at our home meet," Jebbia said.

"We feel like we have a shot, but we know we'll have to run well to knock (University) off."
