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

Ohio hangs on, 27-26

· Buckeyes' defense comes up big late to thwart W.Va. rally

WHEELING - There's a lot of pageantry that surrounds the Rudy Mumley OVAC All-Star Football Game.

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And it was a pair of defensive plays by Ohio's Chris Littell and Dalton Secrest that will forever be etched into the memories of the crowd at Wheeling Island Stadium that allowed Ohio to hold on for a thrilling 27-26 victory.

'This was a total team effort," Littell - a standout at Shadyside - said inside an elated Ohio lockerroom. "I was the defensive captain and just got to be one of the many guys who stepped up and made a play. We were backs to the wall and (West Virginia) was just pushing forward the entire second half,"

It was a classic tale of two halves. Ohio dominated the first half and appeared to be on its way to posting a rout when it built a 27-7 lead midway through the second quarter and just pounced on a West Virginia fumble.

The momentum shifted drastically, however, when Madonna's Will Bowser scooped up an Ohio fumble and raced untouched 79 yards for a touchdown, making it a 27-14 game



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First for Dave Caldwell and then for Paul Kanzigg, Secrest was a force for the Blue Devils, helping lead them to an Ohio Division VII playoff berth last fall.

He registered an eye-popping 26 quarterback sacks and was the Blue Devils' leading tackler with 75 stops from his defensive line position.

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






can be a tough task. The coaches can only do so





Colabella will be a Hilltopper, while Fletcher is heading to play at Washington & Jefferson.



One mile and 70 yards is the longest race distance Only I Know has attempted to date. That was on the grass at Mountaineer on June 24, and he finished unplaced. Only I Know has made one prior effort in stakes company, in the six-furlong Woodstock at Woodbine near Toronto. He finished last in a six-horse field.

An examination of Only I Know's pedigree, however, reveals some impressive bloodlines. His sire, Flower Alley, earned \$2.53 million at the races. Flower Alley's victories included the 2005 editions of the Jim Dandy and Travers Stakes at Saratoga. Only I Know's dam, Cuz You Never Know, did most

of her racing in starter allowance and optional claim-

ing company at Northern California tracks. She made 10 career starts, and gained of a trio of wins, a trio of placings and modest purse earnings of \$52,000. But go back several generations in Only I Know's family tree and there resides an impressive representation of major Thoroughbred sires. There's a 4x3 Danzig

cross, a 4x4 Mr. Prospector cross, a 5x5 Raise a Native cross and Northern Dancer crosses, both top and bottom. Bred in Kentucky by Three Chimneys Farm, Only I Know was purchased as a weanling at Keeneland's November auction by E.J. Hubel for \$1,200. Hubel subsequently sold Only I Know to Flying G in a pri-

vate transaction. "We've never paid more than \$10,000 for a horse," Bowerman said. "Right now we own five, including a pair of yearlings, a colt and a filly, by (the 2007 West Virginia Derby winner) Zanjero." Debra E. Rombis is Flying G's trainer. The West Virginia Derby will represent her first stakes try at the Hancock County track.

Flying G donates two percent of its purse earnings to its Pick-Up Mount Program, "which aids jockeys who have ridden for us before, who have gotten hurt on the track," said Bowerman. "T.D. Houghton was supposed to ride Only I Know on March 4 But Terry got injured — broke his back — in a riding accident a few nights earlier."

Andrew Ramgeet has been Only I Know's regular rider. But Ramgeet's being replaced by Christian Pilares in the West Virginia Derby.

"Only I Know's got speed, and Christian's an expert at getting a horse to gun early," Bowerman said. "He'll be setting the pace, and we'll see what happens from there."





Only I Know's dam, Cuz You Never Know, did most of her racing in starter allowance and optional claiming company at Northern California tracks. She made 10 career starts, and gained of a trio of wins, a trio of placings and modest purse earnings of \$52,000.

But go back several generations in Only I Know's family tree and there resides an impressive representation of major Thoroughbred sires. There's a 4x3 Danzig cross, a 4x4 Mr. Prospector cross, a 5x5 Raise a Native cross and Northern Dancer crosses, both top and bottom.

Bred in Kentucky by Three Chimneys Farm, Only I Know was purchased as a weanling at Keeneland's November auction by E.J. Hubel for \$1,200. Hubel subsequently sold Only I Know to Flying G in a private transaction.





Ohio hangs on to win OVAC All-Star Game

WHEELING, WV "By one or one hundred....a win's a win."

Those were the words of victorious coach Jose Davis after his Ohio squad dominated the majority of the first half and then held on for dear life to claim a 27-26 victory over West Virginia in the 69th Rudy Mumley OVAC All-Star Football Game at Wheeling Island Stadium on Sunday.

Behind the strong right arm of QB Brenton Colabella (Steubenville Catholic), Ohio roared out to a 27-7 lead and was about to deliver a knockout punch with the ball deep in West Virginia territory just before halftime, but a scoop-and-score fumble return for a touchdown got the momentum going the other way, forcing the Buckeye State squad to battle to the very end to get the win.

Ohio drove 72 yards in six plays off the opening kickoff, scoring on a 37-yard pass from Colabella to Rich Springer (Edison). Zach Musilli (St. Clairsville) kicked the point-after to give Ohio a 7-0 lead with 9:48 on the first quarter clock.

After the defense forced a three-and-out thanks largely to defensive lineman Dalton Secrest (Beallsville), Ohio increased its lead to 14-0 with a short 29-yard TD drive.

Chez Glenn (Toronto) got the score on a seven-yard run and Musilli again conthe lead to 14-0 at the 5:08 mark of the first quarter.

West Virginia cut the lead

in half early in round two, scoring on a 31-yard pass from QB Zach Phillips (Wheeling Park) to Jared Yates (Bishop Donahue). Liam Casey (Wheeling Park) added the extra-point for a 14-7 lighting with 9:53 left in the first half.


Ohio made it 21-7 at the 6:35 juncture when Kenny Hess (Bellaire) made a spectacular diving catch of a 22-yard Colaballa toss in the back of the end zone, with Musilli nailing his third PAT of the night.

Following a pass interception by defensive back Nate Olmstead (East Liverpool), Ohio worked its way to its fourth score of the half behind Colabella completions of 38 yards to Olmstead and 23 yards to Hess and capped with a sixyard TD strike to Brendon Ross (Bellaire).


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The 69th annual Rudy Mumley OVAC All-Star Football Game will usher in a new gridiron season tonight when it kicks off at


goes their separate ways after this evening.

Dan McGrew has been around the game of football, basically, his entire life.

He graduated from Martins Ferry High School in 1955 and played in the OVAC All-Star Game that season. He then went on to Purdue University before being drafted by the Detroit Lions in 1959 with the 232nd pick.

He was then taken by Buffalo the next season and served as the Bills' starting center in all 14 games that year, earning All-AFL second team honors. He never played another down for Buffalo. Instead, he returned to the Ohio Valley and played for the legendary Wheeling Ironmen.

In 2009, Dan was one of eight to be inducted in the 29th class of the Minor Pro Football Hall of Fame.

After his playing days were over, Dan got into the coaching profession where he served as head coach at places like Chopticon High School in Maryland, St. John Central, Akron Hoban and Weir.

Since his retirement from the Hancock County School System, Dan remained in the coaching business. He served as the jr. high coach at Sherrard Middle School until about six years ago.

consistently hear that teams are battling low numbers.

But, as it pertains to the high-level players, obviously, I don't think it's a matter of their priorities. It's just their

priorities are different, and that's the way they should be. Some 10 years ago, the NCAA began allowing a Division I-A football scholarship to kick in for the summer term, meaning true freshmen reported to their collegiate destinations in June, rather than waiting until August when official camp begins.

Obviously, if you're a Division I player, and the school you're heading to wants you on campus, you can bet they're going to be there.

That rule caused many all-star football games to change their dates either into the spring or into June just before the players leave. Is that a cure all? Absolutely not because some schools just don't want their players play-

ing because of the risk of injury.

"This game still matters to the adults and the football fans of the Ohio Valley," Rataiczak said. "The kids, who have been in camp this week, really, really, really appreciate the opportunity they have. Obviously, it's been a very bizarre year, and maybe one of the worst we've had, for replacing kids.'

Moving the OVAC Game into June is an idea, but one with a very faint chance of ever happening.

In this year's game, one can safely assume – if they were able to play – that UMass signee Ross Comis (Madonna) and Youngstown State signee Jaylon Brown (St. Clairsville) would have been lining up for West Virginia and Ohio, respectively.

But, as Rataiczak pointed out, there's no guarantee of

"The Ohio Valley has had some pretty good players and we're in an up cycle of talent right now. You certainly can't fault a kid who chooses colleges over an all-star game," Rataiczak said. "They'd be stupid not to choose

Obviously, Rataiczak, Koch and all of the football fans of the Ohio Valley would love for the "blue-chip players" to be able to shine one more time in front of the area fans in a game that many grew up dying to be chosen for.

But, there's more to the Mumley Game than just football. It's an event that basically serves as the kick-off to

the season, the school year, etc.
"I don't see it moving," Rataiczak said. "You look at the middle of June and you've got senior trips, family vacations and there's still no guarantee you're going to get the blue-chip players. Before changing something, I want proof it's going to work. I still don't know that a big-time college, regardless of date or regulations, would allow its recruit to play in the game. A kid signs those papers and it's like an investment."

A handful of future Division I players have played in the game since the new NCAA rule began. Nate Davis reported to Ball State in 2006 and then convinced the Cardinals' coaching staff to allow him to go home and

play in the OVAC game.

Trent Neavin of Martins Ferry is currently on the Pitt roster. He played last year after having began classes and workouts. Austin Whipkey of Linsly is a captain for West Virginia this evening and he's heading for Marshall.

However, those are few and far between.
Guys like Dan Monteroso and Jerrid Marhefka weren't afforded the same luxury. And next year, it's possible Austin Dorris, who is headed to Indiana, and Colton McKivitz, who is headed to West Virginia, will also bypass the game.

Those are just the future Division I players, too. This year, a few soon-to-be Division II college players opted against playing at the urging of their future coaches. Soon, it could trickle into those going to play at a Division III school.

For the player, the OVAC and the fans, it's a shame. But, it's what those kids have to do and that's understood.
