Steubenville wins last event to clinch share of 5A crown **By CODY NESPOR**


Sports Writer ST. CLAIRSVILLE – The team title in Class 5A came down to the final 100 meters of the final leg of the final event at Saturday's OVAC Cal Griffin Track Championship at Red Devil Stadium in St. Clairsville.

Entering the event, Morgantown held a twopoint lead over second-place Steubenville (102-100). The final event of the day was the 4x400relay, which happens to be Big Red's best event.

The Mohigans were in the lead through the first three legs of the relay until Steubenville senior Brenton "Inky" Jones met Morgantown's Preston Core down the final 100-meter stretch. Jones outraced Core just enough to win the race by less than one second. 3:31.59 to 3:32.28, and clinch a share of the Class 5A championship.

"Both teams ran a heck of a race and we hap-pened to come out on top," said Steubenville coach" Andy Kidwell. "The coaches are very confident in the 4x400 team. All year, it's been that relay that we think is going to move on to the state level."




The Reds had lost nine straight and 20 of 21 before winning the first game of Saturday's doubleheader. Friday night's game was rained out.




