WHEELING – After dotting his career at Linsly with game-changing plays, it was a fitting sendoff for Luca DiLorenzo to play the part of the hero one last time in his final high-school game.

It'd been a low-scoring, defense-centric OVAC All-Star Football Game through three quarters, with Ohio ahead 3-0 going into the fourth. Bilby wins his first Kalkreuth **Amateur Golf** Championship

WHEELING — Thirty-six holes weren't enough to decide the Kalkreuth Amateur golf tournament Sunday on the sun-soaked Trent Jones Course at Speidel Golf Club inside spacious Oglebay Park.

Ryan Bilby, a junior-to-be at Marshall University, parred the first extra hole – No. 18 – to hold off Bryan Myers who bogeyed, for his first Kalkreuth Amateur title. Both players, who are good friends on and off the course, carded 139s.

"I kind of struggled yesterday (Saturday). I didn't make any putts but I came out today and hit it really good for the first 13 holes," Bilby said. "I was 5-under and had it going.

The victory didn't come easy. however, as the 20-year-old Brooke High graduate struggled down the stretch after leading by three shots with five holes to play. It all started on the 14th when his second shot splashed down in a small pond in front of the green.

"I hit it in the water and bogeyed that hole and then bogeyed 15. I told myself, 'whatever, I've still got three holes left," Bilby added. "It was deflating but in golf you've got to have a short memory sometimes.

That was more than enough time for DiLorenzo to flash his skills once more.

West Virginia started at its own 34 and quickly got to midfield with a pass from Coffield to Wheeling Central's Riley Watkins, who shined on both sides of the ball. A key handsto-the-face penalty against Ohio advanced the leather to the 35 and, after a holding penalty against the Mountaineers and a dead-ball personal foul against Ohio, West Virginia had a first-and-5 at the 30.

Coffield took the snap and handed to DiLorenzo who looked to pass, but tucked the ball under his wing and weaved his way to the promised land. The Fairmont State recruit cut to his left after crossing the line of scrimmage, made a couple of would-be tacklers miss before sprinting down the left sidelines. The PAT was no good, but the Mountaineers led 13-9 with 55 seconds on the clock.

"Luca is an unbelievable athlete and he showed it on that play. He's a great dancer and he danced with the

ball on that play."

On third-and-15, Watkins intercepted a pass as time ran out to secure the win.

"This feels amazing, especially to be able to do it with Coach Young," he said. "I give every ounce of my football career to Coach Young. He's the best man I've ever met. I love him to death and tear up when I think of not being able to spend another minute with him on the football field."

Ohio had taken a 3-0 lead just past the midway point of the second quarter when Harrison Central's Jace Madzia split the uprights from 32 yards out.

West Virginia let a pair of golden scoring opportunities slip away in the late stages of the second quarter.

Following the three-pointer, West Virginia marched to the Ohio 6 on a 39-yard connection from Coffield to Watkins on second-and-20. Watkins made a nifty move at the Ohio 40 and got around a block to the sidelines before being run out of bounds.

Wheeling Park's Erick Brothers, Jr., had a huge quarterback sack on the final drive.

"It feels good to win this game on my home field since we lost in the first round of the playoffs," the WVU wrestling commit said. "It feels really good"

A pair of running plays moved the ball to the 1 but a bad snap on third down resulted in a four-yard loss. DiLorenzo tried some razzle-dazzle but Fort Frye's Zaiden Huck and Steubenville's Spenser Ostovich didn't bite as Ohio took over at its own 3.

However, a fumble on second down was recovered by Weir's Jamari Hubbard-Bass at the Buckeyes' 8.

A pass interference penalty on Ohio advanced the ball to the 4, but Coffield was brought down after gaining a yard. St. Clairsville's Andrew Vera knocked down a third-down pass in the end zone, and then picked off a pass in the back of the end zone with 14 seconds left in the half.

"Jacob was down on himself for throwing that interception, but I told him you stick with us because we are going to stick with you. He responded," Young said.

The third quarter saw the teams combine for 67 total yards as both offenses struggled to find any rhythm. In fact, the teams only converted 2 of 19 third-down attempts — none

until the fourth quarter — and to go a combined 2-for-7 on fourth down.

"Offensively, we just couldn't get out of our own way," Barnesville's Blake Allen, who led the Ohio squad, said. "We had a lot of penalties ... a lot of mistakes. We only had a week to prepare, but no excuses. We just didn't play well.

"We finally took the lead late there in the game, but I told the guys that the game wasn't over," Allen continued. "Their No. 7 (DiLorenzo) made a great play. He's a very good player. We missed some tackles, as well.

"They made one more play than we did. Congratulations to West Virginia."

DiLorenzo finished with 98 yards rushing and 31 receiving. Coffield was 5-for-9 for 119 yards with a TD and INT. Watkins caught three passes for 62 yards, ran for 34 and made several big plays on defense.

"Riley is a hard-nosed kid. He was a four-year player for me and I couldn't be more proud of him right

now," Young added.

Ohio could only manage 75 yards of offense — only 16 on four pass completions — on 42 snaps. Union Local's Jaksan Price ran six times for 25 yards.

But another big victory made it even more likely they'll have at least two more months to enjoy their two-way superstar.

Ohtani hit his major league-leading 36th homer in Los Angeles' final home game before the Aug. I trade deadline, and the Angels wrapped up a strong homestand with a 7-5 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Ohtani's low line drive in the first inning was his 24th homer in his last 45 games. Only five other major leaguers entered Sunday with more than 24 homers for the entire season, but Ohtani has rekindled his June power surge after the All-Star break with four homers during the Angels' nine-game homestand.

"Every single time you see Shohei, he does something to help the team," said Luis Rengifo, who hit two homers.

While Ohtani's future is uncertain as the team heads to Detroit, the Halos' recent team success seemingly decreases the odds of a trade while Los Angeles owner Arte Moreno decides whether to risk losing Ohtani in free, agency this winter.

General manager Perry Minasian has said the Angels are highly unlikely to deal Ohtani if they remain in playoff contention. The Angels are still in the AL wild-card race, although it currently features seven teams separated by roughly six games for the final two spots.

Andrew Velazquez and Rengifo hit back-to-back homers during the Angels' four-run fifth inning, and Mickey Moniak extended the majors' longest active hitting streak to 14 games during Los Angeles' sixth victory in eight games.

Tyler Anderson (5-2) yielded eight hits while pitching into the seventh inning for the Angels. Carlos Estlvez worked the ninth for his 23rd save, remaining perfect this season in save chances

"It means a lot after how we finished the first half," Est vez said of the Angels' surge. "We figured out a way to get going again, and it feels really good. Things are going our way."

Bryan Reynolds homered for the Pirates, who have lost seven of nine out of the break. Liover Peguero got his first career RBI on his second major league hit during Pittsburgh's four-run

seventh.

Mitch Keller (9-6) allowed three homers for the first time in his career while giving up nine hits and six runs over five innings with seven strikeouts in his third straight winless start. Pittsburgh's ace earned his first major league victory during the Pirates' previous visit to Angel Stadium in August 2019.

"It looked like he got away from his fastball a little bit," Pittsburgh manager Derek Shelton said. "When you stay in the middle of the plate in the big leagues, you're going to get hit."

Peguero doubled home Nick Gonzales in the seventh and then alertly scored from third when reliever Jacob Webb dropped catcher Matt Thaiss' throw back to the mound and was slow to retrieve the ball. Carlos Santana added an RBI double before Webb escaped the jam.

DELAYED START

Ohtani will make his next mound start Friday in Toronto. The Angels pushed back his final pitching appearance before the trade deadline to give him an extra day of rest and to avoid putting him in line to start a Wednesday afternoon game in hot, humid Atlanta the following week — one day after the deadline. Nevin is worried the humidity could cause a reoccurrence of the finger blister that bothered Ohtani earlier this month.

After the touchdown grab, it seemed like some of the momentum had rubbed off on Ohio as well, who returned the ensuing kickoff to the West Virginia 14 and powered through a Ray Ray Pettigrew touchdown rush. A game which had resembled two gears grinding against each other now looked like a metronome swinging back-and-forth. And with three minutes remaining in the game, DiLorenzo had more in the tank still

A highlight-reel run went 30 yards to the end zone, DiLorenzo making nearly every man on the Ohio defense miss on his way to the house. With less than a minute to play, West Virginia had lurched into the lead again, and would not relinquish their advantage.

The two plays were the second and third-longest plays of the day from either side, behind only a 39-yard catch from Riley Watkins in the first half, and the only touchdowns for West Virginia in the win.

"It's all about my blockers, all about my teammates in those situations," DiLorenzo said. "We practiced all week, and the line said they would put them down, and they sure did put them down right there."

"Unbelievable athlete," Young said. "[DiLorenzo] showed his athleticism, what he's able to do. We knew he could break it, he dances like crazy, he dances with the football and I'm just so

proud of him."

Unbelievable, yet expected, was the sentiment surrounding the future Fairmont State Falcon, as those who know him best were not at all shocked at the day he turned in at Wheeling Island Stadium.

"It was no surprise," Wyatt Haynes, an offensive lineman for West Virginia on Saturday and a teammate of DiLorenzo's at Linsly, said. "I've seen it too many times. That's just him."

DiLorenzo and Haynes represented Linsly well Saturday, and enjoyed being able to share the field one last time.

"It was special," Haynes said. "I've played with Luca since sixth grade, and we've been doing this stuff for eight years now. It was nice to have a final game like this. The last game of the season just didn't feel like it was it. I didn't know why, but I'm glad we could finish up here."

"It was great, especially being able to play with my guys," DiLorenzo said. "And then having a bunch of new teammates, nothing better than that."

In all, DiLorenzo totaled 98 rushing yards, a rushing touchdown, 31 receiving yards, and a receiving touchdown.

New Zealand opens Women's World Cup with Norway upset

AUCKLAND, New Zealand (AP) - On a day that started with tragedy, the Football Ferns triumphed.

Hannah Wilkinson scored to open the second half and New Zealand went on to upset Norway 1-0 on Thursday for its first-ever win at the Women's World Cup, hours after a shooting in downtown Auckland shocked the host nation.

A gunman stormed a highrise construction site near Norway's team hotel and opened fire, killing two people. The gunman was found dead after a police shootout.

There was increased security at Eden Park stadium, where 42,137 - a record crowd for a soccer match in New Zealand were on hand to cheer on the home team, co-hosts of the tournament with Australia.



All-Star Game a crossroads for players







For the Ohio team, Blake Allen and his staff sifted through over 90 player nominations before finalizing his squad, standing at 30 players going into camp. While the Barnesville head coach knows all about Ohio's various rivalries, and how intense they can be, his talented team has been able to come together in record time.

"It's been a really cool thing to see," Allen said. "I'd always heard the stories, but to actually see it first-hand, to see these rivals coming together, sitting at tables together, joking, telling stories, laughing, having a good time at practice, that's pretty neat. You're kind of trained where Ferry-Belaire are supposed to hate each other, Barnesville-[Union Local] are supposed to hate each other. To see these guys coexisting as teammates, that's what it's all about.

"It's a really cool thing to see. I think we ended up with about 75% of our schools being represented on the Ohio side. I think we've got 17 or 18 schools between our 30 players. We wanted to try to give as many schools a chance as we could. We're excited about it."

Mike Young and his West Virginia team have experienced a similar phenomena, a result. Young suspects, of the increase in communication among players from different areas.

"A lot of them, because of social media and how we interact today, they've gotten to know each other over the years and they've shared experiences even before they even got here to camp." Young said.

This is Young's third time coaching the OVAC All-Star Football Game, having coached the Ohio team in 1991 and the West Virginia team in 2013. Throughout his years of involvement with the game, the longtime Wheeling Central head coach feels honored to continue a rich tradition of competition.

"This place exists because of so many people before me, before all of us in this room. Whether it was Rudy Mumley, Sam Mumley, Tom Rataiczak, there's so many people. And there's always someone to take their place. [...] I could go all the way back to Cal Griffin and Cal Pokas and the newspaper people, so many that I either coached with, played with, played against. It's a lot of years, but I feel like I've been very rewarded in being able to continue on with this."

And as Saturday ticks closer and closer, the OVAC is hoping to start some new traditions too, through programs like \$1 student tickets at the gate, and hand-fan giveaways to the first 2,500 fans in attendance.

"What we want to see are more kids in the stadium, in the stands." DeCoy said. "We want to see the green, we want to see the maroon, we want to see the purple, the orange. We want to see the red, white and the blues. We want to see more of that, and we're also hoping to have more young families come out and start a tradition, like a lot of us have, going to the OVAC All-Star football game every fall. Time is ticking on a decision. Truex announced last June that he would return for 2023 and he hasn't made up his mind yet on 2024. Gibbs needs an answer. So do the sponsors and all other interested parties affected by Truex's decision.

"I think it is, though, very important for us to kind of have some pressure here because it's pressure for all of us," Gibbs said. "It's a huge deal for us."

Truex, the 2017 NASCAR Cup Series champion, said he was close

to choosing.

He is still driving at an elite level and has stamped himself again a serious contender for the Cup championship. But the choice is much more complicated for Truex than making it about simply wins and losses.

"They deserve the very best driver, the guy that wants it more than anyone else, and I've been that guy," Truex said. "I want to make sure that if I come back, I'm willing to do that. It takes a lot. It's not just show up at the track, drive the car, go home. It takes a lot. It takes a lot of commitment. It's a lot of travel. A lot of time missing things with family and friends and all those things that I've done for 25 years. Do I want to keep doing it and am I willing to sacrifice all those things again for my team?"

JGR hopes the answer is yes. "Our focus is on this championship and winning that, and we'll worry about next year come December," crew chief James Small said.

At the Magic Mile, the answer could wait another day; it was

simply time for an overdue celebration.

"This one's been eluding me for a long, long time," Truex said.

Truex led with 15 laps left when JGR teammate Christopher Bell, last year's New Hampshire winner, smacked the wall to bring out the eighth caution.

"We should have a company policy that says when one of your teammates is leading, don't crash by yourself," Truex said over the radio.

It really didn't matter for Truex. He pulled away off the restart with nine laps left and could taste victory — and soon enough, the lobster that traditionally goes to the winner.

There was no such tasty prize in 1994 when the elder Truex won at New Hampshire. The Truex family went to the track so often that younger brother — and fellow driver Ryan Truex — tweeted a family photo of the kid brothers and mom in the grandstands.

About as soon as Truex could race at New Hampshire, he won. Truex had just turned 20 when he won a regional stock car series race at the track. Pretty cool. Even better? His father finished fifth in the same race.

"This place is a big reason why I got to where I am." the younger Truex said.

Truex found early success in Loudon once he transitioned to Cup in 2006, rattling off a third-place finish and a fifth in 2007 when the series still raced here twice a season and a fourth and seventh in 2008. He had six straight top 10s from 2016 to 2020 and led 172 laps from the pole last season before he faded to

fourth. Truex said his JGR team "panicked" with a late call for two tires that backfired and cost them the checkered flag.

"It's always been one that I wanted so bad, and maybe I think too bad at times," Truex said.

The wait is over.

With 34 wins, a championship and three season runner-up finishes, Truex has built his case for the Hall of Fame.

If only he can pull off the perfect ending.

"It would be pretty awesome to

win the championship and walk off into the sunset," he said.

Joey Logano finished second. Kyle Larson, Kevin Harvick and Brad Keselowski rounded out the top five.

BUSCH BUMMER

Kyle Busch was forced to drive his backup car after the No. 8 Chevrolet suffered damage in both practice and qualifying. Busch hit the wall early in the race and was forced out after 71 laps. The two-time Cup champion finished last. Busch had one win and finished in the top 10 in each of his last seven races.

"I've been lacking right-rear grip the whole time we've been here," he said. "Just couldn't get the right-rear feel in the race track."



A look back at 25 memorable years as sports writer

It's a thought that all of us have had at

But, it's one that I've really spent a lot of time wrestling with over the course of the last month or so and it is "where does the time go?'

It was November of 1998 when I first walked into The Times Leader office in Martins Ferry to meet with then sports editor Bubba Kapral about a part-time sports writer's job. That simply seems like just

Now, as you're reading this, yesterday (Friday) was my last day at The Times Leader. I've accepted the position of Athletics Director at Wheeling Central Catholic High School and actually started two

Somehow, someway, I am going to try to summarize nearly 25 years of chronicling Ohio Valley sports and athletes in less than a thousand words.

My mom, who died in July of 1998 and unfortunately never got to read one article I wrote outside of my high school newspaper at Shadyside, used to tell me when I was growing up to do my best to find a career that didn't feel like work.

I can — without hesitation — say I was

able to do just that . Let's be honest! I was getting paid to cover sports in an area in which I grew up. Fresh out of high school, and working through my time at Ohio University Eastern, how could it honestly get any better?

Unfortunately, with that position came some moments of being content. There were times when I slacked off in college or didn't even explore any other jobs be-cause, quite simply. I had found my dream


The first game I covered was Monroe Central at Shadyside girls basketball. I still have that article. Actually, I have several because my grandmother used to clip them out for me. However, she told me a couple of years into it that there were simply too many to save and nowhere to put them. I considered that a compliment.

Anyway, back to that original by-line story, which wasn't very good. That's not the point, though.

I had made it. To me, as an Ohio Valley native who couldn't wait to get to my grandmother's house on weekend mornings because she subscribed to both The Times Leader and The Intelligencer so I could read recruiting tidbits in Doug Huff's "smorgasports" or see what na-tional events that the T-L had "assigned" Rich Gibson to cover or what Cal Pokas' thoughts were on Ohio State football. On top of all of that, there was still the droves of prep coverage that both papers are still known for today.

As I grew even older and became active in different sporting things at Shadyside. I realized I wasn't going to be an athlete. so I wanted to pursue things that could help me in life, but still be involved with sports. I was the scorekeeper for girls basketball and watched several games that Bubba Kapral coached against the Tigers and then would look anxiously to see if and who covered the games for the paper. I met Greg Harkness, who is the current athletic director at Martins Ferry, this way and peppered Gibson with countless questions about the business.

In track season, I was involved in the meets that Shadyside hosted in a variety of ways, including timing for then head coach Donna Joseph. Well, Kapral was the Irish track coach, too and it came full

walked into The Times Leader office in Martins Ferry to meet with then sports editor Bubba Kapral about a part-time sports writer's job. That simply seems like just yesterday.

Now, as you're reading this, yesterday (Friday) was my last day at The Times Leader. I've accepted the position of Athletics Director at Wheeling Central Catholic High School and actually started two

Somehow, someway, I am going to try to summarize nearly 25 years of chronicling Ohio Valley sports and athletes in less than a thousand words.

My mom, who died in July of 1998 and unfortunately never got to read one article I wrote outside of my high school newspaper at Shadyside, used to tell me when I was growing up to do my best to find a career that didn't feel like work.

I can - without hesitation - say I was able to do just that . Let's be honest! I was getting paid to cover sports in an area in which I grew up. Fresh out of high school. and working through my time at Ohio University Eastern, how could it honestly get any better?

Unfortunately, with that position came some moments of being content. There were times when I slacked off in college or didn't even explore any other jobs because, quite simply. I had found my dream

The first game I covered was Monroe Central at Shadyside girls basketball. I still have that article. Actually, I have several because my grandmother used to clip them out for me. However, she told me a couple of years into it that there were simply too many to save and nowhere to put them. I considered that a compliment.

Anyway, back to that original by-line story, which wasn't very good. That's not the point, though.

I had made it. To me, as an Ohio Valley native who couldn't wait to get to my grandmother's house on weekend mornings because she subscribed to both The Times Leader and The Intelligencer so I could read recruiting tidbits in Doug Huff's "smorgasports" or see what na-tional events that the T-L had "assigned" Rich Gibson to cover or what Cal Pokas' thoughts were on Ohio State football. On top of all of that, there was still the droves of prep coverage that both papers are still known for today.

As I grew even older and became active in different sporting things at Shadyside, I realized I wasn't going to be an athlete. so I wanted to pursue things that could help me in life, but still be involved with sports. I was the scorekeeper for girls basketball and watched several games that Bubba Kapral coached against the Tigers and then would look anxiously to see if and who covered the games for the paper. I met Greg Harkness, who is the current athletic director at Martins Ferry, this way and peppered Gibson with countless questions about the business.

In track season, I was involved in the meets that Shadyside hosted in a variety of ways, including timing for then head coach Donna Joseph. Well, Kapral was the Irish track coach, too and it came full circle when I had the opportunity to cover his Lady Irish winning back-to-back state championships. However, long before that, I remember approaching him at a meet about any opportunities at the paper.

He looked at me like "who in the world are you?" That approach paid dividends six months later when I hannened to be reading the paper as a freshman at OUE and saw a part-time job in sports at the Wheeling Intelligencer in there. I applied and interviewed with the legendary Nick Bedway. Talk about nerves ... here's an 18-year-old kid sitting down with an icon about a job.




