These elected delegates are unusual, not just because they were elected, but because they lived through a complete year of office--and out of that unique experience, have contributed the most relevant bits of thought and prose which they have touched in the course of that year of leadership.

The title is one that Mr. Frank Cheley used for a booklet in 1923, and which Mr. Jack Cheley has given us permission to use.

These aren't answers; they are reference points in the leadership journey. They are questions and rules of belief which are the only elements that can maintain a leader when he tries--when he commits himself--when he leads.

But one thing leadership demands of one who would lead is contemplation—deep thought about the nature of leadership. Leadership demands the commitment of the chosen leader to think!

This book might make a difference—not just as a speech resource to be browsed, not just to read at leisure moments (there aren't any such moments for a leader). This is a book to review regularly—to read when times are good and when they aren't. This is a book which demands response—from you, the reader. You have the responsibility to keep records yourself, as you go along, to keep this book relevant, by recording the thoughts of reason, by becoming a source, and by filling in the next to last page and sending it to me.
