History of the 1914 Football Season

It is the year 1914. The war in Europe is just beginning to involve the eastern hemisphere in a terrible conflict that will change the nations of the world in the brief space of four years. But over here the clash of nations has not yet threatened the peace of the country and affairs go along in their usual style. The auto is a comparatively new invention and airplanes are not yet an everyday sight. Coach Bill Estabrook is preparing for a war all of his own at the 16th street football field. The Big Reds are starting the greatest season in the high school's history, one that is destined to go down in the books as the season supreme. Boys whose names are later to become legendary and synonmous with Bellaire high school football work out nightly under the watchful eye of Estabrook.

Finally comes the season's opener, the start of a roaring victory march through all opposition in a drive that meets its match only in the strong Columbus East high team, paced by the immortal Chick Harley. A luckless Moundsville eleven fell victim of the mighty Reds who romped at will through the bewildered Trojans for a 42-0 victory. Beck, Foley and Houston bombarded the Trojan defense with seven touchdowns. Aggressive Ernie Beck and White, Trojan halfback, further enlivened the tilt with a near fight when Beck smashed White to the ground with a hard tackle, and the Trojan back was removed from the game when he charged Referee Johns was crooked.

On the following Saturday the Reds scored a revenge victory over Cambridge on the 16th street gridiron, humbling the visitors with a 32-0 assault that evened up a similar defeat by the invaders in 1912. Continuing their roughshod march over all opposition, the Reds registered the third consecutive victory of the season in humbling a hapless Steubenville outfit, 49-0. The Reds found the muddy going much to their liking and, despite the loss of quarterback Clyde Duffy, relegated to the sidelines with an injured shoulder, the Red reserves picked up the torch and pounded at will through the Stubber defense. The Hub city outfit failed to make a first down, while the Red backs averaged 15 yards per try from scrimmage.

Rain constituted no handicap to the Rampaging Reds as East Liverpool failed to survive and sunk beneath a 38-0 avalanche. The heavy Potter team might have felt the sting of defeat to an even greater degree had not the mud slowed the Red backfield to a certain extent. Coach Estabrook kept the lineup liberally sprinkled with reserves throughout the contest.

Martins Ferry shoved over a first-quarter score against the Reds but the irresistable Red machine, evidently angered that its goal line had been crossed, blasted the Rider defense from end to end and scored the most decisive victory in the long series between the teams, finishing out front 54-7. The Red line, composed of Brady, Cochran, Deafenbaugh, Green, Nelson, Tschappat and Lawrence, was responsible for the sixth victory, a 41-0 triumph over Zanesville. The forward wall ripped and tore through the Zanesville offense and sawed wide holes in the Zanesville defense, through which Beck and company poured like water over a dam.

Marietta's hosts found themselves hopelessly outclassed by the Reds as they bowed, 33-0, to what papers were beginning to call "Ohio's greatest high school team." By this time the Reds were we'll on their way to the school's best record and the assault of 25 different teams since that time has failed to better the mark. In seven games the Reds had totalled 289 points, average a little better than 41 per game, while holding opponents to a mere touchdown.

But the Red record was endanged when Chick Harley, who was later to become Ohio State's brightest star, led his Columbus East high team into town for the acid test. Packed stands turned out to witness the great Harley in action, and give them an exhibition he did. Diminutive Clyde Duffy alone staved off defeat for the Reds as he pulled Harley down time after time in the open. Green and Cochran were outstanding in the Bellaire line, and paced the Red line in the pinches after East and Harley had scored in the first quarter.

The East defense kept the Reds bottled up until the final quarter when a desperate Red drive started goalward. Foley, Beck and Duffy were the spearheads in the march and Beck's long toss to Duffy finally shoved across the tying counter. Foley's kick for point was no good. Near the dying moments of the game Harley shook loose through the Red line and Duffy, playing safety, hit him so hard that both players were knocked out.

The going got tougher after the East game and New Philadelphia, catching the Reds at the bottom of an emotional let-down, threw a scare into the boys but class finally told and Duffy's kicks for point supplied the margin of victory. The East game had evidently taken something out of the Reds and with the traditional Wheeling tilt a few days off, Coach Estabrook kept the gridders plugging in an effort to snap them back to normal.

Thousands jammed Island park on Thanksgiving afternoon, 1914, to witness the battle for Ohio Valley football supremacy. Riding on the crest of a psychological wave, the Gold offense battered time and again at the Red line until finally the Gold advance moved into pay territory. Defending a 6-0 lead, the Gold defense stubbornly resisted the Red attack, giving up only a grudging two points on a safety during the third quarter. With the minutes fading fast, the Reds moved to the Gold 20 yard line where the attack appeared stalled until Duffy tossed to Houston over the Gold line for the deciding touchdown. Duffy added another touchdown a few minutes later on a 50-yard jaunt to put the game on ice, and the Reds had finished the season with a 16-6 victory over Wheeling, annexing the championship of the Ohio Valley.

They were a hard-fighting, hard playing bunch, that 1914 team, and kept in there pitching until the final whistle. Today they are graying a little and the old paunch has taken on a few extra inches. Boys on the 1914 squad, who were not present at the time the picture was taken, shown in this issue of the football program were Allen Duga and Frank Nelson. The former served as captain of the Bellaire Hi team in 1917.

VOTE TO KEEP THE SCHOOLS OPEN

Every city and exempted village in this section of Ohio has voted a levy for school outside the ten mill limitation. This has been necessay in order to secure the levy required by the state before state assistance is given. Bellaire has had a three mill levy for many years. These levies can be voted for any number of years not exceeding five. This year the voted levy expires and the board is asking for a two mill levy instead of three mills. This will mean a tax reduction of one mill for school purposes.

The passage of this levy is necessary if the schools are to be kept open. Where levies have been defeated as in Hamilton, Dayton and Springfield, in the last few years, either new special elections were called and the levies voted or school terms were shortened. Bellaire schools cannot operate for full time this year without this levy. Local income would be lessened and state aid would be withdrawn. Vote "yes" on this levy.

LOSS OF 5 YARDS

- 1. Taking more than three times out during either half.
- 2. Illegal delay of game.
- 3. Failure of substitute to report to umpire.
- 4. Violation of kick-off forma-
- 5. Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team before ball is snapped. Also, backfield man illegally in motion.
- 6. Offside by either team, or enroachment on neutral zone.
- 7. Attempt to draw opponents offside.
- 8. Taking more than two steps with ball after signalling for fair catch.
- Illegal use of hands and arms by defensive players.
- 10. Flying block or flying tackle.
- 11. Running into kicker.
- 12. Crawling by the runner.

LOSS OF 15 YARDS

- 13. Team not ready to play at scheduled time.
- Substitute communicating with teammates before ball is put in play.
- 16. Failure to stop at least one second on shift play.
- 17. Forward pass by member of team which did not put ball in play.
- 18. Forward pass touched by ineligible player.
- 19. Intentional grounding of forward pass.
- 20. Interference by member of passing team with defensive player eligible for pass.
- 21. Interference with fair-catch or tackling player before ball is caught.
- 22. Illegal use of hands and arms by offensive players.

- Defensive player striking opponent above shoulders.
- 24. Roughing the kicker.
- 25. Piling up, hurdling, clipping.
- 26. Tackling player out of bounds.
- 27. Coaching from the sidelines.
- 28. Illegal interference with defense by passing team.

OTHER PENALTIES

- Striking, kneeing, or kicking opponent—half the distance to the goal and disqualification of offending player.
- 30. Foul within one yard line half the distance to the goal.
- 31. Interference by defensive team on forward pass—first down for passing team at spot of foul.
- Flagrant roughing of kicker disqualification, plus fifteen yards.
- 33. Flagrant unsportsmanship conduct—disqualification, plus fifteen yards.


