The Big Reds Meet

Tonight's game presents the unusual spectacle of Big Red meeting Big Red for both the Bellaire and Steubenville high elevens are known far and wide by the same nickname.

The game itself represents the first grid contest played between the elevens of the two schools in 16 years and only the third meeting of the old rivals in the last 20 seasons.

The Stubs hold the upper hand. In 1922 they defeated Bellaire 23 to 0 and in the Ohio Valley championship game of 1923 at North End Field, the Cartledge men were victors again, this time by a 20-0 count.

The 1939 Bellaire-Stub game also marks the full return of the Wellsmen to Valley competition for they also meet Martins Ferry and East Liverpool before the curtain falls.

In the last 20 years, the Stubs have played valley rivals 24 games, most of them in the early years of Coach Cartledge's regime, and they hold a wide margin of superiority over their river front foes. Of the 24 valley games, the Cartledgemen have won 18 encounters, lost but five and tied one, running up 576 points to 97 for the opposition.

Bellaire has long been one of the top pigskin powers in the Wheeling district and in 1938 they lost but one tilt, while so far this year they have swept aside four straight foes, Shadyside, Youngstown Chaney, Tiltonsville and Benwood Union, rolling up 115 points to only 13 for their rivals. They are coached by John (Butch) Niemiec, a Bellaire grad who later starred at Notre Dame and who teaches his own Big Red the "Fighting Irish" system.

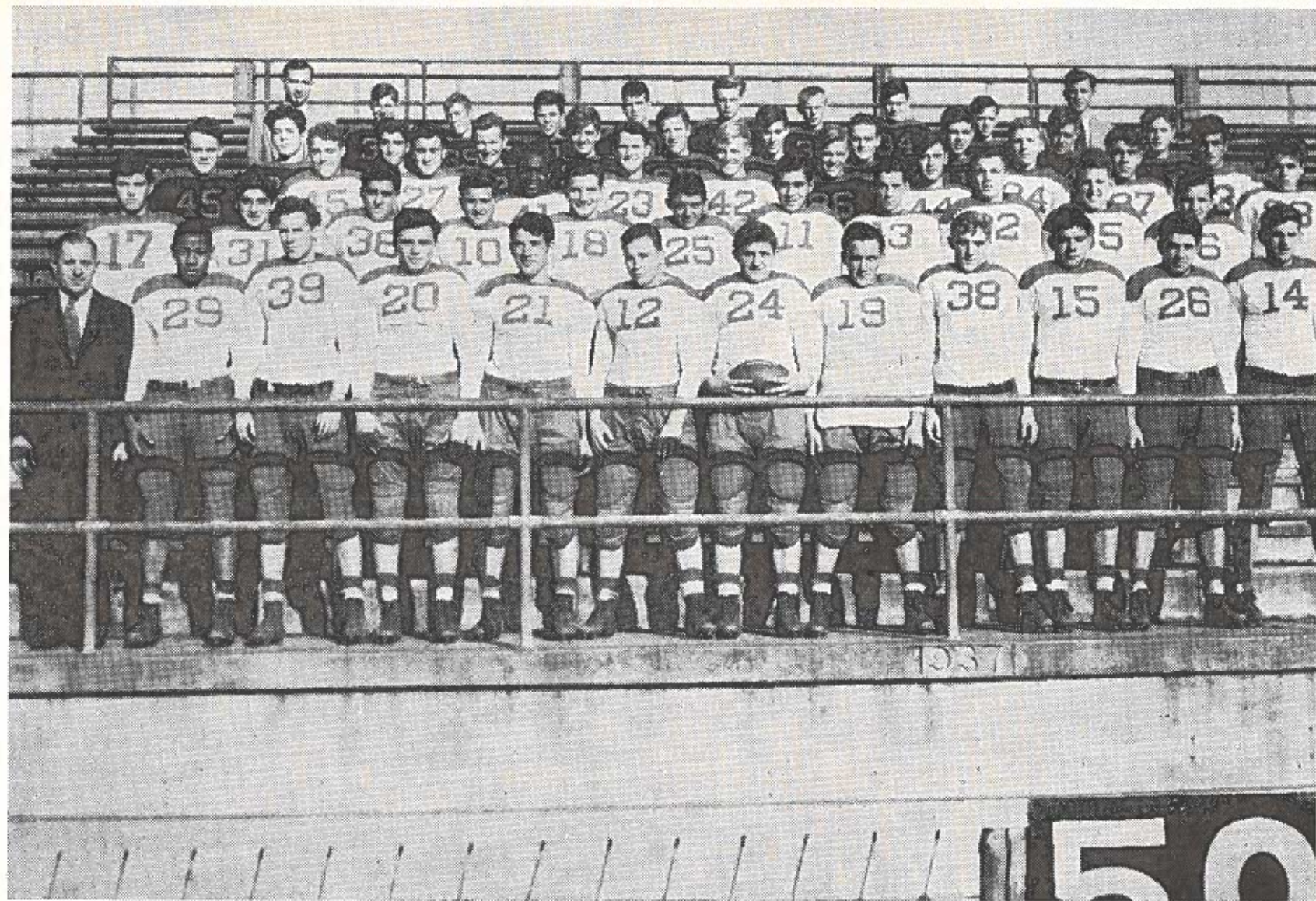

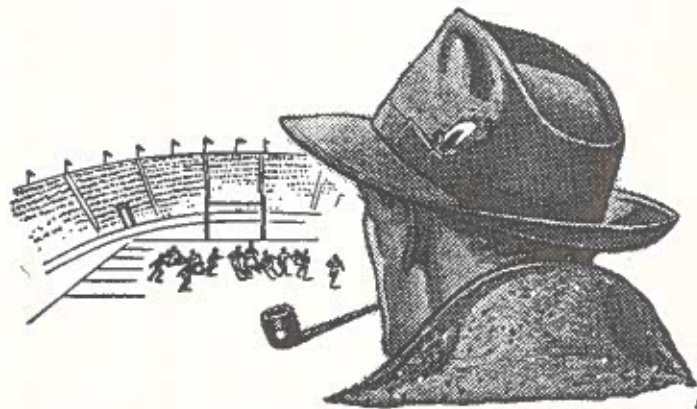

THE HUB

Linemen have outnumbered backs as captains of the Steubenville high football team since the Big Red was born back in 1919. Since then, eleven men in the forward wall have captained Cartledge-coached pigskin juggernauts while only nine backfield men have captured this honor.

Cas Myslinski, the junior player who leads the 1939 Big Red team, is only the third center to hold down the captain's responsibilities in 20 seasons for the Stubs. The other two captain-centers were Pat Sweeney of the 1922 machine and Brady Sullivan, leader of the 1935 eleven and now playing his third year of varsity ball at the same spot for Western Reserve university at Cleveland.

Three ends, three tackles, and three guards, have been captains of Wells elevens, in addition to the three centers and nine backs.

All the captains in modern Wells high football history have been: 1919 Fred Risdon; 1920-21 Minnie McSwiggen; 1922, Pat Sweeney; 1923, Piano Bowers; 1924, Dom DeMayo; 1925, Jimmy Welsh; 1926, Tony Reducha; 1927, Buddy Coles and Cliff Spellacy; 1928-29, Pete Reducha; 1930 Mele Zori; 1931, Steve Rybolt; 1932, Puck Burgwin; 1933-34, Bobby Arthurs; 1935, Brady Sullivan; 1936, Babe Hampton; 1937, Jack Roe, and 1938, George Straka and Ted Williams.

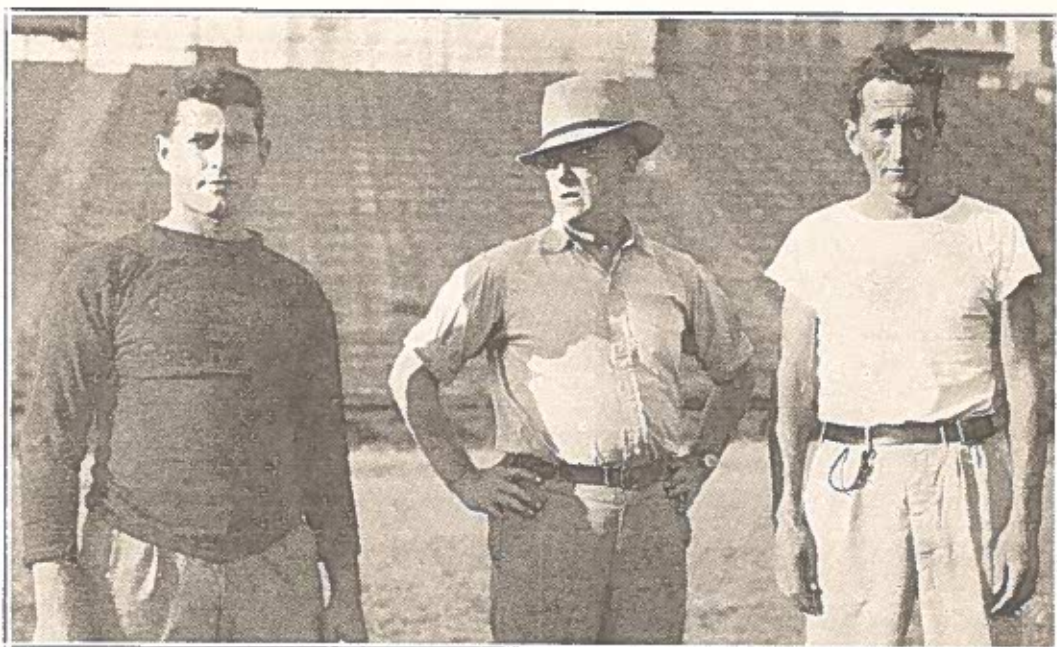

The History of The Big Red

History holds a high place for the glorious deeds on the gridiron of Steubenville high school's football teams of the past and from the earliest days of the game, Stub teams have been noted for their prowess, clean play and brilliant collective and individual performances.

The Big Red's modern history dates back to the fall of 1919, when Charles Q. Cartledge started on what has proven an unexcelled coaching career, and many glowing chapters have been written by his clubs.

In 20 seasons of play, the Crimson elevens have gone into 173 grid battles and have come off victorious in 138 of these encounters. Only 26 times have they been beaten and but nine times have they been held to ties. In this span, the Big Red has scored 3,777 points and limited the opponents to but 725 tallies.

Seven of Punque's teams, the '22, '23, '25, '26, '30, '32 and '35 elevens, were unbeaten. Three seasons the Big Red lost but one game and in eight other campaigns they lost but two combats a year. Twice the Wellsmen have gone over the 300 mark in point-making, on seven occasions they have run up more than 200 counters and in only four seasons have they fallen below the century total. Such outstanding performances year after year, long ago earned the Big Red its rightful place in the gridiron sun.
