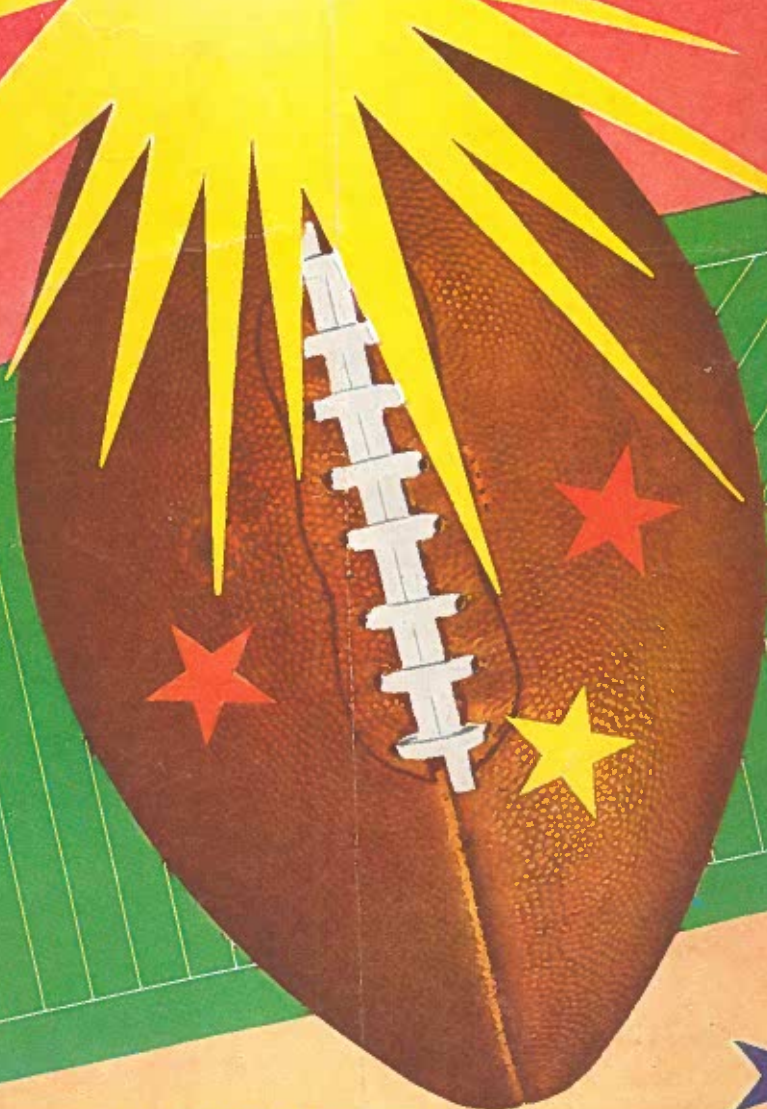

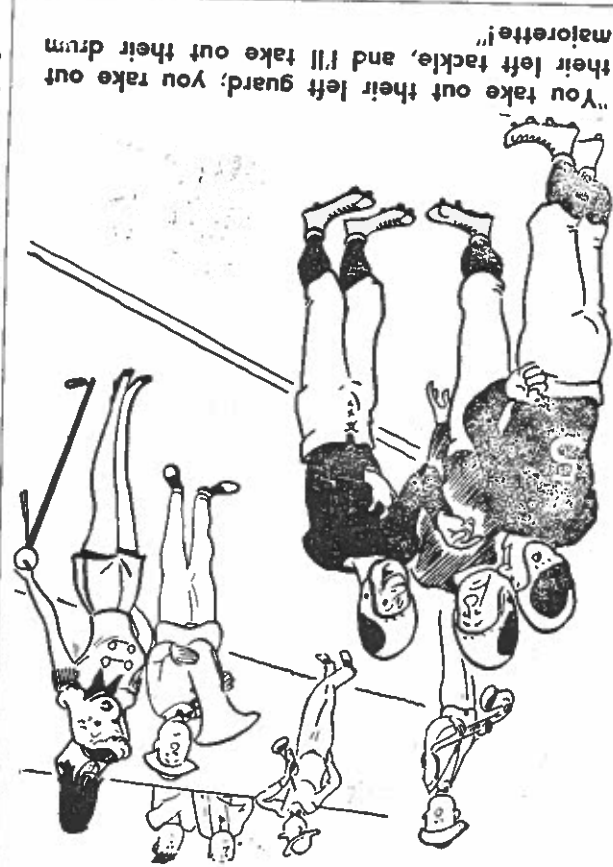

## DO YOU REMEMBER? . . . by Jimmy Mountain

That little booklet which the Big Red Boosters club is distributing, "40 Years With the Big Reds", will open the gate on a lot of memories, mostly good, some bad, for both the guy who wore the red and black and the ordinary Joe Fan who sat in the Riverview Pk. yesterday, and here at 26th st. today. Actually, this is the 42nd year in an unbroken string that started in 1910, when a touchdown counted 5 points and you wore a big welt across the jaw from somebody's nose guard, and has carried through to '52 when you have to look close to see who has the ball on the tricky T-handoffs and you don't have to be toted off the field before they'll give you a substitute . . .

The first big year, the one they still talk about around here, was 1914, when Coach Joe Estabrook's club won seven-in-a-row without even being pressed, then was tied by the famed "Chick" Harley and Columbus East team, closing out the season with two more wins for an unbeaten and once-tied record. That was the year they gave it good to favorite enemy Martins Ferry, and the next year the Riders were absent from the schedule. A lot of the fellows who played that game are still around—but some of them aren't.

You can wrap yourself around many pleasant recollections by browsing thru the booklet, - the scores will bring up a picture of a play or player from the half-forgotten corner of your mind. Like, for instance, that Colbus East game, when Clyde Durfy, who today keeps his field in shape for the boys and the stands in shape for you, caught Harley on the 5-yard line in last seconds to hold score at 6-6 and preserve the unbeaten record. Everybody can't remember everything, and we don't go back that far in our own conscious life, but these are some of the things we remember or were told about:

The stores uptown in the days before the 1930's when you could walk down Belmont street and see a dozen football window displays arranged for a particular game, like the Hart Bakery window with the cutouts of the players, lined up on a marked-off field . . . the signs the Boosters Club painted on the windows in the early '30s, the one particular window sticking in our memory, "Rutan U-Tan Union" . . . and before that, the window stickers of "BEAT Wheeling", and the combinations worked up like "Beat Wheeling, Eat Wheeling, At Wheeling", just by tearing off the first and first and second letters! Bellaire's first drum major, Charley Bomar, now a city fireman, and the big white shako that looked as if he ever fell down he'd be sticking straight up in the air . . . the school band developed from the old "Rube Band", and they tell the story about the guy who borrowed a bass drum for the Wheeling game, then got so tired carrying it that he threw the drum in the river when the band marched across the Island bridge . . .

Coach Al Sears' 1925 team which duplicated the 1914 record of nine wins and one tie, linsly spoiling that year with a scoreless draw. . . It must be

we're snake-bitten, but we've never been able to kick home an unbeaten, untied season . . . somebody's always getting into the act . . . Bud Bonar quarter-backed that ball club, and also the 1926 team which posted nine wins and a single tie . . . that year we got by Linsly 9-6, but Marietta came along three games later to play us off 0-0 . . . those were the years they stopped the games and bought out Bud's special square-toed kicking shoe when he got back to top-kick . . . and you marked them up almost automatically when he put on the shoe. . .

Katz Kadlic at Riverview Park hurling would-be tackerers, and you kept hoping that nobody ever caught him head on going up in the air . . . The 1929 Martins Ferry game, when Miller Munjas stepped out of the end zone on a punt and the Riders won 2-0 . . . a few years later ours was the only town in the whole land with local boys quarter-backing three of the nation's leading college teams, with Bonar at Notre Dame, Kadlic at Princeton, and Munjas at Pittsburg. . .

Long and then-lanky Mike Basrak leading the 1930 team's defensive line . . . six years later and some 80 pounds heavier, he was Duquesne University's first All-American . . . his ball clubs today at DuPont Manual High in Louisville, KY, play the way he did, no quarter . . . Coach Bart Rutan's four-year record of 30 wins, six losses, and four ties, from 1930 to 1933, one of them a 3-2 win over Mingo in 1931, with quarterback Joe Churman kicking the field goal . . . Coach Steepy Glenn's double wing and the wide sweeps when it looked as though he had ten blockers out in front of the ball carrier . . . the 7-3 loss to Martins Ferry when the Riders said they had practiced that "bounce" lateral on which the winning touchdown was scored . . . we still don't believe it . . . Brickly Malley, killed at Iwo Jima, running up three second-half tds in 1939 to beat the Riders 18-13, after Ferry had scored twice in the first half . . . and Coach "Butch" Niemiec, hospitalized for an appendectomy, using North Carolina State-Pittsburgh Steeler Mac Cara as his telephone "eyes" during the game over a special line from the stadium to the hospital . . . Ferry reigned the next year by winning 15-14, the only break-through on an otherwise all-winning season . . . Coach Jim Dixon's 1946 team, tied by Shadyside in the opener, going on to win all the rest with the exception of a 7-0 loss to Shadyside . . . the first and only 11-game schedule in Big Red history . . . Coach Bud Bonar's 1950 ball club, which came within a few seconds of posting the first all-winning season, with New Philly spoiling that by scoring the tying touchdown in a prayer-pass play to gain a 20-20 standoff . . . The oddest season, 1913, during which the Reds won three, tied three and lost one . . . one of the ties was an unbelievable 34-34 standoff with Marietta . . . and the highest score, the 104-0 win over Barnesville in 1916 . . .

You got a million more of these memories hanging around somewhere just waiting to be pulled out of the mental file, dusted off and relived . . . try it!

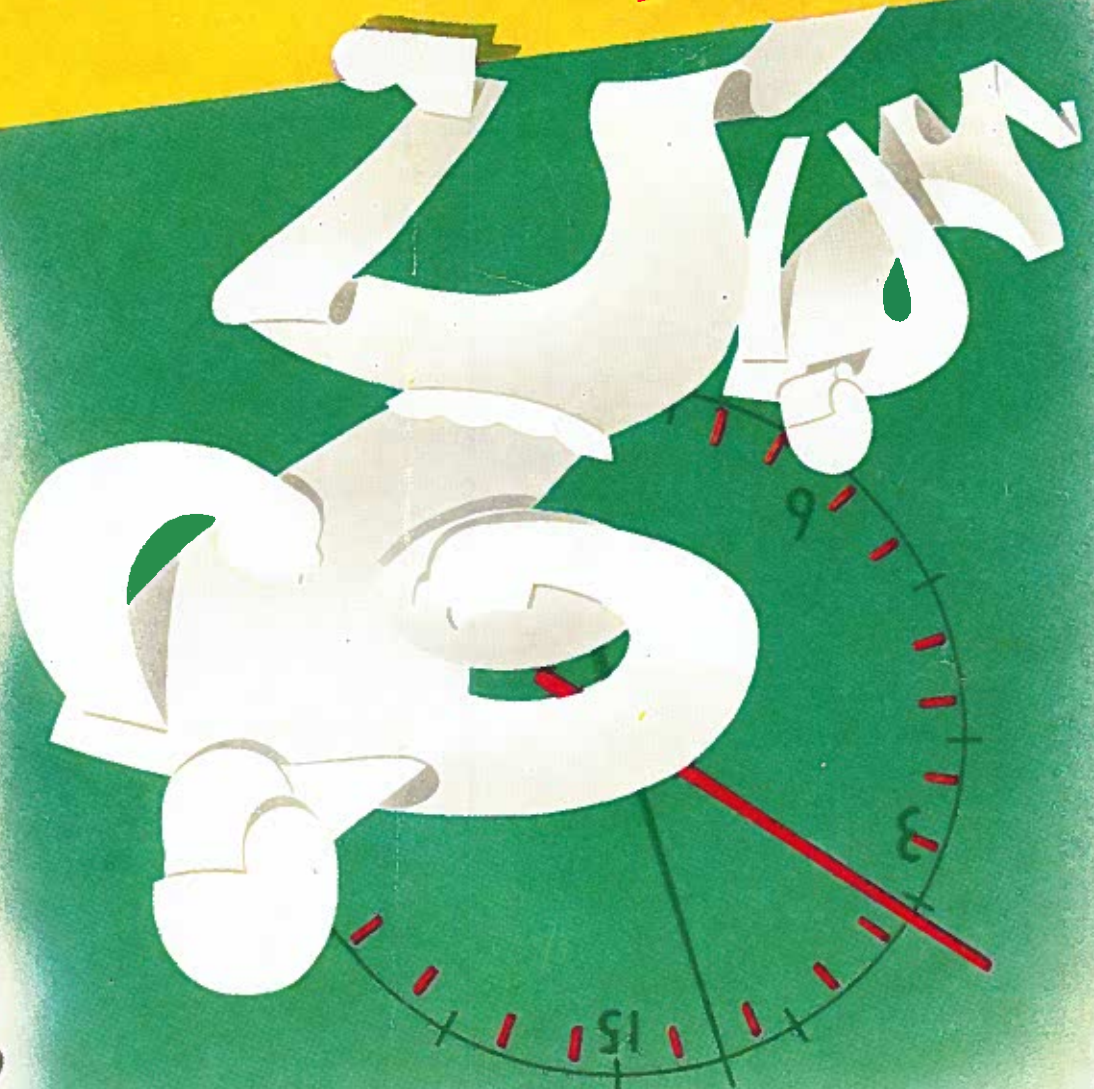

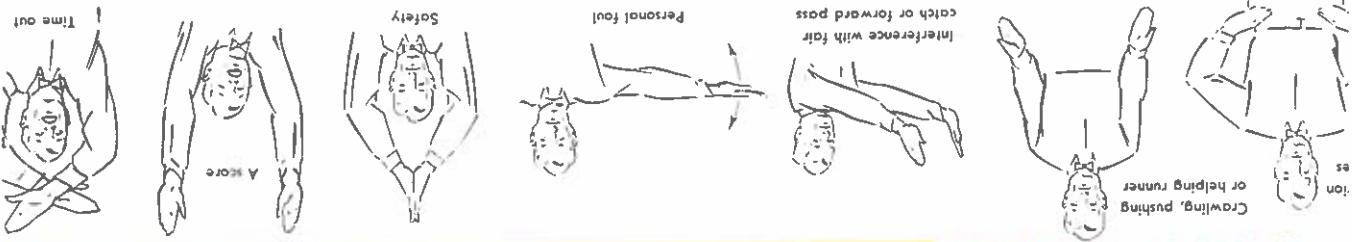

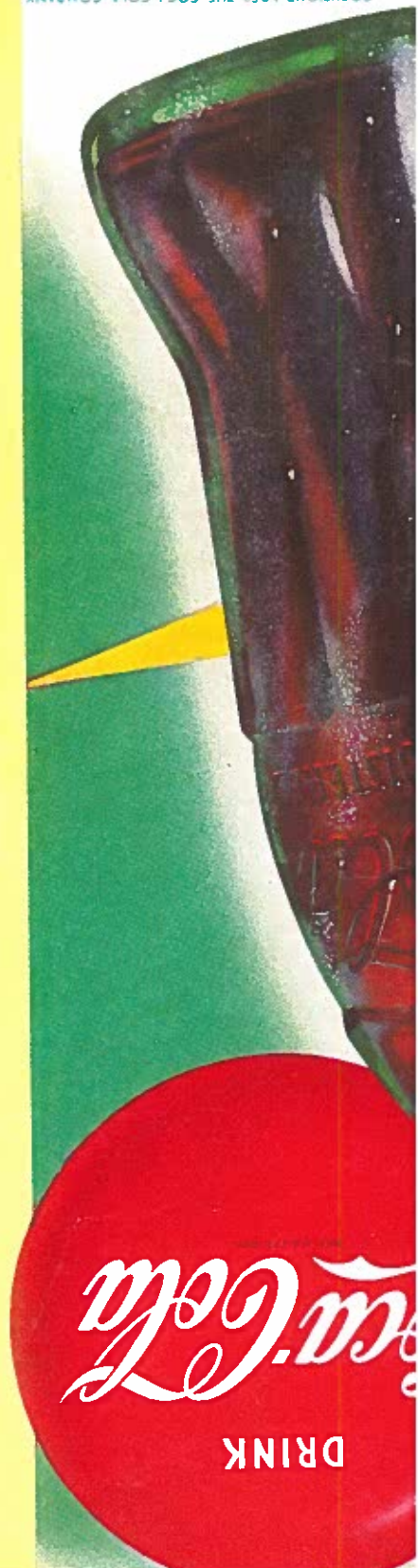
