### AS WE REMEMBER HIM

To print all the glowing tributes paid to Mr. Nelson at the time of his retirement and since his death would require more space than is available in this program. The ones which follow were written by school personnel, all of whom served with Mr. Nelson while he was Superintendent of Bellaire Schools. When they worked with him they respected his strength and appreciated his leadership. They now honor his memory.

#### J. V. NELSON: 1877 - 1952

John Vance Nelson, or "J. V." as he was generally known to his friends, was born in the hills of Monroe County about one mile from Jerusalem on May 27, 1877. With his two brothers and three sisters, he attended the nearby one room school, and at the age of fifteen he went into Jerusalem to attend high school where he met and later married Miss Lena Bonar whose interest, personality, and tact were a constant source of help and inspiration to him as he journeyed along the road of success.

Mr. Nelson taught for a decade in the schools at Sardis, Pike Creek. Jacobsburg, and Jerusalem during which time he earned his way through Ohio Northern University to get his B.S. degree in 1907. He obtained his M.A. at Columbia in 1922.

CHINE CONTRACTOR CONTR

From 1911 to 1914 Mr. Nelson taught Latin in the Bellaire High School when in the latter year, the enrollment was 249. Then for two years he was Superintendent of the Monroe County Schools, but in 1916 he returned to Bellaire as principal of the high school. On his birthday in 1918 he was elected Superintendent of the Bellaire Schools, and he served in this position until 1949. He remained with the Bellaire schools as purchasing agent, but his health began to fail, so he retired. He died on April 16, 1952.

As Superintendent, Mr. Nelson strove continuously to maintain financial stability and high standards of scholarship. Three buildings were opened during his time: Indian Run in 1919, and West Bellaire and the present high school building in 1925.

Mr. Nelson was an early member of the Ohio Valley Athletic Association and therein did much to help set up regulations which have stabilized valley athletics. He felt that athletics should play a definite roll in community and school life. As he said to a newspaper reporter in 1936: "Athletics, particularly football and basketball, give the needed tone to a community, something around which the people can rally. If the game is not played by bona-fide players it can become a menace to the community. I believe that the best football is developed through a program of non-promotion with those boys participating who have grown up in the schools, developing within themselves the proper spirit . . . Football played as an adventure for the participant and amusement for the spectator, and subordinate always to school work helps unify a community." Mr. Nelson's leadership in bringing about the founding of Nelson Field marks the growing up of athletics from the sand lot stage of his earlier years to the stadium stage of today.

Mr. Nelson lived to see the Bellaire Schools housed in up-to-date buildings valued at a million and a half dollars, and the high school enrollment multiply five fold. Every phase of community life felt his influence either as a leader or as a public speaker in its many religious and benevolent organizations. As an elder he was especially proud of his work in the Presbyterian Church, but above all he seemed to enjoy having so many children know him, and to speak to him using the familiar title, "Mr. Nelson."

He was a great leader in education, not only by precept, but by example, having for his ideal, "Education for Character." His influence here was spread like waves on water in ever widening circles over the lives of men, women, and children who, because of his unselfish devotion, warm responsiveness, and helpful encouragement to them, still express their love and admiration for him.

For thirty-five years, he was a high school teacher, a high school principal, and a superintendent in the Bellaire Public Schools. He was an executive of high standing among his associates, loved and respected by all. During this time, he will be remembered for his kindliness, gracious cooperation, and his humor.

He gave liberally of his time to his community. His speaking engagements took him to practically every organization. His addresses were very lucid, beautifully organized, and well delivered. Part of the secret of his success lay in his wide interests. He could talk on most any subject; books, politics, travel, people, and religion. His versatility, initiative, and zeal have drawn his energies into many civic channels.

Yet, he was always faithful to the work in the church of his choice which was the Presbyterian. He was on the building committee, pastoral relations committee, Sunday School teacher, and elder, the highest office for a layman in his church.

His rich personality, ripe experiences, and continued services was the crowning glory of a long career of usefulness — a life of unselfish devotion to others.

All who were influenced by him can best express our indebtedness in these lines:

There is no better service man can lead Than to become a teacher, councilor, friend,

And those of us who have this friendship shared

Now pay our homage to him unimpaired.



It was thirty years ago that I first met Mr. Nelson. The word "striking" would well apply to his appearance. His carriage was that of a West Pointer and it gave one the impression that he was taller than he actually was. Walking into an assembly of people with his head erect, his iron gray hair and his piercing eyes made people realize that no ordinary mortal was coming into their midst. Many a time I have seen all eyes focused upon him.

However, his personality was every bit as striking as his looks. He had an amazingly large stock of information on practically every field of knowledge. He had read extensively and he remembered what he had read. His was truly a first rate mind.

He was a forceful speaker and no one ever accused him of being dull. But as a conversationalist, he was really brilliant. Many a time the long road between Bellaire and Columbus with all the twists and turns in Guernsey County would pass like magic and all on account of his conversation.

He had a nice sense of humor, he was tolerant of human frailities, and at no time did he gossip or discuss personalities. One thing he detested and that was sham and hypocracy.

Mr. Nelson was really a kindly man. In all my association with him, I have never heard him make one disparaging remark about any one. To me his life approached more nearly that of the Christian ideal than that attained by most people.

#### MR. NELSON

Mr. John V. Nelson, teacher, principal, and superintendent of Bellaire Public Schools, was a man who, true to American tradition, really came up the ladder of success. A believer in hard work, he drove himself harder than anyone else. A genuine scholar, he admired scholarliness in his students and teachers. Always progressive, he liked to see his two major projects completed — his church and Bellaire High

School. One of the charter members of Kiwanis, he later served as lieutenant governor and president. A school man to the core, he was highly esteemed in the State Department, and as one of the members so aptly put it, Mr. Nelson always bent over backward to be a gentleman. At the peak of his career he had ceased to werry about public opinion and did what he thought best. However busy, he always took time to lend a courteous, although sometimes dissenting ear. With his finger always on the pulse of every school activity, one of his keenest delights was to follow a child's progress from kindergarten to senior honor student, and, then up the ladder of success in the business world.

His record speaks for itself, and when cur class-work sometimes becomes a vague confusion, we will still be able to feel the grip of his thought, and the stimulus of his personality. With his passing we have indeed lost a gentleman, a civic leader, and a friend.

He contributed much to the education not only of the young people but also the adults. During his time most of the school buildings were constructed and a philosophy of education was developed which now exists.

He was devoted not only to his church work but to all religious groups whose idea was to develop a better and moral life.

Bellaire owes much to this great educator and religious leader.

To me Mr. Nelson was for many years the Bellaire schools. Always I shall consider myself fortunate in having begun my leaching career under his wise guidance and supervision. Failure had no place in his make-up. He gave his best and expected the best of those who worked under him. For this reason anything less than one's best was unthinkable. He was approachable and no one ever left his office, having gone for help or counsel, feeling let down or discouraged. Students and teachers alike respected his judgment and valued his friendship. Every student who attended the Bellaire schools was important to him and he could call most of them by name, both while they were in school and after they had been graduated. Any success which came to a Bellaire boy

or girl gave him deep and lasting satisfaction.

In the school, in his church and as a civic leader, Mr. Nelson gave unstintingly of his time and energy. Not the least of his interests was athletics. He liked a winning team and his enthusiasm at pep rallies always had a stimulating effect upon the student body and upon the team. It seems to me particularly fitting that this athletic field should be called Nelson Field. He loved boys and girls and encouraged them always to live well rounded lives, mentally, physically and spiritually. I feel that he would be happy indeed to lend his name to anything designed for the pleasure and betterment of youth.
