TRUE WINNERS 1978-79 ATHENS TEAM

Every coach seems to establish within his coaching philosphy a team or player that he seeks to pattern future squads after. For Mark Matz, head basketball coach at Bellaire High School, this group not only is one he seeks to emulate each year, but also one which he had the privilege of coaching.

The 1977-1978 Big Reds were not a star-studded team; it contained no superstar or Valley court giant. Yet they captured the OVAC AAA Title, a Sectional crown, their first District title in 70 years, and finally fell to a powerful Portsmouth to settle for Regional runner-up. Ending up ranked 17th in the state, the Reds made it into the final 8 teams before state competion began.

This group of men perhaps displayed the best example of team play and unity of any squad ever to wear the Red and Black. Although Brian Dawson dominated most of the categories, it was only made possible by the unselfish play of Greg Gray, John Helms, Vince Mehl, and Junior Gray. Also lending moral support from the bench at all times when they weren't contributing on the court were JoJo Campbell, Dickie Sketel, Dean Lipperman, Bill Mehl, Bill Wiley, Curtis Feller, and Chuck Mehl.

In December, no one expected them to be in Athens. But slowly, through determination and belief in themselves, the Big Reds inched their way to the regionals. If all teams could develop the pride, confidence, and belief in themselves as this group did, the future of Bellaire Big Reds basketball is extremely promising.

It is to this group of men that we dedicate the 1980-1981 season and program. Welcome back home, Big Reds.

Mr. Frank Danadic is the assistant principal at Bellaire High School. He has worked in this capacity since 1978 taking care of the attendance and discipline.





Mark Matz Boys' Varsity Basketball

When Mark Matz applied for the position of head basketball coach at Bellaire in the summer of 1976, little did he know he would lead the school to one of the best basketball programs in the Valley.

Success was nothing new to him, having participated in varsity baseball and basketball at Bridgeport. Being selected the baseball team's MVP and all-conference team were just the start of rewards for his hard work and dedication.

After attending Anderson College in Indiana for one year he transferred to West Liberty where he majored in Physical Education. Starting his coaching career at Bishop Donahue in 1974, the first-year head coach led the Bishops to an 18-9 record and a state championship. The same year Matz's baseball team duplicated this feat. His second year was just as spectacular. His roundballers went 23-1, winning the state title for the second straight year. On the national level his team was ranked 2nd in small catholic schools.

In 1976, Coach Matz had the opportunity to pilot the Big Reds. Under his guidance the Matzmen have accomplished the following feats: 77-25 record, 4 sectional championships, 2 OVAC championships (AAA and AAAA), 1 district championship, 1 district runner-up, 1 regional runner-up, and numerous school records.

"This year we must rely on good defense, quickness, and good fundamental basketball to be successful. We must be an opportunistic team, utilizing the whole court and taking advantage of our opponent's mistakes," stated Matz. Adaptability isn't new to the Big Reds. Coach Matz seems to ease his teams into the best style of play for them.

With Matz at the helm, the Bellaire fans can have another exciting season to look forward to. He reminds the fans that, "These are only kids. Give them all the support that you can."

"Our wrestling squad this year looks like they may become a contender, but it is still too early to tell how good we really are."



Mr. Steve Minney, girls' varsity and reserve basketball coach, has a great outlook for the 1980-81 basketball season.

Minney, a graduate of Cadiz High School, went on to further his education at Salem, West Virginia, where he studied Industrial Arts and made this his major. After completing college, he found employment at Buckeye West High School. Minney feels he also has a lot to look forward to with his underclass girls. "The underclassmen are a super group."

The main plan for the year is to establish a good program for the girls and to have several wins. The coach feels he has the team to do the job. In order to obtain the goal set by the new coach the girls must put in hard, long hours of practice and dedication. This will enable them to obtain what's expected of them.

Connie Hibbitts, a senior has been among the top five high scorers in the Ohio Valley in the last 2 years. "She always shows a lot of desire and hustle," said Minney. "She is a team leader and always gives a 110 percent when on the court." Kim Mokros, senior, is another very important part of the team. She handles most of the inside work. A strong insider player, she also shows a lot of desire. If she continues to progress, she will be a fine ball player by tournament time. Stella Bryan, reserve coach





No one ever said it would be easy. As a matter of fact, it took ten years to build, but today the BHS PUBLICATIONS department has become recognized throughout the United States for their ability to produce an average of five productions at one time, using the same staff and facilities in the process. And the amazing part is that ALL of this is done "camera-ready," meaning the productions are ready for the printing presses when they leave Room 332.

Under the direction of Thomas E. Rataiczak, BHS PUBLICATIONS <u>rogram</u> became reality this year, with the school newspaper, THE TRIBUNAL, the school yearbook, the BELJUAN, the Quill & Scroll Society, and the school district paper, the REPORT, all merging together into an editorial board which decides all the policies for the staff and the production schedule each is to follow. Meeting every Monday during lunch, the group of eight students help determine the week's schedule and priorities.

Recently, the staff received international attention by being used as the lead-in article for QUILL & SCROLL, a magazine sent to honorary journalism students throughout the world. The article pointed out how well-organized the staff was and how they were able to meet such a grueling schedule. Through this organization, the staff produces a 208-page yearbook, nine issues of an 8-page newspaper, five issues of a district-wide newspaper, a monthly newsletter for its alumni association, brochures for the Bellaire Relays, booklets for area women's clubs, pamphlets for the Medical Foundation of Bellaire, basketball programs for the OVAC All-Star Classic and the District 12 All-Star game, the program you are now reading, and the list continues.

The staff has equipped its own darkroom and does all the printing for these publications themselves. Six photographers are kept busy each week shooting and developing hundreds of pictures. Likewise, type is set on a professional typesetter by three experienced typists, saving the staff and student hundreds of dollars each year. But perhaps the most unique feature of this group is the fact that all the staff members are versatile. The days when one person does one job are over. Each staff member is trained in several jobs — pasting, trimming pictures, writing, layout, typing, etc. — so that they can be utilized wherever needed, whenever needed. This is really the success behind the program. The staff takes a tremendous amount of pride in their work; and it shows.

The motto, "Training amateurs for professional roles," is more than just some words. To the BHS PUBLICATIONS staff, it is a commitment to producing works on a professional level.



Mark Bonar, timer




