


another.

Mark Matz came to Bellaire High School in 1976, well aware of the reputation Bellaire basketball had throughout the Valley. Bringing with him Gene Ammirante and Kim Clifford, the three set out to develop an even better program than Bellaire already had. His credentials from Bishop Donahue were definitely impressive: 41-10 and two state championships. But, then again, that was only a small Catholic school in West Virginia, right?

Bellaire has always had the athlete, but several goals always eluded the Reds, like Valley championships and a district title. Under his direction, the Reds won close to 100 games, 4 sectional championships, 2 OVAC titles (back to back in the AAA and AAAA), a district championship, and the coveted trip to Athens for a regional runner-up title. In addition, Matz-coached teams presently hold over 50 of the school's basketball records.

But the above are really not what's important in building a basketball program. Although the fans like seeing all the titles and honors coming in, the winning teams were built in the off-season, not during the season. Giving his assistant coach, Gene Ammirante, full reign, Bellaire students were enrolled in every camp and clinic available. Basketball became a way of life for many. However, the real success of the program had nothing to do with basketball, for Matz emphasized two qualities that made Bellaire basketball what it really is: pride and confidence.

Down at halftime more than they wanted to be, the Reds always knew that the locker room talk was going to be a positive one, stressing how to win rather than why they were losing. Everywhere the Reds went - camp, away games, restaurants - they went with class and pride. That positive attitude was carried into the classroom and, for many, into their present day life.

Matz retired at the end of the 1980-1981 season to devote more time to his family. He remains, however, that positive guiding force at Bellaire High School. It is to this man that we dedicate the 1981-1982 Winter Sports Program.


Frank Danadic, asst. principal






Mr. Jeff Stolz, a graduate of Bellaire High School in 1970, is currently a teacher and head wrestling coach at his alma mater.

During high school, he was a three-year letterman of the wrestling team and the captain his senior year. He was also a two-year letterman in football. Some of the honors he received during his high school wrestling career were runner-up in the OVAC tournament and champion of the district and sectional tournaments. He achieved both of these honors during his junior and senior years.

Coach Stolz attended Bethany College where he was a fouryear letterman of the wrestling squad and again reigned as captain his junior and senior years. When competing in Conference Tournaments, he earned a fourth place standing as a freshman and third place as a sophomore. He graduated from Bethany with a major in health and physical education and a minor in biology.

Coach Stolz accepted a CETA job, at Rose Hill his second year out of college. The classes that he taught were mostly physical education for grades kindergarten through seventh. He also volunteered to help coaches Bowman and Kovalick with the wrestling team.

Even though 10 grapplers were graduated last year, leaving only five experienced ones to hold varsity positions, Coach Stolz still feels confident about the team. "Even though we are rebuilding, I think we will always be competitive because our kids are physically and mentally tough," stated the coach. In the past two seasons the wrestling team has been successful with an 8-4 and an 8-5 dual meet record.



She also said, "Today there are jobs and many other activities competing for the girls' attention while in the past there weren't as many."




Stella Bryan, Girls Assistant

WBHR BELLAIRE HIGH SCHOOL RADIO

by Jeff Campbell What does Bellaire High School have that only two hundred other high schools in the whole country DOSSess?

This would be WBHR, the radio station that begins its sixth year of operating at BHS. This year, the station has a new studio and better programm and is ready to provide the Ohio ing Valley with alternative radio.

WBHR is located on the third floor of Bellaire High School in the back of Room 344. It has a power out-put of a hundred watts and can be found at 88.7 FM.

The operating hours for the station are Monday and Wednesday 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday of each week.

The beginning of WBHR goes back to 1975. At this time, Mr. Norman Russell, advisor of the station, was working at WWVA in Wheeling. He took two turntables that were being given away and decided to start an in-bend refine stering to elay marks for school radio station to play music for students.

After talking to a friend about having a high school radio station that went over the air, Mr. Russell formed the Radio Club. He had decided that going on

the air was just as easy as having an in-school station. The Radio Club had to have money for the equipment. Without help from the Board of Education, the members sold T-shirts and held a bike-a-thon to raise funds for WBHR.

Finally on May 26, 1976, the first broadcast was made. WBHR was a network of 140 other high school stations and able to boast that it now part of a network of 140 was the first in the Ohio Valley.

In the first five years of broadcasting, WBHR played mainly the same type of programs carried by commercial stations. Since it is licensed by the Federal Communications Commission as a noncommercial educational station, Mr. Russell decided that a change in the format was due.

"I do not wish to duplicate the services already in the valley," said the advisor about the type of station he wants to have. He doesn't want to be like a

With this in mind, he and a few students built a new studio in the back of his classroom over the summer. This has allowed him to work with the students better and be closer to the station to repair equipment. Along with this change will come new programming. "We hope to carry public affairs, performing arts, various types of music, and sports," said Mr. Russell.

This expansion will include programs produced by the thirty members Club. This type of format is very rare for most high school stations. Most, high school broadcasts are made of pre-recorded programs sent to of the Radio Club,

Most high school broadcasts are made of pre-recorded programs sent to the station. But if Mr. Russell has his way, the operators at WBHR will be producing their ewn shows on such topics as alcoholism, divorce, and city projects. These changes have come about as a result of the Board of Education's vote to give credit to operators at the station. The Board voted to give each student ¼ of a credit per year. This was a major victory for Mr. Russell and his staff at the station who had been trying to get credit since WBHR began broadcasting. The system set up for credit is an independent study program, in this

The system set up for credit is an independent study program. In this format, each student will be required to choose a project at the beginning of the grading period. The advisor will then check the operator's work and give points to them for their accomplishments.

Some of the projects that students can use are production of public affairs programs and the design of a WBHR handbook to be used as an operator's manual for members of the station.

This winter, the big sport is basketball and WBHR has expanded its format to cover it. Bill Dallison and Richard Crofton, juniors, will announce boys' varsity games. Chuck Miller, junior, and Michael Newhart, sophomore, will cover all the reserve action.

During the summer months while the studio was not being built, some members of the Board of Directors of WBHR visited WKWZ, a high school radio station in Syosset, New York. Here, they talked with the operators and compared the two stations. Mr. Russell planned the trip, and he also got the idea for the

the two stations. Mr. Russell planned the trip, and ne also got the idea for the independent study program from this school. In the next year, Mr. Russell hopes to have a more diversified program roster for WBHR. It is there to serve the people of Bellaire, and the staff is going to make every attempt to have as many public affairs programs as possible. With a new studio and format, students will take more pride in their station. All these changes should provide WBHR with a more professional sound. It is not every high school that has their own radio station. WBHR is a unique asset to Bellaire and provides a chance for students interested in broadcasting to test their skills.

Under the direction of an editorial board, the group is entirely run by students. Each Monday, a group of seven students and Thomas E. Rataiczak, the advisor, meet to decide the staff workload and co-ordinate the various deadlines. All decisions on spending, policy, discipline, and production are made by a majority vote of the board, and this more than anything else is responsible for the success they've enjoyed.

The type for all productions is set on their own composer and everything is prepared for the printing press directly in Room 332, BHS PUBLICATIONS' new office. The only phase of production that can't be completed is the actual printing, and that is only because of the lack of a press.

And this work is starting to pay off. Graduates are beginning to leave BHS and find jobs on newspapers, both as writers and photographers, and make the adjustment with remarkable ease. The result of the program? The teacher? Nope, it's neither. It's the result of a lot of hard work, dedication, and above all, PRIDE. There's no group like them anywhere in the United States. And they haven't reached their potential yet. Mike Sherwood Record Holder At BHS

Mr. Mike Sherwood guided the Bellaire Big Reds football squad to a 8-2 record this past fall. This was his second year as head football coach and raised his two-year record to 16-3-1.

Mr. Sherwood graduated from BHS in 1967 where he was a standout in both football and basketball. He later went on to play on the gridiron for West Virginia University.

While at Bellaire, Coach Sherwood was very successful in sports. He was a starter for one year on the football team and a two-year starter on the cage squad. As Mr. Sherwood reflected back, he stated, "I enjoyed basketball a little more than football. I feel I had a little more success in basketball because I was a starter for two years."

Mr. Sherwood holds down several BHS cage records, one of which may not be topped for a long time, if ever. It is also a very memorable one for the present grid mentor. The record is that of 59 points scored in one game. This mark is probably the most significant of his records.

One of the most conspicuous games recalled by Mr. Sherwood was a contest against Moundsville his senior year. The Reds accumulated 118 points in that outing and dominated their opponents. The former star recalled, "That was probably the best example of team effort that we put forth. We had seven or eight guys in double figures and I think every-one on the team scored."

Unfortunately, he has a few bad memories about hoop, also. "We were beat in a district game as one of our better players got thrown out of the game on a controversial call. It was one of those bad memories that you would like to forget, but you can't." This example only proves that athletes must take the bad as well as the good. (continued page 42)

Mr. Sherwood also holds a couple of football records that may continue standing for a good while. The most prominent is his 20 touchdown passes in one season. This mark hasn't really been seriously threatened since it was set. Another grid mark held by the second-year coach is that of total yards in a season. As a senior, Sherwood gained over 1,300 yards through the air and on the ground. This is yet another archive that has lasted in the Bellaire record books over the past 15 years. Mr. Sherwood said of records, "It's nice to have them to look back upon, but I don't think an athlete should concern himself with individual statistics during his season."

Looking back on his youth, the memento's are numerous. He recalls, "It's hard for me to remember a time when I wasn't shooting baskets or throwing the football in the summer with my brother. Too many young people concern themselves with jobs and other things when they're in high school. A lot of people realize after they are out of high school what they missed out on. You've only got a couple of years to be an athlete. I was fortunate enough to play four extra years at WVU. Young people should realize that they've got the rest of their lives to work, but only a short time to participate in athletics."

Mike's brother, Kelly, also starred in sports during his high school career. He also holds a few BHS marks in football.


In college, Mr. Sherwood was a standout performer his junior and senior years. He set Mountaineer passing marks that still stand, although a young man who played this past fall for WVU, Oliver Luck, has broken a few of those records. Mr. Sherwood felt that the competition at the college level was very vigorous. He commented, "It's a lot tougher in college from a physical standpoint. At a major university, you have a lot of guys who were all stars on their respective high school teams. The athletes in college are there because they want to be there. Often in high school, there are guys on the team who are there because of peer pressure, or pressure from their parents."

The reason Mr. Sherwood pursued a football career in college over basketball was mainly because of his size. He felt that he would have a much better chance with football than with hoops. The successful gridder admits, though, that he did a lot of growing in college.

Mr. Sherwood went on to serve as an assistant coach at Waynesburg and Bethany. The sophomore mentor added, "I decided around the time I was in high school that I would like to coach."

Returning to Bellaire provided the coach with new challenges as he took on his first head coaching job. It was a hero returning to his hometown to take the controls of a once-successful football program. Mr. Sherwood was pleased about coming back as he said, "I think everyone in that kind of situation would want to go back. I guess I can say that noth-

ing has really happened that I didn't expect."

He returned to Bellaire football bringing with him new formations and new ideas. The inception of the "winged T" and the "power I" formations have brought much success over the past two seasons. Mr. Sherwood is a firm believer in the art of physical intimidation. The weight program has also been improved since his arrival. Coach Sherwood's idea of mashing the football right up the field has made many a team walk away in disgust.

This past season was an "oh so close" season as the Reds lost two games by a combined total of just eight points. The heartbreaking loss on closing day to Martins Ferry prevented the Big Reds from their first OVAC championship in 17 years. The squad will welcome about 12 lettermen back next year in hopes of another successful season.

Coach Serwood's future plans are more or less up in the air. The grid mentor mentioned, "At this point, I have a hard time seeing past the next two years. I can't see anything more than staying at Bellaire."

The past for Mr. Sherwood is one full of glory and accomplishment. As a youngster, he was very intense and hard working. He was a prime example of a dedicated athlete who wanted nothing short of success. He realized the satisfaction that was attainable out of athletics, and he learned this at a very young age. Taking all this into consideration, he set out to accomplish his goals with great earnest. Coach Sherwood recalls many memories as he stated, "I remember a lot of the guys on the team would go swimming at the pool for a couple of hours and then we would pick up a game of touch football. We would play for a couple of more hours." High school was a period in his life that was full of chal-

lenges and opportunities. His senior football squad was considered to be one of the best in Bellaire's history as they supported a 9-1 record. His cage team went to the district tournament before being eliminated. This period in his life was one of the most enjoyable that he ever experienced as Mr. Sherwood expressed, "I feel that my BHS years were probably the most enjoyable in my life."

The ex-star added some final thoughts, "Athletics have always played a major role in my life." Sports provide very gratifying experiences, and Coach Sherwood's case demonstrates this fact. He is a man who will probably always stick to the ideals of hard work.

He is the son of June and the late Edward "Pie" Sherwood. "Pie" was very active in Bellaire sports until he passed away last summer. Sherwood currently resides in North Bellaire with his wife and daughter, about two blocks from his previous residence as a child. He is constantly reminded of the past, as he can relate to most of the surroundings of the Ohio Valley. The fact that he is a former standout has regularly followed him over the past couple of years, but it hasn't bothered him very much. Coach Sherwood feels that most people have certain taggings that follow them throughout life.

With so much success behind him, Coach Sherwood more than likely has much success yet to come. We wish him the best of luck.

BHS Basketball Goes National

Any fan who has followed Bellaire basketball for the past few years is well aware of the success they've enjoyed on the court. Their reputation throughout the Valley and Tri-state area has grown into one of respect. But few are aware that Bellaire's basketball program has also been recognized throughout the United States and Canada.

Perhaps the largest project presently being worked on is a slide show that is being used to show other schools how to play defense, Bellaire style. Started at the end of last season, the show was designed by Gene Ammirante and Kim Clifford and photographed by Tom Rataiczak. Using the players as models, the show goes through various drills used by the Reds to condition them for the defense they're expected to play. It was hoped that the show would be marketed this year, but with the change in coaching staffs, the project was shelved for another season.

Ammirante, the "Organization Man," has published several articles in SCHOLASTIC COACH, the Ohio ATHLETE, and other trade magazines showing schools how to organize their programs to get the maximum results out of them. Along the same vein, Rataiczak had published last year an article on how statistics are kept at Bellaire, a system that is being recognized throughout the Ohio Valley as second to none. The article resulted in our system being used in over thirty schools throughout the United States and Canada.

This year the Reds are using their own scorebook designed by the scorekeeper for the scorekeeper. If it is successfully used during the season, plans are to market and sell them next season.

And our fame doesn't stop there. Constantly trying to "sell" basketball to the area athletes, Ammirante has gone out of his way to bring in big names in coaching circles. Last year, the grade school program was treated to the performances of 11-year-old Sean Miller, a ball-handling wizard who has performed throughout the United States at professional games and on television. As a result, the Reds were invited to his home of Blackhawk, Pennsylvania, for an overnight scrimmage with their varsity squad. George and Austin Lehman, two of the world's best ball handlers, also came to Bellaire on November 10 to put on a Pro-Keds Clinic for the Valley youngsters.




