To The Stats

Mention Bellaire Basketball and watch the aficionado's eyes light up. Lee Patrone, Ricky Lee, Darrel Ewart, Ed Burgy, Mike Sherwood, Claire Cribbs, Athens. It's people and teams like these that put Bellaire on the map, and it's people and teams like this that established the pride that present-day teams carry everywhere they go.

But stop for a minute and look about you. What you see as you sit in the Big Reds' gym is more than just pride, but a lot of class too. And for this facet of the program, only one name stands out — THE STATS.

Started under the tenure of Terry Snively, the original idea was to have a couple of girls just chart shots, a job normally designated to boys. Since Thomas E. Rataiczak was then scorekeeper, Snively thought it only natural for him to direct the job. But between the two of them, the program kept expanding. Two girls turned into three, three into four, and the number of stats and the complexity of the charts kept developing. And every time a Bellaire team walked into a gym, "the Stats" were being recognized for their friendly smiles, neat appearance, and accurate stating.

By the time Mark Matz

hit Bellaire, "the Stats" were an established part of the program. With nothing for him to contribute, Matz helped add the class. In the lobby of the gym is a 4' x 8' board showing all the school's basketball records. "the Stats." The Indian-head on the West wall? "the Stats." Look at the gym floor, painted not once but twice. "the Stats." The schedule board? "the Stats." Anything you see in the gym that adds a touch of class was probably thought of or designed by "the Stats."

But this year, the ultimate was accomplished. The system that was developed over a period of seven years and was featured a few years ago in SCHOLASTIC COACH magazine was finally organized into a scorebook/stat system and copyrighted with the Library of Congress. This system was finally marketed this fall and presently is being used by over forty schools throughout the United States.

And so it is to this group of ladies that Bellaire High School is proud to dedicate the 1982-83 season and program. No one ever thought seven years ago that "the Stats" would have reached such recognition, but it was only logical that they would. For they aren't just another group of kids keeping some statistics; they are "the Stats."


We welcome you to Bellaire High School, and hope that regardless of the school you're boosting, you can become a part of this pride.

"This is what I want to do right now. I don't want to be a doctor or an engineer, I want to coach basketball." And coach basketball he does.

Coach Gene Ammirante enters his sophomore year as head mentor, with expectations exceeding last year's. Coach "A," as he is more commonly referred to, took over his post a year ago after highly successful Mark Matz stepped down from the main position. The hoop contingent compiled a 13-9 mark last campaign and journeyed into the District tourney before being ousted by Coshoc-ton.

There are some new looks this year which definitely will have positive effects on the season's outcome. Many incentive programs have been established under Ammirante and they are reflected in the squad's goals. Coach "A" is stressing several key points to his hoopsters, one of which is not winning. "The players must have confidence in themselves, and one of my personal goals is to instill that in each of them. We're not setting victories as one of our goals this year. Once the confidence sets in and everything gets rolling, the wins will fall into place."

The ex-reserve coach kept himself very busy over the summer with the Wheeling Recreation Basketball Camp, the "Yes I Can" Camp, and

countless other endeavors. Included in his occupied schedule was the chore of repainting the gym floor, which is currently considered to be one of the best in the Valley.

Ammirante hopes to retain the running offense and, of course, the devouring full-court defense in his game plan. This swarming type of defense has become ever-so-familiar to Bellaire basketball. Costly turnovers hindered the unit a year ago, but Coach "A" hopes for a drastic turnaround in that department.

Ammirante considers his experiences here at BHS as an "opportunity to work." He stated, "I can't really even call it 'work.' As the head coach, I'm in a position to give direction to many of the players in the program, and not just the 12 on the varsity squad."

Coach "A" resides in Elm Grove, West Virginia, with his wife, Pam, and son, Jerry Michael.

Pride is a major ingredient in the Big Reds' recipe, and Coach "A" certainly gets the pride to come out in his players. He works at his job with extreme intensity and strives for perfection.

He does what he wants to do very well -- he coaches basketball. Oh, does he coach basketball.


When it comes to athletics, Bellaire is known for some of the best sports teams in the valley. Now, we are becoming one of the leading schools in terms of athletic training.


BHS Editorial Board


