# Linsly, Wheeling Central pocket OVAC golf crowns

The City of Wheeling laid claims to the 1999 Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Class 2-A and 1-A golf championships.

Wheeling Central won the 2-A title by 21 strokes over runnerup Toronto and Linsly captured the 1-A crown by 20 strokes over second-place St. John Central Thurs-

This marked the third conference golf title won by a Wheeling school this season. Last week, Wheeling Park copped the 3-A championship.

Vince Zachweija of Wheeling Central gained 2-A medalist honors with a four-over par 76 at the Riverside course near Sardis which played especially long. Additionally, cool, damp and windy weather greeted the golfers when they teed off at 9:30 a.m.

Zachweija was one of three Central golfers to earn All-OVAC laurels. He was joined by teammates Mark Sapon (82) and Scott Seabright (83), along with Bryan Tate of Steubenville Central, who earned the runnerup medalist award with an 81. Also earning all-conference (five lowest scorers) was Andrew Martin of Fort Frye (84).

Coach Mickey Duffy's team showed consistency, turning the corner with a 165 and then combining for 161 on the back side.

Linsly also showed good balance and its four low scorers all shot in the 80s. "I told my team that we would have a good shot if we could all score in the 80s," said veteran Cadet coach Mark Zavatsky. "That's the way it turned out. I was pleased with our performance on a course that played really tough and

Linsly's Drew Tatich and Weirton Madonna's Cory Toth each came in with 81s and Toth won the medalist award when he fashioned a birdie on the first hole of a playoff.

# OVAC 4-A, Bel-Roe golf tourneys slated

There's plenty of high school golf action on tap Friday, one in the northern part of the area serviced by the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference and the other in the extreme southern part.

Ten schools will form the field for the usually competitive OVAC Class 4-A tournament which will be held at the Highland Springs Golf Club, east of Wellsburg.

At about the same time, 10 schools will be competing in the 20th Bel-Roe Golf League ment at the Riverside Golf Club

EDISON HIGH is expected to make a strong defense of the OVAC 4-A title that it won a year ago at the Spring Hills Golf Club near East Springfield in Jefferson County.

Joining coach Tom Bocek's eam in the 4-A event will be Weir, Steubenville, Buckeye Local, Camoridge, East Liverpool, Zanesville, 3rooke, John Marshall and Wheeling Park. Cambridge was runnerup last year, with Wheeling Park, Brooke and East Liverpool rounding out the top five.

A new medalist is assured as Steubenville High's Justin Holman, who won medal honors the last two years, has been graduated. In last year's tournament, Holman and Buckeye Local junior Larry Boroski finished their rounds at five-over par 76. Holman won the title on the second hole of a playoff. Boroski has also enjoyed much success in the conference event. He also earned All-Tournament honor sophomore when he finished among the five low scorers, and just missed that designation as a freshman.

Tournament director Tom Smarrella of Brooke High said he's split the field into 11 foursomes and two threesomes, with the first group slated to tee off at 8 a.m.

MARTINS FERRY is cast in the role of defending Bel-Roe champion, finishing nine shots ahead of runnerup St. Clairsville in last year's event held at the ClairMar course in Powhatan.

The title was the second for coach Ken Campanizzi's Ferrians in the 20-year history of the event. For St. C., the runnerup finish was its seventh. Coach Richard "Lefty" Hall's Red Devils have also won the title on nine occasions.

Joining Ferry and St. C. in the field will be Shadyside, Bellaire, St. John Central, River, Beallsville, Monroe Central, Union Local and Barnesville.

St. Clairsville and Ferry finished regular season league play in a tie and the two teams will match scorecards for the initial nine holes to determine the regular season crown.

A new medalist and runnerup are assured. Mike Mayhugh of Ferry won his second medal title a year ago with a 71, nosing out Monroe Central's Justin Sawyers by a stroke. Both of these golfers have since been graduated.

The Bel-Roe tourney is unique in that six golfers per team are allowed to compete. The first group will tee off at 9 a.m.

### Park golfers bag OVAC 4-A crown

Medalist Mike Ricci shot even par to lead an underdog Wheeling Park team to the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference Class 4-A title Friday at the Highland Springs Golf Club near Wellsburg.

The Patriots carded a team score of 312 over the difficult layout to topple Cambridge by 14 strokes. Defending champion and pre-meet favorite Edison settled for third place at 332, while rounding out the top five in the 10-school field were Buckeye Local at 339 and Weir at 340.

"Our kids were big underdogs," said ninth-year head coach Mike Ricci, father of the tournament's medalist. "Edison had defeated us in the regular season, and we felt they and Cambridge would be the teams to beat."

Young Ricci made the turn in even par 36, which included a save after hitting the ball into the water on a par three hole. He dropped, but then knocked the ball in the hole to save par. With birdies on Nos. 12 and 13, he went two under and stayed that way until he bogeyed each of the final two holes.

"Our kids came to play and I'm real happy for them," said coach Ricci. "They are a great bunch of kids and work hard. I told them before the start of the tournament that we'd be right in there if we got two scores in the 70s and two in the 80s, and it worked out that way. Our balance worked out good."

Ricci, a junior, heads the all-OVAC team consisting of the five lowest scorers. Sophomore teammate Keith Miller and Buckeye Local senior Larry Boroski tied for runnerup medal honors at 76, and also earning all-conference laurels were Robbie Mattheson of Cambridge (77) and Nathan Hubbard of Edison (78). This marked the third straight year that Boroski has earned all-OVAC honors.

Back of Ricci and Miller for the Patriots were the Hatcher sisters, with Lori, a senior, carding an 81 and Allyson, a freshman, posting an

This marked the second OVAC title for Ricci's team in the last three seasons. The Patriots' next major outing will be the Wheeling City Championship against Linsly and Wheeling Central on Oct. 4 at the Wheeling Country Club. Park will then play host to the Class AAA Regional at Oglebay Park's Speidel course on Oct. 18. The Patriots' victory in the conference tournament improved their overall record to 51-19-1.


