# **OVAC** volleyball tourney unfolds this Saturday

### • Event held at UL

No, you haven't been locked in a time capsule and no, it's not deja vu. The lineup for this year's OVAC volleyball playoffs does resemble the 1999 cast of characters.

With all four defending '99 champions back as top seeds in this weekend's tournament, it's hard to believe that the OVAC has developed more parity over the past few years.

When the annual championships get under way at Union Local High School in Morristown on Saturday, the teams to beat will be the teams that did not get beat in the '99 tourney.

Indian Creek, ranked third in the state of Ohio and a state runner-up just two years ago, is back as an unbeaten and top seeded team in the most competitive division of the OVAC tourney.

Cameron, a champion last year after advancing to the playoff finals three straight years, comes into the tournament with Indian Creek as the only unbeaten teams left in the conference,

East Liverpool, a two-time defending champion after having a very off year in '97, comes in with one of the most consistent teams in the big school division, but just barely edged out Brooke for the top-seed.

Shenandoah, who seems to grab OVAC title every other year, will try to make it two straight in one of the toughest brackets in the tourney in years.

Action gets under way at the Union Local gym at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday with 2-A semi-finals. The Class 3-A semi-finals are slate to start at noon followed by the 4-A at 2:30 p.m. with Class 1-A play closing the evening with a scheduled 5 p.m. start.

Last season, Cameron swept to the 1-A title while Shenandoah took home the 2-A championship, Indian Creek was a repeat winner in 3-A and East Liverpool in 4-A.

On Saturday, the top-seeded Lady Zeps open action in the semi-finals opposing fourth-seeded Monroe Central while second-seeded Steubenville Central takes on third-seeded Wellsville in the other semi-final at 9:30 a.m. As in each of the division, the two semi-final matches will be played simultaneously on two different courts with the championship finals contested immediately following.

Top-seeded Creek will open 3-A competition with its semi-final match with fourth-seeded Martins Ferry at noon while second-seeded St. Clairsville will take on erful Lady Devils and Buckeye Trails Lady Warriors Monroe Central, Barnesville, Harrison Central, Belthird-seeded Buckeye Trail in the other semi.

At 2:30 p.m., the top-seeded Lady Potters will do battle with fourth-seeded Steubenville and second-seeded Brooke will face off with third-seeded Cambridge in the 4-A semi-finals.

Class 1-A competition closes the day-long tourney with top-seeded Cameron facing fourth-seeded Beallsville and second-seeded Weirton Madonna taking on third-seeded St. John Central in the 5 p.m. semi-finals.

Indian Creek comes in as a three-time defending champion having swept the '97, '98 and '99 3-A titles. East Liverpool won 4-A titles in '99 and '98, Shenandoah was a 2-A winner in '99 and '97, Trail took the 2-A crown in '98 and St. John Central was a 1-A ish. champ in '97.

Oak Glen, the West Virginia state champion in '98, was the 4-A champ in '97 and Conotton Valley was the 1-A titlist in 1998.

Tickets are \$5.00 for adults and \$4.00 for students. Harrison Central AD Barb Hoffman is serving as tournament director.

IN CLASS 4-A, coach Bob Shansky's Lady Potters come in with 10-9 record team that edged Brooke for the top spot by just twotenths of a point. Twice a loser to Indian Creek, East Liverpool twice beat Steubenville, Steubenville Central, Buckeye Local and Youngstown Rayen to advance into the tourney.

Brooke came on strong late in the season winning five of seven to qualify. The Lady Bruins, who lost two of the area's better players through graduation a year ago, got a boost by beating Edison twice, Buckeye Local, Wheeling Central and Magnolia down the stretch.

Cambridge took the opposite route dropping five of eight down the stretch, but qualified with a strong schedule that included wins over Dover, New Philadelphia, Indian Valley, Zanesville, Coshocton and Meadowbrook.

Steubenville bests three OVAC playoff qualified en route to the conference tourney as the Lady Big Reds posted wins over Brooke, Steubenville Central and St. John Central.

IN CLASS 3-A, coach Erin DeSantis' Lady Redskins will take part in the tourney for the second time in two years as an unbeaten. In '99, they entered the tourney with just one loss. Of course, the Creekers won't be without their usual company with St. Clairsville's powbreathing down their neck.

With a lineup that features one of the state's premier players in Brandi Beebe, along with fellow seniors Brenda Difillipo and Natalie Siburt, the Lady Redskins will bring in a perfect 17-0 mark. Indian Creek has recorded two wins over both St. Clairsville and Buckeye Trail this season as well as double wins over 4-A qualifiers, East Liverpool and Brooke and a single verdict over Cambridge.

St. Clairsville, coached by Greg Bizzarri and Jay Tazar, enter another conference playoff as the second seed. Paced by standouts Bethany Piccolini, Lindsay Piccolini and Katy Kubica, the Devils posted a 17-2 mark at the cutoff, nearly matching last year's 20-2 fin-

> The Lady Devils advanced with regular season wins over Cambridge, Buckeye Local, Bellaire, Martins Ferry, Brooke, John Marshall, Zanesville, Shenandoah and Union Local.

> > Buckeye Trail, one of the area's top programs under coach Jeff Beros, advanced to the regional semi-finals before closing last season at 23-4. Despite losing one allstater, the Lady Warriors returned another in the person of Ashley Bates and will bring an impressive 16-4 mark into the tourney.

Trail twice beat Shenandoah, Meadowbrook, Wheeling Park, Cambridge and

Caldwell during the regular campaign en route to the OVAC playoffs. Wins over Indian Valley and Tusky Valley on the final day clinched a playoff spot for the Warriors.

Martins Ferry has made great strides in volleyball in the past couple years and capped off the return with their berth in the OVAC playoffs. Coach Tom Suriano's Lady Riders included a balanced group that reeled off 16 wins and lost only four times this season.

## Indian Creek tops St. C. for OVAC 3-A volleyball title

### Cambridge, Cameron, Wellsville also take home championships

The Ohio Valley Athletic Conference passed out its third championship of the fall sports campaign Saturday afternoon in Morristown.

As the OVAC volleyball tournament was staged at Union Local High School with some familiar faces prevailing.

IN THE OPENER, two teams that are all too familiar with one another met to decide the 3-A championship.

Indian Creek and St. Clairsville hooked up in a battle of volleyball juggernauts.

But, the Lady Redskin dominace continued as for the Lady Red Devils the story was the same as the earlier two meetings this season.

Indian Creek prevailed by a 15-5, 15-10 score over the Belmont County-based school.

The win gave Indian Creek its fourth consecutive title in the conference second largest class.

The Lady Redskins received a fine effort from senior leader Brandie Beebe who did it all for coach Erin DeSantis.

Winning this has not really sunk in. It feels really good. I thought the first game really set the tone early on, an elated DeSantis said following her 10th OVAC championship.

Beebe played a fine match as she scored seven points, had 16 spikes, 13 kills and nine blocks against a quality St. Clairsville club. Beebe also chipped in with two aces.

Lindsay Coniser passed out 25 assists, while Natalie Siburt chipped in with seven points.

St. Clairsville, which slipped to 19-3 on the season entering this week's sectional play at Buckeye, was led by senior-standout Bethany Piccolini.

Piccolini, a state track champion in the long jump, came up with 15 spikes, seven kills and two blocks for the Lady Devils.

Junior-ace Lindsay Piccolini scored two points, had 15 spikes, five kills and six assists.

Senior-standout Katy Kubica led the way in the scoring column as she netted 11 points with five assists. Kubica also passed out five assists.

Indian Creek and St. Clairsville got to the title games thanks to semi-final wins over Martins Ferry and Buckeye Trail, respectively.

The Creek came up with a 15-5, 15-0 win over the Lady Riders and the Lady Devils were 15-8, 15-1

points and passed out 12 assists. Lindsay Lyle chipped in with six kills and five blocks, while Casey

Carter posted three blocks. The Lady Seminoles were paced by Samantha Daugherty who scored

IN THE BIG School class, Cambridge captured the OVAC hardware thanks to a two-game win over East Liverpool.

The Lady Bobcats prevailed by a 15-8, 15-11 score.

The Lady 'Cats were led by Lyndsey Shannon who scored nine points. Randi Arnold had 19 spikes and made six kills.

Stephanie Arthur came up with 12 spikes and five kills. Rachael Shansky was in on 43

sets and 22 assists. The Lady Potters were led by

Constance Fowler who scored four points. Katie Lander and Paula Holman evenly divided six markers.

Lander also chipped in with 11 kills and two blocks.

The Guernsey-County team got into the finals thanks to a 15-17, 15-0, 15-8 decision over Brooke, while Liverpool knocked off Steubenville.

IN THE NIGHTCAP, the 1-A champion was crowned as Weirton Madonna and Cameron hooked up in a battle of West Virginia.

Madonna jumped out in the first game, but Cameron came roaring back to take the first game 15-8. The second game was all Lady Dragons as they came up with a 15-9 decision in the second game to win the conference title.


The win moved the Dragons to 19-0 on the season and captured its second consecutive OVAC title.

# Regular season winding down for OVAC spikers

With a Saturday cutoff date for qualifying for the OVAC volleyball playoffs coming on quick, there are heated races for the spots in each of the four classes.

In Class 4-A, defending champion/East Liverpool has come on strong to just barely take the lead in the big school race while another defending champion, Indian Creek, has opened a comfortable lead in Class 3-A.

Class 2-A leader Shenandoah has seen its big lead cut by more than half in its attempt to gain the top-seed in that division while Class 1-A defending champ Cameron has double its lead in that race.

Of course, the top spots are in question as much as the other three qualifying spots are as the conference heads toward the October 7 cutoff date.

In Class 4-A, it has been a game of musical chairs with teams bouncing around the top spots all season. Coach Bob Shansky's Potters have regained the lead from a runners-up spot a week ago, but hold only a two-point lead over this week s runner-up Steubenville.

The Lady Big Red jumped from fifth place to second with its 7-6 record and 34.0 average.

Brooke, at 7-7 and 32.9, remained in third place for another week while last week's leader, Cumbridge, dropped to fourth after a disastrous week. Weir sits in fifth at 4-5 and 30.7 just 1.3 points behind Cambridge.

In Class 3-A, coach Erin DeSantis' Ohio No. 2 ranked Lady Redskins widened their gap at the top with a 12-0 record ands 72.2 average. The Creek holds a 13.8-point lead over second place St. Clairsville, another valley net powerhouse with a 14-2 mark.

Both St. C losses have come at the hands of IC.

Oak Glen, fresh off an impressive week in which the Lady Bears doubled their record at 10-4, have jumped into third place with at 47.1. Martins Ferry continued its hot pace and owns a 13-3 and 46.6 average in fourth. Buckeye Trail, at 10-3 and 45.2, is hot on the trail in fifth.

In Class 2-A, Shenandoah s nearly-insurmountable lead of a week ago, has been cut considerably by much-improved Wellsville. The Lady Zeps, losers at St. C during the past week, are leading at 13-2 and 50.5. The Lady Tigers jumped from fourth to second at 11-3 and 44.0.

Steubenville Central, despite a good week, fell to third place at 10-5 and 41.3 while Monroe Central dropped from third to fourth at 9-3 and 37.5. Frontier is within striking distance in fifth at 10-5 and 28.1.

In Class 1-A, Cameron continues to join Creek as the only unbeatens as coachSam Bayza's Lady Dragons extended their lead with their 11-0 mark and 43.1 average.

Weirton Madonna, a loser to Cameron last week, remain comfortably in second place at 9-3 and 36.8.

St. John Central, at 6-8 and 19.3, continue to hold on to the third spot while Paden City, at 5-9 and 11.9, continues its grip on fourth. Waiting in the wings in fifth place, despite a 4-11 mark, is Beallsville.

Teams finishing in the top four spots after Saturday s action will qualify for the October 14th OVAC championships at Union Local High School in Morristown.

Action gets underway at 9:30 a.m. with the Class 2-A semi-finals and runs day-long until all four champions are crowned.

# Indian Creek, Shenandoah keep OVAC volleyball leads

' Unbeaten and state-ranked Indian Creek and once-beaten Shenandoah were the only OVAC leaders from last week to continue their hold on the top in the latest standings released by the OVAC.

Cambridge has moved atop the Class 4-A race and unbeaten Cameron has jumped ahead of Weirton Madonna in the Class 1-A while the Creek tops Class 3-A and the Lady Zeps head 2-A as the prep volleyball season heads into its fifth week of action.

With just two weeks of play remaining for teams to qualify for the 3 record and 41.0 average ahead of second place East Liverpool, at 8-5 and 37.5. Brooke holds on to third place at 5-4 and 34.9, while season-long leader Weir fell off to fourth with a 28.9 average.

Two other teams are within a fraction of a point of the fourth spot in 4-A with Steubenville in fifth place at 4-5 and 28.2 and Edison at 4-6 and 28.0.

Indian Creek has beaten all the top contenders but leads the 3-A race by just under seven points despite its 8-0 mark. The Lady Redskins have a 61.3 average, but the top is crowded in the competitive 3-A rankings


top is crowded in the competitive 3-A rankings. St. Clairsville, with its only losses coming to Indian Creek, are second at 11-2 and 54,5 while Buckeye Trail is third at 6-2 and 47.3. Oak Glen has a hold on fourth place with a 5-2 record and 46.6 average. 11-3 and 41.4 while Meadowbrook is sixth at 7-5 and 33.0.

In Class 2-A, Shenandoah continues to walk away with the lead holding a double digit advantage over runnerup Steubenville Central. The Lady Zeps lead with a 12-1 mark and 50.3 average.

Central is second in 2-A at 7-4 and 36.9 while Monroe Central dropped to third at 8-3 and 34.5. Wellsville is fourth at 7-3 and 28.4 and Frontier is fifth at 8-4 and 26.7.

Unbeaten Cameron, a defending OVAC champion, overcame Madonna this week with its 9-0 record and 40.0 average. Madonna is second at 6-1 and 37.1 while St. John Central is third at 5-4 and 21.8.



# **Defending champs** contend for OVAC volleyball crowns

With all four defending champions returning and a new place to play, the OVAC has announced the pairings for the annual OVAC Girls Volleyball Championship Playoffs set for Saturday on the courts at Union Local High School in Morristown.

Ironically, all four defending champions come into this year s tourney as the No. 1 seeds in their respective divisions.

Top seeds in this weekend's championships are Cameron in Class 1-A, Shenandoah in Class 2-A, Indian Creek in Class 3-A and East Liverpool in Class 4-A. All four teams swept both the playoff and regular season titles a year ago.

Saturday s playoff schedule gets underway at 9:30 a.m. at Union Local High School. In the past few years, the OVAC tournament was staged at the McDonough Center on the campus of Wheeling Jesuit, but due to a scheduling conflict at. WJU, the tourney was moved to the Morristown school.

Action on Saturday starts with the Class 2-A semi-finals at 9:30 a.m. with top-seeded Shenandoah facing fourth-seeded Monroe Central and second-seeded Steubenville Central taking on third-seeded Wellsville simultaneous on two gyms. The winners will play immediately following on the main floor for the 2-A title.

At noon, Class 3-A semi-finals will get underway with top-seeded and unbeaten Indian Creek battling fourth-seeded Martins Ferry in one gym and second-seeded St. Clairsville taking on third-seeded Buckeye Trail on the other court with the winners vying for the title.

Class 4-A top-seed East Liver-pool will face fourth-seeded Steubenville while second-seeded Brooke squares off with third-seeded Cambridge in semi-final matches set to start at 2:30 p.m. Winners will battle to the 4-A crown immediately afterwards.

In the nightcap, set to start at 5 p.m, Class 1-A top-seed and unbeaten Cameron faces fourth-seed-

ed Beallsville and second-seeded Weirton Madonna battles thirdseeded St. John Central in the semifinals. The championship matches closes the day s action.

Indian was the 3-A champion in '99, '98 and '97 while East Liverpool captured 4-A titles in '99 and '98. Oak Glen was the 4-A champ in '97. Shenandoah won the 2-A title in '99 and '97, losing in '98 to Buckeye Trail.

Repeating as champion in Class 1-A has been a rarity with three different champs in the past three seasons. Cameron won in '99, Conotton Valley won in '98 and St. John Central won in '97. Of the past champions since '97, only Conotton Valley and Oak Glen are not in this year s tourney.
