If there is one certainty in Ohio Valley Athletic Conference boys soccer play, it would be that when Wheeling Park and Linsly face off, its going to be a thriller.

The two clubs had already met twice earlier this coarse, with Linely

twice earlier this season, with Linsly (15-3-2) winning both games by a single goal.

The first encounter, at The Memorial Cup, Linsly edged Park (10-6-2) in a penalty kick shootout by a 2-1 margin. The second time, Linsly won again by a score of 2-1, in the game that turned out to be the in the game that turned out to be the OVAC Division I championship

Consider this game above both.

In a game lasting five overtimes and nearly three and a half hours, Linsly defeated Park 3-2 in a penalty kick shootout, Monday Night in the OVAC Cup finals at Wheeling Island Stadium.

Stephen Reihner was credited with the game winning goal for the cadets, when his shot gave Linsly a 4-2 penalty kick advantage. Each team is awarded five shots.

'I've been in soccer for over 35 years, and this has to be the most incredible game I have been apart of," remarked Linsly coach Dave Coutts. "There was good hard play between both teams, and it just had a little bit of everything.

Everything would include Cadets goalkeeper Brandon Regan feeding an assist, with less then 30 seconds left in the second overtime, to Jake Mozney tying the score at 2-2 and forcing the golden goal (sudden death) periods.



Park, Bruin Girls Back in Finals

Patriots, Linsly set up rematch in boys' Cup championship

The Wheeling Park and Brooke girls soccer teams set their sixth straight date to meet in the OVAC Cup finals after breezing to easy semifinal wins Saturday afternoon in Wellsburg.

The Bruins and four-time defending champion Patriots will settle OVAC Cup girls' matters at 5:30 p.m. Monday at Wheeling Island

In the nightcap of Monday's championship doubleheader, the Linsly boys will attempt to defend their Cup title against Wheeling Park in another rematch of the 2000

The Brooke girls, who ran away to a 7-2 victory over Weir in Saturday's semis, haven't defeated Park for the Cup since the 1996 championship.

The Park girls banged home eight unanswered goals race past Linsly,

The Patriots found three two-goal games from Julie Gompers, Lauren Gompers, and Brianne Basilone in the dominating performance.

"We had a lot of opportunities," said Park head coach Russ Hutchins. When you have that many opportunities the ball is going to go in the back of the net. Going into a final you have to play well and our kids played well today."

Early on, though, the three-time defending state champion Patriots found themselves in an unaccustomed position, looking up from the wrong end of a 1-0 deficit.

The Cadets came alive in the opening moments of the contest, as Ann Riley surprised Park keeper Jillian Wright with the first goal of the game. Nadia Sawtarie assisted

giving Linsly the advantage.

"These girls are really excited to play them," said Linsly head coach Jill Regan.

"Unfortunately, we aren't allowed to play in the state tournament (Linsly is not an SSAC member) so this is our state championship.

"I think that gives us a little edge in being pumped up and excited for

the game. Unfortunately for the Cadets, the quick goal also served to draw the Park's attention to the task at hand in

the rare morning encounter.

"They scored right out off the bat and we've done that with teams before but these kids are very resilient," said Hutchins. "It just gives them a push, they wake up and go to work."

When the alarm clock sounded midway through the first stanza, the Park girls stole the momentum of the game and never relinquished it.

Five minutes into the second period, Park's Lauren Hutchins scored off a pass from Ashley Adamovich as she sneaked it just past Linsly keeper Ashley Neal.

A short time later Basilone converted an assist from Julie Gompers to put the Patriots ahead to stay.

Linsly's only other highlight came when Julie Gompers fired what seemed certain to be the Park's third goal of the game only to see Neal dive to her left for a dazzling save.

Any hopes the Cadets may have had of drawing inspiration from the play were quickly dashed, however, as Patriot senior Lauren Gompers put

the game out of reach. The Park sweeper put the nails in the Cadets' casket with two more second quarter goals, the first coming on a penalty kick and the second one a powerful blast that sailed over Neal's head, setting Park up with a 4-1 lead at the half.

Once that goal went in the heads went down and they got discouraged," said Regan.
