Ohio Holds Off West Virginia

Monday afternoon's OVAC all-star softball game turned into nothing more than a pitching clinic for the Ohio squad, led by a pair of stellar all-state performers.

Ohio pitchers Stephanie Peddicord of Edison and Natalie

5-0 lead on its way to a 7-4 victory over West Virginia at the Chambers I-470 fields in Elm Grove.

Peddicord — who fanned seven without issuing a walk — began the game by striking out the side, then re-entered in the ninth to strikeout the side and gain the save.

Vinci pitched no-hit ball in the third and fourth, striking out three. Meanwhile, Fort Frye's Kim Heldman fanned five of the six batters she faced to pick up the win.

Ohio held the Mountaineers hitless for seven innings before the designated visitors busted back into the contest.

Trailing 5-0, Linsly's Noelle Adams walked to lead off the eighth. John Marshall's Kristen Doyle singled off of Caldwell's Heather Sayre for West Virginia's first hit, and run, of the game.

Weir's Susan Goysovich reached on a Buckeye error before Cassie Greathouse loaded the bases with a bunt single.

Following an out, Doyle and Goysovich each scored on a wild pitch.

Kim Ayers of Brooke chased Greathouse home with a single, cutting the deficit to 5-4 with just one out.

Ohio added a pair of insurance runs in the bottom of the inning on a run-scoring single by Fort Frye's Rhyan Close and a fielder's choice RBI from Shadyside's Jillian Johnson.

Peddicord — the OVAC Class AAAA player of the year for the regional finalist Wildcats — then set the Mountaineers down in order on strikes to end the contest.

"Stephanie Peddicord is just an absolute remarkable pitcher," said Ohio coach Jackie Marook of Steubenville Central.

"Along with being an excellent athlete, she is a very nice young woman who does her job and is

very humble about it.

"We had planned before the game to start her and then bring her back in the ninth to showcase her a little. Overall, we played a great game, we just had a little trouble covering first base on a couple of bunts in the eighth."

West Virginia coach Charlie Howell of Magnolia was also in awe of the Buckeye hurlers.

"How often are you going to have to face a pitching staff like that?," Howell wondered. "We pitched solid also, and allowed some runs without the benefit of

a lot of hits.

"This was a great experience for me and very well worth the trip. The kids had fun and played hard. This was just very, very nice."

Ohio finally broke a scoreless tie with three runs in the third on an RBI triple by the Crusaders' Tracey Straker and run-scoring fielder's choice from Central teammate Cristen Biggio and the Cadets' Close.

Vinci, the Class AAA player of the year, had a run-scoring single in the sixth while Bellaire's Heather Wright contributed another fielder's choice RBI to make it 5-0.

Overall, the Buckeyes scored four of their runs on fielder's choices.

Jenny Carroll of Beaver Local was the another player to enjoy a multi-hit game with a pair of singles.

Wheeling Park's Stacy Kunz fanned the side in the seventh while Jessica Armann started the contest for the Mountainears, striking out four and taking the

loss on the hill.
