

# **Park** Edges Linsly

#### Aderholt's goal all Patriots need in win

The Wheeling Park girls soccer team survived a stiff challenge from crosscity rival Linsly Monday night to claim its seventh straight OVAC Cup crown with a 1-0 shutout.

Casselyn Aderholt scored in the final minute of the first quar-

ter and a stiff Patriot defense – keyed by hard-nosed keeper Jil-lian Wright – made it stand up.

"It never gets old," smiled Wheeling Park (12-2-2) head coach Russ Hutchins when asked about Park's seventh straight tournament title.

"We talk about the OVAC from day one of practice in August.

"It was a great game with a great crowd that really got loud at the end."

It was the second meeting of the year between the two squads, who also finished 1-2 in the OVAC First Division. and the second time Coach Jill Regan's Cadets (9-4-3) came away on the short end of a 1-0 count.

Regan was anything but dejected following Monday's loss.

"What can you say when your team plays its heart out and just comes up short?" she asked.

"Our motto for tonight was respect and I definitely think we earned it.



Wheeling Park will face Linsly in both OVAC Cup finals

It took Linsly just over 11 minutes to draw first blood in its OVAC Cup semifinal matchup with Weir.

But once the bleeding started, the Red Riders were unable to stop it and Linsly rolled on to an 8-f victory at the Brooke High soccer complex in Wellsburg.

With the win, Coach Dave Coutts' Cadets (13-4-2) earned the right to defend their tournament title against Wheeling Park, which blanked Brooke, 3-0, in

Saturday's other semifinal.

The OVAC Cup championship game will kick off at 7:30 p.m. Monday at Wheeling Island Stadium.

It might have taken Linsly half the first quarter to score the first one, but by the end of the initial 20-minute period, the Cadets had already mounted a

four-goal lead.
"Weir came out and played on the defensive, so I wasn't surprised we were able to score early," Coutts explained.


