# Devils win OVAC

Lady Red Devil head coach Rebecca Hays knows a thing or two about winning OVAC championships.

As a player in 1995, Hays was a key figure on St. Clairsville's OVAC title team and last season as an assis-tant, she was part of the Lady Devils' second conference champion.

Guiding her team back from a first game loss, Hays saw her Lady Red Devils register a 20-25, 25-12, 15-8 win over Harrison Central to capture the school's and her third OVAC Class' 3-A title in the conference playoffs at Union Local High School in Morristown Saturday afternoon.


With the win, the Lady Devils boosted their season mark to 16-6 and successfully defending their OVAC crown after coming into the tourney as a No. 3 seed.

St. C advanced into the finals with an impressive 25-23, 25-19 win over second-seeded Martins Ferry in the semifinals.

Harrison Central, one of the area's hottest teams over the past two weeks, came into the tournament as the fourth seed and finished the day with an impressive 15-6 mark. The Lady Huskies of coach Marsha Zoller moved into the finals with a surprising 25-16, 25-12 win over top-seeded Bellaire in the semifinals.

'It feels wonderful, it's an amazing title," an elated Hays said after the win. "We had a title to defend and we did."



East Liverpool was paced by Briane Bishop with six kills and 13 spikes while Tricia Mackey had six kills and one spike.







Following the wins, BT coach Jeff Beros paid tribute to the competition.


"OVAC competition is improving each year," he said. "We had to be ready to play hard in both matches today. There were no pushovers in Class 2-A. There were four really good teams here today.'



# OVAC tourney: Volleyball at its best



What a year for high school volleyball in the Ohio Valley and what a weekend to come out and watch the best the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference has to offer

in the sport. Union Local High School's dual gyms in Morristown will be the site for the annual OVAC Volleyball Championship playoffs and theone constant that the tournament has offered each year is that it just keeps getting better and better.

This year's tournament marks the 10th straight season that the OVAC has held one tournament in the sport including teams from both Ohio and West Virginia. Just as a reminder that dominating the OVAC volleyball playoffs is no easy task, keep in mind that over the past four years, Class 4-A and 1-A have had four different winners in each of those years and Class 3-A has had three different schools take home titles. Wellsville has captured three of the last four in 2-A and will be returning this year to defend its crown. Three of the four defending champions from a year ago will be back to try to capture yet another ring, only Frontier, who Harrison Central on the main just missed qualifying in Class court and middle seeds St.

Dan McKinstry, the Ohio Valley's winningest coach with 491 career victories, will be bringing his Lady Tigers back on Saturday in hopes of nailing down a third straight crown.

St. Clairsville, a defending champion after taking the 3-A title last year with co-coaches Lisa Kazmirski and Sharon Pastor at the helm, will look for a second straight crown and third overall for the school, as firstyear coach and former Lady Red Devil standout Rebecca Hays leads St. C back to the tourney. Bob Shansky, the OVAC's sec-ond winningest coach, has hopes of adding a fifth OVAC crown since 1994 as his East Liverpool Lady Potters again return to the OVAC playoffs. Shansky guided EL to titles in '94, '98, '99 and **'03**.

In a rule that features more of a defensive player in a specialty role, the Libero is being used in an experimental phase this year and will be available for teams to use in the OVAC tourney. While West Virginia schools do not use a Libero player, some Ohio schools do and may do so since the playoffs are being played under Ohio rules.
